\$2 Wheat May Be Realized by Few

A 15-cent boost in the OPA ceiling price for wheat was announced in Washington today, effective on May 13, applying to grain now in the hands of producers and grain which will be harvested this year. The boost in the celling

The boost in the celling will bring ceiling price paid to the farmer in this area to about \$1.70 per bushel, and for the few remaining days until the May 25 deadline, the 30-cent bonus will boost the price of wheat to the farmer's dream-level—\$2 a

Few farmers will realize that goal, however, as there is little or no wheat from the 1945 crop left in this


