**Annual tree spectacular set this week**

The 9th Annual Festival of Trees will be Wednesday-Sunday at the Hereford Senior Citizens Center, 426 Ranger.

The festival agenda, which was expanded to five days two years ago, will continue again this year.

Continuous festival activities and children's programs will begin at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday.

A preview of this year's trees is scheduled for 5-8 p.m. Wednesday, providing extra viewing time for anyone interested in bidding on one of the 24 beautifully decorated trees.

The Festival Gala, followed by the annual Festival Auction, is set for 6-7:30 p.m. Friday.

Traditionally, the trees included in the auction are 6-1/2' to 7' tall artificial trees. One tree though, a 9-foot tall Super Tree, is included in the auction.

The trees are sponsored by local and area businesses for \$500 per tree. Some are sponsored by one company, while others have two firms splitting the cost.

The Super Tree is sponsored for \$1,000.

All trees are provided by the Senior Center. Decorations for the trees are provided by individuals, businesses, school groups and service clubs.

Decorators determine what they will be used for a specific tree.

The Memorial Tree, offered for the first time in 1994, will be featured again this year. The lighted, wooden Christmas tree serves as a tribute where people may honor loved ones through monetary contributions.

Donor levels and corresponding tree light colors are:

- Green Light - \$10 - \$99
- Blue Light - \$100 - \$249
- Red Light - \$250 - \$499
- Gold Light - \$500 - \$1,000

All proceeds benefit the Hereford Senior Citizen's Association which offers services to area senior citizens that include; congregate and home-bound meals, transportation and a modern and multi-functional senior center.

According to the Hereford Senior Citizen's Association, more than 2,000 senior citizens were assisted in 1997.

Also included in this year's festival, is the always popular melodrama. This year's presentation, "Here Come the Cows,"

**Area lawmakers predict a 'budget session'**

**Smithee, Bivins say George Bush will be the dominant player when 76th Legislature convenes**

Two veteran Panhandle lawmakers believe George Bush will be the dominant player in the 76th session of the Texas Legislature when it convenes in January.

Also, both state Sen. Rep. John Smithee and state Sen. Teel Bivins, both Amarillo Republicans, believe the session will be dominated by budget issues, thanks to the anticipated \$6.3 billion surplus.

Smithee said he believes the session will be a "budget session," something that hasn't really happened since the '80s.

"Teel (Bivins), (Rep. David) Swinford and I have been talking about (the session), and nobody has a real handle on it yet," Smithee said. "But I think it will be a budget session. We haven't had one of those in a number of years." Smithee said the focus on the budget this session, however, will be different than those in the 1980s, when the legislators were having to cut funds.

Now, with a surplus estimated to be about \$6.3 billion, the lawmakers are in the enviable position of having to decide how to use the money.

"Some (of the surplus) will go back to the taxpayers in some form, and some will stay to fund the good things the state does," Smithee said.

In the past four or five sessions, Smithee said, the legislators have found the budget was "pretty much set" and the lawmakers' major task was to allocate roughly the same amount of funds to the various agencies, with most of the budget battles over adjustments.

"This is the first time in quite a while we've had to deal with a surplus," he said.

Sen. Bill Rathliff, R-Mount Pleasant, recently described the budget surplus as illusory, saying the natural growth of the state would siphon away the funds.

Smithee agreed with Rathliff's assessment, saying the "surplus can be misleading because it's not money in the bank. A lot is a one-time deal."

"That's going to come into focus during the session, exactly how much money is available," Smithee said.

However, the use of the surplus likely will be decided by Gov. George W. Bush, the Amarillo lawmaker said.

The senator agreed with his

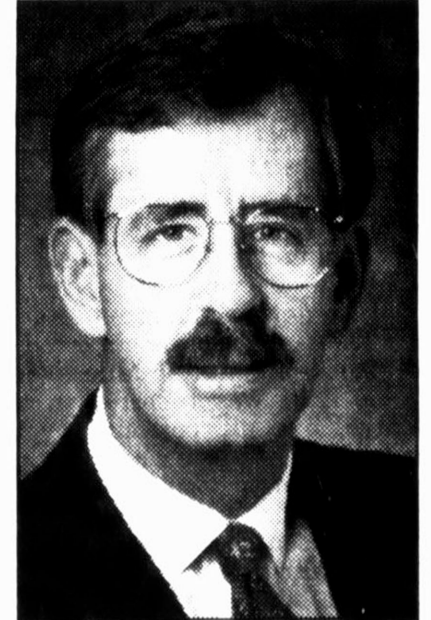
"Hands down, the biggest issue will be the budget. That's because we have projected a historically larger surplus of revenue over expenses," Bivins said, adding this situation hasn't occurred during his legislative career.

"Some of the old-timers say a surplus can cause the session to be as contentious" as one where the money's tight, Bivins said.

Smithee said Bush's hand was strengthened considerably by his overwhelming victory in the Nov. 3 general election. Bush, who became the first Republican governor to be re-elected and the first Texas governor ever elected to a second consecutive four-year term, picked up about 70 percent of the vote in his crushing defeat of Democratic challenger

school districts - if they will use it to reduce the ad valorem taxes," Smithee said. He said the school districts could use the extra funding for boosting teacher pay. The districts also would be expected to share the bounty by reducing property tax rates.

Bivins agreed that a big chunk of the surplus should be returned to the taxpayers. He said he will propose increasing the state's share of funding for schools, which will allow the local districts to reduce the property tax rates.

He said he wants to use \$2 billion of the surplus to boost the state's share in school funding, with the districts to

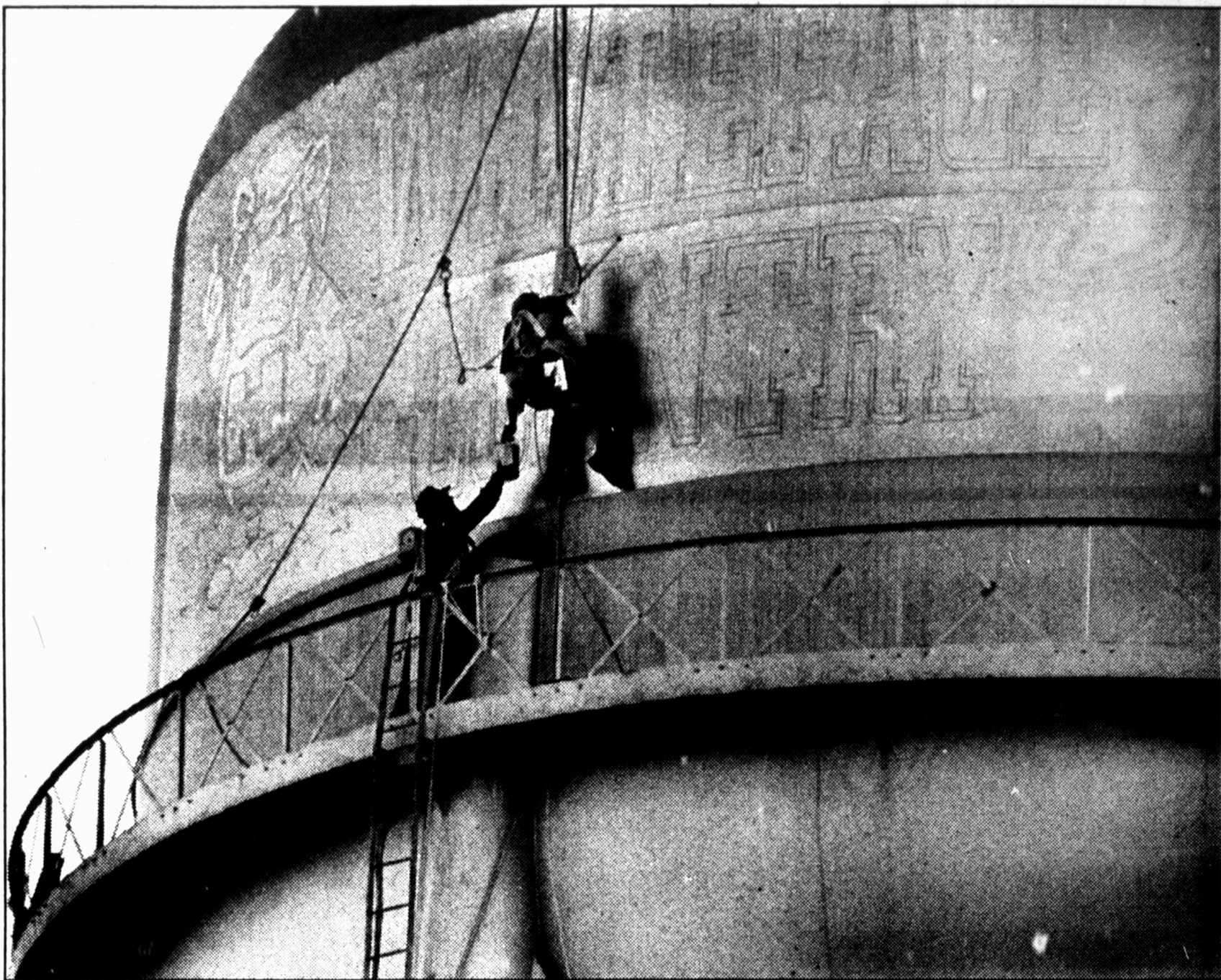

respond by cutting property tax rates.

Another \$1 billion would be allocated for school districts, "with no strings attached," Bivins said.

"If the school district in Hereford wants to hire another science teacher or the district in Mount Pleasant wants a bilingual teacher, they can use that money that way. The answer is not a 'one size fits all' plan out of Austin," Bivins said.

He also wants to use another \$600 million to support Bush's reading initiative, which has a goal of ensuring all school children can read at their grade level by the third grade.

Because of a changing curriculum to incorporate the Bush reading initiative, Bivins would use \$200 million for textbooks, "to get everything aligned," and an additional \$200 million for school construction projects.

"We will really begin to go a long way toward getting our-

selves out of the hole Texas dug for itself (in school construction)," Bivins said.

"I think the governor has considerable portfolio (going into the session)," Bivins echoed. "He's an immensely popular governor and a strong leader."

Smithee, who chairs the House Insurance Committee, said his major focus during the session will be insurance issues.

However, there will be a change in that focus, he said. In the past session, the Legislature looked at reforms of the insurance industry, primarily focusing on HMOs (health maintenance organizations). In this session, he expects the lawmakers will review the

results and make any adjustments they believe to be needed.

"I'm working on some legislation to give more flexibility to people in HMOs to choose their own doctors," Smithee said. He acknowledged HMOs have opposed such efforts in the past; however, he believes the legislation when it is offered will be "something the HMOs can live with."

Smithee predicted Rep. Pete Laney will be re-elected to another term as speaker of the House.

Although Laney is from the opposing party, Smithee said he believes the Hale Center Democrat's re-election will be good for the Panhandle.

"Deaf Smith County and Hale

County have a lot in common. Even though Hale County's predominantly cotton and Deaf Smith's predominantly cattle, they're both agriculture counties," and having Laney, with his interest in agriculture, in the speakership will be good for the whole region, Smithee said.

On the Senate side, Bivins also said he looks forward to working with Lt. Gov.-elect Rick Perry, the former agriculture commissioner. Perry, a Republican, will succeed Democrat Bob Bullock as the Texas Senate's presiding officer. Bullock did not seek re-election as lieutenant governor.

"I loved Bob Bullock," Bivins said. "There never will be another Bob Bullock. But I think Rick will be more collegial, more disposed to group decision-making and not quite so autocratic."

"I'm excited about the session. I think it will be a good session for the Senate," Bivins said.

Over the years, the primary was moved to June, then to March. Each time the move was justified to give Texas more of a voice in the nomination of the presidential candidate of each party. This was disproved in 1996 and in 1992 when Clinton and Dole already had party nominations clinched when Texans went to the primary polls.

With a few changes in the election calendar and a reform of campaign financing, the average voter might regain interest in the process.

Something I've always found interesting are collectives, those words used to describe a group. For example, a "pride" of lions, a "herd" of cattle, a "swarm" of bees.

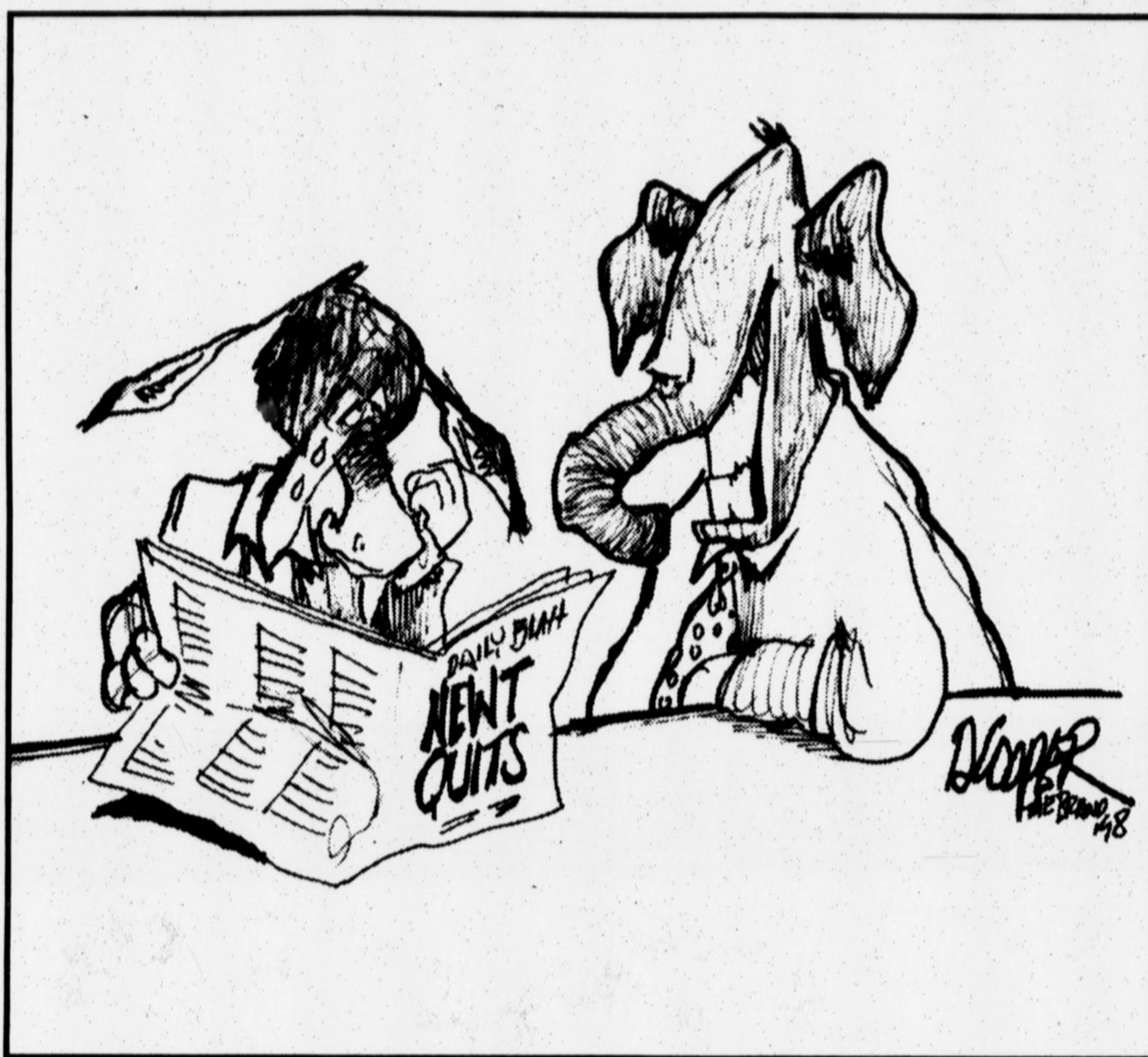
Well, thinking about that the other day, I realized there are some collectives missing from the list. Working with Annett, we came up with some more collectives, ones we think have been missing from the language.

## Gingrich in 2000 Can fallen speaker rise again?

House Speaker Newt Gingrich is leaving Congress, but that's no reason to count him out of the presidential sweepstakes.

Gingrich isn't saying whether he will run for president in 2000. His closest advisers say he won't decide for weeks or months. But as he ponders his future, picking up the pieces from disappointing midterm elections, Republicans are debating whether Gingrich could be a serious contender.

Supporters argue that Gingrich is still one of the party's best fund-raisers and a leader with "big ideas" who energizes audiences like no other Republican, including poll-topping Gov. George W. Bush of Texas.

"I'm a big fan of George W. Bush, but it's a long way to go between now and...2000," said longtime Gingrich adviser Rich Galen.

Gingrich "has such incredible energy and intellect that he would have the ability to

drive the race by his very presence," said Tom Rath, a New Hampshire party leader who is helping former Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander position for the 2000 race.

But others say Gingrich is too scarred by the wars of Washington to make a serious run.

"It would defeat everything he's achieved with his graceful exit from the House," said Republican media consultant Alex Castellanos of Alexandria, Va. Gingrich has been the GOP "point man" for too long, he said.

"The good news is the point man gets to blaze the trail. The bad news is you get shot full of bullet holes doing it," Castellanos said.

Exit polls Nov. 3 showed that nearly six of every 10 voters nationwide viewed Gingrich unfavorably. Even in his home state of Georgia, he could muster only a 47 percent favorable rating.

"His negatives are just too high," said Tom Slade, chairman of the Florida GOP, though he called Gingrich the party's

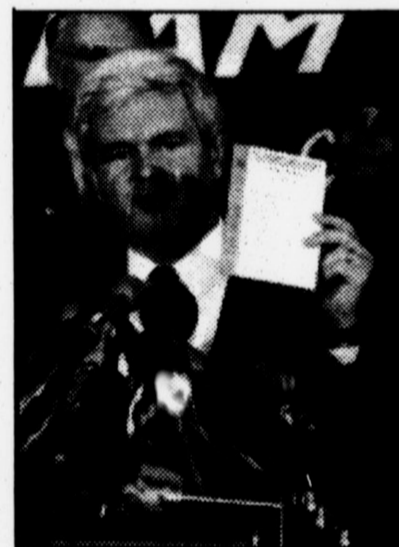
most articulate spokesman and fund-raiser.

Gingrich's chances also might be hurt by perceptions among conservatives that he capitulated too often in negotiations with President Clinton.

"I think Newt did a lot of good things early on, but as a leader he got away from our message and that resulted in what happened in the elections," said Tim Lambert of Texas, a leading conservative voice among Republican National Committee members.

As for the midterm elections, Steve Grubbs, chairman of the Iowa Republican Party, said, "I think the loss of five House seats was a very serious setback for a Gingrich presidential run. ... There is a lot of disappointment among the rank and file."

Yet critics and supporters alike say Gingrich's chances might be helped by his decision to leave the House. He could soon begin retooling his political image, free of the bickering that helped cement his reputation as a Washington firebrand.

"The run is easier, if he decides to make it, by not being burdened with the responsibility of speaker," said Slade, the Florida GOP chairman. "But the fact that he had to resign as speaker in order to prevent a very divisive situation in the House kind of speaks for itself. ... He's a polarizing figure."

Said Gingrich ally Galen: "He's got more time to think about what he wants to say and how he wants to say it because he's not spending 18 hours a day in meetings ... in the Capitol."

Advisers say that while being House speaker was his lifelong goal, Gingrich may be

The gang initiates potential

young new members by having them ride with older members after dark.

The older driver uses his bright lights and when oncoming motorists flash their lights to ask them to use dims, the gang chases them down and at least shoots the tires, at worst shoots the driver and other occupants.

My friend's fax changed what I thought was a bad joke into a prime example of "free agency of choice" which all

children are supposed to be allowed to develop these days.

Matter of fact, parents are encouraged to ignore signs that may indicate adolescents and teens are considering making these choices.

Don't get me wrong. I firmly believe kids should be taught and given every opportunity to make good, sensible choices and decisions.

When children are young, parents allow their children the opportunity to make nomi-

nal choices. On a cold, raw, winter day, after a child has been told to get dressed, and comes out in a pink and blue tanktop and purple and orange shorts, mom will usually inform the kid that they need to go and put on more suitable clothes.

When the child returns with green sweat pants and orange and red plaid turtle neck, Mom may cringe at the color selection, but as long as it keeps the kid warm it's OK.

Granted, later in the day

# Gephardt 2000?

## Top House Demo eyes presidential run; some advise aiming for speaker's post

**D**ick Gephardt said Thursday he is seriously considering a presidential race despite pressure from some Democratic officials who want him to remain in the House and set his sights on the speakership.

"I'm actively considering it, and I will continue to do so for the next two months," the House Democratic leader said of a presidential bid in an interview with The Associated Press.

The Democrats who want Gephardt to stay put have various motives: Some think he is the party's best hope for leading the effort to seize back the House in 2000. Some are simply supporters of Vice President Al Gore who would like the field clear of a tough rival.

Gephardt's political future was buoyed Nov. 3, when Democrats surpassed their own expectations and picked up five seats in the House. Six more would give them a majority. He had raised millions of dollars, campaigned for dozens of candidates and helped shape the party's mid-term message.

If Democrats had collapsed, losing 20 or more seats, advisers say Gephardt almost certainly would have run for president. With the speakership a whisper away, he now faces a tougher choice.

Does he try to win the House or the White House? "It's a hard decision, but it's a straightforward and simple decision," Gephardt said. "The decision is: Where do you best think you can do what needs to be done for the

country — now and in the next few years?"

Gephardt and his allies have worked this week to dampen assumptions that he will not run for the presidency. Supporters say he wants to keep his options open, both because he hasn't made up his mind and it's in his best political interest to remain a presidential prospect as long as possible.

In a wide-ranging interview, Gephardt didn't sound like a man prepared to concede the presidential race to anybody. He said both Gore and a likely GOP contender, Texas Gov. George W. Bush, can be beaten.

"One thing I've learned from having been through this before is the front-runner status is never where you want to be. (Gore) doesn't have it locked up. George W. Bush doesn't have it locked up. Nobody has it locked up," Gephardt said.

Gephardt ran for president in 1988, clashing frequently with Gore. Both lost the nomination, but much has changed since then. Other than Gore,

the Missouri lawmaker is in the best position to raise enough money and call in enough political IOUs for a Democratic presidential bid.

"It's a great time for him to run as president," said Rep. Patrick Kennedy, D-R.I. "His stock is at an all-time high."

Some Democrats would prefer to see Gephardt in the House speaker's chair.

Gephardt said he has heard from some Democratic lawmakers who are antsy about him leaving.

At the center of one political dynamic is Terry McAuliffe, a top Democratic fund-raiser who is close to both Gephardt and Gore.

The vice president's allies hopes that McAuliffe and other prominent Democrats will encourage Gephardt to stay in the House. McAuliffe, who had lunch with Gephardt on Thursday, is said to believe Gephardt has a great shot at being speaker — and in seeking to regain the House would also position himself to be a possible Gore running mate.

Under this scenario, also offered by one Gore backer, the Missouri lawmaker would be active enough campaigning for candidates and raising money that he also would be in prepared to change his mind and run for president if Gore suddenly faltered.

Some Gephardt allies believe that running for president would be the best way to ensure himself a place on the Democratic ticket — either as the presidential or vice presidential nominee.

Kennedy, an ardent Gephardt-for-president man, suggested he could run for speaker and president at the same time.

But Gephardt ruled that option out Thursday.

"I've always believed that in doing a good job at whatever you are doing you have to have a single goal," he said. "You can only cross one bridge at a time."

looking for a new place in history as president. Yet some say their best bet is that he won't try this time, perhaps waiting until 2004.

In a speech to GOPAC, a political action committee he helped form, Gingrich sprinkled his remarks with comments that raised questions about his

presidential ambitions. "There are many avenues for a public life beyond the speakership," he said. "As I leave public office and rejoin the ranks of active citizenship the venue changes and the cause lives on."

Will a new venue be the campaign trail? Not immediately, anyway.

Advisers expect Gingrich to

spend the next several weeks thinking about the future while earning \$50,000 or more making speeches. He still believes he can wait until next summer to get in the race.

Or, said Galen, noting that Gingrich's interests include studying dinosaur bones, the speaker may simply say, "I want to go dig rocks."

parents should still expect to have some authority over their offspring.

### Computer Eyestrain

If you have to sit in front of a computer for several hours a day, chances are you've experienced blurred vision or aching and stinging eyes. Focusing on a monitor screen can certainly tire the eyes, but you can take steps to protect them.

**Get a large screen:** The larger the better, for your eyes sake. A larger screen has better resolution.

**Make the display sharp and clear:** Best bet are darker letters on a light background and an easy-to-read typeface.

**Make sure the screen is in the right position:** Whether you have to adjust the monitor or your chair, make sure it's comfortable. The monitor should be about arm's length away.

**Keep notes and clutter off the monitor:** It's best to cut down on distractions.

**Use good lighting:** If there's glare from outside, get blinds or shades to minimize direct light on the screen. To avoid glare from an interior light, adjust the position of the monitor.

**Keep the screen clean:** Simple smudges can distort the display.

**Take breaks:** Take time to step away from the computer every hour or so.

## Clinton: Iraqi defiance will not be tolerated

WASHINGTON — Iraq's continuing refusal to permit U.N. weapons inspectors will not be tolerated, President Clinton says, backing up that declaration by ordering an air and sea armada and thousands of ground troops to the Persian Gulf.

"None of us can tolerate an Iraq free to develop weapons of mass destruction with impunity," Clinton said Friday, and "the (U.N.) Security Council and the world have made it crystal clear now that this is unacceptable."

The deployment of heavy bombers, jet fighters and ground forces to the gulf to bolster the U.S. military presence there could presage air strikes to cripple Iraq's potential for developing and using nuclear, biological and chemical weapons.

Iraqi President Saddam Hussein, in his first statement since halting the monitoring of all weapons sites Oct. 31, insisted his "just and balanced demands" must be met — an apparent reference to lifting an 8-year-old U.N. trade embargo and other economic sanctions.

But the administration brushed that comment aside, with White House spokesman Joe Lockhart saying there was "nothing new and nothing positive or productive" in what Saddam had to say.

The crisis has been building since Aug. 5 when Iraq prohibited field inspections for nuclear, biological and chemical weapons it is compelled to eliminate under Security Council resolutions passed following the 1991 Gulf War.

Defense Secretary William Cohen, Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott and national security adviser Sandy Berger met at the White House late Friday to assess the situation.

### Saddam links end of sanctions, end to crisis

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — President Saddam Hussein has made clear nothing less than a pledge to lift U.N. sanctions will end the current crisis over U.N. weapons inspections.

At the United Nations and in Washington, the words from Secretary-General Kofi Annan and President Clinton are equally clear: Iraqi defiance is intolerable and Saddam should resume cooperation with inspectors before it's too late.

And with U.S. bombers, warships and troops moving to the Persian Gulf, fears were growing in the Iraqi capital that a U.S. military strike was imminent. Motorists jammed their cars by the hundreds into gasoline stations, forming long lines to fill up their tanks. Shoppers found some prices rising in Baghdad's crowded markets.

At Friday prayers in the nation's mosques, preachers called on Arabs and Muslims to rally behind Iraq, despite signs of a loss of support for its confrontation over the inspections.

"I call upon you — all Arabs and Muslims in the world — to declare war on America and its allies," said Abdul-Latif Humeim, sheik of the Abdel-Khader al-Gaylani Mosque in downtown Baghdad. "Do not let their airplanes use your airspace or bases."

In his first public statement since the latest dispute, Saddam insisted Friday he was not trying to create a crisis but said any initiative must lead to an end to sanctions.

But Clinton declared the standoff would only end when Iraq resumed its cooperation with the U.N. Special Commission, charged with eliminating Iraq's weapons of mass destruction.

### Tobacco negotiators nearing settlement

NEW YORK (AP) — Cigarette makers and state prosecutors are near agreement on a \$200 billion deal that could salvage some anti-smoking initiatives from a bigger pact that collapsed in Congress earlier this year.

"We are very, very close," said Washington state Attorney General Christine M. Gregoire, who has been leading negotiators from eight states.

Under the deal being discussed, Big Tobacco would pay \$206 billion over 25 years to settle claims from states that have sued to win compensation for the cost of treating sick smokers.

A spokesman for the industry declined comment Friday. "Issues arise as you draft but I'm very optimistic that we're going to get through them all," Gregoire said Friday afternoon, noting that negotiators had worked at a "fever pitch."

## Starr slaps Hubbell with new charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — As he prepares to face hostile questioning in the House impeachment inquiry, Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr is coming up with a few unpleasant surprises for President Clinton.

Starr obtained an indictment accusing presidential friend Webster Hubbell of committing 15 felonies in order to conceal his and Hillary Rodham Clinton's work on failed Arkansas land deals that benefited Hubbell's father-in-law, Little Rock businessman Seth Ward.

Starr also turned over new evidence for House investigators to decide whether they should expand the impeachment inquiry to include allegations against Clinton by former White House volunteer Kathleen Willey.

Democrats were furious at Friday's developments.

Starr is engaging in "a transparent attempt to change the subject" of "the Judiciary (Committee) hearings next week," said Sen. Robert Torricelli, D-N.J.

As the first witness in the impeachment inquiry, Starr will undergo questioning Thursday from committee Democrats about his aggressive pursuit of the Monica Lewinsky investigation last January before getting formal approval from the Justice Department.

Starr's transmittal allows the House committee to determine whether Mrs. Willey's allegation of an unwelcome sexual advance by the president should be included in

the inquiry, said sources familiar with the matter who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Starr has been investigating whether Clinton lied under oath when he denied making a crude sexual advance toward Mrs. Willey during a 1993 encounter in the Oval Office.

The material sent to the House is testimony from key witnesses and other evidence from the Willey investigation that had been left out of Starr's earlier referral, which accused Clinton of 11 offenses that the prosecutor contends are impeachable. Mrs. Willey and several of her friends testified before Starr's grand jury.

The Hubbell indictment holds potential peril for Mrs. Clinton.

The 40-page indictment refers to her three dozen times, saying that Hubbell lied about his own and the first lady's actions at the Rose Law Firm in Little Rock on behalf of the savings and loan owned by the Clintons' Whitewater investment partners, Jim and Susan McDougal.

**Charges dropped against Tarantino**

NEW YORK (AP) — A judge Friday dismissed an assault charge against Quentin Tarantino for allegedly hitting a woman with a punch meant for her boyfriend.

Prosecutors said they couldn't prove the case beyond a reasonable doubt.

The writer, actor and director was accused of hitting Leila Mwangi during a fight with her boyfriend, photographer Barron Claiborne, in a restaurant on May 2. She said the punch opened a cut over her left eyebrow.

The dispute arose during a discussion about the way Hollywood portrays blacks. Tarantino's lawyer, Paul Callan, said Claiborne became belligerent, Tarantino walked away, Claiborne followed and the fight started.

Mwangi is suing Tarantino for \$15 million.

**Bobbitt back on job, back in trouble**

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — John Wayne Bobbitt is back at work at a brothel — and back in trouble with the law.

He was arrested Thursday on charges of theft and conspiracy in connection with more than \$140,000 in clothes taken from a store in Fallon. At least two store employees were also implicated.

"They all worked together," Fallon police Lt. Ray Dolan said. "They gave some clothing away as gifts and kept some and sold some. They also returned some clothing to the store to get money for it."

Bobbitt was released five hours after his arrest when his boss, Dennis Hof, posted \$10,135 bail.

Hof owns the Moonlight Bunny Ranch and Kitty's Guest Ranch brothels in Mound House, six miles east of Carson City. Bobbitt was fired as a Moonlight bartender-chauffeur in April because he couldn't keep his hands off the working girls, but he now works as a Kitty's bartender.

"John has been a perfect angel since he's been back," Hof said. "He is a very controversial person; half the people love him and half the people hate him."

Bobbitt's then-wife Lorena was put on trial for cutting off his penis in 1993, claiming abuse led her to it. She was found temporarily insane and spent several weeks in a mental institution. Bobbitt, 31, was acquitted of abuse in a separate trial.

**Garth's skeptical about Wal-Mart goal**

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — Garth Brooks is skeptical but intrigued by Wal-Mart's lofty goal to sell a million copies the first day his new album is released.

Brooks said he recently told Wal-Mart officials at a meeting: "I don't mean to offend you guys, but I'll be shocked if you pull this off. But I'll be extremely happy ..."

The album, "Garth Brooks: Double Live," will be released Tuesday. Brooks will mark the release by performing a live studio show via satellite for broadcast to more than 2,300 Wal-Mart stores.

On Wednesday, Brooks will do three shows back-to-back for a live NBC special — one for the Eastern and Central time zones, a second for Mountain time and a third for the West.

"It always bugged me: Why do we do a live show with call-ins, and by the time it gets to the West Coast, it's tape-delayed and there are no live call-ins," Brooks said.

**Rock star won't face any charges**

LONDON (AP) — Liam Gallagher won't face charges over a fracas outside a pub last week, Scotland Yard said Friday.

The rock star was arrested and questioned Nov. 4 after photographer Mel Bouzad accused Gallagher of punching him and smashing his equipment.

Bouzad said he had followed Gallagher — part of the brother duo Oasis — to the pub near Gallagher's north London home.

**October's temperatures make month second warmest on record worldwide**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Just a day after the United States signed the global warming treaty, things seemed to be looking better.

With an average worldwide temperature of 58.14 degrees Fahrenheit, last month fell short of the all-time heat record for October.

It was the first month this year that did not set a record for warmth, according to data collected by the government's National Climatic Data Center.

October was already over when the climate treaty was signed, of course, and no one is contending that one month constitutes a trend.

Instead of being the hottest, it was the second warmest October on record, world-

wide, trailing October of 1997 when the planet's average temperature was 58.15 degrees.

The string of hot months has increased some environmentalists' concern that human activities are adding chemicals to the atmosphere that could cause rising temperatures and changes in climate.

Governmental officials have been discussing that problem at a conference in Buenos Aires this week. On Thursday, the Clinton Administration took that occasion to announce its signing of the climate agreement reached previously.

The treaty won't be submitted for Senate confirmation right away, however, as it faces serious political opposi-

tion there.

October's 58.14 degree average was 1.04 degrees higher than the October average recorded between 1880 and 1997, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration reported. The global land surface temperature was 1.74 degrees F above the long-term mean, while the global sea surface temperature for the same time was 0.74 degrees F above the long-term mean.

El Nino, the periodic warming of large areas in the Pacific Ocean, boosted the 1997 readings, but that phenomenon has now cooled, lowering ocean temperatures.

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## Dumas dethrones Hereford

**Demonettes end Lady Whiteface bid to win 3rd straight title in 'real' Class 4A championship**

AMARILLO — They know each other so well they call each other by their first names.

Dumas and Hereford have met nine times in the past two seasons — including the last two Region I-4A finals — with Hereford owning a slim 5-4 lead in the series.

The fourth match between the two teams in 1998 almost makes the rest of the Class 4A volleyball playoffs meaningless.

That includes the state tournament in Austin Friday and Saturday.

Twenty-four teams in Region I began the volleyball playoffs, but in the end it came down to Hereford and Dumas Friday at Amarillo Caprock Activity Center in the Region I-4A final.

Just like it was supposed to be. And just like it was supposed to be, the match went to three games, Dumas — propelled by senior outside hitter Julie Williams' 18 kills — taking the match 12-15, 15-9, 15-8.

"This was a sweet win," Dumas coach Jack Wilson said. "This was a making-up-for-them three-times-kicking-our-butts-in-a-row-in-a-region-final win."

With the win, the Demonettes earned the trip to Austin and the right (barring a complete implosion on their part) to bring back another title to Region I, just like Hereford had the past two years.

While the games had individual turning points, one thing was apparent — especially in the final two games. Aggressiveness — Dumas had it; Hereford didn't.

"Julie, of course, is their main boss," Kitten said. "But Beth (Ratliff) hit well. Several other hitters hit well. We know after watching film from all of this year, and we know from having played them, that the only way you can beat Dumas is to play aggressively . . ."

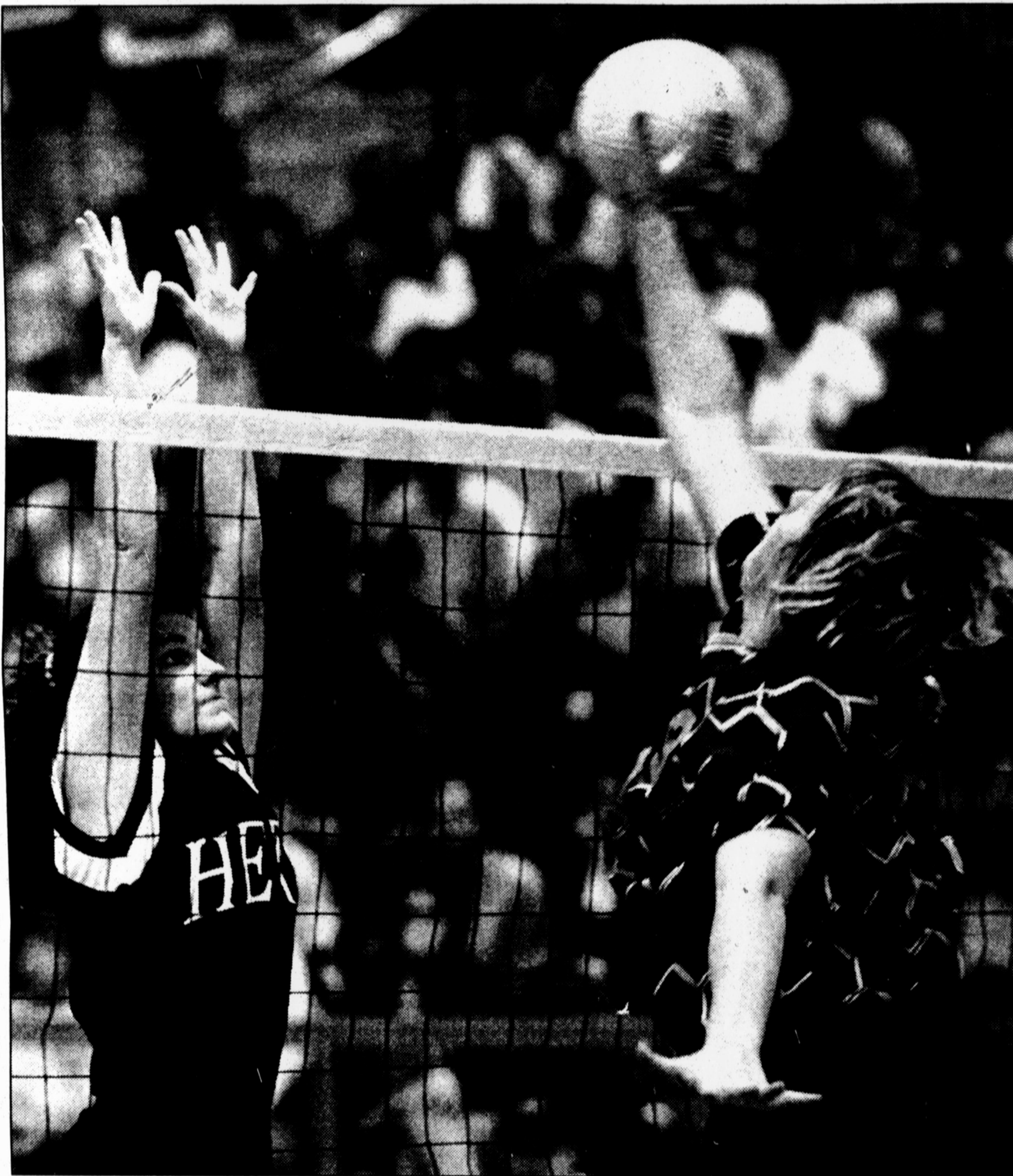
"I just felt there were so many times we got to the ball late, and were just a little bit tentative. You can't play that way against a team as good as Dumas and expect to survive."

With both teams gunning for this match since District 3-4A play started, was it in fact for not just the trip to Austin, but for the state championship?

"Oh, boy, I'd like to think so," Kitten said. "I know for us in the past years, (regional final matches with Dumas) have been the toughest of the matches that we've played. . . . It's just sad that we keep score and only one can go on."

Wilson echoed his District 3-4A counterpart.

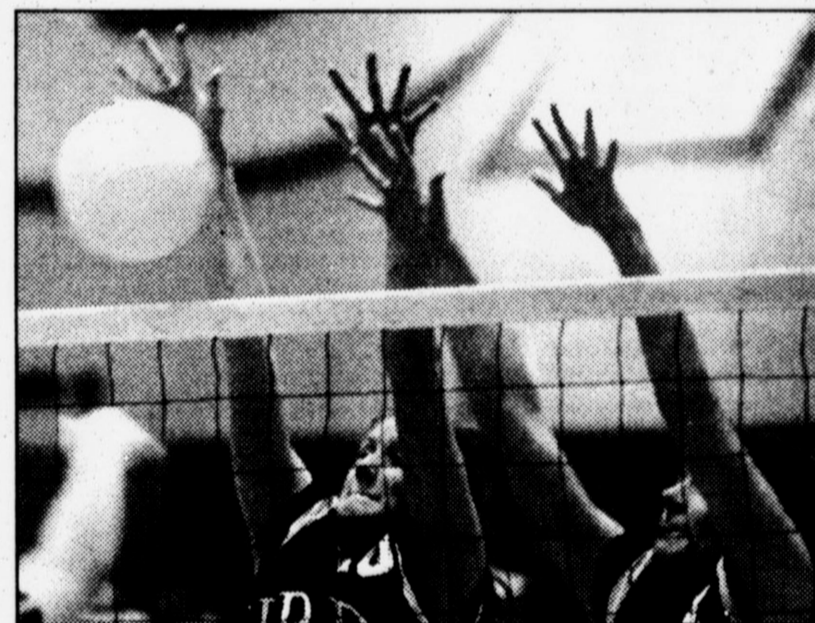

**Williams powers Demonettes to 12-15, 15-9, 15-8 Region I-4A win and trip to Austin**

AMARILLO — Everyone knew it would be the *de facto* Class 4A state championship volleyball match.

Everyone knew it would go three games.

But no one knew how much Julie Williams would want it at the end.

The Dumas senior got five kills in the last seven points to break an 8-all tie in the third game, powering the Demonettes to a 12-15, 15-9, 15-8 Region I-4A final victory over Hereford Friday at Amarillo Caprock High School Activity Center.

"Once she came around back on the front row, we knew we couldn't continue to give Dumas free ball after free ball," Hereford coach Brenda Kitten said. "That's suicide for any team. Those free balls are just going to get killed down our throat with Julie in the front row."

Dumas (30-9) advanced to the Class 4A state tournament in Austin Friday and Saturday for the first time since 1994. Hereford (31-6) ends its season short of a third straight title.

Williams — who recorded a match-high 18 kills — would have had a great game even without becoming possessed at the end. But with the opportunities that the Lady Whitefaces provided, the 5-10 outside hitter wasn't about let it go at that.

"We've wanted this so bad," Williams said, "since seventh grade. This is all we've thought about. We've dreamed about it. I'm so pumped about going to Austin."

The Demonettes will return to Austin in search of their fourth Class 4A title under coach Jack Wilson.

"I really believe this is the most pressure we'll face all year long," he said. "Going to Austin will be a cakewalk compared to this. I think every Hereford-Dumas match costs me three years off my coaching career."

In the beginning, the match looked very unlike the typical wars between the longtime District 3-4A rivals. Dumas jumped out to a 10-0 lead, getting three kills from Williams and two more from senior Lacey Beauchamp.

Hereford lost its first serve when a free ball fell to the court and Dumas got on the board with a Beauchamp soft kill. The Demonettes extended their lead to 3-0 on a pair of Hereford service receive errors — two of nine errors committed by the Lady Whitefaces in the 10-point Dumas run.

"I don't know if it was nerves, I don't know if it was a fear of

## Dallas shoots down Wings, 5-1

DETROIT (AP) — For one night at least, the Detroit Red Wings didn't belong on the same ice with the Dallas Stars.

"(The Red Wings) know when to turn it up, but hopefully we gave them something to think about," Stars coach Ken Hitchcock said after Dallas scored four times in the first period and beat the defending Stanley Cup champions 5-1 Friday night.

Ignited by Joe Nieuwendyk's goal just seven seconds into the game — the fastest in franchise history — the Stars took their second win in two meetings this season between last spring's Western Conference finalists.

But this victory was much more convincing than Dallas' 3-2 home win on Oct. 31 over the Red Wings. It was just the Stars' second win in their last 21 games

(including playoffs) at Joe Louis Arena.

"We've had some bad luck in this building for a long time,"

said forward Mike Modano, who scored Dallas' final goal. "The first period has always dictated the game here, and tonight we had a good first period."

Nieuwendyk also had two

assists in the first period. Derian Hatcher, Darryl Sydor and Grant Marshall had the other first-period goals.

Darren McCarty's second-period goal was the only one of 35 Detroit shots that got past Dallas goalie Ed Belfour. Detroit's Chris Osgood allowed four goals on 14 first-period shots before Kevin Hodson replaced him to start the second. Hodson

finished with 13 saves.

About the only suspense after Dallas' hot start was seeing how Detroit might try avenging a first-period hit from the Stars' Dan Kezmer that sent Red Wings captain Steve Yzerman to the dressing room for stitches.

Kezmer appeared to elbow Yzerman head-first into the boards and, as Yzerman slumped to the ice, McCarty went after Kezmer. McCarty drew a double minor that led to Sydor's goal.

Kezmer was a marked man the rest of the game, although no major brawls occurred. Yzerman, who returned in the second period, twice drew roughing penalties trying to mix it up with Kezmer in the third.

"Steve had to do that," Detroit's Brendan Shanahan

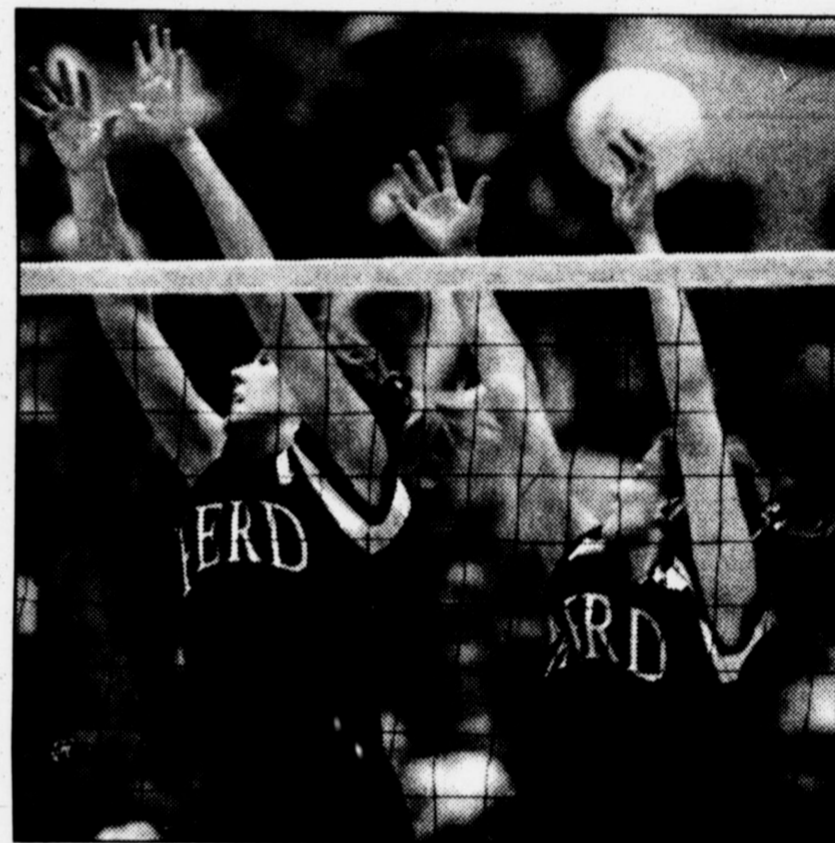

## "Wish Books" of fall have stuff sportsmen "can't do without"

**W**hat would outdoors enthusiasts do without all of the "wish books" that begin arriving by late summer, and continue to come in an avalanche throughout the fall and winter months? We might have room on the kitchen counter, next to the chair in the den, or in the bookshelf or on the computer desk if these places weren't cluttered-up with stacks of these catalogs.

Cabela's seems to send a colorful new book every time you turn around, a spring one for fishing time, early fall, a master fall catalog, another fall issue a few weeks later with the same stuff inside, but a new cover, then a Christmas catalog, too.

Herter's gets in on the act too, although their basic catalog is much-diminished from the days of old when their book was nearly as big as Sears' and they offered everything from reloading dies to gun bluing equipment and duck pluckers, plus helpful diagrams on how to set duck decoy spreads.

I wish that I had saved one of those well-worn Herter's catalogs from back in the 1970's, just for its interesting reading, and all of the helpful hints and diagrams that were included right along with the merchandise listings.

Knutson's sends a newspaper tabloid-size listing of assorted duck and goose calls and decoys, decoy line and anchors and snap swivels and such, plus camouflage netting, waders, field blinds and stuff. It comes a bit later than the books from the other outfits, but Knutson's listings are interesting to look through, and usually offer some decent buys.

Catalogs from some real-world outfits, and a lot of "yuppie gear" distributors, start coming just far-enough in advance of hunting season to get you fired-up about the prospects and convinced that you need several new pieces of the equipment so colorfully portrayed. Of course, the catalog companies promise that your order will arrive in plenty of time to use the

stuff in the field when the season begins in just a few weeks.

Back when I was growing up I spent a lot more time in the fields and the playas, and didn't have nearly so much gear, nor any that was so nice as is available today.

Duck hunting was done in a pair of irrigation boots, some coveralls or a knockabout heavy jacket, and a cap. We seldom used decoys. Usually, if you had a good outing for ducks, you came home wet, at least to the waist. With enough time, I learned that it was a good idea to keep a spare pair of jeans and extra socks in the car, so that I could change into them and warm up again once the hunt was over and the rubber boots came off.

My folks finally gave me a pair of Walls insulated coveralls that were brown camouflage pattern. Sometime in there, I got a pair of hip boots. I figured that I had arrived if I had that kind of gear. Finally, there were even chest waders, and better caps. I had never heard of Cabela's until some hunting clients from Colorado showed up for an outing so completely outfitted that even the spare tire on their Chevy wore a covering adorned with a flying Canada goose. In response to my inquiry about

where they had gotten all of that stuff, they told me of the mystic mail-order marketplace called Cabela's.

From Cabela's pages, one may order clothing adorned with any camouflage pattern known to modern marketing, plus a million-and-one accoutrements.

A lot of their stuff isn't half-bad for the money, and generally, they get it to you in a hurry.

Their insulated hunting boots allowed me the discovery, some years ago, that it is possible to go on a goose hunt without your toes turning to ice.

What's the best thing in the Cabela's catalog? Hard to say—there's so much to choose from, but there's a gear combination that has to rank right up there.

They offer gray "liner socks" that are to be worn beneath a heavier sock. The liners are lightweight and comfortable, and wick moisture away from your feet.

If you're headed into a bitter day, a pair of "Norwegian army wool socks" pulled over these liners will work wonders at keeping your feet warm and comfortable, which does a lot to help your staying power in the early morning hours in the goose spread.

The liners and socks feel great—like an air cushion on your feet—as you tiptoe to the back door where those good insulated boots, your cap, the Columbia widgeon parka that you finally decided that you were worth, and all of the other mail-order gear you just couldn't resist is stashed in anticipation of slipping-out into the wee hours of a waterfowl hunter's morning without awakening the whole of civilization.

Ruth homer ball fetches \$126,500

NEW YORK (AP) — Add a new Ruthian number for the Babe: \$126,500.

That was the price paid Friday for the ball he hit in 1923 for the first home run in Yankee Stadium — a record for a baseball sold at auction. The ball was discovered in a New Jersey attic two years ago.

"It's the best baseball we've ever sold and the price showed it," said Mike Heffner, managing director of Leland's Auctions.

Four people bid on the ball, which is signed by Ruth, and the winning bid came by telephone from a buyer who did not want to be identified. The bid was \$110,000 and the total price includes the auction house's 15 percent commission.

Two year ago, the ball Eddie Murray hit for his 500th home run was sold for what one day could be \$500,000. Michael Lasky, the founder of the Psychic Friends Network, paid \$280,000 that was put in an annuity to be paid over 20 years. With interest, the annuity will be worth about \$500,000, according to a spokesman for Lasky, who also operates as syndicated handicapper Mike Warren.

Lasky bought the ball from Dan Jones, a Towson, Md., salesman who caught it.

The previous record for an auctioned baseball was \$93,500 for the ball that went through Bill Buckner's legs, allowing the

New York Mets to beat the Boston Red Sox in Game 6 of the 1986 World Series. That ball was bought by actor Charlie Sheen in 1992.

Mark Scala, a graphic designer from Ramsey, N.J., found the Ruth ball two years ago in the attic of his grandmother's house in Irvington, N.J.

After Scala's son, Chris, dressed up as Ruth for a school project on famous Americans, 87-year-old Viola Bevilacqua remembered the ball that was given to her husband as a prize in 1927 for making the New Jersey all-state high school team.

The ball, hit by Ruth on Yankee Stadium's opening day in 1923, was kept in the attic of the house she has lived in since 1946.

Roger Craig's 1955 Brooklyn Dodgers World Series ring was sold for \$18,785 (all prices include the 15 percent commission). The former pitcher, fired as manager of the San Francisco Giants in 1992, consigned his entire collection for auction and is giving the money to his grandchildren to pay for their education, Heffner said.

An autographed ball from President Franklin Roosevelt that he used to throw out the ceremonial first pitch before the 1941 season opener at Griffith Stadium sold for \$17,255, and a personal check signed Henry Louis Gehrig sold for \$15,306.

something," Kitten said. "We just did not come out swinging aggressively. We didn't come out firing. We were helping Dumas get points..."

Hereford began the slow climb back with a seemingly innocuous net violation on the Demonettes. But the Lady Whiteface rallied from that humble beginning to take 14 of the last 16 points.

The Lady Whitefaces closed the gap considerably behind the serve of senior Sarah Matthews, scoring four straight points to trim the margin from 11-4 to 11-8 on a Tori Walker kill.

Hereford tied the match 12-all on a Christy Schumacher kill to the Demonettes' deep middle and then used three straight kills from Walker to finish out the game.

"We choked, we just choked," Wilson said. "But you have to give Hereford credit. We started to make mistakes and they'll eat you alive when you do that because they're a good team - they're good enough to be state champions this year."

"What we wanted to do was take the momentum from coming back (in the first game),"

## Broncos fined for not revealing Elway injury

DENVER (AP) — The NFL fined the Denver Broncos \$15,000 Friday for not disclosing a rib injury that limited quarterback John Elway to just five plays last week against the San Diego Chargers.

Elway, listed as "out" for Monday night's game against Kansas City, practiced all week leading up to the San Diego game but did not come out of the locker room for kickoff.

"In my mind, there was a 99.5 percent chance that John Elway was going to play," Broncos coach Mike Shanahan said. "I'm surely not going to tell somebody the day before the game that John

has some sore ribs and make him cannon fire for the opposition."

"If John had started the game, there wouldn't have been any (fine). John didn't start the game and therefore we've got to pay the punishment. That was my decision, my fault, so I'll play the \$15,000."

Each week, the NFL asks teams to list their injured players in four categories: "out," meaning there is no chance of playing; "doubtful," if he has a 25-percent chance of playing; "questionable," if he has a 50-percent chance of playing; and "probable," meaning he is likely to play.

## Anniversary of local church marks 25 years of growth in community

Community Church will celebrate its 25th anniversary with Sunday services at 10 a.m. today with Morris Means as speaker, followed by a Thanksgiving dinner in Hereford Community Center.

Community Church was formed on Nov. 4, 1973, by a home group made of a number of people from different denominations.

The group, which met in the home of Dorman and Jani Duggan and Jerry and Joyce Landers, began to grow spiritually and in numbers. They outgrew the homes and Westway Community Building was suggested as a possible church building.

The name "Community Church" was given to the church and the first service was held on Feb. 10, 1974. In August 1974 Morris Means was called as pastor.

With Means as pastor, the church continued to grow and by 1977 had outgrown the Westway building.

Construction on a new building, at 15th and Whittier, began in July 1977. The first service was held in the completed structure on Feb. 19, 1978 and the dedication took place on April 9, 1978, with Jim Darnell as speaker.

In June 1978, Dorman Duggan became the full-time assistant pastor.

Means served as pastor until 1982 then moved to Blossom. Duggan became the pastor with Raul Valdez as assistant pastor.

The parents of Community Church has a vision of Christian education for their children, thus "Community Christian School" was established through the joint efforts of those parents. School began in September 1981.

The first three years the school operated as an ACE school, with Duggan as principal the first year. The fourth year brought changes with the adoption of the ABeKa curriculum which implemented a traditional classroom setting.

The school has maintained an enrollment between 50 and 80 students and offers classes from kindergarten through 12th grade, with graduation services each year.

In addition to Duggan, four others have served as principal - Raul Valdez, Eric Alexander, George Rushing and Jan Wilks, who holds the position currently.

The wing of the church which houses the school was built in 1988.

"God's anointing has clearly been upon the administration and teachers throughout the years to meet the educational and spiritual needs of our students. It is a major ministry of our church," Duggan said.

Over the years, Community Church has been involved in several local ministries such as Aglow, Full Gospel Business Mens, Flame, Problem Pregnancy, Prison Ministries and Pro-Life.

Duggan has also been active in Hereford Ministerial Alliance during his 20 years as pastor at Community Church.

Within the church there are home groups, youth groups, children's church, intercessory prayer group, praise team Sunday services.

"Many years ago our church received a prophecy which said that we would be an Antioch church where saints would be taught and then sent out to minister to others. We have seen this prophecy come to pass," Duggan said.

"We can see God's hand as He fanned the spark in the lives of a small group of believers in 1973, to produce a flame that has touches many lives and places throughout these 25 years," he concluded.

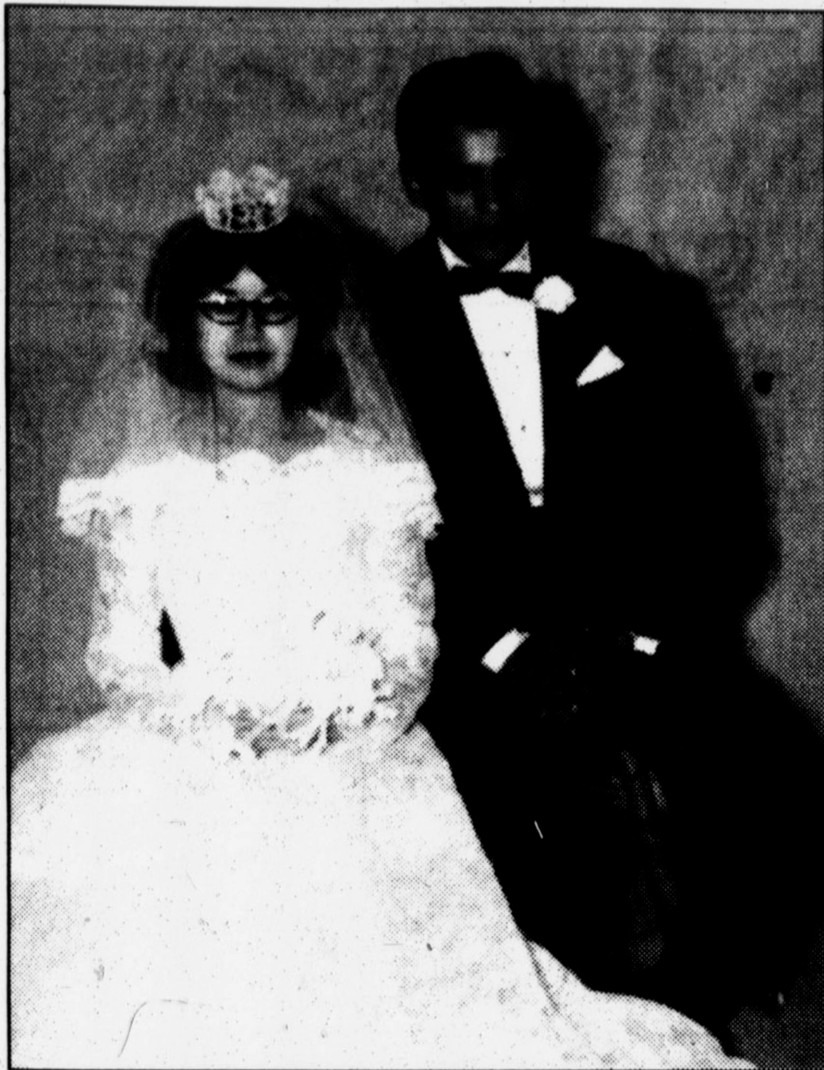

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At age 80, I learned that to love and be loved is the greatest joy in the world.

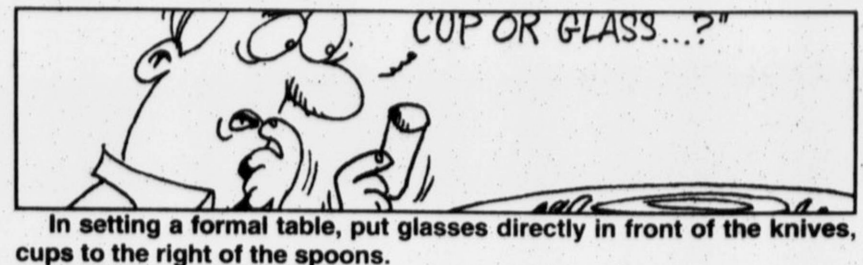

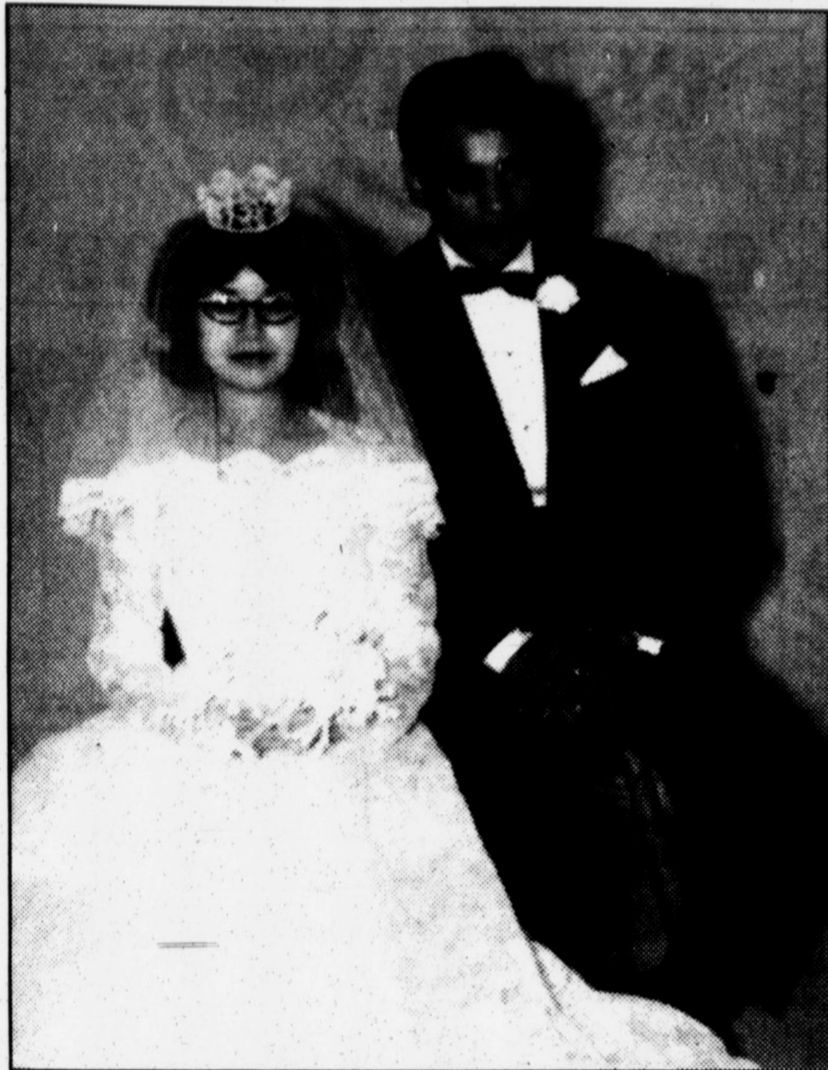

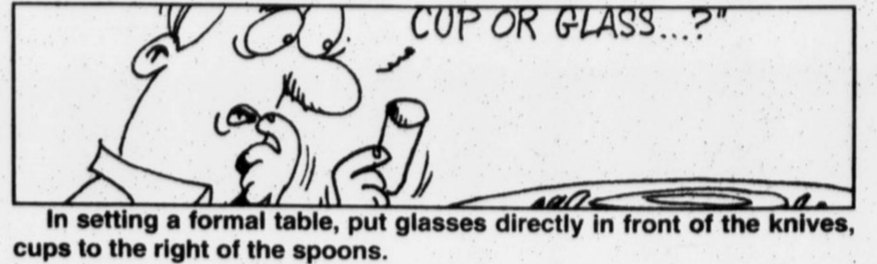

Dear Readers: Anyone owning pets

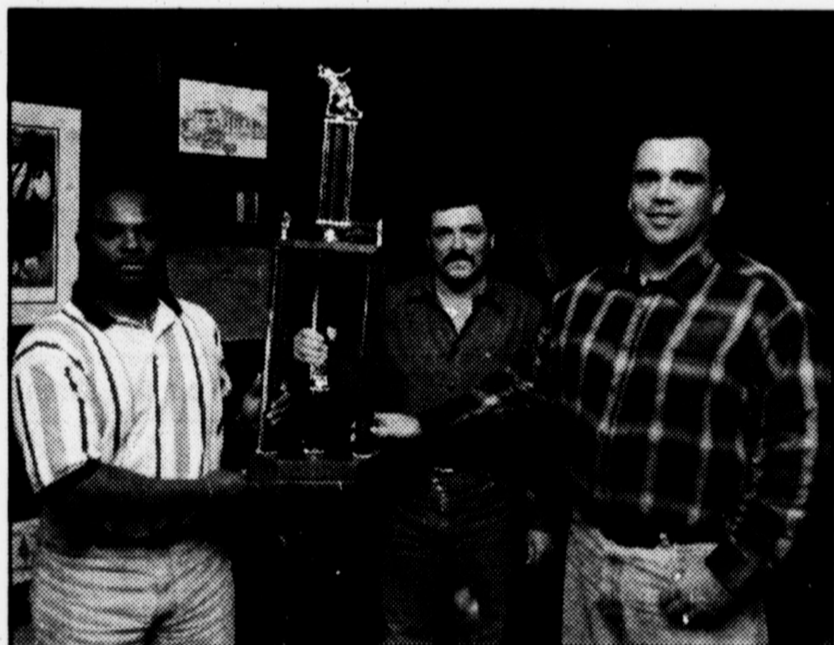

### Seeds of Smallness Fifteen factors for failure

(Last of a two-part series)

In part one of this series, I gave you seven of the 15 factors for failure. One of the best ways to identify failures is to listen to what they say. The failure's words are negative, uncaring and self-serving. Their words become the seeds they plant for a harvest of smallness.

Read on my friends, and study the words of flops. If you avoid sowing the seeds of failure, you can reap a harvest of success and great achievement.

#### Thoughts for failure

• **I don't care.** This phrase actually means, "I want what I want this moment and the consequences down the road are of no concern to me." Watch people who say, "I don't care." You will often find them focused on *now* while avoiding the results that come *later*.

• **It's too late.** What the failures are actually saying here is that they are unwilling to pay the price. This is a cop out and a way to avoid work. It is seldom too late to do the right thing. Failure is easy; success carries a high price tag made up of work and diligence.

• **I didn't think.** Henry Ford said, "Thinking is the hardest work there is, which is the probable reason why so few engage in it." James Allen said, "You are today where your thoughts have brought you; you will be tomorrow where your thoughts take you." I might add that if you think "after" you act it will increase your chances for failure.

• **I don't have an education.** This phrase means "I dropped out of high school" or "I don't want to go to college." "I can't afford to go to college," is not true today. Though education is costly, it is much less expensive than ignorance. A lack of education is no excuse except to the failures.

• **I quit.** When the going gets tough, quit. Failure is achieved by those who quit. (Especially, by those who quit just a little too soon.) I remember reading a story as a child. It was about a man caught in a blizzard. He walked for hours

trying to get home. Finally, he gave up, laid down in the snow and rested. The following morning his family found his frozen body just a few yards from his front door.

• **I'm just as good as my friends.** The real question here is, "Are you soaring with the eagles or trotting with the turkeys?" Failures are always happy to be just like everyone else. It's the "I'm OK, you're OK," syndrome. This may mean: I'm happy being mediocre if you're happy being mediocre. Choose your friends carefully, or they will ensure your failure.

• **I'm too tired.** One of my favorite sayings is this: Everyday about 5 p.m. we must decide whether we are genuinely tired or just lazy. The failure quits at the first sign of fatigue. Those who rise above, understand that what you achieve after you feel like stopping is the main difference between you and failure. When fatigue sets in, take a short break. ## To Your Good Health

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am tired all day long, from the moment of waking, until I go to bed. I have consulted two doctors. One said I had chronic fatigue syndrome. The other said there is no such thing. Whom do I believe? — M.M.

ANSWER: Even though there are no lab tests, no X-rays, no scans for chronic fatigue syndrome, experts, with impeccable credentials, say there is such a thing. I, too, am a believer.

Some of the criteria that define this syndrome are memory impairment, recurring sore throats and tender lymph nodes. Muscle and joint pain are common. So are headaches. A night of sleep fails to refresh a patient who experiences overwhelming fatigue, which usually persists for six months.

The biological basis for chronic fatigue rest on several facts. It's found in people with diverse backgrounds,

occupations, and ethnic heritages. Often it's ushered in by a viral illness. Both observations argue against chronic fatigue syndrome being a hypochondriacal illness.

Its cause is puzzling. Perhaps that's why some doctors doubt it's a bona fide illness. Researchers have looked for a viral cause. Some implicate a persistent and abnormally low blood pressure. No one has offered conclusive evidence for a cause.

If your blood pressure is on the low side and if it dips when you stand up, ask the doctor if it's OK to add more salt to your food. (Ask the believing doctor.)

A nutritious, high-fiber diet and eight glasses of water a day often have a beneficial effect.

Exercise might free a person from the grip of chronic fatigue. Start out modestly with five minutes of walking. Every week add one or two more minutes until 30 minutes of continu-

ous walking have been reached.

I'm sending you the report on chronic fatigue. It explains in greater detail what's happening. Readers can order it by writing: Dr. Donohue — No. 46, P.O. Box 5539, Riverton, NJ 08077-5539.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My mother suffered a mild stroke last year. She takes Plendil and Maxide. Everything she eats has a bitter taste. Do you have any suggestions? — C.F.

ANSWER: Of the two medicines your mother takes, Maxide — a water pill — might be implicated in altering taste sensations. Have her ask her doctor for a substitute to see if Maxide is the cause.

If your mother brushes her teeth and tongue before and after eating, the terrible taste might go away.

Extracts of unsweetened chocolate and coffee can eliminate bitter tastes. Sprinkle minute amounts on food. It's much like fighting fire with fire.

## Unusual weather patterns impact local crops

### Producers and ag businesses see cotton, sorghum yields drop

There's no dryland and there's no dry land is an oft-heard sentiment right now among area farmers and other agribusinesses.

On the one hand, producers are saying dryland farms failed to produce much of anything this year.

With the low soil moisture, early spring heat, drying winds and drought, dryland farms just didn't produce crops.

On the other hand, the farmers mentioning no dry land are referring to the recent rains, though badly needed, now are preventing producers from getting in the fields to harvest sorghum and cotton.

"We need some sunshine," said Joe Artho, manager of the Hereford Grain elevators. "Sorghum harvests are just beginning, but it's looking better than we expected."

"Some farmers didn't put as much into the crop as usual and they'll be OK. But the dryland guys out near Bootleg are a complete write-off," he said.

Artho said the grain which has been brought in is still a

little wet, but the yield appears to be at least average.

The recent rains, which have brought the annual precipitation to within 2 1/2 inches

of normal, give some farmers hope for a better crop next year.

"We've had several come in and say their winter wheat is

doing well since the rain. It's ridiculous that we got all that rain within 30 days when it would have done some good if were more spread out," Artho

said. If the area gets a little sunshine, Artho said, producers should be able to bring in the sorghum in a matter of a few weeks.

Cotton, which got a late start and had to endure the drought, was just at the point of harvest -- most was waiting for a freeze to kill the greenery -- when the rains came and stopped the stripping.

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service expects a 3 million bale harvest -- a 42 percent decrease in the number of bales harvested last year.

Yield is now expected to average 472 pounds per acre, 7 pounds less than last year. This year's drought, as bad as it was for most producers, may prove beneficial for some growers though.

Growers like Garrison & Townsend, who plant breeding stock, take rare opportunities to develop and breed varieties that do well in the hot, arid regions of the Southwest as well as varieties that are much better suited to the cooler wetter climates of the Northern United States and Europe.

Jerry O'Rear, Garrison & Townsend's breeding line man-

ager, said that in year's such as this one gives breeders the opportunities to develop the special varieties which each area needs.

"Individual varieties are planted and select female plants have the head covered before pollination," O'Rear said. "Then at the appropriate time the covers are removed, the plants are hand pollinated with varieties with desirable traits, then is recovered to prevent cross pollination."

Using these select plants, breeders are able to breed for the exact type of plant desired.

"Some of the stuff that looks really bad in our breeding nursery will do very well in other parts of the country," said O'Rear.

He said 40-60 percent of the varieties will be discarded due to few desirable characteristics.

Even with work being done by groups like Garrison & Townsend to develop drought- and weather-resistant varieties, state statisticians forecast a 46 percent decrease in sorghum.

Sorghum yields are expected to be 840 pounds per acre less than last year's harvest.

## Pork producers see lowest prices in nearly 30 years

PEORIA, Ill. (AP) — The nation's pork producers, struggling with a supply glut, are getting the lowest prices in almost 30 years for their livestock. But the farmers contend grocers are making big profits nonetheless by selling overpriced chops, roasts and sausages.

Pork farmers are starting to put retailers around Chicago, the nation's third-largest market, under pressure to help the farmers growers bring home their share of the bacon. They want grocers to lower store prices, which would encourage people to eat more pork and increase demand for the meat.

The prices farmers got for hogs fell 39 percent in the 12 months ending Sept. 30 and have fallen further since, the U.S. Agriculture Department said. But the government estimates that retail pork prices have declined only 1.5 percent.

"Consumers should be aware that hog prices are low enough to create some bargain pork prices," said Dennis Vercler, an Illinois Farm Bureau spokesman.

To that end, volunteers for the Farm Bureau and the Illinois Pork Producers announced Tuesday they will track pork prices in supermarkets around Chicago and compare them with wholesale prices.

Whole hogs, for instance, were selling for about 18 cents a pound this week, presenting farmers with losses of \$20 to \$50 per hog. In a Chicago supermarket, butterfly-cut pork chops were selling at \$6.08 a pound, with other chops ranging in price from \$2.79 a pound to \$5.19 a pound.

But USDA economist Annette Clauson said the price gap between wholesale and retail takes time to narrow.

"Look back to 1996, when

(farmers) were receiving record prices for their hogs. Retail food prices only went up 9.9 percent," Ms. Clauson said. "Your retail prices never go up as much as your farm or wholesale prices."

And supermarket groups such as the Illinois Retail Merchants Association and the Washington-based Food Marketing Institute noted that re-

tail prices also must reflect costs for slaughtering, processing and shipping.

Consumers also tend to buy pork when it is on sale, the trade groups say.

But a nationwide glut of beef, poultry and pork has forced slaughterhouses, flush with supplies and running at record capacity, to lower their asking bids and allowed su-

permarkets to reap the rewards, leaving producers out of the equation.

The glut came after farmers boosted production, betting incorrectly that world demand would rise sharply this year. The plan was short-circuited by major economic problems abroad. The rise of large-scale hog farms also contributed to the problem.

Iowa is the nation's largest hog state, with about 18,000 producers, followed by North Carolina, Minnesota, Illinois, Missouri, Indiana, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Ohio.

Unlike other commodity growers angry over low prices, hog farmers won't be protesting or picketing, said Vercler, the Illinois Farm Bureau

spokesman. He was careful to choose his words, saying he does not want to alienate retailers.

"This is not a protest. Farmers and retailers are partners," he said. "It's not about price-gouging or bashing the middle man, but there is a difference of opinion about the proper level of retail pricing."

## Texas sweet potato crop falls short Consumers expect higher prices

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Sweet potato producers in East Texas may not get to enjoy the profits they hoped for, with the crop yield falling to less than 30 percent of normal.

For consumers, this could mean higher prices and out-of-state potatoes in the supermarket, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports.

Because of extreme drought conditions and scorching temperatures, this year's sweet potatoes failed to develop. Extension horticulturist Marvin Baker said the poor potato yields will hurt producers as well as potato shed operators.

"This crop is so pitiful that people who have storage sheds are calling out of state to find sweet potatoes to fill their sheds," he said. "The root temperatures were just so hot,

around 97 to 108 degrees, that they did not swell and bust out like they're supposed to."

Mississippi, Louisiana, North Carolina and California all harvested profitable sweet potato crops. Baker said that although there is not much difference in these out-of-state crops, East Texas sweet potatoes are known for their smooth skins.

"Texas-grown sweet potatoes always sell well because of the high quality of their skins" because of the sand they are grown in, Baker said. "It just so happens this year, though, that these same sands hurt the crop by not holding the water we did have."

Tommy Phillips, Wood County Extension agent, said sweet potato conditions in Quitman are disastrous.

"Less than 20 percent of

the crop is being harvested, and most of the crop has rotted in the fields because of the recent heavy rains," he said. "Nobody can get digging equipment in the fields because of the mud, and so the potatoes have had to sit for two weeks. It's a total loss."

Baker said this year's loss will affect the market for several years. Because of the magnitude of the losses, families will have to switch to other crops to make ends meet.

"This terrible crop will force many of the 53 families here that grow sweet potatoes to go to watermelons or maybe nothing at all," he said. "In the 12 years I've been here I've never seen this kind of a lack of crop without disease or insects. It was just the plain old heat that got them this year."

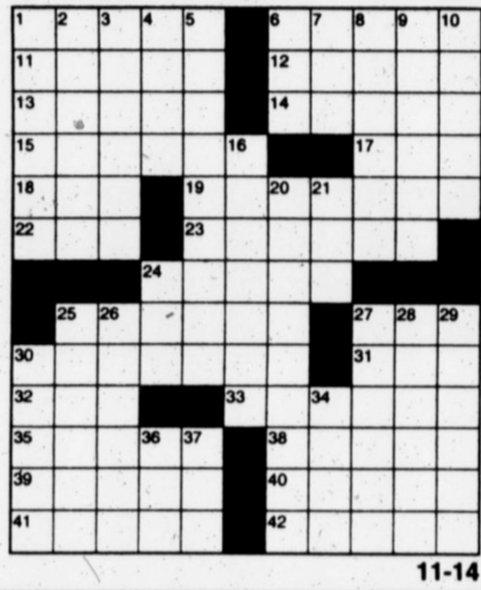

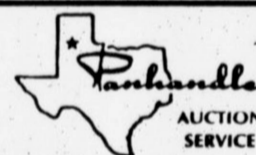

**NEW HOME EQUITY LENDING LAW GIVES TEXAS HOMEOWNERS KEY CONSUMER PROTECTIONS**

AUSTIN — A new statewide study shows an overwhelming majority of Texans believe that consumer safeguards in the new home equity law are important.

During the 75th Texas Legislature, lawmakers reversed a 150-year ban on home equity loans in Texas. Texas' new home equity lending law, which went into effect Jan. 1, constitutionally guarantees consumer protections that most states don't have.

Some argue that the consumer protections should be relaxed to permit more than 3 percent in lender's fees and loans of up to 125 percent of a home's value. Meanwhile, others caution that these options wouldn't be sound business practices. The Texas Association of Realtors championed the strong consumer protections that the Texas Legislature wrote into the law.

"Without these important protections, Texans could lose their homes, fall too deeply into debt, or pay too much in fees," said Charles McMillan, president of the statewide Realtors' organization.

So far in Texas, the demand for home equity loans and the supply of lenders to handle the business has been robust. One lender reports more than \$700 million of home equity business in the first eight months the law was on the books, with a projected \$1 billion by the end of 1998.

According to the financial community, the home equity lending market in Texas is estimated at more than \$6 billion a year now and \$20 billion annually within four years.

Lenders have jumped into the market and Texas homeowners have taken advantage of the new law, which allows them to borrow against the equity in their homes for a variety of purposes.

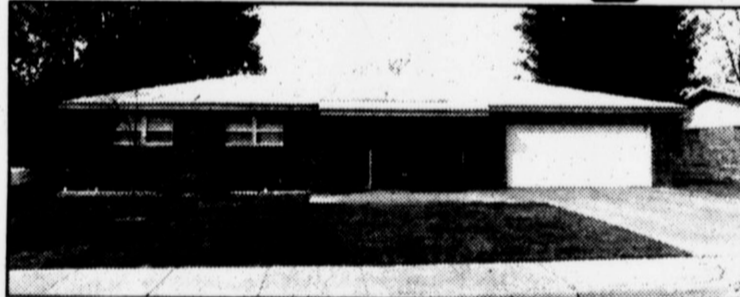
**Key provisions of the new law:**

1. A homeowner's total debt cannot exceed 80 percent of the home's value.
2. A judge's permission is required before lenders can foreclose on a home.
3. Fees charged for home equity loans cannot be more than 3 percent of the principal.

The statewide opinion survey, conducted Sept. 11-21 by The Eppstein Group, shows that 83 percent believe it's important to maintain strong consumer protections for home equity borrowing.

Thirty-one percent of respondents said they would most likely use a home equity loan for home improvement projects, 14 percent said they'd be more likely to use one for education expenses, and 10 percent cited debt consolidation as the main reason they'd consider it. Only 12 percent of those surveyed had actually taken out a home equity loan.

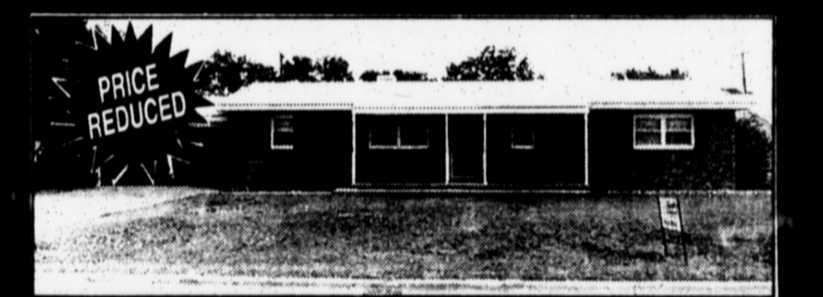

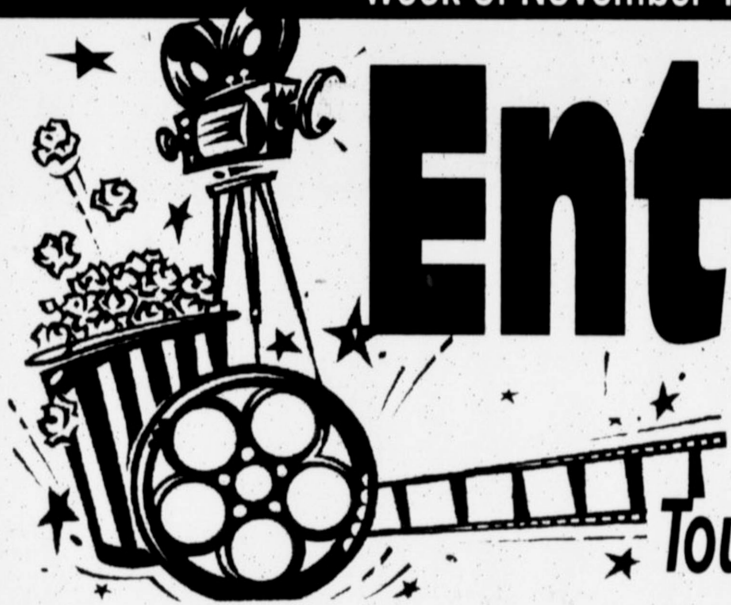

*Touched by an Angel* soars to 100-episode mark

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There's no doubt in Roma Downey's mind that *Touched by an Angel* was heaven-sent.

Now in its fifth season, the hit CBS drama presents its 100th episode Sunday, Nov. 15. Downey still is counting her blessings.

"It wasn't that long ago I was a struggling actor in New York, doing off-Broadway, waiting tables, doing whatever one has to do to keep body and soul together," Downey recalls. "I'm thrilled to have a steady gig, a good job, to be on a hit show. All of that is fantastic."

"But you add to that this (knowledge of being) part of something that is having such a good effect."

"I feel like playing Monica for five seasons has made me a better person. I'm a better listener, a better friend. It kind of rubs off, you know?"

In Sunday's episode, titled "Psalm 151," country singer Wynonna follows in the thespian footsteps of her sister, Ashley Judd, making her acting debut as the mother of a child with cystic fibrosis. Still riding the *Titanic* wave, Celine Dion has a cameo as herself.

The singers' appearance isn't coincidental. A *Touched by an Angel* album is about to be released, with cuts by Wynonna, Dion, Downey's co-star Della Reese and others.

"The episode itself is very strong," Downey says. "It was written by our executive producer, Martha Williamson. And true to *Touched by an Angel* form, as sad as it is, it has a kind of an inspirational thread throughout."

Downey believes the series' consistent message has made it a success.

"The show comes with a very simple message, really, that there is a God, and that God loves you," she says.

"We try very hard to make sure that the God that we as angels work for doesn't come across as being a Christian God ... or whatever, but simply the

God of love."

That approach struck a chord in the heartland.

"A lot of shows become hits in the bigger cities (first)," Downey explains.

"It seemed like *Touched by an Angel* became a big hit in the middle of the country, in the South, in small towns, then sort of spread to the bigger cities.

"I meet people all the time who say they make a date with their families to watch the show together."

Downey has no trouble picking her own favorite episodes of the series.

"I have a very fond memory of an episode in our early days, a show about homelessness, starring Gregory Harrison," she says. "I was also especially proud of our season finale last year, a two-hour special called 'The Spirit of) Liberty Moon' that tackled the civil rights issue in China."

In the future, Downey would like to set an episode in her native Northern Ireland.

"I've been talking to Martha about that, and I have a feeling this could be the year. Obviously it's something near and dear to my heart," she says.

But divine intervention has a way of keeping its own timetable.

"There's an awareness on our show that we're part of something that's bigger than all of us," Downey says. "We're part of something that has the potential to touch people's lives in a very positive way."

"I think that makes everybody, from the stars to the people on our crew, very proud to get up and go to work in the morning. It makes it more than just a TV show."

Millions of *Touched by an Angel* fans would agree.

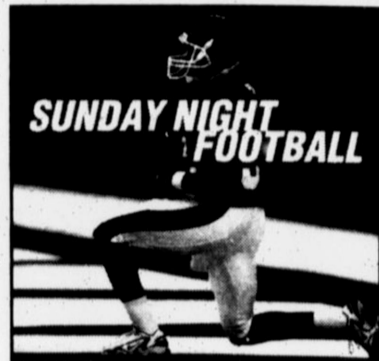

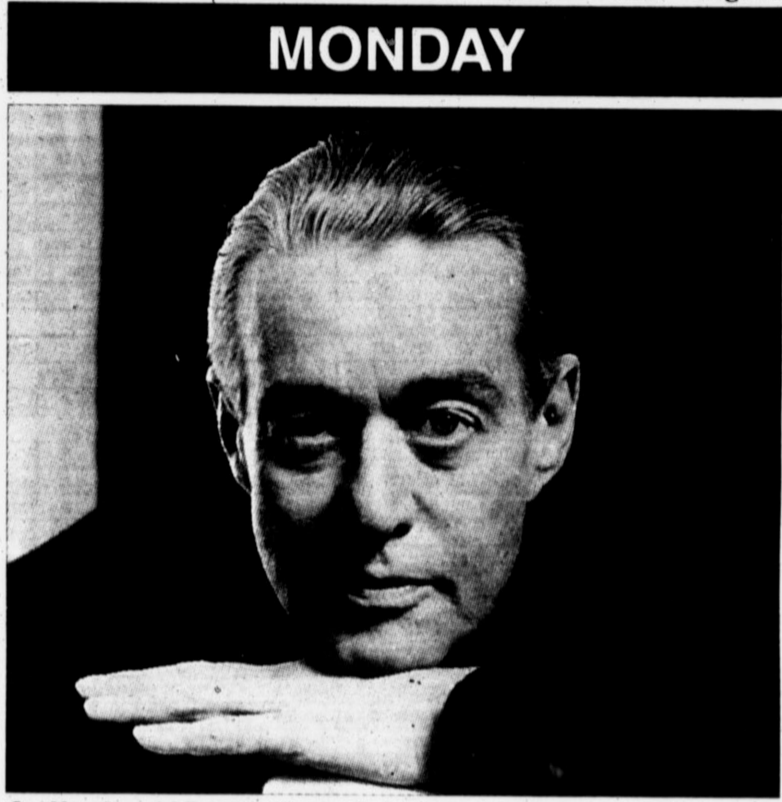

**Strauss plays victim and villain in fact-based murder drama**

"Blood is a very hard thing, as Lady Macbeth will verify, to get rid of."  
 Actor Peter Strauss invokes one of the theater's most famous murder scenes to make a point about a very real 20th-century killing.

In *My Father's Shadow: The Sam Sheppard Story*, airing Tuesday, Nov. 17, on CBS, Strauss plays the surgeon convicted in 1954 of brutally murdering his pregnant wife (Lindsay Frost). The case drew national attention and inspired the TV drama *The Fugitive*.

Henry Czerny plays the doctor's son, Sam R. Sheppard, as an adult. Like Hamlet, he is haunted by his father's ghost, a belligerent, abusive character the son feels compelled to defend.

The Sheppards were one of Cleveland's leading families; paterfamilias R.A. Sheppard founded the hospital where his sons, Sam and Robert (John Bourgeois), were both on staff. Sam had a weakness for women, and his affairs, though unconnected to the case, counted heavily against him during the murder trial.

"It intrigues me how much of a failure the defense attorneys were," Strauss says. "This woman suffered 35 blows to the head by a left-handed assailant. (Sheppard was right-handed.) The athletic trophies Sam Sheppard had won were all broken. And he didn't have (blood) on him. All these things point in a direction other than Sam Sheppard."

Still, Sheppard is not a heroic or even a very sympathetic figure, and Strauss' forceful performance does a fine job of preserving the script's ambivalence.

"The challenge (was) to play a man who is a villain and a victim at the same time," Strauss notes. "(I wondered,) how can you portray someone honestly as a 'dysfunctional' human being and at the same time make him vulnerable?"

Legally, the case remains unsolved. Strauss believes the younger Sheppard "is still finding it difficult to move forward with his life."

"In the end what I get is a feeling of discomfort. (The film) is unsettling," Strauss says. "Human stories sometimes don't wrap themselves up into neat little packages."

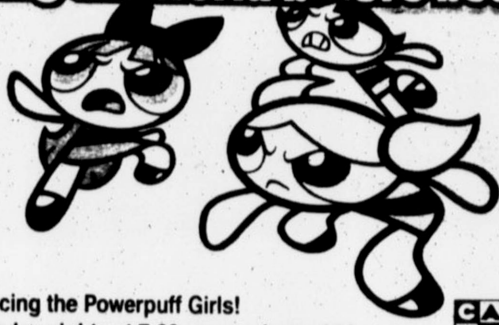
