PUBLIC: Sentiment opposing impeachment

WASHINGTON (AP) - The American public hasn't caught the impeachment fever that's been sweeping the nation's capital, choosing instead to give President Clinton healthy job approval ratings.

Since the president admitted in August that he had a sexual relationship with Monica Lewinsky, some newspapers, TV pundits and members of Congress have called for his resignation or impeachment.

But two-thirds of Americans in polls taken after Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr's report was released don't want impeachment. Almost that many don't want him to resign.

"To my knowledge it's unprecedented," said Todd Gitlin, who teaches culture and communication at New York University. "I can't remember when there's been this deep a gulf between the Washington press corps on one hand and the public on the other.'

He recalled one student who said it was surreal, given the world's problems, to turn on the television and hear everyone talking about oral

Experts see more trouble for Clinton

WASHINGTON (AP) - Kenneth Starr's report leaves Americans with three stubbornly enduring portraits of President Clinton: detailed evidence that he lied to them and the grand jury, used federal employees to facilitate his sexual escapades and then used the unique powers of the presidency to hide it all

Legal experts say the president's biggest problem in mounting a defense may be his difficulty testimony abo when their affair began and the nature of the intimate


"There's lots of corroboration for her allegations," John Barrett, a former prosecutor now at the St. Johns University law school, said Monday.

Prosecutors spent six months assembling evidence of Ms. Lewinsky's intimate relationship with Clinton and alleged cover-up even before they got the former intern's cooperation. And the mountain of evidence that backs up her story stands in stark contrast to the many vagaries of Clinton's testimony.

Combest offers full confidence in House panel

"I don't think they called many folks in my district. Have any of you been polled?" he asked

"If that had happened between you and my daughter, you wouldn't have to worry about hearings because I'd shoot you dead!"

U.S. retail sales show increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - Retail sales rose a mild 0.2 percent in August as consumers snapped up back-to-school clothes and home furnishings but showed other signs of more cautious spending.

August sales increased to a seasonally adjusted \$224.8 billion, the Commerce

Department said today. That followed a 0.6 percent drop in July caused mainly by a General Motors strike that had sharply reduced auto sales. Outside the volatile automobile category, sales of all other retail goods rose by a relatively modest 0.3 percent in August. That was on the heels

of a 0.6 percent jump in July that was more typical of previous months'

shopping sprees this year. The pace of consumer spending has slowed," said Stan Shipley, senior

economist for Merrill Lynch & Co. Plentiful jobs and rising incomes have fueled consumer spending in 1998. Also, unusually good mortgage rates have encouraged Americans to buy houses, spurring sales of furniture and home improvement supplies.

Analysts say consumers may be starting to spend more warily. Unemployment remains near a 28-year low. However, several recent surveys on consumer confidence say Americans are feeling less secure as economic hard times abroad have slowed U.S. production and taken the stock market on a scary roller-coaster ride this summer.

Today, the Dow Jones industrial average of blue-chip stocks was up about 25 points at midmorning.

In August, sales of durable goods were unchanged after plummeting 2.1 percent in July, largely because of the GM strikes. Before July, durable goods sales had grown strongly in every month this year except March. Furniture stores again reported a strong, 1.0 percent sales increase in

August, after similar jumps in the previous three months. Sales at hardware and building supply stores dropped 0.5 percent. Auto dealers saw business drop another 0.2 percent on top of the sharp slide they experienced during the GM strike.

Sales of nondurable goods were up a cooler 0.3 percent in August following a 0.6 percent increase in July. Sales at clothing and accessory shops were up 1.2 percent and department store sales rose 0.3 percent as back-to-school shopping got under way.

And food store sales were up 0.4 percent. But Americans went out to eat and drink less often. Business at bars and restaurants fell 0.2 percent Drug store sales rose 1.1 percent, but continuing low fuel prices dropped

Au-yeung said officials would investigate the complaints and may refer them to a media tribunal.

The maximum penalty for publishing obscene material in Hong Kong is a fine of \$102,500 and one year in jail.



About 95 percent of those polled called domestic violence a serious

Current state laws prohibit judges from granting joint custody if they believe one spouse shows a "history of domestic abuse," but judges can grant full custody to a convicted batterer.



Doctor's discovery may end obesity

HILTON HEAD, S.C. -believes that a natural formula containing the extract of a small Asian fruit can help cause significant weight loss.

Anthony A. By EVAN GRANT The Dallas Morning News ARLINGTON -- Judging by their vagabond careers, they are not a pretty group. By trade, left-handed relievers never are.

At some point, and probably more than once, during the final three weeks of the pennant race, Rangers manager Johnny Oates will entrust a tight game to one member of his left-handed quartet: Tony Fossas, Greg Cadaret, Scott Bailes and Eric Gunderson.

As a group, they have spent parts of 38 seasons in the majors. During that time, they have changed teams 35 times, playing for 18 different organizations.

Together, they have been traded twice, claimed off waivers twice, retired once and been released 19 times. Oh, and on one occasion, loaned to the Mexican League.

'We're kind of like kick returners or punters in football," said Cadaret, who has been released seven times. "We can come in and get you in position to win and then we're forgotten about. Look at Desmond Howard. He won a Super Bowl MVP with the Packers and then he was gone."

Left-handed relief work, like kick returning, is specialized work. Teams often import a couple extra lefties for the season's final months, then bid them adieu afterward. It is so specialized that it often drops among a team's list of priorities. The Rangers had one of the best one-two lefty combinations in the league in 1996, then let both Dennis Cook and Mike Stanton fly off through free agency after the playoffs. The reason: They thought signing a closer, guy by the name of John Wetteland,

might have a bigger impact. For the majority of the season, that is true. But left-handed relief work takes on extra importance in the final month of a pennant race. The majority of the American League's best hitters, especially power hitters, are left-handed. Because they start their delivery from out of a left-handed batter's view, left-handed pitchers usually have more success against those hitters. A left-handed hitter's average can drop 100 points -sometimes more -- when he has to face a lefty.

In the pennant race, having an extra left-handed reliever or two allows a manager more moves. The opposing manager is forced to either leave in a left-handed hitter who inspires little awe against lefties, or try a pinch-hitter who probably inspires little awe, period.

"The key in this league," said Seattle manager Lou Piniella, "is if your lefthanders can get their lefthanders out."

Oates plays by the same rules. He loves to match up his lefty against an opponent's left-handed batter -- provided the numbers give the Rangers an advantage. Often, Oates uses his lefty for just the one

In 1996, when the Rangers won the American League West, the Rangers made the most of their left-handed relief. They had a lefty who could also retire right-handed hitters in Cook; they had a onebatter specialist in Ed Vosberg; and they acquired Stanton from Boston just before the trading deadline to give them extra flexi-

In certain situations, against lineups that spread their lefthanded hitters, Oates could use one lefty to get a key out, then bring in a right-handed pitcher to face a right-handed hitter, then go back to those matchups work in their the lefty-lefty matchup. LANDOVER, Md. (AP) -- In his first NFL start, Trent Green gave a decent Steve Young impersonation. Unfortunately for the Washington Redskins, the real thing is off to the best start of his 14-year career.

Young threw three touchdowns passes to three receivers and ran for another score -- a clever quarterback sneak that left \$57 million tackles Dana Stubblefield and Dan Wilkinson on their knees -- in the San Francisco 49ers' 45-10 victory Monday night.

It was the worst home loss for the Redskins since a 45-0 defeat to Philadelphia in 1948 and the worst loss in coach Norv Turner's five-year

The Redskins (0-2) have given up 69 points in two games.

Picking apart one of the best secondaries in the league, Young completed 21 of 32 passes for 303 yards, giving him six TD passes and 666 yards after two weeks -- his best two-game start ever. The 49ers (2-0), who have scored 74 points in the two games, might have run up more had they not committed nine penalties, including a couple of false starts that killed an early drive.

Sosa says 62nd homer should be in Hall of Fame

SANDIEGO (AP) -- Sammy Sosa took calls from President Clinton and Mark McGwire on Monday and issued a plea -- how about someone giving back historic home run ball

Not for him to keep, though. "If he comes and gives it to me, that ball's not going to go to my house," Sosa said before the Cubs played the San Diego Padres. "That ball's going to the American people and the Hall of Fame.

Getting it back could be a whole other matter, though.

Sosa tied McGwire in stunning fashion on Sunday, hitting Nos. 61 and 62 out of Wrigley Field.

Three people claim to be the rightful owner of historic ball No. 62, Chicago police said, and there may be no real way to prove who has it. After McGwire broke the record last week in St. Louis, major league baseball stopped putting a secret mark on balls pitched to him and Sosa.

Both homers set off wild scrambles, and Sosa was asked what he thought about fans practically beating each other up to get to the ball.





In accusing Clinton of committing perjury before the grand jury, prosecutors note he testified that the intimate relationship started in 1996, while Ms. Lewinsky says it began in 1995 when she was still a White House intern.

To support the story, Ms. Lewinsky provided the names of members of Congress she says Clinton was talking to on the phone during a sexual encounter. The phone calls checked out - in 1995. And Ms. Lewinsky confided details of her relationship to 11 people, sometimes on a near-contemporaneous basis. Among her confidants were two therapists. All of them corroborated her claim, the report says.

Prosecutors say Clinton has a motive for lying about starting sexual contact with Ms. Lewinsky in fall 1995 -Ms. Lewinsky was still a White House intern at that

"The motive for the president to make a false statement about the date on which the sexual relationship started appears to have been that the president was unwilling to admit sexual activity with a young 22-year-old White House intern in the Oval Office area," Starr's report said.

"Indeed, Ms. Lewinsky testified that, at that first encounter, the president tugged at her intern pass. He said that "this" may be a problem; Ms. Lewinsky interpreted that statement to reflect his awareness that would be a problem with her obtaining access to the West Wing."

Prosecutors also have detailed accounts from Ms. Lewinsky that could undercut Clinton's sworn testimony to the grand jury that he was "legally accurate" in denying sexual relations with Ms. Lewinsky because he never touched her sexually.

Ms. Lewinsky testified that on several occasions the president fondled her breasts and genitals. Starr dismissed Clinton's interpretation as "not credible."

Starr's report extends the pattern of Clinton's alleged lying to his public statements. It not only seeks to discredit his "I did not have sexual relations with that woman" statement in January, it also asserts the president tried to lie to Americans about invoking executive privilege to keep some aides from testifying.

"On March 24, while the president was traveling in Africa, he was asked about the assertion of executive privilege. Clinton responded, 'You should ask someone who knows.' He also stated "I haven't discussed that with the lawyers. I don't know.'

'This was untrue," Starr's report stated, saying that on March 17 White House counsel Charles F.C Ruff told a federal judge he had discussed executive privilege with Clinton who "directed the assertion of executive privilege."

Executive privilege is the premise that inner-council advice from a president's aides should not be open to subpoena by Congress or courts because it would inhibit advisers and deny presidents their unvarnished counsel.

The prosecutor uses that same executive privilege claim in his arguments that the president abused the vast powers of his office by invoking the claims to protect personal and not official conduct.

It discloses that even after Clinton gave his grand

jury testimony in August, he authorized further invocation of executive privilege. Currently, Clinton's invoking executive privilege is keeping a lid on grand jury testimony from presidential aides Bruce Lindsey, Cheryl Mills and Lanny Breuer. Mills' testimony could prove especially interesting: She spoke to key witness Betty Currie, Starr's report says. And Breuer declined to discuss conversations with Clinton regarding Mrs. Currie, who is the Oval Office secretary.

Clinton, the report argues, further abused those powers when he gave aides false information about the relationships and they passed it on to the grand jury. And it suggests Clinton was behind an early White House whispering campaign to discredit Ms. Lewinsky.

The report also lays out extensive evidence that Clinton used federal employees to facilitate his relationship with Ms. Lewinsky. Foremost in that effort was Mrs. Currie, whom the report says secreted Ms. Lewinsky into the White House and sometimes asked Secret Service officers not to log in her visits.

Clinton also involved his chief of staff, Erskine Bowles, and a top presidential personnel aide, Marsha Scott, in trying to find the former intern a new job. And the report alleges Clinton once threatened to fire a Secret Service officer for telling Ms. Lewinsky that Clinton was in the White House with another woman,

which angered Ms. Lewinsky and caused a scene at the Northwest Gate of the White House. Finally, the report provides significant evidence that Clinton acted on his own to possibly influence people who could be turned against him in the Paula

Ms. Lewinsky testified it was Clinton who called her at 2 a.m. on Dec. 17 to inform her she was about to get a subpoena from Mrs. Jones' lawyers, reminding her of cover stories that would conceal their relationship. The stories included saying Ms. Lewinsky went to the White House to visit Mrs. Currie. Clinton used the cover stories in his deposition in the Jones case

Mrs. Currie related a similar experience with Clinton, testifying the president summoned her to the White House the day after he gave his testimony in the Jones lawsuit and tried to get her to agree with statements he had made in his deposition. Mrs. Currie said she nodded in agreement even though she knew some were inaccurate, the report asserted.

CIA bankrolled Tibetan independence movement

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The CIA provided the Tibetan exile movement with \$1.7 million a year and paid the Dalai Lama a subsidy of \$180,000 annually during the early 1960s, the Los Angeles Times reported today.

The decade-long covert program to support the Tibetan independence movement was part of the CIA's worldwide effort to undermine Communist governments, particularly in the Soviet Union and China, the newspaper said.

Citing declassified historical documents released last month by the State Department, the Times said that the CIA helped support Tibetan guerrillas in Nepal, a military training site in Colorado, Tibetan causes in New York and Geneva, education for Tibetan operatives at Cornell University and supplies for reconnaissance teams.

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - The Federal Bureau of Prisons defended the medical attention it gave jailed Whitewater figure James McDougal, saying he received "timely, appropriate, professional medical

McDougal died March 8 of cardiac arrest at the Federal Medical Center in Fort Worth. He had suffered from a variety of ailments, including heart disease and blocked arteries.

An earlier bureau report obtained by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram indicated McDougal received no medical treatment despite complaining of dizziness and becoming ill before his death.

But the bureau said Monday that a team of investigators concluded that McDougal, who died at age 57, received appropriate care.

Clinton called the ministers for their help on Labor Day when he was preparing for Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr's report.

White House officials confirmed that the ministers include the Rev. Tony Campolo, a liberal Baptist from Pennsylvania known for advocating Christian acceptance of homosexuality. Another is the Rev. Gordon MacDonald, pastor of a nondenominational Christian church in Lexington, Mass. MacDonald has admitted having an extramarital

The five men and seven women who make up the Boulder County grand jury were expected to convene today, according to published reports.



Clinton's denial said to cost taxpayers about \$4.4 million WASHINGTON (AP) - President

Clinton's denial in January of a sexual relationship with Monica Lewinsky cost more than the personal embarrassment of Kenneth Starr's report. Taxpayers will foot a bill of at least \$4.4 million, The Associated Press has learned.

Starr has provided that figure as the preliminary estimate of what his independent counsel's office spent over the past eight months investigating the Lewinsky affair and alleged

The figure - which doesn't include the costs the administration bore fighting legal battles that delayed Starr, the future costs of witness reimbursements or the other aspects of Starr's investigation - may become a political weapon against the

Some already are discussing the possibility that Congress could demand the president pay restitution to cover some of the costs of the investigation as one form of punishment that might also include a vote of censure.

Russia may be skirting weapons commitment

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. intelligence warned lawmakers that Russia may be skirting its commitment to eliminate its chemical and biological weapons arsenal and doing little to prevent the export of weapons technology.

The CIA and the Defense Intelligence Agency told lawmakers in newly released written responses to questions that the basic building blocks of the former Soviet Union's chemical and biological weapons capability are being maintained by Moscow

In addition, the intelligence agencies said certain elements of the Russian government may be seeking to circumvent arms control agreements that limit development of new chemical and biological weapons.

The CIA cited evidence from Russian "whistleblowers" who have "alleged that Moscow is hiding a program designed to ensure a continuing offensive chemical weapons capability despite arms control commitments," including the Chemical Weapons Convention, which took effect in 1995. Some of these allegations have long been publicly aired, but the CIA cited other unspecified evidence corroborating the charges.

Russia dragging feet in Y2K computer glitch

MOSCOW (AP) - Russia has the world's second largest arsenal of nuclear weapons and perhaps a dozen decaying nuclear reactors. No one appears to know what will happen when the clocks on aging Soviet-era computers that control them click over from 1999 to 2000.

Despite the possible dangers, Russia has been dragging its feet in confronting the so-called millennium

"Compared with other countries, I must say we are behind," said Ale cander Krupnov, chairman of Russia's Central Telecommunications Commission, which has just been assigned to work on the computer problem that many countries began tackling several years ago.

Even Krupnov isn't quite sure how much of a danger Russia faces, or where it's going to get the hundreds of millions of dollars needed to fix critical systems.

Consumed by pressing day-to-day problems and grappling with economic crisis, Russia's government has paid scant attention to potential failures in computers and embedded circuits that could now be fewer than 500 days away.

The millennium bug threatens all computer software and chips that, to save programming space, use just the last two digits to designate a year. When 2000 arrives, many computers won't know if it's 2000 or 1900, which could cause them to go haywire.

Navy divers seeing horror of plane crash HALIFAX, Nova Scotia (AP) - More

than 180 feet under the ocean surface. the jagged edges of a mangled airplane and the broken bodies of its victims greet the navy divers who are combing

the seabed off Peggy's Cove.

Mixed among the electrical cables, landing gear and fuselage of Swissair Flight 111 are reminders of the 229 people who died so violently there on Sept. 2 - suitcases, wallets, a child's 'Lion King' puppet.

"It was like you were standing in the middle of a landfill. There was just stuff everywhere," said Marcel Maynard, a Canadian navy diver who helped retrieve the jet's flight data recorder. "It was just busted up so much it didn't look like an airplane."

The murky waters envelop the wreckage like the fog that hovers over the Nova Scotia coast, giving divers views of 40 or 50 feet at best. At such depths, things appear in black-and-white. Fish don't seem much interested.

The largest sections of the MD-11 are about 50 feet long, Maynard said. From what he's seen, all the plane's windows were smashed.

Also hidden in the gloom - a treasure trove worth millions. The valuables, including diamonds, jewels, millions of dollars in cash and a Picasso painting worth an estimated \$1.5 million were on their way to Geneva when the jet crashed into the Atlantic, Swissair said

Court overturns conviction in talk show slaying case

DETROIT (AP) - An appeals court overturned the murder conviction of a man who killed a gay admirer whose crush was revealed on "The Jenny Jones Show.'

The state Court of Appeals said lawyers for Jonathan Schmitz were wrongly barred from removing a juror before his trial began. They said Schmitz should be retried on second-degree murder and firearm charges.

However, the three judges said in a footnote that if they had been the jury, they might have convicted Schmitz of first-degree murder. The panel's ruling was made Friday and released Monday.

10 accused of spying, infiltrating exile groups

MIAMI (AP) - The Cold War is over, but the spy games go on.

Ten people - including a couple of husband-wife teams - were charged Monday with spying for Cuba's communist government, allegedly by targeting U.S. military bases in southern Florida.

The targets included the U.S. Southern Command, which oversees military operations in Latin America and the Caribbean, authorities said. The 10 also are accused of trying to infiltrate anti-Castro groups and manipulate U.S. media and political

organizations. 'In scope and in depth, this case, it is really unparalleled in recent years," U.S. Attorney Thomas E. Scott said Monday. "This spy ring was cast by the Cuban government to strike at the very heart of our national security system and our very democratic process."

WASHINGTON (AP) - In election-season jockeying over how to address a severe downturn in the farm economy, Senate Republicans killed a \$7 billion aid package backed y the Clinton administration.

Republicans said the measure, which would boost government price supports, was too costly and could eventually backfire by pushing commodity prices still lower. They said they're working on a much cheaper plan that would give farmers direct payments, possibly about \$2

"I don't think there will be a soul in this place that doesn't want to help agriculture," said Sen. Craig Thomas, R-Wyo. "What we're really talking about is how can we best help agriculture."

The centerpiece of the Democratic lan, which was rejected Monday along party lines 53-41, was a one-year boost in rates on government commodity loans that would trigger an estimated \$5 billion in farm



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
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
