#### CHINESE AID PESANTS

SIAN, China-(AP) .- The government is trying to win the support of the peasants in its fight against the Communists in this section of northern China. The peasants appear to be skeptical. They ask why the government, which has been fighting a civil war for two years, hasn't done this before. Maj. Gen. Chang Ming, deputy director of the Ministry of National Defense, said he couldn't answer that question. "Nationalists troops used to carry their own rations," Chang said. "When they ran short they took food from the peasants, often without paying for it. From now on, they will get their food from the


