Witnesses testify about events leading up to slaying

Witnesses in the murder trial of 38-year-old Scott Lawson testified Wednesday about a night of drinking and socializing for two men and two women ended with the stabbing death of one man.

Carmen Allejandre, 41, the host of evening's get-together, testified in 222nd District Court that 42-year-old Isidra Zuniga and her daughter Alaina Constancio, 13, came over on the night of Feb. 21 to go dancing. However,

they remained at the residence at 511 S. Progressive.

After a few beers and a few margaritas, Zuniga testified she allowed Alaina to call her cousin, Victoria Alvarez, 12, to come over. Zuniga then called Lawson and invited him to the house. At some point, Zuniga left Allejandre's house and went to get Victoria, according to testimony.

Lawson, accompanied by his son, Josh, and carrying an 18-pack of beer, arrived at the residence. Later in the evening, Lee Rogers came to the house to say hello to Allejandre. He, too, was invited in for drinks and food.

Allejandre testified Rogers did not like the way Lawson was treating his son. She also said the adults had become intoxicated.

She said she went to bed after asking Rogers to lock up when he left, but she was awakened some time later by the screams and shouts of the girls.

Zuniga and the two girls also testified about minor arguments between Lawson and Rogers, as well as about

Economy Rebuilding from storm fuels gains in building

WASHINGTON (AP) — Construction of new homes and apartments rebounded strongly in October as builders in the South worked overtime to make up for time lost to Hurricane Georges.

Builders started work on new housing units at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.695 million last month, up 7.3 percent from September, the Commerce Department said today.

The increase, the largest in 14 months, returned starts nearly to the 1.704 million rate of July, an 11-year high.

In the South, starts surged 14.5 percent to an annual rate of 820,000 units, the most in nearly 13 years. Starts in the region had sagged 7.7 percent the month before when the hurricane set back builders in Mississippi, Louisiana and elsewhere.

Starts jumped 16.5 percent in the Northeast, to a rate of 162,000 units, the most in 11 months, and 6.9 percent in the Midwest to a rate of 352,000, the highest in eight months. However, in the West, they dropped 11.1 percent — the sharpest decline in almost two years — to a rate of 361,000.

Low mortgage rates, strong income growth and a plentiful supply of jobs have contributed to the strongest year for housing construction since the mid-1980s.

Analysts expect another good year in 1999, although with overseas economic turmoil causing job losses in U.S. manufacturing, activity won't be as brisk as this year.

Controversial account of Crockett's death auctioned for \$350,000

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two unidentified Texans paid \$350,000 for a diary that challenges one of the most popular legends in their state's history: that Davy Crockett proudly fought Mexican troops to the end of the 13-day siege at the Alamo.

The 200-page manuscript, purchased Wednesday at an auction in Hollywood, is supposedly a Mexican army officer's eyewitness account of Crockett's death on March 6, 1836.

The controversial diary says the King of the Wild Frontier was captured and executed with other volunteers in the force of 200 who were defending the former Spanish mission in their fight to create the state of Texas out of Mexican territory.

Many experts doubt the account, said to have been dictated in Spanish in the 1840s by Lt. Col. Jose Enrique de la Pena. It defies the traditional story of the Alamo's capture in which the volunteers were forced to die on the walls or in hand-

to-hand combat with Gen. Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna's troops.

The traditional story holds that Crockett, the former congressman from Tennessee, fought to the end, wielding his long rifle, "Betsy," like a club before he fell near the front doors of the Alamo's chapel.

Little was known about the buyers other than that they purchased the diary through a New York dealer with the intent of keeping it in Texas, said Gregory Shaw, vice president of Butterfield & Butterfield auction house.

Among critics of the diary is Joseph Musso, a Los Angeles-based historic illustrator who is researching a biography on Alamo commander James Bowie.

Musso questioned the validity of the documents because they seemed to surface out of nowhere in 1955 in the

House Judiciary Committee impeachment inquiry

Starr accuses Clinton of misusing authority

WASHINGTON (AP) — In the first public accounting of his investigation, Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr is opening the third presidential impeachment inquiry in the nation's history by charging that President Clinton "misused his authority and power" to impede civil and criminal cases against him.

"On at least six different occasions — from Dec. 17, 1997, through Aug. 17, 1998 — the president had to make a decision," Starr said in a statement prepared for delivery today. "He could choose truth or he could choose deception. On all six occasions, the president chose deception."

Starr was the leadoff witness today for the historic event, with nine television networks planning to carry the House Judiciary Committee hearing live. It promised

to provide a highly partisan start to proceedings aimed at deciding whether Clinton deserved to be removed from office by subsequent votes in the full House and Senate.

Seeking to end this threat to Clinton's presidency and prevent a permanent blot on his legacy, the White House sent Clinton's private lawyer, David Kendall, to interrogate Starr and make a case on the president's behalf. Kendall has accused Starr in court of prosecutorial misconduct.

Clinton was far from the scene in Japan, where he began a five-day Asian trip. Asked gen rally about the pressures of his job, Clinton told a Tokyo town-hall meeting today, "Of course, sometimes you want to get away from it."

Asked how he had apologized to his wife and daughter

for his "inappropriate" relationship with Monica Lewinsky, Clinton replied: "I did it in a direct and straightforward manner." Did they forgive him? "I believe they did, yes."

Republican members of the Judiciary Committee, undeterred by election losses and negative polls, pressed ahead with plans to broaden the impeachment inquiry beyond whether Clinton illegally tried to cover up his affair with Ms. Lewinsky.

They were seeking subpoenas today for four new witnesses, including Clinton lawyer Robert Bennett and presidential confidant Bruce Lindsey, and have requested a key document from the Justice Department laying out allegations in the Democrats' campaign fund-raising prob-

HISD committee reviewing goals, district operation

Hereford Independent School District Leadership Team members recently reviewed the committee's goals.

In March, the committee, which is made up of employees from throughout the district, established goals including comments on many areas of HISD operation, including TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) testing, special education, state compensatory education migrant programs, Title I, the intake center, technology planning attendance T.E.K.S., reading initiative, and the gifted and talented programs.

The recent session focused on areas in which team members received special knowledge and information about various areas to be covered as it completes its work throughout the school year.

District leads reviewed the areas of concern, beginning with mission statements and continuing through the operational goals and activities of each department. Spekaers include Deputy Superintendent Nena Veazey, Assistant Superintendent Corky Lockmiller, Director of Career & Technology Ernie Eckert, Director of Student Services Debbie Gallman, Director of Special Language Programs Rene Severo, and Director of Special Education Terri Souter.

Eckert outlined the goals of career and technology education, including proposed new courses. Among the courses being considered are meat processing, collision repair and horticulture.

Eckert said the meat processing class could be important because area processors are looking for people to fill positions at the production facilities. Similar needs have been identified in the automobile collision repair and horticulture programs.

A majority of Hereford High School students are enrolled in one or more classes already offered by the department, with more expected to take advantage of new offerings.

Veazey discussed the gifted and talented program, optional extended year, pre-kindergarten, TEKS and the reading initiative, and TAAS scores.

She used a slide presentation to give a detailed look at last year's TAAS scores, showing how various classes have improved over the years. HISD had its most dramatic gains last year, with some classes reaching 100 percent mastery in one or more areas. All others were at or above the averages for students across the state.

Veazey also reviewed the committee aims, which are designed to examine overall site-based management. She said site-based management integrates the individual campuses into an overall school district.

This, she said, allows for several things, including:

- A process for decentralizing the district;

Jesse James, still black sheep, remaining much in demand

BLEVINS, Texas (AP) — Some folks still want Jesse James, alive or dead.

The smart money's on dead. Then again, exactly when the notorious gunslinger died and where he rests in peace are questions that haven't been entirely resolved.

Texas now has two sets of families in two towns claiming that James staged his own death as a hoax, took an alias and lived to a ripe old age in their midst.

The families are adamant, despite DNA evidence to the contrary.

Historians say James died rather unromantically in April 1882 at the age of 34, shot in the back by a member of his own outlaw gang while straightening a picture on the wall of his home.

Canada tries to block Texas execution

TORONTO (AP) — The Canadian government is filing a rarely used legal motion with the U.S. Supreme Court in an attempt to block the December execution of a Canadian man in Texas.

The government plans to file the clemency brief within the next few days to block the execution of Joseph Stanley Faulder, 61, of Jasper, Alberta. Sophie Legendre, a foreign affairs department spokeswoman, said Wednesday.

As Canadian authorities draft the legal papers, a group of prominent Canadians plans to travel to Texas to call attention to the case.

Among them is Rubin (Hurricane) Carter, now of Toronto, a former boxer who came close to dying in the electric chair in New Jersey while serving 20 years in prison for three murders he did not commit.

"I faced that," said Carter, now executive director of the Toronto-based Association in Defence of the Wrongly Convicted.

The attorneys want a big paycheck for their work on the tobacco settlement.

- Facilitating student learning;
- Outlines expected outcome in excellence and equity in student performance;
- Says trustees will set policy and approve district/campus plans;
- District must have an improvement plan developed and evaluate it annually;
- Measurable district objectives;
- Strategies for improvement;
- Campus-level committee involvement in various areas of district operations, with regular meetings;
- Campus-based staff development;

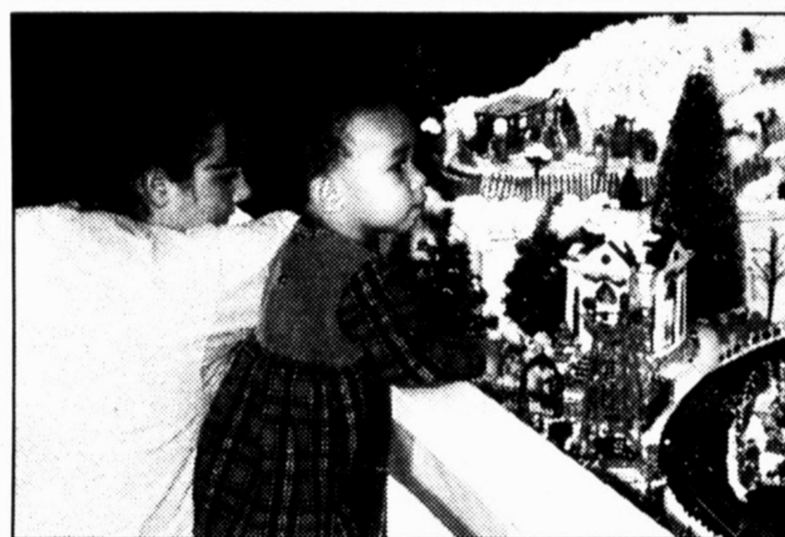
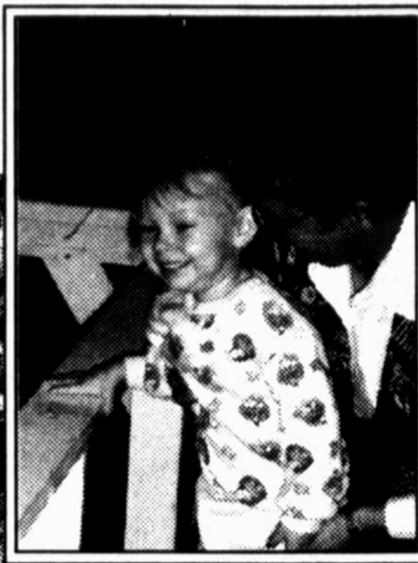
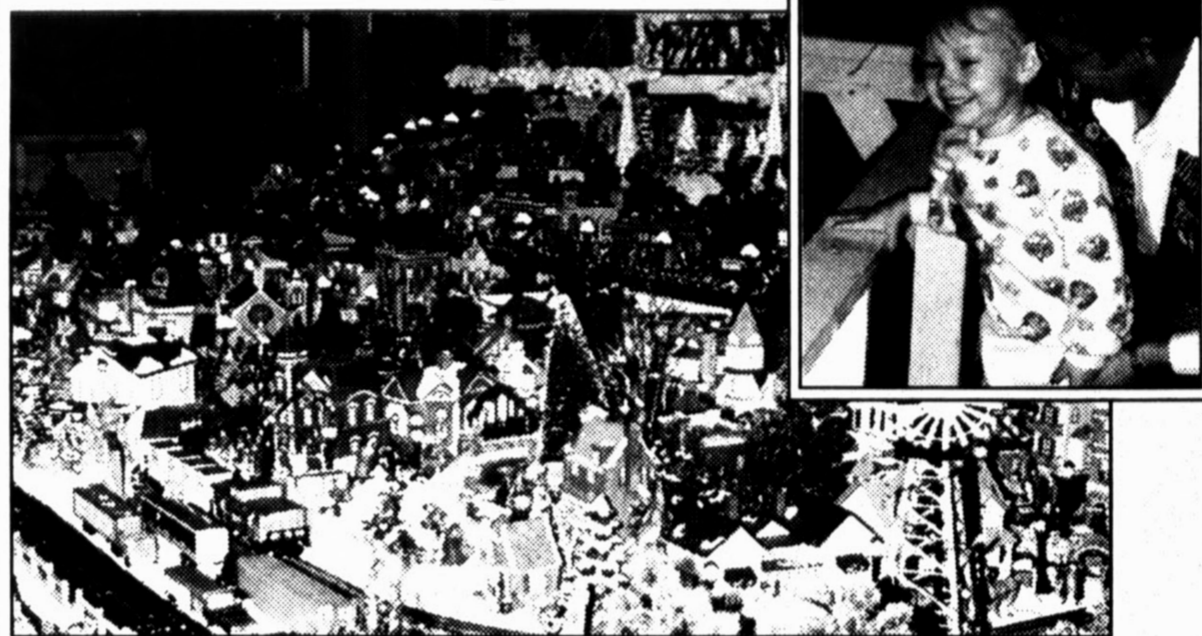

the amount of alcohol being consumed.

"Scott threw the first punch, but missed. He threw another one and hit Lee across the face. Lee hit him back," Constancio testified. The girl then broke down in tears and had to be escorted from the courtroom. Her testimony was to continue today.

Alvarez testified she saw Lawson push Rogers, saw them fighting and saw Lawson pull a knife and watch Rogers fall.

She then demonstrated to Criminal District Attorney Roland Saul how Lawson wielded the knife.

Saul had previously entered two knives -- a hunting knife with a 6-inch blade and a lock-back pocket knife -- as evidence.

Alvarez also testified that when Lawson saw Rogers fall and stay down, he did attempt mouth-to-mouth and tried to stop the bleeding.

Earlier testimony by Dr. Rodney F. Tucay, a forensic pathologist with the Lubbock County Medical Examiner's Office described the condition of the Rogers' body and the kind and type of wounds sustained by the victim.

GOP taps party's only black for House leadership position

WASHINGTON (AP) — J.C. Watts, the only black Republican in Congress, brings to his new position as chairman of the Republican Conference the party's hopes of showing the nation it can diversify and reach out to minorities.

Watts, 41, was elected Wednesday to the position that ensures GOP members are informed of the party's agenda and helps them explain that agenda to the voters. "My responsibility is to put feet and words and message" to Republican policies, Watts said.

The former University of Oklahoma football star represents bedrock Republican ideals: he's a Southern Baptist minister who has emphasized family values, attacked big government and told minorities they should work to earn power through education and free enterprise rather than rely on government.

A member of the Republicans' conservative class of 1994, Watts has had a fast ride to the party's top echelon. He urged blacks to support Bob Dole in a well-received speech before the 1996 Republican presidential convention and was picked last

year to offer the official Republican response to President Clinton's State of the Union address.

Watts is the sole black among the 39 in Congress who does not belong to the Congressional Black Caucus. Still, he also has differed with those of his party seeking to end all affirmative action programs, supporting instead a more gradual approach toward changing them.

Julius Caesar Watts was born in Eufaula, Okla., son of a Baptist minister. He was quarterback at Oklahoma and led the Sooners to Orange Bowl victories in 1980 and 1981. From 1981 to 1986 he started for Ottawa and Toronto in the Canadian Football League.

He became a Republican in 1989 and was elected as a State Corporation Commissioner before running for Congress in 1994.

The four-man, eight-woman jury was empaneled Tuesday. Saul, assisted by Jim English, is prosecuting the case. C.R. Daffern of Amarillo is the defense attorney.

hands of a Mexican coin dealer.

"It doesn't have 110 years of human records behind it," Musso said, asserting that not enough forensic tests have been conducted.

Critics have dismissed de la Pena's memoir as a fake ever since an English translation by San Antonio archivist Carmen Perry was published in 1975.

Bill Groneman, a New York arson investigator, called the journal a forgery in his book, "Defense of a Legend: Crockett and the de la Pena Diary." He has acknowledged, however, that he cannot prove it.

But James Crisp, a history professor at North Carolina State University, has studied the documents and are convinced they are genuine.

"I have no doubt that they are authentic," Crisp said Wednesday. "They have passed every test."

Shaw said the memoir was written on paper of high rag content, typical of the early 19th century.

Musso acknowledged there are many who would refuse to believe that Crockett did not go down fighting. He said he is not one of them.

"If the document is real I don't think it should change people's perceptions of Davy Crockett. Whether he died swinging his rifle... or whether he was brought before Santa Anna" should not matter, Musso said.

The diary had been at the John Peace Library at the University of Texas at San Antonio for nearly 25 years, but was sold by John Peace III, son of the man for whom the library was named.

Don Carleton, director of the Center for American History at the University of Texas, said Texans associate the Alamo with a great sense of patriotic pride, so many would be offended at the thought of Crockett surrendering.

"Many Texans like to hold onto their historical myths," he said.

Hawaii, which is several time zones away from many cities on the mainland. My mother lives with me. She's a night owl, stays up past midnight and rarely gets out of bed before 11 a.m.

Mother is 88 years old and receives a lot of phone calls from solicitors. One morning, the phone rang at 7 a.m. It was a salesman calling from Denver. '72 Dolphins want to keep history

MIAMI — With the show-down still a month away, the 1972 Miami Dolphins are already working on a game plan. They'll assemble along the sideline, the past come to life, looking over Jimmy Johnson's shoulder and rooting to preserve their unique place in NFL history. The schedule says Denver at Miami on Dec. 21. That could also mean the unbeaten '72 Dolphins against the unbeaten '98 Broncos. "I'll be down there on the

field trying to trip somebody as they go down the sideline," said Mercury Morris, a running back on the Dolphins' team that went 17-0. "I'll be out there with one of those laser lights, shining it in John Elway's eyes. This is Miami: You want to play? Let's play." The tantalizing scenario depends on Denver winning its next four games: Oakland, at San Diego, Kansas City and at the New York Giants. Victories would make the Broncos 14-0 when they play in Miami on the Monday night before Christmas. The 1972 Dolphins achieved the only perfect season in NFL

history. Now the Broncos have a chance to match the accomplishment. "I hope somebody beats them and we continue to be the only team," Hall of Fame coach Don Shula said. "It's just nice being the only team that has ever done something. I've enjoyed that. "Every year about this time you get worried, and this year with Denver you've got a very strong team. They're going to be tough to beat." The coach who replaced Shula will worry about the Broncos later. With an impor-

Hampton coach claims accuser mistaken

HAMPTON, Va. — The Hampton University women's basketball coach said Wednesday she was humiliated and scared when Lubbock police arrested and handcuffed her over what she said was a false accusation that she tried to run a con game. Patricia Bibbs, her husband, Ezell, and assistant coach Vanetta Kelso were arrested Monday after a woman claimed they had tried to con her out of cash at a Wal-Mart. No charges have been filed.

Hampton's game Tuesday night with No. 12 Texas Tech was canceled because the coaches and team weren't physically or emotionally prepared, university officials said.

During a news conference Wednesday, Bibbs, her husband and her assistant, who are black, said in response to questions that they believe race played a role in their arrests.

"I was handcuffed, and I was never read my rights," Bibbs said when asked to elaborate. She also said that none of the 15 or 20 police officers she saw was black.

Bibbs said the ordeal lasted about six hours.

Being held in a dirty jail cell with graffiti-covered walls was "worse than what you do with a ... wild animal," she said, crying.

"It's demoralizing. It's embarrassing to be falsely accused. I've seen it. I've read about it. No one knows until you experience it," she said.

Hampton president William Harvey said the university has contacted two attorneys. "No one in this country ought to be faced with this kind of degradation or harassment," he said.

Rose K. Wilson, the president of the Lubbock chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said her organization plans to investigate the arrest.

"I believe race was a factor," Wilson said. "They were never charged but you take them downtown, hold them for four hours and then let them go. I don't believe a couple of white coaches would have been held for four hours. If they were not charged what were they doing downtown for so long?"

Lubbock police said they were investigating to see if this was a case of mistaken identity.

"But we clearly had a victim transported to the scene that said that without a doubt those were the people involved," Police Chief Ken Walker said.

Walker said the three were accused of trying a con game called the "pigeon drop." In the ruse, a con artist says he or she has found a purse with a lot of money and tries to persuade the victim to put up money to retain a lawyer so that they can both lay claim to the purse.

The Bibbises and Kelso said they went to the Wal-Mart to buy supplies for the team and some personal items.

Juan claims AL MVP

Rangers' Gonzalez beats out Boston's Garciaparra to win his second MVP award in three seasons

NEW YORK — Juan Gonzalez was voted the American League's Most Valuable Player Wednesday, overwhelmingly defeating Nomar Garciaparra and Derek Jeter to win the award for the second time in three seasons.

Gonzalez, who had the most RBI in the AL in 49 years and led Texas to its second AL West title in three seasons, received 21 first-place

votes and seven seconds for 357 points in balloting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

"This is a great moment for everybody, for the whole team and the organization," Gonzalez said in a conference call from Puerto Rico.

Garciaparra, who helped Boston win the AL playoff wild card, got five firsts, seven seconds and seven thirds and had 232 points.

Jeter, one of four players on the World Series champion New York Yankees to receive votes, had two firsts, six seconds and three thirds, finishing with 180 points.

Gonzalez beat Seattle shortstop Alex Rodriguez 290-287 to win the MVP two years ago.

"The first time was too tight," said Gonzalez, the first Latin American native to win two MVPs.

And it could be a Latin American sweep if Sammy Sosa beats Mark McGwire on Thursday for the NL MVP.

"I'm waiting for tomorrow's results ... and praying for Sammy," Gonzalez said.

Runner's heroic act denied him chance at state meet

ARLINGTON — Lake Worth High School cross-country runner Randy Todd is a hero. Many might not realize it, especially those lucky enough to have run in the state cross-country championships Saturday in Round Rock.

Todd should have been there. A three-time district champion, the senior was on his way to qualifying in the Region II championship Nov. 7 at Vandergriff Park in Arlington. Running strong in second place and ready for the most grueling part of the race, the unthinkable stopped Todd dead in his tracks.

"I saw him in the corner of

my eye. I thought someone would grab him," Todd said. "Then he started to run, and I knew I was going to hit him."

The rain was coming down hard and the course was sloppy when Todd collided with a small child who wandered onto the course. The young boy was no more than 3 or 4 years old, according to Todd and eyewitness Bill Fuller.

"It was the craziest thing I've ever seen in my life," Fuller said. "This little kid runs out in front of them, a couple of the first runners were able to miss him. Randy had nowhere to go. He slammed on his brakes and then stood there protecting the kid."

"After I hit the kid I felt

Gonzalez hit .318 with 45 homers and 157 RBI, the most in the AL since Ted Williams and Vern Stephens each had 159 for Boston in 1949.

"He's a great, great hitter," McGwire said. "But you know, the sad thing, if somebody said, 'Who was the 1996 MVP in the American League?' I bet you nobody really knows — Juan Gonzalez. Every year, year in, year out, he just puts up the numbers. It just seems like he doesn't get the notoriety he should."

Gonzalez had 101 RBI at the All-Star break, becoming only the second player to top the century mark going into the All-Star game (Hank Greenberg had 103 in 1935).

By the final week of July, he had 116 RBI in 105 games, bringing up talk he could challenge the record of 190, set by Hack Wilson in 1930.

"It's not impossible," Gonzalez said then. "I just need to stay healthy and keep working hard." But then he was slowed by hamstring problems, and the chance to reach that record disappeared.

Garcia, a unanimous choice as the 1997 AL Rookie of the Year, hit .323 with 35 homers and 122 RBI. Jeter, a unanimous pick as the 1996 AL Rookie of the Year, batted .324 with 19 homers and 84 RBI, providing solid and sometimes spectacular play at shortstop from start to finish.

Mo Vaughn and Ken Griffey Jr. tied for fourth in the voting with 135 points each, followed by Manny Ramirez (127), Bernie Williams (103), Albert Belle (96), Rodriguez (92) and Ivan Rodriguez (60).

Gonzalez gets a \$250,000 bonus for winning the award. Also getting bonuses were Garcia (\$75,000) and Ivan Rodriguez (\$50,000).

Report: Patriots close to moving to Hartford

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — New England Patriots owner Robert Kraft is likely to announce within 48 hours that he will move the team to Hartford. The Associated Press learned Wednesday night.

Despite reports that a deal was complete, a source, speaking on the condition of anonymity, told the AP he was not aware of a finalized agreement. But the source said a deal probably would be made soon.

Legislative, business and community leaders met with Gov. John Rowland earlier Wednesday amid reports that the Patriots had agreed to move from Foxboro, Mass., to the Connecticut capital.

ESPN and WBZ-TV and WEEI radio in Boston reported

that an agreement had been reached between Kraft and Rowland, and that it would be announced by Friday.

"There is nothing scheduled right now for that to happen," said Patriots spokesman Stacey James, responding to the report on WBZ-TV.

Hartford television stations reported that Kraft and Rowland were to meet Thursday.

ESPN, citing an unidentified source close to Kraft, said Rowland had given the team owner until the end of business Friday to make a commitment to move the Patriots to Hartford.

Any deal to move the Patriots must be approved by NFL owners.

Wolfe impresses readers, but not contest judges

NEW YORK (AP) — He has hundreds of thousands of readers. Everyone seems to be writing about him. His new novel was nominated for a National Book Award a month before it was published.

None of these facts about Tom Wolfe seemed to impress the crowd Wednesday at the awards ceremony, where the fiction prize instead went to Alice McDermott for "Charming Billy."

Wolfe, whose novel "A Man in Full" quickly topped best seller lists, was giving a reading in Atlanta. His white-suited presence apparently wasn't missed.

In announcing the selection, jury chair Thomas Mallon cited a preference for "stealth" over "horse power," which many took to mean Wolfe's energetic, epic-length book.

"Congratulations to Alice McDermott," Wolfe told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution in today's edition. "She's published

by my publisher, which I've been with since 1965, so I'm happy for her and happy for the company. I love awards when I get them, but I don't sit around wringing my hands when I don't."

Earlier, two-time award winner John Updike offered a bemused reading of a highly descriptive account by then-journalist Wolfe of Updike's 1964 acceptance speech. Updike, who received an honorary prize Wednesday night, panned Wolfe's novel in a New Yorker magazine review.

"I wouldn't have read it otherwise," Updike said before the ceremony.

Also attending was critic Harold Bloom, a nonfiction nominee and non-fan of Wolfe's who gave the novel a lukewarm review in The New York Observer.

There were plenty of cheers and warm feelings for McDermott, whose novel tells the story of an Irish family and

community in New York. Fiction finalist Allegra Goodman praised the book's "beauty" and called it a favorite among the nominated works.

"It just shows my Catholic taste," the Jewish author said with a laugh.

Although not nearly as famous as Wolfe, McDermott has long been respected in the literary world. Her earlier novels include "At Weddings and Wakes" and "That Night," a 1987 finalist for the award.

"I could hear my grandmother saying, 'Don't get a swelled head about this.' I will clutch onto my Irish humility with great vigor."

The big winner Wednesday night was the publisher Farrar, Straus & Giroux, which received prizes in three of the four competitive categories.

'Easy Rider,' 'Tootsie' added to list U.S. film heritage list

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Dennis Hopper's 1969 counterculture classic "Easy Rider" and Sydney Pollack's 1982 cross-dressing comedy "Tootsie" were among 25 films honored by the Library of Congress for their contributions to American cultural history.

The movies were added Monday to the library's National Film Registry. Now at 250 films, the registry was created by Congress in 1988 to celebrate American cinema and to call attention to the need to preserve films.

Also added this year were the little 1928 animated film "Steamboat Willie," in which Mickey Mouse made his debut for Disney; the 1967 Bob Dylan documentary "Don't Look Back"; the 1931 James Cagney gangster film "The

Writing Want Ads that really sell!

Unsure how to write a Classified Ad that will get results? Follow these pointers and you'll soon have an empty space in your storage room and cash in your pocket.

- Use key words to describe what you're selling. The key words for a car are make, model, year, body style, color, mileage and price. If it's a house, key words are location, type of construction, number of bedrooms and baths, and condition.
- Don't use abbreviations. It's tempting to abbreviate and save money if ads are billed by the line. Brand ads are billed by the words, so spell them out so readers won't be confused trying to figure out abbreviations.
- Don't be misleading. Think accurate and factual when you write. Be sure to include a phone number and the best times to reach you.

lems. The committee also planned to question Daniel Gecker, the lawyer for Clinton accuser Kathleen Willey, and Nathan Landow, a Maryland Democrat who had contacts with Mrs. Willey. She has accused the president of making a sexual advance inside the White House.

In his prepared testimony, Starr spared no words for a president he has investigated for four years at a cost of \$40 million. Clinton, he said, "repeatedly used the machinery of government and the powers of his office to conceal his relationship with Monica Lewinsky from the American people, from the judicial process in the Paula Jones case and from the grand jury."

The prosecutor said Clinton used premeditated false statements, provided job assistance to Ms. Lewinsky when she was a potential adverse witness in Mrs. Jones' sexual harassment case against the president, schemed to conceal gifts, and used his own Cabinet members and staff to unwittingly provide inaccurate information to the public and the grand jury.

Starr dismissed Democratic suggestions he had no right to investigate the Lewinsky affair. Obstruction of justice "is not a private matter," he declared.

"The evidence further suggests that the president, in the course of these efforts, misused his authority and power as president and contravened his duty to faithfully execute the laws. That too is not a private matter," Starr continued.

Starr mostly stuck to his written September report listing 11 possible grounds for impeachment, mostly related to alleged obstruction of justice and perjury.

But he also told lawmakers that his investigations into the gathering of FBI files on Republicans by the Clinton White House and the firing of White House travel office workers resulted in no evidence of impeachable offenses by the president.

The White House dismissed Starr's statement as a repeat of his earlier impeachment referral "in new wrapping paper." "The only new thing" is the conclusion "the president is innocent in the FBI files and travel office matters," the statement said.

The prosecutor also disclosed that his office drafted an impeachment referral to Congress on the original Whitewater allegations last year, but pulled back.

The referral related to Clinton's testimony that he knew nothing about a fraudulent \$300,000 loan and a second loan from a savings and loan owned by the president's former business partners.

"In late 1997, we considered whether this evidence justified a referral to Congress," Starr wrote. "We drafted a report. But we concluded that it would be inconsistent with the statutory standard because of the difficulty of establishing the truth with a sufficient degree of confidence."

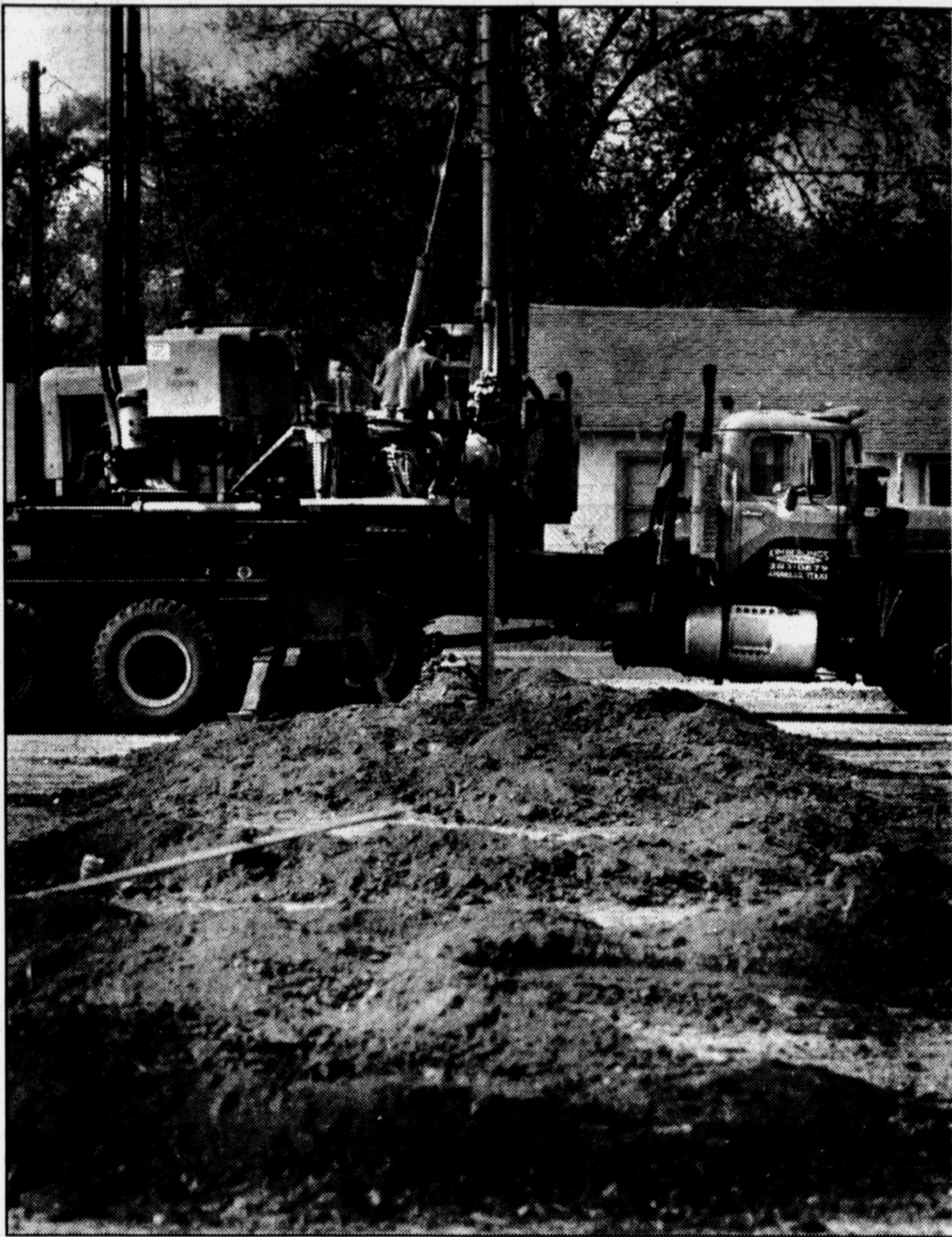
Alluding to the graphic sexual detail included in his written report in September, Starr acknowledged some believed it was "too thorough."

"We must dispute the suggestion that a report to the House suggesting possible impeachable offenses ... should tell something less than the full story," Starr said.

Starr drew parallels between the job assistance Ms. Lewinsky got from presidential friends at a time she was emerging as a witness in the Jones case to the \$550,000 in payments Clinton supporters steered to Webster Hubbell, Hillary Rodham Clinton's former law partner.

Hubbell at the time, in 1994, was under investigation in the Whitewater case.

"This rush of generosity obviously gives rise to an inference that the money was essentially a gift. And if it was a gift, why was it given? This money was given despite the fact that Mr. Hubbell was under criminal investigation," Starr concluded.

Israeli Cabinet reviews accord

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel's Cabinet convened today to review Palestinian compliance with the Mideast peace accord and vote on whether to approve the first of three troop pullbacks in the West Bank over the next 10 weeks.

On Wednesday evening, Israeli and Palestinian troop commanders met to complete preparations for an Israeli pullout in the northern West Bank that is to be carried out by Friday.

In the first stage, 2 percent of the West Bank, or 44 square miles, will be transferred from sole Israeli control to joint Palestinian jurisdiction. In addition, 7.1 percent of the land, or 160 square miles, will be moved from joint jurisdiction to sole Palestinian control.

No army bases or Jewish settlements will be dismantled. Instead, Israeli troops will move black-and-yellow road markers the size of washing machines to demarcate the new lines of division.

The first pullback will leave two Jewish settlements, Ganim and Kadim, east of the Palestinian town of Jenin, surrounded on three sides by Palestinian-controlled areas.

One settler said that isolation will prompt some Israelis to move.

Avner Sinwani moved to Ganim, a settlement of 51 families, for a peaceful, rural lifestyle. He said he would leave if the community turned into a fortified enclave with watch towers and barbed wire. "If we have to stay inside a fortress, I don't think anyone will want to stay and raise children here," Sinwani told Israel radio.

U.S. courting Iraqi opposition

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Its latest standoff with Saddam Hussein now past, the United States is courting the Iraqi opposition with the declared aim of toppling the Iraqi leader.

But standing between Washington and the emergence of a new Iraqi regime are a fragmented opposition that often suffers from a lack of credibility and Saddam himself, a man with a singular reputation for survival.

"(Saddam) immune to coups, and he is the best among conspirators," said Ahmed Chalabi, head of the Iraqi National Congress, an opposition umbrella group considered a favorite to receive nearly \$100 million in U.S. military assistance. Chalabi met with U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Martin Indyk on Wednesday.

But Iraq experts in the West dismissed the U.S. aid — approved last month by Congress to oust Saddam — as a futile gesture. Some opposition groups even rejected the offer.

Many, in fact, fear that an Iraq without Saddam would splinter into ethnic and religious enclaves — perhaps tempting targets for powerful neighbors such as Iran and Turkey.

"While seeking to topple Saddam, the Americans don't want a weak and a fragmented Iraq to follow," said Sean Boyne, an analyst for Jane's Intelligence Review.

The United States itself, experts said, was

far from decided on the most effective way to topple Saddam, with all the obvious options — a coup or an insurrection — either fraught with problems or difficult to implement.

Gates fires back at Justice Dept.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Microsoft Chairman Bill Gates wants people to reserve judgment until his own executives take the witness stand in his company's antitrust trial to explain e-mails about industry rivals.

Gates, who also accused the Justice Department of attempting "to put words in my mouth," said in an interview Wednesday night that government lawyers were "trying to use the e-mails in a very misleading way." Six witnesses for the government have testified so far.

"The best thing is, if people would just wait until the Microsoft people actually get up there and talk about these relationships," Gates told The Associated Press.

Gates also appeared frustrated that government lawyers showed hours of videotape recorded during his three days of sworn testimony last summer.

"I answered every question, completely, truthfully through many, many, many long days," Gates said. "The fact that they're taking snippets out of that and holding them up without having me there because they chose not to call me as a witness, I think, is quite novel."

Gates is not among the 24 witnesses who will testify in person at the trial. But under court rules, the government can show videotape of its lawyers questioning Gates.

The Justice Department responded by calling the Gates deposition "relevant and admissible evidence."

Doctors unclear about ADD

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than a million American children are being given powerful drugs for attention deficit disorder, but doctors still don't know how best to diagnose or treat the often-disruptive behavior, a panel of experts concludes.

A committee selected by the National Institutes of Health said Wednesday that attention deficit disorder is a "profound problem" that may affect as much as 5 percent of American schoolchildren and costs schools more than \$3 billion for special programs.

But the group of experts said that a consistent, proven method of diagnosing and treating the disorder remains elusive. Some of the committee members worried that doctors may be too quick to prescribe the mind-altering drugs that are the principal form of therapy.

"There is no current validated diagnostic test for" the disorder, said Dr. David J. Kupfer, a University of Pittsburgh psychiatry professor and chairman of the panel.

Some treatments are effective in the short term — principally drugs such as Ritalin — but no studies have examined their effect on children who take them for more than 14 months, Kupfer said.

Billy Graham

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The Rev. Billy Graham is back on his feet, six days after being hospitalized following a fall.

The 80-year-old evangelist was released from the Mayo Clinic Jacksonville on Wednesday.

Graham, who was not seriously injured in the fall, also received follow-up care for previous eye surgery during his stay, clinic spokeswoman Carol Chaffin said.

Graham, who suffers from Parkinson's disease, has previously been treated at the Mayo Clinic in Minnesota.

In December 1997, Graham spent six days in St. Luke's Hospital in Jacksonville while he received treatment from Mayo Clinic doctors for pneumonia.

Mike Barnicle

BOSTON (AP) — Former Boston Globe columnist Mike Barnicle is scheduled to undergo heart bypass surgery.

Chris Stirling, producer of WCVB-TV's "Chronicle," where Barnicle was a regular contributor, said Wednesday that the operation is scheduled for early next month.

Barnicle began a 90-day leave of absence from "Chronicle" in August after he was accused of fabricating a column in the Globe. Barnicle, who had been suspended after being accused of lifting jokes from a book by comedian George Carlin for his column, resigned at the paper's request.

Larry Flynt

CINCINNATI (AP) — There are things that offend Larry Flynt.

"There's an awful lot of material on the Internet that children should not have access to," the Hustler magazine publisher said Wednesday. "There's material that even I, in my wildest imagination, would not consider publishing."

Flynt said he'd like to see the government force computer makers to come up with foolproof blocking devices parents could use to keep objectionable material from children.

Still, he believes adults should have access to anything they want to read or view.

Flynt, 55, and his brother, Jimmy, 49, face trial in January on 15 felony charges including selling pornography to a minor, pandering obscenity and conspiracy. Each faces 24 years in prison and \$65,000 in fines if convicted.

Flynt signed autographs at one of his downtown stores while waiting to address students at the University of Cincinnati on Wednesday night.

Yusef Jackson

CHICAGO (AP) — The Rev. Jesse Jackson's youngest son knows legal briefs. Soon he'll know lager brews.

Yusef Jackson, an attorney at a Chicago law firm, says he hopes to learn the beer industry "from the bottom up" by acquiring one of Anheuser-Busch's largest local distributorships.

"We have signed an agreement" to purchase Busch's River North Distributing Investment Capital Corp., but arrangements have yet to be completed, said Jackson, 28.

Also on board is his brother Jonathan, a 32-year-old Chicago real estate executive, and a partner Jackson did not identify Tuesday.

Mickey Mouse

LAKE BUENA VISTA, Fla. (AP) — Mickey Mouse, you've just celebrated your 70th birthday. What are you going to do next?

Well, he didn't go to Disney World, but the famous mouse did get the red-carpet treatment during a bash at Disney-MGM Studios on Wednesday.

Feted in a blue magician's hat and red robe from the movie "Fantasia," Mickey celebrated No. 70 with about 50 costumed friends.

Nature is theme of '99 issue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nature in America will be a prominent feature of next year's postage stamps, a series that opens with a rabbit and includes Arctic animals, insects and spiders, aquarium fish and desert wildlife.

Jan. 5 will see the first new stamp of 1999, a Happy New Year stamp to mark the Year of the Hare on the Chinese astrological calendar, the Postal Service said today.

Like other new issues, the New Year stamp will bear the 33-cent first-class postage rate, up a penny from the current price, which takes effect Jan. 10.

Performing arts will be represented by stamps honoring James Cagney and the husband-wife team of Alfred Lunt and Lynn Fontanne.

The 1999 additions to the Legends of American Music series honor Broadway songwriters and Hollywood composers.

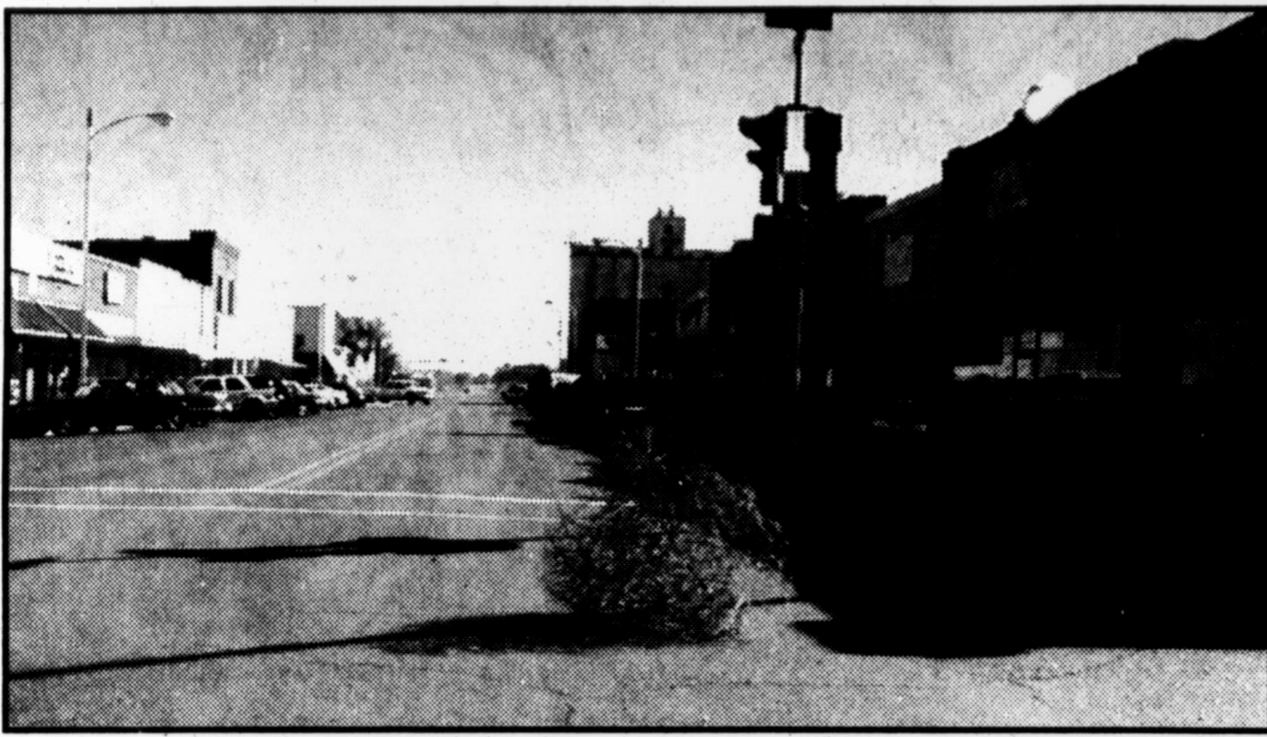
Featured Broadway teams include Ira and George Gershwin, Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe, Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II and individual songwriters Lorenz Hart, Meredith Willson and Frank Loesser.

The Hollywood composers stamps salute Max Steiner, Dimitri Tiomkin, Bernard Herrmann, Franz Waxman, Alfred Newman and Erich Korngold.

These stamps complete the long-running music series that began in 1993 with issuance of the Elvis Presley stamp and the rock 'n' roll-rhythm and blues stamps.

The annual love stamp will feature Victorian designs and will be the first U.S. self-adhesive stamps die-cut to the shape of the images depicted.

San Jose approves highest-ever living-wage law

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — The city council has adopted what may be the nation's highest minimum wage, saying workers need to be guaranteed a "living wage" as costs soar in Silicon Valley.

More than 500 union members applauded as the council voted 7-3 Tuesday night to require city contractors to pay employees at least \$9.50 an hour with health benefits and \$10.75 if benefits aren't provided.

Susan Hammer, the outgoing mayor in California's third-largest city, said the wage was "a step toward addressing the plight of those struggling to provide for their families."

In September, a proposal to raise the federal minimum wage from \$5.15 to \$6.15 was defeated.

Catholic bishops urge action, more votes against abortion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's Catholic bishops say it's not enough to oppose abortion personally without taking steps to stop it. They're asking citizens to vote antiabortion candidates into public office.

The National Conference of Catholic Bishops voted 217-30 Wednesday for a statement that also urged Catholic officials to take action against abortion.

Catholic officials should focus on social issues such as poverty, housing and health care, they said. But being "right" on those issues "can never excuse a wrong choice regarding direct attacks on innocent human life."

The statement, developed by seven of the eight U.S. cardinals, also said that officials who "ignore church teaching on the inviolability of the human person indirectly collude in the taking of an innocent life."
