Another Eye-Sore Passes

Dump Ground Has Face Lifted

The Dump Grounds -- Hereford's eye-sore greeting to motorists on Highway 60 -- is to become a thing of the past.

By special arrangement with C. H. Messer, who holds the contract for water and sewer ditches in the current improvement program, the City Council Monday closed a deal whereby his equipment will be used to transform the dump grounds, two miles east of here, into a presentable tract, and perhaps, someday, into a beauty spot. Work started on the project this week.

Messer has agreed, during idle periods, to use his ditching machine and two huge bull-dozer at the dump grounds. The city plans to dig a series of deep ditches around hills, located on the site, with the ditching machine, following which the bull-dozers will push all cans and debris into the ditches. When this step is completed, the bull-dozers will be operated back and forth across the filled ditches until all cans and other metal is flattened out and firmly buried. The ditches will be covered with dirt as a final step in the improvement program.

Absentee Voting Closes July 21

Persons who will not be here on Saturday, July 24, to vote in the first Democratic Primary may secure absentee ballots at the County Clerk's office any time on or before July 21. Lilye London, deputy clerk, said today.

Absentee voting was reported as light up to the present time with only 24 votes having been cast. The number was expected to increase during the week, however, as people left on vacations or business trips nearer the election.

The final date, July 21, is set by law as the last day on which to cast absentee ballots.

Finlan Onion Crop Will Gross \$75,000 From 75 Acre Tract

A total gross of \$75,000 from 75 acres -- and probably more -- was anticipated here this week as D. W. Finlan and Charles Digby neared the half-way mark in harvesting their 1948 onion crop.

From 75 to 80 Mexican laborers are employed in harvesting the crop, and Mr. Finlan estimated that the harvest work will be completed by July 24. Onions have to be brought to sheds for grading and sacking. Yields are averaging 500 sacks to the acre, while the market price varies between \$2.25 to \$2.85 per sack.

Not All Profit "Don't get the idea it is all profit, however," points out Mr. Finlan, an experienced onion grower. He adds that growing onions on a large scale still has quite a few of the handicaps seen in growing them in your own garden. The 75-acre crop has been "weeded" three times, by hand -- at a cost of from \$25 to \$35 for each weeding. Planting, irrigation and other necessary expenses generally run production costs up to between \$240 and \$275 per acre, which provides quite a gamble for the producer, who can easily lose money in the face of low crop yield or a low market.

"The crop this year seems to be highly over-rated," said Mr. Finlan. "Last year I made more tonnage on a smaller acreage." He hastily added, however, "This is a very nice crop." The estimate of \$1,000 an acre gross income on the crop was expected to be well on the conservative side by producers, many of whom indicated considerable increase over this figure, depending upon continued good market. The onions were running an exceedingly high yield on No. 1 size and quality.

Delegation Seeks \$50,000 Federal Aid For Deaf Smith County Hospital

Elmer Mathis, hospital manager, and O. F. Cowart, Chamber of Commerce Secretary, Wednesday appeared before the State Health Board in Austin in an effort to secure \$50,000 in federal funds to apply on the new \$150,000 improvements now in progress on the Deaf Smith County Hospital. Outcome of the hearing will be announced after the state board officially convenes.

The \$50,000 can be used to defray current costs on the county hospital, or may be used for additional improvements, according to advance information furnished the group. The money is made available through the Federal Hospital section and is handled by the State Health Department.

Wildcat Drilling Nears 5,500 Feet; Royalties Reported At \$60 An Acre

General interest centered this week on the Humble test well, which Wednesday morning was reported at a depth of 5,500 feet. The well is located one and one-half miles north of Harrison Highway, around one mile east of the New Mexico line.

Drillers and speculators felt that the next two weeks will tell the story on the wildcat, provided no accidents or unexpected trouble develops. Drillers will start checking closely within the next few days as the well nears the 6,500-foot point. The Hyslop level was reported at 6,485 feet, while topography of the Deaf Smith location sets the point at 6,448 feet.

Considerable speculation on royalties and leases was reported here during the past two weeks. One sale of royalty on 80 acres was reported to have brought \$60 an acre -- a total of \$4,800.

Sponsors Hope To Close Hotel Drive By Friday

Plans to complete the hotel drive by Friday night, July 16, were made here Tuesday night when members of the Executive Committee met with Chamber of Commerce directors in the C-C office. The group will again meet Friday night for the report, which they hope will close the drive.

The remaining amount to be raised was slightly above \$15,000, when the \$2,500 in lot donations were deducted from the total. Members expressed themselves favorable to the second drive, reporting general interest of numerous persons in purchasing more stock in order to build the hotel, free of all mortgages. Sponsors felt that the second drive might be successful following completion of potato and sugar beet harvests here.

Hereford Downs Hart, 4 to 2, In Sunday Game

A brief ceremony is planned for the opening, but City Officials felt that all formalities should be cut short in order to let the boys and girls enjoy the pool as much as possible. Advance estimates placed the costs at around 50 cents per lesson with a complete course of lessons at approximately \$5. They pointed out, however, that the figures are not definite and might be lowered or raised after the pool is opened.

As previously announced, the Council has also voted to allow no Mexicans in the pool, pointing out the need of curbing the spread of diseases.

Complete details as to operation, rules and regulations, admission charges and other data will be carried in The Sunday Brand, July 19.

KPAN Tower To Be Up Thursday, On Air August 1

Radio Station KPAN is not "on the air" yet, but by Thursday noon the station's 270-foot tower will be "up in the air". A. W. Stewart, Brownwood radio engineer announced late Wednesday. Stewart and a crew are on the grounds this week, erecting the tower and laying the ground wire.

The 270-foot tower is in nine sections, and each section is raised with a gin pole, which is then raised to carry up another unit. Workers on top are so far away from Stewart, directing the work from the base of the tower, that a small telephone unit is used for talking between the top and the ground.

The tower is painted orange and white and on top will be a huge beacon, to serve as a warning for aircraft.

Marshall Pomy, KPAN Manager, said most of the work on the studio is completed, and installation of the transmitter will begin at once. A staff is being assembled, a United Press wire is to be installed, and a recording library service has been received.

All three volumes are fully illustrated to show construction details, and the series also contains helpful general instructions and information on tools used.

These are not books but of timely interest for the handy man and hobbyist, Miller said.

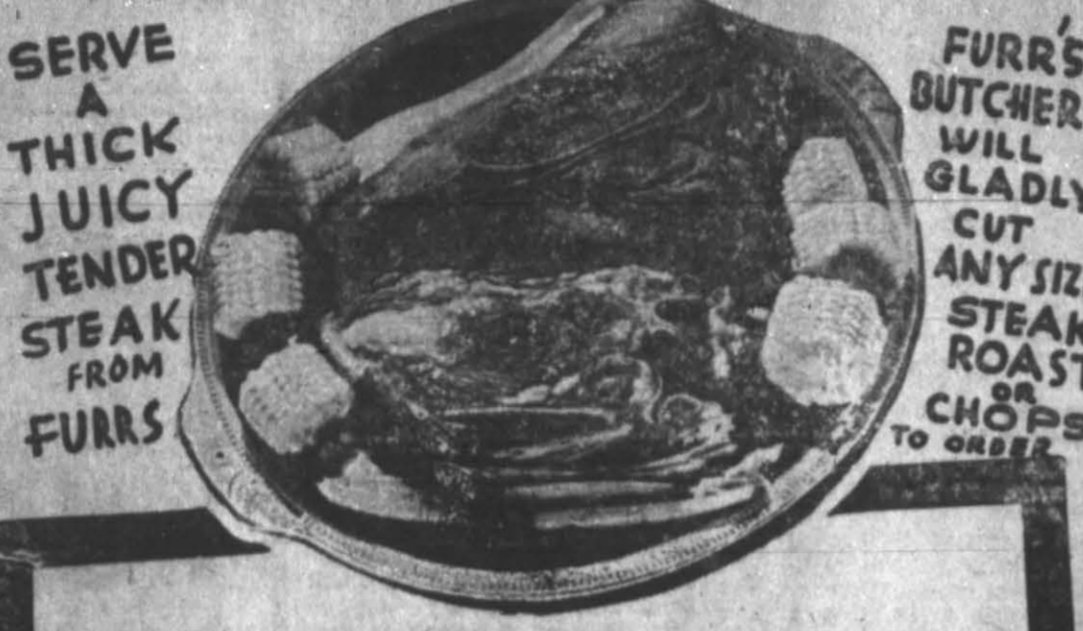

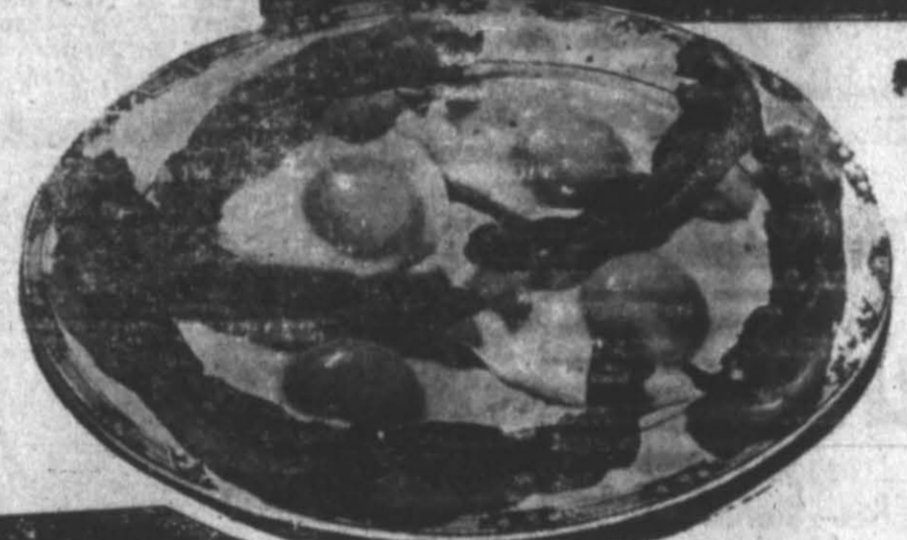

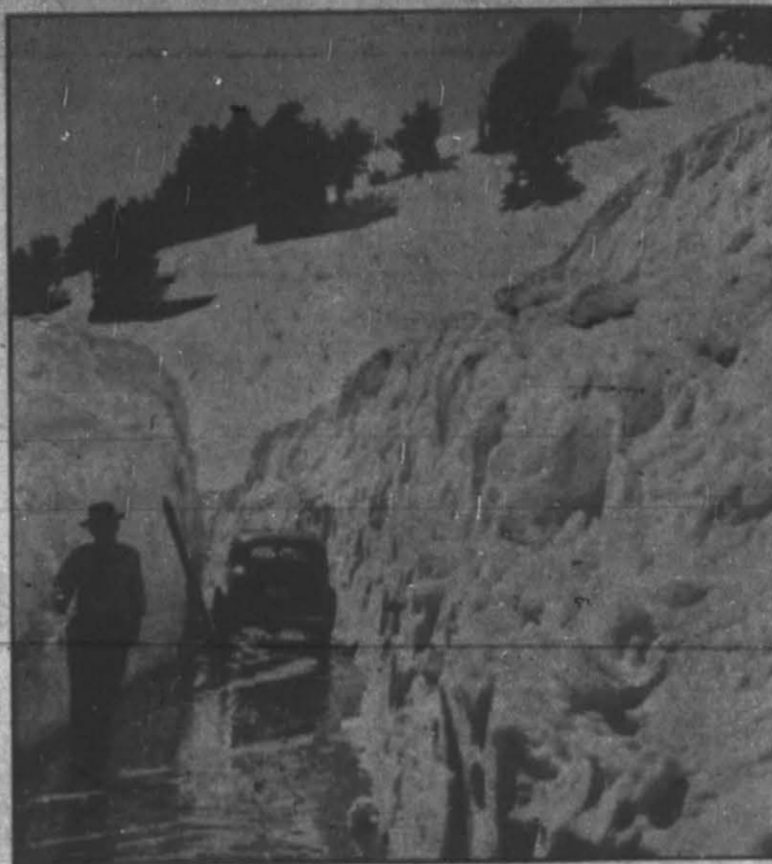

Hereford Temperatures Hit 97 Degrees During Week



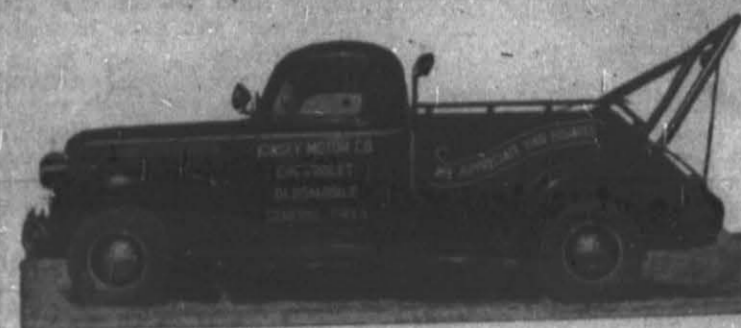

Canyon Votes School Merger By 540 To 105

Residents of 16 rural school districts in Randall County went to the polls last Saturday and voted by a margin of 540 to 105 to consolidate nine outlying school districts with the Canyon Independent School District. Present plans are to take in other districts, finally merging 16 districts into the one large district at Canyon.

The Canyon merger is one of several which followed consolidation of districts in Deaf Smith County last year and creation of the Hereford Rural High School District.

Judge Jas. W. Witherspoon of Hereford, handled legal matters for the Canyon School District, and had previously represented school districts in Deaf Smith County and in Swisher County. As in the consolidation here, a board of trustees will be appointed by the County School Board to represent the new district, and will take place of the trustees now in office.

One of the first problems of the new Canyon District is the purchase of busses to handle students from the old districts. Like other counties which have followed the grouping plan, trustees of the Canyon Independent District reported that students from the outlying districts were coming to the Canyon Schools, which were operating at a loss.

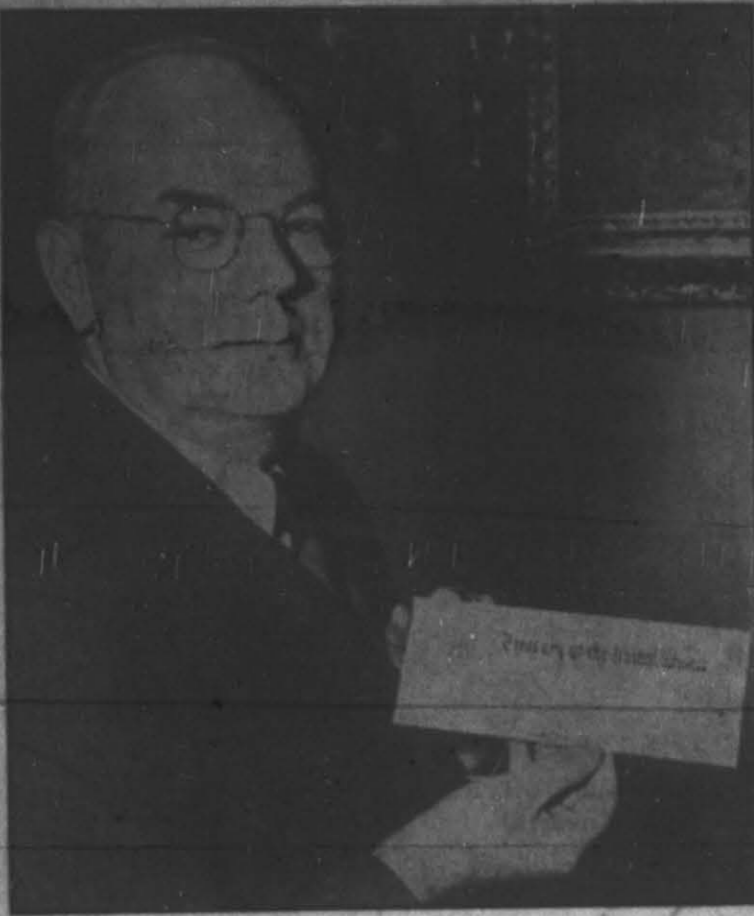

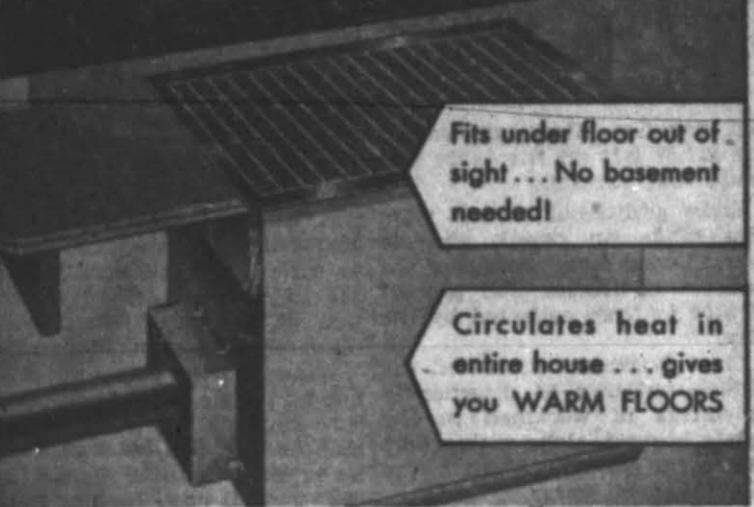

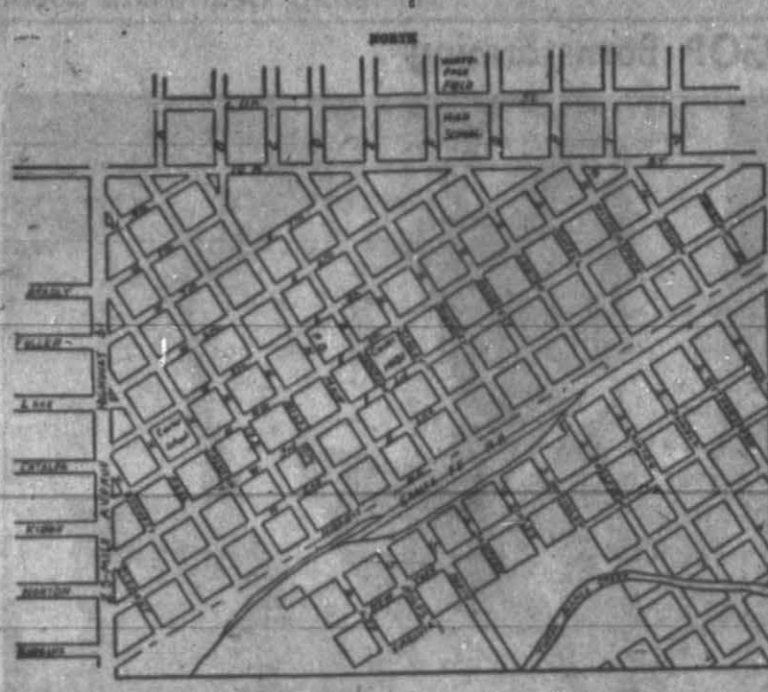

BEDS KEEP CLOSE CHECK ON AUSTRIANS

VIENNA (AP) — A high

Austrian government source says Russian military authorities have made increasingly stiff demands upon local civil authorities in their zone of occupation for detailed reports on almost every phase of public life in certain sections.

Although Russian troops had been removed from some of the areas nearly two years ago, Russian officers recently approached local Austrian officials with verbal orders to list all former Nazis and all foreigners residing in the area, to report on all political parties and their activities and to report three days in advance on all public meetings to be held — even traditional religious processions.

The Russian officers also asked for complete local police rosters and demanded that any changes in personnel be reported immediately. They wanted lists of all hotels including details as to their capacity and the names of their owners. Post Offices were told to submit lists of newspapers coming into the area and the number of each speeches by public officials had to be reported verbatim and they also demanded that each political party secretary give detailed account of the activities of his party on 10th and 20th of each month. And local officials were told to turn over lists of all trucks and other vehicles, all garages and names of their owners.

CRIME DOESN'T PAY; NEITHER DOES LAW

BANGKOK (AP) — When you call a policeman in Bangkok, be sure you get a \$2 a month man, not a two-bit one. One group joins the force voluntarily. These make 30 ticals a month. That's slightly less than two U. S. dollars. The rest of the force, about 6,800, are conscripts assigned by the Army. They are paid four ticals a month — about 25 cents.

CANBERRA (AP) — Reports that Australian mortars were being used by the Arabs in Palestine were denied by John J. Dedman, minister for defense, who added that no official report of such allegations had been made to the Australian government.

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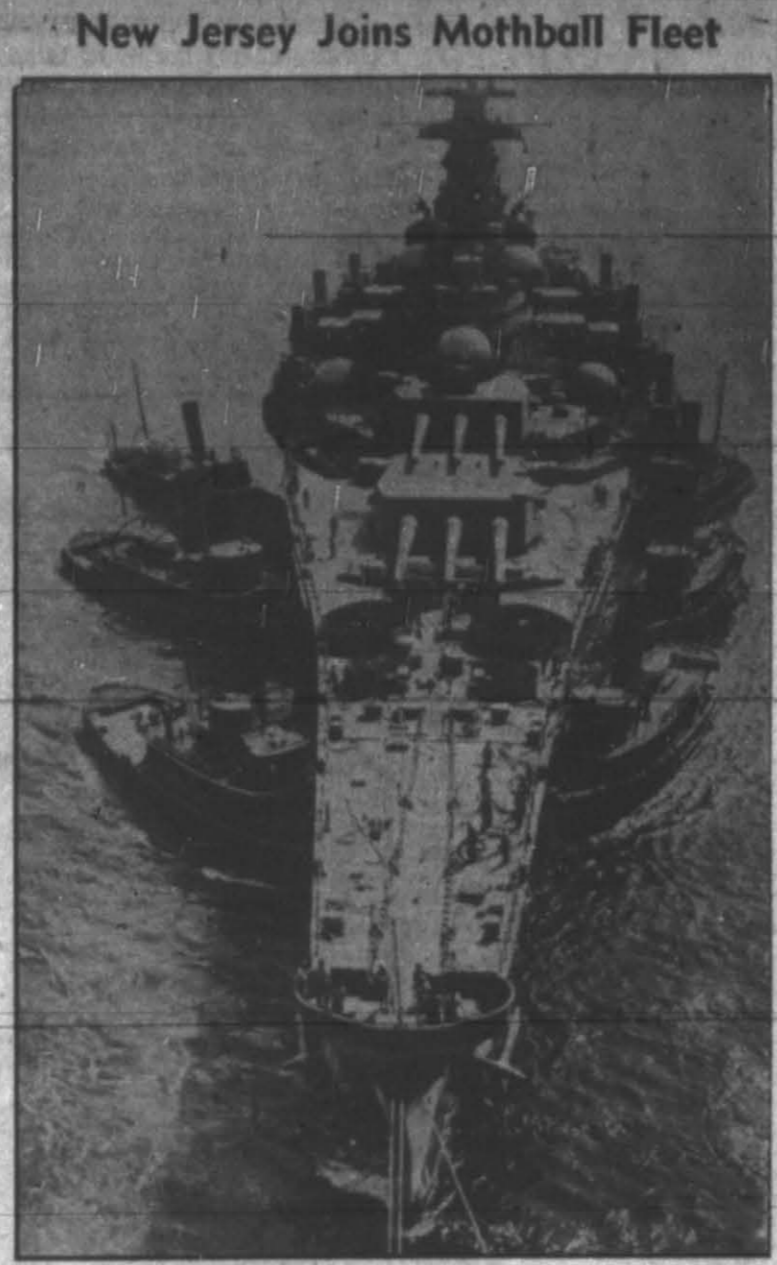
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BUNNIES FLY SOUTH
NEW YORK — (AP) — One of the largest shipments of furred-and-feathered life ever flown to Latin America was completed recently by Peruvian International Airways.
The cargo included 3,000 baby chicks from New Hampshire, destined for Havana, 200 golden finches and 100 doves from Amsterdam, Holland, also bound for Havana, and six Angora rabbits from Maine for Lima, Peru. An airline official said the chicks would be raised for resale and that the finches and doves were for South American collectors and zoological gardens. The rabbits, shipped to a Peruvian breeder, arrived in Lima approximately 24 hours after leaving New York.

The Buddhist system, adhering to the country's religious traditions, is used now in many schools and offices in the provinces. One argument for its official adoption is that government office workers and school children would be able to attend special services and observe Buddhist rites.

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"PAINLESS CHILDBIRTH" PROVOKES CONTROVERSY
LONDON — (AP) — Dr. Grantly-Dick Read, leading British obstetrician, scoffs at the theory that painless childbirth may destroy mother love.
He said in the "British Medical Journal" he had never known such a case in 30 years of practice. But on the other hand, he said, mothers frequently felt resentment at the child because of the agony of prolonged labor.
An argument on the subject was touched off by an article in the "Journal" by Dr. J. A. Hadfield, London University lecturer in psycho-pathology. Dr. Hadfield said that there is evidence that the pain of childbirth is what stimulates the mother instinct. He suggested in investigation of whether anaesthetic lessens this love.
Retorted Dr. Read: "It is not pain in labor which 'unlocks the door of mother love.' Anaesthesia of itself does not inhibit the maternal instinct. When a child is born, the sight of it, the sound of it, and the touch of it open up the floodgates of mother love."

SPUR YOUTH PROJECT
WARSAW, Poland — (AP) — The ministry of labor and social welfare is buying 345 bicycles to be given to Polish youths who show the best production record in the "In Service to Poland" movement. The government is mobilizing 2,000,000 youths this year under this organization for work on national reconstruction projects. The youths, 16 to 21, also receive 16 hours military training monthly.

SWISS WELCOMED BY BRAZIL
RIO DE JANEIRO — (AP) — A plan to bring three thousand Swiss farmers to Brazil is being carried out by Brazilian Immigration officials. These immigrants will settle in the central mountainous State of Minas Gerais. They had previously asked to go to the southeast State of Parana where the climate is cold. The initiative to bring the immigrants came from the Young Men's Christian Association of Brazil.

POLISH PEASANTS GO LEFT
WARSAW, Poland — (AP) — Peasants of Poland are joining Leftist political parties in increasing numbers.
Organizers for the Polish Socialist party reported a total of 123,800 peasants had joined. These peasants represent 1,800 communal groups and 6,600 village groups. The peasants who have thus signed up with the Socialists soon will be Communists — at least technically. The Socialists are merging with the Communist Workers on or about Oct. 1.

THREE-DAY "THINK" IN PARIS PARIS—(AP) — The French Parliament has agreed it takes three days to think clearly.

The assembly, resembling the House of Commons and the House of Representatives passed a bill authorizing release of a number of government workers. The bill was passed after 32 hours of debate and sent on to the council of the republic for review. The council of the republic can't veto a bill, but is described as a "reflective body" whose opinions on laws passed by the assembly must be given attention.

The assembly demanded that the bill be treated as "urgent" and be acted upon by the council in the same time as the assembly. The council denounced such pressure tactics and refused to think so fast. A constitutional crisis was threatened.

Finally a joint body of the two organizations met and decided that the council could take three days to reflect on a bill. Only after that would it become a bill arbitrarily. Moreover, it was agreed that the council doesn't have to think on Sunday. If Sunday intervenes as one of the three days, it doesn't count.

TEST PLANE LIGHTS
ROCHESTER, N. Y.—(AP) — College students are flying blind on long, make-believe cross-country flights in studies to make night flying safer. They "fly" in a link trainer, guided by instruments lighted with different colors and different intensities of light. The purpose is to learn how much or how little light is needed to light airplane cockpits efficiently, and what colors may reduce fatigue. While a pilot needs enough light to read his instruments quickly, the light should not be strong enough to interfere with his ability to see objects outside the cockpit.
The project is headed by Dr. S. D. S. Spragg, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Rochester, and was undertaken for the Air Materiel Command at Wright Field.

Big Bad Bears Irk Washingtonians

ABERDEEN, Wash. — Dan Boone, partly remembered for having killed a bear in a tree, had the right idea, in the opinion of Jack Ekstrand.

Ekstrand, a veteran big game hunter, says bears are getting so thick in this coastal mountain area they have become a menace to the timber crop.

The bruins go after second-growth fir when food is short in the early spring. They pick on 10 to 70 foot trees and rip the bark away. The raiding was heavier this year when the berry crop was late.

The hunter believes the bear population hereabouts has increased from three to five times in the last quarter-century. They are becoming more des-

tructive than cougars, picking on livestock and poultry as well as the timber," says Ekstrand.

The state regards bears as game animals. Ekstrand thinks bruins should be classed as predators and hunters permitted to bang away at them freely.

FISH JUNGLE PROJECT
RIO DE JANEIRO — (AP) — About two hundred young men who graduated from a government school for poor and abandoned children will settle in the wild regions of Central Brazil. The government is planning to recover the rich jungle lands. Those who will go as emigrants from Rio De Janeiro will begin new life there as farmers.

Mrs. Stanton was accompanied by her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Norton, and by Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Jones and daughter, Shirley, all of Greenville. While here, the South Carolina group also visited with the B. Y. Edwards family and other relatives, and went from here to Plainview, where they plan to visit still others.

This was their first trip to the Panhandle and the group expressed considerable surprise at the irrigation, crops, cattle and over oil prospects in this section.

CHINESE AID PEASANTS

SIAN, China — (AP) — The government is trying to win the support of the peasants in its fight against the Communists in this section of northern China.

The peasants appear to be skeptical. They ask why the government, which has been fighting a civil war for two years, hasn't done this before. Maj. Gen. Chang Ming, deputy director of the Ministry of National Defense, said he couldn't answer that question. "Nationalist troops used to carry their own rations," Chang said. "When they ran short they took food from the peasants, often without paying for it. From now on, they will get their food from the peasants and pay for it."

At several villages the peasants sullenly refused to provide the troops with water. No attempt was made to force them. At other villages the peasants grumbled loudly when asked for water and food. When they were paid for it they appeared bewildered. The government also is using an effective method of praising the peasants.

"Without the help of the peasants," says General Chang, "we can't beat the communists, even with American help."

CHICAGO — (AP) — A woman witness in Felony court was a deaf-mute. But Frank Denardo, a rookie policeman, solved the problem of taking her testimony by communicating with her in sign language. "Where did you learn to talk with your hands?" Judge Charles S. Dougherty asked when the hearing ended.

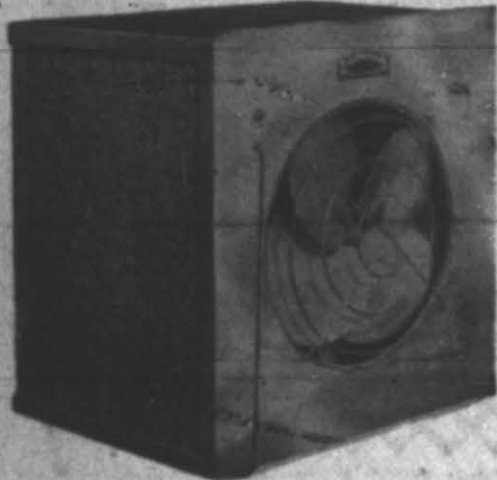

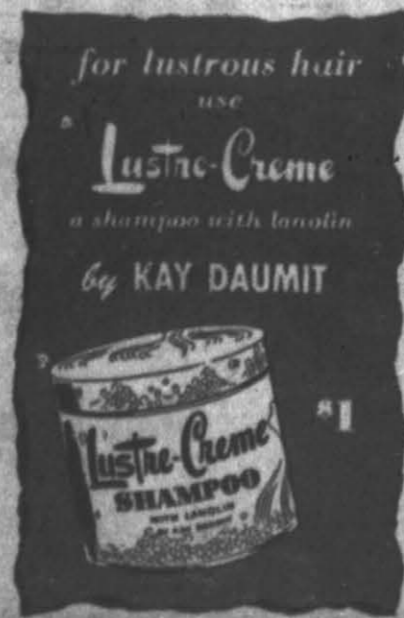
