





Discard seeds and place pulp in small pan sait slightly and add a few-drops of tarragon vinegar and let stand an hour or so to become seasoned. Add all the rest of the ingredients to the purp, mix well and fill scooped out tomatoes with mix ure. Top with Mrs. George V. Add two tablespoon of butter to the pulp and other ingredients and top with bread crumps instead of club and played high for the mayonnaise. Broil under moderate heat about ten minutes or until tomatoes are tender-but still retain their shape

Tomatoes may also be baked in moderate oven about twenty ond high. minutes if you do not want to broil them.






