Due to freezing rain and slushy roads, only a light number of Deaf Smith County farmers voted to continue marketing control on cotton in the 1960 Cotton Referendum here Tuesday.







## FARMERS NOTICE!

The Board of Directors of the Deaf Smith County Farm Bureau met in regular session last Thursday in the Farm Bureau Office. Concern was expressed over the announcements in the paper and over radio and TV stating that ALL trailers over 4000 pounds must be titled.

After studying the Legislative report of the Texas Farm Bureau, the board noted that the bill had been named to exempt farm trailers. Steve Clements and Roy Botkin were selected to contact the local tax office and take other steps to clarify Farm Trailer exemptions. After contacting the Tax Office and examining the law it was found that Farm railers WERE exempt.

The Tax Office, in explaining the ads and news releases said that "they were prepared by the state and sent to the papers for publication but were not clear on this point. It should be made clear however that a section of this law does exempt Farm Trailers."
