

A holiday must be declared in politics and we must settle down to a well defined course of thrift and economy. More than ever, our economic salvation rests upon our ability to lay aside trivial differences and personal wants, and to settle

"The problem of taxation is a subject of such unlimited dimensions that a brief and hasty conclusion on any phase thereof will often, and more than likely, prove impractical. Now, as ever, the views maintained are so varied and divergent that a proponent of any one measure inevitably finds himself entangled in a mesh of a thousand conflicting interests, each of which seeks to shift the burden to the other. and the necessities of life, the ad valorem tax be totally abolished. With this accomplished, let us make an exhaustve and thorough study of the multiple problems presented in the redistribution and equalization of taxation to the end that a measure of justice and equity may be accorded to all.

"Of our natural resources, the gas problem most vitally affects this area. I am for the unqualified, positive and absolute conservation of this great natural resource. Four years have passed since our first gas conservation law was enacted, yet, since this time, the amount of gas wasted represents enough to supply all of the present domestic consumers of Texas for a period of 50 years.
