My farms are located west of Hereford and in the block which has been taken over by the Soil Conservation Service. I have been watching the results of their work in terracing and especially contouring and I am convinced that if our farmers follow the plans, advice and demonstrations of the Soil Conservation project, we will bring the country back to its most prosperous productive years. Of the many thousands of trees which they have planted in our county, I am of the opinion that that undertaking will be successful. Altogether, I believe that the work of this soil conservation undertaking is one of the greatest things ever introduced in the Panhandle. B. A. Atchley: I have signed a

cooperative agreement with the Soil Conservation Service because every other program that I had signed up with the Government had been a benefit to me. After seeing the good that has been done by the work completed, I say to sign and get as much good as you can out of it, because these programs have been life-savers to the community in general.

G. C. Hartman: Contour farming, in my opinion for some time, is the only way to farm. I had rather contour my pasture than my field as it does more good for the amount of work that I have to do. I baven't lost any water during this rainy spell where I done any contour work. If had not had my pasture contoured, I would have lost at least water, and these rains have been low in falling. I am beartily in favor of the tree program and think that every farmer should try to raise trees. These trees have a better chance to grow than the average farmer's trees because they get more water than normally falls on them.

Ray L. Johnson: Had my land een terraced and contour furowed, I could have saved all of the four inches of rain which has fallen in the last few days. I am sure that I have lost at least two inches of it. The moisture has penetrated about eight or ten inches. I am sure that had all the noisture been held on the land it would have penetrated to the lepth of 20 to 24 inches, or maydeeper. My land is what is sidered level. On more sloping land than mine the run-off bas been greater and the penetration six to seven inches.




