Larry Watson Named New Juvenile Officer

Larry Watson, 24, was named this week as the new Deaf Smith County Juvenile Probation officer, according to an announcement from Donald Hicks, juvenile board chairman.

Watson is presently serving as an assistant in the Potter County Juvenile Probation Department and will assume duties here March 1. His appointment was confirmed by the juvenile board in a meeting here Wednesday afternoon.

Hicks said the board agreed that the appointment "opens

the door" for a new and revamped program in dealing with juveniles. Watson added that he views the post as being more case-worker oriented than that of law enforcement.

PART OF the change in the program came about as a result of the new Family Code laws in Texas. The new law requires that the juvenile judge be a licensed attorney. In Deaf Smith County, as in many counties, this removed the jurisdiction from the county judge's hands. Dist. Judge Archie McDonald is now the juvenile judge for Deaf Smith

The local juvenile board is composed of two represen-

tatives each from the county, city and school, along with the county judge—who is required by law to be a member. Hicks and Rev. Doug Manning are the county representatives; Charlie Bell and Paul Abalos represent the city, and Ruth Word and Larry Wartes are school representatives. All members of the board were present Wednesday except Mrs.

Each of the political subdivision pay a third of the cost of the juvenile probation office. Watson was employed as one of four assistants in the Potter County Juvenile Probation office for about two years. He is presently working on his master's degree in criminology and corrections from Sam Houston

A native of Sunray, Watson is the son of Rev. and Mrs. W.H. Watson of Amarillo. Watson's wife, Judy, is a native of the Lubbock area and they have one daughter, Rhonda, who is two-years old. They are members of the Methodist Church.

The county has been without a juvenile officer for several months, following the resignation of Leon Gorrell who joined the sheriff's department as a deputy.

WT Vegetable Growers To Meet Here Tuesday

The potato and onion will take the spotlight in the Bull Barn Tuesday as West Texas vegetable growers meet for their annual conference.

Vegetable growers and shippers in the area, together with the industry, Extension service and research representatives, will be studying all phases of production and marketing of vegetables grown in the area.

Registration for the event is scheduled for 9 a.m. and is open to the public. Registration fee is \$5 each with \$2.50 for students. A noon wef barbecue

will be included in the day's activities. "We especially want all shippers, their employees and growers to attend this conference if they can make it," said Juston McBride, Deaf Smith County Extension Agent. 'The conference will deal in detail with many phases of handling and shipping and it will be very interesting to local persons interested in

vegetables."

THE CONFERENCE is being sponsored by the West Texas Vegetable Growers Association and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Potato diseaser and disease prevention, soil fertility, insect control, potato handling, shipping, merchandising and promotion all will be dealt with during the day's activities.

'Industry and business representatives are strongly supporting this program financially to make possible presentations by experts from other states," said Dr. Roland Roberts, Extension vegetable specialist of Lubbock.

Theme of the conference will be "Space Age Vegetable Shipping and Mechanization."

REGISTRATION for the conference

at 10 a.m. Bruce Parr, president of the WT Vegetable Growers' Assn., will welcome guests at 9:45 a.m. followed by the 10 a.m. talk by Dr. Bill C. Clymer of Amarillo concerning "A Look at the Vegetable Insect Situation.

Dr. Robert W. Berry of Lubbock will conduct a session at 10:30 a.m. concerning "Effective Potato Disease Control.

At 11 a.m. 'Potato Diseases in the Arid Southwest," will be discussed by Dr. Albert O. Paulus of Riverside, Calif.; to be followed by the mon harberne.

AFTER LUNCH Headlee Wright, president of the National Potato Promotion Board of Colorado, and Ernest D. Cornwall, central field representative of The Potato Board will conduct a session about potatoes.

Dr. Creighton Miller of Lubbock will then conduct a session entitled "A&M Vegetable Breeding Highlights," at 1:30 p.m. followed by "Tech Vegetable Research Highlights," by Dr. John Downes of Lubbock.

At 2:15 p.m. William Aldred will discuss the A&M Mechanical Onion Harvester and then Parr will conduct the business session of the conference at 2:45

"A&M Vegetable Research Highlights" by Dr. William Lipe of Lubbock.

ONE OF THE programs in the conference will be about the revolutionary device known as the "Zapper" and will be presented by the Oceanography Intemational Corporation.

"In a successful vegetable industry, there is a strong interdependence between persons in the growing and handling phases of the business," said Dr. Roland Roberts in relation to the conference Tuesday. 'Each shipper has ested interest in seeing to it that he does the best possible job of preserving vegetable quality on the way to market. And likewise, each grower wants to produce vegetables of the highest quality, to gain the greatest return per pack and preserve a quality image in the

buyers' eye.' "We expect this conference to offer a unique opportunity for vegetable growers and others to discuss crucial matters in the future prosperity of our industry," Roberts added.

Three games are on tap Tuesday with the soph clash set for 4 p.m., the JV contest at 5:45, and the varsity feature at 7:30.

THE WESTERNERS rallied in the closing minutes of the game at Lubbock Friday night after Whiteface reserves got into he action, and after big Dan VanderZee fouled out of the game. Both teams went to the charity line frequently in the closing minutes, and Hereford hit only 1 of 5 free shots.

VanderZee led the scoring for Hereford with 17 points, while Lynn Tarr and Dennis Noggler shared the attack by hitting 16 points each. James Harris was also in double figures with 10 points.

MIKE ALBIAR, the other starter, had only two points—the lowest total for him this season. However, Coach Barry Armwine had high praise for his playmaking guard, explaining that "Mike sacrificed for the good of the team." Arnwine said Lubbock's strategy was to cut off Albiar as a scoring threat, playing a 2-2 zone and putting one player on Mike



company began operations in 1936 with headquarters in Oklahoma City. The firm had grown to 128 stores at the end of 1957 when purchased by Butler Brothers of Chicago, remaining an autonomous division and continuing under the management of TG&Y officers.

The division had climbed to 219 stores by 1960, the year Butler Brothers was purchased by City Products Corp., with headquarters in Chicago and operating throughout the U.S. City Products and its -subsidiaries conduct a diversified business consisting primarily of the sales of general merchandise through company-owned and franchised stores, home furnishings and department stores.

Scott Stores, a subsidiary of City Products, merged with TG&Y in 1969. Scott operated 110 stores in 18 states, with most of its outlets being clustered in the Great Lakes and Middle Western states. This merger brought all of City Products' company-owned variety stores into the TG&Y division.

PLANS FOR the growth of TG&Y call for 1,000 stores by 1975, doing a volume of about \$800 million. The firm is scheduled

for a 15 to 20 per cent increase per year for the next five to seven years. Additional warehouses are planned, with a 350,000 square-foot facility to open in Houston this year.

TG&Y considers their stores to be of three classes: one is the expended variety store, primarily convenience merchandise ranging to about 15,000 square feet; secondly, the family center unit ranging from 20,000 to 30,000 square feet; and thirdly; the larger family center unit ranging from 40,000 to 80,000 square feet.







College Offers "Vanishing Art"

A vanishing yet highly paid art — sign painting — will be taught at South Plains College for the first time this spring.

Don Stroud, associate professor of art at SPC, will instruct the course, apparently the only one of its kind offered in any Texas college.

Time and date of classes will

be announced later.

The sign painting course will be a two-year program with onthe-job training during the summers, Stroud said.

Students will have a chance to work part-time during the summer and receive training from Vernon Hill, a professional sign painter with 15 years experience in the sign painting business. Hill has the only sign painting company in Levelland, Vernon Hill Sign Co. at 115 W. 1st. Students will receive a grade for both classroom and on the job work, Stroud said.

Hill termed sign painting a 'vanishing art." He said there is a "terrific need" for sign painters. 'It's one of the highest paid skills and it's going to get better." he said.

Hill estimated that a sign painter can earn anywhere from \$4.50 to \$12.50 an hour, depending on the area they are

in. He said that a skilled sign painter could earn about \$10.50 an hour in the Levelland area.

The sign painting course can be taught on the SPC campus or at the college extention centers in Lubbock and Plainview. 





Price Advocates Better Insulation

Price of Texas introduced legislation to encourage businessmen to improve the level of insulation in their homes and businesses as a step toward conserving fuel consumption.

The new provision would enable the Treasury Secretary to allow a federal income tax deduction based on the costs of improved insulative materials. If passed, the measure would go into effect for taxable years beginning in 1973.


The bill already includes an income tax deduction of up to \$1000 a year for home repairs and maintenance. The new provision would allow the insulation deduction in addition to other repairs.

Price noted that while 17.9 per cent of U.S. energy consumption goes for heating of homes and offices; some 40 per cent of that energy is wasted due to inadequate building insulation.

"My bill would provide a



Amarillo Whether or not the oil embargo is lifted soon or several months from now, one thing is certain .The embargo is not effective because we are receiving much more oil than we should under a complete embargo.

However, the world's hunger for oil will not diminish for several years until alternate. sources of fuel are developed and Americans/in particular, change their driving habits and living standards when it comes to fuels.

Since the price of oil isn't expected to drop much below present levels, the earnings of oil companies will depend on just how well they increase output and where that output comes from. The big push now is away from the Mideast and into countries where embargos are unlikely, even though the cost of crude produced in those "safe" countries will rise with worldwide crude prices.

"Safe" producing areas would be the North Sea, Nigeria, Canada, Venezuela, Peru, Colombia, Ecuador, Trinidad, Australia, Indonesia and Wes. Africa. The Mideast, with the possible exception of Iran, would be "unsafe".

But remember, "safe" means only that production is assured, not that it is secure from the threat of higher prices as the price of crude goes up. There are numerous ways the producing country can jack up the price to the oil company, through royalties and-or taxes or outright demand of a participation in the actual oil production at the expense of the producing oil company.

The only "safe" country in the Mideast today as far as production is concerned, is. Iran. But it is high-risk in terms of taxes or other means of getting the maximum share of revenue out of the oil produced. Indonesia is regarded thus far as reasonable both as to production and price. ezuela, however put through a severe price increase

Why did he make the bicycle



More Red Meat For Consumers Is Goal

DEAF SMITH COUNTY

Of A&M Research An intensified research program designed to increase

red meat supplies for consumers is being launched by animal scientists with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. To cut costs for both con-

sumers and producers, the expanded beef research effort will enable cattlemen to maximize their beef cattle operations by improving overall efficiency, said Dr. Jarvis E. Miller, director of the Experiment Station, the state's agricultural research agency:

The long-range research program focuses on management systems for improving reproduction in cattle and will utilize the talents of the state's and nation's most outstanding researchers, Miller added.

Dr. O.D. Butler, professor and head of Texas A&M University's Animal Science Department, said the research improved animal reproduction will have four

major objectives. 'The first will be to obtain and analyze data which will allow more accurate prediction

of reproduction rate in cattle. "The second will be to develop and apply management techniques to cause cows to calve at 10-month intervals," Butler said.

"Third goal of the project will be to determine the effect of various management techniques on the rate, efficiency and economy of reproduction performance in

"Fourth major research goal will be to select for native fertility in cattle. This will mean utilizing cows with a history of outstanding reproduction, either through multiple births or short interval calving," Butler explained.

"We expect to develop research which will have a dramatic impact on the ecomomy and immediate and far-reaching effects on the beef industry," Bufler said.

Numbers Down, Value Up . . . Feed Grain Stocks .. . See Your County Agent .. . Red Meat **Production Declines.**

While the number of sheep and goats in Texas is about the same now as a year ago, the number of sheep farms in the state dropped 1,000 compared to a year ago and 2,500 compared to two years ago.

All sheep and lambs in the state totaled 3,200,000 head, about the same as a year ago. The number of sheep farms in Texas is estimated at 12,500, compared to 13,500 a year ago and 14,500 two years ago.

The number of goats and kids on Texas farms and ranches as of January 1 was 1,350,000, down 16 per cent

Nationwide, the inventory of all sheep and lambs is down seven per cent from a year ago. Texas has about 20 per cent of all sheep and lambs in the nation.

The total value of all sheep and lambs at \$32.70 per head means a combined value of more than half a billion dollars. A year ago, the value was \$468,000,000, or an average of \$26.40 per head.

STOCKS of the four feed grains-corn, barley, oats, and grain sorghum-totaled 288,000,000 bushels in Texas, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Wheat stocks held in all positions are estimated at 53,000,000 bushels compared with 87,000,000 bushels a

Grain sorghum stocks are set at 233,000,000 bushels, down 242,000 bushels from a year ago.

Corn stocks at 37,800,000 bushels compared with 25,800,000 bushels a year ago.

Nationwide, January 1 stocks of all grains except grain sorghum and soybeans were below year earlier levels. Stocks of the four feed grains were seven per cent below those of a year ago.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is in charge of the program on a state level. Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said the experiment will help the \$85,000,000 sheep and goat industry in Texas stay in existence. "The project also means more suits, sweaters, and lamb chops for the consumer" he said.

COMMERCIAL slaughter plants in Texas produced 169,200,000 pounds of red meat during December, 1973. This is down eight per cent from the previous month and four per cent below the total produced a year ago.



For an item with a 10-year life, the first year's depreciation would be 10-55 (10 +9+8+7+6+5+4+3+2 + 1 - 55) of property cost reduced by salvage value. The final year's depreciation would be 1-55 of this cost.







Banana Peels And The Law

So many people are injured by stepping on banana peels and other slippery substances that lawyers talk about "slip-and-fall" as a separate branch of law. And special rules are invoked to determine questions of legal liability. Take a typical case:

A housewife, shopping at the market, skidded on a banana peel, fell, and sustained a broken arm. When she filed suit for damages, the management argued that the peel had probably been dropped by a careless customer -not by an employee of the market.

But the woman pointed out that the peel had been lying in plain sight of four checkout clerks-and that two other employees had walked right past it shortly before her accident. This was poor maintenance, said the court, upholding the woman's



Generally speaking, the management of a store is liable for a slip-and-fall accident if it knew or should have known-about the hazardous condition. This may call for a kind of detective work in figuring out how long the slippery material had been lying on the floor.

For example, liability in one case was based largely on the fact that the ice cream on which a man slipped had pretty much melted; in another, that a lettuce leaf was "old, dirty, and mashed" when stepped on; in another, that a fallen piece of candy had heel marks in it.

These telltale clues helped to prove that the object had been on the floor long enough to have been observed and cleared away, if store employees had been on

On the other hand, the management may be able to pin a negligence label on the victim himself for not having been more

Furthermore, a store cannot be held liable merely because the accident happened on its premises. Thus, a man who slipped on a pencil found himself unable to win damages from the market

where it happened. The court said there was sim ply no way to discover who had dropped the pencil or how long it had lain there. Placing blame on market employees, said the court, would be a "mereguess."



Gas By Half-Gallon? It May Happen Here

AUSTIN-Buy gasoline by the half-gallon and multiply for the correct price?

It may happen in Texas if gasoline prices go over 50 cents a gallon.

State regulations issued in January will allow gasoline pumps unable to indicate a price over 49,9 cents a gallon to display the price per half-gallon. Sale price registered on the pump will be half the actual total which can be computed by multiplying by two.

The new regulations, which apply to retail dealers, will go into effect only if gasoline exceeds 50 cents a gallon.

They will be enforced by the weights and measures section of the Texas Department of Agriculture. Department inspectors are responsible for checking gasoline pumps to certify that meters are accurate:

According to Ed Whitesides, director of the Department's Consumer Services Division, pumps manufactured before 1965 do not have enough digits to register higher prices anticipated for automotive and truck fuels.

Later/models are equipped with additional numerals for possible conversion to the metric system.

Only one company in the nation manufactures petroleum meters for retail pumps. A spokesman for the company, Veeder-Root, estimates it will be late 1975 before enough equipment

can be produced to meet national demands. Regulations require that dealers inform customers of the changes in large type affixed to the pumps. Labels must read "½ total price" and "per half gallon" by the unit price. Beneath the unit price another label must state the price per gallon.

A foot-square weatherproof sign must be placed on top of the dispenser to warn buyers of the changes.

Advertising petroleum fuel products will continue to be done in gallon values. If the regulations go into effect, Whitesides warns consumers to be on the look-out for dealers whose advertising or labeling is misleading.

Whitesides said, "We can't
control the price of gasoline but we can help to assure that the customer gets what he is paying for - whether gas is 36 or 60 cents a

Weight Watchers Warned Of Health Spa Exploits

If you're one of the many Americans who have a weight problem, you've probably often wished for a quick, easy way to overcome it.

Remember that your doctor is the best source of information about how to lose weight or inches. He most likely will tell you that proper diet and a program of exercise tailored to your individual needs are the only effective ways to deal with the problem.

Many legitimate health salons or athletic clubs offer facilities designed to make exercise more inviting. These establishments do not claim to work miracles with special treatments or machines, although they may offer them to customers who request them.

There are some establishments, however, which tout such "passive" processes or devices as the ultimate answer to weight control. This is an appealing prospect to many overweight control. This is an appealing prospect to many overweight persons.

Attorneys in my Consumer Protection Division investigated numerous complaints about such businesses and their claims in a special court of inquiry held in Dallas. recently at my request.

If you're considering using such methods or machines, you can avoid disappointments and possible health hazards if you know how they work. Then you and your doctor can judge whether they would be of any use to you in your weight control program.

St. Valentine's Day

We have in history several Saint Valentines and most are linked to February 14th. There are several versions of how Valentine's Day became a day for lovers but probably the most reasonable explanation is that the custom grew out of the general belief of the Middle Ages that birds began to mate on February 14th.

It was the custom in many countries for names of boys and girls to be drawn from boxes on the 14th and gifts were then

exchanged. Can you remember the first school or neighborhood playmate you asked to be your Valentine? Was the offer accepted? Did it provoke giggles or did the quarry run away? How simple and nice it was, or was it?

Few will forget their first Valentine, when nature first begins to work its magnetic force on unsuspecting children starting life's long road.

McGovern & 1976

George McGovern, the South Dakota Senator who led the Democratic Party to a rout in the 1972 presidential election, is running for reelection in his native state this year. Asked recently about 1976, McGovern said he has no intention to run again, that it would take "one whale of a

change to make me change my mind." McGovern's overwhelming defeat was not the only reason his reentry into the presidential picture seems unlikely, even undesirable, to many Democrats. It was McGovern's idealistic activists who took control of the Democratic Party. in 1972 and allowed major splits to develop, in effect helping give President Nixon an almost unprecedent-

In that process the South was almost kissed away. The new party hierarchy has striven hard to put the party back together again since that defeat; a candidate who appeals to all factions is the choice of the new party machine, and some also want one not tainted by scandal (Senator Henry Jackson fits both those requirements).

McGovern, then, would seem to be out of it for 1976 (just as was Senator Barry Goldwates after his merciless rout in 1964) for the good of his own party.

Promise Of Youth

A poll conducted recently by the magazine "Scholastic Life" eloquently refutes the claim the nation's young people are a lost generation of drug addicts, social misfits, etc. The answers to questions asked (in 2,000 schools) are

highly encouraging. One of the questions concerned a ban on tobacco smoking in public places. The young people queried favored it overwhelmingly. Likewise, a majority supported the proposal for manda-

tory tests of high school students to determine the presence of drugs. A large majority agreed their future in America is largely in their own hands-to make of it what they will.

Lastly, a majority favors the proposition that every high school student should enjoy the right to a college education, if able to qualify for entrance.

All of which indicates today's high school seniors and juniors (those questioned) have their feet rather solidly on the ground. That's good to know, and recognize, in these days and times.

FROM INDUSTRIAL NEWS REVIEW

Some people still refuse to face the reality of the petroleum shortage. They find the allegation that oil companies are conspiring to hold out gasoline supplies to boost prices and get other advantages more comforting to their sense of security. Unfortunately, there is a critical shortage, and no spigot can be turned on overnight when "the price is right."

As to the conspiracy fairy tale, an oil company+ article points out that some 60 federal agencies and bureaus, numerous congressional committees and local agencies which govern industry activities are "... more than sufficient reason to question the credibility of the conspiracy theory."

In connection with the problems of supply that independent marketers are having, the situation should be obvious. There is less gasoline available than the people of the United States are accustomed to using. Our traditional sorplus of gasoline, which independents bought from any company that had gasoline to sell is unavailable due to deficiency in supply.

As for the monopoly charge—let the facts speak. Competition is still strong in the industry. It takes 25 of the largest oil companies to account for 66 per cent of the nation's crude oil and natural gas liquids production and 78 per cent of , the total gasoline market.

Any serious, objective survey of the energy shortage brings the conclusion that hiding one's head in the sand to escape danger better be left to the ostrich. A coordinated national energy policy based on the realities of the petroleum supply situation is imperative. We must develop domestic sources of energy that will free the US. from critical dependence on foreign powers.

Talk Of Texas

By JACK MAGUIRE THE CHANGING TIME - Like

everything else, the cost of writing a new state constitution is going up. Each member of the Con-

stitutional Convention in session now has at least one secretary, plus the services of dozens of clerks, pages and other assistants. They also got \$50 a day in salary, plus the \$400 monthly expense allowance they normally receive as members of the

Things were a lot different in 1875 when delegates gathered in Austin to write the present Constitution. They were so frugal with the taxpayer's money that they elected one of their own members to serve as secretary for all. They elected another to serve as sergeant-at-arms.

After considerable debate, they finally voted themselves a wage of \$5 per day, plus another \$5 for each 25 miles traveled in getting to Austin.

CALIFORNIA, HERE WE COME - During the five years between 1965 and 1970, an average of 26,000 Texans deserted the Lone Star State to become residents of California.

According to a Los Angeles firm that keeps track of such statistics, Texas supplied more migrants to California than any other state. New York, with 25,000, was a close second. Illinois, which furnished 22,000 new Californians each year during the period, was third.

IT'S WORTH NOTING - That Praha, Fayette County, is the mother village of all Czech settlements in the U.S.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY SCHOOL - What may be Texas' smallest coeducational "college" teaches a single course that enables its graduates to earn between \$20,000 and \$30,000 a year.

It's the North Texas Horseshoeing Institute at Grapevine, Tarrant County. For a tuition fee of \$750 (plus an additional \$110 if the student wants a dormitory room), the institute turns out qualified "master farriers" after ten weeks of instruction. Classes last from ten to 12 hours a day and go on for ten weeks. Maximum enrollment is 22 students.

Horseshoeing, once the private domain of the village blacksmith and a craft believed to require an unusual amount of brawn, now is becoming a vocation for women, too. A half dozen girls have received their certificates from the Grapevine school and one or two are in every new class.

IT TAKES ALL KINDS - To reduce the high cost of dying, some. residents of the piney woods have organized the East Texas Pine Box Association to provide burial cases for members.

Those who join are guaranteed that they'll be buried in a wooden box, pine or otherwise. The cost will be between \$25 and \$40, plus whatever additional the mortician charges for his minimal services.

By circumventing the high cost of fancy caskets, members hope to get funeral charges to a figure well below \$100.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? -Quitaque, Briscoe County, was named for a Comanche Indian word meaning "horse manure."

CORRECTING THE HISTORIANS - In the Lyndon Baines Johnson Library at Austin, there is a ship's bell on display which supposedly was aboard the USS Houston when the heavy cruiser was sunk by the Japanese in World War II.

It wasn't.

The plaque dispalyed with the bell reads: "This bell is of the USS Houston of the United States Fleet sank during the Battle of the Java Sea in World War II. It was recovered by the Republic of the Philippines and presented at Corregidor on the 26th of October,


It's true that the bell once was aboard the USS Houston. It also was presented to President Johnson by President Marcos of the Philippines. But President Johnson never was told that this bell was not aboard the Houston when Japanese shelling sent it to the bottom.

There were two bells that belonged to the USS Houston. The one displayed at the LBJ Library was removed from the ship and ordered scrapped several years before the incident in the Java Seal The bell aboard the Houston at the time of the battle went down with the ship-and it was not recovered until. the summer of 1973.

How the discarded bell from the Houston evaded the scrap heap, and how it got into the hands of the Philippine government for presentation to President Johnson, is one of history's mysteries. Now the bell which sank with the Houston also belongs to the U.S. government. It was presented recently by the government of Indonesia.

The city of Houston, for which the cruiser was named, hopes to get the recovered bell for display there.

It's sort of like what the farmers, scratching their head, say about fertilizer: if fertilizer manufacturers made a profit last year when fertilizer was selling for \$80 a ton, how much profit you reckon they're making now when it's selling for \$160 a ton?

One interesting statistic about the oil companies is that while their sales last year were up only 6 per

cent, their profits were up nearly 50 per cent, which is one of the things that seems to be making some people mad every time they pull into a filling station or pay their heating oil bill.

But if you think the general public is mad, think what the political fund raisers for the last Presidential campaign are feeling.

"WHY, those chinchy oil companies," they're probably muttering, "here they hemmed and hawed when we asked them for a measley \$100,000 apiece, when if we'd known they were making that kind of money we'd have doubled their assessments. We ought to kick ourselves. We let em off with a total of five million dollars when it should have been ten. Just wait till the next campaign."

However, maybe the fund raisers ought to write down their instructions for others just in case they're not around for the next campaign. You know anybody who'd like to swap oil stock for a Deaf Smith grass farm?

That Could -- And Must

By ARCH BOOTH

Anyone who follows the affairs of the nation's railroads knows there is always a big fight over any proposal to abandon service on a particular line. Urban transit companies and airlines have the same problem.

As you can imagine, the collapse of the Penn Central raised the prospect of numerous abandonments, and a corresponding

amount of dust.

Recently, the administrator of the Federal Railroad Administration, John W. Ingram, decided to personally inspect a few of the branch lines Penn Central wanted to drop. He picked the Eastern Shore of Maryland to examine.

At first, he says, he was unable even to find the line he sought. Later, he returned with more detailed maps and a surveyor. His report is fascinating:

"We found that branch line, all right. At one place it was directly under a junk yard full of wrecked cars. At another point the highway department had covered the tracks with at least eight inches of pavement. And just off the road we found a six-inch-wide tree growing between the rails. That line had been completely forgotten, yet grown men were arguing before the Interstate Commerce Commission that stretch of track was vital to the nation's economy."

FOR PEOPLE who like to search for villains, the cast of the foregoing. tragicomedy could be numbered in thousands: Small-town politicians, railroad management, railroad unions, Congress, regulatory agencies - like the ICC - that go on blindly doing what they were set up to do, even though changed conditions make it no longer appropriate; and finally, our modern American penchant for protesting practically anything a corporation proposes.

IN THE case of the Northeast rail system, these "villains" now have a chance to redeem themselves.

It has been estimated that complete cessation of rail service over the former Penn Central lines and those of several other bankrupt Northeastern railroads would cause a four per cent drop in the Gross National Product — the value of all the goods and services we produce in a year.

Such a drop would translate into hundreds, perhaps thousands, of

bankruptcies and hundreds of thousands of lost jobs. Unthinkable.

So last year Congress established a guasi-governmental organization, the U.S. Railway Association, to siff through the ashes of the bankrupts and put together what valuable pieces remain into a new, private 'Consolidated Rail Corporation."

Congress has provided \$558 million to keep the freight moving in the meantime. Congress has also made \$1 billion available to be loaned to the new company, plus another \$500 million to be used for improving rail passenger service in

the Northeast corridor. If all goes well, the new corporation will be able to operate at a profit, attractive private capital, and needing no further subsidies from the taxpayer. But that will depend largely on how many of the old albatrosses are hung around its neck.

BOTH THE ICC and the Department of Transportation are supposed to study the question of what lines and services to retain in this region. Ultimately, Congress will make the final decision, based on their recommendations transmitted through the U.S.R.A.

If the new company is not allowed to streamline its route system, it will be no better off than the old Penn Central.

That would be bad for the country, especially in these energyshort times. Based on actual operating experience, railroads haul about four times more ton-miles of freight per gallon of fuel than highway transportation. This same energy efficiency makes them the least polluting of all carriers.

FINALLY, the railroads haul 70 per cent of the coal used domestically, and coal is our ace-inthe hole in the energy crisis.

Fortunately, the railroads are alive and well just about everywhere but the Northeast. The industry set ton-mile records in 1972 and 1973, and expects to do still better in 1974, due largely to an anticipated increase in coal traffic.

had almost lost the plant a few years ago, because she cut branches and stems from it so often to share with friends.

They were used for flower arranging and to start other plants. The constant cutting on the cacti had taken much of its strength, therefore it had to be stopped.

Soon my attention was directed to a very unusual plant which had been placed on a table in a rather dark corner. In fact I had a feeling that it was either dead or dormant. I learned that it was a frarigiparu, and was in a dormant state.

This plant is native to Hawaii and is greatly admired by tourists and loved by the natives. The flowers are pretty and have a pleasing fragrance.

Other plants placed where they could receive direct sunlight were: azeleas, kalanchoes, and poinsettias. Some of these Mrs. Griffin was growing for the first time.

Nearby in filtered light there was a bulbous plant which appeared dormant. It was receiving special attention and Mrs. G. told me that it was grown for cut flowers. Would be very interesting to see when in-

A part of the garage had been reserved as the work area, where basic steps are taken to grow the successful potted plants we had been seeing Mrs. Griffin uses organic

potting soil mixed with pea gravel. She prefers clay pots because she believes they have the best pores for breathing, thus assisting in the growth of the plant.

Discussing containers for potting, she said they should be thoroughly washed and sterilized, then placed in a water bath for several hours, all night if possible, before the seeds, cuttings, or bulbs are planted.

Being an excellent horticulturist, Mrs. Griffin believes in feeding her growing plants. She prefers organic feedings, and in the commercial she selects Carl Pools Br 51 for those which are to flower. On the non-flowering variety she uses Rapid Grow. A-light feeding is given the plants each

Another factor which plays a large part in producing healthy house plants is to keep them well groomed. All faded blooms and faded leaves should be removed. They should also be kept clean.

Each week her plants are thoroughly cleaned with a bath of sweet milk. With cotton balls all leaves are washed carefully.

Mrs. G. emphasized that all gardeners should remember that leaves have two sides, top and bottom, and both should be well cleaned. Plants breathe through their foliage, and if they are left with dust or other residue the pores will be closed.

Gloss and texture are affected, color also harmed by alternates the cleaning fluid, using tepid water instead of the milk.
