With grasshoppers reported in terms of millions over the Panhandle area, the poison mixing station in the Bull Barn here, was reported to be doing a record business as Deaf Smith joined other counties in an effort to exterminate the hoppers before they do ex-

In addition to previous statements by County Agent A. R. Bateman, an appeal came this week from Mayor C. J. Paddock for residents of Hereford to also take steps toward exterminating grasspers, and Mayor Paddock pointout by hoppers.

Bateman who for two weeks has been urging farmers of this area to search out breeding places of grasshoppers in this county and to spread poison, this week, continued his call for urgent action. extension specialists and federal men stationed in Amarillo to curb

the spread of the hoppers. The government poison mixing station continued to operate in the Bull Barn, Farmers who take advantage of the government offer must furnish half of the bran and all of the poison. It takes 10 proximately one-half cent per acre.
