Week End Rain Scaks County

Reports from various rain gauges over the county varied on the amount of moisture received for the week end from 75 of an inch to an inch and a half, according to The Brand's rural correspondents.

All correspondents agreed, however, on the fact that the farmers are smiling. Some farmers are planting oats, and many more are working long hours getting land ready for vegetable and row crops.

Farmers are not yet predicting the outcome of the 1951 wheat harvest. Wheat all over the area is turning green from recent moisture.

In Hereford, 80 of an inch of moisture was recorded at the city hall. Correspondents from the area reported Summerfield, 14. Dawn, 75 to 1 inch; Bellview, 1 1/2 inches; Garcia, 58, and Northwest Hereford, nearly one inch.

Cotton Seed Is Scarce Due to Crop Failure and Restrictions in 1950

Farmers are already buying cotton seed as fast as they can get it even though planting doesn't start until late spring, according to John McCleskey, manager of the Hereford Cotton Gin.

Reduction in acreage allotments and the failure of the crop in many sections of the country last season caused the scarcity of seed for this spring, and the lifting of government restriction on planting has caused the demand to increase tremendously.

McCleskey said the gin has bought all the Macha, "Storm-proof" variety, obtainable. This is the most popular variety used locally.

He predicts this variety will not be available later in the season. McCleskey said, as a last resort, farmers will use "mill run" seed, disadvantages of which include variety in height and maturity of the crop.

"People are planting cotton this year in places where it hasn't been raised in years," he added. Last year 900 acres were planted in this area with farmers netting as high as \$200 per acre, the price being higher than it has been since the Civil War.

Total allotment was less than 2000 acres, but many farmers failed to get a stand because of unusual weather conditions.

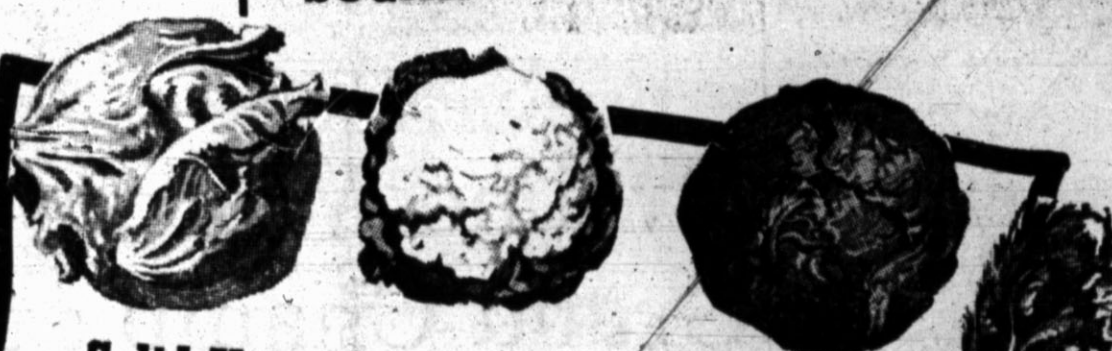

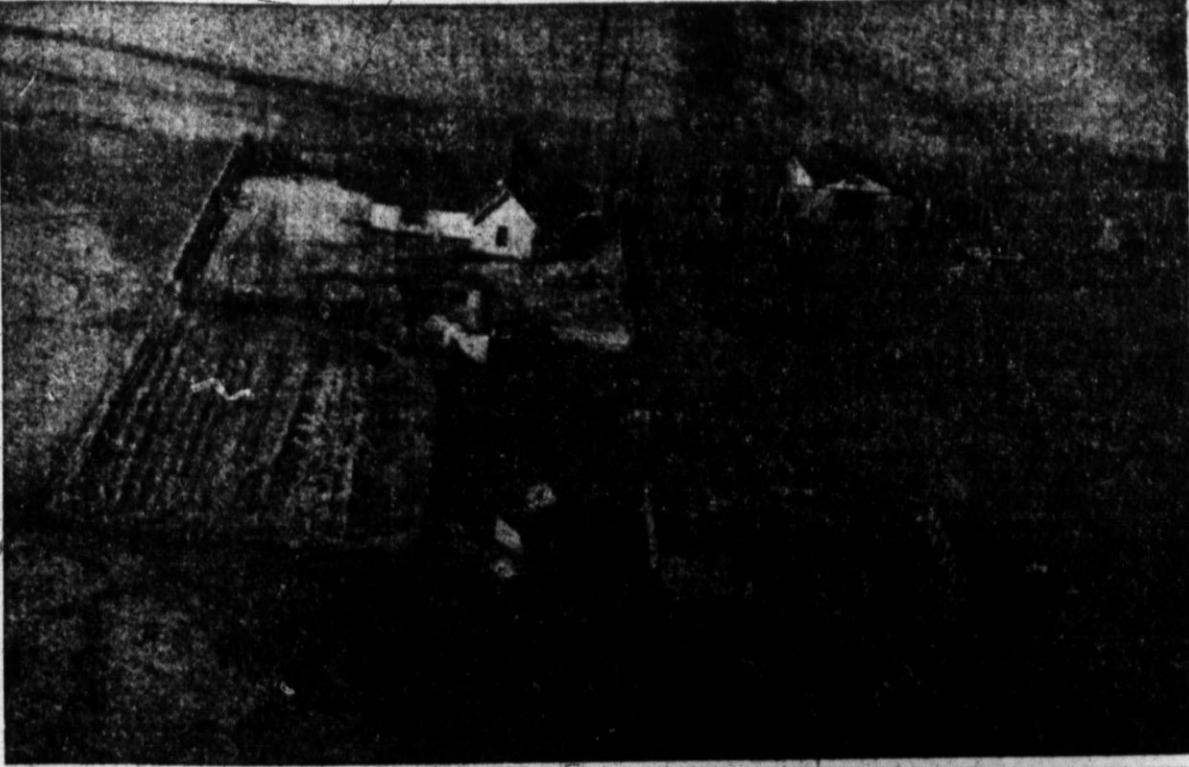

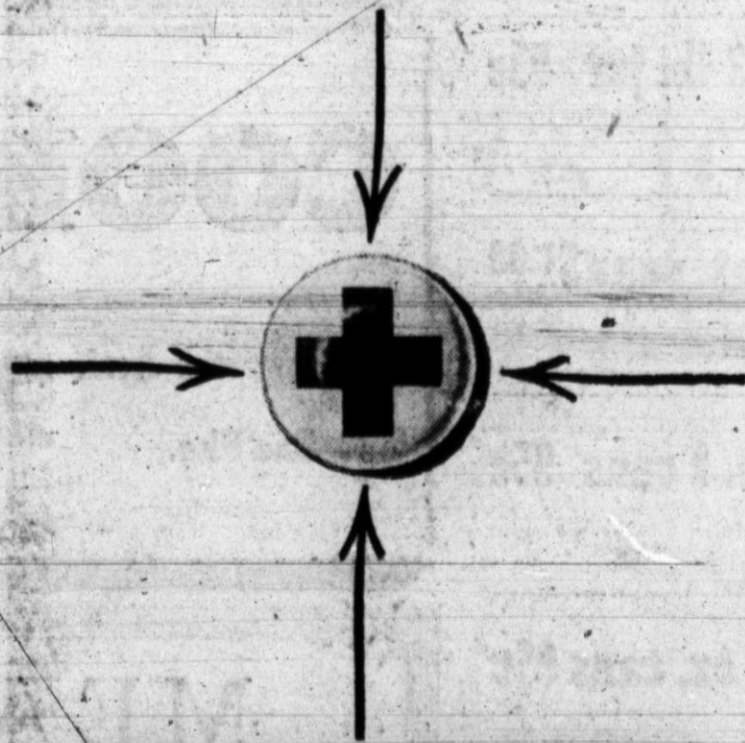

## Deaf Smith Tax Payments 90.78 Percent by Deadline

Deaf Smith county's taxes were 92.78 per cent collected by the January 31 deadline, according to Worth Covington, tax deputy.

Of a total tax charge to the county of \$241,503.88, \$224,075.94 was paid by the deadline thus avoiding a penalty.

Collections this year by the end of January were .04 per cent under last year's figure, when 92.82 per cent of the tax was paid before the deadline.

Tax items charged to Deaf Smith county and total collected toward that charge are listed by Covington as follows:  
State, \$87,957.24 charged, \$83,067.90 paid; county, \$107,000.77 charged, \$98,694.20 paid; road, \$41,874.22 charged, \$38,553.13 paid; Walcott common school, \$24,871.65 charged, \$23,760.71 paid.

Covington said the tax charge for payment this year was about \$60,000 more because of a new road tax levied and because of increases in all taxes.

# Letter To Editor

Dear Jimmie:  
In order to clarify a few questions that have arisen with reference to the building of the

new high school, the school board would like to answer them in the form of a letter.

The question has been asked as to what the exact cost of the new school would be? This question cannot be answered exactly. We do know that Shirley school cost approximately \$13 per square foot and we know that the new high school contains around 56000 square feet, so we estimate the following: \$56,000 square feet at \$15 or \$840,000.00.

You will notice that we have estimated cost at \$15 per square foot in order to allow for the already higher cost of construction and the estimated amount of increase by the time actual bids are received on the building. The balance of the bond issue would be used for the purchase of the equipment for the building, to do whatever is necessary to the present high school for use as a junior high; to move the barracks buildings near the high school building to be used for shops and band hall; to pay architect's fees and provide parking facilities around the new school. In the event the amount is more than is needed, the balance can go unissued or can be used for future school

expansion. We have been asked who is eligible to vote on this bond issue. All resident, qualified property-taxpaying voters can vote in the election. That means that a person must have his poll tax or exemption receipt for 1950 and means that a person must have rendered either real or personal property for taxation by the Hereford schools. Residents are those that live within the bounds of the school district. The folks that live in the district are just as eligible to vote as those folks that live in the Deaf Smith county part of the district, provided, of course, that they are otherwise qualified.

Another question that has been asked is as follows: "If the voters turn down the \$1,000,000 issue, would the board consider submitting a one-half million dollar issue to the voters?"

The only way the board can answer that question is that one-half million just will not build a high school that would be appropriate to the school's needs, nor would it build one that people would be proud of for many years to come. The type of building the people would want, we presume, would be one that would be attractive

and practical for their needs, and not one that would cost thousands additional each year for maintenance and upkeep. If it is the type of construction that makes it necessary to hire two or three janitors to keep it clean instead of one, or if because the building is not fire-proof, the insurance premiums are much higher, a person can readily see that the cost in maintenance in a few years would exceed the additional amount to build it practical and fireproof in the first place. Shirley school is a practical and fireproof building, and we feel that the people of the Hereford district would like a high school similar to it in construction.

Again we would like to say that the school board has given long thought and study to the plan submitted to you. All of us have come to the conclusion that as members of your school board, we would not have been fair to you had we not advised you of the present and future conditions of the school. We know too, that the plan must be approved by you if the issue passes, you know what you may expect. If not, we have no other alternative than to try to do the next best which none of us as yet, has been able to think out to a satisfactory conclusion. Very Truly Yours, A. J. 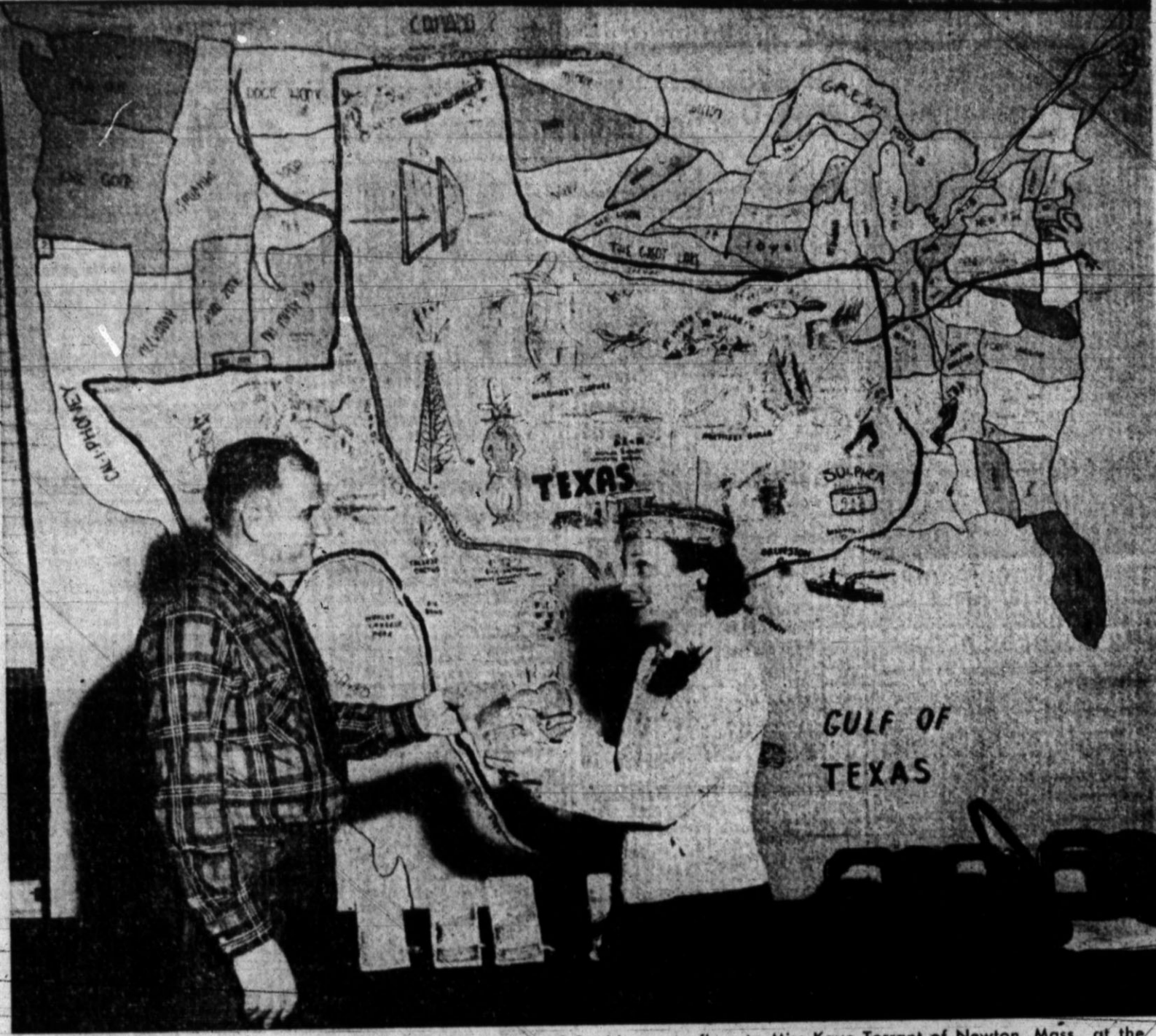
