PANHANDLE CATTLEMEN

Arrangements Going Forward for
the Greatest Session of the
Association at Roswell,
April 6, 7, and 8.

Every day's developments point to the fact that the coming tenth annual convention of the Panhandle Cattlemen's Association, to be held at Roswell the first week in April will be the largest and best in the history of the association.

None of the old-time features will be neglected. To be sure the roping of cattle is prohibited under the territorial laws, but in its place will be given a great goat roping tourney, which will be participated in by some of the best hands with the lasso in West Texas and the territories, who are being attracted by the liberal prizes hung up for the event. Of course a goat isn't a cow or lively steer, but they are fleet of foot, and work on them brings out all there is in the rope artist, who are moved to work all the faster by the elimination of danger to horse and rider in handling big cattle.

The roping will be accompanied by a monster rough riding tournament, which will also be held at the driving park on the afternoon of the second, and the committees are now engaged in scouring the country for all mean horses that can be had for love or money, and there are few in this section of the great dryness.

Some of the best riders in the world have already entered in this department and the wise men expect even a bigger showing of equestrian skill than was brought out at the big Denver show last fall.

On the afternoon of the last day, following the great barbecue, at which it is expected to feed over 5,000 people, there will be a race meet at the driving park, which will include not only harness events but also cowboy races of the old-fashioned sort, and all the trimmings that ought to be at a great gathering of cattle workers.

In addition to the side trips to Carlsbad and other valley points on the 8th and 9th, arrangements are practically perfected for a night trip at a very small charge to the great natural gas well at Dayton, where is awaiting under valve one of the greatest deposits of natural gas in all the west. The well owners are co-operating in the plan and have agreed to turn on the full force of the well in honor of the visitors, making a blaze that will light up the country for miles around, and burning thousands and thousands of cubic feet of gas, for which there is now no use except for the small quantity that is piped to Dayton. This trip in itself will be one of the star attractions of the convention, and it is expected that several hundred people will take advantage of the low special rate from Roswell.

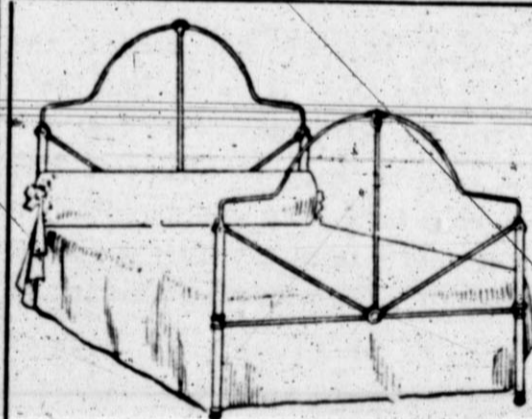
The Millinery Openings.

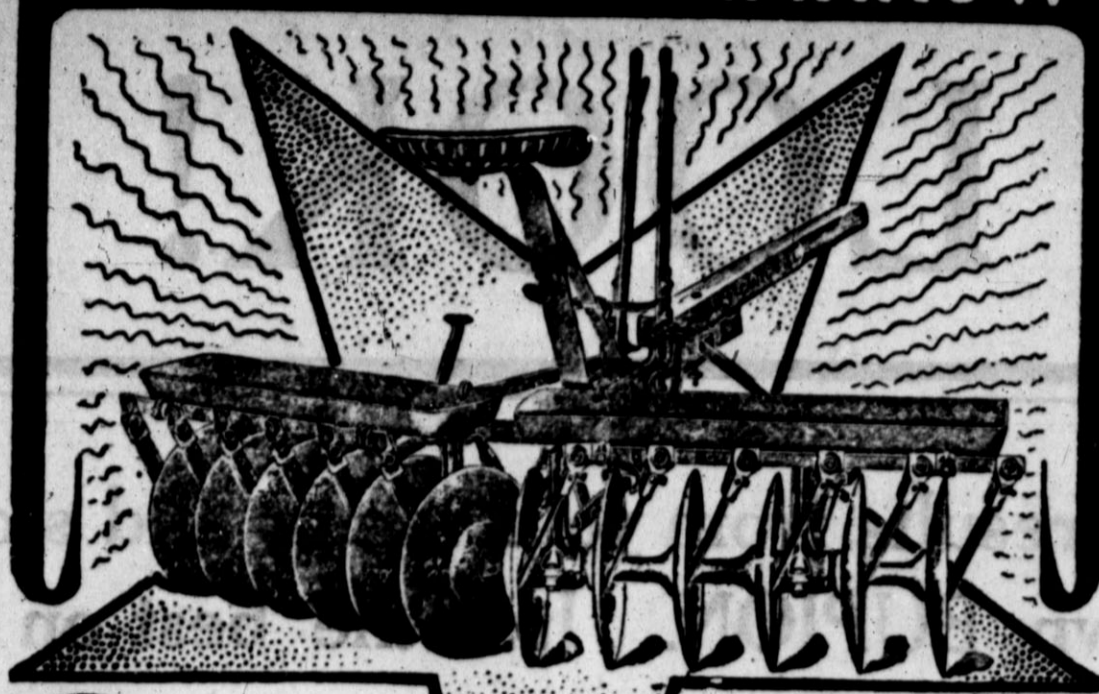

The hitch is low and the tongue is directly in the line of draft, avoiding neck draft and relieving the frame from all strain. The weight boxes are large and have ample capacity. The bearings are **dust-proof** and are provided with **wood bushings**. As a result all wear is concentrated upon these wood parts.

The wood bushings cost but a trifle and are easily renewed, though it is seldom necessary to do so. Owing to the facilities for oiling the bearings they won't run dry. You take out the oil plugs which are in the bottom of the weight boxes, the most accessible place to put them, and fill the oil ducts—they hold a lot of oil, too—then forget about them. The feed is just right and the harrow will run easily without more attention for a long time. These oil ducts are simply **holes cast in the standards**, the lower ends of which form the top sections of the bearings. It is a simple and effective arrangement.

Don't overlook the scrapers—they are one of the fine points on this harrow. A harrow defective in this respect, though perfect in every other, is often useless. HAULS THIRTY TONS

Road Engine Pulls Heavy Load Out of Hereford on Trail Wagons for New Farm.

Some weeks ago, The Brand gave out as a bit of news that C. S. Businga of Franklin Grove, Illinois, would open a 4-section farm in the northwest part of the county this spring. This week Mr. Businga and his two sons unloaded a big 35-H. P. road engine, three trail wagons and the water wagon. Besides one wide tire farm wagon. The trail wagons each weighing empty 5000 pounds, carried a load of 30 tons, equal to three car loads. The wagons were loaded with lumber, cement and cement blocks, sand, brick, angles, and coal were drawn up Main Street by the engine. The procession called everybody to the street. The new engine and the new wagons with side boards six or seven feet high, bearing the inscription, PRAIRIE VIEW FARM, told the story. It was that 2000 acres of land was to be put into feed crops this spring, that new houses were to be built, barns put up, fences strung and other improvements made in the

Hereford country. The farm is about 40 miles northwest of Hereford, the nearest town will be Adrian just over the line in Oldham county. Mr. Businga and his sons are practical farmers and mechanics. The young men were at the wheel and throttle of the engine and showed their ability to make the steam horse pull the great load. Once or twice while on the streets, the wide drive wheels would slip on the soft ground, but they soon got to where they found terra firma and proceeded at the rate of about 4 or 5 miles per hour. An 8-room house will be built at once.

Two Painful Accidents.

Last week while playing "whip-crack" at the Public School, Clifford Acker, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. G. A. F. Parker, was "popped off" and was thrown with such force that his left arm was broken just above the wrist. He was carried home and the fractured member set. Mr. Parker's mother, being quite sympathetic, thought to do the boy's evening chores and went to bring in a bucket of coal. In doing so she stepped on a small round lump which suddenly turned under her foot,

causing her to fall, sustaining a fracture of the right shoulder joint. Mr. Parker says that all this has been the result of the 320 acre homestead act recently passed by Congress, which caused his hired girl to skip back to New Mexico in order to file on an additional 160 acres, leaving the family without help. At present both patients are doing well and the boy is at school.

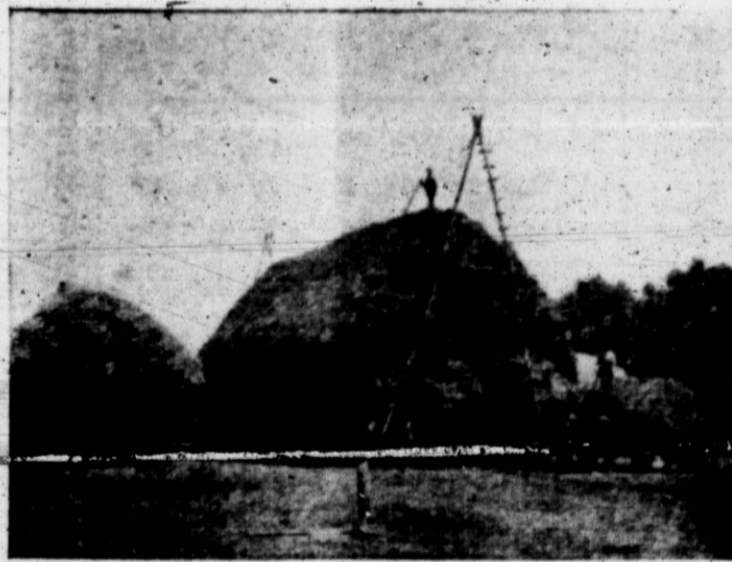

This one thing is lacking in our school system—proper instruction in the Mother Tongue. Not technical grammar but simple construction of the English sentence. It would be far better to throw all the grammars into the creek and let the boys and girls fish with pin-hooks for a catch of correct English than to hope that they will ever learn to write English by the study of grammar.

News Notes.

From Ontario Banner.

The construction train with a large force of hands is now busily engaged in laying steel between here and Wildorado, and if the weather is good they will reach our place in a short time. Two or three camps are stationed between here and Tucumcari, N. M., and it will be but a few months until through trains will be running.

The graders are making good headway preparing the road bed for the ties having the grade nearly completed through Ontario. Mr. Cassidy has the best kept teams we have ever seen work at this kind of work. Many of the teams are worth from \$500 to \$800. Much credit is given Mr. Cassidy for the manner in which he cares for his teams.

A fire, which is supposed to have caught from some movers camp last Sunday evening, near the Cap Rock, gave the cattlemen considerable uneasiness during the night, as it threatened a large scope of pasture west of Ontario, and many were out before daybreak fighting it and it was late Monday before it was headed off.

Snow at Stratford.

Sherman county is getting a fine snow as we go to press. It began snowing this morning (Thursday) at about 3:00 o'clock and has kept the good work up constantly since. It is estimated that there is at least seven inches of snow on the ground, and the snow is a wet one, so the ground will get the benefit of a good soaking when the thawing begins. Not enough wind has accompanied it to cause drifting on the prairie or on plowed ground, and the weather is not severe enough to do any damage to stock.—The Star.

Snow at Texline.

After a densely cloudy day Wednesday, it began snowing here about 5 o'clock in the afternoon and continued through the night and all day Thursday.

About 10 inches has fallen and from all indications there will be 2 feet by the time the large flakes cease falling.

It will be of great benefit to growing wheat and oats which are now in a promising condition; also the work of planting other crops can now be taken up. The farmers throughout the upper Panhandle country are rejoicing over the flattering prospects.

Rain and snow is reported to be quite general in the lower Panhandle counties.—Texline Local.

Some time ago Dr. Martin of Perry, Oklahoma, came to our town and organized among the boys of the various grades of our school Anti-Cigarette Leagues. Dr. Martin is National Organizer of the National League which has headquarters at Chicago. Her purpose was to encourage the boys to abstain from the use of tobacco in any form until they are 21 years of age.

This organization has been made. Officers have been elected in each grade. Enthusiasm is running very high, especially among the boys of the lower grades. They are striving with all their might to fulfill their promise, and to help others do

the same. They are doing even more. They are learning to respond as a body of boys to good influences and good suggestions. They are learning to avoid all forms of evil. They are learning to seek the good in everything.

This enthusiasm is very largely the result of the efforts of their teachers who, seeing the possibilities for good in this direction, are giving all the encouragement possible.

Part of the plan set forth by Dr. Martin is that the various women's organization of the town each single out a grade in the school and use their influence and efforts for that individual grade. This should be done as soon as possible since our boys are likely to become discouraged if they receive no encouragement except that given by the teachers.

This is a very impressionable period in the life of our boys, and we should surround them with the very best influence—not only in the home but as a body. If we can bring into their lives now those things that are of most worth their future is safe.

Another part of the general plan is to aid the boys in building and equipping a gymnasium. On last Thursday the faculty of the public schools and the Ladies' Federation of the Anti-Cigarette League formed the plan of giving a benefit entertainment at the moving picture show. Through the courtesy of Messrs. Johnson and Bickmore, owners, Friday evening was selected. The boys and girls enlisted most heartily in the work and raced with each other in selling tickets. The honor of making the greatest sale falls to a number of the Junior class of the High School. The highest recorded sale in any one room falls to the 6th grade.

The entertainment was a success in every way. Every one seemed to enjoy the evening very much. In a large measure this was due to the Hereford Band which furnished an excellent program to the large crowd outside. Those in charge of the entertainment certainly are under many obligations to the members of the band for their generous assistance.

The net proceeds of the show were \$86.80, half of which has been placed to the credit of the Ladies Federation for the boys' gymnasium and half to the public school library.

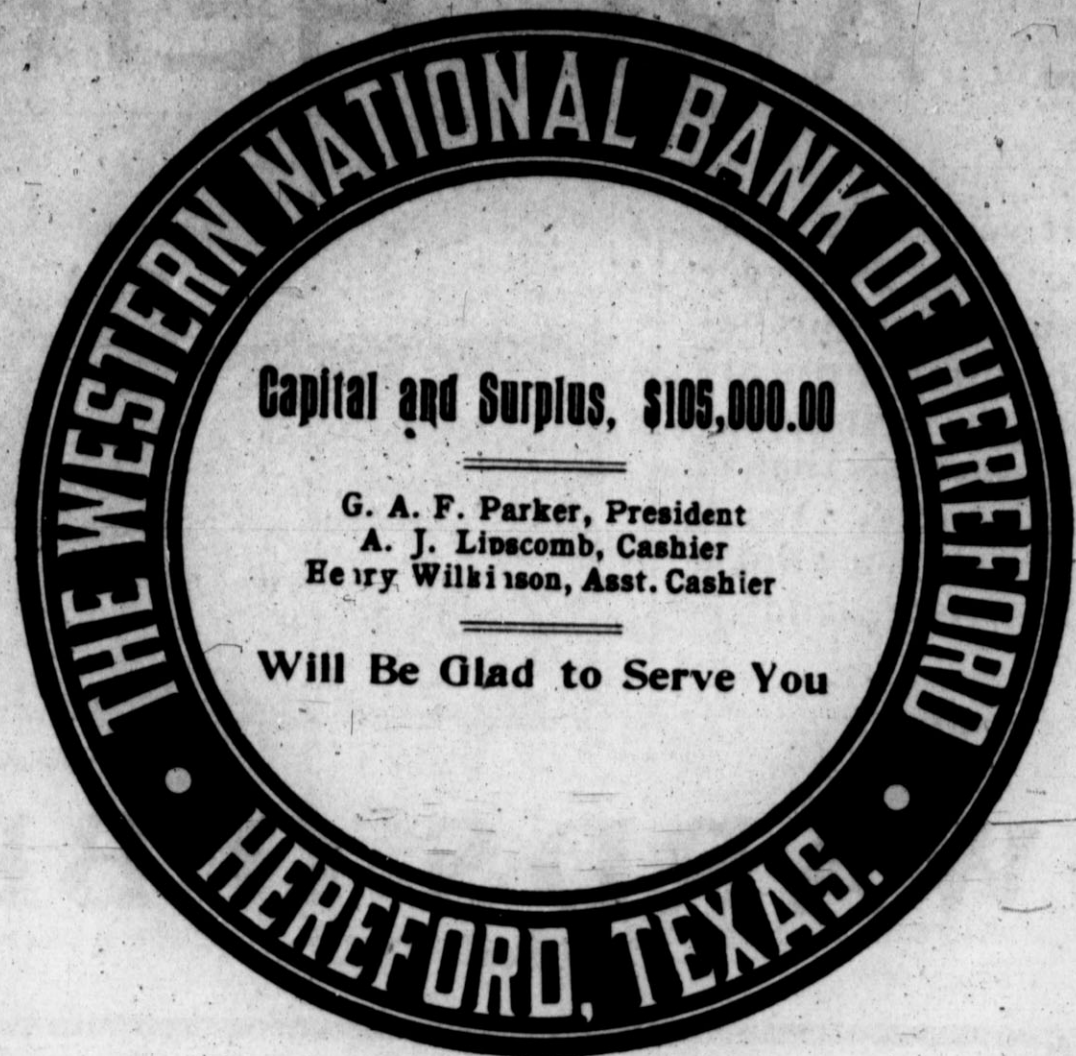
