What Our Exchanges Think

ROOSEVELT AT CHICAGO

The President's Chicago speech to the American Legion places new emphasis on the plain duties of citizenship. These have not altered since Washington and the Continental Army laid aside their weapons and turned to the work of completing the Nation they had fashioned. The President who does not hesitate to reform the structure of banking and industry in the interests of the entire United States, brings equal courage to the proper solution of a national problem that never has been handled satisfactorily since the birth of the Republic. For the first time a President insists on a just settlement of a national debt to its veterans and a refusal to pay more than is due.

Mr. Rosevelt first accepts the unquestioned fact of governmental responsibility to the war injured. In the other two points of his proposed compensation program may be discerned the dawn of a new day for the national taxpayer. He recognizes no obligation to a war veteran above that due any other class of citizen and would supply national care for the veteran needy only when all other sources of charitable aid are exhausted. This means definite abandonment of the pension policy under which the superannuated vet-9erans of every American war have attached themselves to the pay roll of the Nation.

How quickly or how completely such a policy can be adjusted to the remaining veterans of the G.A.R. and those of the Spanish-American War already on the pension rolls, the President made no effort to explain. Full application o fan eltered national policy compensation involves detail and may take as long a period as Mr. Roosevelt told the veterans national recovery will require

In the broad principles he has laid down, the President has assailed one of the Nation's greatest problems with his customary courage and frankness of speech. His views are those of many former service men, notably those of the National Econnomy League, a majority of whom can not be changed with themselves drawing pensions even under a regular army contract. It is to be hoped the veterans will fall in step behind his leadership. The Nation, sick of governmental extravagance, is already forming ranks.—Dallas

A MODEL OF REAL LIQUOR CONTROL

Repeal of the 18th amendment is likely to give our capacity for providing ourselves with decent government one of the most revealing tests it has ever had.

When you look over the various liquor control schemes that have been suggested, you find that they all share one factor; each one depends for its success on an honest, efficient, alert and intelligent set of officials to enforce.

Here's a sample:

The liquor control law of one of the Canadian provinces, which provides for retail stores where liquor is sold in packages, has one extremely sensible provision. Not screkeeper is supposed to sell liquor to confirmed drunkards, to men who are prone to spend an undue proportion of their earnings on booze or to characters who are apt to make public nuisances of themselves when in their cups.

The liquor control commission checks up on its storekeepers very easily. It simply scans the police records for their districts. If any district shows a rise in drunkenness, a spread of poverty, an increase in crimes or any similiar symptom indicating that too much liquor is being sold there, the license of the storekeeper in taht district is revoked forthwith.

Every storekeeper knows that he will be out of a job if he fails to use good judgment in making his sales. Every storekeeper, consequently, has the best incentives for running his place as it ought to be run.

Now that is almost a fool-proof scheme, well worth copying in the United States. As much as any such plan can, it makes social considerations paramount in its hndling of the liquor traffic.

But no one needs to think very long to realize that it would be no good whatever if its supervision and enforcement were in the hands of political hacks whose first loyalty was to the machine which gave them their jobs.

Let a Tammany, a Vare machine or any similiar outfit pick your commission, and your fool-proof plan is as full of holes as a screen

And the same thing is true of any liquor control scheme that can possibly be devised. All of them will rest, ultimately, on the local government unit. They will give our ability to govern ourselves an acid test.-Wichita Record News.
