
Mrs. E. C. Eubanks of this city, author of many magazine tories and articles, received an acceptance letter from the McFadden Publications last Saturday for her latest story regarding a 42-year-old murder, which took place in Lynn county, Missouri. The publishing company informed the local author that her story would be used in one of the nationally known detective magazines at a date to be announced

The story, which is titled "Murder Men of Missouri," has a double interest to citizens of this area. It was not only written by a Hereford journalist, but the father of Mrs. J. B. Jones of his city plays a part in the story of the murder which took place in 1804. Her father, Dr. Van Wye, held the inquest over the bodies of the victims, Gus Meek, his wife and children, and returned a verdict of "Came to their death at the hands of Bill Taylor (a banker) and his brother George ;a farmer." Still another interest is found in th George is farmer." Still another interest is found in the fact that the author's step-father was sheriff of Lynn county at the time. He, James A. Nibio, removed the victims' bodies from the grave in which the murderers had placed them.

Bull Taylor was hanged in Carlton, Missouri, in 1896, but George, as far as is known, is still a tlarge.

Mrs. Eubanks has had a number of stories and articles published, but this marks her first venture into the true-crime field. The author's first published story appeared in the Brand about all years.







Hybrid No. 5 seed, received more grain, according to five men Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Caldwell who seeded one acre each in the experiment. Forty acres of alfaifa produced 210 tons of hay, with irrigation cost reaching \$165 and labor, water and baling completed at the cost of \$205. The hay was valued at \$2,520, and milk cows, hogs and turkeys grazed the fields without any apparent dam-One wheat demonstration was conducted, using pure bred variety on 20 acres of dry land. A yield of 15 bushels per acre was grown at a cost of \$10, while

the grain was valued at \$4.0. Forty-five hundred acres of pasture land were contoured, terracid, listed, deferred grazed, cleared or sodded in the demonstration, which cost an average of 10 cents per acre and improved the land at an estimated value of 50 cents per acre.

In the way of rodent control, both prairie dogs and jack rabbits were poisoned at the cost of from 10 to 20 cents per acre and resulted in a saving of \$1,925.

Of the ten active community agricultural associations in the county, an average of eight meetings were held in 1936, with an attendance total of 4,800 members. Six meetings were held in the County Agricultural Associations, which were organized in May The Rural, Electric Association, with 125 members, was organized in November for the purpose of getting electric power distri-buted through the shallow water area of the county. The County Agricultural Council has worked untiringly with making out and planning programs of conservation, erosion control, farm demon-strations, selecting committees,

and organizing communities. Instructions and supervision of lso conducted by the agent's office. Four hundred and eighty farm record books (AAA) were distributed. Six meetings were held in the spring and three in the fall for the purpose of county planning of agricultural economics.






