District Meet In Last Minute "Write-In" Water Charge To Start Next Week

Sell Above Par

A. O. Thompson, secretary-treasurer of the Hereford national farm word from the governor of the Farm Credit Administration, Wm. I. Myers, telling him of the ready reception which farmers and their creditors are giving to the bonds of the Federal Farm Mortgage Corporation which are now being tendered by the Federal Land Bank of Houston in place of cash in settlement of farmers' debts.

"These bonds have been selling in the large markets at a little above par, indicating a ready market for them. Just a week after the banks began using bonds instead of cash, the first bonds to be sold on the New York market were purchased at 100 3-4. We anticipate these bonds which bear 3¼ per cent interest per annum would sell at par or above at the time we set the interest rate, for Clubs to Help Government bonds maturing in 1941; bearing the same rate were selling above par."

Mr. Myers pointed out that these bends were not only exempt from local, State and Federal taxation with the exception of surtaxes, inberitance and gift taxes, but that they are as readily saleable as Government securities. He said they are being quoted in the metropolitan papers but if such quotations are not available readily to farmers that they will be given the quotations if they will write to the Federal land bank of their district.

An Object Lesson

A beautiful and, fortunately, inexpensive, lesson on the importance of voting was given in election of school trustees here last Saturday.

Three candidates were on the ballot seeking three vacancies on the board of the Hereford Independent School District. The polls opened to the south was soon to be openat the usual hour and the voting was as light as usual, only about 40 persons having balloted at 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

From that hour on there was an influx of voters. More than 60 went to the polls, wrote in the names of three men whose names were not on the ballot and elected them. Obviously the coup was planned. And fortunately the men selected by the forces engineering the move are highly competent and of high rank in the community.

But if three undesirables had been chosen there would be howls to high heaven and most of them would come from persons-like the writer-who did not go to the trouble of voting because the candidates were satisfactory and without opposition.

It now appears Deaf Smith county's one opportunity to have payed highway to the outside world is going to fail through default. will go forward just as people stand Reference is made, of course, to Highway 33 east of Hereford to connect with the paving at the Randall county boundary.

As the matter stands the Highway Department has just finished building grade and drainage structures. Now the department has agreed to furnish materials, truck hire and supervision for giving the new roadbed a caliche surface with topping that would make it a paved road. 


