**RAIN**  
Area gets heavy shower Saturday

Hereford received .89 of an inch of rain from showers that fell in two separate storms on Saturday morning.

There was a chance of more rain during the afternoon and evening Saturday and early Sunday. An upper level low pressure system in the western United States was expected to continue throwing off impulses that could trigger more rain in the region.

KPAN recorded .05 of an inch of rain from showers that fell early Saturday morning. The region was placed under a tornado watch until 4 a.m. today when a line of storms, which had caused damage in the Carlsbad, N.M., area, began moving into the region.

The other .84 of an inch fell in a strong storm that struck at 6:45 a.m. Saturday. The rain had ended in Hereford by 7:30 a.m., and caused some minor street flooding. Eastern Deaf Smith and Oldham counties had been placed under a flash flood warning at 6:35 a.m. Saturday as the showers began moving into the county from the south-southwest.

Although they didn't fall in Hereford, there were more showers that fell just east of the city at about 8 a.m. Saturday

**Buckley is National Merit winner**

Blake Buckley, the salutatorian of the Hereford High School Class of 1991, has been named the winner of a \$2,000 annual National Merit Scholarship.

Buckley succeeded through several rounds of competition to win the award. He is one of 2,500 students across the country who survived the competition to win the coveted honor.

Buckley will receive his annual scholarship from Texas A&M University, where he will major in computer engineering.

The process for Buckley began in 1989, when he and students at over 19,000 U.S. high schools took the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which served as an initial screen of the 1.1 million participants.

In the fall of 1990, Buckley and 50,000 other students were recognized for their very high perfor-

**Baer, 92, pioneer businessman, dies Friday**

Gaston Baer, 92, a pioneer retail merchant in Hereford for almost 70 years, died Friday at Deaf Smith General Hospital. He had been a resident at Golden Plains Care Center for several years.

Funeral services will be held Monday at 2 p.m. at Rix Funeral Chapel in Hereford. Burial will follow in Llano Cemetery in Amarillo.

Born in France in 1898, the family moved to the United States in 1915 and settled in Michigan where they had relatives. He moved to Vaughn, N.M., to live with a brother and learn the dry goods business, then met and married Pauline Berg in 1921. They spent a short time in Tucumcari, N.M., before moving to Hereford in April, 1921, to open a dry goods firm called The Popular Store.

The Baers had one daughter, Hertha (Teddy) Baer and in 1949 their son-in-law, Irvin Alexander, joined the family in the business. They expanded the size of the Main Street store and, in 1965, opened another store in the new Sugarland Mall. Baer managed the downtown store until 1978, then closed it and partially retired. He had married Esther Hauser of Los Angeles in 1971.

Baer was a Rotarian for a number of years and had also been a member of the Lions Club and a charter member of Hereford Country Club. The Baer family were longtime members of the Jewish Synagogue in Amarillo.

**TWINS Daniels, DeBords ready for life apart**

Hereford High School hallways looked somewhat like a Doublemint gum commercial during the 1990-91 school year. With seven pairs of twins, one might think they're seeing

double at HHS. Two of the seven graduated Friday, leaving behind them memories of togetherness, starting on the road to separation.

Dawn and Terri DeBord and Mike and Mark Daniel have been constant companions for the past 18 years.

Both claim to not being away from the other for more than a week.

Both will be attending the same colleges and will be roommates for the next school year.

"It's different having a twin than a brother or sister," said Dawn. "We go everywhere together and do everything together. We haven't been apart from each other more than a week our whole lives."

"I think going to school will change our relationship," Terri, the more quiet twin said. "It will be a while before we're not together so much, but because we'll have different majors, we'll grow apart. We have to be together for a while because we share our clothes and car."

Growing up, the girls were encouraged to have their own and different interests, instead of competing against each other.

"Our mother encouraged us to be in different things, rather than being competitive," the articulate Dawn said. "We work as a support team."

**It's a bull market out there**  
Study shows cattle are better than T-billsBy CHIP BROWN

HEREFORD - Some serious investors will spend an eternity searching for a bull market in the canyons of Wall Street.

But any rancher will tell you that bulls don't roam around in New York, unless they're doing an advertisement for a certain investment firm.

The only bull market a rancher knows is fed and sold for steak. And he may be on to something.

Serious investors know all about sinking money into bonds or even precious metals and works of art. But what about investing in the cattle-filled feedyards of Hereford, the heart of the cattle capital of the world?

In most investment portfolios, a mud-covered, less-than-fragrant feedyard is hardly one of investors' first options.

But according to a university study, buying into beefed up bovines has proved to be somewhat of a cash cow over the long haul.

"It seems to fit very well in terms of investors' needs for diversification," said Jerry Miller, professor of finance at the T. Boone Pickens School of Finance at West Texas State University. "The returns in the long run will be very good."

Miller studied the accounting reports of six different cattle feeding operations in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma from Jan. 1 1985 through Dec. 31, 1990, and compared their returns against the gains of stocks, treasury bonds and treasury bills.

Stocks outperformed cattlefeeding, which has enjoyed record high prices over the past four years. But putting stock in livestock produced higher returns than T-bonds and T-bills.

According to the study, a \$100,000 investment in the Standard & Poor's 500 Index over the six years grew to \$245,961, for a compound rate of return of 16.81 percent.

The same investment in cattle feeding grew to \$221,206 for a return of 14.15 percent.

A hundred grand invested in a 10-percent coupon T-Bond, with a 10-year maturity, grew to \$204,495, or a return of 12.7 percent. The same investment in T-bills netted \$151,277, or 7.1 percent.

But Miller says moderate leveraging likely will improve cattle-feeding dividends.

"If the investor puts up 40 percent, and the lender puts up 60 percent, the result is a 17.1 percent compound annual return over the six years," he said.

Because cows are fed for only 150 days and then sold for slaughter, most banks are generous with loans because of the liquidity.

"Most of us are very comfortable with making cattle loans because the collateral is secure," said Bill Snure, vice president of First National Bank of Amarillo. "Often times an investor will buy a head of cattle in a feedyard we can drive to and check on. And because they are quick turning loans, usually 150 days, we know right where we stand in about four months."

From the early 1970s through 1980, cattle feeding afforded tremendous tax breaks. Investors from all over the country sunk millions in feedyards simply to defer paying taxes.

As a result, the supply of cattle ballooned, prices plummeted and the market crashed.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 eliminated such tax breaks and several of the nation's leading feeders say today's market is better off for the change.

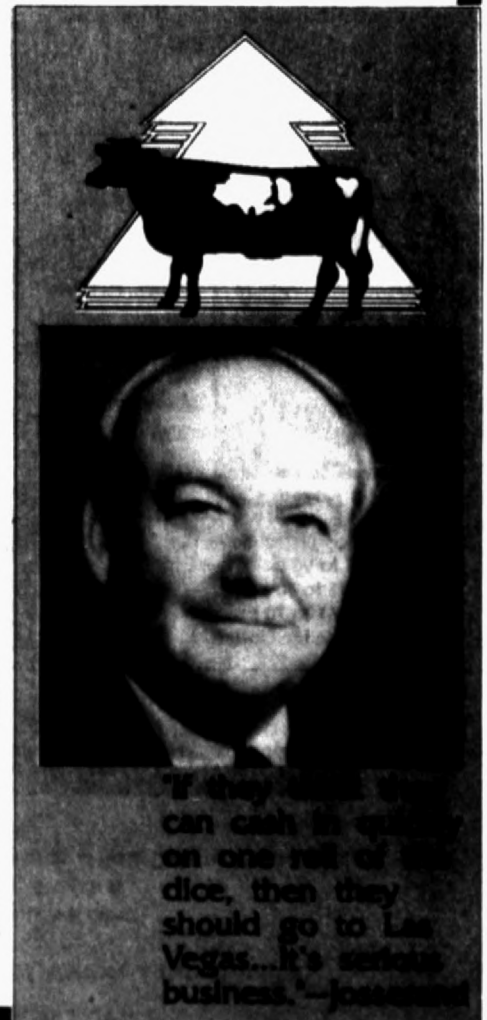
"The industry back with the tax breaks allowed people to come in with less than good intentions," says Bob Jossorand, president of Hereford-based AzTx Cattle Co., one of the nation's largest cattle feeders.

"Investors came in looking only to break even or even take a little bit of a loss for tax purposes. It hurt the industry very badly."

Jossorand said today's investors are profit-oriented and are willing to invest over the long haul.

"The shortest investment term we recommend is three years, but more realistically five," Jossorand said. "If they think they can cash in quickly on one roll of the dice, then they should go to Las Vegas."

## BULL MARKET

When cattle feeding served as a tax haven, huge financial syndicators corralled investors from across the country. Today, investors are approached mostly by word of mouth, said Miguel DeAchaval, customer service representative for Amarillo-based Cactus Feeders Inc., the nation's largest cattle feeder.

"It's more one-on-one today," DeAchaval said. "We know where they stand and they know where we stand. There is a lot more quality control."

The nation's feedyards are concentrated in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico. About 30 percent to 50 percent of them depend on outside investment.

At AzTx, 10 sales representatives work full time trying to attract investors in an increasingly competitive market.

Investors buy the cows - usually about \$550 a head - then pay the feedyard to feed it for 150 days. The fattened cow usually brings in about \$850. Besides the cost of feeding, some feedyards also charge a daily fee to house the cattle.

About 60 percent of the cows are investor-owned with the rest owned

by ranchers, experts said. The feedyards play matchmaker between investors and ranchers to insure themselves of a market.

"It's serious business," Josserrand said. "And like a stock broker, we will show an investor performance sheets so they know exactly what they are getting into."

DeAchaval says cattle feeding, unlike stocks and bonds, affords the investor a degree of glamour.

"The John Wayne-syndrome still runs through this country," he said. "We will send investors pictures of the cattle they've bought and they feel like they are the rancher. They get to be the cowboy."

Because cattle prices have been bullish for the last four years, Snure wonders how long it can last. "Cattle prices have been at all time highs for a while," Snure said.

"I don't know if that is a good time to get in. The downside potential is tremendous."

Miller says cattle feeding has risks just like any other investment. "With a moderate degree of leverage," Miller said. "Investors should be able to weather the cyclical downturns of cattle feeding and capture excellent profits during the good times in this industry."

is inevitable, they know that because they are twins, they will always have a special closeness.

"I know that Dawn and I will always be close," Terri said. "We'll always share memories. We've been through everything together," Dawn added. "We have to be close. Family has always been important to us. I know we'll see each other on the holidays."

Although they are twins and look very much alike, they are their own person. By sitting with them for 20 minutes, their differences become obvious. Dawn is more outgoing and loquacious. Terri is reserved and quiet.

"Dawn is on the wild side," Terri said, smiling sheepishly at her sister. "She likes to have fun. I'm more conservative. I take things safe and drive the speed limit."

The DeBords feel like they have had some unusual experiences because they are twins.

"When we were little we would lose teeth on the same day," Dawn said. "We would get sick on the same day. Sometimes we'll say about three or four sentences exactly the same at the exact same time and look at each other and say 'what.'"

Although being a twin may sound exciting to some, the DeBords say there are some disadvantages.

"I get tired of people always asking what's it like to be a twin," said Terri. "People ask us if we feel each other's pain and stuff like that."

"One good thing is I don't have to prove anything to Terri," said Dawn. "She's probably my best friend, but I don't like to admit it."

Their looks and actions show that they are more than just sisters. A special closeness is obvious in their relationship.

Mark and Mike are a laugh a minute. Without knowing the twins,

the average onlooker may think they are in a constant fight.

"Our parents always think we're fighting when we're not," Mike said. "We really don't fight. It's just that people mistake our philosophical discussions as fights."

"We don't fight more than most people," said Mark. "We're just better at it."

Mark and Mike add their own kind of humor to life. Being together for 18 years has made their personalities and sense of humors interact in a spontaneous way to make for hilarious conversation.

The young men have quite a philosophy on being a twin.

"It's hard to discuss what being a twin is," Mark said. "I've never been anything else. The bad part is we get less at Christmas and at birthdays because there is two of us."

"We're always considered a pair," Mike said. "No one ever says, 'Hey Mike, want to go play golf.' It's always, 'Mike and Mark do you want to go.'"

"A lot of people think it is terrible if they get our names wrong. I don't care unless it's my mom or girlfriend or someone like that."

"A good point of being a twin, is always having someone to blame everything on," Mark joked.

"I kind of like confusing people," Mike said with a sly grin. "When you meet someone new, you normally don't say, 'Hey, there's another one just like me running around,' then they'll meet Mark or me and think it's the other and start talking, and you're going, 'Who are you.'"

The Daniels agree that being a twin is a different kind of relationship.

"You're with them for better or for worse," Mark said. "When you're around that person 99 percent of your life, they tend to get on your nerves quicker. We get into fights over little

things."

"We don't fight," Mike corrected.

"We have disagreements," Mark will be leaving for Lubbock in two weeks. He will be walking on the Texas Tech football team.

"When Mark leaves, it will be the first time we've been away for more than a week at a time."

"Mike thinks I can't live without him, but he can't live without me."

"I can't wait until you leave," Mike said leaning back in his chair. "I get to do whatever I want when you leave."

Mark and Mike are convinced their lives won't change that much after graduation.

"I think we'll always be the same," Mark said. "Mike won't ever change."

A natural reaction to twins is to constantly compare one to the other.

"We are always being compared to each other," Mike said. "I think twins want to be individuals. We strive for individuality."

Mike and Mark are individuals who work well as a pair.

Despite numerous threats on each

others lives, many humorous stories about the past managed to emerge.

Between eating snails and dodging bullets, Mike and Mark have managed to build a special relationship.

Both the DeBords and Daniels share a kind closeness that other siblings long for, but never can achieve. A closeness that only a twin can know.

son of Faye and Jerry King of Hereford.

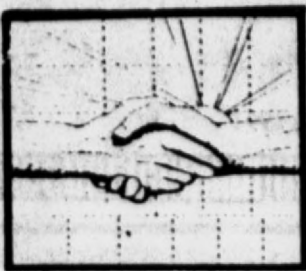
Miss Paetzold, a 1987 graduate of Hereford High School, recently received a BBA degree in accounting from West Texas State University.

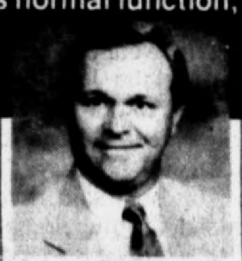

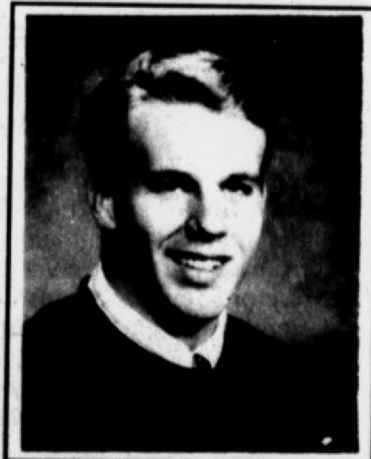

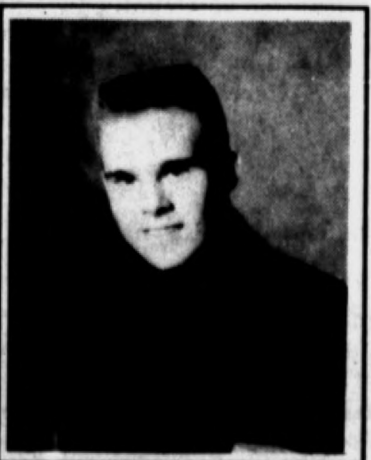

## Arms control depends on 'need'

WASHINGTON (AP) - In the effort to curb the Middle East arms bazaar, the hard haggling will come when competing weapons salesmen and ancient enemies set about defining a deceptively simple word: need.

President Bush said his plan for Middle East arms control is aimed at halting the weapons buildup "while supporting the legitimate need of every state to defend itself ..."

Translate that into a formula, and the rest will be easy. But in arms control, as Bush said, nothing ever is. Indeed, the question of how much defense is enough to meet national needs is central to a permanent political debate about U.S. priorities. The answer depends on the judge; in the Air Force Academy speech that outlined his arms control plan, Bush said he'll veto the defense budget if Congress tries to cut too much from strategic weapons spending he deems essential.

The Bush plan stresses curbs on the spread of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons in the Middle East, aimed ultimately at making it a nuclear weapon-free zone.

"We are committed to stopping the proliferation of weapons of mass

destruction," the president said. But even on that point, defining terms can be troublesome. The Israeli government said the potential for mass destruction lies in enormous arsenals of conventional weapons in other Middle Eastern countries.

Outnumbered by the troops, tanks, artillery and other weaponry of Arab states, Israel wants curbs on those conventional weapons. Since Israel is believed to have nuclear arms, other Middle Eastern nations seek controls on non-conventional weapons of mass destruction.

Bush had promised to come up with a Middle East weapons control plan in his March 6 victory speech after the Persian Gulf War, but there were congressional complaints that he wasn't moving fast enough and wasn't pushing to curb conventional weapons.

That led to Democratic calls for a moratorium on U.S. arms sales pending negotiations for international curbs. The Canadian and French governments proposed Middle East curbs.

Now Bush has reclaimed the issue. A House Democrat who had been critical of the delay said Bush had restored the momentum for arms control. The president proposed a conference of senior officials of the

big five arms sellers - the five permanent members of the United Nations Security Council.

The Soviet Union tops the list of arms sellers, the United States is second, followed by France, Great Britain and China.

Among them, they've supplied nearly 90 percent of the conventional arms flow into the Middle East over the last decade.

There's a certain irony in the dual roles. "The fact is most of the hardware that Saddam Hussein had in his inventory he acquired from companies or countries that are members of the U.N. Security Council," Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney told a congressional committee after the war against Iraq.

Under the Bush plan, the five nations are to meet in Paris within the next month to talk about guidelines that would "restrain destabilizing transfers of conventional arms ..."

Of course that will require defining another term; different capitals have differing views as to what is destabilizing and what is not. "If we're going to have an intelligent policy, it can't just be arms sales are bad," Cheney told a Senate committee on May 21.

## Pledge defined

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following story was presented recently by Keith Flood at a "welcome home" program in Sugarland Mall for local servicemen.

Americans have been saying the pledge for a very long time, but how many of us know what it really means? My name is Keith Flood and I am with the Pioneer 4-H Club of Deaf Smith County and I would like to share with you what it means to me.

At school, not so very long ago, I noticed a gentleman sitting at the back of the room in my first period class. As usual, the teacher asked us to stand and recite the pledge of allegiance to the flag. It was something we did every morning...it was a habit. When we had finished, our teacher said he would like to introduce a guest to us. The gentleman at the back of the room stood and was introduced as Mr. Mayes.

"I listened and watched you kids say the pledge and I feel as though it has become very monotonous to you," he said. "If I may, I would like to recite the pledge and explain it to you as it was explained to me when I was a small boy:

I...me, an individual, a committee of one, pledge...dedicate all of my worldly goods to give without self pity, allegiance...my love, my devotion, to the flag...our standard, old Glory, a symbol of freedom, wherever she waves there is respect, because your loyalty has given her a dignity that shouts FREEDOM IS EVERYBODY'S JOB, United...that means we have all come together, States...individual communities that have united into 48 great states, 48 individual communities with pride and dignity and purpose, all divided with imaginary boundaries yet united to a common purpose, and that's love for country, and to the republic...republic, a state in which sovereign power is invested in representatives chosen by the people to govern and government is the people, and it's from the people to the leaders not from the leaders to the people, for which it stands, one nation...one nation meaning so blessed by God, indivisible...incapable of being divided, with liberty...which freedom, the right or power to live one's own life, without threats, fear or some sort of retaliation, and justice...the principle or quality of dealing fairly with others, for all...which means that this is as much your country as it is mine.

Then he said, "Now, boys and girls, let me hear you recite the pledge of allegiance.

I pledge allegiance to the flag of the United States of America and to the republic for which it stands, one nation, indivisible with liberty and justice for all.

When we had finished, the man looked at us with tears in his eyes and said, "Since I was a small boy, two states have been added to our country and two words have been added to the pledge: under God. Wouldn't it be a pity if someone said that it is a prayer and that it should be eliminated from our schools, too.

"So, the next time you say the pledge of allegiance, or sing the national anthem, or see the most recognized symbol in the world--our flag, and you feel a pride welling up inside of you or feel a mist in your eye, then thank God because you're still an American."

Waco Herald Tribune on protecting Texas aquifers:

The Texas House approved a bill that would exclude aquifers from state control, a move just opposite of what should be done.

Water already is a precious commodity, and it will become even more so in the future. The state needs to exercise more control over its water resources, not less.

Rep. Harvey Hilderbran, R-Uvalde, sponsored the bill that would define a subterranean stream to exclude an aquifer. Under current law, subterranean streams, unlike most underground water, belong to the state. An aquifer is an underground layer of porous rock, sand or other material containing water. ...

Rep. Alan Schoolcraft, R-San Antonio, said Hilderbran's bill "strengthens the idea that anybody can poke a hole in the ground and waste as much water as they want."

Unfortunately, that is too close to the truth for the long-term good of the state. City people often waste too much water on lawn care and other activities while many farmers pump millions of gallons of water out of Texas aquifers to grow lush crops on otherwise arid land.

Without better management, millions of Texans will find themselves high and dry in the not too distant future.

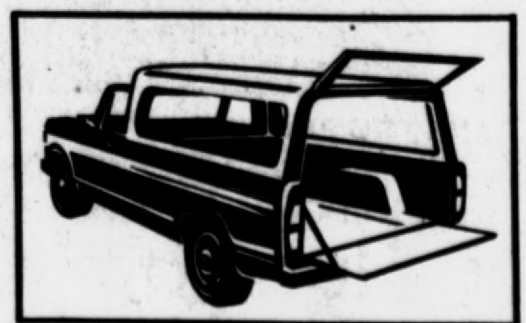

## Yankees get another miracle

Five pitches into the game, gloom settled over Yankee Stadium. Pascual Perez, who figures to be the ace of the New York staff once he settles in after a late start because of shoulder surgery last season, neaded for the dugout.

"We were dead," second baseman Steve Sax said Friday night. "Just flat ... until the eighth inning."

By that time, Perez realized the stiffness he felt was little more than that. It was time for the surging Yankees to produce another miracle for the Bronx faithful.

They tied the Milwaukee Brewers at 2-2 in the eighth, setting the stage for Jesse Barfield. With two outs in the ninth, he homered off Chuck Crim

to give the Yankees a 3-2 victory - their seventh in eight games, including four in their final at-bat.

"This is the most exciting time I've had as a Yankee," Barfield said. "Nothing takes the place of winning."

Barfield, who teamed with Mel Hall to beat Boston with home runs on Monday, hit a drive over the left-field wall on a 1-0 pitch from Crim (3-3).

Steve Howe (2-0) pitched one inning for the victory.

**Blue Jays 5, Angels 1**

David Wells (6-4) pitched the first complete game of his career as Toronto cooled off Mark Langston at the SkyDome.

Langston (6-2) allowed eight hits, struck out three and walked three. His five-game winning streak was snapped.

**Red Sox 7, Orioles 2**

Jody Reed and Tom Brunansky keyed the offense and Mark Gardner (1-0) earned his first big-league win in his Boston debut as the Red Sox scored four runs in the first inning.

Reed, Carlos Quintana and Wade Boggs started the first with consecutive singles to load the bases against

Jose Mesa (4-5). Brunansky hit a two-run double off the left field wall at Fenway Park.

**Royals 4, Twins 1**

Streaking Bret Saberhagen (6-3) outpitched slumping Kevin Tapani for the second time in five days as Kansas City ended visiting Minnesota's three-game winning streak.

Jim Eisenreich's RBI double in the fourth inning put Kansas City ahead to stay. Kevin Seitzer, in his first appearance since April 29, hit an RBI single to cap the inning and help Hal McRae to his first home victory as manager.

It was the fifth straight winning decision and third complete game for Saberhagen, and the sixth straight loss for Tapani (2-6).

## Bulls built by GM Krause

CHICAGO (AP) - Michael Jordan is the foundation on which the Chicago Bulls were built, but he's the only player remaining since Jerry Krause took over as general manager. That was in March 1985, a month after the club was purchased by Jerry Reinsdorf.

"We've made over 30 moves and trades," Krause said. "More than any other team in the league. I'm proud of that."

Krause also is proud of the Bulls having advanced to the NBA Finals and has been counting down since the playoffs began.

"The magic number is 15," he said. "We've got it down to four. We're getting closer every day. Craig

Hodges and I started counting down and we've missed only one beat."

That was the 99-97 loss to the Philadelphia 76ers in the second round that has been the Bulls' only defeat in the playoffs. They have won 11 games.

"I feel the players and the coaching staff have done a hell of a job," Krause said. "But I feel good about it personally."

He should. He has drafted and traded players with abandon, hired and fired coaches, and the Bulls have responded by reaching the Finals for the first time in the 25 years of the franchise.

When he took over, he had players like Quintin Dailey, Orlando

Woolridge, Wes Matthews and Ennis Whatley.

They are gone along with others because "the chemistry was bad," Krause said. He has replaced them with players like Scottie Pippen, Horace Grant, Bill Cartwright and John Paxson. Some of his moves have been criticized, but not lately.

"The critics don't bother me," Krause said. "They don't know about the inner problems of a club."

In addition to having Jordan, Krause points to some key moves beginning with getting Charles Oakley. He traded his No. 1 pick in the 1985 draft, Keith Lee, and Whatley to Cleveland for Oakley.

"Getting Oakley gave us the physical presence we needed," Krause said.

Two years later he traded up to get Pippen, who was selected ahead of Grant in the same round.

Krause bristles when the subject of drafting Grant comes up. Some have said he did not want Grant but was overruled by Reinsdorf. Krause said that isn't so and that Reinsdorf has never told him who to draft.

"When it was our turn to make a pick, there were two other guys we were thinking of," Krause said. "I walked out of the room and into the hallway and Jerry (Reinsdorf) came after me and said, 'You have good gut feelings, go with your gut feeling.' I walked back in and we picked Grant."

In midseason, Krause asked the New York Knicks for permission to talk to Cartwright. They refused. But when the season ended, the two teams agreed a deal could be made and they had Cartwright take a physical because he had a history of foot injuries.

## Incaviglia's spring release cause of Rangers' success

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - The Texas Rangers "miracle in May" had its foundation in a gamble Bobby Valentine took in spring training when he fired Pete Incaviglia.

Popular with his teammates and left field bleacherites at Arlington Stadium, Inky's departure caused enough stir that fans booed Valentine when he was introduced on opening day.

The Texas manager figured the Rangers needed to take Incaviglia's league-leading strikeouts out of the lineup although the free-swinging was averaging 25 homers a season.

"Little Ball" was the buzzword that sprang up. The Rangers were going more to hit-and-run and sacrifice instead of playing for the big inning.

The insertion of 21-year-old Juan Gonzalez into the outfield paid immediate dividends. Gonzalez triggered the Rangers' 14-game victory streak with late-inning heroics. Now you can find his name on the All-Star ballot.

Gonzalez, Ruben Sierra, Brian Downing, and Rafael Palmeiro were all in the American League's top 10 in batting with Julio Franco fast closing in. During the streak, the "little ball" Rangers averaged almost six runs and 10 hits per game.

They became the first team in three years to win 14 in a row and only the 38th club in major league history.

Texas shot from sixth place to first place. But there are clouds on the horizon.

Starters Scott Chiamparino and Bobby Witt are hurting and Nolan Ryan just came off the disabled list. Another starter, Kevin Brown, has been wild.

"In spring training we thought the starting pitching was going to be our strength," said general manager Tom Grieve. "Now, it's a big question mark. Our bullpen has been great."

"We've got to start carrying our part of the load," Ryan said. "We can't expect the team to keep hitting like it has."

Ironically, Ryan didn't contribute a victory during the winning streak. He did pitch his seventh no-hitter on May 1 then got hurt in the fifth inning of the second start after that and spent some time getting over a sore shoulder.

Texas didn't need much pitching as they bashed their opponents with barrage after barrage of base hits.

The Rangers led the major leagues in hitting, slugging percentage and on-base percentage during the streak.

"Bobby deserves the credit for making tough decisions like the Pete Incaviglia situation," said owner George W. Bush. "He's the one who has molded this team together."

Valentine is in his seventh year of managing the Rangers. Some critics have said that the nickname Bobby V stands more for "vain" than "victory." That he is guilty of "overmanaging."

Those same critics were after him again after the Rangers lost 3-0 to

Minnesota to stop the 14-game victory ride, pointing out that he benched two of the Rangers hottest hitters, Downing and Steve Bucchele, to try to matchup up left-handed batters against Scott Erickson.

However, Bush couldn't be prouder of his little batter.

"Nothing better came out of this streak than to show we've got a great manager," Bush said.

Of course, the Rangers need to be in the pennant race on Labor Day to convince the cynics that their franchise has turned the corner to respectability.

A big May was certainly a good start. Last year, the Rangers were long gone by the July All-Atar break.

# SWC football features varied offenses

**HOUSTON (AP)**—Split personalities cause problems. Just look at Southwest Conference football.

Trying to defend each of the nine offensive schemes will be even more complicated in 1991, when Texas A&M and Arkansas must plug in new personnel virtually across the board.

Houston, Rice, SMU, TCU and Texas Tech will stretch defensive capabilities with their passing games. Texas and Baylor, like the Aggies and Razorbacks, will be run-oriented with controlled passing attacks that promise to be tough to defend.

"It's really kind of a split deal," Rice coach Fred Goldsmith says of the varied SWC offenses.

"Baylor has gone to more of a running game, like Arkansas. I would think Texas, with a guy like Butch Hadnot, would run the ball a lot. I hope they do put the ball in the air instead of giving it to Hadnot," Goldsmith said.

The Rice coach said his own club, along with those at Houston, TCU and SMU "will be more of a one-back look, so about half the conference will be running the I and

about half the conference will be running the one-back."

Texas Tech coach Spike Dykes frets about the defensive pressures that will be exerted.

"Our conference is getting more and more wide open," he says, "and your defense better be able to adjust from week to week and even in the game, because the offenses are so potent."

Take SMU, for example.

"They've been in the top 20 in pass offense most of the last two seasons. Arkansas was really something with (quarterback) Quinn Grovey and his bunch until they started getting people hurt. Then you've got teams like Houston and TCU that you know are coming out throwing with everything they've got."

"In our TCU game last year, they ran 72 plays of no running back. It was just a quarterback with five receivers running all over the place. That ought to be against the rules."

Told that UH quarterback David Klingler passed for 1,600 yards and 15 TDs in one spring scrimmage, Dykes said: "It may happen in a game sometime. They've taken a

concept of offense (the run-and-shoot) and taken it to a level that gives them a chance to be in the upper echelon."

Dykes added, "They couldn't have done it any other way. It's no accident, so it has to be coaching."

It's also another reason for defenses to keep evolving. Dykes, for one, became convinced of the need to change the Red Raiders' defensive base from a 4-3 to a 3-4.

His defensive coordinator, Carlos Mainord, had been trying to persuade Dykes for two years.

"Finally I woke up and saw the light," Dykes said. "You can adjust quicker with more people to handle the different kinds of offensive looks you get so much of these days."

The University of Houston is going back from an odd-man defensive line of last year to the 4-3 it played before Jack Pardee and his defensive coordinator, Jim Eddy, went to the Houston Oilers two years ago.

But the Cougars, too, will be adjusting constantly from three standard linebackers to a more mobile, strong safety type in passing situations.

"The game has become adjustments almost all of the time," Texas coach David McWilliams agrees. "There is no guarantee that your

opponent is going to play the same offense they played the week before, so you have to be able to adjust."

For the defending SWC champion Longhorns, the biggest adjustment may be replacing defensive player of the year Stanley Richard at free safety. Van Malone, a big hitter who must learn more caution in reading receivers, and Willie Mack Garza were the top contenders after spring practice ended.

UH coach John Jenkins foresees a different defensive problem each week. He said the league is as different and varied as it's ever been because of the differing offensive philosophies and combinations.

"Baylor looks like it's going to stay run-oriented, and Arkansas and possibly A&M are also very strong against the run. Texas will run 70 percent of the time, but still strive for balance between running and passing."

"Rice will be more of a balanced attack. Tech is always a team that adjusts from year to year because Spike changes to his personnel. With Billy Joe Tolliver at quarterback, they were a balanced offense. Then they were 90 percent run with James Gray two years ago. Last year, they ran a lot, but opened it up, also."

"SMU will spread its offense, and TCU is a multiple offense, much like Miami's."

Dykes cast an early championship vote for the Longhorns.

"I'm a big repeat guy, at least until someone beats them. There's a certain mystique in knowing how to do it, how to win a championship. Until you've done it at least once, it's hard to know what it's all about," Dykes said.

"Texas went from being an average, average team to a shot at the national championship in late November. It takes a lot of happen and a lot of action for that to happen from one year to the next, like they did."

Goldsmith adds: "Texas has solid performers. Shane Dronett (defensive end) is a leader of a defense with a lot

of good people. (Quarterback) Peter Gardere is a winner. He beats you in different ways."

Goldsmith also warns of the Aggies and Bears.

"Bucky Richardson (A&M quarterback) seems to be in an offense more suited to him. Baylor's personnel scares you, especially in the offensive and defensive lines."

Pro football Hall of Famer Don Hutson led the NFL in touchdowns eight times.

How sad to make his pets hated in the neighborhood because he is too dumb or too lazy to see to it that they are trained properly. You're going to hear plenty about your answer to that one. — Mrs. X

**DEAR MRS. X:** Right you are. Read on:

**FROM COLUMBUS, OHIO:** After more than 50 calls to the dog warden and many fights with my neighbor, I can understand why that man in Indiana shot those two dogs. A while back I counted 13 dogs running loose in our neighborhood. When I complained to animal control about dogs chasing my children on their bikes and scaring them to death, he said, "If you honestly believe that

the dogs are a threat to your children, go ahead and shoot 'em."

**AMARILLO, TEXAS:** A stray rottweiler attacked my 3-year-old son while I was raking leaves. Bashing the dog over the head repeatedly with the rake didn't even faze him. Finally I was able to wrest my son from the dog's jaws and carry him into the house. Thank the good Lord my son was wearing a leather jacket. It saved him. If I had had a gun I would have shot that dog.

**TOK, ALASKA:** I have 24 dogs. Half of them are sled dogs, and the others are pets. I've never lost a dog because he was running loose. My neighbors' dogs have killed chickens, treed my cats, littered my yard with garbage and caused no end of problems.

Terrorize or maul every jogger, bike rider, small child or elderly person in the neighborhood? Get shot by an angry neighbor who doesn't want his lawn ruined? Responsible owners do not let their dogs outside unattended, to be attacked by other dogs, shot by irate neighbors, kicked by a cow or horse,

or hit by a car and left dying along a road somewhere.

**LOUISVILLE, KY.:** There is no such thing as a dog who never bites. I have scars from two separate attacks, and both owners insisted that their pets were sweet and gentle and that I must have "done something" to provoke the animal. They made me feel that it was my fault—another example of blaming the victim.

Can you believe such ignorance?

So, dear readers, you have spoken eloquently, but I cannot condone shooting dogs that were doing nothing more than trespassing. Sorry.

## Red Cross Update

The aluminum can drive for Bangladesh is in full swing. Cans may be brought by the Red Cross office, on S. Main, or call to make arrangements to have the cans picked up.

The plight of the Kurds and other displaced people in Northern Iraq has

diverted attention from a series of recent natural disasters. These disasters are severely testing the response capability of global relief organizations.

On April 22, Costa Rica and Panama were hit by an earthquake that killed 66 people, injured 834 and left more than 11,000 homeless. The American Red Cross sent supplies and money.

On April 29, an earthquake hit Soviet Georgia, killing over 200 people, leaving 160,000 homeless. The American Red Cross sent assistance.

On April 30, a cyclone hit Bangladesh with 4 million people still lacking food and fresh water. The local Red Crescent volunteers, 21,000 strong, are working with the League of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies to help.

Many areas in Africa are threatened with famine. Sudan and Ethiopia have up to 14 million people in serious danger of starving this year. The League of Red Cross Societies have appealed for \$42.7 million for Ethiopia and \$25 million for Sudan for drought relief.

## Remember rules of safety during summer

Students are shouting, teachers are celebrating, mothers are pulling their hair! School's out and this is a happy time for most. The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind you to be watchful for children playing in or around the public streets and highways.

Major V.J. Cawthon, regional commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Region V, stated: "We want to remind all motorists that since school is out children will be playing, walking, and running everywhere. We, as motorists, need to be especially watchful for our younger people, because in the act of playing, they have a tendency of becoming excited and forgetting the rules of safety."

Major Cawthon reminded us that

since motorists are older and more mature than children that we need to accept the responsibility of an adult and help lookout for younger generation. Major Cawthon cautioned, "Motorist should be on the lookout for the kids on bicycles and be prepared to give the bicyclist the right of way to save a life."

Bicyclists need to be aware of laws regulating their using the public streets or highways. Bicyclists are required to obey all the laws that drivers of cars have to obey. They

must stop for stop signs and red lights, yield at yield signs, make legal turns, and ride in the same direction as vehicular traffic.

Now that school is out, let's all work together to help our children have a safe and happy summer vacation.

## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### Killing Time

One of the best ways to kill time is to work it to death. I don't know who said that first, but it fits most of us today. We live in a world filled with timesaving devices and yet there is never enough time. Every morning, we rewrite our to-do lists so we can tackle what we didn't get done yesterday.

The typical small business makes significant demands on the owner's time. Recently, the National Federation of Independent Businesses surveyed a large group of their members. Fifty-three percent of the respondents reported that they work more than 60 hours per week.

Unfortunately, putting in long hours is not a guarantee for success. Often, those who work the longest hours are wasting the most time. Long hours can cause fatigue that results in the loss of efficiency and productivity.

One of the most difficult management lessons is learning to work smarter, not harder. By working smarter, we can

eliminate waste and inefficiency.

Most of us are guilty of wasting some time. A recent survey published in *USA Today* tracked how some business executives wasted their time. According to the survey, nearly one-quarter of the workday was unproductive.

During the typical day, these executives burned up 15 minutes while on hold on the telephone. They wasted another 32 minutes reading or writing unneeded memos and letters. Unnecessary meetings destroyed the largest block of time, averaging 72 minutes per day.

### Activity or Productivity?

Perhaps one of the greatest time-wasters is confusing activity with productivity. We get busy doing trivial things. Urgent tasks that aren't important overwhelm us.

Before you undertake any activity, determine if it is vital. Will this work help you progress toward your goals? Will this activity help you serve your customers? Will it make your business more profitable? If the activity doesn't contribute to your success, don't do it.

Productive people focus on the results they wish to achieve. Of course, activity is required, but their focus is on the goal, not the work.

Most time management experts recommend setting aside time for planning. Use this time to review work that needs to be done. Prioritize activities into three lists: 1) vital, must do, 2) important, should do and 3) wouldn't it be nice. Discard everything else.

Tackle the first category at the beginning of the day. By concentrating on fewer tasks, you may find that you actually accomplish more. You can use the additional time to work on the lower priority items.

### Old Dogs, New Tricks

Recently, I attended a time management workshop. The presenter illustrated one of the worst time-wasting habits. She described an individual who had many projects going at one time. This person would start on the first task but leave it to work on another. Then, a third project would catch this person's attention, and the first two would be abandoned.

A good way to solve this problem is to clean off your desk. Work on only one project at a time until you complete it or until you have done all you can do. Put away that file and move on to the next highest-priority project.

Here are five of my favorite time management tips. 1) Plan. 2) Prioritize. Divide projects into "must do," "should do," "would be nice to do," and "don't do." 3) Don't attend meetings without written agendas. 4) Work on one item at a time. 5) Do it now.

## Extension News

Jam and jelly don't have to be "forbidden fruit" to people on sugar-restricted diets. Just use artificial sweetener instead of sugar when making them.

If an artificial sweetener is used, only a form of saccharin and/or I2D-K can be used. Aspartame such as Nutra-Sweet or Equal products can not be heated without destroying the effect of the sweetener.

Diet jams and jellies must be refrigerated or frozen unless they are made by the long boil method. And storing them in the freezer keeps the natural color and flavor of Texas strawberries, peaches or dewberries at peak quality. Leave at least one-half inch head space in the container before freezing.

Fresh strawberry jam can be made to suit special dietary requirements. To prepare fruit for jam, sort and wash fully-ripe fruit. Remove any stems or caps. Crush the fruit.

For jams, the method of combining ingredients varies with the form of pectin used. Powdered pectin is mixed with unheated crushed fruit, and liquid pectin is added to the cooked fruit and sweetener mixture immediately after it is removed from the heat.

Cooking time is one minute at a full boil. A full boil occurs when bubbles form over the entire surface of the mixture.

Jams made without added pectin or gelatin require longer cooking. Cook the mixture to a temperature of 221 degrees Fahrenheit.

If you are making jam without pectin or gelatin and a thermometer isn't available, just cook the product until it has thickened slightly. Allow for additional thickening as the

product cools. Also, when preparing jams, be sure to stir constantly to prevent scorching the fruit.

**Strawberry Jam with Pectin**  
1 qt. clean strawberries  
1 3/4 oz. pkg. powdered fruit pectin  
3-4 teaspoons artificial sweetener  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
Red food coloring as desired

Crush the strawberries in a one and one-half quart sauce pan. Stir in artificial sweetener, food coloring, powdered pectin and lemon juice. Bring to a boil and boil for one minute. Remove from the heat. Continue to stir for two minutes. Pour into freezer containers, cover and freeze. Thaw before serving. Store in the refrigerator after opening. One tablespoon provides five calories.

Jams made by the long boil method require another procedure. You may follow tested recipes for jams made by a long boil method without the addition of pectin.

Cook the fruit with liquid sweetener until jam is of desired consistency. Substitute two tablespoons of liquid sweetener for each cup of sugar called for in the original recipe. Pour the boiling hot jam into clean, hot jars and seal each jar as soon as it is filled.

For making strawberry jam by the long boil method, take four cups of crushed strawberries, eight tablespoons of liquid sweetener. Measure crushed strawberries into kettle. Add sweetener and stir well. Boil rapidly, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Fill and seal containers. Process in a boiling water bath for five minutes. One tablespoon provides 10 calories.

### CHOOSING SUNGLASSES

We're learning more and more about the damage that sun can do, to our eyes as well as our skin. To make it easier for you to choose effective sunglasses protection, the Food and Drug Administration, together with the Sunglass Association of America, adopted ratings last year. You can choose cosmetic, general-purpose or special-purpose lenses; the last are recommended for beach and ski-slope use.

There are other things to consider, too, like the shape and size of the frame. Best bet is a large, wraparound frame that keeps the lenses close to the eyes so the sun can't get through.

Color and darkness of lenses don't matter much. Dark green or dark gray lenses are less likely to distort natural colors. Amber or polarized lenses may be preferred by drivers, boaters and skiers.

Plastic lenses are safer because they're less breakable than glass, but they are easily scratched. Top-quality polycarbonate lenses are now coated with a scratch-resistant finish.

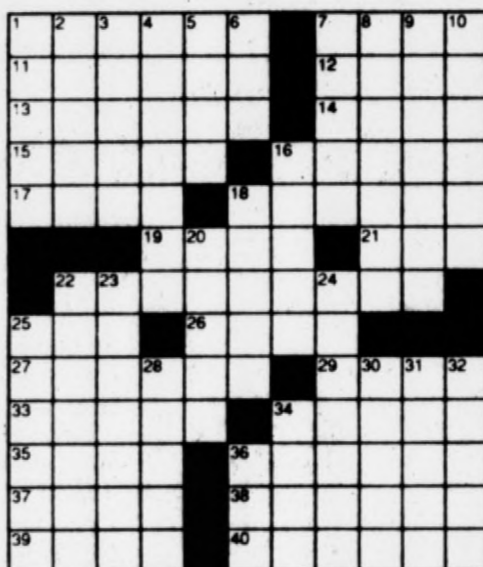

## Rolling with the punches on Broadway's biggest night

### 'Miss Saigon,' 'Will Rogers' duel for top Tony honors

Broadway can be a nasty place. Take for instance last month's *I Hate Hamlet* incident in which Nicol Williamson lectured co-actor Evan Handler in front of the audience, then hit him with a sword during a dueling scene. Handler, outraged, walked off stage (undoubtedly to rehearse for *I Hate Nicol*), and an understudy finished the performance.

But don't expect high drama like that on Broadway's biggest night of the year: Tony night. The 1991 Tony Awards will be doled out Sunday, June 2, and everyone will exhibit their best behavior for CBS' cameras. May 6, Tyne Daly properly announced the nominees at a press conference at Sardi's restaurant in New York. May 15, each nominee was decorously presented with a Tony certificate at the official 1991 Nominees Brunch. And both winners and losers will rub elbows after the telecast at a Taittinger champagne reception ball.

This year's big vote-getters are *Miss Saigon*, a Vietnam-set *Madame Butterfly*, and *The Will Rogers Follies*, a kudo to the American actor and humorist. The two are tied with 11 nominations each. Leading actors and actresses in both shows are contenders — Jonathan Pryce and Lea Salonga for *Miss Saigon* and Keith Carradine and Dee Hoty for *Will Rogers*. (Despite rave reviews for his *I Hate Hamlet* performance, Nicol Williamson found himself left in the cold.)

Julie Andrews and Jeremy Irons will co-host the soiree. Both are acting-award vets. Irons won a Tony for *The Real Thing* and copped an Oscar this year for *Reversal of Fortune*. Andrews has two Tony nominations to her credit and won an Academy Award for *The Sound of Music*.

Another particularly genteel Tony-winner will be among those handing out 1991's trophies. You can bet Carol Channing will be aglow with graciousness, a nasty word for no one.

In a recent interview, the ever-smiling blond dynamo spoke with an air of congeniality that has surely contributed to her success.

In fact, people still pop out of manholes to shout, "Hello, Dolly!" to her. After more than 3,000 Broadway performances of *Hello, Dolly!*, Channing says she finally lost count. She won a Tony for the role, beating out the likes of Barbra Streisand in *Funny Girl* and Bea Lillie in *High Spirits*.

What was it like winning the Tony? Nerve racking, says Channing. Nine trophies had already been awarded the show; they saved hers for last. "I thought, 'Oh no, what if I don't win? Everyone else has won!'" For the actress, now 70, it was worth the wait.

This year's competition will be tough. Channing saw *Miss Saigon* in London with her longtime friend, the late Mary Martin: "I've heard it's better here," she says... "and *The Secret Garden* has an aura all its own." Of *The Will Rogers Follies* she raves, "I had such a good time. I don't care what anybody says."

*60 Minutes* recently ran a story about a *New York Times* critic whose opinion could make or break a show. What does Channing think about that? "Isn't that what people new to Broadway always say about the critics?" she says unconcerned. She's weathered the punches with the best of them.

Thought for Tony day: Carry a big sword, but speak softly, and definitely don't beat anyone one with it.

**Robin Leach began as news reporter**

Each week, Robin Leach brings champagne wishes and caviar dreams to millions of viewers as he searches for the best of the good life. But what many viewers don't know is that Leach started his career as a news reporter, and it's only been in the last 10 years that he's been living the good life.

Leach began his journalism career at the age of 15 in England as a general news reporter for the *Harrow Observer* and then moved on to the *Daily Mail*. At that time he was Britain's youngest reporter. When he was 21 he moved to New York and wrote for a number of publications. Leach eventually became the show-business editor for *The Star*.

In 1980, Leach joined CNN's *People Tonight* after reporting for morning shows in Los Angeles and New York. He also reported for *Entertainment Tonight*. In 1983, Leach and the president and founder of TeleRep developed *Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous*. Leach wanted a show that looked at the celebrities intimately and made millionaires and moguls into stars. Four years later, *Runaway With the Rich and Famous* premiered, and a new show, *Home Videos of the Stars*, is expected to debut this fall.

Leach has authored three books and is now working on his first novel. In addition to his television shows, he does voice-overs for numerous commercials that stress the good life.

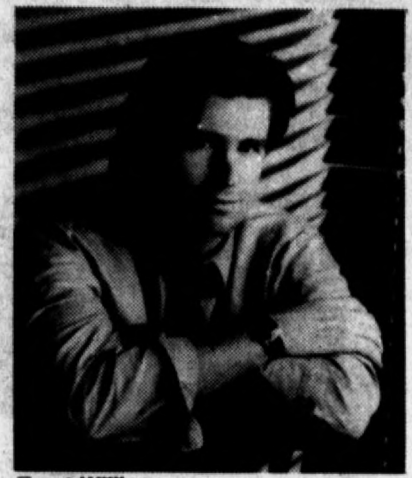
**Q:** Will you please tell me who sings the theme song for *In the Heat of the Night*? It is my favorite. —Margaret Mullins, Benton, Ark.

### CBS' plans announced for NFL season

CBS Sports launches its 36th season of National Football League coverage Sunday, Sept. 1, and will feature 95 games throughout the season, climaxing with Super Bowl XXVI.

The network opens the 17-week regular season with a doubleheader that includes Philadelphia at Green Bay, Tampa Bay at the New York Jets, Atlanta at Kansas City and Dallas at Cleveland. For a nightcap, viewers will see either Phoenix at the Los Angeles Rams or Minnesota at Chicago.

The New York Giants, who narrowly defeated Buffalo in last year's Super Bowl, will make 10 appearances beginning Sept. 8 when they host the Los Angeles Rams. Other appearances include division battles against Philadelphia, Dallas and Phoenix, as well as NFC showdowns with Chicago, Tampa Bay and the Rams. On Dec. 1, the Giants travel to Cincinnati to take on the Bengals in a game that has become one of the traditional NFC-AFC grudge matches.

The Giants will kick off CBS Sports' pre-season schedule with a Saturday, Aug. 10, game against the Cleveland Browns. The Super Bowl runner-up Buffalo Bills will take center stage the next two weeks with games against the Green Bay Packers and the NFC Central champion Chicago Bears.

Other season highlights include 11 appearances each by the San Francisco 49ers and Chicago Bears and two by Buffalo.

David Birney has taken on a new mission as a pollster on Lifetime's weekday series *Great American TV Poll*. I asked Birney about the show: **Jeff Ambler:** Could you describe the show for me?

**David Birney:** It's a blend of news, information and entertainment, which uses the Princeton Survey Research Associates. It will deal with a variety of issues. ... We dealt with vigilantism and found out that 44 percent of Americans don't trust their local police, and this poll was done before the Los Angeles videotape incident. We also polled some parents and found out their attitudes on how they feel about their child going to school with another child who has AIDS.

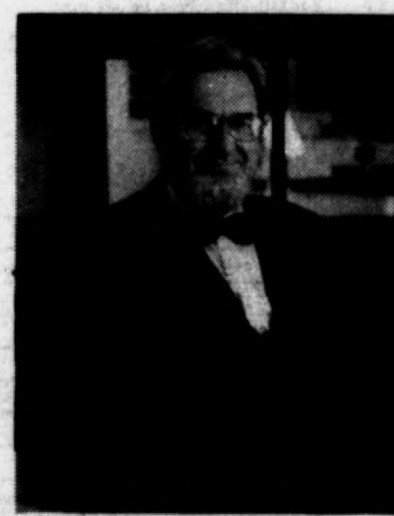
**J.A.:** Do you feel this show is significant to society?

**D.B.:** I do because no matter how trivial the subject is at first or how substantial the issue is, it forces you to look at your own attitudes and your culture.

**J.A.:** Are all the questions dealing with current news events?

**D.B.:** No, not at all. We deal with lighter subjects such as sex, the media and just general information-type issues. We also have a man-on-the-street segment where we ask people would-you-ever-do-this- and would-you-ever-do-that-type questions, and you would be surprised what people will say right to the camera.



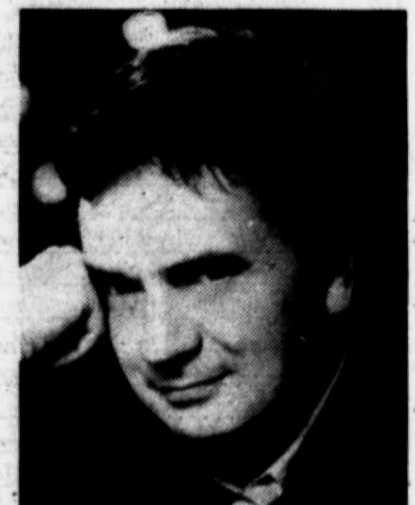

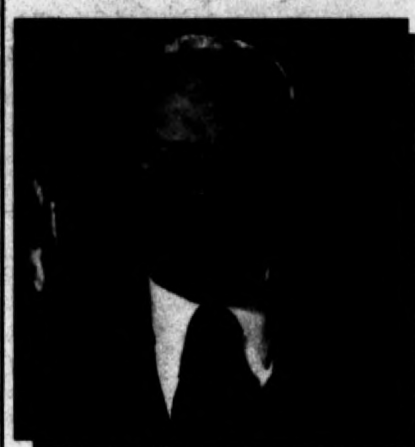

**THELMA AND LOUISE:** Starring Susan Sarandon and Geena Davis.

This is one fabulous movie. Director/producer Ridley Scott (*Alien, Blade Runner, Black Rain*) combines his mastery of dramatic visual imagery in a humorous and uplifting story about two women who, by re-routing the course set for them by society, ultimately change the direction of their destiny.

Susan Sarandon, a jaded waitress, and Geena Davis, a bored housewife, give laceratingly acute performances as the women who,

sick of their oppressive men, take a weekend road trip together - a cinematic journey filled with friendship, character and truth.

At a roadside honky-tonk, somewhere in Arkansas, something happens that changes their lives forever. They become Bonnie and Clyde without Clyde. Against their will, they become Bonnie and Bonnie. This movie is not, however, about male-bashing. It is about truth, and it never deviates from that.

*Thelma and Louise* is blisteringly funny; it's dramatic, it's even slightly mythical in its proportions. It is smartly and incisively written

(by Callie Khor), stylishly directed, beautifully photographed, and wonderfully acted.

Do not let anyone tell you about this movie - see it for yourself. Rated R for language, violence and sex.

**THE ADVENTURES OF ROBIN HOOD:** (1938) Starring Errol Flynn and Olivia de Havilland.

This classic presents Errol Flynn at his swashbuckling best. He is backed up in this color spectacular by a perfect cast of supporting actors.

Olivia de Havilland is Maid Marian, Alan Hale and Eugene Pallette are Little John and Friar Tuck. The bad guys are also at their evil best, as played by Basil Rathbone and Claude Rains.

**THE YEARLING:** (1946) Starring Gregory Peck, Jane Wyman and Claude Jarman, Jr.

*The Yearling* is a beautiful film version of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings' sensitive story of a young boy's love for a pet fawn that his father must destroy.

It was exquisitely filmed, in Technicolor, on location in Florida. Simply told, this emotionally-charged drama has been called one of the finest films ever made. It won Oscars for Cinematography, Art Direction, and a special Oscar for newcomer Claude Jarman (tragically killed some years later in an automobile accident). Unrated but would be a PG.

**12 ANGRY MEN:** (1957/Black & White) Starring Henry Fonda, Lee J. Cobb, Ed Begley, Sr., and E.G. Marshall.

A superb cast, under the inspired direction of Sidney Lumet, makes this film brilliant in every aspect.

Henry Fonda is the sole holdout on a jury that seeks to convict a boy accused of murdering his father. Fonda desperately seeks to convince his eleven peers to reconsider their hasty vote. The struggle behind closed doors is taut, charged, and fascinating. Unrated but would be a PG.

**HOW TO SUCCEED IN BUSINESS WITHOUT REALLY TRYING:** (1967) Starring Robert Morse, Rudy Vallee and Michelle Lee.

This is a near-perfect musical based on the Pulitzer Prize-winning Broadway show, with most of the original cast intact. Robert Morse plays the window washer who schemes, connives, and plots his way to the top of the Worldwide Wicket Company.

The musical numbers by Loesser and Lowe (*Brotherhood of Man* and *I Believe in You*) are staged with as much exuberance as topflight Broadway shows. Unrated but would be a G.
