#### Junior Slow About Learning To Read? . . Give Him a Chance

well known specialist in reading problems tells me that parents very often fail to realize that learning to read is like learning to talk. It is a slow process which is influenced by a sense of need on the child's part. Junior will learn to talk because he needs to communicate with desire to obtain the pleasure and information contained in

According to Professor Ruth Strang of Teachers College, Columbia University, the mother who tells a friend with melancholy pride, "Johnny has a read ing problem," is very probably reinforcing Johnny's difficulty. Often children who are having trouble mastering the elements of reading are plunged into deep. er discouragement by unwitting parents who try to spur them on by comparing them with their little friends or by deploring their nabilities in front of other peo-

"Primarily the child who is poor reader needs the security and confidence which comes from knowing that his parents value him for himself alone ind not for his accomplishents," Dr. Strang says, "With this as a point of departure, ordinary reading difficulties frequently can be overcom through three - way parent hild and teacher cooperation."

Parents should not force reading upon children, according to Dr. Strang, but they should take advantage of simple opportunities to encourage interest in read ing at an early age level. For example, there is no particular worth in having a disinterested child memorize the alphabet be-fore he goes to school. However, if at home Johnny asks, "What does that say," pointing to the label on a can, this is mother's chance to explain that these let\_ lets says "peaches" and have a personal meaning for him. "Therefore, it is important for parents to help their children to build vocabulary by talking clearly, using words accurately and choosing an underothers. > A plentiful supply of attractive literature on his present reading level is advocated by Dr. Strang for the boy or girl who is having trouble progressing in reading Parents who are embarrassed because their fifth rader can read only second grade material fall into the error of supplying books that are too hard in the hope that junior will be spurred to greater efforts. Just the reverse occurs and the child becomes more discouraged and trustrated than ever, she says. Even the comic books are not shunned by Dr. Strang if they can serve as a springboard in developing enthusiasm for read-

For children just beginning to read, Dr. Strang feels that the making of a scrapbook with colorful pictures very simply labeled is helpful. With mother or father as a companion in this undertaking, the child begins to understand that the letters which spell "rabbit" may mean a big rabbit, a small rabbit or a sleeping rabbit. The understanding that the written word is a symbol is a fundamental concept in reading. Older children may enjoy dramatizing simple plays by reading the lines with their parents.

If the teen-ager has some special interest such as baseball or stamp collecting, parents may help by selecting books which deal with this subject, thus making reading seem less of a chore, she says.
