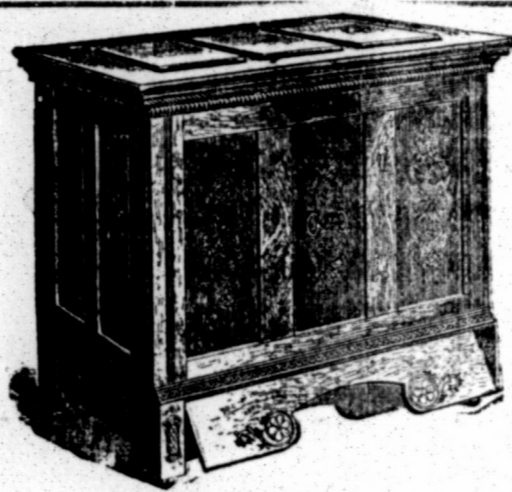

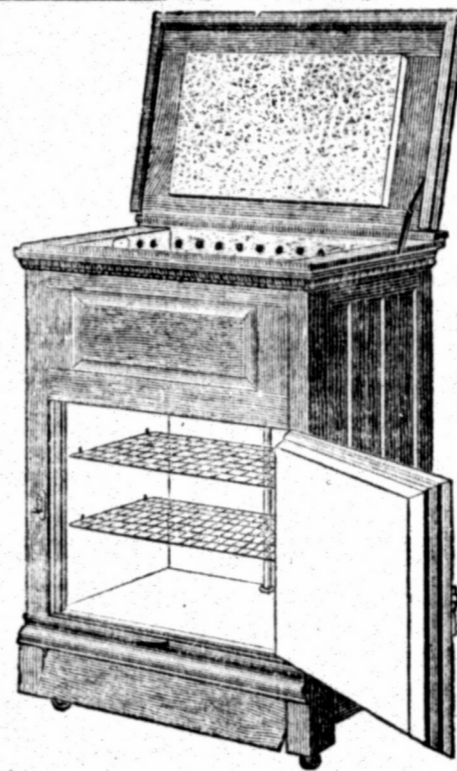

CLARENDON PUBLIC SCHOOL.

Will Close Another Successful Term May 12—Names of the Graduates.

Clarendon Public School will close for the summer vacation on May 12. All of next week will be spent in reviews and examinations and the general public is invited to be present at any or all of these exercises. The session closing has been a successful one in all respects. The total enrollment has reached above 450, while the average daily attendance has been good and the pupils as a whole have done good work and made good grades. Supt. W. R. Silvey and his corps of teachers are to be congratulated on the progress of the

school this year. No town has a better superintendent or a better class of teachers than Clarendon, hence the reputation we have built up as a public school center.

The graduating class this year consists of ten members. They are as follows: Ralph Collinson, T. S. McClelland, Jr., J. B. McClelland, Jr., John Brinley, Roy Stevens; Misses Minnie Thorp, May Lumpkin, Lila McClelland, Mattie Trigg, Millie Baker. Miss Baker is valedictorian. Bruce McClelland, salutatorian; Lila McClelland, class poet, Stanhope McClelland, class historian; Roy Stevens, class attorney.

The graduating exercises will be held Friday evening, May 12. The

primary entertainment Thursday afternoon, and the entertainment of the intermediate department will be held Thursday evening, all at the opera house. All the exercises are free except the one of Thursday night at which a small admission fee will be charged to defray expenses.

It has been the habit of Prof. Silvey to give the school a picnic on the Monday following the close of school each year and the Banner-Stockman suggests that this occasion be again arranged for as it serves to cement the cordial relations always existing between teacher and pupils and is looked forward to by the latter with much pleasure.

Address by Judge O. H. Nelson.

Delivered at Amarillo Panhandle Stockmen's Convention.

In opening this, our first annual combination sale of pure bred cattle, I wish to say that it is our intention to hold these sales each year during the meeting of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association; thereby bringing to your very doors the cattle you need and want. It is well known to you, or most of you, that I personally have been bringing bulls to the Panhandle for many years and am known all over the Southwest as "Bull Nelson", a title of which I am very proud, even more so than I am of my title of "Judge", for it tells in a measure of one of my efforts for the betterment and advancement of the interests of the Panhandle country. During the years from 1881 to 1887, I brought into the Panhandle over 10,000 head of bulls from the "States" as well as many high-bred cows. Dodge City was our nearest railway point. Mobeetie was our first point of distribution, then Clarendon and the Red River points, and as far south as Colorado City. These bulls were the foundation of all the good herds that have since obtained in this country. Of course the most of these were simply grades from the fact that in those days thoroughbreds could not be had in such numbers. For the past ten years the majority of the bulls I have brought in have been thoroughbreds, for the past five years I have handled, no other and hope that I have sold my last grade bull to any ranchman of the Panhandle, for the ranchman, under the present conditions, who will permit a grade bull to run in his herd is behind the times and will in the long run lose money. In our sales of calves and feeders in the corn belt, it is absolutely essential that we can say to our buyers that these cattle have been sired by thoroughbreds, and we must be able to say so truthfully. Those of you who will confine yourselves to the use of thoroughbred bulls, dehorn all your cattle and give them reasonably good at-

tention in the winter will always have a market that will be remunerative and satisfactory. The "good kind" are always in demand and always bring the top of the market; be the market high or low.

These Herefords that we are offering you today are as well bred and as grand a lot for their number as were ever sold in one sale here or elsewhere. I have superintended the feeding and care of the most of these myself and we have brought them to you in the best possible condition for range use. While they have been well fed and are in good condition they have been fed out of doors and a mixed ration of grain, not having been BURNED OUT with corn and when you put them out on grass they will improve in condition from the start, whereas if they were in "show order" condition, they would go to pieces and it would require another year for them to recover, if they ever did.

We of course regret that the rain has come at this time, as the most of our bulls are as you see out of doors and in the mud; this we could not avoid. I care not how good a judge a man may be of cattle, a muddy bull will not look as attractive to him as one well groomed and will not sell so well. You will see this demonstrated today, and our loss will be your gain, but let me say to you, that any of us should be more than pleased to buy a muddy bull when the mud upon him was obtained in the Panhandle at this season of the year.

We are attempting a great undertaking considering the weather, in endeavoring to sell 160 head in two afternoons, and we hope for brisk, fast bidding that we may be able to get through. Help us to make this first sale a success; by so doing, you will do us much good, as well as yourselves, and encourage an enterprise that will be a benefit to the entire state, and the city of Amarillo.

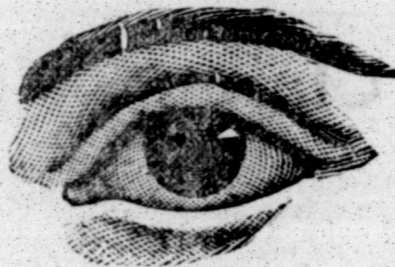

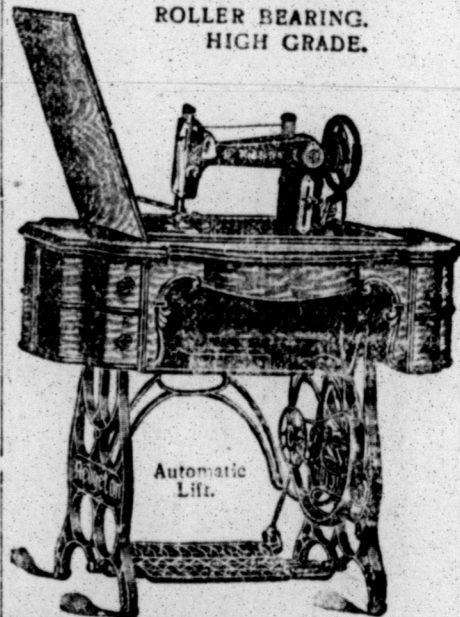

GENERAL STOCK NEWS

A number of yearling steers have changed hands in Childress county of late, the price ranging from \$9 to \$13.50.

Chas. E. Collins, who has been pasturing cattle in the Box T ranch, sold 500 head of 4-year-old steers to Stuewe Bros., at \$40 per head.—Higgins News.

J. C. Montgomery of Hall county has sold to Finch Bros., of the 96 ranch 175 yearlings and 28. The price was \$18 for the 28 and \$14.50 for the yearling.—Childress Post.

Ed Pyer, of the upper Washita neighborhood, recently sold two cars of three and four year old steers. For the threes he received \$31 and for fours \$40 per head.—Canadian Record.

Geo. Hughes, a cattle buyer of Topeka, Kan., was here Tuesday and closed two deals, one with Browder Bros., for 250 head of 4 year old steers and the other with John Gibson for 150 head of 4 and 5 year old steers. They will be shipped out Thursday night.—Memphis Herald.

Capt. E. E. McGee of Leila, Donley county, came in Monday to attend the association. Capt. McGee sold his last year's crop of kaffir corn, threshed at 70 cents a bushel and realized \$15 net from each acre. He had 30 acres. The fodder is not included in this income.—Amarillo Herald.

A. S. Bassett and P. N. Adkisson recently bought 100 top cows out of a Potter county herd of 200, paying \$25 around. They ranged from 2 to 6 years old, most of them being 3 to 4 years. They were a choice lot of cattle and could not be purchased from the present owners at a considerably advanced price.—Amarillo Herald.

DONLEY county is putting on her summer clothes in great style. Prospects were never so good for a fine crop.

THE Banner-Stockman extends a cordial welcome to the visitors now in town attending the District Conference of the M. E. Church.

THE committee having in charge the county fair matter report satisfactory progress in every respect. Copy for a catalogue and premium list is now being prepared, and various other matters pertaining to the fair are being looked after. Further facts will be made known later.

ANOTHER change in the newspaper situation at Amarillo is made evident this week by the taking down of the name of F. L. Vanderburgh as business manager of the Herald and the substitution of E. P. Brooks. No explanation given. We are sorry to see Van down and out for he is not only a splendid good fellow but the first man who has ever given Amarillo a good newspaper.

THE Amarillo Herald had a load picked into it this week by R. D. Kinkead, the windy editor of the Jericho Enterprise, which for plain tom foolery takes the last dilapidated shred of linen off the shrubbery. The "load" consisted of a lurid description of the discovery of a flow of natural gas at Jericho. There seems to have been quite a flow of gas, more or less natural, ever since Mr. Kinkead established his newspaper, real estate office, drug business, postoffice and general gas factory in that thriving and growing burg, and this last "find" seems to be the gentleman's crowning achievement. The Banner-Stockman received the same communication for publication and does not claim to be extra wise in scenting a "nice." By a little investigation we learned that the wonderful "gas" well was simply the product of a little natural phenomenon in the way of an underground current of air as a result of a heavy rain, and a cupful of gasoline.

THE Sixth Annual Meeting of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association is now a matter of history, and interesting history it is, too. The attendance was larger than was anticipated by even the most sanguine, while the secretary's books show a most remarkable growth in membership and power. From a humble beginning six years ago has sprung a powerful organization, destined to make history not only for the Panhandle but for all Texas as well. The members are the men with whom the northwestern buyers do business, and the attendance of these buyers at this convention indicate that they recognize the importance of the organization. More cattle were sold at this meeting than at any other live stock convention which has been held in Texas in recent years. That the association is growing is evidenced by the fact that Amarillo is now the only Panhandle

town that can care for its annual conventions, and if the growth and attendance is as great for the next year as it was the past twelve months even Amarillo will find lots of trouble in accommodating the crowds. All honor to the Panhandle Stockmen's Association and the men who have made it what it is.

George Washington made a trip to Channing the first of the week and got caught behind the washout. He says the plains country was a veritable sheet of water, it being impossible to get about in the town of Channing.

The Clarendon Produce Co., T. J. Davis manager, reports that the demand for eggs, chickens and other produce except kafir corn is much greater than the supply. They are building up a nice business and are offering the farmers cash for all produce.

The editor is in receipt of a card from Charles R. Lewis, now at Washington, D. C., saying that he was successful in his application for a government job, standing his examination and "beating out the bunch" for the position. He will be employed in the Customs Department, having the title of First Assistant Collector. The Banner-Stockman extends Charlie its hearty congratulations and best wishes.

The biggest rain of the season fell in Clarendon Saturday night and Sunday, the government rain gauge showing a precipitation of 3.60 inches. This brings the total rainfall for April up to 7.68 inches, which statement will perhaps be an eye-opener to some of the people who are so misguided as to think it rarely ever rains in the Panhandle. The season now in the ground is very fine, there have been no hail or sand storms yet this spring, and the farmers are all at work and very happy over the prospects. If you want to farm and be happy come to the Panhandle.

MY DEAR SIR:

I am constrained to deny myself the pleasure and profit of being with your association at its sixth annual meeting. Our present state law contemplated, and above all periods, requires at this time of year, the constant services of the commissioner, both for your interests and the interests of Kansas. This being the busy shipping season I feel that it is my duty, which I owe to both Kansas and the Panhandle, to be at my post of duty.

I am pleased to call your attention to the work of Secretary Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, and of Dr. Salmon, as Chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry. Their services and suggestions have been of great value to you vicinity and to this state. Recognizing the thoroughness and reliability of their work, Governor Hoch, by proclamation of rules and regulations, under date of April 1, 1905, provided for the admission of your cattle into the state of Kansas, without restriction when accompanied with a certificate of health issued by the Bureau of Animal Industry.

It occurs to me that Kansas can give you better results, with less expense, on account of their location for markets, and convenience to yourself, than any other locality that you might desire to go to for feed or pasture.
