## Hits and misses

Landing industry, new firms inexact science

When it comes to economic development, the competition is fierce.

There are more communities trying to attract new industry and businesses than there are companies looking to expand or relocate operations.

And, smaller communities, especially those like Hereford located in rural areas, find the going particularly difficult when it comes to attracting new companies.

Mike Hatley, executive director of the Hereford Economic Development Corp., has had some hits and more misses in trying to attract new business to Hereford.

In recent years, Hatley's tried to sell Hereford as prospective location, but the results have been mixed.

Four big projects that have looked at Hereford have included three agriculture-related companies and one non-agriculture.

The three ag-related companies -- Premium Standard Farms, Seaboard Farms and Nippon Meat Packers Inc -- all were looking for sites to build pork/beef processing plants. The economy impact would have been significant, with Premium Standard Farms planning a \$65 million facility that would have employed 500; Seaboard Farms, \$100 million and 2,400 jobs; and Nippon Meat Packers, \$110 million and 2,400 jobs. The paper recycling mill projected a \$100 million facility with 101 jobs.

Although the four projects went to other locations, Hatley said he's

proud Hereford made the companies' "short list."

"I'm sure that no other community in the Panhandle ... has made the short list for this many large manufacturing/processing projects, outside of perhaps Amarillo with their \$9 million budget," Hatley said.

Another hit that turned into a miss has been American Modular Building, an Amarillo-based company that received a \$2,500 monthly subsidy from HEDC to cover its rent.

The company, which opened in February with pledges to maintain a workforce of at least 10 people, would later seek permission to lower than figure to six. Although the request would be approved -- reluctantly -- by the Hereford City

Commission, American Modular Building has shut down operations and has vacated its building.

Dallas Pallet Co had been considered a "hit" during the first of the year, but that, too, turned into a miss. The company, which had taken over a former trucking company's facility and renovated office space, never got off the ground. The buildings now sit vacant.

As for the "hits," Hatley points to the \$7.8 million Grupo Bimbo Cereal Foods Inc. plant going in near Dawn. That plant is expected to create about 40 jobs in Deaf Smith County. Also, LIA, an Oklahoma-based company, has opened an operation in Hereford, spending about \$2 million to convert an existing building for its needs. The

LIA workforce is expected to be 35-40.

And, he points to Moovies 6, noting the theater complex cost about a half-million dollars to build and has created 17 jobs. He said the theater also has kept additional dollars from leaving the community.

Hatley said HEDC, working through the Hereford City Commission, also has assisted existing companies with financial assistance or tax abatements.

Caviness Packing received a \$50,000 wastewater line grant that will retain about 30 jobs and create an additional 10 jobs, he said. It also will boost wastewater revenues for

## Hospital board digesting report on health system

The ball was tossed into the court of the Deaf Smith County Hospital District directors -- and they're deciding what to do with it.

Members of the Community Health Improvement Partnership wrapped up their work Sept. 22 by presenting a final report, including a series of recommendations for improving the county health care system, to the hospital district directors. The directors now will have to digest the mass of information and decide what recommendations will be accepted, modified or scrapped.

The CHIP partners spent the last year evaluating all aspects of the health care in Deaf Smith County, from the physical plant to loss of patient base and specific health problems. Working with community organizer Pat Stone and health care consultant Paul McGinnis of the Oregon-based McGinnis & Associates, the partners gathered information from a variety of sources, including members of the community, health care professionals, civic and community leaders and state databases.

The partners narrowed the focus of the project, forming six committees to examine specific areas of the health care system and draft recommendations for solutions.

While the six areas examined do not represent all of the health care issues in the county, the partners did reach consensus on those areas in which they believed they could offer credible solutions.

The reports focused on the physical plant, determining if the Hereford Regional Medical Center facility is obsolete or if it can be renovated; out-migration of patients; heart disease, which is the No. 1 killer of Deaf Smith County residents; knowledge of available health services; and cancer and teen pregnancy, both of which in Deaf Smith County exceed the state average.

The hospital directors haven't decided exactly how they plan to use the information provided by the partners; however, they have indicated they need time to assess the material provided before taking any action.

"The next step is to evaluate it as the whole board ... They're all good ideas," Director Chris Leonard said.

"Some of the things already are in place," Leonard said, citing the new mammography equipment purchased by the hospital, as well as increased efforts to publicize the availability of screenings at HRMC.

"They (the partners) have some good ideas and some are pretty feasible,"

## Second to none

Hereford's senior citizens center managing to beat odds and thrive

It has been said repeatedly in the past 15 years the Hereford Senior Citizens Center is second to none.

That continues to hold true. While other senior centers in the area are struggling just to keep their doors open, the Hereford facility is continuing to provide a wide variety of services on a daily basis.

"For this budget year, we had allowed for 49,920 congregate meals (served in the Senior Center) and 49,500 meals to be delivered to the home-bound," Margie Daniels, executive director, said.

The nutrition program gets some federal funding. The amount received for the budget year which ended Sept. 30 was just under \$137,000, according to Daniels.

In September, the board voted to increase the suggested donations for noon meals served by the center. "The increase was necessitated by the fact that federal funding has remained at the same amount for 15 years while food costs have risen dramatically," Daniels said.

"We also get some money from the USDA for the congregate meal

program, but we don't always get it on a monthly basis," she added.

The remainder of the money required to provide these meals and other programs of the Senior Center must be raised locally, which is done in part through the annual Festival of Trees.

This year's fund-raiser is planned for Nov. 18-22, with the actual tree auction on Friday, Nov. 20.

"From the tree auction, a silent auction and some different things offered this year, we hope to clear \$60,000," Daniels said.

Profits from the Senior Citizens Thrift Store also add to the center's operating fund. The store brought in \$30,000 last year, according to Daniels.

"We only had enough volunteers to keep the Thrift Store open on Thursday and Friday. But we are planning soon to be open 4 1/2 days a week, from Tuesday through noon Saturday," Daniels said.

Membership dues in Hereford Senior Citizens Association are applied to the operating fund as well.

Not only do dues help keep the center functioning, seniors with a current dues card are allowed to vote

in the annual meeting. Three positions on the board of directors are vacated each year and new directors are elected from the membership.

"We have five members running for election to fill the three positions on the board. Our annual meeting is next Wednesday at 1 p.m.," Daniels said.

Finding members who are willing to serve on the board is difficult, Daniels said. "We need people to volunteer now to work at the center and learn what it is all about who are willing to become board members next year."

Volunteers are an integral part of Hereford Senior Citizens Center. With only 13 paid employees, many of the programs, such as meals delivered to the homebound, are almost totally dependant on volunteers.

"We have nine people who deliver meals and only one of them is a paid driver," Daniels said.

Volunteers who reported hours turned in a total of 26,000 hours for last year and not all volunteer hours are reported.

## Autry took Rogers' advice, became star, multimillionaire

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Will Rogers once heard a young Gene Autry strumming a guitar and singing in an Oklahoma telegraph office. "You're good," he said. "Stick to it, young fellow, and you'll make something of yourself."

Autry did much more than that, serenading generations of children as the nation's original singing cowboy and becoming a gentle moralist for millions of fans of the American West as he built a fortune in business.

Autry died at his home Friday after a long illness, three days after turning 91.

Beloved for his signature song, "Back in the Saddle Again," Autry popularized the musical Western in 91 movies from the 1930s to the early


'50s by playing the same character: a true-blue cowboy who always fought fair and loved his horse, Champion.

"He often considered himself the baby sitter of three generations of children" while they watched his movies on Saturday afternoons, said Alex Gordon, who met Autry 52 years ago and became his director of licensing.

"And these weren't just bang-bang, shoot 'em-up Westerns. He always wanted to put a moral in the story."

Autry's "Cowboy Code" contained eight rules to live by. The first was "The cowboy must never shoot first, hit a smaller man or take unfair advantage."

## Combest hopes 'wiser heads' prevail on agriculture package

Larry Combest hopes "wiser heads" will prevail and President Clinton will sign an agriculture bill providing disaster assistance to farmers.

Combest said the Republican-backed \$4.1 billion farm relief package is "multi-faceted" and will aid both farmers who had crops but were hit by low prices and those, such as in Texas, with crops wiped out by drought.

Democrats, as well as the Texas Farmers Union, oppose the GOP plan, claiming the package is inadequate, even with the natural disaster assistance provision, and doesn't provide enough relief from the impact of low commodity prices.

Democrats are touting a \$7.3 billion package proposed by Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, which includes funds to cover disaster and economic losses, as well as a provision to boost marketing loan prices.

Overriding Democratic objections, however, the Republican-controlled House voted 236-156 to reject a motion to send the package back to the House-Senate conference committee. Following the vote, the House approved the measure and sent it to the Senate for consideration.

Combest also said the \$80 billion tax cut passed by the House will

benefit agriculture because it offers five-year indexing, which allows producers to apply current losses to other years -- averaging the losses and gains. This would be an expansion of current law, which provides for two-year indexing. The "carryback" potentially means "thousands and thousands of dollars to farmers," Combest said.

"The ag bill is trying to recognize multiple problems ... transition

payment would go to all farmers," he said. It also would provide disaster relief to areas that have multi-year losses.

Referring to the latest batch of documents from Independent Counsel Kenneth W. Starr's investigation into President Clinton's affair with former White House intern Monica Lewinsky, Combest said the impeachment process must move forward.

The House is expected to vote within days on a resolution authorizing the Judiciary Committee to conduct an impeachment inquiry.

Combest said the matter has been "dumped in the lap" of Congress, which did not seek the report.

He said the impeachment process, which must proceed to a conclusion -- either recommending or rejecting impeachment of Clinton -- will follow the so-called "Watergate model," referring to the House Judiciary Committee's impeachment inquiry into President Nixon's activities in the coverup of the Watergate burglary.

Combest was sharply critical of House Democrats, saying they are trying to "have it both ways." He said House Minority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., urged using the Watergate inquiry as a model, but then seeks to limit the House, both in scope and time.





## Law enforcement veteran garners top certification

Bryan Hedrick, security coordinator and criminal justice instructor at Hereford High School, has earned the top certification available to Texas peace officers.

Hedrick, a 15-year law enforcement veteran, recently was awarded the Master Peace Officer's Certification by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education (TCLEOSE).

Only 15 percent of the 60,000 certified Texas peace officers have achieved this status.

This certification requires an individual to acquire a minimum of 120 training points. One training

point equals eight hours in the classroom.

During the past 15 years, Hedrick has accumulated 165 training points and 1,320 hours of classroom training.

Texas peace officers are certified as basic peace officers, intermediate peace officers, advanced peace officers or master peace officer.

Hedrick earned his instructor's license and has worked for four years in the HISD system.

He is a certified crime prevention inspector and heads the classes at HHS for students considering a law enforcement career.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Facing the most serious challenge to the world economy in 50 years, finance ministers and central bank presidents from the United States and six other wealthy nations are exploring ways to avert a slide into a global recession.

The officials were gathering today to consider a series of proposals by President Clinton designed to lead the world back from a financial precipice.

# Election '98

## Deadline nears to register for November general election

Monday's the last day voters can register to vote in the Nov. 3 general election.

Eligible individuals who want to register need to go to the Deaf Smith County Clerk's office in the courthouse, 235 E. 3rd, to complete the registration form. Voter registration applications also must be postmarked Monday to vote in the Nov. 3 election.

To be eligible to register in Texas, an applicant must be a U.S. citizen; a resident of the county; 18 years old on Election Day; not a convicted felon (unless a person's sentence is completed, including any probation or parole); not declared mentally incapacitated by a court.

Early voting by personal appearance will begin Oct. 17, and the applications to vote early by mail must be received by the county clerk by Oct. 27. Early voting will end Oct. 30.

Polls will be open 7 a.m.-7 p.m. Nov. 3 for the general election.

On the Deaf Smith County ballot, there are only three contested county races.

Republican Jean Schumacher and Democrat Darla Hale are vying for the district clerk's position being vacate by long-time clerk Lola Faye

Veazey; Democrat Sammy Gonzales Sr., who defeated incumbent Lupe Chavez in the March primary, will face Republican Steve Hoffman for the Precinct 2 commissioner's seat; and incumbent Johnny Latham, a Democrat, is challenged by Republican Jerry O'Connor for the Precinct 4 commissioner's spot.

On Election Day, voters will cast ballots at nine precincts. The location of the precincts, as well as the election judges/alternates for the voting stations follow:




the city, which will own the line. Arrowhead Mills received tax abatements on its new 40,000-square-foot warehouse/distribution facility. However, there are reports that Arrowhead Mills' parent company may close the Hereford operation. Pete Holcomb said Monday the parent company is conducting a six-month evaluation of local operations before making a decision on a possible shutdown.

Hatley said HEDC also has helped Beef Tech and Dawn Cattle Feeders obtain tax abatements, as well as helping with the wastewater permit process.

"Our biggest weakness is the availability of existing buildings -- 50,000 to 75,000 square feet," Hatley said. "Most companies that are looking -- and there's not a great lot out there -- they really would like to have an existing building. It's easier and quicker" for companies wanting to relocate.

At the same time, Hatley said HEDC is not giving any thought to building and marketing such a facility, as have some other communities.

"Spec buildings like that are tough. You get it and spend a half-million dollars (in construction). That carries such a high risk, so at this point, we (HEDC directors) have decided not to build a spec building. It may be in the future, but not now," he said.

"We're a rural area and some companies just don't want to be in a rural area," Hatley said in assessing a weakness in selling Hereford.

However, he said the region has "a lot of people we can put to work, and that's a strength. There're a lot of places in the Panhandle that don't have a big labor force, but we do have availability of labor."

"We get a lot of debate about the (dominance of agriculture) being a drawback. There's talk we should be diversified and we try, but I don't see our cattle or farming being a drawback to diversification," Hatley said.

"In our strategic plans, we decided to go after ag-related industries, such as food processors, dairies -- and the auto aftermarket industry, but we wouldn't limit ourselves if the right thing came up," he said. "In a community of our size, you have to have teams ready to go after every project, and everyone we've (asked has) been exceptionally helpful in giving of their time."

Hereford Mayor Bob Josseland, who along with City Manager Chester Nolen is an ex-officio member of the HEDC board, said the City Commission approves the HEDC budget and "big ticket" expenditures, but there

is little day-to-day contact between Hatley and the commissioners.

"Hatley and (Don) Cumpton (executive vice president of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce) work closely together, hand in glove, but the City Commission isn't as a whole involved other than to share frustration that we aren't getting industry in here," Josseland said.

Cumpton echoed Josseland, saying the chamber tries to assist the economic development agency "anyway we can."

The level of assistance depends on the project, Cumpton said.

"What we try to do if (HEDC) gets a good lead is provide literature, information about Hereford, or make contacts, set up visits -- whatever is needed," Cumpton said.

In recent weeks, Hatley has discussed contacts with Wal-Mart, a retail outlet, a factory outlet and at least three dairies.

Hits or misses? Only time will tell.

## Grains, soybeans rise on showers

CHICAGO (AP) - Grain and soybean futures advanced Friday on the Chicago Board of Trade as widespread showers in the Midwest delayed harvesting and on prospects of a smaller than expected world supplies.

Wheat futures posted sharp gains amid reports that a recent frost in Australian could reduce that country's crop by as much as 3 million metric tons, information that surprised investors who had thought the frost caused little damage. The frost could reduce Australian exports, helping boost American prospects at a time of weak world demand.

Grain and soybeans futures also rose as forecasters called for rain into Sunday for major growing areas, slowing what has until now been a rapid harvesting pace that is bringing bumper crops to market well ahead of five-year averages.

Soybean futures also found rose after influential forecasting firm Sparks Cos. of Memphis, Tenn., issued a surprising final production forecast of 2.858 billion bushels - below the U.S. Agriculture Department's current forecast of 2.909 billion bushels. Analysts had expected the figure to be higher.

Soybeans also were supported by a jump in the National Oilseed Processor Association's weekly

crushing figures, which boosted expectations processing is starting to pick up.

Wheat for December delivery rose 7 cents to \$2.76 a bushel; December corn rose 1.5 cents to \$2.065 a bushel; December oats rose 1 cent to \$1.1025 a bushel; November soybeans rose a half-cent to \$5.155 a bushel.

## Which should you believe?

Whom do you believe?

Newspapers run into problems when dealing with breaking news. Maybe it's half-full, half-empty syndrome -- you know, is the glass half full or is it half empty?

That was very apparent Saturday when looking at the front pages of the Amarillo Daily News and the Lubbock Avalanche Journal.

Headlines in the two newspapers offered two different versions of the same story: Hurricane Georges. The Lubbock paper, which apparently had a pessimist writing the headline, proclaimed: "Hurricane batters Florida Keys," while the more-optimistic Amarillo paper declared: "Hurricane spares Keys."

Which headline writer was the more accurate? Here's the lead of The Associated Press story used by both papers:

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) - Hurricane Georges raked the Florida Keys with sheets of rain and 105 mph winds Friday, destroying houseboats and tearing off roofs but sparing Florida the kind of devastation that left at least 300 dead across the Caribbean.

How did the two papers get such a different slant on the same event?

I suppose the Lubbock headline writer looked at the lead and saw how the Keys were "raked" with heavy rain and winds, which destroyed houseboats and ripped off roofs. In Amarillo, the headline writer likely read the second half of the lead paragraph which concluded Georges spared the Keys the destruction that Puerto Rico and the Dominican Republic suffered.

Deadlines always cause trouble for newspapers, especially with breaking stories. Perhaps the most famous case had to have happened during the 1948 presidential election.

Not all of the ballots had been counted when the Chicago Tribune closed out its early edition. Using the information it had at the time, the headline declared boldly that "Dewey defeats Truman."

Unfortunately for the Tribune, Thomas Dewey's early lead over President Harry S. Truman didn't hold up, and that led to the famous photograph of a grinning Truman holding up the paper's front page with its incorrect headline.

Lott said the other day he believes a president, referring to Bill Clinton, may be impeached for "bad conduct."

Lott voted against all three of the articles of impeachment. The Mississippian apparently did not believe that using the Internal Revenue Service as a weapon against his political enemies was an impeachable offense, nor was using the CIA to block the FBI's investigation, nor was approving the payment of hush money to the Watergate burglars, nor was ordering illegal wiretaps.

## Impeachable offenses are in the eye of the beholder

WASHINGTON (AP) - Long before congressional reports warranted X ratings, a Supreme Court justice wrote that he couldn't define pornography "but I know it when I see it."

That's about where the definition of impeachable offenses stands in the case against President Clinton.

The House Judiciary Committee is preparing to consider whether Clinton committed any in the Monica Lewinsky scandal, and possibly in other matters, - while commissioning

a separate inquiry into what they are. Even that, Rep. Henry Hyde said, will produce advice, not a binding definition. "I think every member of the committee will make their own

mind up as to what is an impeachable offense," the Republican chairman said.

Sen. Trent Lott, the Republican leader, said bad conduct that brings

disrepute on the office would meet his test for impeachment. Lott wouldn't say whether that would cover Clinton's behavior.

Hyde had another example, saying it had been suggested that a president who went on vacation the day of another Pearl Harbor would be impeachable.

The whole case has been tangled in disputes over the meaning of words, acts and offenses.

Prosecutor Kenneth W. Starr told the House he had substantial and credible evidence of acts that may constitute grounds for impeachment, centering on obstruction of justice and perjury, in the president's attempts to hide his conduct in the Lewinsky affair.

Clinton's defense is founded in fine distinctions and definitions. It begins with a judge's ruling on the meaning of sexual relations for the questions put to Clinton in his sworn deposition in the Paula Jones sexual harassment case on Jan. 17. The wording approved by U.S. District Judge Susan Webber Wright listed erogenous body parts and said that a person is engaging in sexual relations by contacting any of them with intent to arouse or gratify another person.

But any list has loopholes, which Clinton used in denying he'd had sexual relations with the former intern, even after he was forced to admit that he did have inappropriate intimate contact with her.

"My understanding of this definition is that it covers contact by the person being deposed with the enumerated areas..." Clinton said in his testimony to the Starr grand jury.

The dictionary would have been more difficult to evade than the anatomy book. It defines sex more comprehensively. But that isn't what Clinton was asked.

He sparred about other definitions, too.

"It depends upon what the meaning of the word 'is' means," he replied when questioned about his lawyer's use of that verb in denying a sexual relationship of any kind.

And to questions about his testimony that he couldn't recall being alone with Ms. Lewinsky:

"Well, it depends on how you define alone." He said they were, but the doors were open so he never really thought they were.

And those are simple words. Defining an impeachable offense is not.

In the end, what one is depends on

who's got the voters to say what one is. The Constitution is specific on two offenses, treason and bribery, neither of which is involved in this case. Beyond that, it says "other high crimes and misdemeanors" are impeachable.

So there is no fixed standard. Hyde said that leaves it flexible to fit circumstances and the facts. And the politics, since the side with the votes in the House determines what's impeachable. In the case of Richard M. Nixon in 1974, the House Judiciary Committee voted three articles of impeachment, for obstruction of justice - proven by his own White House tapes - in the Watergate cover-up, for misuse of the power of federal agencies, and for defying House subpoenas.

Nixon resigned before the House acted.

The other presidential impeachment was of President Andrew Johnson in 1868, on 11 counts, one for campaign speeches against Congress, the rest for firing the secretary of war in defiance of a law requiring Senate consent.

The Republican House voted impeachment on those constitutionally fragile grounds. Johnson survived by one vote in the Senate, the only president ever impeached.

No precedent there to guide what happens now. But the history of that impeachment proves the political point - the side with the votes can decide what constitutes grounds against a president.

On standards as hard to define as those the late Potter Stewart invoked when the Supreme Court ruled against censorship of sexually-explicit writings in 1964, and he said that he wasn't going to attempt a definition of hard-core pornography because he probably couldn't do so intelligibly even though he knew it when he saw it.

# Lawmakers ask why HMOs dropping aged on Medicare

WASHINGTON (AP) - Lawmakers are asking why health plans in some parts of the country are dropping service to elderly and disabled Medicare beneficiaries.

"A significant number of health plans have terminated their contracts with Medicare," said Rep. Michael Bilirakis, R-Fla., chairman of the House Commerce health subcommittee, which held a hearing on the matter today. "This trend is certainly very deeply disturbing."

As of Sept. 30, 33 of the 347 private health plans that participate in Medicare have said they won't renew their contracts next year and another 31 are reducing service areas, Medicare's deputy administrator, Michael Hash, told lawmakers.

"Plans are saying very clearly that they cannot cover costs and compensate providers," said Karen Ignagni, president of the American Association of Health Plans.

Patients must be notified of any health plan closings in November. In all, 238,816 Medicare beneficiaries are expected to lose their health plans.

Hash said the vast majority will

have the choice of joining another plan in their area - and all can opt to return to traditional Medicare coverage, under which their medical bills are sent directly to the government.

More than 6 million Medicare beneficiaries are enrolled in private health plans - known as health maintenance organizations, or HMOs - that accept from the government a fixed monthly fee that varies based on local medical prices but averages \$471.

The plans generally control costs by limiting patients' choice of doctors and requiring permission for some treatment. But most also offer extra benefits, such as prescription drug and dental coverage not normally available through Medicare.

As part of last year's effort to balance the government's budget, lawmakers agreed to cut the annual raises to plans to 2 percent from past increases as high as 10 percent.

Some HMOs quickly announced they would exit markets or cut back on coverage.

Even more have balked since

Medicare this summer provided details about the payment changes, plus new consumer protection rules - such as a \$50 limit on patient fees for emergency room care.

Allina Health System, which serves 70,000 Medicare patients in Minnesota and the Upper Midwest, informed lawmakers it will cut four counties of its eight-county service area, dropping 10,000 people.

"It is very difficult to add so many administrative burdens at a time when federal reimbursement is being reduced," said Patricia Riley, a vice president with the HMO.

Allina is among plans that asked permission to raise out-of-pocket fees charged to patients next year to help defray costs. But Medicare officials told them Thursday it was too late to change the prices they have committed to.

The inspector general of the Health and Human Services Department also has reported that HMOs are far overcompensated by Medicare for their administrative costs.

"There can be no doubt that what we pay plans is adequate," said Hash.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Only in times of political and constitutional stress are Americans reminded of the first Earl of Suffolk's dubious role in history. The minister to England's King Richard II was the first official to be impeached.

In the 612 years since the earl's ouster by a hostile Parliament, legislators and scholars have debated without much agreement on what constitutes grounds for impeaching an executive and removing him from office.

With the House moving swiftly toward an impeachment inquiry against President Clinton, the debate over the meaning of "high crimes and misdemeanors" is being renewed.

"The dominant concern of the Constitution's framers and ratifiers lay with the specter of misconduct in the actual discharge of presidential duties, not incidental and private misdeeds," said historian Jack Rakove of Stanford University, author of a book on the 1787 Constitutional Convention.

Charles Jones, a political science professor at the University of Wisconsin, said the Clinton matter poses a dilemma for Congress and the public. Many people believe the president's behavior with Monica Lewinsky does not fit the definition of an impeachable offense. "Still, the question is, 'Can you lie about it in a court proceeding?'"

He said the widespread public perception is that Clinton was covering up personal behavior and "that makes it more difficult to define high crimes."

When Gerald Ford was a Michigan congressman, he told the House that an impeachable offense was "whatever a majority of the House considers it to be." He added that in the case of a president, it "would indeed require crimes of the magnitude of treason and bribery."

When the British parliament began bringing impeachment proceedings against government officials, it was a way of attacking government actions without directly confronting the king.

Michael de la Pole, the Earl of Suffolk, was impeached for the high crimes and misdemeanors of misusing public funds.

During the deliberations of the 1787 Constitutional Convention, delegates argued about how much power to give the president and whether the document should include the means of removing him from office.

According to James Madison's notes of the closed deliberations, the length of the presidential term was originally left blank. The first proposal was that it be made three years. Later the convention approved a seven-year term with the president ineligible for re-election. Ultimately that became four years with no limit on re-election. The two-term limit was added to the Constitution as the 22nd Amendment.

What about removing the president?


One proposal was that "the executive be made removable by the National Legislature on the request of a majority of the legislatures of individual states."

Charles Cotesworth Pinckney of South Carolina argued against including an impeachment power in the Constitution because he feared it would give too much power to Congress.

In the Federalist Papers, the essays written by Madison, Alexander Hamilton and John Jay to defend and explain the proposed constitution, Hamilton wrote that basis for impeachment would be "the misconduct of public men, or, in other words, from the abuse or violation of some public trust."

He added that the process was essentially political and therefore "there will always be the greatest danger that the decision will be regulated more by the comparative strength of parties than by the real demonstrations of innocence or guilt."

On one point, there is agreement throughout history. High crimes and misdemeanors as a basis for impeachment need not be crimes under the law.

he said. "But we need to get together as a board. There's a lot in there and some of it will take money. It was a good process, and the people who participated took their role very seriously."

Board president Maf Manchee said the CHIP report will be discussed at the Oct. 20 board meeting, with directors likely to comment on each item in the package.

"We're taking it (CHIP report) very, very seriously," Manchee said. "There are some very good ideas. Some things we (directors) can do something about; some things, we can't, but it's a good report," Manchee said.

"We need some stability (in the administration) and I hope we are finding it now," he said. "It's very hard to do anything when you don't have stability -- I think we've had three administrators since the last (health care evaluation) -- and I think we're getting some stability now with John (Studsrud, new HRMC administrator). We definitely wanted to hear what people in the community are thinking, otherwise we wouldn't have gone into this (partnership project)."

Board secretary Mark Collier said he liked the "concept in what the CHIP program has done."

"We've done this before and it fell through," Collier said, referring to a 1994 report that also made recommendations for improving the health care delivery system. That report were not implemented.

"This is something we had better focus on. There're a lot of good ideas and they'll take money," Collier said.

"When we talk marketing, we have good employees -- they're our greatest asset -- we've got to get our employees on a positive track," he said. "We need to develop good communication" among the hospital, board and community, he said. Collier praised new administrator John Studsrud for establishing a rapport with the physicians, a rapport the board member said has been missing.

He also commented the partners' report listing out-migration as a serious threat to the hospital's viability, noting "we have to promote the hospital."

Collier also said the board needs to set a timetable for dealing with the report, assign groups to work on different areas of the report and establish deadlines for the work to be completed.

## Commuters get to see works by D.C. poets

WASHINGTON (AP) - Professional scribes will now get a chance to write poems for subway and bus riders for the nation's capital to ponder during daily commutes.

That job had been reserved for students, but the District Lines Poetry Project, celebrating its fifth anniversary Thursday, decided to expand its stable of poets.

The poems are posted in unused advertising space on subways and buses here.

One professional poem to be posted is by Reuben Jackson, who is also a music critic. It's called "Early in the City" and says, in its entirety:

"I like it 'cause the subway cars aren't full,  
"Only the sky,  
"With its fetching shade  
"of sunrise blush,  
"Like the lipstick of a lover  
"on the horizon's collar."

In another change, new poems will appear several times a year, rather than just once.

Here is a look at a summary of the Community Health Improvement Partnership's six committee reports:

**PHYSICAL PLANT**  
The committee was charged with determining whether the current hospital is obsolete or if it can be renovated.

Four criteria were established for determining obsolescence: physical, function, technical and economic feasibility.

With assistance of the Hereford Regional Medical Center maintenance staff, the committee concluded the hospital plant is not obsolete under the first three criteria. The fourth criterion, economic feasibility, requires further comment from the community.

The committee did, however, conclude work is needed on the hospital, with full renovation estimated to cost about \$4 million.

In its review, the committee determined there is not a community commitment to invest large sums of money into the physical plant.

The panel made two specific recommendations regarding the physical plant:

- Recommendations from all the committees should be considered and implemented before any physical

plant improvement plan is initiated;

- The hospital needs to get its finances in order before presenting any plant improvement plans to the public.

**OUT-MIGRATION**

The number of patients who seek medical services outside Deaf Smith County, when those same services are available in the county, has risen. The HRMC market share in 1995 was 51 percent, falling to 44 percent in 1997.

Medicare/Medicaid clients make up 61 percent of the HRMC patients, which indicates private insurance patients are the ones seeking services elsewhere.

The Out-Migration Committee's recommendations include:

- Creation/implementation of a medical professional and staff development process;
- Establishment of an affiliation agreement with regional providers;
- Linking specialty care to Hereford/Deaf Smith County;
- Cooperation with local public employers to include incentives for use of local services.

**HEART DISEASE**

Heart disease is the No. 1 killer of Deaf Smith County residents, with one in 12 residents of the county being treated for some form of the

disease. Estimates indicate about 400 county residents will be hospitalized for cardiovascular disease in any given year.

The Heart Disease Committee recommends the coordination of blood pressure screenings through the county, coordination/advertisement of screenings, and increased access to CPR training.

**KNOWLEDGE OF SERVICES**

The committee determined that more and better organized information about health care services available in the county are essential, with a focus on the hours of service, eligibility requirements, costs and expansion to social/human services.

The committee recommended the development of a directory of health, social and human services to be printed in both English and Spanish. The directory would be distributed through the schools, senior centers, Welcome Wagon, churches and the chamber of commerce.

**CANCER**

During the assessments period, the majority of informants in the county considered cancer to be the biggest health problem, with some identified screenings as a health resource problem.

The 1996 county cancer death rate was 1.88 per 1,000 inhabitants, which was above the state rate of 1.68.

The most common cancers -- breast cancer among women and prostate cancer among men -- are curable, if detected early.

The committee recommends more better advertisement and coordination of cancer screenings, increased access to the screenings through reduced or no-cost screens for those without insurance, support for enforcement of tobacco laws.

**TEEN PREGNANCY**

The rate for teen pregnancy in Deaf Smith County is higher than the state and national rate, with 10.3 percent of all county births in 1996 being to women under 17 years old. The state average was 6.9 percent.

The committee recommended development of a multifaceted prevention/education program encouraging abstinence, providing

resources for parents, strengthening personal responsibility, and increasing access to family planning services.

A comprehensive community-based planning process similar to the CHIP process would cost about \$25,000. With a combination of sources for funding possible: Hereford Independent School District, Deaf Smith County, City of Hereford, HRMC and private/public grants.



## Throwing football is tradition for East Texas' McCowns

**JACKSONVILLE** -- Talent, perseverance, and faith made three McCown brothers what they are today -- starting quarterbacks. And when they take the field this weekend they will share what may be a unique moment in Texas football history.

Jacksonville's Randy, Josh and Luke McCown began the season competing for a starting role on their respective teams, which include two major universities. Each triumphed within the past two weeks.

"I have never heard of this anywhere," Jacksonville coach Danny Long said. "To have me and Matt Turner, who is the best quarterback coach in the state, come here and coach three brothers with this kind of talent is not coincidence, it's God."

The distinction is something the boys' parents take in stride, even though attending the games presents some logistical problems.

Weekends are scheduling nightmares for Pat and Robin McCown, who faithfully claim a spot in the bleachers whenever and wherever their four children's athletic endeavors might take them.

On the rare occasion they can't travel, they create their own cheering section in front of the television at home.

The weekly ritual usually begins Thursday night with 15-year-old daughter Amy, a cheerleader for Jacksonville's ninth grade football team. Friday night is Luke's night. As the starting quarterback for the varsity Indians, he's carrying on the family's tradition.

On Saturdays, mom and dad split up -- one goes to watch Josh anchor the Mustangs of Southern Methodist University, the other hits the road to watch their oldest son Randy lead Texas A&M.

"We have always supported our kids in what they played. We just feel like it's important to be at their games," Mrs. McCown said.

Her husband agrees, adding that although the couple's schedule is hectic at times, being with their children is well worth the effort.

"Sometimes it does get crazy trying to get to the games when we've gotten in late from Luke's game on Friday," he said. "Sometimes we get a few hours sleep, get up, tell each other 'bye,' and catch a plane to wherever."

Pat McCown passed on his love of the game to his three sons, brothers with a fierce sense of competition flowing in their veins.

"We were always competitive, and I think we got that from our dad," Randy said. "He taught us to go hard in whatever we played."

Playing tough often meant scuffles, cuts and bruises. The biggest wars came on the driveway basketball court. As Josh recalls, he and Luke would team up against Randy.



## Whitefaces stuff Canyon, 21-14

**CANYON** -- One big play early in the game and it looked like the Hereford defense was going to have a long night.

But one big play at the end of the game ended a long night for the Canyon offense.

The Whiteface defense turned away the Eagles on a fourth and one at the Hereford one-yard line to preserve a 21-14 Hereford victory Friday night at Kimbrough Memorial Stadium in nondistrict football.

Even though the Eagles might have gotten a bad spot on Chris Scott's dive, Canyon coach Bill Patterson wasn't making any excuses.

"That's what the official called and it was a good call," Patterson said. "I've got no problem with it. When you get the ball inside the 10-yard line twice and don't score, you don't deserve to win the football game anyway."

The win propels Hereford into District 3-4A play with a 4-1 record. Canyon suffered its first loss of the season and is also 4-1.

Football has a way of evening things out and the spot on that critical fourth and one made up for a penalty called on Hereford that cost the Whitefaces a first down on their penultimate drive of the game.

that pick call," Hereford coach Craig Yenzler said. "They called us on an illegal pick, but the play was behind the line of scrimmage. They said Slade (Hodges) was blocking the guy but that wasn't the case."

The offensive pass interference

call on a Hereford third and 10 play nullified a first-down catch by L.J. Vallejo. On the next play, Hereford wide receiver George Castillo got picked off by Canyon's Will James on a trick play, giving the Eagles their final possession at the Hereford 48.

It was a frustrating end to a game that had started so promisingly for the Eagles.

Canyon didn't waste any time bringing the homecoming crowd to its feet when they got the ball on the game's first possession.

After a one-yard gain by Brady Hukins and an illegal procedure penalty against Canyon, quarterback Cody Kidd found Kyle Clark in the right flat and Clark hustled in for a 76-yard touchdown.

But after that, Canyon found the yards much harder to come by. The Eagles were never able to establish any offensive consistency and finished with only 242 total yards, well below their average of 326.0 yards per game entering the contest.

"Early on, we were moving the ball," Patterson said. "They tightened up on defense. They came up with a good plan to stop us."

Hereford did it by doing nothing fancy.

"We stayed in our base defense for the most part," Hereford defensive coordinator Bill Bridge said. "They couldn't stop our stunts.

We just tried to mix up our stunts with our base defense."

Hereford found ways to move the ball, and while not overpowering, kept the Eagles' defense off balance with its diversified attack.

The Whitefaces tied the score in the second quarter with a 15-play, 72-yard march. Greg Ewing ran the ball the final four yards for Hereford.

Hereford then went to the air to get its second touchdown of the second quarter. The Whitefaces got the ball with 1:27 left and went 57 yards to score with six seconds left in the half when Cody Hodges threw a four-yard touchdown pass to L.J. Vallejo. The big play of the drive was a 35-yard strike from Cody Hodges to J.P. Holman on a deep crossing route from left to right between the Eagles secondary that took Hereford to the Canyon nine.

"We knew that we could hurt them with the shotgun because we went back and looked at last year's video and saw some of their adjustments they made to it and kind of picked up on some things," Hereford offensive coordinator J.R. Compton said. "Luckily, they worked out for us tonight."

Cody Hodges utilized seven different receivers to go 15-for-26 for 129 yards and one touchdown. Slade

## Yankees complete sweep of Rangers

ARLINGTON (AP) -- Darryl Strawberry encouraged his New York Yankees teammates to "get 'em." Thanks to Shane Spencer, they did -- eventually.

Inspired by a videotaped pep talk from their cancer-stricken slugger, the Yankees outlasted a rain delay of more than three hours to beat the Texas Rangers 4-0 early Saturday for a three-game sweep their AL division series.

Spencer hit a three-run homer and Paul O'Neill had a solo shot in the top of the sixth to put New York ahead. David Cone retired the first two batters in the bottom half of the inning before play was stopped at 9:08 p.m. CDT.

The game didn't resume until 12:24 a.m. CDT and ended at 1:26 a.m.

More than two inches of rain fell during the three-hour, 16-minute holdup, which threatened to cause the first suspended game in postseason history. Plans had been made to resume the game, if halted, on Saturday at 12:07 p.m. CDT. Around 5,000 of the 49,950 fans remained and were as loud as the full house had been.

The 3-0 start to the postseason enhances New York's claim to being one of baseball's greatest teams ever. The Yankees won an AL-record 114 games in the regular season and are eight victories from a second World Series championship in three years.

New York plays the winner of the Boston-Cleveland series in the AL championship series, starting Tuesday night at Yankee Stadium. The Indians beat the Red Sox 4-3 Friday to take a 2-1 lead, and Game 4 is Saturday.

The Yankees held the AL's best-hitting team to only one run and 13 hits in the entire series, but were struggling themselves until scoring all four runs off Aaron Sele in the sixth inning.

O'Neill hit a hanging curveball into the New York bullpen in left-center to give the Yankees a 1-0 lead with one out. Three batters later, Spencer added to his phenomenal story by smacking another hanging curve a few rows above the 14-foot-high fence in left.

The shot gave the 26-year-old rookie nine homers and 24 RBIs in his last 33 at-bats. He had a solo homer and scored another run in Game 2 after hitting three grand slams among his 10 homers in 67 regular-season at-bats.

The success of the newcomer replaced the production void left by Strawberry, but his absence loomed large in the clubhouse a day after learning he has colon cancer.

Players sent Strawberry a good-luck video Thursday and he responded with one of his own Friday. The Yankees watched it before batting practice and took the field in a better mood, manager Joe Torre said.

"Go get 'em tonight guys. Get 'em," Strawberry said, pointing at the camera.

Following batting practice, New York players traded in their hats for new ones that had Strawberry's No. 39 embroidered in white on the back.

"Darryl, if you're listening, we love you and hope you feel the vibes

## College rodeo competes for school -- and \$\$\$

**DICKINSON, N.D.** -- Scott Tucker is a college athlete competing for his school -- and money. If he were a football player, that could get him kicked off the team and cause a scandal at Dickinson State.

But Tucker is a bull rider, one of about 3,500 college rodeo athletes nationwide who compete for thousands of dollars in prize money.

"It's pretty nice -- win money and not get in trouble for it," said Tucker, a freshman from Red Lodge, Mont.

Indeed, the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association -- the NCAA of college rodeo -- considers cash prizes an integral part of the sport.

"If they're talented enough to

go make money at the sport, so be it, good for them," NIRA commissioner Tim Corfield said.

About 150 schools are members of the NIRA, based in Walla Walla, Wash. Schools range in size from small community colleges to those as large as Michigan State. In North Dakota, Dickinson State and North Dakota State universities have rodeo teams.

Like other college sports, rodeo athletes have four years of eligibility, are actively recruited out of high school and must maintain academic standards. But beyond that, college rodeo is a different animal.

The NCAA has strict rules against the influence of money or professional athletics on its teams.

"If we applied that same philosophy to rodeo athletes, we wouldn't have any good ones,"

Corfield said.

College rodeo athletes can win hundreds of dollars in a single rodeo. It's not unusual for a pair of team ropers to split \$1,000 in winnings. In addition, student athletes are allowed to compete in the professional ranks. In 1989, Ty Murray won the national collegiate and professional all-around cowboy titles.

Five rodeos are held in the fall, and five in the spring. The regular rodeo season is followed by regional rodeos and then the national rodeo in June.

Men and women teams travel together and compete at the same rodeo. Men compete in bareback horse riding, steer wrestling, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, team roping and bull riding. Women compete in barrel racing, break-away roping, goat tying and team

roping. A man and woman can pair up to form a two-person roping team.

Because rodeo doesn't attract the TV money and fans that football and basketball does, rodeo athletes face problems that other student athletes don't. Scholarships are few. They have to raise money for expenses and supply much of their own horses and equipment -- from boots to huge horse trailers and the trucks to haul them.

"It gets terribly expensive," said Dickinson State women's coach Jarri Newton. "You've got to be serious about it, otherwise you can't be doing it."

For instance, it costs a student \$75 to \$100 a month to board a horse if the student has no relatives nearby with stables.

Travel expenses at Dickinson

State are the responsibility of the athlete after the first two rodeos. After that, only the top eight men and top six women finishers in the previous rodeo have their travel expenses paid for the next rodeo. The team has 40 members.

Rodeo also requires long hours on the road. The Dickinson State team competes in the Great Plains region, which includes North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Iowa, Wisconsin and Nebraska. This fall, the team must travel to Ames, Iowa, which is about 750 miles away, and River Falls, Wis., about 530 miles away.

Cowboys and cowgirls, meanwhile, don't seem to mind the low profile of their sport. Part of the attraction for them is that rodeo is more of an individual sport than a team sport.

"I like being on my own," said

Brady Hanna, a sophomore bareback rider. "I know I'm doing it for myself."

At a recent exhibition rodeo at Dickinson State, Hanna -- decked out in a black hat, chaps, a checkered shirt with long sleeves rolled up and jeans -- prepared for his ride by winding a roll of tape around his left biceps and down below his elbow to protect against hyper-extension.

He successfully completed the ride, hanging onto the violently bucking horse with just one hand gripped to a rope.

"Look at him rear back and let 'er rip," men's coach Tom Nelson cheered from a safe distance along the arena fence. "Good job, Brady Hanna!"

 Nagy, the winner in the clincher of a three-game division series sweep over the Red Sox in 1995, pitched eight strong innings as the Indians won 4-3 Friday to take a 2-1 lead in the best-of-5 playoff.  
 Manny Ramirez hit two home runs and Jim Thome and Kenny Lofton also connected. The Indians got only one other hit, but still spoiled the latest stage in Bret Saberhagen's long comeback.  
 Nomar Garciaparra hit a two-run homer in the ninth off Indians reliever Mike Jackson. But Jackson retired the next two batters for his second save.  
 Bartolo Colon (14-9) can clinch it on Saturday against Pete Schourek (1-3). Red Sox manager Jimmy Williams chose Schourek over his ace, Pedro Martinez, who won Game 1 Tuesday but would pitch on three days' rest.



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

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# Study shows silt has strangle-hold on High Plains playas

**M**y lake just doesn't hold water like it used to... Unfortunately, that statement is becoming an increasingly common landowner lament in the playa lake country of the Texas High Plains. Why? Simply put, the playas really aren't holding water like they once did, particularly in the most intensively-cultivated parts of the region.

Minnesota may be the land of 10,000 lakes, but the Southern High Plains of Texas is home to over 20,000 playas--shallow circular depressions in the landscape that evolved through hydrological dissolution and wind deflation. These shallow basins may have ephemeral wetland characteristics. When the rainfall comes right, these playas, as abundant as one per square mile in some areas, can make this look like wet country.

Playas are naturally-formed drainage basins unique to arid and semi-arid regions of the world, and more numerous in the Southern High Plains of Texas than anywhere else in the world.

The playas of this region provide vital habitat for migratory birds and a wide variety of resident wildlife. More than two million ducks, a half-million geese, and 400,000 sandhill cranes utilize playas.

In the absence of rivers and streams, playas constitute the drainage system of the Plains, and are a primary source of recharge to the Ogallala aquifer. These oval-shaped basins drain internally, flood periodically as they collect runoff from a vast expanse of acreage, and accumulate sediment. There's the rub. Playas are generally small, and located in intensively cultivated areas. Because they have closed watersheds, sediments can't leave the basin, and sedimentation is more severe.

Research through the Department of Range & Wildlife Management at Texas Tech University reveals that an astounding amount of sediment has been deposited in playas since cropland cultivation replaced grazing as the dominant economic activity on the Plains at the beginning of this century. All of the silt deposited in playas from

the farmland surrounding them is literally choking-off the wetland nature and the value of playas to wildlife in many instances.

In his master's thesis at Texas Tech, "Effects of Land Use on Sediment Deposition in Playas," graduate student Hong-Ren Luo discovered startling answers to the question of why many long-time playa lakes don't seem to hold water like they once did.

Luo found that most playas with crop watersheds have lost over 100 percent of their basin volume and have lost more volume than playas with range watersheds.

His studies centered on a medium-textured soils zone dominated by fine sandy loam surface textures, and a fine-textured soils zone dominated by clay loams.

The deepest playa sediments were found in the medium-textured zone.

Luo found the estimated total sediment volume in playas was about a third of the U.S. Department of Interior's 1982 estimate of the total water volume of playas in the U.S.

Assuming that sediments were uniformly deposited in the past 60 years in crop playas and the sedimentation rate stays the same, Luo projected that all cropland playas would be filled with sediments

within 95 years of 1994...We're already down four more years. Let's put this in perspective...Think about filling a swimming pool. When the pool is clean, it will hold a considerable volume of water. Dump several truckloads of soil in and then see how much water the pool will hold.

Playas have long been an important resource in the Southern High Plains, particularly for wildlife. They are only now beginning to be appreciated for their vital role in recharge to the Ogallala aquifer.

Should playas decline and disappear from the Southern High Plains, we can anticipate a drastic reduction in the number of waterfowl, shorebirds and other species found in the Plains, and possibly the disappearance of many species of wild animals.

With drainage areas greatly decreased, flooding might become a major problem after every thunderstorm on the Southern High Plains.

Recharge to the Ogallala aquifer would be virtually nil. Silt is relentlessly choking the playas even now.

Remediation? Vegetation filter strips around playas, avoiding listing downhill into playas, and avoiding direct water flow into playas can all cut down on the silt reaching the basins.

But for the basins that are already reduced to no longer holding water like they once did, major damage has already been done. In the worst case, some of the playas that were duck hunting holes of old have filled-in and disappeared.

It's a tragedy that we could lose a last bastion of plant species and wildlife habitat on the Southern High Plains. Unfathomable, the thought of fall and winter without flights of ducks, geese, and sandhill cranes winging over the playas of the High Plains.

## Wings will begin quest for 3rd title

DETROIT -- The game was just an exhibition, but don't tell that to Darren McCarty, who sported a red welt under his right eye from a fight with Carolina center Keith Primeau.

McCarty is passionate about the game and knows others on the Detroit Red Wings feed off his intensity.

"You don't have to question our team about whether we're going to be hungry or going to want to play," he says.

If things go right for the Red Wings, they could do something few NHL teams have done: win a third straight Stanley Cup championship. It isn't something McCarty and his teammates dwell on, but they've clearly thought about it.

"That's not our main motivation, to say let's three-peat," McCarty says. "We want to win because we want to win. We know what it's like to win. We know what it's like not to win. We want to keep this winning feeling going."

Only five times in NHL history have teams won three or more championships in a row, and no team has done it since the New York Islanders took four straight from 1980-83.

There have been some mighty good teams since then, too. The Edmonton Oilers, with Wayne Gretzky in his prime, won the Cup four times in five years between 1984-88. The Pittsburgh Penguins, with Mario Lemieux, won the Cup in 1991 and 1992, but got sidetracked by Montreal on the

way to the finals in 1993.

Red Wings defenseman Larry Murphy played with those Pittsburgh teams and says he thinks the '93 team was the best of the three.

"You can't take anything for granted," he says. "A lot of things just have to go your way in order to win the Cup. That could happen with this team, that it could be the best team in the last three years and yet not win."

This team is virtually unchanged from the one that swept the Washington Capitals in the finals last spring. About the only unknown appears to be coach Scotty Bowman. He has missed training camp and will probably miss the early part of the season while recovering from heart and knee surgery.

The 65-year-old Bowman has said he's leaning toward returning for a shot at an unprecedented ninth championship. That would break the record he shares with his mentor, Toe Blake. Associate coaches Barry Smith and Dave Lewis are running the team in Bowman's absence.

When the Red Wings finally broke through in 1997, it had been 42 years since their last Cup title.

The joy was shattered six days later when a limousine accident seriously injured defenseman Vladimir Kostaninov and trainer Sergei Mnatsakanov. The Red Wings, despite a 59-game holdout by high-scoring Sergei Fedorov, dedicated themselves in 1998 to winning another championship for their two injured comrades.

## Is Hull Stars' link to Stanley Cup?

IRVING -- The Dallas Stars picked a man who's never been an NHL champion to help lead them to the Stanley Cup.

And while Dallas is coming off a franchise year, Brett Hull is not. The three-time 70-plus goal scorer seemed to stagnate in St. Louis, with career lows of 27 goals and 45 assists last season.

So, for the Stars, there remains no bigger question than No. 22, who signed a three-year, \$17 million contract with Dallas. Is he the player to make champions out of an already powerful team that had the league's best record last season?

Hull, as much a hockey pundit as he is a dangerous scorer, believes the Stars can do it.

"There's no question. I think we have the chance to win every night," he said.

He's also got an answer for those who suggest his best days are behind him.

"Your skills don't erode," Hull said disbelievably. "You may lose a step here or there, but they don't erode. I'm not concerned."

The 34-year-old Hull scored two fewer goals in 66 games than he did in 48 games in the lockout-shortened 1994-95 season. But 72 points did put him in the top 20, right ahead of Philadelphia's Eric Lindros.

Hull says he didn't score as much last season because St. Louis coach Joel Quenneville asked him to take on a more defensive role.

"I actually think it worked for me, since it showed how I can play a more defensive game," Hull said.

That's made it easier for him in Dallas' defense-first system, which he said is almost identical to St. Louis'. The difference for Hull is coach Ken Hitchcock's approach to

playing his new offensive threat.

"The commitment here is a two-way commitment. Everybody is expected to score when there is opportunity and everyone is expected to check," Hitchcock said. "He's certainly going to have to be like everybody else."

Hitchcock managed to make the two-way commitment work for Mike Modano, once known for his offense-only game. He expects the same results from his new left wing.

Hull and Modano, who have played together on U.S. teams in international competition, both speak of instant chemistry.

"We have a lot of similar tendencies in how we play, so I really don't think there is much adjustment to be made there, aside for communication on the defensive side of the puck," Modano said.

For that side of the puck, there's Jere Lehtinen, awarded the Selke

Trophy last season as the league's best defensive forward. He's no offensive slouch, either, scoring 42 points last season with a plus-19 rating.

In his peak scoring years, Hull benefited from choice feeds by setup men Craig Janney and Adam Oates. Though Hull won't say so, he and Modano will now be setting up each other.

"Some of us are going to have to shoot the puck once in a while instead of passing it," Hull said, laughing. "I want to show them I'm with you guys and I want you to score."

But Hull had a problem deciding when to shoot or pass in the playoffs last season against Detroit. After getting just one goal in the six-game series, he admitted he had passed too much and shot too little.

As for the high expectations for the Stars this season, Hull says it's not his concern.

## Stars nip 'Yotes

DALLAS (AP) -- Brett Hull scored two goals and added an assist to lead the Dallas Stars past Phoenix 5-2 on Friday night.

The Stars' new top line of Hull, Mike Modano and Jere Lehtinen was too much for the Coyotes (3-3-1). Modano had a goal and an assist, and Lehtinen had two assists.

Pat Verbeek opened the scoring for Dallas (3-2-1) two minutes into the game on a power play.

The Stars scored three goals in the second period to break the game open.

Hull got his first goal of the exhibition season at 6:40, also on a power play. Brent Severyn scored at 17:16, and Modano scored at 18:46 with assists by Hull and Lehtinen.

Midway through the third period, Hull scored his second goal.

## Three share lead at Vantage

CLEMMONS, N.C. (AP) -- There are 99 sand traps at Tanglewood Park's championship course. If you ask Brian Barnes, he was in every one of them Friday in the first round of the \$1.5 million Vantage Championship.

But the 53-year-old golfer from England overcame a miserable driving day with good bunker play and a hot putter to share the opening-day lead with Bud Allin and Ray Floyd at 6-under-par 64 in the Senior PGA Tour's fourth-richest event.

The trio leads three other golfers by a stroke, including last week's winner, Larry Nelson. Six others are another shot back at 66.

"I was playing yachting golf, it was from one side of the fairway to the other," said Barnes, who missed 7 of 14 fairways on the par-70, 6,600-yard layout.

"At one stage I turned to (playing partner) Dale Douglass and said, 'If I go into one more bunker, I'm going to go change into some bathing trunks and go sea side.' It was ridiculous."

Barnes was at 2-under after the front nine despite going into six bunkers, and he added another sand trap to his collection on the back side en route to his second-best round of the season after shooting 12-over in last week's tournament.

Barnes was a perfect 3-for-3 on sand saves and needed only 25 putts.





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## Shanahan cautious about Philadelphia

 The best against the worst? Try Philadelphia at Denver.  
 The Eagles have allowed 60 more points than they've scored, have a minus-6 turnover differential and are ravaged by injuries. They're off to their first 0-4 start since 1972, when they started 0-5. They appear ready to implode.  
 Denver is 4-0, the first Super Bowl champion since the 1990 49ers to start the season that way. They have won 18 in a row at Mile High Stadium, and they rank third in offense. With 141 points, the Broncos are on pace to score an NFL-record 564 points.  
 "They're the defending world champions, and they're playing like world champions right now," Eagles coach Ray Rhodes said. "They're averaging over 35 points a game."  
 "I turned on the Dallas film briefly for about five minutes. After I saw all those possessions with touchdowns, I thought to myself: I'm not ready to look at this yet. That's something a coach at 0-4 doesn't want to take a look at right now. Let's go to another game."  
 "I haven't seen everybody in the league play thus far, but from the people I've seen, they're definitely the best."  
 And the Eagles look like the worst. There's little continuity on offense, little stinginess on defense. Even if John Elway doesn't play quarterback for the Broncos, this appears to be a huge mismatch.  
 Of course, Broncos coach Mike Shanahan, as NFL coaches will do,

found something to worry about: the Eagles' close loss to Kansas City last week.  
 "In their first three games they struggled, scoring 15 points on offense," Shanahan said. "Then you watch them against Kansas City and see them score three touchdowns and moving the ball better than any team moved the ball against Kansas City all year and playing with a lot more confidence."  
 Several teams brimming with confidence include the NFL's remaining unbeaten. One of them, Jacksonville, has a bye, along with Cincinnati, Pittsburgh, Tennessee, Baltimore and St. Louis.  
 But two of them, the NFC Central's Packers and Vikings, meet Monday night at Green Bay.  
 New Orleans, the most surprising success story thus far at 3-0, is home for New England Sunday. Miami (3-0) is at the New York Jets, and San Francisco (3-0) is at Buffalo.  
 Also Sunday, it's Carolina at Atlanta, Dallas at Washington, Detroit at Chicago, San Diego at Indianapolis, Oakland at Arizona, the New York Giants at Tampa Bay, and Seattle at Kansas City.  
 The winner of the Minnesota-Green Bay game will take a big edge in the division. The Packers have won 29 straight at Lambeau Field.

**AKIRA KUROSAWA**

**TOKYO (AP)** - Akira Kurosawa, Japan's legendary film director, posthumously received a prestigious award from the government Thursday. The People's Honor Award was presented by Prime Minister Keizo Obuchi to Kurosawa's eldest son, Hisao. The award is given to people in Japan who contribute to the arts, entertainment or sports. Only 14 people have received the award since it was established 21 years ago. Kurosawa, who died Sept. 6 at age 88, is the first film director to receive the honor. Among Kurosawa's movies are "Rashomon" and "The Seven Samurai."

**IMUS AWARD**

**NEW YORK (AP)** - The highbrow crowd over at *The New Yorker* isn't going to like this, but the newest and richest prize in American literature is named for Don Imus. Don Imus, the gleefully spiteful radio host. THAT Don Imus. Imus will help choose the winners of the Imus American Book Awards. The Barnes & Noble bookstore chain is providing the financial backing. There will be three awards of \$50,000 each, and one for \$100,000. By contrast, the National Book Awards' top prize is \$10,000. Imus frequently features authors on his morning program, which boasts an estimated 10 million listeners nationwide on more than 90 stations. The idea for the awards came about after Imus complained that a biography he liked didn't win a National Book Award. Barnes & Noble customers will vote to decide some of the winners.

**PRINCESS DIANA FUND**

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** - Princess Diana's memorial fund lost an effort this week to bar the Franklin Mint from selling unauthorized memorabilia with her name and likeness. U.S. District Judge Richard A. Paez denied the request in Los Angeles for a preliminary injunction pending a trial. No trial date has been set. Lawyer's for Diana's estate and memorial fund called the Franklin Mint "vultures feeding on the dead." Among the items marketed so far by the Franklin Mint: Diana plates, dolls, rings and a pendant.

## The Successful Family

PARENTS HIT KIDS TO PREPARE THEM FOR THE REAL WORLD.

Violence is widespread in today's world. We see it on TV and in movies. We read about it in newspapers and magazines. We witness it in our neighborhoods. Because violence is so common, many parents believe they need to prepare their children for the violence-filled "real world" by "toughening them up." So, parents hit children at home to prepare them for the violent world they live in.

The reality is that the "real world" for a developing boy or girl is not outside his/her home, but within. What goes on within the home teaches and prepares children to handle the "outside world." Violence in the home is transmitted to the neighborhood. The "real world" would become less violent if violence in the home stopped.

Much of the rationale for hitting is founded in myth. Some popular myths and facts follow.

MYTH: Children deserve to be hit.

FACT: Nobody ever deserves to be hit. The skills you can learn at the DRESS YOUR FAMILY FOR SUCCESS PROGRAM will help you replace spanking with more beneficial and pleasant ways of managing the behaviors of children and teens.

MYTH: Children who aren't spanked become spoiled.

FACT: Spoiled children are those who constantly want their

own way. They choose not to listen to parents and are unaware of the needs of others. Children learn such behaviors, they are not the result of not spanking. Such behaviors result from inconsistent parenting, failure to provide necessary structure, and neglect of children's needs. Spanking children to prevent them from becoming spoiled is only a myth. Being sensitive to the needs of children in a consistent, loving, nurturing way is the best means available to prevent children from becoming spoiled.


MYTH: An occasional spanking is good for children.

FACT: The word "good" indicates something pleasant is happening to children. An occasional spanking cannot help children learn desirable behaviors. Being hit never feels good. Hitting has no long-term value in teaching desirable behaviors. Being spanked or hit does not feel good and has no benefit.

## What Happens After Cataracts?

If, in time, the eye's natural lens is clouded, the usual choice today is to have the cataract removed. The procedure today is simpler and more successful than ever. Then what? The eye's lens must be replaced by another one, in order to focus light into the retina so that

the patient can see. Several options are available:

- Glasses may be worn. These can enlarge the image the patient sees, but side vision is restricted.
- Contact lenses may be worn to replace the natural lens. In most cases, soft or extended-wear lenses will be prescribed if they are appropriate, and if the patient is able to insert and remove them.
- An intraocular lens can be implanted directly in the eye during surgery to serve as a permanent replacement for the natural lens. In many cases, eyeglasses will still be needed to fine-tune vision. Though surgery is the province of the ophthalmologist, the optometrist often provides ongoing care and vision correction.

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## Painless Passing: One way to deal with problems

I have a theory about problems. I believe if you attempt to do anything constructive, you position yourself to create problems. Many small-business owners who set out to conquer the marketplace, find themselves awash in problems. Their ultimate success will depend on how well they learn to solve problems.

Recently, our country's leader reminded me of an artful and creative way of dealing with problems. It's called the "Painless Pass." I've enjoyed watching this human dynamic in meetings for years. Many group discussions become deliberate attempts to pass problems from one person to another.

Some of the participants in this game become so skilled

that other members of the group leave the meetings with problems they didn't know they had. The problem-passing practitioners have some cunning strategies to employ. Here are a few I've seen that would win White House approval.

### Problem Dodging Devices

- **First, deflect the problem into other areas.** This will prove that the problem is widespread and therefore of little concern in this particular situation. This is the old "everybody is doing it" or "everyone else has the same problem" ploy.
- **Next, use the "let's approach this problem cautiously" device.** If you convince others that to proceed too rapidly might prove disastrous, you can often avoid getting started altogether. No one wants to move prematurely, so others will commend you for your wisdom and insight.
- **You can pass many problems by stating to the group that you aren't sure of the "best" solution.** Usually, this lets you out of having any solution at all.
- **You can maintain the status quo by proposing very minor improvements.** Often others will jump into the game at this point by adding inconsequential changes of their own. For example, a building safety committee found an outside stair way with rotted and weakened steps. They agreed to repaint the "Watch Your Step" signs.
- **One of the most utilized problem-passing plans is to simply appoint a committee.** Had God appointed a committee, the earth might still be without form, and void.
- **Avoid letting others dissect a problem into smaller, solvable segments.** Forcefully, remind all that will listen that you can't solve the problem if you ignore any aspect to concentrate on another aspect.

- Another great device is to act embarrassed when the problem is mentioned. Hint that any discussion is in bad taste, too basic to warrant concern of this mature group or that someone might misinterpret your motives.
- When an action proposal is submitted, immediately suggest a direct opposite and then concede that perhaps the "middle ground" (no change whatsoever) is the wisest course of action. You'll be praised for your insight.
- When backed into a corner, say something no member of the group can understand. For example, "We must consider both the endogenous and exogenous contributor elements in order to circumvent periphrastic and circumlocutive solutions." Most folks will simply nod in agreement rather than admit they don't have a clue.
- Finally, find general objectives to which all can agree, but which have no bearing on the current situation. For example, when discussing the problem of too many long meetings, respond this way: "Do we agree that time is the critical issue here?" As everyone nods in agreement, continue with, "Let's bring in a time-management consultant. Everyone bring three names to tomorrow's meeting."
- The above methods will work every time if your goal is to duck a problem or pass it to someone else. However, if your goal is to actually solve problems, do just the opposite of the ten methods mentioned above. You'll find problem solvers are in much greater demand than problem passers.

They presented a compelling and educational program. I had never given much thought to these issues because I have not had much need to deal with mental illness among my family and friends.

When they told us that churches in Hereford are not addressing the needs of the mentally ill, I felt a little uncomfortable for the local pastor who was sitting across the table from us. But when they said that there is almost no information on mental illness available in Hereford, I thought that they just had not been to the library yet. Then they said that not even the library had adequate information.

Well, that rattled my cage. The reason for our existence is to provide information for the community. We try to have needed materials on almost every subject imaginable. I really thought we had an adequate collection of materials on mental illness.

The ladies reported that they were in the process of obtaining the latest materials to provide for the community, and were trying to

decide how best to make these materials accessible. Rebecca looked at me, and I looked at Rebecca. At the end of the meeting we approached the ladies to offer space in the library for their new books, videos, pamphlets, etc.

Joy Dones called a few days ago to tell us that they are now beginning to receive some of the materials ordered and money is coming in for more. Shirley Garrison has made a generous donation that will allow them to purchase books, brochures and videos about the illnesses themselves and the medications used to treat them.

Deaf Smith County Library is pleased and privileged to assist in meeting what we are told is a critical need in our community. We will let you know when the details are worked out and the books are processed and on the shelves.

The Judds by George Mair tells the story of Diana Ciminella, who, when her marriage fell apart, moved from Hollywood, California, to Morrill, Kentucky with her two daughters. Diana brought along an old guitar someone had given her, and changed her given name to Naomi from the Biblical story of Ruth. She also changed her daughter's name to Wynonna from the name of the town in the song "Route 66."

The three Judd women describe themselves as an eternal, infernal, turbulent triangle. The stormy relationship between Naomi and Wynonna has gotten the most press and has been the most troubling, partly because Ashley chose a career in theater and films rather than in music.

T.D. Jakes has written *The Lady, Her Lover, and Her Lord* in the same style in which he speaks. His long flowery sentences are difficult to read quickly, because the truth he shares is no fluff. This book gives clear advice to help women achieve their goals, maximize their God-given potential, and have happy and loving relationships.

He explores the three most important relationships in women's lives: with themselves, with their man, and with God. Jakes helps women redirect the expectations characteristic of failed relationships and helps us realize that many of the things we desire from our mates can be attained only from God.

*Great Political Wit* by Bob Dole is a refreshing change from the current political picture. Although he never quite made it to the White House, Dole has picked up some great stories along the way. He quotes political figures from Calvin Coolidge (I didn't know he was so witty) to Winston Churchill and Lyndon Johnson. Dole's own

dry wit introduces each section with funny moments from his own experience. It is a light and delightful bipartisan laugh at ourselves.

Diane Mott Davison has written another of her culinary mysteries complete with recipes. *Prime Cut* finds caterer turned sleuth, Goldy Schulz, fighting to save her catering business from the brink of collapse, thanks to an unscrupulous new rival. An even more unscrupulous local contractor has left her precious kitchen in shambles.

Then the infamous building contractor, Gerald Eliot, is found strung up in the house of one of Goldy's best friends. Goldy knows her friend is not the killer. How

many others would have cheerfully strangled the unethical Mr. Eliot, including Goldy?

Recipes include Big Bucks Bread Pudding, Andre's Coq au Vin, and Jailbreak Potatoes.

*No Physical Evidence* by Gus Lee is the story of a lawyer divided between cultures and torn by grief. Joshua Jin, deputy district attorney, is handed a politically charged Chinatown case involving the rape of a 13-year old girl. The victim refuses to talk. The ex-con charged with the crime was arrested on a hunch. And there is no physical evidence.

As an Asian-American prosecutor, Jin is under intense pressure

from Chinatown to win a conviction. First, however, he must earn the trust of his silent client, a distant, troubled teenager who trusts no one. Working against a brilliant prosecutor who wants nothing more than to crush the opposition, especially if it's Joshua Jin, he throws his heart and soul into an impossible case that is far more explosive than he had ever imagined.



### Clean Up On Cleaning Product Tips

(NAPS)—So, you've decided it's time to clean up around the house. The next step is to go to the store to buy the variety of specialty products you'll need to accomplish each task. Right? Well, maybe not.

When searching for cleaning supplies, you may find you already have a variety of low-cost household products on hand that can do the job. For example, baking soda can be used to clean bathtub rings and vinegar is often mixed with warm water to use as a window cleaner.

There are more uses for common household products than you may realize. For instance, a mixture of WD-40 and water can help shine bathroom fixtures.

Cornstarch can also be used as a carpet cleaner. All you do is sprinkle it on, let it stand up to 30 minutes and then vacuum. A mixture of cornstarch and cleaning fluid can also be used to help remove greasy spots from wallpaper.

Ice cubes can come in handy for a variety of cleaning needs as well. If you get candle wax, chewing gum or other goopy substances on your carpet or tablecloth, simply hold an ice cube against the stain until it freezes and then lift or scrape the frozen object off. If this doesn't work, WD-40 can be used to lubricate and clean the spot.



## House, Senate debate farm aid TFU calls for return to drawing board

WASHINGTON (AP) - The battle lines are drawn in the fight over how best to help America's ailing farmers, with Democratic farm state senators vowing to fight "as long as it takes" to increase a Republican-backed aid package.

"We call on the House and Senate to soundly and swiftly reject this legislation and send it back to the committee to be reworked," said Texas Farmers Union president, Wes Sims. America's producers and consumers deserve better, and Congress can do better. This legislation must go back to the drawing board."

Democrats said they will move to send the GOP proposal back to committee until Republicans add more money. "We will stay here as long as it takes," Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle, D-S.D., said. "This matter will be resolved."

Congress has failed to listen to the concerns of America's producers, as a recent study conducted by the

research arm of Farm Journal, Inc., shows that 73 percent of the nation's farmers feel the current farm bill does not provide adequate income during low price periods.

The study also shows that 73 percent of farmers support lifting the caps on the loan rates.

It is uncertain how successful the Democrat's efforts will be. They were unable to muster the votes to get their \$7.3 billion farm aid proposal out of a House-Senate Agriculture conference committee Monday.

This package, offered by Sen. Tom Harkin, D-Iowa, includes funds to cover both disaster and economic losses, as well as a provision to increase marketing loan rates.

The committee adopted a \$4 billion Republican plan, which includes a natural disaster assistance provision, but according to Sims, the level and form of relief in the package addressing the impact of low commodity prices falls far short.

"We are extremely disappointed

that House Republicans turned their backs on independent livestock producers by rejecting mandatory price reporting and country-of-origin labeling," said Sims. "It is unacceptable that these members have chosen to make these critical issues a partisan matter."

Under the Harkin measure, producers would receive an estimated additional 60 cents a bushel on wheat, 32 cents on soybeans and 30 cents on corn.

The Republican package provide for only an additional 13 cents for wheat, 7 cents for corn and nothing on soybeans.

Harkin's plan provides direct payments to producers based on actual crop losses, the Republican package is based on historical production.

Rep. Bob Livingston, R-La., chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, warned GOP leaders against increasing funding for the aid package.

"We ought to draw the line. We ought to say 'no more,'" Livingston said Monday. "The fact is, \$4 billion is not a thimbleful of money."

The House and Senate are expected to vote on a negotiated version of the bill this next week. Sims is urging producers to contact their Congressmen to press for rejection of the legislation.

## Ranchers lose more than money Events force many to bankruptcy

TULIA (AP) - Cattle rancher John Van Pelt rummaged through his pocket, pulled out a crisp \$100 bill and held it next to one of his scrawny animals.

"I might as well be tying one of these to the tail of every animal I have to sell," Van Pelt said as he looked out over the dusty pens holding dozens of cattle. "That's what I've lost this year. That's what most people are losing this year. This one is putting people out of the business."

After the punishing drought of 1996, which pushed many ranchers to the brink of bankruptcy or beyond, 1998 was supposed to be the year for them to rebound. That's made this summer's brutal, unrelenting heat even more tragic.

B.R. Carter of Sundown was among those who barely made it two years ago.

"If you had a good bank and a little fortune you probably made it through 1996," Carter said. "We were able to stick it out even when it looked like we might not be able to for a while."

A wet winter gave Carter hope that his faith would be rewarded with a prosperous summer ranching season. Then temperatures began soaring into the 100s for days at a time.

"Everything just dried up. It looked like a wasteland out here, like a bomb had dropped - like the dead

of winter," Carter said. "All the grass died, everything died. That was when you knew we were in big trouble."

Without grass to feed their cattle, ranchers found themselves trying to sustain their herds with expensive feed. Most wallets were emptied long before cattle reached their optimum weights.

And now, after months of little rain, ranchers are dealing with the final consequence of the drought of 1998: cattle that fetch hundreds of dollars less at auctions across the state.

In August, when cattle prices begin to peak, steer was selling at \$58.70 per hundredweight, compared with \$67.15 during the drought of 1996. In 1994, considered a good year, the price was \$70.26 per hundredweight.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service researchers say this year's cattle losses are projected at \$451 million because of premature sales, lower cattle prices and added feed costs.

"Everyone knows somebody who has had to hang up their hat this year," Carter said. "No one will get out untouched."

In South Texas, Elmo Lopez's water well ran dry in June. Shortly thereafter, his first calf died, yelping and moaning, from heat exhaustion.

In the days that followed, Lopez lost eight head of cattle and three more calves.

His losses, along with the desert-like terrain of his ranch near Laredo, speak volumes about the trials he has endured this year.


"It's hard to watch an animal die like that," Lopez said. "You want to be able to sell them but you never want to watch them die. This heat has been incredible."

Lopez has also had to take cattle to auction early this year because of the hay shortage.

"When you can't feed them, you don't really have a choice," he said. "Some money is better than no money and no money is what I get if they starve."

### Winningham is stunning in psychological thriller



Two-time Emmy winner Mare Winningham (*Amber Waves*, *George Wallace*) gives a shattering performance as an emotionally fragile housewife terrified by a stalker in *Little Girl Fly Away*, an engrossing and fact-based psychological thriller premiering Tuesday on CBS.

Emmy winner Mare Winningham (*George Wallace*) gives a haunting performance as a mild-mannered woman plagued by repressed memories in *Little Girl Fly Away*, a fact-based psychological drama premiering Tuesday, Oct. 6, on CBS.

Adapted from Gene Stone's 1994 book, *Little Girl* focuses on Catherine and Frank Begley (Winningham, Bruce Davison), a sedate middle-aged couple whose calm lives are devastated when she begins to receive threatening letters and phone calls from a man who is out to kill her.

Catherine grows convinced that her stalker is The Poet, a sinister figure who sends crudely written notes in rhyme and who once attacked and scarred her. As the threats accelerate in intensity, Frank insists they go to the police.

While Catherine is visibly terrified, one of the detectives (Clayton Rohner) begins to smell something fishy about the case and comes to suspect that Catherine may know her tormentor. The truth, when uncovered, is even more bizarre: The Poet is directly connected to a hideous childhood trauma Catherine has repressed for most of her life.

The film's starring role would put any actress through an emotional wringer, yet it seems tailor-made for Winningham, whose exceptional career has included playing a number of ordinary women in bizarre circumstances, from an alien abductee (*Intruders*) to a beauty whose brain is transplanted into a plain woman (*Who Is Julia?*).

The actress admits that her first reaction to this intense material was that it

would be "fun" to tackle.

"Actually, I've wanted to do a role like this ever since I saw *Sybil* back in junior high school," she says, referring to the Emmy-winning drama about a woman with multiple personalities.

"Although Catherine isn't a multiple personality, she does sort of split off from herself, and I think that makes for a very interesting challenge: How do you play denial? What the audience is seeing some of the time is not really what is happening. So it was just an exciting dramatic opportunity to try."

Winningham subsequently immersed herself in Stone's account of Kansas housewife Ruth Finley, the real-life prototype for Catherine.

"Analyzing a character this way just confirms my intuition," she says. "There were 300-odd pages about her therapy, and that was vitally important to me. ... Her early doubts about her own denial sort of mirrored my own doubts when I first read the material, and the book addressed that for me."

The TV movie builds to a shattering emotional catharsis with a scene in which therapist Helen Geddes (CCH Pounder) helps Catherine confront her horrific past and make peace with it. Winningham credits director Peter Levin with shrewdly planning these crucial moments for maximum impact.

"We shot that final scene near the last day of filming, so we had established a trust level with everyone," she says. "That scene builds so you can't really break it up into pieces, and Peter clearly had planned it out in his mind. He knew something would happen, and he somehow knew how to have his cameras in the right place to catch it when it did."

Viewers, too, will want to catch this superb actress at the top of her form. She's a keeper.







**Charmed sister trio casts bewitching spell**

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Shannen Doherty is a witch. Or at least she plays one on TV, along with Holly Marie Combs (*Picket Fences*) and Alyssa Milano (*Melrose Place, Who's the Boss?*) in the new series *Charmed*, premiering Wednesday, Oct. 7, on The WB Network.

The three play the Halliwell sisters, for whom -- literally and figuratively -- all hell breaks loose when they come to live with their grandmother and discover they have inherited their family's ancient powers of witchcraft. Viewers learn, along with the sisters, that Prue (Doherty) can move things with her mind, Piper (Combs) can freeze time, and Phoebe (Milano) is able to foresee the future.

Prue, the oldest, is aghast to discover that her average-20-something life as a museum curator is about to be turned upside down. She blames Phoebe, the youngest, who read the spell that activated their powers.

"You turned me into a witch," Prue cries in despair.

"You were born one," Phoebe responds. "We all were, and I think we'd better start learning to deal with that."

For the trio, dealing with it means using their powers for good, not evil. In the show's pilot, evil takes the form of a dark-hooded character who silently moves around San Francisco murdering witches.

Series creator and executive producer Connie Burge says she wants the sisters to be seen not just as role models, but also as normal siblings.

"Unlike an *X-Files* type of show, this is a story about three sisters who happen to be witches. They are bound by this secret and this is going to affect their jobs and their relationships," she explains.

Executive producer Aaron Spelling, who brought Doherty and Milano to the hourlong series, says this is his best team since *Charlie's Angels*.

"I feel closer to these three. I guess, because they're good witches and they have me under their spell or something," he says.




