tornado damage may come from rapidly changing air pressure.

5. If in the open, travel at right angles from the path of the funnel. Tornadoes generally move from southwest to northeast, but may move in any direction.
6. If caught in the open, the safest place is in a ditch.
7. Above all, stay calm. Most tornadoes cause little or no damage.

8. Do not call law enforcement offices, fire department, radio, TV station, weather bureau or newspapers. The information will be announced as soon as possible and frequent calls may slow down information.

9. In the event you sight a tornado, report its location, speed and direction of travel to the nearest law enforcement office.

10. In the event a tornado approaches during school hours, do not attempt to go after your children. They will be protected and generally much safer in steel-braced school buildings than in a car or residence.

In the event of general tornado warnings for the area, Texas Highway Patrol and Sheriff's Department mobile units will be stationed in scattered areas around the county. Any information received will be radioed to Hereford. The Fire Department will sound tornado signals only if necessary.

Civil Defense plans have been made in case a tornado should strike in the county. All law enforcement personnel will be used, assisted by volunteer firemen and Red Cross workers.

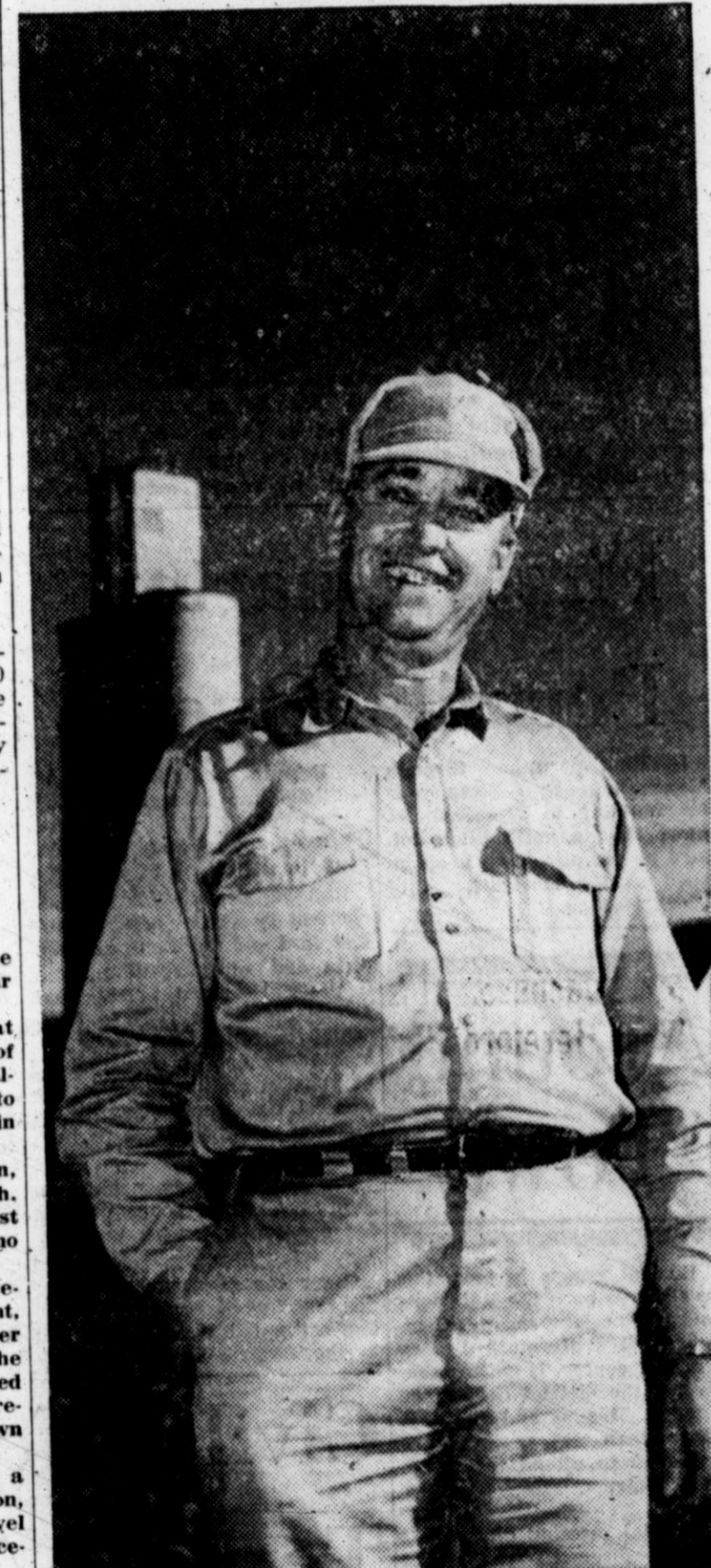

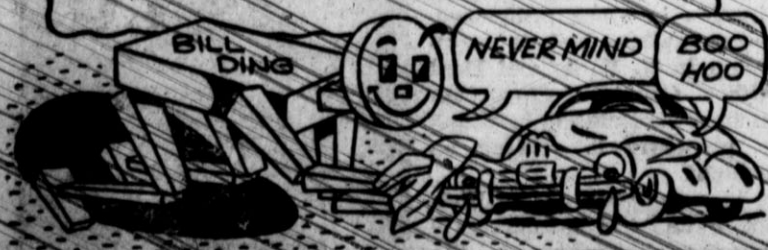

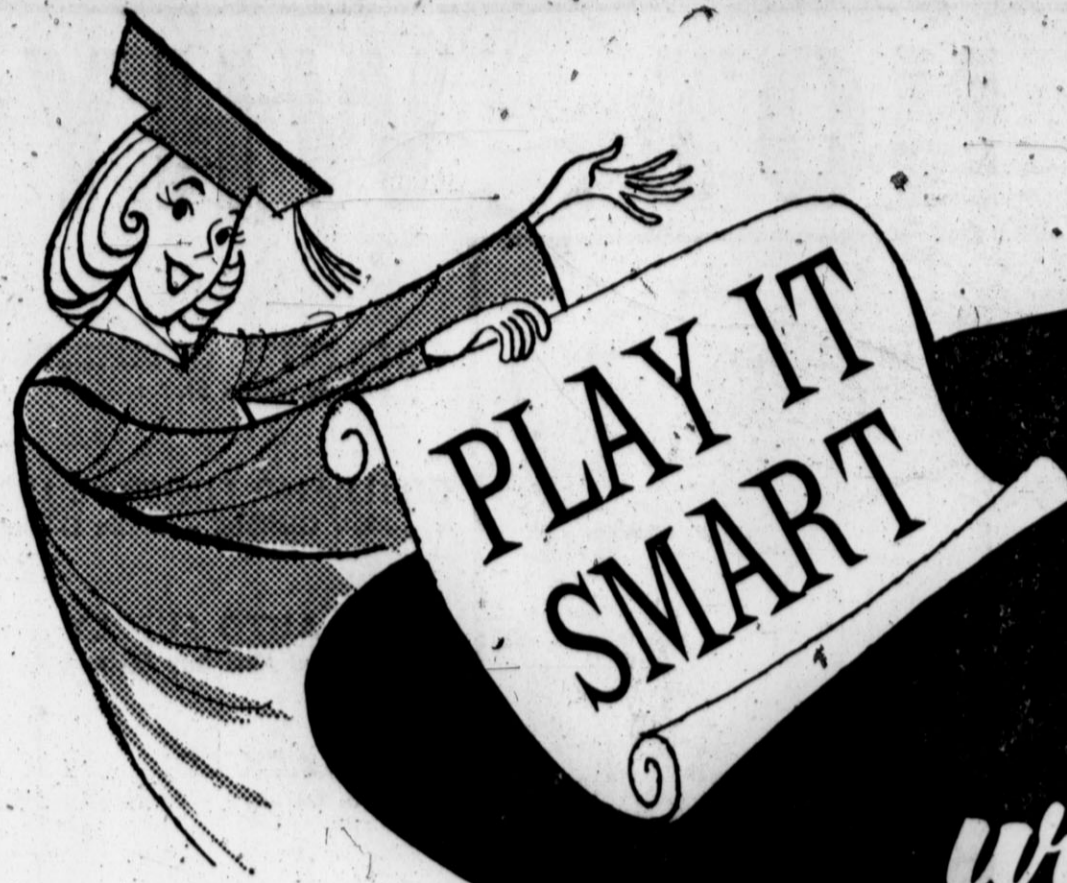
