



Parents Advised On Birth Certificates

AUSTIN-Parents of children starting school for the first time this fall are urged by the State Department of Health to make sure that they have a birth registration certification regarding their child and if not, to take proper legal steps as soon as possible to obtain this record.

Parents who do not have reghis sister Mrs. Mack Noland last istration notification of the birth of their child are advised to contact their local registrar of vital statistics with whom the certificate was originally filed.

In many Texas school districts, a notification of birth certificate is required to prove the child is old enough to enter school As the Vital Statistics Department will be called upon to answer numerous requests for school certificates, securing this record early will speed up the process of securing the needed forms before school opens.





"A public health education program is an outstanding fact-or in the development of the physical, mental, and social wel-fare of the school children of

fare of the school children of today," said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "Health teaching should be a basic part of every educational program."

"Practically every phase of the school system is related to health. Housing, screening, diet, disposal of wastes, exercise, rest, even the manner of daily contact with others, all have a direct bearing on health. Schools must bearing on health. Schools must treat the child as a whole—with his physical condition related definitely to his mental and emotional capacities."_____

"Prevention is the all important factor in the control of communicable disease. 'Communicable'—as we all know—describes that kind of disease which may be imparted or transmitted from one person to another, either

High Ceilings Not Any Cooler

Old-fashioned ideas that high ceilings are cooler than low ones are becoming as obsolete as button shoes and bustles, popular in the same era. Proof that high ceilings are no cooler was obtests, says Mrs. Bernice Clayton, specialist in home improvement for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Rooms with high ceilings are harder to heat and therefore more expensive in winter as well as being without advantage in the summertime, Mrs. Clayton added. This conclusion is another result of a study of farm home construction in which the United States Department of Ag-riculture and the University of Georgia have been cooperating. Explaining how this evidence was obtained, the specilist pointd out that walls in two test houses were constructed with interchangeable panels, so that the location and number of doors and windows and the height of ceiling could be altered at Thermometers on the walls did not reveal any significant difference in favor of 10-foot ceilings as compared with eightfoot seilings, the result show-

"A desirable arrangement of windows and doors to provide cross ventilation and to take advantage of the prevailing breezes does far more to make rooms comfortable than high ceilings," Mrs. Clayton said.
