School System Dares To Lead Way, Says Hartman

Pointing to what he termed Unsupported criticisms and accusations about the school", and pledging e"no relapse in our attempts to build the strongest educational system anywhere." Supt. Roy Hartman addressed the Hereford Lions Club Wednesday and urged citizens to "continue to support this school system as we dare to be eagles in education,

Hartman, program speaker for the regular weekly luncheon meeting, said the motivation for having a strong educational program "comes from our greatest resource-your children and

AT THE conclusion of his talk, the superintendent announced that Hereford was one of seven schools in its size category in the state to be selected by the Governor's office for a study of school districts which have "demonstrated outstanding educational services."

HARTMAN started his talk with a parable about an eagle that was raised with chickens. A naturalist saw the king of birds and attempted to have him soar away from the chicken pen. The eagle looked around at the chickens, however, and hopped back to feed with them.

After several tries, he finally took the bird away from the pen to the edge of Palo Duro Canyon. "You have the heart of an eagle; you belong to the sky; stretch forth your wings and fly," the naturalist told the bird.

FINALLY, with the screech of an eagle, the bird stretched and flopped its wings, then soared away, rose higher and higher, never to return again.

Hartman compared education with his story, claiming it has remained stagnant and dormant for many years guided by tradition. . The Hereford school system has dared to be an eagle in the midst of a society where some would prefer us to be a chicken," he remarked.

THE EDUCATOR emphasized that

innovations in the local system were no made without clear-cut evidence of their worth. Perhaps, he added, "we have strived to make this one of the best school systems in this part of Texas with too little fanfare with what has been the end

He pointed out that the accellerated programs have enabled students to enter college and receive credit for work in high school. "We have probably not explained often enough that our academic program. for those who want to learn is superior."

Referring to the recent trustee election, Hartman said questions and accusations were in print and on the radio that "would have you believe the school board and the administration is

"IT HAS BEEN suggested that more and a greater variety of vocational programs should be offered; that the athletic program should be completely overhauled and guaranteed participation should be afforded for every student fegardless of effort or ability; you have heard it suggested that we are not getting our monies' worth in the buildings we have built in the past few years."

HARTMAN told Lions that he could best respond to "the unsupported criticisms" by quoting Will Rogers, when he said, "Everybody is ignorant, only on diffferent subjects.

The superintendent said there

seemed to be an increasing "disenchantment" among the general public with those who supposedly lead the masses, and a rash of demands for participation in the decision-making process.

"I do not want you to think for one minute that I reject the demand from the public in making decisions that affect the lives of their children, but I do declare there is danger if we educators abandon our educational background regarding education decisions.

"IT MAY SOUND undemocratic, but every man does not have an equal say on all matters. If a wounded man is taken to

Announcement that approval has been granted for a \$2.4 million loan to finance system improvements highlighted the 36th annual meeting of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative Thursday at the Bull Barn. The announcement was made by manager James Hull.

Hull made the announcement during the business session which followed a barbecued luncheon served by the Rotary Club to over 900 guests and members.

The Rural Electrification Administration approved a loan of \$1,680,000-representing 70 per cent of the total loan application. The remaining \$720,000 loan will come from the Co-Op Finance Corporation. The REA loan is to be repaid over a 35-year period at 5 per cent interest. The CFC loan is for 35 years at 7 per cent interest.

HULL REPORTED that about \$1 million of the funds will be used on a 35 mile, 69,000 th transmission line. The cooperative also plans to build two new sub-stations - both located in Parmer County. One will be in the Rhea community and the other near Bruegel's

The balance of the loan is estimated for service and consumers and providing some 95 miles of distribution lines. The co-op serves the counties of Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham.

Hull said that 139 new meters were connected during the first three months of this year which was a record number. He continued, "the board thinks it more important to extend new service than to pay back capital credit, so this is what our access eash has gone for - to provide electric service in the area we serve."

When patronage checks totaling \$80,000 were distributed last year, it was pointed out by A.W. Anthony, Jr., who gave the directors' report, that it would probably be the last year for patronage checks. He said most qeighboring cooperatives had not paid refundchecks in several years.

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

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
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Deadline Is Wednesday

Any transfer of students from one school district to another must not change the racial or ethnic balance in either the home or receiving district by more than one per cent. These restrictions are according to U.S. District Court Order 5281 issued by Judge Wayne Justice in Tyler on April 2, 1971.

Transfers will be denied if found in violation of this ruling.

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Picking Realtor Makes Difference

EDITORS NOTE: This is the fifth of a nine-part series relating to the problms involved in moving one's family from one town to another. This article pertains mainly to selecting and buying a new house in the town in which you are moving.

Selecting a realtor should be done carefully. A realtor has credentials just as a doctor, dentist or banker.

Check these out. The business he is in is probably the very thing that a family spends more money on than anything else in their lifetime.

Naturally a realtor is out to make a good commission on. the house he is trying to sell, but make sure that the house is worth the price he is quoting. This measure is not only to protect the person selling a house, but the buyer as well.

A LOCAL REALTOR explains that if a couple starts to buy a house, one of the first things to consider is, "Is this realtor making his living by selling, or is this just a side-line for him?" If he provides for his family by these means, he will be more interested in getting a deal settled as soon as possible. Also, he will not be pricing a house too high due to the fact that he may have to re-sell that house if the buyer is tran-

sferred again. "Repeat business is our way of staying in business," said the realtor. "Word of mouth is another way, however. If we have over-priced a house, or just protected the person selling, we will have defeated our purpose."

DON'T OVER-BUY. A house that is too large for the family can only be a burden. By making the house payments too large, the up-keep will be much higher than necessary. Also, with families being smaller than in the past, the house may be difficult to sell later.

Shop around and make sure of getting your money's worth before closing a deal with anyone. Sometimes the older homes are a much better buy than a new one and vice-versa depending on the town, city or area chosen in which to live. A new home is great, but keep in mind that yards and plant shrubbery will have to be put in. A fence and other extras will

probably be necessary in order for it to look like a home.

ON THE OTHER hand, an older home would need to be checked for things such as plumbing, recent appraisal value and whether or not it will need carpeting and other major

It always helps if a new home is purchased before moving into the new town. This enables a family to move just the one



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Election Law H³ Explained

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was written by Andy Shuval, district attorney, in response to several inquireis about the election law.)

> BY ANDY SHUVAL District Attorney

Numerous people have contacted my office with inquiries about the election law. Their two most commonly asked questions have been, 'Is your vote a secret and what is undue influence of a voter?

Let me assure each citizen that the District Attorney's Office considers nothing more important than the enforcement of the election law. The best hope for our country and our county is a free, informed, and unafraid electorate.

Your vote is secret! No person or public official can tell you how to vote or can find out how you voted! When you vote you will receive a ballot which has a number on it. You will mark the ballot and sign a stub in the upper left hand corner of the ballot. You will then place the ballot in one box and the stub in another box which is called a stub box. The stub box is sealed personally by the District Clerk, Lola Fay Veazey, before the election and returned to her by each voting precinct, still sealed, immediately after the election. The box is kept in her vault under her personal supervision. This box can only be opened by an order of the District Judge, Archie

S. McDonald. No public official or private person may influence or attempt to influence how a person votes by illegal means.

It is an offense under our law for a person or a public servant to attempt to influence a voter by means of coercion. Coercion is defined by our law as any threat by any person to commit any offense against a voter, to ridicule a voter, to harm a voter's credit or business reputation. It is also against the law for any public servant to take or withold action as a public servant as a means to influence or attempt to influence another person's vote.

If any citizen has any information about any coercion or improper influence of voters or of any other election violation, please let the District Attorney's Office know immediately. My assistant Roland Saul or myself are available to talk with any citizen in private about this matter. We will hold any communications received by the District Attorney's Office in the strictest confidence.

I urge each voter in Deaf Smith County, Texas to turn out and vote for the candidate of their choice on Saturday, May 4th. Let me again assure each voter that they can exercise their constitutional right to vote next Saturday in the full knowledge and confidence that their vote is secret here in Deaf Smith County, Texas.

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

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
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Student Interests Paired With Activity Programs

Can you tell anything about the weather by watching the flight and migration of birds?

Here's an old weather omen one watched closely by the old timers, though today few of us have time to keep track on our feathered friends.

Just as birds have an uncanny sense of direction; they sometimes know more about the coming weather than we do. Newly-hatched birds, left by their parents, often fly a thousand miles of more to their summer habitat--joining their parents, even though they have never traveled the route before. Likewise, birds will return to the same yard year after year from thousands of miles

Similarly, if you see robins lingering longer in spring than usual or departing the northern climate early, it will often indicate the approach of unseasonal weather trends. Birds migrate at night as often as in the day-

You can observe what native birds are present in your location at various times and note a variance from year to year. Often their departures or arrival will give a clue to future weather. It's an interesting hobby in

Unique Position Held

Pioneer Woman Teacher

THE MOST extraordinary fact that emerges from inquiries today about Miss Millicent Griffith, a prominent Hereford woman in early years of this century, is that no one in her time seems to have considered her career at all extraordinary.

ber of a cultivated family, who came alone to the raw pioneer country which was the Plains region in 1902 and stayed nearly

YET SHE was no feminist, or

GIVEN that personality, perhaps the achievements were to be expected. After she taught here a while, residents thought of her simply as an excellent

second HHS graduating class in 1907 when Miss Millicent was principal, says "she always dressed well and looked nice" and another pupil remembers "she stood straight and walked well" and wore simple suits with pretty blouses and frilly

HELEN Patterson, who was first her seventh grade pupil and then taught when Miss Griffith was superintendent, describes her with red hair and big grey eyes. She had the somewhat florid complexion or sprinkling of freckles that often goes with red hair.

"She wore glasses, and we thought she could see us reflected in her glasses when her back was turned in the schoolroom," Mrs. Jowell laughs. Generously built, she was very trim and had small hands, Mrs. Patterson adds.

Those hands usually held a slim stick she used as a pointer, and for emphasis "she stood up straight and shook the pointer, says Horace Hershey, who says she was "especially good as a math teacher."

Mrs. Patterson, who worked with her as an adult after knowing her as a pupil, says Miss Griffith was "one of those rare teachers who simply inspired discipline without any appearance of enforcing disci-

"TEACHERS whom she supervised felt they could depend on her if they needed help, and pupils liked her. They would draw cartoons of the other teachers, but not Miss Griffith. Even we girls liked her, but she was certainly partial to efficient mother," Mrs. Stanthe boys!"

It is also Mrs. Patterson who says Miss Griffith was "high minded; she disliked common or ordinary things and inspired

excellence in her pupils." From Chicago, she came to

addition to Hereford. She was in: Dimmitt in 1910 and 1911 when: Lee Conklin was in school there, then in Clovis before returning to Hereford where she was: superintendent from 1920 to 1923. Before she went back to Chicago to spend the remainder; of her life, she taught at

Hartley.

SHE WAS a partner of A.C. Elliott, former president of the college here who had been editor of the Hereford Brand two years when they bought the Brand late in 1909. She is not remembered as being active in management of the paper; in 1914 Elliott bought her interest.

Associates say she appeared to enjoy living in Hereford, was interested in the community, had many friends and "you never heard any criticism, of her." She lived at the Cordova Hotel a customary style of residence for unmarried employed women then, and was active in the Methodist Church.

One of three sisters, she also had a brother who was living in Chicago when she went back there. Never married, Miss Griffith died in a rest home in that city in the 1950's.

PERHAPS her closest friend here was Mrs. E.B. Black, whose daughter, the late Mrs. Jesse Stanford, remembered the teacher as "an extraordinary person" but also had an amusing recollection of a time when Mrs. Black was in a hospital for a few days and Miss Griffith stayed in the Black home with the children.

"We thought it was funny that she wasn't too handy in managing the housework and was awkward in the kitchen when we compared her with our ford said last summer

But Mrs. Stanford added her impression that Miss Griffith would have been an outstanding woman at any time, and probably deserves the title of first woman educator in the pioneer Midplains areas.



Yet she was a city dweller, a highly educated woman, mem-

a quarter of a century . . . she had many friends in Hereford but apparently no intimates . . . she became high school principal and then superintendent of the Hereford school system at a time when a woman in either position was almost unheard of . . . she ws part owner of the Hereford Brand when few women owned a business unless it was a boarding house or a millinery

"suffragette" as women were called then when they advocated women's rights, specifically the right to vote. Nobody remembers that she ever expressed opinions on that issue.

Casual references to Miss Griffith by oldtimers of the city in giving information to The Hereford Brand for last summer's Golden Jubilee edition sparked a search for more details about a person who certainly had an impact on the community in her time.

People here who remember her were mostly her pupils. They agree that she was certainly a remarkable woman but they referred to her personality rather than her accomplishments.

Health Care, Finally?

The Nixon Administration's new health care bill and the measure just introduced by Senator Ted Kennedy (D-Mass) and Congressman Wilbur Mills (D-Ark) are both commendable nealth care bills, which-if enacted-would bring this country into line with health care practices in most of the world's democracies.

Under the Kennedy-Mills bill, all Americans would be provided health care, not just the poor. (It would not be a voluntary thing, as in the Nixon bill.) There would be an annual maximum families would pay for health care, for all members-\$1,000. (The Nixon bill also contains a maximum

The cost of the Kennedy-Mills bill is estimated at \$40,-000,000,000. That would be obtained by a one per cent tax on incomes up to \$20,000, plus additional taxes for each dependent It's estimated a family earning \$10,000, with one child, would pay about \$200 in added taxes a year. Obviously, those making more, and with more children, would pay more. Because of this, some feel the Nixon voluntary program is preferable.

But Mills says because the Democratic bill requires all to pay it would cost no more, per family, than the voluntary plan. He feels there's a good chance the Democratic bill will be passed this year. If so, it would take effect in 1976.

Both the Nixon bill and the Kennedy-Mills bill are steps in the right direction; either would give the nation a better health care system than it now has. Both would protect families against catastrophic illnesses. The hope is that ongress will pass one of them at this session.

Nixon's Taxes

President Nixon recently agreed to pay \$467,000 in back taxes for a four year period, primarily because of the finding that a gift of his papers came too late to qualify as a propertax exemption. There were also other mistakes found in his returns over the four years:

. This payment, which with interest will mean an outlay of over half a million dollars, is in line with the President's statement when the inquiry on his taxes-which he requested -was begun. At that time he said he would abide by the finding of the congressional committee.

This will satisfy most Americans. Moreover, it seems likely that most Americans would not go so far as to apply the rigid yardstick to the President that the joint committee staff recommended. The staff said, for instance, that the President should declare as income the value of flights ingovernment planes taken by his family and friends, when

business was not involved. It's doubtful if the American people want the President to be that limited; surely a chief executive of the nation can be permitted to carry along family members or friends on flights in government planes. That's a bad practice for government officials in general, of course. But there is only one President, and he would seem entitled to that privilege, which other Presidents have enjoyed and which is

probably in the nation's best interests: While the Democratic-controlled committee might have been overly zealous in this and other small ways, the overall effect of the investigation and result is a good one and sets the standard which future chief executives will be ineclined to live up to. .

Crisis Labeled Real

By BERT MILLS

MANY PEOPLE refuse to believe there is an energy crisis, despite the evidence to the contrary, and this attitude on the part of a substantial minority is hampering the national effort to solve our

William E. Simon, head of the one of his toughest problems is to convince the doubters that the energy crunch is real and that emergency efforts by everybody are necessary. One organization of small businessmen surveyed -a sample of its members recently and found 29 per cent do not think there is an energy crisis.

Energy Czar Simon overlooks no opportunity to try to convert the sceptics. He appears on national * television almost daily to spread the word, holds frequent press conferences, issues daily news releases, testifies before Congressional committees, and accommodates reporters with interviews. He has been America's most quoted man in recent weeks.

Repeatedly he says this nation is only 85 per cent self-sufficient in energy, leaving a 15 per cent shortfall. He breaks down national energy needs this way: petroleum 46 per cent, natural gas 32 per cent, coal 17 per cent, hydroelectric 4 per cent, nuclear 1 per cent.

The oil shortage is the big problem today, and everyone whose house is heated by oil or who drives a car ought to be convinced by both the short supply and the higher prices that there is indeed a shortage. There would have been an oil problem even without the Arab embargo. Remember that some areas were short of gasoline last summer.

DOMESTIC production of gil has declined a bit since 1970, for a variety of reasons, while demand has grown along with the economy. U.S. output was down 2.2 per cent last year while imports jumped a record 30 per cent. Our total oil supply was up in 1973 but we were vulnerable to the Arab embarge imposed in October.

Some sceptics who deny an oil shortage argue that we have plenty of oil underground. That is true but crude oil needs to be refined and we lack refinery capacity. Also, some hard-to-get oil has not been produced because it was uneconomic at former prices to do so. Today's higher prices give an incentive to bring up the expensive

Sirnua has pointed out that it

takes three to five years to bring in new sources of supply. A new discovery on the outer continental shelf, for example, would not mean any more gasoline for motorists or industry until at least 1777. The Alaskan pipeline is now getting started but it will be at least three more years before any oil flows through it.

Critics also say we waste as much as 40 per cent of our energy consumption, by the way we operate our factories, build our buildings and cars, and in other ways. That figure may be high but when energy was cheap, extravagance was natural. We can't tear down our skyscrapers or junk our luxury cars because hindsight shows they should not have been built in the first place.

What we can do is try to waste less energy, and share the shortage while efforts are made to eliminate it. Most Americans are cooperating but the dissenters are closing their eyes to the facts of life. The energy crisis is real.

HISTORIANS will decide later how we got in this pickle. No doubt our national energy policy was either faulty or non-existent. No doubt Congress and the Federal Certainly the oil industry deserves censure on numerous grounds.

The important thing today is that we do have a problem. Simon says the problem is "manageable." Let's hope so, and that he is wise enough to do the managing. He deserves the benefit of the doubt and full cooperation by everybody.

Talk Of Texas

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY -Texas' last lynch mob stormed the Grayson County courthouse at Sherman 44 years ago this week, burned the building and hanged a prisoner accused of rape.

George Huges, a Negro, was to have gone on trial on May 9, 1930, for allegedly assulting a white woman. On the morning of the trial an unruly crowd of spectators gathered and were removed from the courthouse by county officers.

The spectators then gathered on the square and somebody suggested that they take the prisoner from his cell in the courthouse and lynch him. An assault was made on the courthouse but was repelled by sheriff's deputies and Texas Rangers. The crowd confinued to grow, however, and a company of National Guardsmen from Dallas was ordered to the secene by Governor Dan Moody. Before the troops could get to Sherman, the mob attacked the courthouse again. This time they broke through the line of law officers, burned the building and dragged Hughes from a records vault where he had been locked for safety. He was shot to death, then hanged.

This was the last incidence of lynching in the state.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? - If historians wanted to be correct, the shrine of Texas liberty would never

be referred to as the Alamo.

The real name of the famous San Antonio shrine is Mission of San Antonio de Valero. The original mission, built in 1718 by the Spanish, was located at San Pedro Springs at the headwaters of the San Antonio River. This mission, and its nearby presidio called San Antonio de Bexar, were the predecessors of the Alamo. The building known as the Alamo was never a mission itself but served as the chapel for San Antonio de Valero.

In 1793, when the mission wzs secularized and turned over to the military, it was garrisoned by Spanish troops sent from northern Mexico. They had been stationed at a post called Pueblo de San Carlos de Alamo de Parras, which they usually called "el Alamo."

Once they reached San Antonio de Valero, the troops were homesick for their old post and began calling their new station "Alamo." The name stuck and San Antonio de Valero has been all but forgotten by history.

THE GREEKS AMONG US -Houston might be called "the Athens of Texas." More than 5,000 people of Greek ancestry live there.

The first Greek to arrive in Texas came in 1817 with Jean Laffite, the pirate. Eighteen years later, in 1835, two brothers from Greece, Pedro and George Serates, were among the colonists who settled in Goliad

According to the Institute of Texan Cultures, whose staff has carefully researched the various ethinic groups, it was not until the last half of the 19th Century that Greeks migrated to Texas in large numvers. Today more than 10,000 Texans trace their heritage to Greece.







IT'S OUR GARDEN ... we patch up. like it . . . but you don't have to like it. This quote caught my eye the other day while I was reading and studying a lawn and garden book.

It is natural that one may feel that the "fruits of his labors" should be taken very literally. You see the harvest of tasty vegetables, the beautiful ripe fruits and the lovely flowers . . . this is your garden; bless you. For if your harvest includes both food for the table and food for the eye, these are blessings.

The poet really expressed it all when he wrote, "The Lord must have liked us. I say when I see the bloom of a rose, the green of the tree and grass and food for the hungry."

There are many many facets to gardening, and it takes a lifetime to learn and use them all. It takes real know-how to plant and grow a lush lawn. For the past three years I have been Lawns have bad enemies, one

of which is the cut-worm. They can play havoc with a beautiful lawn in a very short time. After their attack there are patches to

Insects, dandelions, crabrass, removal of dead tree or shrubs and washing can cause unsightly patches in a well established lawn. To correct

these blemishes do the

following: Loosen the surface soil of the bad places with a scratcher;

scratch in a bit of long-life fertilizer; leave surface to be re-seeded cloddy. Seed will nestle among soil chunks, this hides seed from birds. Surface when finished should be leveled, watered or let stand to settle. Break up the soil again, leaving it a bit rough as

before. Scatter seed or set plants. If seed use about two or three pounds to 1,000 sq. ft. Water lightly with sprinkler, seeds will sift into chinks between soil lumps and will be in excellent position for

sprouting. A mulch such as a scattering of clean straw or burlap netting will keep the soil from parching, thus sprouting of seed will be speeded. It is important that the soil be kept moist until seed has sprouted and growth is shown.

When the grass is old enough for mowing, do so, use care for the first two or three mowings, then the patched spot can be treated as the rest of the lawn. To promote proper development, fertilize, control weeds and irrigate as needed.

"I'm more interested in the technique of story-telling by means of film rather than in what the film contains," explained Hitchcock. "That's why I'm always surprised at people, and even critics, who place so much reliance on logic and all that sort of thing. I have a little phrase to myself. I always say logic is dull."
