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New devices boost tornado watch here

Any kind of electronic or mechanical device that gives man an almost-even break with Mother Nature is worth its weight in gold during tornado season.

Hereford/Deaf Smith County emergency preparedness got a big boost recently when a satellite dish and monitor were installed to provide information on weather in the area.

"It's another tool to help us keep up with weather conditions," said Jay Spain, emergency management

coordinator for the city and county.

During a period of about four months, beginning about March 1, and especially from the middle of May to the middle of June, weather is a No. 1 concern, remarked Spain, for a variety of reasons.

Sheriff's deputies as well as Spain and his crew of volunteer firemen begin scanning the skies.

"What this satellite lets us do is anticipate -- if we see something on the screen, we can watch what's happening," continued Spain.

Since tornadic weather typically moves from southwest to northeast, Spain said, he or the assistant emergency coordinator, Mike Watts, look carefully at conditions in the vicinity of Portales, N.M.

Readings of clouds, temperatures, winds -- all the ingredients for bad weather -- may be collected off the satellite.

"It's updated regularly every 15 minutes, but when things are happening, it's only about seven or eight minutes between updates," Spain said.

The satellite transmission ordinarily will report weather conditions in the Hereford area faster than an Amarillo television or radio station can, he continued.

The radar transmission by satellite tells us where the clouds are, what they're doing," said Spain. A decision on use of warning sirens is facilitated by the information received by satellite.

Spain hates the thought of having to sound the warning sirens.

"Everybody starts running around, scared, instead of taking cover," he said. "We would run the sirens as a last resort to tell people to take cover immediately."


Spain said the criteria for sounding the sirens is very simple: the storm should be within 10 miles and appear to be headed in the direction of Hereford.

The last time the sirens were turned on, he said, was several years ago when the weather office in Oklahoma City, Okla., called to warn about a tornado building over the city.

"We saw it but it never touched down," he added.

In 1971, before current weather radar and other devices were in use, a tornado almost touched down in

Eclipse due Tuesday; take precautions on viewing

Hereford residents will have their own close encounter Tuesday when a solar eclipse dims the skies across West Texas.

Birds will go to an early roost, flowers will dip their heads, and Hereford citizens of all ages will try to take a good look at the celestial lights.

But be careful, says Dr. Milton Adams, Hereford optometrist. It could be dangerous to your sight.

Adams and other optometrists know that even a brief glimpse of the eclipse can cause permanent burns on the human retina. Children are especially vulnerable.

And even though it is alluring, there is "no safe way to look at the sun," said Dr. Glen Brindley, a professor at Texas A&M Health Science Center College of Medicine.

Local residents will get a good look at nature's show, with most of the state getting a total eclipse.

This means nearly 90 per cent of the sunlight will be blocked throughout the Panhandle. At the same time, warned experts, the sun's ultraviolet rays will not be suppressed.

"What this means is that the sun's ultraviolet rays will be as strong as they are at any Texas midday," said Dr. Brindley. "This will not be repeated in Texas until well into the 21st century."

Mark Collier, director of Work Smart at Hereford Regional Medical Center, said he was concerned about area residents suffering eye damage from looking at the solar eclipse.

He pointed out that the cornea of the human eye is highly vulnerable to ultraviolet light, or the portion of invisible light that the sun throws off.

The eclipse will begin around 9:49 a.m. on Tuesday. That is when the moon will glide slowly across the

sun, creating the annual eclipse.

In West Texas, if the weather is clear, the peak of the eclipse will be like an overcast day.

During an annual eclipse, the moon will cover all except a bright ring around the circumference of the sun. The moon is too far from the earth to totally cover the sun's surface.

Experts say the peak time will be a five-minute period beginning at 11:22 a.m. The moon will complete its celestial journey around 1:12 p.m.

Said an ophthalmologist, "That is what makes this eclipse more dangerous because the outer atmosphere won't be covered.

"People tend to think that when the sun is covered, they can look at it. This is absolutely not true."

During a 1970 solar eclipse, nearly 150 Americans suffered permanent eye damage by watching the event unfold.

Brindley said, "More than half of the victims looked at the sun directly without any type of protection. All the injuries could have been prevented."

Teachers at Hereford High School and Hereford Junior High said they weren't planning any special programs in conjunction with the eclipse.

The solar eclipse can be viewed safely by watching the shadows of trees, buildings, and landmarks.

Another method is to take two sheets of paper, one dark and one white. Place the dark sheet on the ground and punch a hole in the middle of the white sheet.

With your back to the sun, hold the white sheet away from the ground to focus a pinpoint of light on the dark sheet. As the moon passes over the

sun, the sun's shape will appear on the dark sheet of paper.

Because the sun's ultraviolet rays burn the retina, these burns can result in severe and permanent vision loss.

"Patients with retinal burns will have blurry vision," added Brindley. "This damage does not heal itself. There is no medication to cure it, and the damage cannot be repaired with surgery. Eyeglasses won't correct the blurry vision."

He said some people will know immediately that they have damaged their vision, while for others the blurry eyesight will become apparent later in life.

Another safe way to get a firsthand view of the eclipse: watch it with a pinhole camera.

Materials needed to construct a pinhole camera include a large cardboard box, aluminum foil, a white sheet of paper, tape, scissors, and a straight pin.

Cut a one-inch hole in the top center of the box; then cut out a two by five inch viewing port at the bottom center of the same side.

Tape a piece of aluminum foil over the one-inch hole, take a pin and push a hole through the foil. Then tape a sheet of white paper on the inside of the box opposite the pin hole.

To use the camera, stand with your back to the sun and hold the box over your head with the pin hole facing the sun. Watch the eclipse through the viewing port. It will be reflected on the white paper and it will be spectacular.

"Just remember that wearing sunglasses even with protective coating or welder's goggles will provide no

Former state worker files lawsuit against President

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) - President Clinton is signaling through his lawyer that he will vigorously fight a former state worker's lawsuit alleging that as governor he made an unwanted sexual advance toward her.

Robert Bennett, the high-profile Washington lawyer hired by Clinton, "called Paula Corbin Jones' lawsuit 'tabloid trash with a legal caption on it.'

Bennett said the president denies the accusation, does not even recall meeting the woman and refuses to offer a monetary settlement or apologize for "something he did not do."

The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court here Friday, accused Clinton of "sexually harassing and assaulting" Jones during a May 8, 1991 encounter at Little Rock's Excelsior Hotel, then defaming her with denials.

Jones' lawsuit states the incident violated her civil rights and seeks \$700,000 in damages for "willful, outrageous and malicious conduct."

Asked about the suit Friday, the president said: "I'm not going to dignify this by commenting on it ... I'm going back to work."

Jones, 27, said that after paying her legal fees, she would donate any damages she might win to an unspecified Little Rock charity.

She did not appear at the courthouse, but in a statement read by her lawyer she said: "This case is not

about money. This case is about character and integrity. This case is about the powerful taking advantage of the weak."

Bennett disagreed.

"This is about money and book contracts and radio and television appearances," he told a news conference in Washington.

Asked if he had negotiated with Jones' lawyers before the suit, Bennett said: "There were discussions, but I would not call them negotiations. Our position was essentially that the president would not apologize for something he did not do."

Bennett said the discussions concerned extending the statute of limitations in the civil case, set to expire this weekend.

He acknowledged the two sides had "some discussion about whether any statements at all could be made to resolve the litigation."

He did not elaborate, but The Washington Post today separately quoted Bennett as saying he offered a statement in which Clinton would concede he and Jones may have met at a state government-sponsored conference where the woman says the alleged incident took place. That offer was not acceptable to Jones, the newspaper said.


The \$1,000 scholarship is sponsored by CARQUEST Corp. as a special project of the National FFA Foundation Inc.

protection against damage from watching the sun," said Brindley.

"Looking at an eclipse through a telescope, binoculars, or camera viewfinder is especially dangerous. These instruments concentrate the sun's rays, making them even more powerful and dangerous."

"That's why we recommend that adults closely supervise children during the eclipse to make sure they aren't looking at the sun. Children's eyes are especially vulnerable to retina burns."

Poll indicates local teens feel Fay's lashing deserved

A majority of Hereford teenagers feel strongly that 18-year-old Michael Fay deserved the caning on his bare buttocks, according to results of an informal survey conducted Friday.

Fay was sentenced to six lashes with a rattan cane for vandalism in Singapore, a nation that believes in stern, swift punishment for lawbreakers.

The punishment was carried out last week despite protests from President Clinton and the offender's parents, although authorities reduced the punishment to four lashes.

Still, caning wasn't strong enough punishment for Brian Betzen, 16, who attends Hereford High School.

"I thought he should have been shot," said Betzen. "He committed a crime in their country and he should be punished according to their rules."

Mark Kuper, 18, a Hereford senior, said the fact that Singapore has one of the lowest crime rates in the world impressed him.

"I agree with what they did to him," said Kuper. "I know it's a little cruel and unusual punishment, but he's an American citizen and he's

subject to their laws. There must be a reason for Singapore's low crime rate. Maybe this is it."

Dominique Dominguez, 18, agreed with Kuper.

"That kid (Fay) should never have done the vandalism. He was living in Singapore and he should have known the consequences before he committed the crime."

Two Hereford students who felt the punishment was too harsh were Cloudy Meason, 17, and Chad Thomas, 18.

Said Meason, "I can understand harsh punishment if the crime was more serious. But I thought beating him with a cane was too severe for vandalism."

"The government doesn't do it in the United States, so why should an American citizen have it done in Singapore?"

Thomas felt Fay should have been turned over to U.S. authorities to face charges.

"I don't think they should have beat him," he stated.

The Singapore Prisons Department said Fay and nine other prisoners

were flogged at Queenstown Prison, where Fay, a high school senior, finished his fifth week of a four-month prison term for spray-painting cars and other acts of vandalism.

Jennifer Davis, 18, a Hereford senior, said she believes Fay deserved the caning. So did Daniel Schulze, 17, who added, "He did the crime, he should take the punishment."

School students were contacted on or near the high school Friday afternoon.

At the Pizza Mill and Sub Factory, Irma Louise Alonso, 24, said, "I think the punishment is great."

"If it's going to stop people from destroying other people's property, it's wonderful and I'm all for it."

Similar sentiments were expressed by Shelly Maldonado, 25, who said, "People who break the law in this country don't receive enough punishment. I think the caning was correct. I also think if a person kills somebody, that person should suffer the same fate."

Doctors who examined Fay after the caning said he was in satisfactory condition. The teenager's mother and stepfather reportedly were outraged that their son was beaten.

Haiti coup leaders enriching themselves; UN to ban trade

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP)

-The populist Jean-Bertrand Aristide was widely disliked by many Haitian businessmen during his brief term as president, but the economic collapse and unending bloodshed since his ouster by the military has left many

longing for a return to democracy.

Legitimate businessmen say the coup leaders and their allies have enriched themselves on a scale even greater than that of former dictator Francois Duvalier, whose pursuit of money was so single-minded that a new word - kleptocracy - was developed to describe his 1957-71 administration.

Current military leaders have taken control of the nation's gas, flour, rice and imported car enterprises, as well as the nation's ports, telecommunication services and electricity.

They have not developed an economic plan, nor do they offer any promise to Haiti's people other than further punishment from world nations.

In a drive led by the United States, the U.N. Security Council voted Friday to ban all trade - except for food, medicine, humanitarian relief and cooking fuel - at midnight May 21.

Other sanctions take effect immediately: a ban on all foreign travel by 600 military and police officers and their families, a recommended freeze on their foreign assets and a ban on noncommercial aviation - intended to stem drug trafficking by Haiti's rulers.

Regional weather forecasts and temperatures are provided along with surface wind direction and velocity.

Already this stormy weather season, the service has paid for itself, says Spain.

The tightened sanctions are an attempt to bring about the return of Aristide, ousted in a military coup in

September 1991 - seven months after he was sworn in as Haiti's first democratically elected president.

But while the sanctions are aimed at the military, factory owners and workers say they are bearing much of the hardship.

Former First Lady proud of two office-seeking sons

DALLAS (AP) - Former first lady Barbara Bush wasn't in town to stump for her eldest son in his bid for governor, but she did take the opportunity to tell a crowd of about 1,000 who has her vote.

Speaking Friday at a luncheon benefiting camps for children with chronic illnesses or major physical disabilities, Mrs. Bush said she and former President George Bush are "bursting with pride" that two of their sons are running for governor - one in Texas and one in Florida.

"I know that this is a nonpartisan event, but I thought you'd want to know that they're absolutely the best qualified," she said of Texas Republican gubernatorial candidate George W. Bush and his brother, Jeb Bush, who's running on the GOP ticket in Florida.

Although the former first couple have been out of the White House

only a year and a half, Mrs. Bush started her address by inquiring: "You do remember there's another George Bush, don't you?"

She entertained the Attorneys Serving the Community audience, giving them a behind-the-scenes peek at the pair's time in Washington and regaling them with tales of their return to private life in Houston.

"George will tell you that I've been terrorizing the streets of Houston in my navy blue Mercury," and, "George really has turned out to be the best little dishwasher in Texas."

Wearing her trademark set of pearls and a dark dress with circular flowers of yellow, red and blue, Mrs. Bush told the crowd she's kept busy by traveling extensively, cooking and writing a book.

While the ex-president is planning a book with "serious reflective

discussion of foreign policy," Mrs. Bush said her work "will be more along the lines of what happened under the table the night George did you know what the prime minister of Japan."

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Hereford man in Roadeo

AMARILLO -- The Texas Department of Transportation recently held its annual Truck Roadeo in the Hereford Maintenance section.

The purpose of the Roadeo is to recognize the skills of department drivers and the pride exhibited in the safe operation and maintenance of equipment.

The representative from the Hereford maintenance section was E.P. Rodriguez, who has been a maintenance technician with the department since May 1, 1983.

He completed the Roadeo with 330 out of a possible 350 points in competing against 11 other drivers.

Rodriguez will now drive against approximately 204 other drivers from across the Amarillo District, which consists of 17 counties.

The Roadeo consists of two tests of a driver's skills. Equipment inspections show the driver's ability to find several safety defects which have been planted in a department truck. Here is a sampling of editorial opinion from Texas newspapers:

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on lottery:

Money continues to roll in from the Texas lottery, raising spirits, hopes and revenue for the state treasury.

Cash flow is always welcome, especially the kind that seems both effortless and painless, but Texans who value prudence in public finance should resist the tempting vapors of euphoria.

Gambling by definition is a chancy affair, but the alluring promise of quick, easy money has spawned a rush all along the Gulf Coast to capture eager customers for the new casinos.

Texas is also debating whether to allow casino gambling here, thus competing with the attractions of neighboring states. As the competition for gamblers' dollars intensifies, within the state and beyond its borders, the stability in the lottery revenue stream will become increasingly uncertain.

That lack of stability and predictability was the primary reason for the wise decision not to link lottery revenues directly to public school financing, which requires those essential elements and remains in serious need of fundamental reform.

We were glad to see \$101 million - 60 percent more than the monthly average of \$61.2 million - deposited into the general revenue fund for March. It would be nice to plan on such returns indefinitely, but don't bet the ranch on it.

Former Sen. Krueger approved as new ambassador to Burundi

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate on Friday approved the nomination of one of its own former members, Texan Bob Krueger, as ambassador to Burundi.

Krueger, who served briefly in the Senate last year, was among 11 ambassadorial nominees gliding through the Senate without opposition. The Democrat was nominated last month by President Clinton for posting to the Central African nation.

The job could prove challenging. Wracked by ethnic violence for decades, Burundi's bloodletting was

especially fierce last year after a failed coup.

By some estimates, up to 50,000 of the nation's 5.5 million people died after the October 1993 coup attempt and another 600,000 to 700,000 fled to neighboring Zaire, Rwanda and Tanzania.

Krueger, 58, has had a long history in Texas politics.

He was appointed in January 1993 by Gov. Ann Richards to the Senate

after Lloyd Bentsen resigned to become treasury secretary. Five months later, Krueger left the Senate after being trounced at the polls by Republican Kay Bailey Hutchison.

The New Braunfels native served two terms in the U.S. House in the 1970s; as U.S. ambassador at large and coordinator of Mexican affairs from 1978 to 1981; and as a member of the Texas Railroad Commission from 1990 to 1993.

Rockets, Knicks get past 1st round

There will be no Game 5 - or any other games this season - for the New Jersey Nets and the Portland Trail Blazers.

Those two seventh seeds had their 1993-94 campaigns ended Friday night in Game 4 playoff losses to the New York Knicks and Houston Rockets.

Against the Nets, Patrick Ewing scored 27 of his 36 points in the second half and combined with Charles Smith to lead a decisive third-quarter run as the Knicks won the opening-round playoff series 3-1 with a 102-92 victory.

Houston edged Portland 92-89 later Friday.

The Knicks advanced to a second-round matchup with the

Chicago Bulls, who have eliminated New York from the playoffs the last three years en route to NBA titles.

The best-of-7 Eastern Conference semifinal will open Sunday at Madison Square Garden. Game 2 will be played in New York on Wednesday night.

"I'm very happy to be finished and go on to the next round," said Ewing, who added 14 rebounds and five blocks. "New Jersey was in the way, and we got rid of them. Let's move on. I don't care who's there. Chicago is in our way, too. We'll be ready."

New York's key defensive stand came in the third quarter after New Jersey opened with an 11-4 burst and tied the game at 49 on a jumper by Benoit Benjamin.

New York responded with a 23-12 spurt that featured 11 points from Ewing and eight from Smith to take a 72-61 edge. The lead grew to 15 early in the fourth quarter before New Jersey rallied behind Derrick Coleman, who had 14 of his 31 points in the fourth quarter.

Three times the Nets got within five points, the last at 89-84 with 3:02 to play on two free throws by Coleman, but New York responded with an 11-1 run.

Rockets 92, Trail Blazers 89

At Portland, Ore., the Trail Blazers make an incredible comeback only to fall inches short at the end.

Portland trailed 82-69 after Hakeem Olajuwon made a 16-footer with 6:06 remaining. But the Blazers cut the lead to 87-85 on Terry

Porter's 3-pointer from the corner with 56 seconds remaining.

The Rockets made four of five free throws the rest of the way, including two by Kenny Smith with 9.4 seconds to go to make it 91-87. After Rod Strickland scored on a layup, Olajuwon was fouled and made one of two to give the Blazers a final opportunity. But Strickland's final shot, a 3-point attempt from 24 feet, was about an inch or two short.

"They never let up and gave us all we could handle," Houston coach Rudy Tomjanovich said. "They fought back into it. I feel fortunate to get out of here with a win and the series."

The Rockets open the Western Conference semifinals at home against Phoenix on Sunday.

Baltimore fans welcome old heroes

Murray and Martinez, who each spent more than a decade with the Orioles, were given lengthy standing ovations at Camden Yards on Friday night, and the two teamed up to help the Indians to a 4-2 victory in 10 innings.

Martinez pitched a three-hitter for his first AL victory since September 1985, and Murray hit a home run in

the seventh inning as Cleveland snapped a four-game losing streak.

"I had to tip my hat because otherwise they would never sit down," Martinez said of the ovation he received in the first inning. "That was a very emotional time. I almost started getting tears. ... I think that was what really inspired me to pitch the way I did tonight."

Murray, playing his first regular-season game in Baltimore since leaving the Orioles after the 1988 season, hit his seventh homer off Mike Mussina.

Murray has homered in 31 different ballparks, one short of the record shared by Frank Robinson and Rusty Staub.

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Carter fails as NBA team owner

DALLAS (AP) - If you did a top 10 list of people who shouldn't own a professional sports franchise, certainly Donald Carter's name would be listed in there somewhere.

It just proves cents can't buy sports sense.

The Dallas Mavericks owner has had the NBA franchise since 1980. If he's proved anything in that near 15-year span, it's that he's all hat and no cattle.

He's got big bucks but bad judgment.

The Mavs got to the Western Conference finals just once and lost to the Los Angeles Lakers because their star player, Mark Aguirre, bailed out on them when they needed him most.

Instead of firing Aguirre, Carter coddled him and the Mavs started on their downward spiral which became a crash two years ago with one of the worst teams in NBA history.

Proving it was no fluke, Carter hired Quinn Buckner, who had never coached in the NBA, and the Mavs backed up a horrid season with an equally ugly 13-victory season.

Carter fired basketball operations director Rick Sund and Buckner, who still had four years left on his contract.

Nothing is new here. Remember John MacLeod, now the Notre Dame coach?

Carter fired him seven games into a season. Ritchie Adubato? He was MacLeod's successor and he got the axe. And on and on and on ...

Now, it looks like Dick Motta will be back.

Remember Dick?

He was the original Mavericks coach. He and Carter held on for

seven years before Motta just walked off the job one day. Never gave a reason. Just walked off. Never even called to say goodbye.

Carter was so mad at Motta that he kept him on the payroll for years until Motta went to the Sacramento Kings where his return as an NBA coach was a disaster. The franchise was in near revolt by the time Motta was run off.

For the last three months of the Mavericks regular season, Motta was on hand, looking over Buckner's shoulder and offering a tip or two. It had to be most uncomfortable for Buckner to see Motta's shadow.

Carter jokes about Motta not being paid.

Carter forgets he paid plenty with his dignity and dollars in the 1980s. Now Motta is back and likely to become to the next Mavericks coach.

Carter says, no, he won't offer Motta the job.

But Carter says Motta is in charge of the candidate's list and he can't help it if Motta puts himself at the top of the list.

Carter laughs at this little joke. Ho, ho!

Understandable. The Mavs are the running joke of the NBA. Carter and top executive Norm Sonju have been snickered about for years.

Perhaps Motta can help. He is good at working with young players.

And Carter says he wants a coach with "whiskers" this time.

Motta has whiskers. He's 61 and seen and coached hundreds and hundreds of NBA games.

Yes. You'd have to put Donald Carter in your top 10.

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

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

• Be careful when mowing the lawn near a condenser unit and make sure that grass clippings and leaves are not blown toward the unit.

• Never try to add refrigerant to an air conditioner yourself. Call a trained service technician, who has the knowledge and equipment to do this job properly. New regulations require that the unit be serviced in such a way that no refrigerant escapes into the air.

• Do not run a central air conditioner when the outdoor temperature is below 70 degrees. Operating a residential air conditioner in cool temperatures may cause premature compressor failure.

Spurs go home early again

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - It's all too familiar for the San Antonio Spurs.

A lower-ranked playoff opponent.

High hopes. An early exit.

For the third time in five years, the Spurs were eliminated in the first round of the Western Conference playoffs with a 95-90 loss Thursday night to the Utah Jazz, who won the best-of-5 series 3-1.

The Spurs took some solace - but not much - in the fact that at least their final game was close, unlike Utah's blowout victories in the second and third games.

"Overall, I liked the way our guys hustled at the end," said Spurs coach John Lucas.

Still, David Robinson mused, what if?

"That's what's the most disappointing - I felt this was a series we could win," Robinson said.

The Spurs held a slight edge in their overall regular season record, 55-27, compared to the Jazz's 53-29, and San Antonio started with home

court advantage. But the Jazz had beaten the Spurs 5-0 during the regular season, and that dominance lasted into the playoffs.

The loss ended a season that brought the Spurs scoring and rebounding titles, a Robinson race for Most Valuable Player and a deluge of Dennis Rodman technical fouls, league lectures and suspensions.

Rodman, after three questionable clashes with Jazz players in Game 2, was suspended by the league for Tuesday's Game 3. Rodman hung out with Madonna that night while the Spurs were thrashed 105-72.

"I've got to go out there and do what I've got to do to help my team win," Rodman said, after his team lost Thursday. Rodman pulled down 20 rebounds and scored nine points in the defeat.

San Antonio launched the 1993-94 season with a controversial trade for Rodman that sent the popular Sean Elliott to Detroit. Spurs officials said they needed the toughness that Rodman could offer.

Deaf Smith County Extension Agent-HE MEDICATIONS AND THE OLDER ADULT Part One

For many older adults the idea of taking medicine means you're sick, but medication use for either long-term or short-term conditions does not mean abandoning the idea of wellness.

Spotlight on health

Most Americans will probably require at least one rehabilitation service at some time in their lives.

Simply put, medical rehabilitation is the science and art of helping people who survive traumatic injury and potentially disabling disease to lead functional and productive lives.

Unfortunately, short-term cost pressures in some environments limit access to medical rehabilitation, or send patients out of rehabilitation before improvement is complete. The result is often a shifting of costs to families and taxpayers who ultimately pay through increased disability and medical expenditures, reduced tax revenues and a less productive economy.

The fact is that over 80 percent of people receiving rehabilitation services return to their homes, work, schools or an active retirement. Medical experts report that rehabilitation can lengthen and improve the quality of life and can reduce subsequent illness.

Using medication properly is one of the most important tools for taking personal responsibility for wellness. By managing some of the chronic conditions that occur for the "chronologically gifted," older adults can be in control.

Dr. Barry Browne, pharmacologist at the Texas A&M University Health Science Center and Scott and White Memorial Hospital has presented a number of issues and facts about older adults and their medications.

Here are some findings regarding older adults and medications:

*Ten percent of all hospital admissions for patients 65 years of age or older are due to medication not being taken according to the direction.

*Older Americans make up 13 percent of the population, but consume about 30 percent of all prescriptions.

*The average adult over the age of 65 takes between two and seven prescription medications a day.

*Older people buy about 70 percent of the over-the-counter medications.

*Forty percent of people asked by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) said they stopped taking their medications before the prescription was completed, and 20 percent failed to fill their initial prescription.

*Additional time required for the stomach and small intestines to empty. This extra time can reduce absorption by allowing the drug to bind with food, or increase absorption because the drug is in the absorbing areas longer.

*Decreased stomach acid which can either increase or decrease absorption of a drug.

*Decreased blood flow to the intestines and stomach which can decrease drug absorption since absorption is dependent on blood flow.

How are drugs DISTRIBUTED in the body? Medications are distributed by the blood to all different organs of the body. Age-related changes, however, can change the way this happens. Changes include body size and amount of fat and muscle. Drug doses are often based on healthy young adults. So, the elderly may be either underdosed or overdosed.

*Older adults suffer two to five times the frequency of adverse drug reactions to their medications compared to younger people.

*Approximately one fourth to one third of childhood poisonings occur in the home of an older relative (grandparent, uncle/aunt).

Life quality is lost when medications are not taken properly. Health care costs are also driven up by medication problems that could have been prevented. Older adults can learn

about how medications work in their bodies to improve their proper use of medicines.

How is medication used by the body in an older person? The term pharmacokinetics is used to describe how drugs are handled by the body. Simply put, pharmacokinetics involves how drugs are absorbed by the body, distributed throughout the body, changed by the body, and then eliminated from the body.

Medications taken by mouth are absorbed into the bloodstream through either the stomach or the intestines. In older adults, however, some age-related changes occur which may change the way the body absorbs drugs. These changes include:

*Additional time required for the stomach and small intestines to empty. This extra time can reduce absorption by allowing the drug to bind with food, or increase absorption because the drug is in the absorbing areas longer.

*Decreased stomach acid which can either increase or decrease absorption of a drug.

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HRMC is cutting health care costs

One of the best ways to cut health care costs is to increase efficiency in every area. That's why collection policy changes at Hereford Regional Medical Center are paying big dividends, according to Mary Ann Treviso, business office manager.

Collections at the hospital have improved from 77 percent collected on net revenues at the end of December to 100 percent collected by the end of March, reports Treviso.

Bad debt and third party contractuals are deducted from gross revenues to ascertain net revenues.

"Our goal has been to keep the patients better informed about the status of their hospital bill," Treviso said. "The majority of the people want to pay their bills on time, but insurance forms can be bewildering and hospital bills can be hard to understand. We're working hard to improve communications in those areas."

Two people—Sandra Allm, collections manager, and Jackie Mercer, collector—now work in a collection division of the business office. "We are communicating with the patient within seven days after discharge from the hospital by sending out an itemized statement and an information letter," Mrs. Allm said.

The most important aspect of the new policy is that the patients now have someone to talk to about their bill. The business office will counsel with patients to help them find ways to pay their bills. On unpaid bills, the hospital uses a cycle of 30-45-60-75-90 and 120 days to notify patients of balances due. If the bill is not paid after 120 days, the account is turned over to an attorney or a collection agency.

"We need the public to help us," said Treviso. Sometimes the patient can help clear up confusion with their insurance companies to speed up payment of the account. The hospital's policy is to do daily work on a daily basis, by filing insurance claims every day without fail.

Treviso said the business office is working at getting supplemental insurance filed as well. "Technically, the contract is between the patient and his or her insurance company. But we find many patients are just overwhelmed by the complications of hospital insurance, so we are pleased to file their claims for them."

Ron Rives, chief executive officer of HRMC, concluded that "improving insurance procedures is an important goal for the hospital district. The business office is working hard to be responsive to our patients and, at the same time, implement the procedures necessary for an effective collection process."

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

If MOM'S IN A NURSING HOME

Good vision care can make the "golden years" a lot happier for the elderly, especially those in nursing homes and senior residences.

Occasionally, in these busy surroundings, eyeglasses can get lost or even exchanged. And the elderly, loathe to complain, may withdraw from group activities and seem disoriented—while the only reason for the "disorientation" is that the patient can't see clearly.

If you have a parent in such a group home, keep in touch with his or her eye health. Encourage them not to hide any changes in vision and to report such symptoms as headaches, pain around the eyes, mucous discharges and eye inflammation.

In some states, every nursing home resident is required to have a complete eye examination every year. If your parent is ambulatory, a visit to the optometrist's office can provide a more complete exam. All eyeglasses should be identified with the patient's name printed on the temples, so that they are more easily returned if mislaid.

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Today, small business must stay completely focused on their customers if they are going to survive. It will take superior customer service to hold market share and excellent service to gain on the pack. We're not talking about lip service, but real, honest-to-goodness customer care.

Based on conversations we've had with hundreds of business owners and customers around the country, we believe there are five levels of customer service. You may see your business in one of the levels we describe. If you're not where you would like to be, you may want to move your service quality up a notch.

Five Levels of Care

- **No Care.** The lowest level of customer service is no care. A recent study by Yankelovich Partners found that for many businesses "no care" is the norm. Sixty-two percent of the customers surveyed reported that they had walked out of a business because no one greeted them, no one waited on them or offered to help. That's no care.

In the same survey, 60 percent of the respondents reported asking a question that the sales clerk couldn't answer. To make matters worse, most didn't offer to find out. That's no service.

- **Barely Care.** Barely care is the level where many small businesses perform. They barely give any real customer service. They do almost nothing to set themselves apart from the mega stores who also provide barely care.

Barely care givers greet their customers, offer assistance and say thanks. Then they go on to the next sale. The previous customer is quickly forgotten as the barely care giver repeats the process on the next one.

- **Reactive Care.** The reactive care giver provides barely care and then goes one step beyond. The additional step is to let the customer know that they are there to help if needed. The customer must take the initiative, but they are assured of assistance if they call.

Each of these steps is an improvement. Barely care is better than no care; and reactive care is better than barely care. Barely.

- **Proactive Care.** Proactive care is the level of care that goes beyond reactive care. Proactive care givers follow-up with customers. They initiate calls to see how customers are doing.

The proactive care giver really is concerned with how the customer is doing. They want to serve the customer more effectively

because they know that the only way they can guarantee future business is to keep the customer satisfied.

Proactive care is a high level of customer service. However, if you're providing proactive care you could still lose your customers to a competitor who goes all out to please the customer.

- **Whatever-It-Takes Care.** Whatever-it-takes customer service includes the best of all other levels of service. In addition, it encompasses building a partnership with customers.

This level of service is not just based on giving great service to ensure the next sale, but also focuses on helping customers even if you don't make another sale. Your business becomes giving customers what they want and need.

It will require a higher level of commitment and employee training than you've provided in the past. You'll have to stretch to build new relationships. You'll have to think like a partner with your customers. You'll have to know their needs as well as you know your own.

The reward is customer loyalty. I know you've heard that customer loyalty doesn't exist anymore. For most businesses that is true. Most businesses don't offer whatever-it-takes care. No care equals no loyalty. Barely care, reactive care and even proactive care offer little promise of "customers for life." Whatever-it-takes care will ensure satisfied customers who want to do business with you again and again.

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



Today, as a subsidiary of Imperial Holly Corp., Holly operates seven sugar beet factories in Texas, Montana, Wyoming and California.

Ranch-to-Rail registration reaches 400

Advance registration for the Ranch-to-Rail beef cattle program in Amarillo Tuesday has topped the 400 mark and forced a change in locations for the program.

Originally scheduled to be held at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center, Ranch-to-Rail has been moved to the Amarillo Civic Center's north concourse.

Announcing the change, Dr. John McNeill, said the advance registration indicates a total attendance of 500 persons, or more. McNeill, of Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, is program leader.

"We're seeing a rapid increase in producer interest as well as in the number of cattle being enrolled in our program," said McNeill.

The conference will begin at 8 a.m. Tuesday with a complimentary Tex-Mex breakfast, hosted by Roche Animal Health. Speakers during the morning will report on topics ranging from animal health to market changes. A noon luncheon will feature Ranch-to-Rail prime rib.

A mid-afternoon tour at Randall County Feedyard will provide participants with a look at fed steers enrolled in the program and hear on-site reports about key issues of concern to all segments of the fed cattle industry.

"The program is designed to broaden communication and contact at each level of the fed cattle industry, from the producer through the feedlot to the packer," said Dr. Matt Cravey, extension beef cattle specialist at Amarillo.

Applications being taken for 'adoption'

The Bureau of Land Management office in Oklahoma is accepting applications for "adoption" of wild horses and burros captured on public lands in 10 western states.

The adoption program has been conducted since 1973 with more than 142,000 animals adopted through the program.

The Oklahoma Area Office of the Tulsa district of the Bureau of Land Management will develop a schedule for adoptions to be conducted in Oklahoma, New Mexico, Kansas and Texas.

In order to determine the most appropriate locations for the adoptions, the BLM is asking interested persons to call or write for an application packet.

The agency believes the adoption program provides an excellent way to maintain an ecological balance between the wild horses and burros with other wildlife and domestic animals of the western rangelands.

TTU to host regional 'summit' on food, fiber production issues

Five regional conferences -- one at Texas Tech University -- will bring together consumers, environmentalists, government officials, agribusiness leaders and crop and livestock producers to discuss critical concerns facing food and fiber production and protection of natural resources.

The first of the five conferences is scheduled for May 16 at the University Center at TTU. Others will be held on May 18 in Temple, May 24 in Dallas, May 25 in Weslaco and May 26 in Odessa.

Dr. John R. Abernathy, resident director of research at Lubbock for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, is chairman of the Texas Agricultural and Natural Resource Summit Leadership Council which is coordinating the five conferences.

He pointed out that the groups invited to the events are "stakeholders in the need for a prospering agricultural industry which meets the nation's needs" but still cares for natural resources.

The five conferences this year grew out of the Texas Agricultural Summit held last October on the campus of Texas A&M University in College Station.

More than 450 leaders representing a wide diversity of interests identified high priority issues that will impact agriculture in the 21st century.

Abernathy said, "The mini-summits in May will provide opportunities for regional leaders of all the stakeholders to discuss solutions for the issues identified at

the Agricultural Summit. They also will increase public awareness of the issues and the process of finding solutions."

Each of the five conferences will begin at 9 a.m.

Participants will be divided into work groups to develop strategies for resolving five key issues:

- Protecting the environment and natural resources.
- Competitiveness of Texas Agriculture.
- Public policy for agriculture and rural areas.
- Education and information needs of consumers.
- Developing leadership.

'Dapper Don' dances: Gotti gets away on CBS

Viewers who tune in to CBS' "Getting Gotti," on Tuesday, May 10, expecting to see the "Dapper Don" get his comeuppance are in for a disappointment.

Gotti gets off.

Sorry to spoil things for everybody, but that's basically the gist of it.

The movie focuses on the real-life efforts of assistant U.S. Attorney Diane Giacalone (played by Lorraine Bracco), who spent seven years attempting to indict John Gotti and six of his cohorts on charges of loan-sharking, gambling and racketeering.

The viewer sees Gotti's bloody rise to the top of the Gambino Crime family.

The viewer sees Diane endure countless humiliations at the hands of perjurious witnesses, and an intolerably rude courtroom gallery of Gotti supporters.

And ultimately, the viewer gets to hear the words "not guilty" fall on the floor of the courtroom along with the jaws of the prosecutors.

So after investing two hours in this film, viewers are left with a sour, "why-did-I-bother?" taste in their mouths, probably not unlike the one the real-life Giacalone must have tasted when the verdict came down on Gotti in 1986.

Actor Anthony Denison, who plays Gotti in the film, sees the outcome of the case as a small battle fought in the cause of a greater war.

"If you say basically that Diane Giacalone lost . . ." Denison says, "I don't know if she really lost because she did bring this whole thing to light.

"You know sometimes you get a cut and you don't tend the cut. You can slowly bleed to death as a result of that cut. I think, in a sense, Diane Giacalone may not have been able to win

her case, but I think what she did is she exposed an Achilles' heel.

"It then opened the door for other cases to go against him," Denison continues. "Whether or not the (subsequent) cases were founded on any truth or they were led by traditional good judicial prudence or not, the point is her case opened the doors for other cases to go against it."

Another possible knock against "Getting Gotti," is that the film seems to have subscribed to virtually every myth, cliche and stereotype of Italian-Americans represented on celluloid since "The Godfather."

Too many scenes come complete with yelling, screaming and colorful expletives.

But then, ironically enough, some of the most entertaining scenes in the film are those which involve the aforementioned characteristics.

Bracco, in particular, makes good a number of scenes by raising the volume.

And Denison's portrayal of Gotti, the reputation of the "Dapper Don" notwithstanding, is an earnest one. In any case, the actor seems to have Gotti's infamous scowl down cold.

"I think I gave an honest, thorough portrayal," Denison says. "I never play any of these characters, good guys or heroes or questionable heroes or non-heroes. I never play them with the intent of being liked, loved or hated. I play them solely from the point of view of trying to have them be understood."

"I think that if John Gotti watches this movie, and anybody who watches this movie, they'll come away with an understanding of the guy."

"Whether they like him or not," Denison concludes, "that's their choice."

A Leslie Nielsen police role and the name's not Frank; Bo knows 'Days'

Q: Could you please tell me something about actress Hayley Mills? How many movies has she made? How old is she now? —Wanda Vohs, Pollock, Texas.

A: Mills, best known for her dual roles in 1961's "The Parent Trap," starred in 27 movies between 1959 and 1989, including three "Parent Trap" spin-offs.

Mills is now 48 and resides in London.

Q: Could you please give me some information on Robert Kelker-Kelly, who plays Bo Brady on "Days of Our Lives"? Could you supply me with an address where I can write to him? What movies has he appeared in? Also, could you tell me who played the old Bo Brady on "Days"? —A.S., Gallipolis, Ohio.

A: Kelker-Kelly was born in Cleveland but soon moved to a small town in Kansas, where he grew up.

His television career began on NBC's "Miami Vice" and from there he moved on to the role of Sam Fowler on the NBC daytime-drama "Another World," which he left after a three-year stint to return to theater.






