

Redistricting Plan Approved by House Draws Fire in County

The Texas State House of Representatives Monday approved a bill for redistricting representation to that body which puts Deaf Smith county in the same representative district with six counties to the north-Oldham, Hartley, Dallam, Sherman, Moore, and Hansford.

Several Deaf Smith county residents Met Monday afternoon at Hotel Jim Hill to discuss the bill which received a 119-23 stamp of approval by the lower house.

More than 30 individuals sent telegrams to their representa-tives in the Texas legislature protesting the redistricting as set out in the bill.

Heads of civic organizations n Hereford also dispatched telegrams to their legislators protesting the approval of the new plan.

Hereford Fire Insurance Premium Rate Changing to Credit of 5%

Due to the decreased fire loss ratio in Hereford since March 1, 1950, all fire insurance written in the city after March 1 will be written at a 5 per cent

Local insurance agents emphasize that this reduction in premiums does not affect policies in effect previous to March Aunt of Faust Collier 1, 1951. It affects only new and renewals which expire March 1 Dies at Barstow, Tex.

For the year previous to March 1. 1951, all fire insurance written in Hereford was written at a 5 per cent charge due to past fire

The charge or credit for fire insurance premiume shanges annually on March 1 and is based on the amount of premiums paid in ratio to the amount paid on fire losses.

ting of contracts for the 37-mile first class Farm-To-Market road north and east of Bootleg was completed Tuesday, according to J. H. Foster, county judge.

Known as FM1412, the hardsurfaced road will run 14 miles north of Bootleg from the Harrison highway, then east for a distance of 23 miles to where it connects with Highway 51.

Work on securing right-ofway for the new road was started in February, 1950 and the final agreement was just completed this week.

The state highway department set a February 9 deadline on accepting the work and condemnation proceedings were started prior to that time against the one property owner with whom an agreement had not been reached.

When contracts will be let for the work was not announced. but work authorization is expected in the not too distant future. Officials hope that the contracts will be let at the next meeting of the highway depart-.

No contracts could be let for the work until the easements were obtained and no easements could be located until a survey of the area was completed.

There were 91 deeds affected in securing the final easements for the work. A total of 19 ease before the final approval of all easements was final. In the cases of mineral reservations of liens on the property, a total of four instruments had to be secured on each deed.

A study of potential industrial development, population growth, and requirements for municipal and industrial water supplies in the Panhandle-Plains area has been initiated by the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas.

Announcement of the study was made Saturday in Amarillo by H. E. Robbins, regional di-rector of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation.

Industrial Water

Survey Will Be

Made in County

The survey, Director Robbins said, will be conducted in 44 counties in Texas to include the trade areas of major cities in the Region. The survey area includes all counties in the north and south Panhandle-Plains Region; Motley, Dickens, and Kent counties to the southeast, and Borden, Dawson, and Gaines counties to the south.

University of Texas research crews, under the direction of Dan C. Hill, Jr., will interview many persons in each of the 44 counties comprising the survey area. Among those to be contacted are heads of business concerns, including petroleum refining plants, smelters chemical and food processing plants which now use water for industrial purposes; city officials and commanding officers of defense installations. The area's oil, gas, and agricultural resources also will be included in the survey, which is slated for completion next December.

Looking to the future industrial development and water supply requirements in the area, the survey will provide estimates of potential municipal and industrial water use trends in 1960, 1980, and 2000.

The University's detailed analysis of the many factors that influence industrial expansion and population growth and which result in increased water requirements, Director Robbins explained, will facilitate planning operations by the Bureau of Reclamation when funds are provided by Congress for construction of the Cana-



James W. Witherspoon Takes Office as Regent

James W. Witherspoon, Here- on Main street, is one of the ford attorney, signed his "oath of office" las week; becoming a regent of Texas A and M. College, to which position he was appointed recently by Gov. Allen

In addition to the honor of being named to the Board of Directors of Texas A. and M., Witherspoon has been listed in Marquis' publication of famous people, "Who's Who in the South and Southwest."

Included in the listing are scientists, educators, newspapermen, lawyers, doctors, etc., from all over the south, who have been screened by appropriate selective standards. Mr. Witherspoon is the only man in Hereford to receive listing in this publication of the A. N. Marquis Co., of Chicago, Ill.

In January, he was notified by Governor Shivers that he had been nominated to serve on the Board of Directors of Texas A. and M. for a six-year term beginning immediately. Also appointed were H. L. Winfield, Ft. Stockton rancher, banker, and former State Senator, and Bob Allen, Raymondville vegetable grower and shipper.

This is one more honor to be added to those already received, and it is this record that won him the acknowledgement in "Who's Who," where he shares honors with such famous southerners as John Snyder, Tom Clark, Will Clayton, and Clarence Streit.

James Winfred Witherspoon

was born in Indianola, Oklahoma, the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Witherspoon. grew up in Bellview, New Mexico, and his ambition, ever since childhood was to be a lawyer. After graduation from high school he attended Montezuma college near Las Vegas, New Mexico, where he received his A. B. degree and then he studied at the law schools of the Univer-sity of Texas and the University of Oklahoma, being graduated from O. U. with an LLB degree in 1929. He had always been especially interested in civil law, and after graduation moved to Hereford where he rented a law office with Judge Carl Gilliland.

He liked Hereford, and his interest in the town increased tremendously when he met Miss Margaret Gilliland, who had just returned from Randolph Macor college. The couple were married and now have two children, Jerry, a sophomore at Hereford high school and Irene, who is in the seventh grade at junior high.

Witherspoon's record in Hereford is a continual one of civic participation achievement. He has served here, in a legal capacity, first as City Attorney, later as District Attorney of the 69th Judicial District, in 1932, and as district judge from 1940 until 1944. He was the youngest district attorney and the youngest district judge in the history of this area. In 1944 he resigned to re-enter private practice.



Charlie Hoover found a U. S. Army balloon and istruments early Saturday morning about 19 miles northwest of Hereford when he was on his way to Hereford from his ranch. This is the second set of instruments found here in recent weeks; however this set was much smaller than the nuclear research equipment found earlier.

Hoover, who was on his way to Littlefield, turned the equipment over to Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Lawhon and asked them to call The Brand as there was no return address given on the instruments.

The huge rubber balloon was estimated to measure nearly 12 feet in diameter before Hoover released the helium from it in order to bring it to town. As soon as the helium was released, the balloon split. Attached to the balloon by long cotton cords were a foil kite and a plastic and metal box of instruments about 6 inches square. Also attached to the kite was a light bulb, about the size of a marble, with batteries. The bulb was still burning when discovered. Hoover said the instrument box had caught on the barbed wire

Observers were guessing yesterday as to the reason for the instrument some believed it was weather equipment, while others said it had something to withmeasuring cosmic rays, as the nuclear research equipment found earlier. There was nothing on the equipment which would indicate to the average observer the origin of
