Berlin protests continue as officials resign posts

BERLIN (AP) - Several East German officials associated with ousted Communist leader Erich Honecker resigned, but pressure for democratic reform continued to build with tens of thousands taking to the streets in protest.

Also, in an apparent attempt by the leadership to regain popular trust, it was announced that an East Berlin couple with nine children will move into the opulent home of a disgraced trade union boss.

The resignations announced Thursday included that of Honecker's wife, Margot. She had been education minister for 26 years.

In addition, Annelis Kimmel became the first woman to head the federation of trade unions by replacing longtime Honecker protegee Harry Tisch.

Two regional party bosses also quit after more than 20 years in their posts, and the leaders of two Communist-aligned parties resigned under pressure

from members. The Liberal Democrats, another Communist ally, called for the resignation of the entire 45 member Cabinet.

The Liberals have led a drive by non-Communist parties for more independence in recent weeks.

Despite the changes, tens of thousands of people again demonstrated for reforms in at least four cities late Thursday.

They marched in Gera, Erfurt, Halle and Wilhelm Pieck Stadt, the official ADN news agency reported.

It said marchers bearing candles and banners shouted through loud speakers for more democracy and an end to Communist Party privileges.

During recent weeks, tens of thousands have repeatedly taken to the streets for such protests.

The demonstrations came on the heels of an exodus of East Germans fleeing the hard-line Communist regime for the West. Since August, more than 70,000 East Germans have fled through Hungary and West German embassies in Czechoslovakia and Poland.

Krenz, who replaced Honecker on Oct. 18, returned late Thursday from an afternoon visit to Warsaw, Poland. He met with non-Communist Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki and declared that East Germany could learn something from that country.

Before traveling to Warsaw, Krenz met with European Economic Community Commissioner Martin Bangemann and called for closer ties between his country and the EEC.

ADN reported that Peter and Evelin Grossmann, both employed in East Berlin's city transport organization, and their nine children will move into the 10-room house built by Gerhard Nennstiel, the former chief of the metal workers union.

Nennstiel resigned Wednesday, hours after an East Berlin newspaper revealed that he had built a home stunningly luxurious by East German standards. On Thursday, he also lost his post on the board of the Communist-controlled national federation of trade unions.

"Are there millionaires in East Germany?" asked the Berliner Zeitung as it described the mansion. The newspaper is an organ of the East Berlin Communist Party.

It said the house had windows imported from West Germany, plush bathrooms, and a two-story winter garden.

Hobby wants state tax

AUSTIN (AP) - Lawmakers owe it to future generations of Texans to consider establishment of a state income tax, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby said in touring the politically unpopular levy as the answer to school finance problems.

"If the idea of an income tax is not put fairly and accurately into the debate of this state's future, we are letting our children and grandchildren down," Hobby told the Texas Association of Taxpayers on Thursday.

"It would, I suggest to you, be a considerable improvement for the education system, the business community and the tax system of this state," he said.

An income tax would address a Texas Supreme Court ruling that the current school finance system, with its funding inequities among school

districts, is unconstitutional, Hobby said. The school funding system relies on a combination of local property taxes and state money.

Legislators face a May 1 deadline to come up with a solution for the funding inequities among school districts.

"A personal income tax of 4 percent on a broad measure of income, even with generous exemptions and deductions, would raise enough money to replace every dollar of school property taxes, and add almost another \$1 billion per year to fund education," he said.

A state income tax should be coupled with relief from other taxes that unfairly burden the poor and discourage business investment, Hobby said.

"Most statewide candidates will be forced to oppose it," Hobby said, but he called current taxes less fair.

The property tax hits poor taxpayers harder than the wealthy, and it has been an unreliable funding source as property values have fallen this decade, he said.

The sales tax also is regressive, affects investment and weighs too heavily on business, Hobby said, while the franchise tax imposes a levy on investments and is unfair.

The income tax is more just, he said, but "has been the subject of the worst smear campaign since Joe McCarthy."

Texas, the most populous state that doesn't levy its own personal income tax, is tied for the third highest state sales tax in the nation, at 6 cents per dollar.

Although Hobby said he would like to see a state income tax considered right away, he predicted it will not be examined again until lawmakers meet in regular session in 1991.

The Legislature meets in special session beginning Nov. 14 on workers' compensation, and again next spring to address school finance, but special session agendas are controlled by the governor.

Republican Gov. Bill Clements' press secretary, Rossanna Salazar, dismissed the idea of a state income tax.

"Gov. Clements is opposed to an income tax," she said. "And, as far as the school ruling is concerned, the governor believes that before we start discussing more money - a thorough review of the efficiency and effectiveness of the system must be conducted."

House Speaker Gib Lewis said a state income tax is something lawmakers should continue to examine.

"I'm like everyone else," he said. "I'm opposed to a personal income tax, but at the same time, I realize we have to deal with realities, and eventually that might be the only way we can approach the needs of this state as far as fair and equitable tax structure."

"If I'm the father of the Texas income tax, can I also be the guy who abolished the franchise tax, lowered property taxes and lowered the sales tax?" he asked after his speech to the business-based association.

Hobby, a Democrat who is not seeking election after heading the state Senate since 1973, acknowledged that the proposed levy is a political hot potato in Texas, which has neither a personal nor corporate income tax.

Republican gubernatorial candidate Kent Hance launched his campaign for the 1990 GOP nomination by pledging to prohibit an income tax.

Others dismiss idea

AUSTIN (AP) - Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby may be feeling like the political equivalent of the lonely appliance repairman today.

Hobby's call Thursday for a state income tax brought widespread and bipartisan opposition.

"I said from the beginning that this campaign would come down to a choice between an income tax and a lottery," said Democrat Jim Mattox, who is promoting a lottery to raise money for schools.

"The wolf - a state income tax - is at the door," said Republican Kent Hance, who favors a constitutional ban on income taxes.

"I oppose an income tax. I respect Bill Hobby. I've disagreed with him before and I disagree with him in this instance," said state Treasurer Ann Richards, another Democratic hopeful.

Republican Gov. Bill Clements also rejected Hobby's idea. "The governor respectfully disagrees with the lieutenant governor," said press secretary Rossanna Salazar.

Texas has neither a personal nor corporate income tax, and the idea has been so unpopular around the Legislature that many lawmakers refer to it only as "the I-word."

Hobby, a Democrat, isn't seeking re-election for the first time since 1973.

He proposed the income tax as a way to raise additional money for public schools - while lowering other taxes - at a time when the Legislature faces a May 1 state Supreme Court deadline for overhauling the school finance system.

Hance, whose proposal for a cornerstone of his campaign for the

constitutional income tax ban is a GOP nomination, said Hobby's call proves him right about the threat of such a tax.

"Make no mistake. When the leading Democrat in the Legislature and the leader of the Texas Senate calls for an income tax there is a clear and present danger," Hance said.

Mattox says a lottery game could raise \$600 million a year, beginning almost immediately.

"I am the only candidate in the race who is unequivocally opposed to new taxes and in favor of a lottery. With our fragile economy and the trouble we're having attracting jobs, Texas sure doesn't need an income tax," Mattox said.

Republican candidate Jack Rains said he wasn't surprised. "We know that liberal Democrats favor an income tax," he said.

Rains said that instead of hunting for more money, officials instead should look for ways to improve an educational system "that has sopped up a 50 percent increase in funding in the last 5 years."

A spokesman for GOP candidate Clayton Williams, Bill Kenyon, said Williams opposes the idea, too. "Clayton has stated clearly that he will veto any attempt to impose an income tax," Kenyon said.

Richard Ford, president of Texans Against State Income Taxes, also attacked Hobby.

"We want to tell Lt. Gov. Hobby that Halloween is over. Lt. Gov. Hobby should quit pretending to be Little Red Riding Hood's grandma when he's really the Big Bad Wolf," Ford said.

WASHINGTON - President Bush is sending mixed signals about seeking military aid for the Nicaraguan Contras, seeming to revive that option after his spokesman ruled it out a day earlier.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador - Leftist guerrillas withdrew from peace talks after accusing the president of complicity in a terrorist bombing. Unionists buried slain companions and vowed revenge.

WASHINGTON - President Bush's offer to halt his drive for a capital gains tax cut this year could end a bitter congressional deadlock over must-pass fiscal legislation, a minimum wage bill and other measures.

On this date:

Senate votes on North's pension

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House must decide whether to go along with a Senate vote to reinstate Oliver North's \$23,000 annual pension, revoked after he was sentenced for illegally shredding documents in the Iran-Contra scandal.

"Let the vendetta end," said Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., whose bill to restore North's pension was approved by the Senate late Thursday on a 78-17 vote. "Ollie North has been punished enough."

But despite that plea, the debate

over whether to give North back his retirement pay dredged up bitter partisan feelings stemming from President Reagan's efforts with North in a key role to evade congressional restrictions and fund the Contra war in Nicaragua.

"We are asked to bend the law for someone who broke the law," said Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa. "North's defense was that he was just following orders. But we settled that issue at Nuremberg," a reference to trials of Nazis involved in World War II

atrocities.

The issue now goes to the House, where similar legislation has been introduced but not yet acted on.

Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Joseph Biden, D-Del., said he would vote to put North in jail if he could. But he dropped his opposition to the retirement-pay measure after Helms modified it to apply not just to North, but to any military officer who may later be convicted of shredding documents.

"Even a felon deserves equal

treatment under the law," Biden said. "I might want Ollie North protecting me in a foxhole, but I wouldn't want Ollie North teaching my son or daughter ethics."

Senators ignored warnings from colleagues like Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., who said the move would set a bad precedent and invite future congressional tampering with criminal cases.

"We should not on this floor change that sentence anymore than we should for Zsa Zsa Gabor," Simon argued.

North, a Marine lieutenant colonel, lost his retirement pay after he was sentenced July 5 to 1,200 hours of community service and a \$150,000 fine on three felony counts. He is appealing the convictions.

One of the counts, shredding government documents, stipulates that anyone convicted "forfeit his office" with the U.S. government.

The General Accounting Office, which adjudicates federal pay issues, ruled North's status as a retired military officer came under that provision of the law and that forfeiting his office meant he no longer qualified for retirement pay. The case marked the first time the 15-year-old law had been applied to revoke someone's pension.

Technically, military retirement pay is not a pension based on past service but a reduced salary for an officer who continues to hold a commission and remains subject to active duty.

The issue has taken on political symbolism far beyond its dollar value. North is reportedly earning \$25,000 - more than a year's pension - for each speech he gives on the lecture circuit. But some conservatives view North as a hero who bore the brunt of blame for President Reagan during the Iran-Contra scandal.

"This is a pension he fought and shed his blood for," Helms said, rattling off a list of medals North won in Vietnam. "This has been an unfair, unwarranted hardship on Col. North and his family ... Ollie, this one's for you."

Thornburgh says call for special prosecutor is politically motivated

WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General Dick Thornburgh says House Democrats are bringing partisan politics into the investigation of federal housing scandals by forcing him to take the first step toward naming a special prosecutor.

Democrats on the House Judiciary committee formally asked Thornburgh on Thursday to appoint a special prosecutor to investigate former housing Secretary Samuel R. Pierce and other officials linked to allegations of wrongdoing at the department of Housing and Urban Development during the Reagan administration.

Under federal law, Thornburgh must tell Congress within 30 days whether he finds grounds to open a preliminary investigation.

Thornburgh said he would "report to Congress as provided for in that legislation."

But he charged the letter making the

request and the two congressmen leading the push, Reps. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., and Bruce Morrison, D Conn., thrust "partisan politics into this matter, which has until now been handled in a non-partisan, professional way by the Congress, HUD and this department."

"Even more distressing is the assertion by the congressmen that criminal acts have been committed before criminal investigations have been completed," Thornburgh said.

Nineteen of the 20 Democratic members of the House Judiciary Committee signed the letter making the formal request for a prosecutor.

They said evidence gathered by a House subcommittee probing the HUD scandals "raises a serious possibility of criminal conduct." They cited possible perjury and conspiracy to defraud the government by Pierce or other former top housing officials.

"I believe that crimes were

committed at HUD," said Morrison. "We don't know whether Secretary Pierce was responsible for that criminal conduct, but we do know that without a special prosecutor we will never find out."

Pierce's attorney, Paul L. Perito, said he was confident the Justice Department would deny the request after reviewing transcripts of the House investigation.

Perito said the committee's proceedings "contain not one shred of evidence to form a basis that crimes have been committed or that Mr. Pierce was involved in commission of any crime."

Under the independent counsel law, a majority of the members of either party on the committee can trigger the first-step review by the attorney general.

If Thornburgh opens a preliminary investigation, he has 90 days to conduct

it and decide whether to ask a three-judge panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to appoint a special prosecutor, formally known as an independent counsel.

The request came as the House Government Operations subcommittee that has been investigating allegations of fraud, influence-peddling and mismanagement was ending its probe, stymied by the refusal of Pierce and three other former top officials to testify.

Schumer said in announcing the request, "Sam Pierce, entrusted with programs for the poor and powerless, instead gave those programs to the very rich and the best politically connected."

"There is ample evidence of wrongdoing at HUD, but there is stonewalling at the top," he said. "The only way to get to the bottom of the mess at HUD is through the appointment of an independent counsel."

Pierce testified voluntarily last May before the Government Operations subcommittee on housing and employment. But when subpoenaed for further appearances this fall, Pierce invoked his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination and refused to testify.

Three other former top HUD officials, including Pierce's two former top executive assistants, Deborah Gore Dean and Lance Wilson, have also refused to testify.

Morales touts pollution plan

Morales, a San Antonio Democrat, unveiled a 10-point plan that he said would toughen state environmental laws and enforcement.

Morales said lax regulatory enforcement and inaction on the part of the Legislature has resulted in Texas leading the nation in toxic chemicals released in the air. Texas also ranks high in water pollution and production of hazardous wastes, he said.

If elected attorney general, Morales said he would hold a toxic waste summit to shape environmental policies. He also called for tax breaks for businesses that use products that reduce pollution.

His proposal to have the attorney general's office review all administrative penalties against polluters won praise from environmentalists.

Ken Kramer, director of the Lone Star Chapter of the Sierra Club, said pollution penalties are often too small to force compliance with the law.

Morales faces U.S. Rep. John Bryant of Dallas and Houston attorney John Odam in the March 13 Democratic Party primary.

Herd harriers go for trip to state at Region I-4A meet

The Hereford Whiteface cross country teams will make their third trip of the season to Lubbock's Mae Simmons Park on Saturday when they compete in the Region I-4A meet.

The boys race is scheduled to start at 10:20 a.m. with the girls to follow 20 minutes later.

Both teams are coming off second-place finishes behind Randall at the District I-4A meet run on the same course last week.

The girls team, ranked eighth in Class 4A by the Texas Track and Field News, was led by individual champion Teresa Castillo and placed all seven runners in the top 20 finishers. Castillo knocked 17 seconds off her best-ever time in winning the two-mile race by 20 seconds. Minerva Salazar and Veronica Hernandez also posted personal-best times at the district meet.

The boys team was paced by Tim Stagner, who finished fourth with his best time ever over three miles, while Raul Dominguez and Mike Lopez also set personal records.

Coach Martha Emerson said while she doesn't know much about the competition this week, the Herd runners will have to be even faster to be in the race.

"I've looked through everything I can find trying to figure out who will be there," Emerson said. "There will be 12 teams there, though."

"We know Leander and Waco Midway will be there. They were in the top three (in girls) with us last year. I'm really not sure who else is going to be there."

"I think (Hereford entries) are going to have to run better than they did last week regardless of who else is there."

They've decided they're going to give it a shot, boys and girls both. The girls were not happy about losing to Randall, at all."

Emerson said both boys and girls teams from Midway have been ranked in the top 10 all fall, and will be one of the schools to beat.

"I really think, in the girls, Hereford, Midway and Randall may come out in the top three," she said. "I think our experience in having been to regional before will help us."

While this is the Herd's third time to run on the meet course this season, Emerson said she didn't expect that to be as much of a factor as it was last week.

"I don't know if it will be," she said. "Sometimes, some of the teams that are pretty good have been there before. It just depends on the new ones."

Spikers set for Pecos

The Hereford Lady Whitefaces will get a dose of deja vu Saturday when they meet Pecos in an area round playoff match at 1 p.m. at Seminole, but they hope to change things a little this time.

The Herd made its only playoff appearance last year against the same team at the same place, and all nine members of this year's squad were there as the Eagles took a two-game sweep.

Team member Jill West said the Herd is intent on a different outcome Saturday.

"Last year when we played them we felt real little and intimidated," West said. "But now we're as old or older than they are."

The job won't be any easier this time around as the Herd, 25-5 and ranked No. 7 in class 4A by the Texas Girls Coaches Association Baden Top 10, face the top-ranked team in the state.

Pecos comes in at 24-1, with one of the wins being over Hereford in the finals of the Cantaloupe Classic played in Pecos.

Senior Libby Kosub said Hereford should fare better in the rematch.

"It was such a home-court advantage when we played them in Pecos," Kosub said, "and now we're at a neutral site."

Coach Brenda Reeh said she has not seen Pecos since the tourney match.

"We don't know if they changed anything up during their district season," Reeh said of the Eagles. "We do know that their main weapon is a kid named Sophia Terry. She's a junior who was all-state as a freshman."

"When she's on the back row, she pretty much runs the offense as the setter. And she's all over the net when she plays up front. She's just a fantastic athlete. So first and foremost, we've got to stop her. We've got to score while she's on the back row and not blocking against us. When she's on the front row, we've just got to try to get through all the rotations we can without letting her score."

Reeh was quick to add that Pecos is not a one-person team with Terry carrying the entire load.

"The first time we played them," she said, "they were having some trouble with their second setter getting

Terry good sets. But their other player are strong also. It's not like everyone is weak except for her. They're very well disciplined as far as placing the ball on their hits; they're very well schooled as far as anticipating where the ball is going to go. They're very quick and a very good defensive team. I think that's what gotten them so far for so many years."

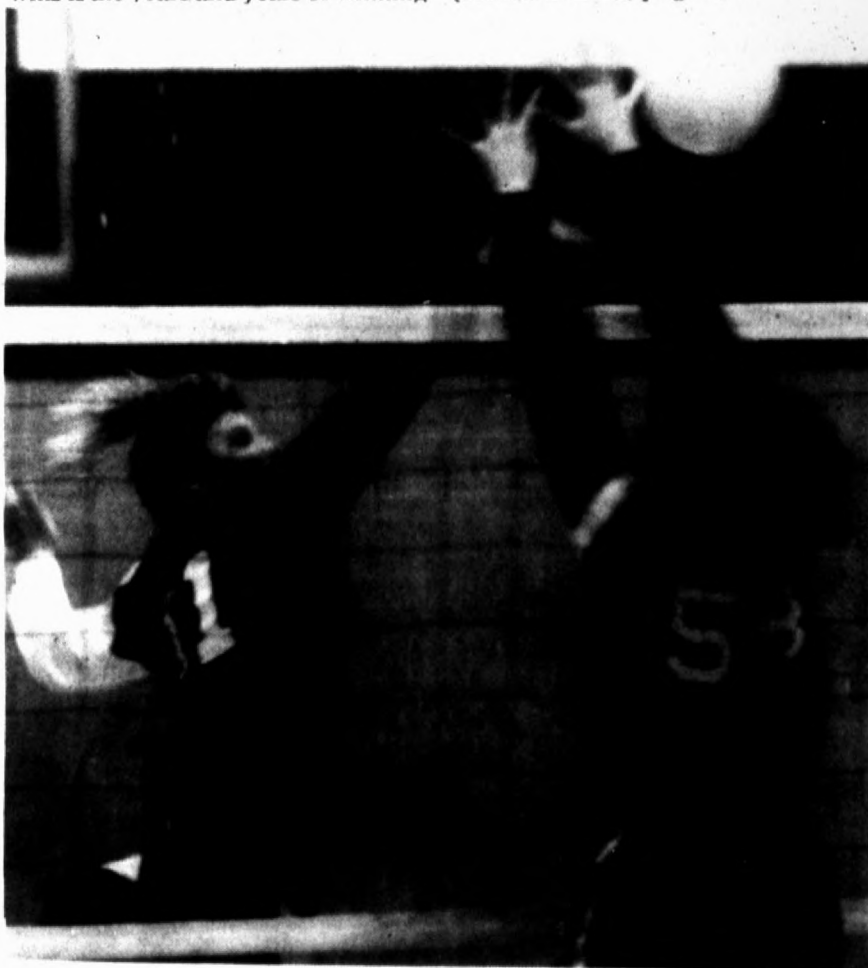
Reeh said the Eagles' winning tradition is a major factor in the match.

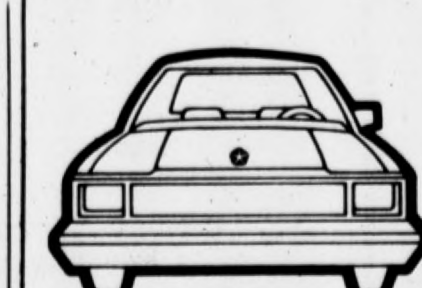

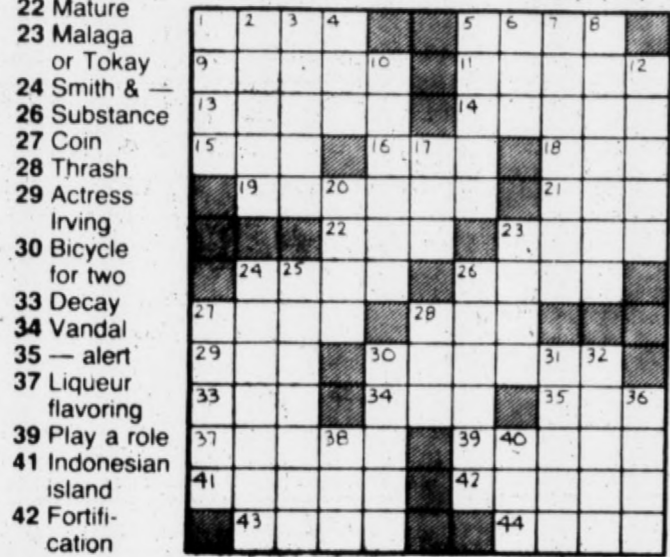

Indoor sunning seldom safe

Beth Robbins, a 35-year-old actress in New York, kept her tan all last winter and she never left town.

These days thousands of people tan the way Beth did: indoors, lying under lamps that emit ultraviolet (UV) rays like the sun's. So-called "tanning beds" can be found in health clubs, beauty parlors and in the nation's 12,000 commercial tanning salons. According to the Suntanning Association For Education in Atlanta (the industry group that promotes indoor tanning under the acronym SAFE), such centers are a multi-million dollar industry.

The facilities offer a wide range of styles-with prices to match. For example, at the Manhattan Beach Club in New York, you pay an average of \$8 to bask for 15 minutes in a clamshell-like sunbed that lets you tan both sides of your body at the same time. (It takes at least three or four sessions to get a tan.) Seashells, beach balls, blankets and sand-colored wallpaper make it easy to pretend you're somewhere else. Clients at others can pay up to \$50 for a tanning session that includes the privilege of chatting on the phone, tuning into a tape deck and cooking off with a built-in fan.

As most people know by now, the tanning story isn't all glitz and glitter. Too much sun can cause skin cancer, premature aging of the skin and serious eye problems. An indoor tanning, despite claims to the contrary, is no less hazardous. "In their advertising, tanning salon owners say it's a 'safe tan,'" says Jennifer Patterson, M.D., assistant professor of dermatology at New York University Medical Center. "There's no such thing."

But wait! What about recent claims that state-of-the-art equipment doesn't send out burning ultraviolet-B (UV-B) rays? You may remember that up until a few years ago, virtually all sunlamps emitted only UV-B light. People got a tan from them, but they burned as well. So manufacturers developed lamps that replaced most or all of the UV-B emissions with ultraviolet-A (UV-A) radiation instead, which is weaker than UV-B rays and, we were told, safer.

However, after the UV-A lamps came on the market, Jan van der Leun, PhD, an expert in UV radiation at the University of Utrecht in the Netherlands, began to conduct studies with other researchers on the effects of UV-A radiation.

Their results have been far from encouraging. "We found that UV-A does the same damage to the skin as UV-B," van der Leun reports. Tanning parlor operators may tell you that UV-B rays are 1,000 times as strong as UV-A's. That's true, but it also means that you need 1,000 times as much UV-A exposure as UV-B exposure to get the same tan. "So the risk," says van der Leun, "turns out to be the same."

Or even worse. UV-A rays penetrate deeper than UV-B and can cause damage to collagen, blood vessels and elastic tissues. Indeed, some experts feel that UV-B light is the safer of the two. "UV-A (radia-

tion) will lure you into a false sense of security that you're not injuring yourself," says Isaac Willis, M.D., professor of dermatology and medicine at the Morehouse School of Medicine in Atlanta, Ga. Also, once exposed to UV-A rays, your body is more susceptible to the aging and carcinogenic effects of UV-B radiation, according to studies underway by Dr. Willis.

Many still find tanning's benefits worth it. "Most clients say they've heard bad things about tanning, but they look better and say they find it therapeutic, so they come," says Denise Marquette, owner of several tanning parlors in New York.

People also tan indoors to develop a "base" so they won't burn as easily when they go on vacation in mid-winter. But that's not a good reason to go to a tanning parlor, says Willis. "The tan you get does not protect you from cancer or any other detrimental effects of UV rays," he says. "In fact, it adds to natural sunlight hazards, because all radiation effects are cumulative." A tan rates only a 2 or 4 on the sun protection factor (SPF) scale, meaning that you can stay in the sun 2 to 4 times as long before starting to burn as you could with no protection at all. And that's only if your skin tans. If you burn easily, you can't expect to build a protective base indoors no matter how careful you are. A much simpler solution, says Willis, is to use a sunscreen, some of which have an SPF of up to 29.

Still tempted by the land of the indoor sun? Remember that parlors can be set up by anyone who orders a tanning bed through the mail. Operators don't even need a license like hairdressers. "A lot of people burn in tanning salons because they're not being monitored closely enough," says Marquette.

It's hard to estimate just how much radiation you're getting by how long you spend under the lamps because they vary in the amount of UV radiation they emit. It depends on the type of equipment and the age of the bulb. In addition, manufacturers can claim that their lamps emit only UV-A light when in fact they actually give off up to 5 percent UV-B rays.

And unless you wear special goggles, "you can fry your corneas," says Rene Rodriguez-Sains, M.D., an ophthalmologist at New York's Manhattan Eye and Ear Hospital. UV radiation of both types can also increase your chances of developing cataracts. A recent study of 16 tanning salons led by Jere Guin, M.D., at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences in Little Rock found that none required goggles, and several didn't even supply them.

Because of all these hazards, the American Medical Association, the American Academy of Dermatology and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration all advise against tanning indoors or out. The incidence of skin cancer among people who have a high exposure to UV light, says Willis, is just too great. Of 50 patients whose skin cancer he

diagnosed last June, some 70 percent had been in a tanning parlor. (Over half of the victims were under 28 years old.)

If you still want that golden glow, at least see a dermatologist first to check if you have any pre-cancerous spots or if your skin is too fair to handle UV rays at all. Mention any drugs you're taking; many antibiotics, tranquilizers and diuretics increase your sensitivity to ultraviolet rays.

A doctor's visit this year convinced Beth Robbins to give up indoor tanning. "He said, 'You're damaging your skin, you have moles that are pre-cancerous and you're going to look a lot worse in 10 years,'" she recalls. "I decided the tan just wasn't worth the risk."

Spice up seafood with lemon

Seafood and lemon go together like salt and pepper. Pair low-fat shrimp with sassy citrus flavor to make this satisfying stir-fry. Stir-frying takes far less fat than pan frying. To trim fat even more, spray the cold wok or skillet with non-stick spray coating before cooking the vegetables. Then you'll need only 1 tablespoon for cooking the shrimp. Never use non-stick spray coating on a hot pan.

- LEMON SHRIMP ORIENTAL**
- 1 1/4 pounds fresh or frozen shrimp in shells
 - 1 cup water
 - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
 - 2 tablespoons soy sauce
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
 - 1 teaspoon instant chicken bouillon granules
 - 1/2 teaspoon finely shredded lemon peel
 - 3 to 4 tablespoons lemon juice
 - 1/8 teaspoon pepper
 - Non-stick spray coating
 - 2 cups sliced fresh mushrooms
 - 3 stalks celery, bias sliced
 - 1 medium green pepper cut into strips
 - 1/4 cup sliced green onions
 - 1 tablespoon cooking oil
 - One 6-ounce package frozen pea pods, thawed
 - 3 cups hot cooked rice

Thaw shrimp, if frozen, and drain well. Peel and devein shrimp. For sauce, stir together water, cornstarch, soy sauce, sugar, bouillon granules, lemon peel, lemon juice and pepper. Set aside.

Spray a cold wok or large skillet with non-stick spray coating. Preheat over high heat. Add mushrooms, celery and green pepper; stir-fry 3 minutes. Add green onion and stir-fry 1 minute more. Remove vegetables from wok.

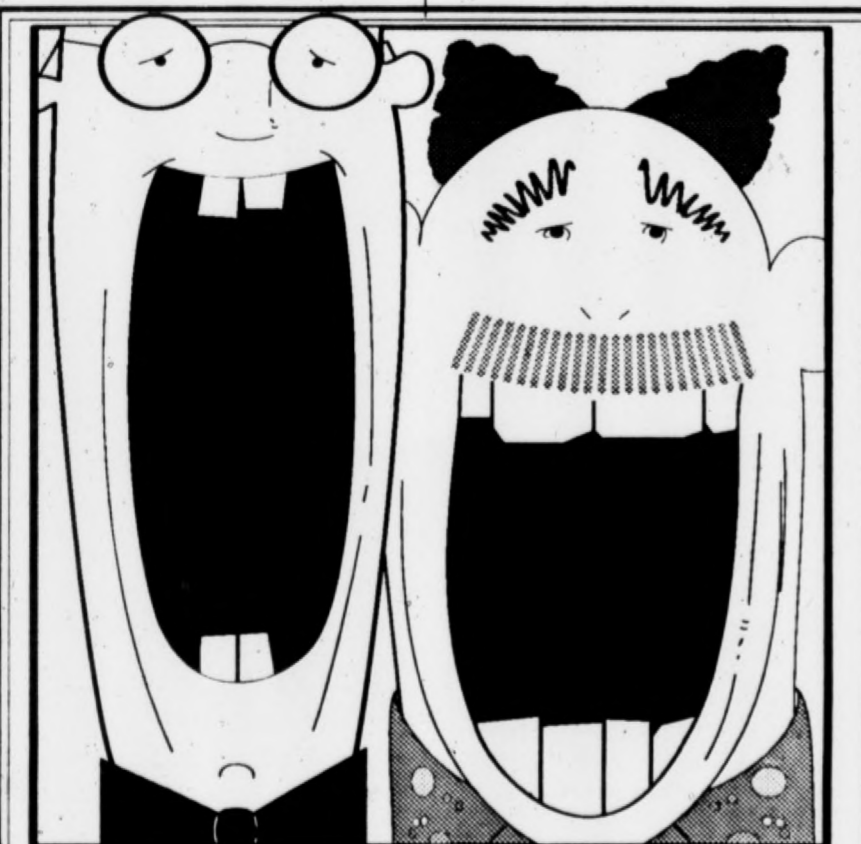
Add oil. Add half the shrimp to hot wok. Stir-fry 2 to 3 minutes or until shrimp turn pink. Remove shrimp. Stir-fry remaining shrimp. Return shrimp to wok. Push from center. Stir sauce; add to center of wok. Cook and stir until thickened and bubbly. Add vegetables and pea pods. Stir to coat mixture with sauce. Cook and stir 1 minute. Serve over hot cooked rice. Makes 6 servings.

DEAR T.F.: We called the National Institute of Standards and Technology in Boulder, Colo. and talked to Donald B. Sullivan, Ph.D., chief of their Time and Frequency Division.

Dr. Sullivan said, "Coordinated Universal Time is the world's official time scale. It is coordinated in Paris. We broadcast time signals 24 hours a day via short-wave radio and satellites." Perfectionists who want the correct time can call the following number: (303) 499-7111. The exact time is announced once every minute. In between there are ticks and tones.
