





This we cannot do when we are doing a thirty day credit business as that only gives us cash once a month, and our accounts at the wholesale houses are coming due all along through the month.

2nd. We do not have the capital to keep up our stock and meet these accounts when most of the work and sales we are making are being charged. We must depend upon our sales for the money to meet our expenses.

3rd. It only takes one time to pay these accounts and at the time of purchase is the best time for you and for us. At the first of the month your account is not larger than you were expecting, and it gives us money to operate on.

We know in making this change some of our customers may get offended when we refuse to let anything leave the shop without first being paid for. But we trust that you will cooperate with us by not asking us to charge anything as we will have to refuse you if you do. You realize that we cannot treat one customer different to another. We must treat all customers alike, giving each and everyone the same treatment. And if we were to break this rule for you it would place us in a position that we would have to break it for some one clae. Then we would soon be doing a credit business again and would be in the same position that we now find ourselves—without capital to work on.
