The plaintiff further pleading as title from the sovereignty of the soil, the State of Texas, by patent, and through a regular chain of title to and into himself, setting out the specific instruments of conveyance, and prays in addition for the removal of all clouds from his title and that he be quieted in the peaceable use and possession of said lands and premises, and pleading generally for all relief, special and general, in law and in equity he may be entitled to.

Plaintiff alleging that the defendants, Agatha Cramberg and the First National Bank of Las Vegas, are non-residents of this State, and that the names of the heirs, their heirs and legal representatives of John Cramberg, deceased, are unknown, and that the said Agatha Cramberg is the surviving wife of John C. Cramberg, deceased.

The plaintiff's petition being endorsed on the back: "This action is brought as well to try the title as for damages."

Herein fail not, but have before said court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.
