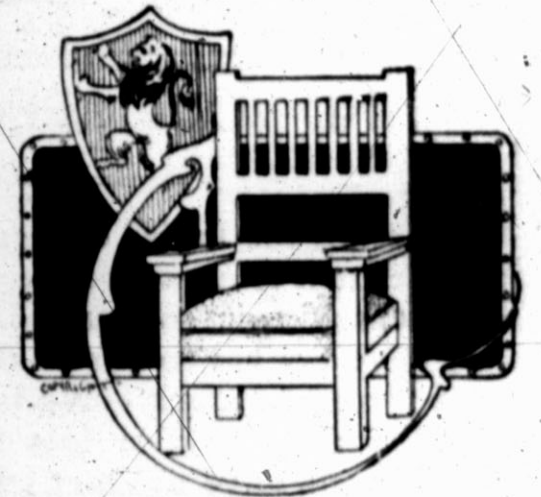

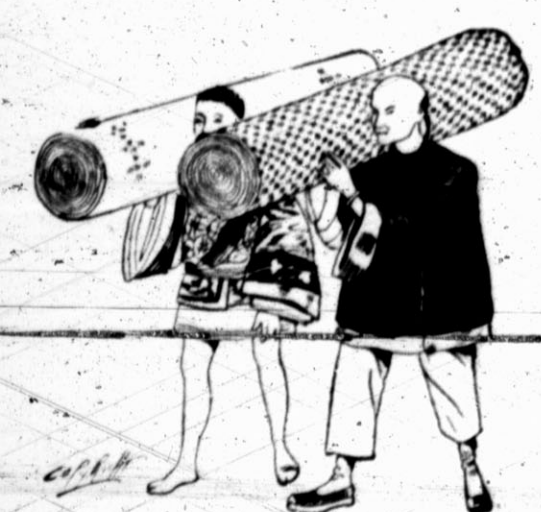

New Texas Laws are Now Effective.

Twenty-six laws of the first called session of the Thirty-First Legislature went into effect Monday, being the nineteenth day after adjournment of the session.

Some of the measures are of special importance, notable, the Robertson-Fitzhugh liquor law, several tax laws, empowering district judges to act in vacation, making it a felony to sell liquor in local option districts and other laws.

The bills that become effective are as follows:

Amending the law providing for the appointment and compensation of official court stenographers.

Amending the statute relative to assessment of taxes as to all tax assessors having more time to prepare their roll.

An act amending the law creating the state automatic tax laws as to require preliminary reports of valuation to be filed with the state board one month earlier, which will be July 15.

An omnibus act defining and regulating fraternal beneficiary association.

A law making it unlawful to give away intoxicating liquor in local option territories.

An act amending the statutes relating to injunctions by providing for appeals from injunctions involving clouded titles.

Bill authorizing district judges to act in vacation in certain proceedings which can now be considered only in term time.

Diminishing the civil and criminal jurisdiction in the county courts of Crockett and Edwards.

Act authorizing the state health officer to isolate indigent consumptives.

The bill providing that citations in land sales by executors or administrators shall be as in other citations, being twenty days prior to the term of court.

An act protecting estates under \$1,000 so as to prevent the same

form being consumed by court cost.

The bill remodeling and changing the laws relating to the game, fish and oyster commissioners.

An act providing for the expediting of the trial of cases in which citation is had by publication upon the defendant.

The bill appropriating \$25,000 to enforce the laws of the state, being intended to be used for the recovery of school lands.

An act amending an act of the regular session regulating life insurance companies, prohibiting them from taking other risks, etc. so as to avoid confusion in the regular law.

The Fitzhugh-Robertson liquor regulating law, superseding the

Basking-McGregor law.

An act providing for the incorporation and supervision of co-operative life insurance concerns in Texas.

The law making it a felony to sell intoxicating liquor in local option territory.

A bill providing that the state, any county, the railroad commission or head of any department shall not be required to give bond on any appeal or writ of error in any civil case involving some official matters.

The act making plain that bond must be given in appeals, in probate cases.

The act amending the anti-trust laws, fixing the venue of such cases in Travis or any other county of the state, fixing the minimum penalty at

\$1,500 a day and the fees of the district or county attorney at 10 per cent of the judgment up to \$50,000 and 5 per cent thereafter.

An act providing that briefs of fifteen written pages may be filed in the appellate courts on appeal, the maximum now being eight pages.

The act providing for the establishment of a central light and water plant at Austin to supply all state institutions, appropriating \$250,000.

Establishing a tobacco experiment station in the Seventeenth representative district.

Act fixing the terms of criminal district court of Galveston and Harris counties. This act becomes effective by its own terms August 1.

SLAYING WEEDS.

Boys Brigade Make Charge on Weeds. Working Under Direction of City Marshal.

Thursday morning bright and early about 20 boys and a few men organized into a weed-cutting brigade. They began on the main streets where property owners had allowed weeds to grow. The work will continue until all the streets are clear. The city marshal asks the cooperation of all citizens and property owners in cleaning out the weeds. Last year Mr. Sullivan had a similar organization and the city was cleaned of all weeds, bearing a part of the expense himself.

While it is the business of the city to keep the streets clean, it looks bad for down-town vacant property to grow up in noxious weeds. For example, the half block just north of the old city cafe stand. This property is owned by outside parties but the weeds have been cut by the city and Civic League for the past three years.

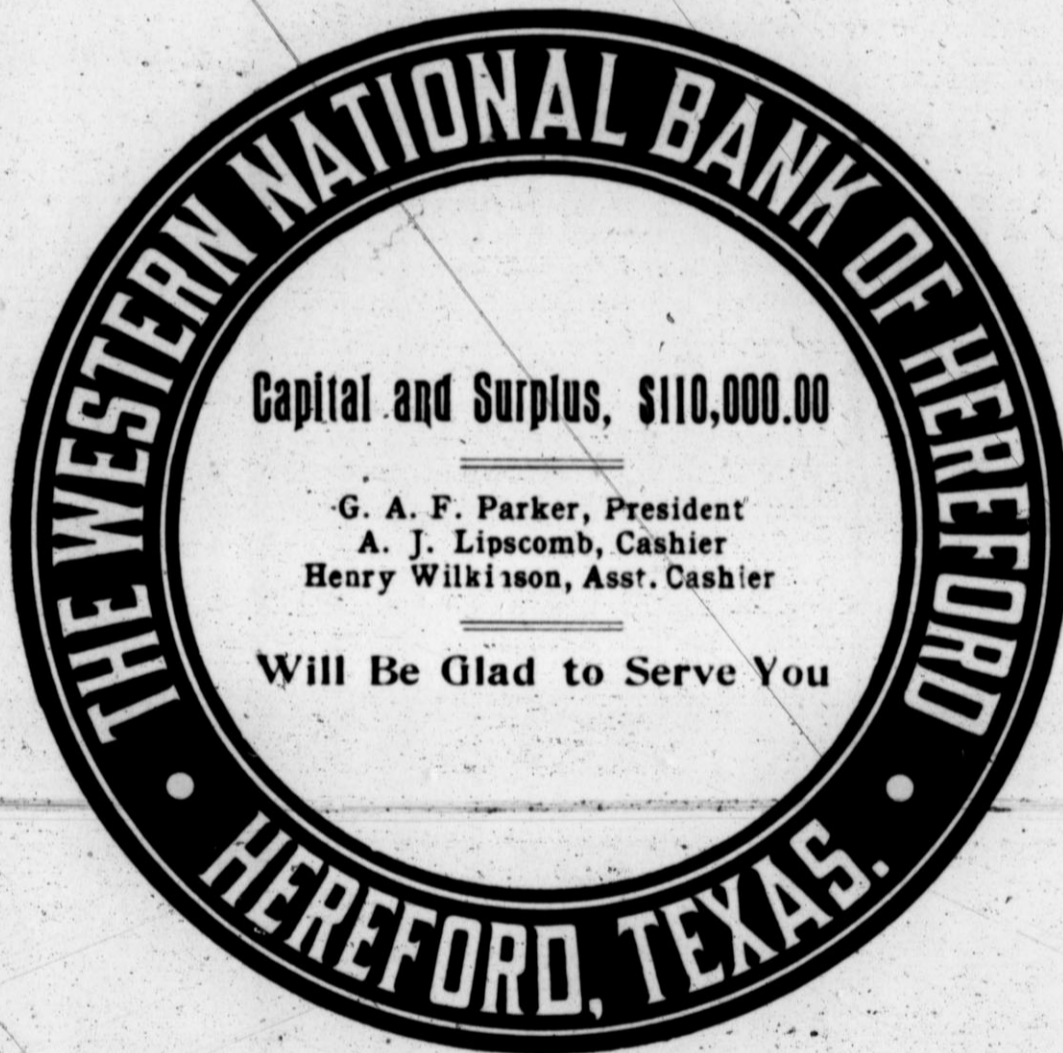

CHARLES AGNES BREAKS JAIL

Prisoner Here for Safekeeping As Result of Alleged Crime Against Young Girl at Hereford Gone to Parts Unknown.

From Daily Panhandle. Amarillo, July 20. Charles Agnes, charged with a crime in which a young girl at Hereford figures, and brought here more than a week ago for safekeeping broke jail last night and escaped to parts unknown.

It is believed that Agnes secreted himself behind a door while an attendant was serving a late supper to a prisoner, and later passed into the toilet and bath room. In this apartment one of the bars had been sawed and the prisoner broke another and was soon at liberty.

Sheriff Hughes has sent out numerous telegrams and phone messages over the country, in the hope of catching the man. It is not really known just when Agnes escaped, and this fact is somewhat against his recapture. The officers of Hereford have been notified and they in turn have placed others upon notice regarding the escape.

Agnes, since coming to Amarillo, has been an ideal prisoner, and has occasioned no trouble. He has steadfastly maintained his innocence and acted as though he had rather face the charges against him than not to do so. His escape for this reason occasion considerable surprise upon the part of the officers.

So little is known of the man outside of his term of residence at Hereford that the probable route of his flight or objective point is purely a matter of guess work.

Motorcycle Race to be Event.

At least three entries will be made in the motorcycle race during the show and races of the Amarillo Auto Show association beginning July 26 and continuing three days. Some of the contestants in this interesting race tried out their machines at the track yesterday afternoon. Some autoists of the city were also upon the ground and the track is assuming a shape that is surprising to even those who have been closely in touch with the progress. Slight fills are being made and other points in the course are being cut down. The track is nearly as natural a one as could have

been found in the entire country. A steam grader is kept constantly upon the task of putting the track in shape. The entire length of the course is two and a half miles, over which steel levelers are being drawn. This has a tendency not only to compress, but likewise to remove all bumps and to fill depressions. It is estimated that from five to ten thousand people will be in attendance at the first day's events. Attendance after the first day will maintain an average standard, and following that a liberal number of persons will be in the city on account of other meetings, including that of the doctors, the fireman and the confederate veterans.

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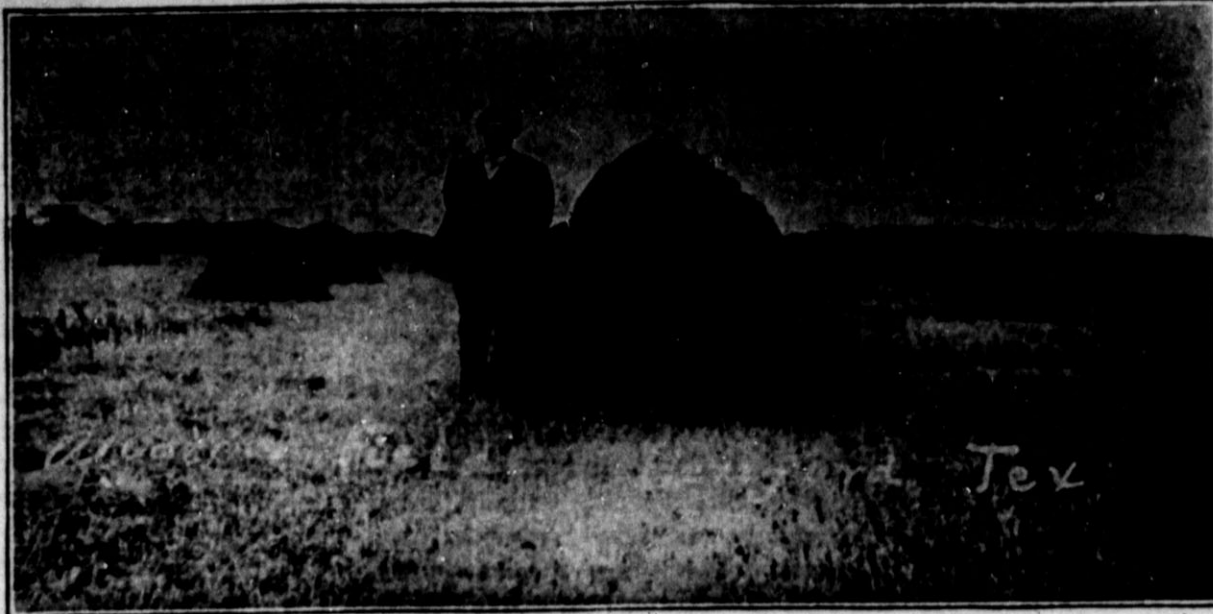

NORMAL BOARD TO MEET SOON

Locating Committee in Ft. Worth
August 9—When Bids will be
Opened.

Austin, Texas, July 17, 1909.

The following letter regarding
the location of the West Texas Nor-
mal school, has been sent out:

Notice to places seeking the loca-
tion of the West Texas Normal
College.

To the Local Committee in Charge:

The committee to locate the West
Texas Normal College will meet in
Fort Worth on August 9, in the
Worth Hotel, at 10 o'clock a. m. At
that time and place the committee
will receive sealed bids and briefs
setting forth the claims of each town
desiring the location of the college.
Oral arguments will be heard in sup-
plementation of the briefs and bids
under some limitation as to time,
which will be announced at the meet-
ing. After hearing what the repre-
sentatives of the towns wish to say,
the committee may proceed to elimi-
nate such places as do not appear to
be most desirable and thus reduce
the number of applicants. From Ft.
Worth the committee will proceed
to visit the few places that seem
most desirable as locations and will
complete its labors and make its re-
port. The following paragraph
from the law establishing the school
will indicate the points that the com-
mittee will notice in considering the
claims of the competing places.

"In considering the claims of each
place that may ask for said school,
the committee shall consider the
healthfulness, accessibility and the
general intelligence and social con-
ditions of its people: The committee
shall also consider the bonus or do-
nations, offered, whether in houses,
money, land or other valuable con-
siderations, which the respective
places bidding for the location of
said normal college may offer, and
shall take into account all facts and
circumstances of each place that

may bid, and shall locate said nor-
mal college where it will most effi-
ciently serve the state; provided,
that the committee shall not sacrifice
the permanent advantages of any lo-
cation to the donations offered by
any other place."

The governor will not serve on
the committee in person, but will ap-
point someone to serve in his place,
as the law provides. He will be
represented at the Fort Worth meet-
ing by his appointee.

The committee from each place
desiring the location of the normal
college should reduce its claims and
propositions to concise terms, avoid-
ing long and tedious presentations
of imaginary advantages claimed
for the respective towns. The com-
mittee to locate the normal college
will grant each applicant a reason-
able amount of time in which to pre-
sent real advantages.

FATHER BEATS DAUGHTER

Rev. White Formerly of Amarillo
and Fifteen-year-old Girl Are
Victims—Child Flogged
With Horsewhip.

From Daily Panhandle.

A fearful event was enacted at
Pampa yesterday.

Rev. I. D. White of the Christian
Church, who is engaged in the past-
orate of the church at Pampa and
other points over the Panhandle,
preached at Pampa yesterday and
last night administered baptism to a
girl fifteen years of age.

The mother of the girl was at the
baptism, but it was stated that the
father was opposed to his daughter's
connection with the church. It is al-
leged that when the daughter return-
ed home her wraps were torn away
and a severe beating administered
with a horsewhip to such an extent
that the flesh was torn and blood
burst from the wounds discoloring
the clothing.

It is further alleged that Rev.
White being met by the father this
forenoon was beaten by him. For the
offense against Rev. White the man
was arrested and fined \$25.

Rev. White makes the statement
that Pampa is greatly incensed over
the affair both as to the assault up-
on himself and also upon the child
as a result of the baptism. The
feeling, according to Rev. White, is
not confined to members of his
church or to those even who are
friendly to himself personally on his
doctrines.

The preacher was beaten in such
manner as to get both eyes and
cheeks discolored and other bruises
and hurts about the face and body.

Rev. White was formerly a resi-
dent of this city, and is widely
known in and around Amarillo. He
states that he did not strike his as-
sailant but busied himself with
warding off the blows as much as
possible.
