SHALL CITY OWN **POWER PLANT?**

(Continued from page one)

of the interest on the investment in addition to the other charges. Where he people own their own lighting lant they receive interest on the inent in the service rendered and in the opportunity for lower rates if conditions permit. Where a lighting plant is owned by the Public if the care for the operation, maintenance, and depreciation it does not matter par ticularly if interest on the investment is not seriously considered.

If the City owned the Light and Power Plant then it could do its pump-ing with very little or no extra expense by arranging so as to do most of the pumping at a time when the power plant was not loaded with furnishing power for others.

If the City owned the Light & Power Plant it would probably be pos-sible for it to do a great deal more street lighting than it is possible for it to do at present.

If the City owned the Light & Power Plant it would be possible for it to operate both utilities more . efficiently because the volume of business produced by both plants would justify the employment of one firstclass expert man to act as superintendent of both.

The concensus of the best opinions on the subject seems to be in favor of municipal ownership of the most of blic utilities.

franchise under which the Light & Power Plant is now operating was entered into on the 18th day, of February, 1908. It provides that at the end of fifteen years after the franchise is accepted the City shall have the right to purchase the Light Plant, the price to be fixed by an Arbitration Committee of three members one of which is to be selected by the City, one by the owners of the Plant and the third is to be selected by the other two. No member of the Committee shall be an inhabitant of the City of Hereford. The franchise alprovides if the City does not wish to take over the property at the end of fifteen years, then it may do so ing the life of the franchise, which is

Of course if the present owner is unwilling to sell before the expiration of the fifteen year period a practical difficulty might be presented, but it is not believed that the present owners would refuse to sell to the City if it could be shown that a decided majority of the tax payers of the City were in favor of the City's taking over the

That the rates of light and power to consumers would certainly be reduced, cannot and is not put forward as a reason why the City ought to acvery few have sufficient information on this subject to venture an opinion at this time. It may be that the rates could not be reduced even if the plant was owned by the City and yes there are advantages that would accree to the City directly and indirectly if it owned the Plant. In addition to this if the time should arrive when the rates could be reduced then the people would be in a condition to get the benefits of it. But it is certain that if the City owned the Light &

It may be said that there is no legal way to acquire the plant before the time specified in the franchise, unless the City would be willing to pay the owner's price. This way be true but

It is thought that there are no serions difficulties in the way of financing the enterprise, no increase in the rate of taxation would be necessary. Arrangements could be made so that the earnings of the plant and water works could take over of the operation. works could take care of the operation, maintenance and depreciation and al-

whether it would be wise to try to acquire the plant in the immediate future, considering war conditions may be debatable, but surely it is wise for the people to be considering the enterprise and getting such information as prudent business men should necessarily have in order to pass on any ques-

tion intelligently.

> The speaker complimented the city on the size of the audience, saying it was the best and most representative he had yet faced in this campaign. He gave two reasons why we were in this war, first, because we were on the defensive and either had to submit and admit we were cowards or fight secondly, he compared Germany to a big bully, who jumped on poor little Belgium, who challenged the peace and security of the world, and it was simply a case of chastizing the bully and restoring order and democratic government to the world or else submit to a world autocratic rule.

He quoted eminent authorities on self-centered and domineering view point of Germany as a worldnation, and then amused the crowd very much by tracing his own emotions throughout the events leading up to the present wherein he said he, would get mad when news would come of some atrocious act of brutiality or treachery on the part of Germany, how he would then remind himself that he was a Minister of the Gospel and should not bear malice, was against war, etc, and would cool off. Then another news story would excite him and he would cool off again.

Finally said the speaker: "I decided to get mad and stay mad."

Rev. Thomsen gave a brief history of the organization of the German government, tending to show that they had been a war-loving and war-pro-voking nation even before the time of Caesar, and declared that their attitude today showed that they had not changed in nature one whit from those ancient days. He exploded the idea that England was an autocracy like Germany by showing that the English states are bound together in a real democracy, while the German states are dominated and overawed by Prussia. He declared the German education was based on skill, knowledge and power, without character, and therefore all the more dangerous, He even declared that the German preachers proclaimed the doctrine of the "good old German God" and instilled into the people the idea that God was for Germany and against all the rest of mankind.

He related talks with returned English officers and other in regard to cruelties practiced by the Germans in the war, all tending to show the barbarous methods used and medevial ideas possessed in regard to war by the Prussian soldiery. He emphasized the fact that he did not believe things of all the German peoples, but that it had been proven of the Rrussians alone. That was the over-bearing, dominating element in the Ger-man Empire that was causing all the

Peden, Federal Food Administrator for Texas wishes it to be generally understood. that the only industries handling the 20 fundamental staples to be affected by the bill at this time are those industries doing a business in excess of \$100,000.00 per year. Through a hasty interpretation of the Food Control Act, the Food Administrator was at Saving the little bits will add analysis of the proclamation issued by the President that the Food Law. with regard to licensing, embraces all of the packing and wholesale concerns which have been accused of controlling the markets in the food staples. The President has power to extend the regulation, but at the resent moment the minimum is \$100,000,00 per year. Among those exempted from the regulation are packers and distributors of beef, pork, and mutton, whose gross sales do not exceed \$100,000.00 per year, and the operators of poultry and egg packing plants, whose sales do not

exceed \$50,000.00 per year. The regulations do not affect farmers, gardeners, or co-operative associations of gardeners, including live stock farmers, and other persons with respect to the production of any farm or other land owned or leased by them. These exemptions were made .







Advantages of the Silo

Among the advantages claimed for the silo, particularly at this time when the high price of grain threatens the very existence of the dairy industry, is that less grain may be fed without reducing mile production, provided the dairy man feeds more silage and legume that it is pointed out that the build. hay. It is pointed out that the building of silos at this time is like the building of ships or fortifications; the sile will help to win the war because it means the saving of grain. Less grain is available for the feeding of cattle, since it is needed for human food and must be conserved for that need. Yet milk production must be maintained, and this can be done by supplementing a shortened grain ration with silage.

The silo offers the best way of preserving the mature corn crop .40 per cent of the food value of which is in the stalks and leaves. It also serves the crop which, for any reason, must be harvested before it is mature. When the farmer harvests only the ears of corn he loses nearly half the value of the crop; when he puts it into the silo the loss is very small. When drought, frost, or insects threaten a field of corn before it is ripe the entire crop may be lost unless the farmer has a sil ready in which to preserve it.

Value of Speculence

Just as fruits and green vegetables are canned to supply succulence to the family during the winter, the die supplies succulence to the cow, and succulence adds to the milk flow. The abundant milk flow obtained from pasture is, to a large extent, due to the juices of the grass; the sile provides a similar juiciness during winter, when pas-ture is no available. It promotes the health of dairy cartle by providing the coarse feed to which the digestive system of the cow is accustomed. 

is made into butter on the farm. The butter produced is variable in quality and color and is marketed in packages of all shapes and sizes and, for these reasons, does not find good markets. Better prices could be secured for Southern farm butter if it were properly made and put into attractive packages.

In starting out to make butter, bear in mind that the public will always pay the price for the quality, while, as a rule, poor, rancid butter is very hard to sell at any price. In order to pro-duce quality butter, the farmer should provide himself with the following equipment: Some type of barrel churn, butter worker, butter printer (one pound square prints), small scales, cream atrainer, cream stirrer, floating dairy thermometer, parchment papers, carton, brushes and some kind of wash-

The first important step in buttermaking is to see that the cream is handled with care. It is impossible to make the best quality of butter from cream that is produced under unsanitary conditions. Experience has shown that in general practice the churning of whole milk results in butter of poor quality and in greater losses of butter-fat in the buttermilk than if cream is used. It is, therefore, best to skim the milk and churn the cream. The best to skim the butter from different way to skim milk is by means of a separator. A farmer who has only to each pound of butter. two or three cows, but no separator, may put the milk into deep, harrow cans (shot gun cans) and set them in cool water, and when the cream rises it can be removed with a shallow spoon, When this system is used, it usually takes about 12 to 18 hours for the cream to rise. Care should be taken to keep the milk cool in order to make the cream rise rapidly. The old method of setting the milk in shaland there are more vessels to wash

As soon as the cream is skimmed, it should be cooled to a temperature between 56 and 62 degrees Fah. and held at that temperature until enough has been collected for churning. Cream should not be held more than three days before churning, because a stale tlavor will develop and this is carried on into the butter and injures its quality. In adding cream from time the old cream before it is added, as warm cream causes souring to set in.

As a general rule, it will take from 30 to 45 minutes for the churning ,this being governed by the temeprature and acidity of the cream, and the character of the butter-fat globules.

As the cream "breaks", the churning process should be stopped at the time the butter granules are about the size of an ordinary pea. Drain the butter-milk away immediately and add clear, pure water, the temperature of which is the same as / that of the drained buttermilk. Add as much water as you drained away buttermilk, turn the churn about 12 revolutions at a rather slow speed, and then drain off this wash water. If the last portion from the draining appears milky, another washing should be given.

When churning a small amount of butter, the salt can be added while the buttey is in the churn by sprinkling the salt loosely over the granular mass and revolving the churn a few times to distribute it evenly, or the salt may be added after the butter is placed in the butter worker. A definite amount of salt should always be added in order to have a uniform percentage in the butter from different churnings. A good rule is to add one onnee of salt

While the butter is still in the churn, the worker, printer and paddles should be put to soak first in hot water and later in cold water, thereby saving time. 





The Sunday school children and all the Sunday School realize the need of the new church. These children are seeking instruction in God's Word, "forbid them not." Will the parents and others refuse to give the same opportunity and advantage for the instruction of these children in His Word and His cause that is so zealously provided in your public schools. What if the public schools of this town were being daily conducted in an old parallelogram of a barn and a dozen recitacleiogram of a barn and a dozen recitations by as many classes being conducted in one room at the same time. What would you do? Every Methodist in this town together with the other citizens would shut up shop and demand that suitable buildings be at once provided. Oh, no, you wouldn't stand for that one week in your public schools. But then the public schools are for the purpose of training and preparing your child to attain to position and make money in this life, and the Sunday School does not amount to any thing more than training that child to become a Christian.

Suppose all the Methodist children hould go on a strike and refuse to attend your sham Sunday School any more until you parents provide a de-cent place for them. Wouldn't they have the best of the argument. Could you parents answer them if your own children should accuse you of worship-ing \$\$\$\$\$\$ instead of God? If you denied it, couldn't they prove it on you? Are your own children justified in thinking and believing that you love \$\$\$\$\$ more than you do their souls and their moral and religious training? Are they? These children look at your buildings and your business conveniences and homes and automobiles and compare all these with the THING you are providing for YOUR God. Does the comparison have tendency to the comparison have a tendency to cause them to respect YOUR God? Or does the comparison have a tendency to cause them to understand that the main god is \$\$\$\$\$\$ and property? Will the comparison have a tendency to cause your children and your neighbors children to believe your professions and your statements when you talk to them about YOUR God and the love and confidence you have in Him and the blessings He will give and the care He will take of you and them? That child may not reply to your talk about what you think of YOUR God, but don't you make the mistake that you have deceived and soft soaped such a child, because that young mind is working just as rapidly and truly concerning you and your conduct in pay-ing tribute and obedience to that God as your mind is working. And that child knows that you are feignning and trying to get it to do a thing which you are not doing. Suppose that child in its innocense should ask you several "whys". You would begin to back away and you would get out of the presence of that child as quickly as ssible. You know you would. The estion may not be asked, but that child is thinking and making the comparison just the same.
