Found Dead On Office Floor

hands of death reached out swiftly and dramatically last Friday morning about ten-thirty o'clock and removed another of Hereford's first line trained and experienced fighting men. D. F. Ashbrook, veteran of twenty-two years of Panhandle pioneering. was the victim. The news traveled quickly over the community and all activities of the moment ceased as the magnitude of the loss dawned upon the minds of the people.

The body of Mr. Ashbrook was found by friends on the floor of his office. He had on his overcoat, evidently having just started for home. His hat and glasses were on the floor beside him. The rug upon which he lay was straight and undisturbed, showing that he probably sat down suddenly when the stroke came, then lay back and breathed his last. Just a few moments before he had visited a physician and complained of pain in his body. He had procured some medicine and stated his intention of going to his home, He had been in delicate health for several years.


