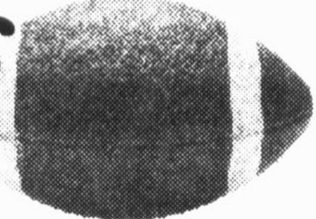

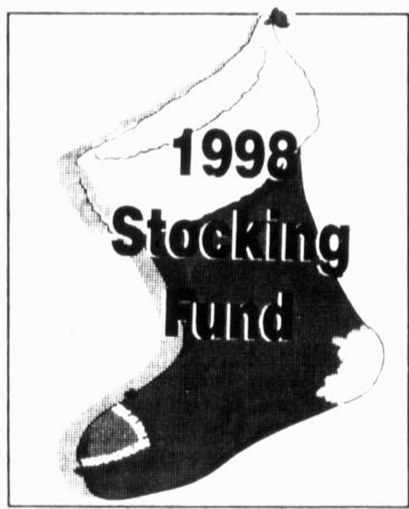

Hereford-Plainview bidistrict playoff tickets go on sale

Tickets for the Hereford-Plainview bi-district football game went on sale this morning at Troy's Sweet Shop, 1003 E. Park Ave. The tickets are \$7 for adults and \$4 for students, high school age and under. The game is tentatively set for 2 p.m. Saturday at Whiteface Stadium. The ticket office will open at 12:30 p.m. Saturday. Troy's Sweet Shop is the only location for pre-game sales of the adult tickets, which also may be purchased at the gate. Student tickets also will be available at Hereford High and Hereford Junior High schools. All tickets will be general admission; no reserved seats will be available. About 6,000 tickets will be available for the game.

CSF signups accepted at Community Center

Hereford's home-grown holiday charity, the Christmas Stocking Fund, will be accepting applications for assistance from the 1998 program through Thursday. The signups are being conducted for just three days this year, but daily hours will be extended. Applications will be accepted 9 a.m.-4 p.m. each day in the west end of the Community Center. The Tri County chapter of the American Red Cross, although not affiliated with CSF, is providing volunteers to handle CSF applications. Those registering for assistance must provide some form of personal identification and proof of Deaf Smith County residence. If applicants are seeking help with water, gas or electric bills, copies of those bills and appropriate account numbers are required. CSF will enter its 18th season of operation in Hereford and Deaf Smith County this year. This year's fund-raising campaign will mark a dozen seasons of grassroots operation within the community following restructuring of CSF in 1986. The Christmas Stocking Fund is run by a committee of anonymous volunteers representing a broad cross-section of the community. CSF is a holiday charity based strictly on the generosity of the residents of Hereford and Deaf Smith County. It is not affiliated with any governmental entity, nor with any other organization. The charity assists the less fortunate of Hereford and Deaf Smith County during the Christmas season. CSF volunteers screen applications and make the tough calls on assistance to be extended, keeping in mind that they must operate within a budget that is dictated by the sum of donations. Priority is given to the needs of children and the elderly. The local charity assists with food, clothing, utility and medical expenses, and other special needs. CSF is funded strictly by the caring and sharing of the local community. The Hereford Brand serves as the official collection point for CSF funds, and periodically publishes listings of CSF donors. The Brand will begin accepting donations immediately after Thanksgiving. Donations may be made in person at The Brand at 313 Lee Avenue, or they may be mailed to CSF in care of The Brand at Box 673, Hereford. Donors wishing to remain anonymous should notify The Brand at the time that they give their gift. The Brand will maintain a running tally of CSF contributions. CSF made the holiday a little brighter for 140 families in 1997. Contributions to CSF hit a new record high last year of \$21,772, eclipsing the old record of \$21,451 that was set in 1993. CSF's third-highest fund-raising total came in 1989, when donations hit \$20,718. Among the less fortunate families that got help from CSF in 1997 were eight households coping with cancer. Help also went out to homes burdened with Alzheimer's disease, blindness, domestic violence, heart disease, paralysis, and parents in prison. Food baskets, including a ten-pound turkey and a variety of staples, were delivered to 45 families that included 72 adults and 94 children, including 11 elderly and six disabled recipients.

Productivity rises at healthy 2.3% rate in third quarter

WASHINGTON (AP) — Growth in American workers' productivity, the key to rising living standards, improved in the July-September period after nearly stalling during the previous quarter. The productivity of nonfarm, nonsupervisory workers rose at a seasonally adjusted 2.3 percent annual rate in the third quarter, the Labor Department said today. During the April-June period, productivity advanced at a scant 0.3 percent rate, the slowest increase in nearly two

San Jose residents ask for flood-prevention aid

Residents of the San Jose community received assurances Monday the county will do whatever it can to help reduce the threat of flooding in the area. However, County Judge Tom Simons told the San Jose delegation the county will not be able to do anything until the water still standing from the heavy rain which swept through the region on Halloween weekend recedes and the ground dries.

Janie Jimenez, the spokeswoman for the San Jose residents, explained the community wants the county to do something to alleviate the threat of flooding.

When the area was hammered by waves of thunderstorms on the night of Oct. 30-31, the San Jose community was hit by severe flooding as the playa overflowed and water rushed across the flood plain toward the Tierra Blanca Creek.

After the flooding, some residents said the county has not cared about the situation in San Jose.

However, at Monday's meeting, Commissioner Lupe Chavez said the county cannot do anything to stop the flooding, noting the natural flow of rainwater is through the community.

Chavez said the state of Texas conducted a study of the area and the engineer concluded it is not feasible to deal with the flooding problem.

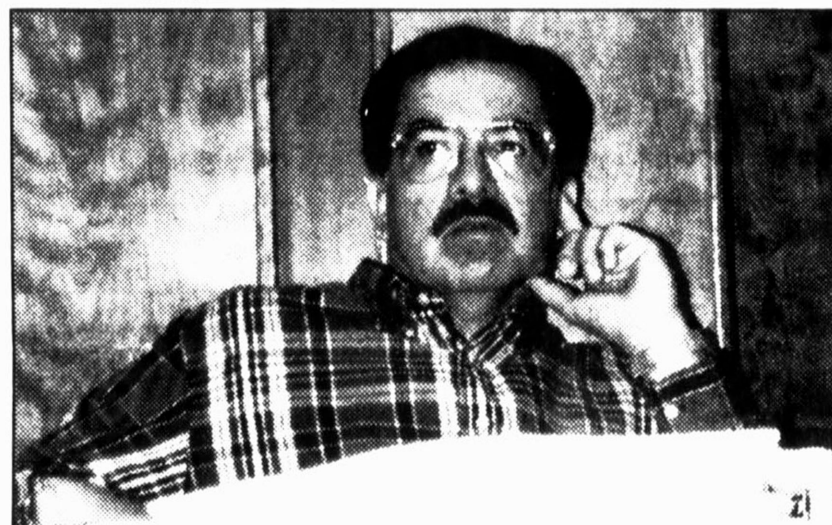
"I don't know what else to tell you," Chavez said.

Mona Hernandez, a resident of the area, showed a map which outlined the areas where flooding occurs.

She said the county should consider building a levee around

the playa to prevent the flooding and install a culvert which would channel the water to the creek.

She said an old culvert once had been a conduit for the water, but it has filled with silt and has not been cleaned. She said there is a culvert that helps and a pump, but more is needed.

Simons said the pump, which can handle 2,000 gallons per minute, wasn't adequate for the amount of water that fell during the storm. He said Wayne Winget of Winget Pump said about 50,000 gallons per minute flowed through the area.

Simons expressed annoyance at hearing anyone claim the

county "doesn't care about the San Jose community."

He said county workers spent hours in the water working to get the pump up and running properly, but there was just too much water.

He also said the culverts that appear to be channeling water into the lake aren't there for that purpose. The water is going into the lake anyway, Simons said, the culverts were installed to keep the water from washing out U.S. Hwy. 385.

Alma Liscano, whose aged parents live in the San Jose community and who were forced to evacuate their home, made an

emotional appeal to the commissioners to take action.

She said the flooding was the fourth time her parents' house has been inundated. She also said the county should never have allowed the land in a flood plain to be sold.

"The problem has been there for 30 years and nothing has been done," she said. "I'm not asking you for a miracle ... I'm asking for your help," Liscano said.

Commissioner Johnny Latham said the state engineer concluded that it would take a

O'Connor requests recount of votes in commissioner race

Votes in the Deaf Smith County Precinct 4 election will be recounted at 9 a.m. Thursday in the commissioners courtroom at the courthouse, 235 E. 3rd.

Jerry O'Connor, the Republican challenger in the Precinct 4 commissioner's race, lost by six votes in the Nov. 3 general election to Johnny Latham.

The commission canvassed the election results Tuesday morning, but the request for a recount did not affect the canvass, which is a formal certification of the election. The commissioners, however, made note of the recount request when the canvassing began.

In the Nov. 3 vote, Latham, the Democratic incumbent, received 377 votes, while O'Connor received 371.

In the early voting, Latham outpolled O'Connor 111-110. On election day, the voting by polling place was:

Precinct 4: Latham, 213; O'Connor, 132

Precinct 5: Latham, 7; O'Connor, 48

Precinct 6: Latham, 37; O'Connor, 59

Precinct 9: Latham, 9; O'Connor, 22.

The recount will be conducted by County Judge Tom Simons and County Clerk David Ruland.

Hispanic voters a growing force in U.S. politics

Hispanics, reaching for political power as their numbers grow, sent a clarion call to both political parties on Nov. 3: do not take us for granted.

In key states across the country, Hispanics helped elect both Democrats and Republicans, whoever responded to their concerns, and their leaders hope politicians will see them as a key swing vote as they approach the 2000 presidential election.

"If they expect to get elected, they better start learning," said Cecilia Munoz of the National Council of La Raza, the nation's largest Hispanic advocacy group. "The bottom line is, as voters, we expect to be respected. We expect to be treated like Americans, which is what we are."

Half of Hispanic voters in Texas, traditionally Democratic, gave their support to GOP Gov. George W. Bush, who made it clear that he had no interest in the sort of anti-immigrant policies backed by California Republicans.

Helping matters, Bush also speaks fluent Spanish. So does his brother, Jeb Bush, who is married to a Mexican-American and was elected governor of Florida, thanks in part to a strong Hispanic vote.

Meanwhile, in California, Hispanics are still furious at GOP support for anti-immigrant and English-only measures, and they delivered 78 percent of their votes to Democrat Gray Davis for governor and 70 percent to Democrat Barbara Boxer for Senate, based on exit polls conducted for The Associated Press by Voter News Service.

"If the GOP wants to stay in control and move forward, then they need to sort of follow the steps taken by Bush — by both Bushes — to include the Latino vote," said Lydia Camarillo of the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project, which worked to mobilize Hispanic voters in four states.

Hereford Police are investigating a burglary of a residence which occurred Oct. 1, 1998 in the 100 block of Kingwood.

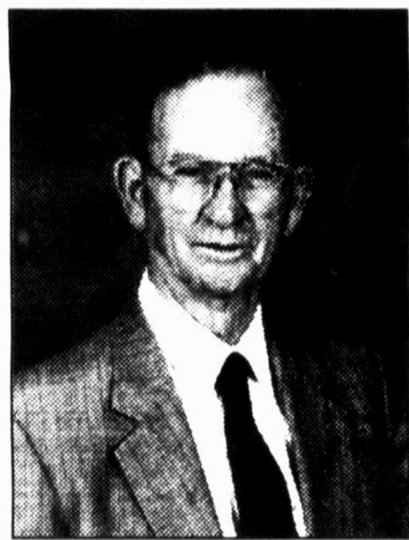

27-foot-deep cut from the playa to the creek to eliminate the flood problem. Also, there is not a culvert big enough to handle that much water.

"We will do whatever we can to deal with it," Simons said. "I'm not an engineer, but it seems to me if we could put in some kind of pipe" on a permanent basis it wouldn't stop the flooding, "but maybe it would give us a head start."

"But we can't do anything until the water's gone," Simons said. Chavez said a maintenance crew did some dredging to build up around the side of the playa.

"I'm sorry to be hearing this, but we have done all we can do," he said.

Latham said the only thing he knows to do is to install a permanent pump and line, which would help. However, event this wouldn't be adequate for a storm such as the one which caused such flooding in San Jose, he added.

When one resident said it appeared the county didn't respond quickly and adequately to the flooding, Simons responded, "Nobody shirked their responsibility on this ... (and) we will do what we can do, but we don't have limitless amount of money" and personnel.

"Nobody's sitting up here trying to hurt anybody. Don't say nobody has done anything," Simons said.

When asked when the pump could be installed permanently, Simons said it could be done as soon as the ground is dry, whenever that occurs.

"As soon as it is dry enough, we'll get on it - but we can't predict what the weather will do," Simons said.

Chavez suggested residents whose homes were flooded should contact the federal Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), which he said will provide assistance and loans, provided the applicants are willing to relocate out of the flood-prone area.

"We're not here to blame anyone, we're just looking for a solution," Jimenez told the commissioners.

Simons said he will contact the state about sending an engineer to take another look at the area and see what other possible solutions might be available.

In other business, the commissioners:

• Accepted a bid of \$27,580.66 from Stevens 5 Star Auto & Truck for a new 1999 Chevrolet Tahoe. The vehicle is for the sheriff's department.

• Approved payment of \$6,378.20 for election expenses. These expenses included \$2,596 to election workers; \$2,353.55 for the printing of ballots; \$1,120.07 for machine coding; \$311.81 for election kits; and \$26.77 for election notices published in the newspaper.

• Approved advertising for bids on installation of monitoring equipment for underground fuel tanks. The bids will be broken down by site so the commissioners will be to determine individual costs. Also, the commissioners directed the foremen in Precincts 3 and 4 to obtain estimates on the cost of fuel trailers and construction of an above-ground tank.

• Appointed Mike Carr to the Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corp.

• Paid monthly bills.

UT addresses minority enrollment

AUSTIN (AP) — University of Texas President Larry Faulkner has challenged students to help him find ways of increasing minority enrollment without a return to race-based admissions.

Faulkner met Monday night with more than 400 students in the first of four campus conferences to discuss the demise of affirmative action at UT.

Asked repeatedly about his personal feelings toward affirmative action, Faulkner said, "It doesn't matter how I feel a bit."

What matters, he said, is

the success he had in pursuing affirmative action policies, as University of Illinois provost. He left that post in April to become UT president.

Student activist J. Reed, spokesman at an Oct. 22 occupation of the school's Main Building, continued his criticism of Faulkner.

"Even in the face of persistent questioners ... (he) still managed to avoid answering the question about his personal commitment to affirmative action," Reed said.

Faulkner agreed to the forums after students occupied the Main Building, or Tower,

to protest UT's response to Hopwood case, which effectively ended the practice of considering race in admissions procedures at all Texas colleges and universities.

Reed said the university went too far in dismantling all affirmative-action programs after a court struck down minority-preference admission policies in the law school.

UT is appealing the 1996 federal court ruling.

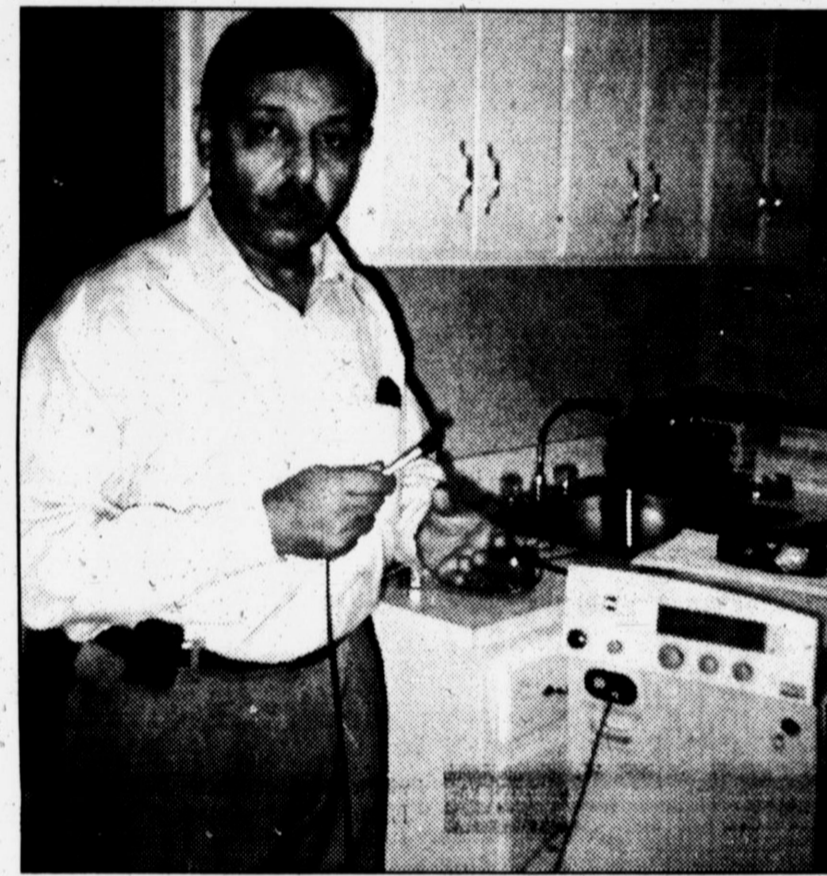
Laser technology is program topic

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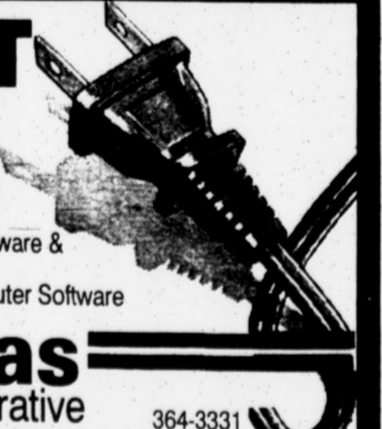
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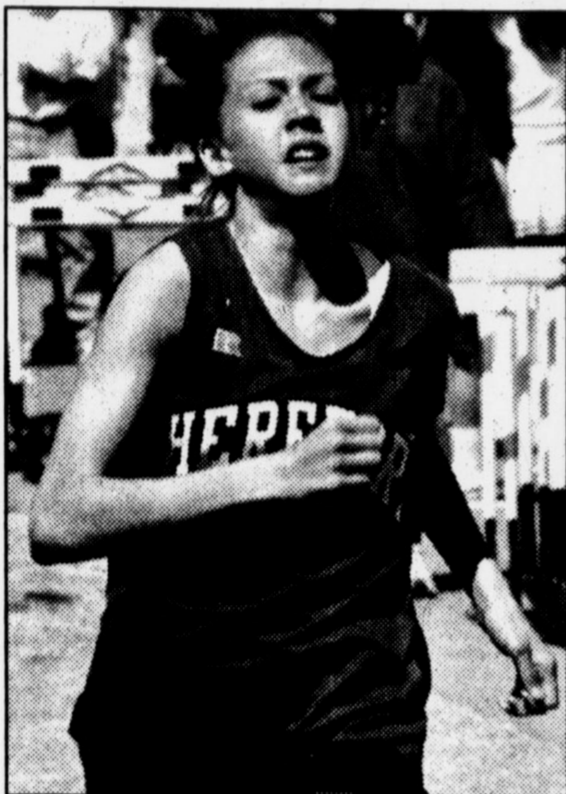

Yosten heads back to Round Rock

Hereford soph earns 2nd chance to win Class 4A cross country title

LUBBOCK — Hereford sophomore Brionne Yosten earned her second straight trip to the Class 4A cross country meet, winning the girls Region I-4A meet Saturday at Mae Simmons Park. Yosten ran the two-mile course in 11:32.94, besting Jennifer Marable of Canyon who finished second with a time of 11:50.96.

"Brionne was just Brionne," Hereford coach Ray Baca said. "She just pretty much dominated the field. She keeps getting

stronger."

Yosten will run in the state meet in Round Rock Saturday. She finished fourth as a freshman in 1997.

But Yosten won't be without friends this time around. The Lady Whitefaces put four runners in the Top 20 to earn a third-place team finish and a trip to Round Rock.

Hereford freshman Amy Crox finished in third place in 11:59:41, running her best race of the year, according to Baca.

"Amy Crox right now is running just as well as — actually she probably ran a little better,

and she placed better — than Brionne did last year as a freshman," he said. "Amy Crox is every bit as talented, but Brionne's got so much more big-race experience."

Weatherford won the team title with 71 points. Canyon was second with 73 points; Hereford also had 73 points.

"When you break it down individually," Baca said, "we had three that ran extremely well — they ran better than I thought that they would. That was the key in us running as well as we did."

The boys team won't be making the trip to Round Rock with the girls, however. The Whitefaces finished in fifth place with 173 points.

Wood wins NL rookie of the year

NEW YORK (AP) — Kerry Wood is already one award ahead of Roger Clemens and Nolan Ryan.

Wood, who struck out 20 in just his fifth career start, won the NL Rookie of the Year Award on Monday, narrowly beating out Colorado first baseman Todd Helton.

Ryan and Clemens, fellow Texans whose blazing fastballs made them Wood's childhood heroes, failed to win the rookie honor.

"I hadn't really thought about that," said Wood, who just hopes to come close to the careers of Ryan and Clemens. "If I last as long as those two guys have lasted in baseball and done the things they've done ..."

Wood, a 21-year-old right-hander, received 16 first-place votes and 16 seconds to finish with 128 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Helton got 15 firsts, 14 seconds and two thirds for 119 points.

"It adds confidence that people who watch the game and people who follow baseball acknowledged as good a season as I've had," Wood said.

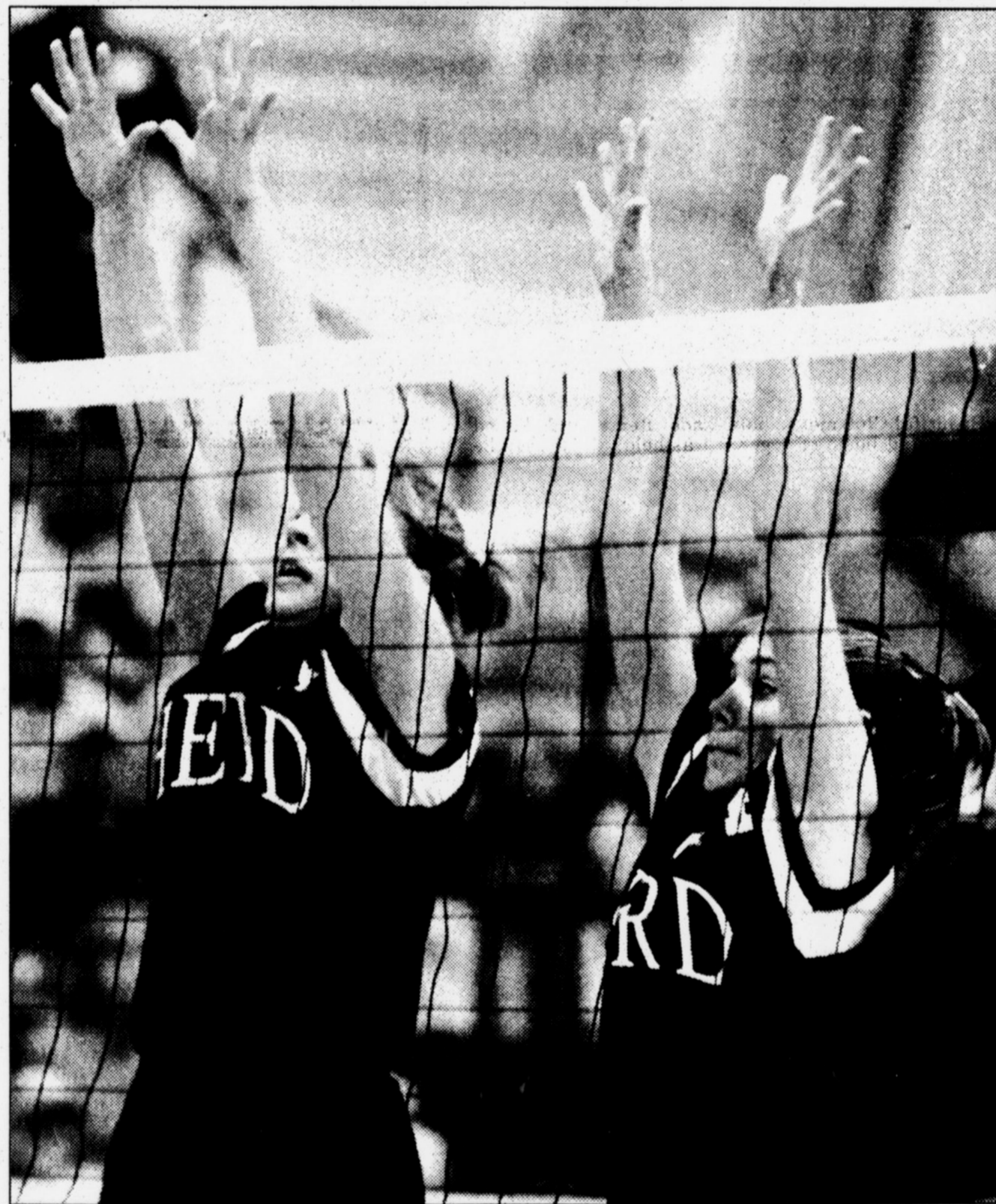
Wood was 13-6 with a 3.40 ERA in 26 starts, striking out 233 in 166 2-3 innings as the Chicago Cubs made the playoffs for the first time since 1989. He was even more impressive at Wrigley Field, going 9-1 with a 2.97 ERA in 13 starts during the regular season.

Most people hadn't even heard of Wood before he struck out 20 while pitching a one-hitter against Houston on May 6. Clemens, who did it against Detroit and Seattle, is the only other pitcher to strike out 20 in a nine-inning game.

"It helped me finally realize that I was capable of pitching at that level," Wood said. "The previous four starts before that were rocky."

Wood was the favorite to win the award heading into the final month of the season. But because of a sprained elbow ligament, his start against Cincinnati on Aug. 31 was his last of the regular season.

Kitten said improvement is a must for the Lady Whitefaces.

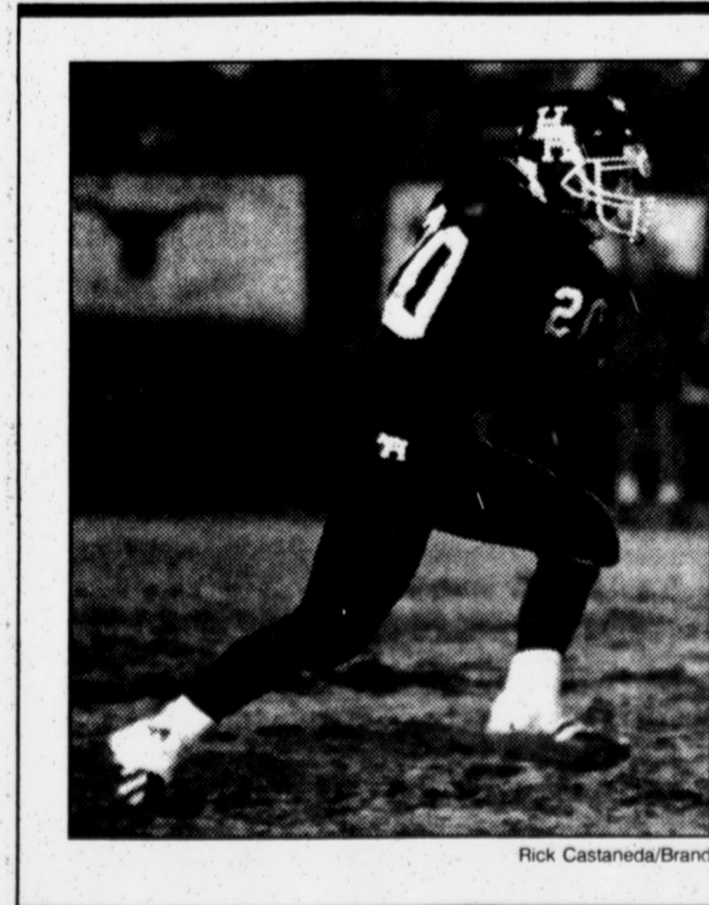
"We know that we can't make silly mental errors and expect to survive it," Kitten said. "There were some errors that we made today, we make them on Tuesday night, we won't see another round."

PAINTING Xs AND Os

Former coach turns to canvas and oil to keep him focused in his retirement

BEDFORD — John Reddell is painting a picture. Years ago, this would have been a coaching blackboard splashed with Xs and Os in his office at Trinity High School. Now he works from home.

His tools are a blank canvas, oil paints and his memories of a 39-year coaching career; of his days playing for one of college football's greatest coaches and winning two national championships in as many sports; of growing up on an Oklahoma farm without a father; and of a loving wife and 18 grandchildren.

There are 10 Reddell paintings in

the ex-Trinity coach's Bedford home. The paintings, like the game balls and mementos that scatter his home, keep Reddell focused. They help him remember.

A farm scene and its gentle, rolling landscape decorates his office at home. His painting of the Model-T Ford with Oklahoma plates next to a barn is in his living room. Above the mantle is the little boy with the fishing pole.

The boy wearing a straw hat is walking toward a pond, a retriever at his side and a wooden rod resting on his shoulder. Storm clouds are in the distance. This was the first picture Reddell painted, more than 30 years ago. The boy is 9, perhaps 10 years old. Maybe the boy is Reddell.

"I like the rain," Reddell said, looking at the framed canvas. "I like the smell in the air before it rains and just after it rains. Painting calms me."

This is Reddell's life now. After 39 years and a highly successful coaching career in Texas high schools, Reddell spends his days taking it easy. He

figures he deserves it. He mixes children and grandchildren with golf and oil painting.

But Reddell still is a Friday-night fixture at Pennington Field. He may have retired in 1991, but he hasn't strayed far. A member of the Hurst-Euleless-Bedford Sports Hall of Fame, he has an honorary seat for every game.

He enjoys a career record of 260-135-12. At Trinity, he either won or shared nine district championships. Reddell experienced only three losing seasons.

Before going 116-53-4 at Trinity, he fashioned a 25-11 record at Midland and a 48-14-2 mark at Arlington. In college, he played for legendary Bud Wilkinson at the University of Oklahoma and won national championships in baseball and football in the same year, 1951.

Through it all, Reddell said, he tried to do it the right way: with class.

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
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
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

and also showed a surprising amount of offense.

"I thought we hit the ball well at times," Pampa coach Carmen Pennick said. "We'd been aiming at this match throughout the playoffs. I think Hereford knew they had a big target on their foreheads."

That would be nothing new for the two-time defending state champions, but Saturday they had a hard time getting out of the way.

"It is so difficult to help your kids understand that once the playoffs start, everybody's even again," Kitten said. "Having beaten Pampa pretty easily on two other occasions meant absolutely nothing coming into this match."

The Lady Harvesters' Tandi Morton and Destiny Engle kept the pressure upon Hereford offensively, getting four and two kills, respectively. Engle — a sophomore — was called up from the junior varsity for the playoffs.

"We made a few lineup changes for this match to give us a little more height," Pennick said. "We wanted people who could control the net the most to get us where we thought we could be."

And Pampa's defense didn't make it any easier for the Lady Whitefaces to finally pull away.

"That's one of the things we were impressed with early in the season," Kitten said. "I think they're still doing that and have improved upon it, but what they've added is just the offensive aspect. They've got two or three kids that can hit the ball and pick out where they want to hit the ball."

Hereford did get the final three points of the second game to win the match, but even that didn't come easy.

"This team has come back all year long," Pennick said. "They believe that they can come back, and that's what they did today."

But Hereford is just too good a team. You can do that with some teams, but Hereford is just too well coached and has too much talent."

Hereford got a match-high 12 kills from junior Tori Walker, and seven more from Kristin Fangman, who also added four stuffs in what Kitten called her best match of the year.

"That's as good as Kristin Fangman has played," Kitten said. "She was being very smart about where she placed the ball. She hit the ball hard sometimes, she took something off of it at points. I was happy with the way she played."

But there were things the Hereford coach saw she didn't want to see. The Lady Whitefaces were guilty of 24 unforced errors in the match — 17 alone in the second game.

"I think we let balls drop that we just didn't make an effort for," she said. "There a few things we consider to be lazy errors. We just didn't play the entire match crisply and cleanly."

Now the Lady Whitefaces will face the Denton Lady Broncos — a team that's been gunning for a rematch with Hereford since the Lady Whitefaces throttled them in less than 30 minutes in a regional semifinal match last year.

Denton defeated Hereford at the Justin Northwest tournament early this season, but Kitten said that match should have little if any bearing upon the match today.

In fact, Kitten said having played the Lady Broncos might be better than playing an opponent the Lady Whitefaces haven't played.

"Especially because they played so well early in the season," she said. "I think Denton having whipped our tails pretty much is a good thing. I think it's going to be very motivating. I don't think there's going to be one thing about the match we're going to take for granted."

"Many young men remember their coaches. I do. They were great influences on me. Whether you're good or bad, you'll be remembered," Reddell said.

Seven years after leaving Trinity, Reddell still runs into former players.

"Everything he did was class, class, class," said former Trinity player Mike Baab, who went on to become an All-American at the University of Texas and played in the NFL for 11 years. "He never talked out of the sides of his mouth, not to us. The way he was is the way he was."

All along, Reddell has been painting. He has painted football programs, players and pictures. Now he is painting memories. Who will want his pictures? "I'm not going to force

them on my kids," he said. "I'll wait till kick off and they can either burn 'em or keep 'em."

Until then, they will remain on the wall, frozen in time, just like the little boy with the fishing pole. Maybe Reddell IS that boy. Maybe that is Oklahoma.

Sometimes, when he closes his eyes, he can smell the rain.

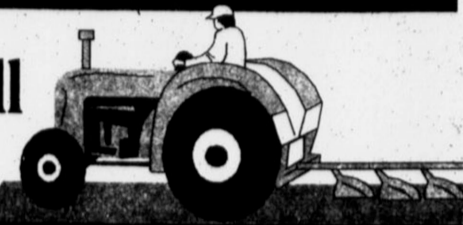

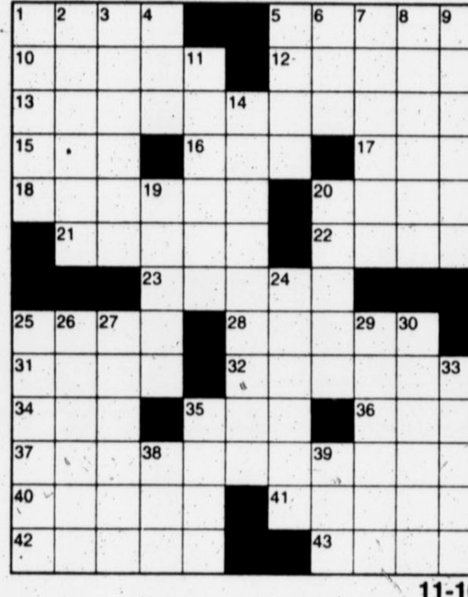

Republicans not backing off on inquiry

WASHINGTON — House Judiciary Committee Republicans, sending a message that they're not shaken by election losses, are intensifying attacks on Democrats who believe lying about sex is not an impeachable offense.

Republicans are even considering expanding impeachment hearings next week by calling President Clinton's closest White House adviser, Bruce Lindsey. This possibility arose after the Supreme Court on Monday refused to shield Lindsey from questioning by prosecutors on what conversations he had with Clinton regarding Monica Lewinsky.

"We're talking about it, yes," committee Chairman Henry Hyde, R-Ill., said, less than a week after announcing that Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr would be the only major witness when hearings begin Nov. 19.

Despite the loss of five House seats in last week's election and polls showing the public wants to put an end to the Lewinsky matter, Hyde said Monday his committee was duty-bound to proceed.

"I don't interpret the election as a veto of our efforts," Hyde said.

Added Rep. Asa Hutchinson, R-Ark., "I did not see any change in mood" among committee Republicans.

Republicans and Democrats tested their divergent messages Monday at a grueling, 10-hour Judiciary subcommittee hearing on the history of impeachment. Both sides had their supporters among the 19 professors of history, political science and law, who debated whether presidential lying over a sexual affair constituted an impeachable offense.

Gingrich calling for unity, 'big ideas'

WASHINGTON — With the new House Republican leadership lineup still unclear, retiring House Speaker Newt Gingrich is calling for GOP unity in the next Congress so the party can continue to push its "big ideas."

With heir apparent Rep. Bob Livingston looking on, Gingrich addressed a hotel ballroom packed with Republican loyalists Monday night in a speech that was part nostalgia, part defense of his four years as speaker and part roadmap for what looms as a challenging 1999 for the GOP.

"We never had a big majority, but we always stood for big ideas. And that is what made us different," Gingrich, R-Ga., told about 250 listeners at a dinner held by GOPAC, the Republican fund-raising and candidate recruitment group he once headed.

"And let me say that if every Republican will pull together with Bob Livingston, these big ideas will continue to move us forward," he added.

Gingrich's 45-minute speech, marked by several standing ovations, was his first since he stunned the political world last Friday by abdicating the speakership, following an election that nearly cost his party its House majority.

When the new Congress convenes in January, the GOP will have a 223-211 House majority, plus an independent who usually votes with Democrats. That means that just six Republican defectors will be enough to defeat any GOP initiative.

U.S. finding little backing for Iraq strike

WASHINGTON — Whatever Arab and European governments may be saying privately, they are offering little public support for a military attack on Iraq. And that narrows President Clinton's options and possibly what a solitary U.S. strike could accomplish.

"We don't feel lonely," State Department spokesman James P. Rubin said Monday, broadly hinting that the West Europeans and the Arab kingdoms privately have pledged to assist U.S. forces in the event of an attack.

In any event, Rubin said, "Changes we have made to our forces in the region over the last several months ensure that an adequate level of forces exists in the (Persian) Gulf, should their use be necessary."

President Clinton is pondering the consequences of using force, what to target and whether a combination of more diplomatic overtures and an ongoing trade embargo might persuade Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to reverse course and resume cooperation with U.N. arms inspectors.

Clinton met with his senior advisers Sunday at his Camp David hideaway in Maryland, but deferred a decision on Iraq for a few days. Sandy Berger, his national security adviser, convened a follow-up meeting late Monday at the White House.

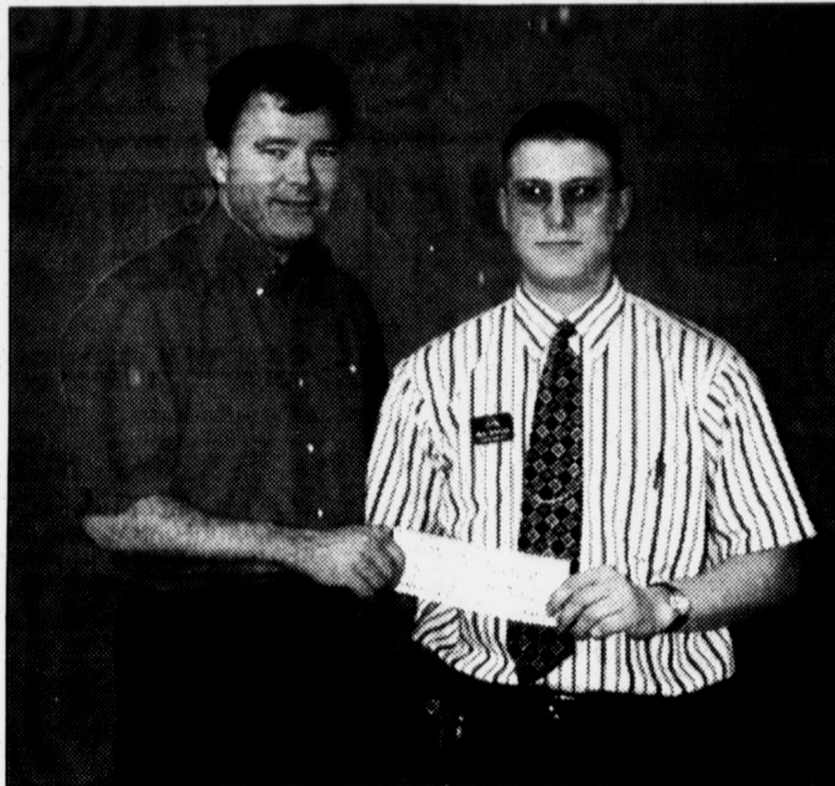
Mitch-stricken nations appeal for assistance

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Helicopters roared into the hills with aid for the starving and Central American leaders faced the task of rebuilding after Hurricane Mitch set their countries back 50 years.

The presidents of four nations appealed to lenders and creditors for help in the aftermath of a storm that laid their economies to waste and took an estimated 10,000 lives.

"In 72 hours, we lost what we had built, little by little, in 50 years," Honduran President Carlos Flores Facusse said Monday after a summit in Comalapa, 25 miles south of the capital. He called his country's \$4.2 billion debt "unpayable."

Jimmy Carter and French Prime Minister Lionel Jospin have supported pardoning the foreign debt of countries ravaged by Mitch. German Foreign Minister Joschka Fischer said some debts should be forgiven for Honduras and Nicaragua, which owes \$6 billion.

Voter registration is growing among Hispanics as more become citizens and more become enraged at anti-immigrant policies. Hispanics also are becoming an increasing portion of the electorate in several key states. They made up 36 percent of the electorate this year in New Mexico, 13 percent in California and 16 percent in Texas, for instance.

But the Hispanic community is not monolithic.

Florida is populated with Cuban-Americans, staunch anti-communists who have traditionally backed Republicans. Yet the Southwest is home to Mexicans and New York attracts Puerto Ricans, who generally favor Democrats.

Hispanics already make up about 10 percent of the U.S. population and by 2005 are projected to overtake blacks as the nation's largest minority group. Nationally, Hispanics made up just 5 percent of all voters Tuesday, but that, too, will grow, as more immigrants become citizens and are motivated to go to the polls.

Already, they are a key constituency in certain important states. Looking ahead to the presidential contest, they could play a critical role in places like California, Texas, New York and Florida, which carry the largest blocs of electoral votes.

This year, California Democrat Barbara Boxer lost the white vote, but was propelled back to the Senate by black and Hispanic voters, who overwhelmingly supported her.

By contrast, GOP New York Sen. Alfonse D'Amato captured just over half of the white vote in his re-election bid, but overwhelmingly lost among blacks and Hispanics and was defeated.

Seeing the potential, both parties have reached out. House Speaker Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., has hired a Spanish-speaking spokeswoman to communicate with Spanish-language media. Over the last two years, California Republicans have registered
