

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LE-GISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

statewide system of retirement and isability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such sys-tem may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article

Section 2. The foregoing Constitu-ional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to held throughout this State on the second Tuesday of November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Con-stitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for sait election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amend-

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the ing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and pro-clamation shall be made by the Gov-

ernor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand
Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby ap-propriated out of any funds in the freasury of the State of Texas not

Next State Legislature Gets Task Of Rewriting Complicated And Conflicting Surface Water Laws

Austin, Tex. (A) - The job of writing Texas' complicated conflicting surface water aws has been handed on to anther legislature.

This past legislature squabbled st of the session over the isand then assigned the task of making an interim study of face water problems to a 21n committee.

That committee will decide on hat it thinks will satisfy most Legislature.

The study group consists of and nine laymen. Three of the laymen will be named by the govgovernor and three by the speaker of the house.

Early in May the senate approved a 22-man committee consisting of five senators, five representatives and 12 laymen, including six named by the governor. The house asked for a committee of eight senators and ten representatives, with none named by the governor.

The differences between the two houses were not ironed out until a few days before the ses-

But the controversy over the make-up of the committee was in no means the first time this mittee. legislature heard of surface wats er laws this session.

Shortly after the session opened, the Texas Water Conservation Association announced it had prepared a proposed new surface water code. The TWCA said the proposed code was the result of two years work by committees appointed by different water users associations.

Before the bills could be introduced in the legislature-by Rep. Bill Tippen of Abilene and Senator W. R. Cousins of Beaumont -the TWCA got a list of 17 protests from the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The WTCC said the bill did not protect the right of West Texas cities to appropriate water, over irrigation and industrial uses.

The 1913 act required water users to secure permits from the state board before diverting water from streams or lakes.

In 1917 the legislature repealed the 1913 act and enacted a comprehensive surface

The 1917 act, with the numer-ous amendments attached by almost every legislature during the past 32 years, is the present surface water code.

It is up to the next legislature to decide if the amended 1917 act is adequate for the conservation and development of Texas surface water sources-now and in the future.


