City to spend \$3 million on water development

A \$3 million water development project for the City of Hereford was approved formally Monday evening by the City Commission.

During the meeting, the commission also adopted a budget for the next fiscal year, turned down bids to construct a pavilion in Dameron Park, authorized city staff to proceed toward sale of property and agreed to a Police Department proposal to install a canine unit.

And, in a busy evening, the commission passed an ordinance to complete sale of property to Deaf Smith General Hospital, named an auditor for city financial affairs and approved a contract with an architect for a new swimming pool.

The water development project will be financed by issuance of revenue bonds. Planned are nine new wells into the Ogalalla formation and three into the Santa Rosa, as well as pipelines. A new million-gallon storage facility also will be built at the station behind the Community Center.

The budget for the year beginning Oct. 1 includes a three percent increase for city employees, but no new taxes will be imposed. General operations of the city are expected to cost \$3,765,629 and water-sewer

operations, \$1,272,898.

General fund revenue is anticipated at \$3,195,175 while water department income is pegged at \$1,908,398. Approximately \$570,454 will be transferred from water department to general operations to balance the expense budget.

By city ordinance, the commission transferred title to about 1.5 acres of property to Deaf Smith General Hospital for hospital expansion. The \$15,000 paid for the land will be placed in the city's park improvement fund.

In another item related to parks, the commission decided to turn down bids for construction of a pavilion in Dameron Park so the money may be spent for other projects. Low bid for the pavilion was \$79,750.

Property, known as Fraser Farm, that was purchased several years ago for water development will be sold. The acreage has been found to be impractical for development. City Manager Chester Nolen was authorized to begin procedure for selling the land.

On a recommendation of Police Chief David Wagner, the commission authorized a cooperative agreement between the city and Hereford Independent School District for a dog to be used in drug detection. Cost of

the dog and training required will be about \$6,000.

Wagner said funds are available through the drug seizure account and HISD would contribute the amount currently spent for contracted drug detection services.

An audit of the city's business from May 1 to Sept. 30 will be conducted by McGinty and Associates at a fee of \$5,000. The firm recently acquired the Hereford office of Gerhardt and Puckett, auditor for the last fiscal year.

A contract for architectural services was authorized with Shrikel, Rollins and Associates at a fee of six percent of the cost of a new swimming pool for the city. The project is expected to cost about \$950,000.

Recent Texas legislation allowing certain entities to purchase items valued up to \$15,000 without competitive bidding was endorsed by the commission. Previously, the city charter set a limit of \$2,000 but the legislation allows the city to amend the policy to correspond with legislation.

A request from Mrs. Wayne Dollar for water-sewer services at 918 E. 18th was granted. The owner will be responsible for expense of connections to the city systems.

Feud continues between ABC affiliate, cable firm

A dispute over access to the television signal of KVII-TV in Hereford heated up Monday when the Amarillo station began a campaign encouraging subscribers to apply pressure to Hereford Cablevision.

A crawl line placed on the screen during two programs telecast by KVII-TV and retransmitted to Cablevision customers suggested that viewers call the cable company to give their opinions on the dispute.

Channel 7 and Cablevision have not reached an agreement on retransmission of the station's signal to cable customers. Federal legislation that became effective recently requires cable companies to sign agreements with broadcasters before sending programs into homes.

The crawl line on Channel 7 Monday was run once during "Wheel of Fortune" and twice during Monday Night Football, two popular programs.

Text of the crawl said, "the program you are watching will not be available to Hereford viewers after Oct. 5." The law requires that agreements be in effect by Oct. 6 if cable companies retransmit station signals.

The Amarillo station's crawl line further declared that "all reasonable offers" to Hereford Cablevision have been turned down.

KVII-TV has asked the cable company to pay one cent per subscriber per month, about \$40, for

the use of the station's signal.

Cablevision has refused to meet those terms.

And, the Hereford company apparently is not the only cable installation in the Panhandle that is balking on the proposal.

James R. McCormick, president of KVII-TV, told *The Brand* Tuesday morning that no other cable companies have reached an agreement.

He said the broadcaster decided to "pick out one system and start working on it."

Lloyd Ames, Hereford Cablevision general manager, offered an assessment of the situation, saying "they don't have to go to Dallas or New York to negotiate with us because we're home-owned."

He said Channel 7 is "trying to

Suspect eliminated in abandonment case

A woman whom investigators thought may have been the mother of Deaf Smith Baby Jane has been located but is not the parent of the infant found March 18 in an animal clinic incinerator.

Deaf Smith County Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul and Sheriff Joe Brown announced Tuesday morning that there are no suspects now in the child abandonment case.

Officials issued an all points bulletin on Aug. 27 for the woman, based on information gathered in the investigation.

"The woman positively is not the mother," Saul said Tuesday. He declined to explain how the determination was made, saying, "We've invaded her privacy enough."

The baby was approximately two hours old when workers discovered her in the incinerator. After initial treatment at Deaf Smith General Hospital, she was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital's neonatal unit in Amarillo. She was discharged about 10 days later and placed in a foster home.

By court action on July 27, parental rights were terminated and full custody of the baby was placed with the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services. She is in foster care outside Deaf Smith County.

Saul said photographs of the baby will be distributed in an effort to gain information. Deaf Smith County Crime Stoppers also is offering a reward for information leading to the mother of the child. Information may be turned in by calling 364-CLUE.

Cowgirl Hall of Fame to close for 'restructuring'

The National Cowgirl Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center will close its doors for three months beginning in October to allow for discussion of the center's future.

In a news release Monday, Hall of Fame board chairman Roger Eades said the hall will close its doors to the public from Oct. 1 through Jan. 3, 1994.

The two-paragraph news release said the decision was made by the board on Sept. 16 that the "Hall of Fame needs to be restructured, and options for its future need to be studied."

In a telephone interview Monday, Eades said the hall felt the need to close its doors temporarily to relieve financial considerations while plans for the future are made.

He said the hall continually works at raising money for the operation, and the closure will enable the board to think more about the structure of the hall than about the finances.

He said it seems like all the board does is raise money. With the hall closed to daily visitors and expenses cut, they will be able to think in different directions.

Eades said the hall of fame staff will be cut during the period.

make the subscriber the negotiator" by running the crawl line across the bottom of the television screen during programming.

McCormick justified the KVII-TV demand by asking, "why should we put out a free signal, then allow the cable company to sell it to you?"

Hereford Cablevision has signed agreements with two other Amarillo stations, KFDD-TV and KAMR-TV, that do not call for a fee for retransmitting their signals.

However, Ames said the agreement specifies that if any other station receives a fee, then those two stations also would be entitled to the same remuneration. The fourth Amarillo station, KCIT-TV, is not signed to an agreement.

McCormick said KVII-TV has "made a reasonable offer, more than

reasonable," to Hereford Cablevision.

Asked if the broadcaster is willing to lose the advertising market in Hereford, he replied, "We're willing to make a test case, and we picked Hereford."

Ames pointed out Tuesday morning that his office had received a number of calls from subscribers who wondered about the advertising that KVII-TV would lose.

"That's kind of interesting," he said.

Ames insisted that Hereford Cablevision does not intend to "lower our standards" by going to customers to fight the battle.

"We want to negotiate with them, not with consumers," he said.

KVII-TV scheduled the crawl line for transmission 12 times during programming Tuesday.

Border blockade initiated

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) - The U.S. government hasn't let Juan Rios get to work.

The Chihuahua, Mexico, native had been illegally crossing the Rio Grande daily for seven months to get to his job as a painter's assistant. He said he made the trip virtually unhindered every time.

On Monday, Rios ran into "Operation Blockade" - a 20-mile wall of U.S. Border Patrol agents lining the river from Sunland Park, N.M., to the eastern outskirts of El Paso.

"I've never seen it like this," Rios said as he waited patiently on an international bridge with dozens of others hoping vainly to get across. "What's their problem?"

Their "problem" is Rios, and the thousands of other illegal immigrants who flood into the United States from Ciudad Juarez each day.

Their answer - at least for now - is Operation Blockade.

The blockade, which uses about 400 agents for a 24-hour high-profile vigil of the border, went up at midnight Saturday and will stay in place indefinitely.

It is the most aggressive show-of-force ever for the Border Patrol's second-largest sector, which boasts about 625 agents and covers 125,000 square miles in West Texas and New Mexico.

In its early stages, it is proving effective.

Agents arrested 158 illegal immigrants Sunday, compared to an average of about 500 to 1,000.

There is no way of determining how many people decided not to cross. Many who waited along with Rios said there is no way to break the cordon.

"Everything is covered up," said Rogelio Sierra, who said he helps other people make the trip across.

The Border Patrol was counting on that.

"So far, the operation has been a tremendous success," said the sector's chief agent, Sylvester Reyes.

Reyes said he decided to try the blockade after members of the community expressed concern over high border crimes rates and the sheer numbers of illegal border crossers.

The El Paso agency has arrested 283,311 people since Oct. 1, up 16 percent from the same period last year, when 244,113 were apprehended.

"This type of operation is at this point the most effective and realistic response," said Reyes.

The crackdown also comes at a time when illegal immigration has drawn the attention of leaders across the nation, including President Clinton, who has called for taking control of the border.

But Duke Austin, a spokesman for the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, the Border Patrol's parent agency, said the El Paso

experiment does not signal a change in national strategy.

The patrol is constantly making adjustments to keep up with illegal immigrants, who have shown themselves to have a talent for overcoming most obstacles.

The blockade is one of those adjustments, going from the usual policy of pursuing and arresting people once they're across to deterring them from ever making the trip.

The operation, which is costing between \$250,000 and \$300,000 through the end of the month - mostly in overtime - has other objectives as well.

Reyes wants to determine the impact of committing two-thirds of the sector's manpower on the frontline; the effect that cutting illegal immigration will have on the area's crime rate and the panhandler population; and the effect on illegal immigrant arrest rates at the city's airport.

south of 15th Street and near Avenue C was donated to the hall.

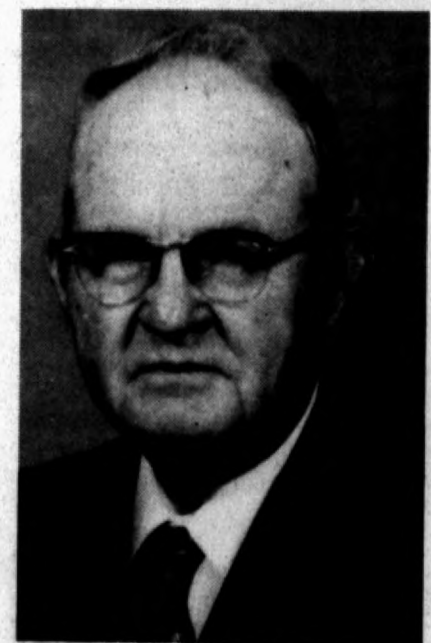
It has been located there ever since.

Beauty, fashion secrets revealed at club meeting

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

The Hereford girls' cross country team took fifth in its own meet Saturday in Veterans Park. They came away knowing they had a chance to compete for a spot in the regional meet.

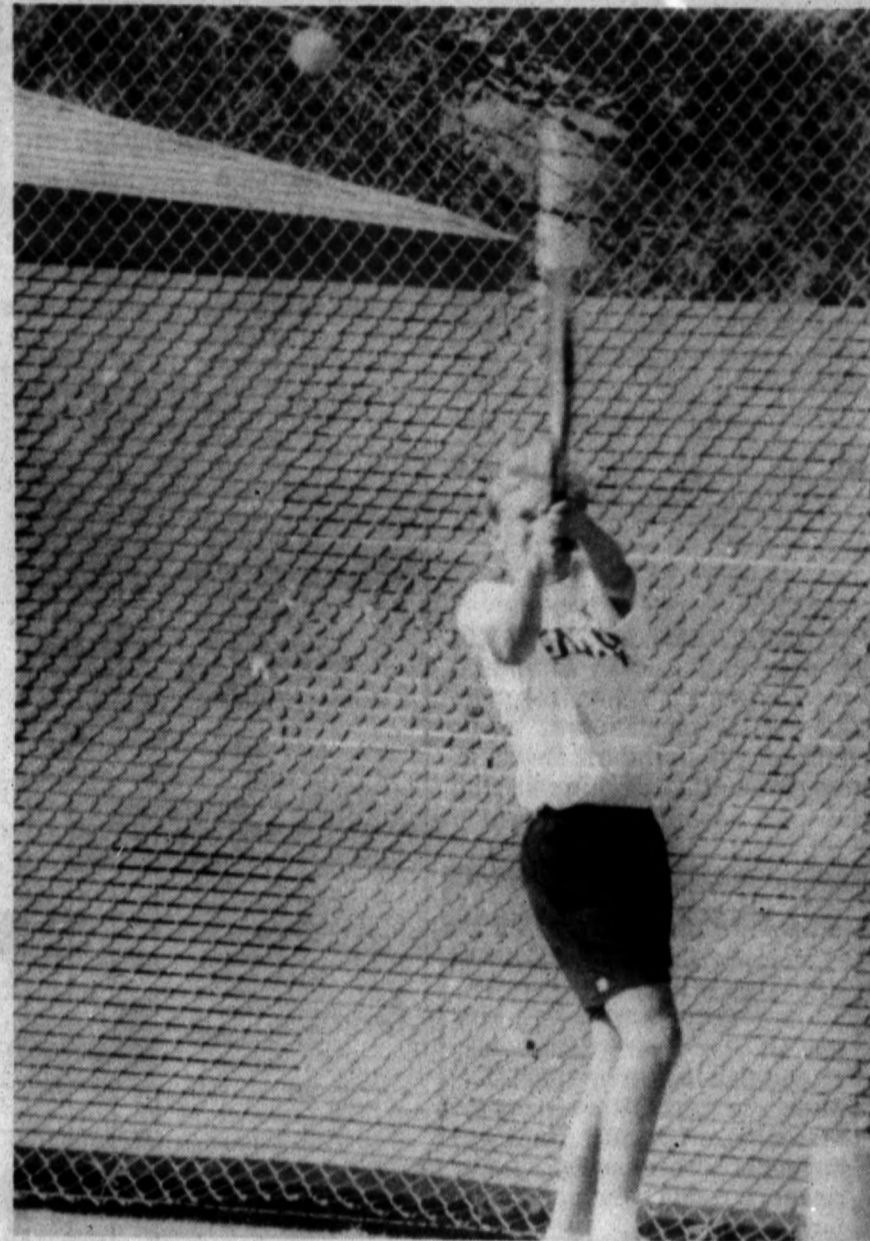

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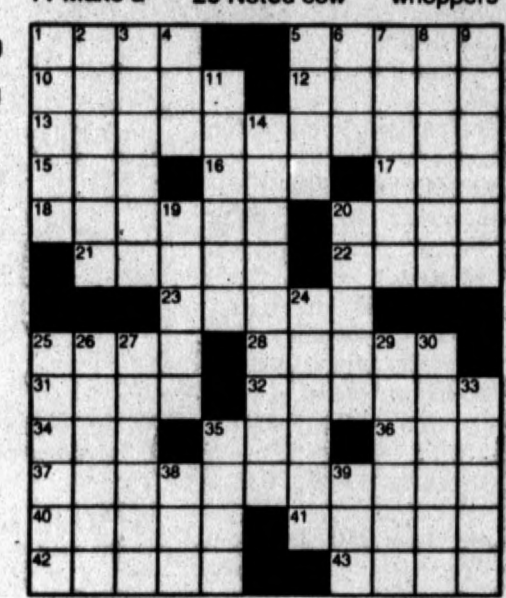

AUSTIN — Gov. Ann Richards' re-election campaign was kicked off last week after her coffers were enriched by \$2 million at a fund-raising birthday party that featured Texas' top musicians.

Willie Nelson opened the party singing "Waltz Across Texas," and ended it with a speech in which he praised Richards' record and promised to work for her re-election.

More than 2,700 people bought tickets ranging from \$25 to \$10,000 for the fund-raiser billed as "Ann at Sixty Birthday Celebration."

"Being governor of Texas is the best job in the world," Richards told the crowd. "And with your help and the consent of the voters of Texas, I intend to keep it."

Bush Declares Candidacy
Meanwhile, Republican George W. Bush ended months of speculation by declaring his candidacy for governor.

In a two-page press release, Bush for the first time said he definitely will run and will make job development the main issue in the campaign to unseat Gov. Richards.

Citing his business background and devotion to Texas, Bush said, "I will run because of my commitment to Texas and my concern for its future. My business experience will enable me to provide the strong, independent leadership our state desperately needs."

Bush, 47, eldest son of the former president and managing partner of the Texas Rangers, said he had filed documents with the Texas Ethics Commission establishing a campaign committee.

A Bush adviser, Karl Rove of Austin, said Bush would make a formal announcement after the baseball season ends.

Court Nixes Bell Bid
The 3rd Court of Appeals has rejected an attempt by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. to pass on a tax increase of about \$23 million to its customers.

The court decision last week upheld previous rulings, including one by the Public Utility Commission.

The PUC had decided that Southwestern Bell could not pass on the franchise tax increase because in 1990 it agreed to freeze rates for four years.

In 1991, the Texas Legislature passed a bill that resulted in a franchise tax increase for Southwestern Bell.

In the same session, lawmakers also approved allowing regulated utilities to recover their increased tax costs from ratepayers.

But the 3rd Court ruled that Southwestern Bell's previous commitment to freeze its rates prevented it from passing through those tax increases.

Nabers Launches Campaign
Mary Scott Nabers kicked off her campaign for the Texas Railroad Commission last week with a strong pitch for more domestic oil exploration.

"The rumors about the demise of oil and gas in Texas are extremely premature," Nabers told supporters at the Brownwood Coliseum. "Not only can we depend on our oil and gas industry, we must depend on it."

The 53-year-old Democrat, who was appointed to the agency in February, said she supports an oil import fee, wants Congress to provide incentives for drilling in the United States and is calling for moderate trucking regulations.

Paris Next Capital for Day
Gov. Richards' second "capital for a day" event will be Sept. 30 in Paris in Northeast Texas.

The governor's office said numerous officeholders and leaders of several state agencies will join the daylong program at Paris Junior College.

"Taking government out of Austin is as important to the decision makers in the capital as it is to the people in these communities," Richards said.

Republicans labeled the first program held in Carthage earlier this month as a political trip.

Insurance Discount Eyed
The State Board of Insurance is considering giving a 10 percent discount on car insurance to motorists who complete a drug and alcohol driving awareness course.

The discount, which would be valid for three years, would be revoked if a motorist were convicted of driving while under the influence. The discount also would be taken away from minors found in possession of alcohol.

The Office of Public Insurance Counsel, an independent state agency which represents consumers, has recommended the discount.

Utilities Panel Named
Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock has appointed five state senators to interim committees that will study state regulation of public utilities.

Bullock's appointees are Sens. Kenneth Armbrister, D-Victoria; John Leedom, R-Dallas; Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur; Peggy Rosson, D-El Paso; and David Sibley, R-Waco. Parker will co-chair the committees.

House Speaker Pete Laney will appoint five House members to the committee at a later date.

October Is Wine Month
October is being declared Texas Wine Month, and Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry says the event should be toasted.

"Last year, Texas produced 1.5 million gallons of wine and contributed \$107 million to the state's economy," Perry said.

According to a spokesperson for the new system, "We have removed nickel from the piercing earrings which helps ears look great in great comfort, from the moment their ears are pierced."

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Michael Jackson was moved to tears during the first of two concerts in Israel.

After singing his love ballad, "She's Out of My Life," at a beach-side park Sunday, the singer wept for a few minutes while fans screamed: "We love you."

Some 50,000 people attended the sold-out show; police estimated another 20,000 fans were in the area to hear the music. At least 182 people were treated for heat exhaustion in the sticky, 86-degree weather, police said.

His visit to holy sites Saturday in the old city of Jerusalem provoked Orthodox Jewish ire because photographers who followed him broke the rules about observance of the Jewish Sabbath by taking his picture.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am a 70-year-old woman and I have a bad case of arthritis in my right shoulder. My doctor put me on Indocin-SR 75 mg capsules. In a few days, all the pain was gone. Then I read that Indocin causes internal bleeding. I stopped taking the medication and now I have arthritis pain in my right knee. Please tell me how dangerous Indocin is. Is there another medication I can take that would work as well as Indocin with less side effects?

DEAR READER: When your doctor prescribes medicine for you, it is a mistake to stop it without consulting him. Yes, Indocin can cause bleeding, particularly in elderly patients. So can almost all the medications used to relieve the pain of arthritis. They may cause erosion of the esophagus, stomach and small intestine and bleeding from a diverticulum (pocket

of the colon). Often bleeding may start without causing symptoms. Really there are none of these anti-inflammatory medicines that will not cause some risk of bleeding with the exception of the acetaminophen (such as Tylenol) medications. There is another medicine called Cytotec which will reduce the risk of bleeding and is sometimes prescribed along with these medications. Of the various medications, aspirin or salicylates is probably the most likely to cause bleeding. The smaller the dose of medicine you require, the less likely you will have a problem, but your doctor will want to keep a careful check on you, and you should be aware of what to look for as a possible sign of bleeding, such as black stools. There is no perfect medication for arthritis or for any of the disorders

that cause chronic pain. The choice may be different depending on the diagnosis and other findings. There are new medicines under investigation that have an entirely different way of acting that may change this, but for now we are stuck with what we have. I have discussed osteoarthritis in Special Report 80, Help for Osteoarthritis, which I am sending you. Others who want this report can send \$3 with a stamped (52 cents), self-addressed, No. 10 envelope for it to THE HEALTH LETTER/80, P.O. Box 5537, Riverton, NJ 08077-5537. Your doctor may want to send you to a physical medicine specialist for an exercise program to strengthen and stretch your muscles. Physical therapy is often a big help in controlling symptoms and that helps to limit the amount of medicine a person might need to control pain.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I am taking Procardia XL, 60 mg a day. Please explain the side effects that are caused by this medicine. My feet and legs are very swollen. Could the medicine be causing the swelling?

DEAR READER: Possibly. You have to be taking Procardia for a reason and that reason may be why you have swelling of your feet and legs. However, about 10 percent of patients who take Procardia will have edema (swelling). Procardia is a calcium channel blocker used in treating coronary artery disease and high blood pressure. Less common side effects include nasal congestion, shortness of breath, diarrhea, constipation, muscle and joint pains, sweating, sexual difficulties and many others. But calcium channel blockers are very good medicine when one does not have these complications.

Lowery steals show from glamour-boy quarterbacks

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Fans looking for a classic duel between two of the best quarterbacks ever didn't get what they expected.

Sure, Joe Montana and John Elway played. But they didn't produce much excitement Monday night in a game dominated by the leg of Nick Lowery. The Kansas City kicker made five field goals as the Chiefs beat the Denver Broncos 15-7.

Montana completed 21 of 36 passes for 273 yards, but did not appear as sharp as he had in the first game against Tampa Bay.

Elway passed for 300 yards, completing 28 of 45, but the Broncos botched their chances by committing 14 penalties. By the time Elway finally got Denver in the end zone late in the fourth quarter, Lowery had already done his damage.

The Chiefs (2-1) sent the Broncos to their first loss in three games.

The lack of a Kansas City touchdown didn't seem to bother Montana, who made his

regular-season home debut before a crowd of 78,453.

"Yeah, they did some stuff and I made some mistakes," said Montana, who played after sitting out last week at Houston because of a wrist injury.

"We would like to give our defense a little more help. Like I've said many times before, defense is the mainstay of this team and that's what it takes to win championships. If we score field goals and the defense doesn't let them score, that's what it's all about."
