Red Cross Sewing Room Needs Help

Woolen materials for girls dresses and skirts have arrived at the Red Cross sewing room here, according to Mrs. C. B. Williams, and volunteer workers are needed badly to complete the garments. The cutting committee has been working all week, and the dresses and skirts are needed so badly that they are being sent out as fast as they are made each day.

These garments are to be used for foreign relief. Volunteers are urged to give at least three hours a week in order to keep the sewing rooms open. Otherwise there is danger that they may have to be closed.

The sewing room is located at the City Hall, and is open daily.

A meeting of all farmers interested in growing produce for the new canning plant now under construction in Hereford has been called by Worth Ware, manager of the project, at the county courtroom in Hereford Friday night, May 17, at 8:30 o'clock.

Construction of the new plant, which according to Ware will represent an investment of between a quarter and a half million dollars within three years, was started Wednesday when concrete foundations for the first building were poured.

R. B. (Rip) Ancher of Houston is the contractor.

Only one unit of the plant is being constructed at the present time, Ware said, and work is being rushed to get the factory in operation in time for the canning season this summer.

The plant will be located on a 15 acre tract 3 miles west of town on the south side of the highway. It will be known as the Deaf Smith County Food Products Company.

The first kitchen unit, now under construction, will be an airconditioned building walled with glass brick. Plans are being rushed for a boiler room, retort room, welfare building, and warehouse to complete the initial unit.

"We expect to be able to handle a thousand acres of black-eyed peas, 100 acres of carrots, as well as green beans, beets, and potatoes," Ware said.

"At least for the first year of operation, because of the labor shortage," he said, "we expect to have a full-time field man who will work in cooperation with County Agent Hugh Clearman in assisting farmers with problems in connection with growing crops, and will organize harvest crews to be carried around to various fields as crops are ready to be harvested."

This is a radical departure from the methods employed by most canning plants, which buy crops on a contract basis delivered to the factory, Ware pointed out, but the "flying squad" idea of harvest labor is expected to relieve the shortage of farm labor during the summer harvest.

A & M College has pledged cooperation in setting up a vegetable growing industry here, Ware said. Knox Parr, district superintendent of Extension Service, has offered his support and aid.

The plant will furnish vegetable seed for planting and provide for harvest crews this year, Ware has announced.

Of considerable interest to local growers is a plan to can "pee-wee" potatoes, which prior to this time, have been a loss on the market.

Ware, who will manage the local plant, is a recently discharged Navy lieutenant (sg).

County Sanitarium Will Hold Open House Here on Sunday

In observance of National Hospital Day, on the 216th anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, the Deaf Smith County Sanitarium will hold Open House next Sunday afternoon, May 12.

Visitors will be welcomed between three and five o'clock Sunday afternoon, and the public is invited to visit the hospital and make an inspection of the entire building, Bob Wilson, manager announced this week.

This will be the first open house to be held at the hospital since it was formally opened in January, 1925, Wilson believes.

Special invitations are being mailed to recently discharged patients, and to local business men, but an invitation is being extended by the staff to all the public to visit the sanitarium Sunday afternoon.

Architects are now working on plans for greatly expanding the county hospital plant. Proposed plans will call for remodeling of the present building, and addition of wings which will more than quadruple the present bed capacity.

Plans are nearing completion and should be ready to be made public within a short time. Guy Carlender of Amarillo, designer of the Northwest Texas Hospital in that city, is the architect.

Plans for the re-modeling were announced by the board of directors in February, and would increase the capacity of the hospital from 14 beds to 64.

More Units To Be Allocated For Local Use

First real assurance that a solution to at least part of Hereford's housing problem is in sight came yesterday from the Federal Public Housing Authority in the form of approval for twenty family dwelling units for veterans and their families in Hereford.

Applications were filed on April 1 by Ralph Smith, Veterans County Service Officer, with the Housing Authority for 100 barracks from the Hereford POW camp for conversion for veterans housing.

Yesterday, in a wire to The Brand, Congressman Gene Worley advised that the Housing Authority had approved for Hereford twenty family dwelling units for veterans and their families. Similar telegrams were received from Senators O'Daniel and Connally by Mayor W. E. Dameron.

In a telephone conversation with the branch office of the FPHA in Fort Worth, Smith confirmed the telegrams and was advised that the buildings would come from the Prisoner of War Camp.

Twenty units have been set aside for Hereford veterans' use, the Fort Worth office said, and additional units may be allocated. West Texas State College at Canyon had filed a prior application for veteran's housing, they advised, and their needs will be filled first.

Information and instructions regarding methods of handling and disposition of the housing units are expected in a few days, Smith said, emphasizing the fact that no action can be taken at the present time.

Wedding Featured Formal Opening Of Hospital

The Deaf Smith County Sanitarium, which will hold open house next Sunday in observance of National Hospital Day, was formally opened on January 22, 1925.

The opening was celebrated with an open house, a banquet, and an unscheduled wedding.

The wedding, which was not on the program, was solemnized by County Judge Earl W. Wilson on the steps of the new hospital on the afternoon of opening day. The principals were Paul Rudd and Miss Fannie Little, both of Friona.

Plans for the hospital were approved by the county early in 1924, and in March of that year, the present site was selected by the Commissioners Court.

J. C. Chisum, the original architect, resigned on April 15, 1924, ten days later the court employed the firm of Sanguniet, Staats, and Hedrick of Fort Worth, designers of then-building Texas Technological College, to prepare plans for the new building.

The construction contract was let on May 26, 1924, to Christy Dolph Construction Company of Dallas on a low bid of \$34,624. Final cost of the completed building was \$46,708.

The cornerstone was laid without fanfare on June 30, 1924, only members of the Commissioners Court attending the ceremony. From the files of The Brand of that date comes a list of items placed in the corner.

\$2 Wheat May Be Realized by Few

A 15-cent boost in the OPA ceiling price for wheat was announced in Washington today, effective on May 13, applying to grain now in the hands of producers and grain which will be harvested this year.

The boost in the ceiling will bring ceiling price paid to the farmer in this area to about \$1.76 per bushel, and for the few remaining days until the May 25 deadline, the 39-cent bonus will boost the price of wheat to the farmer's dream-level—\$2 a bushel!

Few farmers will realize that goal, however, as there is little or no wheat from the 1945 crop left in this area.
