Correct posture in school children, and adults as well, is necessary to proper physical and mental development, says a warning adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated from the Texas State Department of Health. "Good posture is "Section 15-a. The Legislature shall a sign of self respect and plays the respect of others," said Dr. George W. Cox, State Health

> Officer. "Many of the ills of childhood and the deformities of adult life have their beginning in poor posture acquired during childnood," he said, "and it is particularly important that the child's posture conform to nature's dictates. Most children are porn in good physical condition and yet examination of large groups of school children show a nigh per cent to be suffering from poor posture. Malnutrition and fatigue are producive of poor posture. These lessen the size of the chest and decreases the jung capacity. Abdominal or-gans may also be pushed out of natural position, which may seriously interfere with their action. These conditions must be corrected before the body is able to attain normal weight and nutritional standards.

"School children who have poor posture are said often to average lower in attendance and in school mental and physical ac-tivities than those who have good posture. A child may be forced to hold his body in an unnatural position by a desk that is too high or too low. Desks and work tables should be just high enough to allow the feet to rest Sec. 3. 

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.







## Polio Panic Called Worse Than Disease

By ALTON L. BLAKESLEE Associated Press Science Reporter New York (A)-Polio panie is hitting millions of children and

parents this year. This panic isn't new. But it may be getting worse. It comes from fear, and from ignorance or misunderstanding of what is known about infantile paralysis.

"The fear and panic over polio can be worse than the disease. itself," declares Dr. Hart E. Van Ripper, medical director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

Many parents break out with the polio jitters each summer. They torment themselves with worry. Their homes and children get upset.

Often, children are forbidden to live and play normally. They may be cooped up in the house, with mother and child on each other's nerves. They may be forbidden to swim anywhere, or even use their own wading pools. Camps, movie or a trip into town are banned by some parents. Frightened parents may impose these taboos even when there has been only one or a few cases of polio a few miles away.

And the fact is that such steps do no good. The net result is emotional harm to the children, by giving them the idea that some unknown terror is abroad.

No one wants polio, and no one wants to get hit by a car while crossing the street. The best you can do is observe the traffic safety rules. Even then you might be hit. But the slim chance doesn't keep you glued to the corner, afraid to go across.

"Parents and their children would be better if they took the same reasonable attitude toward polio," Dr. Van Riper said.

Knowing the facts about polio is the best way to banish fear. Here are some fictions about polio, and the facts as cited by Dr. Harry M. Weaver, research head of the foundation:

Fiction: That polio is the worst of all childhood diseases.

Fact: Polio in a recognizable form is relatively rare. Rheumatic fever is the worst, by far, both as a killer and a crippler. Even in a bad polio year, only 1 in every 6,000 Americans get polio. And only I in every 15,000 is left slightly or badly paralyzed or avoiding fatigue.



Fact! Swimming in polluted waters is foolish, for the virus may be present there; and you might get other disease bugs. But there's no evidence that anyone ever got polio from swimming in a clean pool. Intimate contact between children playing together at the beach could be dangerous, if the children haven't all been regular play-

Sudden chilling, over-exertion and fatigue may set you up for virus already in your system to go to work on the nerve cells. There's no proof yet that fatigue is bad when you have the virus in your system. But there is ample evidence that fatigue when you have a little fever, nausea, headache or other sign of possible polio will increase your chances of coming down with the paralytic form of

Fiction: Every person getting polio will be crippled or die.

Fact: Fifty to 60 per cent recover completely. About 20 per cent are left with mixor handieaps. Fifteen to 20 per cent may be badly handicapped, and five to 10 per cent may die. Fiction: The cause of polio is

hopeless. Fact: It is caused by a virus, one of the tiniest disease orvanisms. There is not yet a vaccine to prevent it, but one probably will be developed soon. Your best protection is good health rules, especially in keeping clean, getting rest, and

A complete change in frontal appearance and fender treatment gives the 1950 models sleek, new lines which make them appear in motion even when they're standing still.


Both ride and handling ease have been considerably better by engineering innovations complementing the use of an improved self-stabilizing coil spring front suspension.

The front of the 1950 Studebaker is particularly striking. It embodies an airplane fuselage-type hood, flanked by air-foil front fenders and set off by a chrome "spinner." In addition to providing an ornamental touch the "spinner" augments four frontal openings which direct air to the engine for maximum cooling. The largest of these air passages consist of two oval-shaped honeycomb grille scoops located below the two smaller air channels which flank the "spinner." Chrome moldings over these twin channels contribute to the unusual decorative effect.

In harmony with a styling that expresses power, speed and sleekness are the heavy wrap-around bumpers. In front they are held by supports enclosed within tubular housings which are painted to match the automobile.

In keeping with the new speed lines are the redesigned rear fenders, also air-foil type, and the large vertical tail lights which fit into the trailing edge of the fenders. Both front and rear fenders are the bolt-on

The wheel bases of all 1950 Studebaker models have been increased by one inch: Champion, 113 inches; Commander, 120. inches; Land Cruiser, 124 inches. Overall lengths of the cars are: Champion, 197-1/4 inches; Commander, 207-7/8 inches; and Land Cruiser, 211-7/8 inches.

Instrument panels are located about four inches farther forward than previously, thus providing additional space in the front compartment. Gauges are grouped directly in front of the driver so that they can be checked at a glance.

In these new models the company continues its flair for luxurious upholstery and generous use of leatherette trim. Because of the popularity of nylon, first used by Studebaker in the Land Cruiser, and because of its proved durability, the company is introducing it in all Regal Deluxe models of the Commander series and in two patterns of both the Champion and Commander convertibles. Leather upholstery is optional on the convertibles at no extra charge. Foam rubber cushions are standard equipment in all models with the exception of the lower priced Delux Champion.

An unusual feature of the Studebaker coil spring front suspension lies in the fact that both upper and lower control arms are pivoted so that they rake to the rear about 15 degrees. This has the effect of cushioning the ride on rough roads since the front wheels tend to "travel away" from a bump as the car is driven over it. Rubber insulation is used at the top and bottom of each coil spring. Shock absorbers on the Champion are the direct-acting tubular type while the Commander utilizes the double-acting linkand-lever variety.

Engines in both the Champion and Commander have a new compression ratio of 7.0 to 1; for high altitudes only, a ratio of 7.5 to 1 is available. Commander engine horsepower has been increased to 102 at 3,200 revolutions per minute while the Champion has been raised to 85 horsepower at 4,000 revolutions per minute.

All models have a simplified symmetrical steering linkage, with definite centerpoint linkage on the Commander and Land Cruiser. Commander tire size has been increased to  $7.60 \times 15$ . The Champion is equipped with four-ply 6.40 x 15 tires. All tires are the extra low pressure type.






