Public Relations Theme Of Annual Firemen Banquet

"My Fire Department" was the topic of C. F. Churchwell Richardson, first vice president of Texas Firemen and Fire Marshals organization. Mr. Churchwell, in addition to being an excellent speaker, is a volunteer fireman with 23 years active service.

Public relations of the department with the community was emphasized in his talk, in which he also stressed public relations with the home and family.

"Treat people as though it was their last day on earth," advised Mr. Richardson. "Also stop and wonder once in a while what you would do if it were your last day on earth."

If you are the kind of fireman who thinks the chief is an old fossil, the department officers are poor; that the city officials are also old fossils, he said, they will probably be that way. He contrasted a fireman of this type with the fireman who took pride in the department, the community and in his home.

With a shudder, Mr. Richardson recalled the number of suits and clothes he had ruined answering fires. He also told of a neighbor who felt that he was silly to be on the department and answer calls without pay.

"But a few days later we had an emergency call when a small boy was reported drowned, Mrs. Churchwell recalled. "The sun was boiling down and sweat was seeping through our clothes as we started giving artificial respiration. Then I heard someone talking, glanced to the side -- and there was the boy's mother before the huge crowd, down on her knees praying to God that her boy be returned. We kept working, and most of us were praying a little bit, too. And finally the little boy began showing signs of life. After a while his eyes opened."

"I'll tell you the truth," he declared, "when I handed that little fellow, whole and hearty, back to his mother -- all of those suits and shirts, all of those drills and special schools, they were all repaid in full, 100 times over."

"I know we didn't do it all. That 'Old Man' up there really passed judgement, but we did."

Hardly had he met the city employees and put his feet under the manager's desk Monday before he received a call from Stamford that his father, R. A. Bowdry, 81, was seriously ill as the result of a stroke at 4:45 the afternoon before.

Mr. and Mrs. Grady Bowdry, who arrived here late Saturday, started on the return trip to Stamford. His father died at 8 o'clock, however, two hours before they arrived. His mother, who has been in ill health for several years, was also reported in critical condition.

Funeral services were held from the Methodist church in Stamford for R. A. Bowdry at 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Interment was made in Stamford. Surviving are the wife, and three sons, Clifford of Dallas, Milton of Hamlin and Grady, now of Hereford.

Grady Bowdry was to have been sworn in as Hereford's first City Manager Monday night at the regular council meeting, Mayor S. O. Wilson said. The formalities will be delayed, however, until he is able to return to Hereford to assume his duties.

Area East Of Town Is Annexed By City

The City Council officially annexed two blocks in the Braly sub-division east of Hereford at the regular meeting Monday night, Mayor S. O. Wilson announced today. The tract is located east of "K" Street (old Airport road) with the north boundary at 13th Street and the south boundary at Forrest Avenue.

"Sewer and water lines will be run down the alley of the block next to 'K' Street in the near future," Mr. Wilson said. "The Council also agreed to install additional sewer and water service for the entire tract when 50 percent, or more, of the area is developed."

Description of the new area as listed in the city records reads: "All of blocks 1 and 2, together with all of Forrest Avenue, between 'K' Ave., and East boundary line of Irving Street, and all of Irving Street from north boundary line of Forrest Ave., to north boundary line of 13th Street, and all of 13th Street from east boundary line of Irving to west boundary line of 'K' Street from north boundary line of 13th, south to existing city limits." The instrument said that the area is annexed to and is part of Hereford, Texas.

Addresses Sought For Xmas Mailing To Boys In Service

In answer to numerous requests for "word from friends" by boys in the service, The Brand will publish in its Sunday and Thursday editions, Dec. 14 and Dec. 18, a list of all names and addresses of servicemen submitted by parents, friends or other relatives. Addresses should be brought or called in as soon as possible.

There will be sufficient time to send Christmas cards to these boys if the cards are airmailed. Air mail stamps, incidentally, are six cents to APO overseas addresses, just as in the states.

Slight Drop In Support Price On Castor Beans

Texas has again been included in the 125,000 acres of castor bean production allocated in the United States, according to F. G. Collier, county PMA chairman. The support price, however, will be dropped from 16 cents to nine cents per pound for 1953.

The 125,000 acres approved includes 35,000 acres on irrigated land, and was specifically requested by the Munitions Board to aid in defense purposes.

Commodity Credit will carry the program out through PMA offices. The program will be available to farmers who enter into contract with CCC, or with private companies under contract with CCC, and where planting seed is available.

The price to be paid farmers participating in the program will be the higher of nine cents per pound, hulled basis, or the market price at time of delivery. The 1951 and 1952 crops were on tiths basis with a 10-cent price support.

The total acreage for the nation is about the same this year, Collier reports. He estimated 3,800 acres in Deaf Smith County in 1952. Hauling centers and harvesters will be operated along the same lines as during the past season.

"Crack Down" On Traffic Violations Starts Monday

Ah-Ah-Ah... Don't do it! Violate traffic rules, that is. Starting Monday, Dec. 15, City Police will be out to stop violations which, they believe, are becoming hazardous to the community.

Speeding in school zones is No. 1 on the violation list. Racing on Main Street and other city streets is No. 2 on the list. Blocking alleys is the No. 3 item.

"For 90 days a policeman has been issuing warnings against speeding and careless driving in school zones," says Chief of Police Leo F. Box. "Monday is scheduled as the date to start handing out tickets to all violators."

Blocking alleys creates a fire hazard as well as a traffic hazard -- and clear out. "Racing and speeding on Main and other streets," he continues, "is dangerous and is flooding the city hall with complaints." Most of these offenses come, he believes, from boys and girls who, when stopped, will first be asked to show driver's licenses in addition to getting tickets for traffic violations.

These safety measures are a "must," he says and adds that he hopes the patrolmen will not be able to give out one single ticket.

Two Wrecks Place Five In Hospitals; Charges Filed

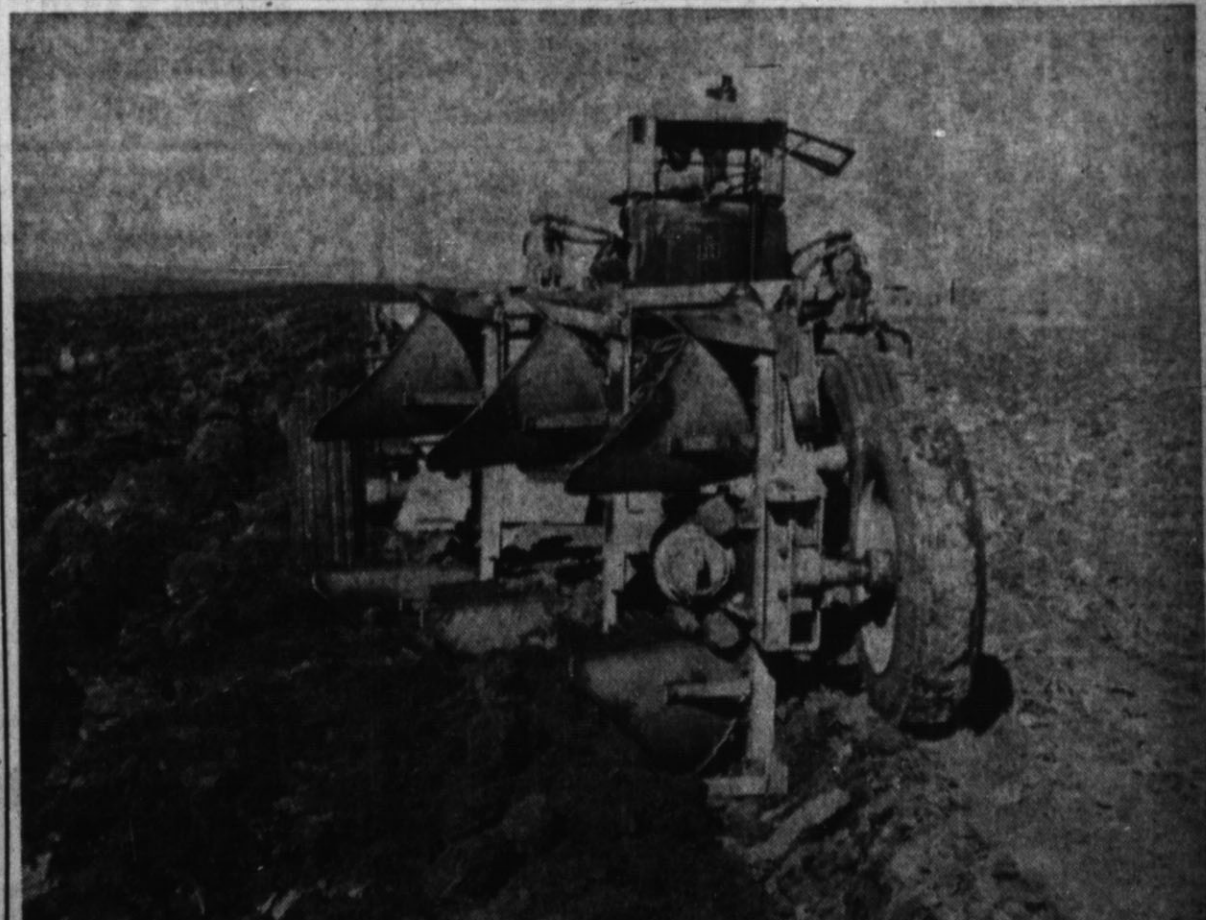

Second Gin Under Construction Here

The foundation will be completed this week or early next week on a new gin in Hereford and the entire structure will be installed and ready for business next spring. John McCleskey, manager of Hereford Gin Company, made the announcement today. The new gin will be located two miles south of town on the Taft McCleskey farm, almost due south of the elevators.

"It will be as big or bigger than the present gin operated just east of town," he continued, estimating that it will handle 100 bales each 24 hours, which is the approximate capacity of the present 580-saw installation. Reason for constructing the new gin, McCleskey reported: "We believe this is finally going to be a cotton country." He estimated that the gin has this year handled 5,500 bales and that at least that amount has been forced to go to other areas to secure ginning services.

Balanced Farming Aim Of PMA Plan

By assisting farmers to carry out approved soil and water conserving practices, the Agricultural Conservation Program has encouraged balanced farming in Deaf Smith County, says E. G. Collier, Chairman of the county PMA committee.
He points out that back in 1936 when ACP started, the emphasis was on shifting from soil-depleting to soil-conserving crops. This started many farmers working grass and legumes into the crop rotation. This in turn led to the introduction of livestock production on many farms.
With the completion of the 1952 program, farmers will be finishing up 17 years of conservation work. During these years the farmers who have cooperated in the pro-

gram have been building toward a more productive and permanent agriculture.
The conservation practices carried out by many farmers under the 1952 program added to and strengthened the conservation work of previous years. As a result their farms are in condition to continue to help meet the needs for increased production in the future.
Pastures have been improved by the seeding of higher yielding grasses and clovers. Cropland has been made more productive through the practices carried out to check the loss of topsoil, the building up of organic matter and fertility through the use of grasses and legumes in rotation, and practices which result in more effective use of water.

No Cotton Quota For Coming Year

No marketing quotas or acreage allotments will be enforced on the 1953 cotton crop, F. G. Collier, county PMA chairman announced here this week.
Under provisions of the law, the Secretary of Agriculture is required to proclaim a national marketing quota by Oct. 15, whenever he determines that the total supply of cotton will exceed "normal" supply -- domestic consumption and export, plus 30 percent carryover.
Latest available statistics of the Federal Government indicate that the total supply does not exceed the normal supply, therefore the Secretary has announced, "No marketing quotas or acreage allotments."
"Acreage planted to cotton in 1953 will be considered as part of the base acreage in establishing future cotton acreage allotments," Mr. Collier pointed out.

Your meat pie with corn bread topping can be served at the table in its baking dish. As the serving spoon breaks through the corn bread crust, you'll love the wonderful aroma that greets you, and really welcome the good flavor that has been sealed in by the corn bread. There will be no cold second helpings because the corn bread tends to hold the heat in.

Meat Pie With Corn Bread Topping (A good way to use left-over meat and vegetables)

Filling:
 1 cup cooked, diced carrots
 1 cup cooked, diced celery
 1 cup cooked, diced potatoes
 1/2 cup cooked peas

1 tablespoon grated onion
 3 cups diced left-over roast beef
 2 cups celery

Topping:
 1/2 cup corn meal
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 1 egg yolk
 1/2 cup milk
 1 tablespoon melted butter or margarine

(If self-rising corn meal and flour are used, omit salt and baking powder.)

Combine all filling ingredients in a 1 1/2-quart greased casserole. Sift together corn meal and other dry ingredients. Combine beaten egg yolk, milk, and melted fat. Add to dry ingredients, mixing only until moistened. Pour batter evenly over meat and vegetables in casserole. Bake in a 400° F. oven, for 20 to 25 minutes, until the corn bread just starts to shrink from the sides of the casserole. Yield: 6 servings.

Christmas Fun For The Family

COLLEGE STATION — Part of the fun of Christmas is getting the family to do things together. This fun can be increased when members are active in planning and creating Christmas decorations and gifts that have the personal touch.

Lucille Moore, recreational specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, makes a suggestion for such a Christmas fun activity that could be done when only the family was present or a special "how-to" party with guests.

The idea is to mould Christmas figures that can be used as decorative touches for the living or dining room. The figures can be created by each person's ingenuity, or copies made of biblical characters, snow men or angels.

The specialist says make your own moulding clay using one cup of salt, one of flour, a teaspoon of alum, and about a half cup of water knead this well and you are ready to mould Christmas figures. Add clove eyes and befy mouths to snow men, or tiny candles to the angel figures.

The material dries a shiny white and then can be tinted with water colors.

Have fun with your family and friends this Christmas by planning to do things together. Moulding Christmas figures as Miss Moore suggest may be the beginning of many other artistic attempts and family evenings together.

1 to 2 squares of chocolate
2 tablespoons corn syrup
Few grains of salt
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix sugar, milk, corn syrup, salt and chocolate. Stir frequently until sugar dissolves and chocolate melts. Cook to soft ball stage (250°F to 240°F). Add butter, remove from fire. Cool to slightly more than lukewarm. Add vanilla. Beat until it is creamy and has lost its gloss, then pour quickly into oiled pans making a 1/4-1/2 inch layer. Cut into 1 inch squares when nearly cold. It may be kneaded and molded if preferred.

Variations

Nut Fudge: Add 1/2 to 2/3 cups coarsely chopped nuts to fudge just before pouring into pans.

Marshmallow Fudge: Add 1 cup chopped marshmallows just before turning into pans. Marshmallows will melt and lose their identity if added while fudge is warm.

Fruit Fudge: Add 1/2 to 2/3 cup Sultana raisins, or chopped dates, figs, candied cherries, or candied orange peel to fudge just before turning into pan.

Heaven Delight

3 cups sugar
1 cup corn syrup
1 1/2 pound candied cherries
1 1/2 cups cream
1/2 pound candied pineapple
1/2 pound walnuts
1/2 pound pecans
1/2 pound Brazil nuts

Cook sugar, corn syrup, and cream to firm ball stage. Beat until almost ready to lose glossiness. Add nuts and fruit. Mold into loaf pan (3" x 8") lined with waxed paper. Garnish with nuts, pineapple, and cherries. Slice.

Date Loaf

2 1/2 cups sugar
1 cup milk
1/2 pound dates, seeded
1/2 cup chopped nut meats

Cook sugar, milk, and dates to soft ball stage (235-240°F). Stir as needed to prevent burning. Remove from fire. Cool to slightly more than luke warm. Beat until it begins to harden. Add nuts and turn onto a damp cloth. Shape into a roll. Let stand until firm. Cut into slices as needed. This candy will keep some time if tightly covered.

Timely-Tips

Pans chosen for candy making should be of suitable size, not too large but allowing space for "bubbling up". One with a smooth surface and of material thick enough to prevent scorching is desirable.

Wooden spoons are preferred for stirring candy as they do not scratch pan and are easy to handle.

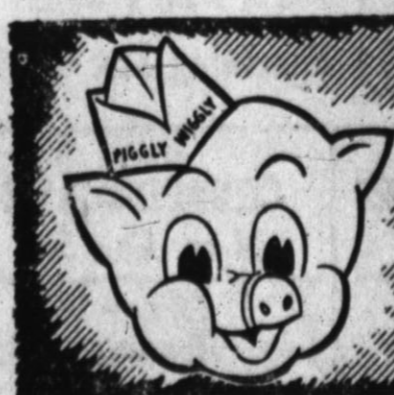

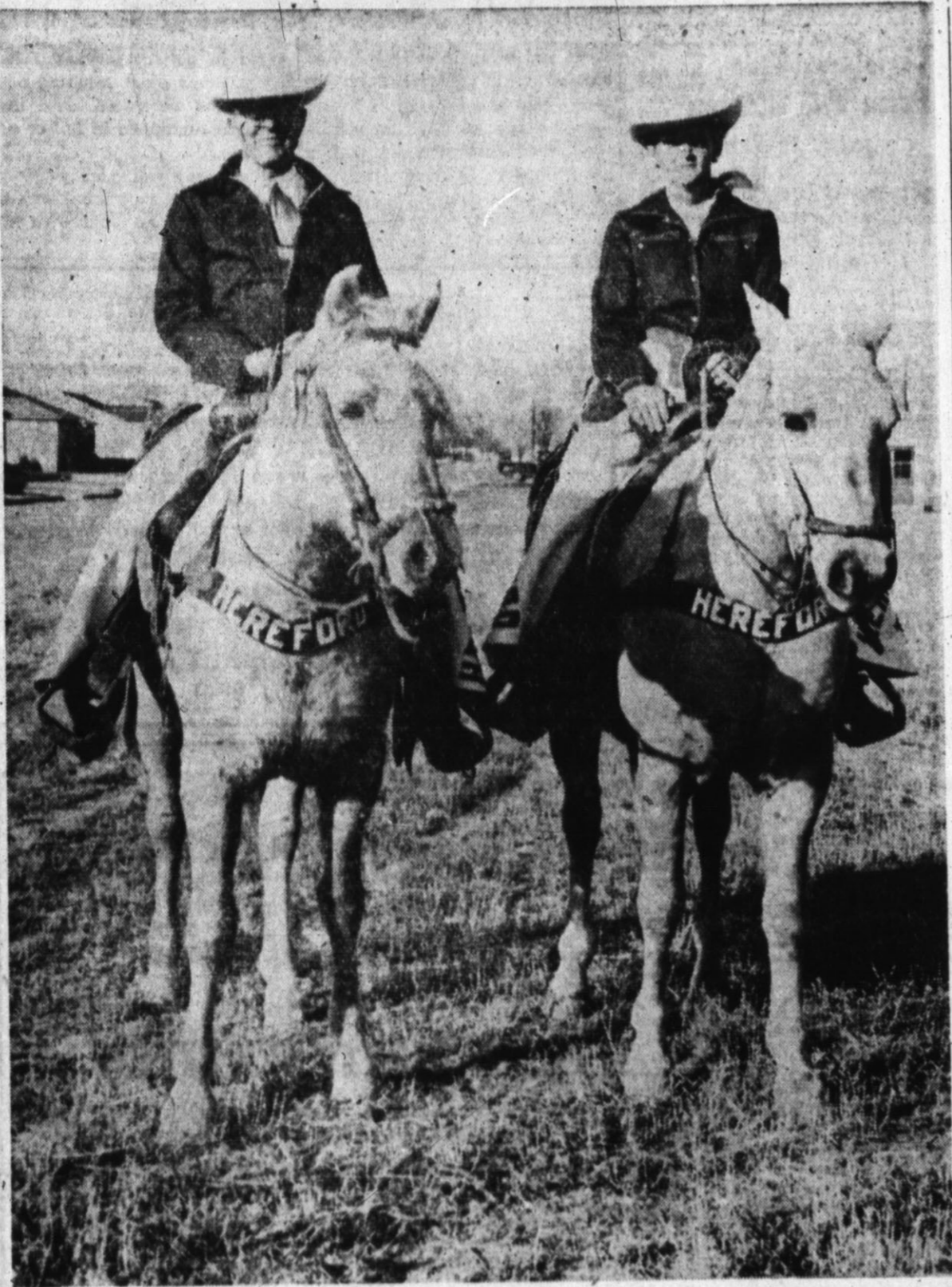

Fancy and Plain By Kent Snare

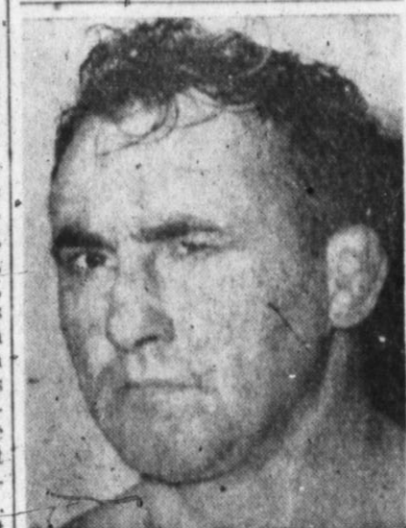
Last Saturday I was skimming the remnant of the 1952 regular football season, by skipping the dial here and there ... Being in-bound on account of a thick-head type of cold, when either-wise came one from the Tech-North Carolina State game broadcast, that didn't alleviate the cranium density much ... Their announcer came up with this gem: They've called time out, there's a player down on the field ... Here comes the trainer ... Here comes the doctor ... But folks, he's not hurt much, they're just trying to get him to breathe ... Isn't it about time for the annual SWC yammer fest? Do you suppose this is the lap when they divest themselves of Arkansas, and take in Oklahoma? There's so little ballyhoo extant, that the above may be about to happen ... Two of the better known collegiate coaches, who frequently drop verbal block busters, have been exuding at the mouth again ... One of them, Jim Tatum, who has never been noted for sagacious remarks, has unnecessarily worded himself into a deep pocket ... The other, Dr. Phog Allen, who also, has always made freely with the words, has to me, a very just protest although it may be a whit too loud ... The foregoing one-one does not apply to double fouls or fouls against a player trying for a goal, or multiple fouls or profit fouls. Each of these is handled just as formerly ... This means, of course, that any foul in the final 3 minutes will be a two-shot foul automatically." One big result of this rule will be to turn the game into an interminable affair ... For example in last Friday's games: Bowling Green-Gustavus Adolphus, a total of 98 foul attempts; Wyoming-Montana State, 68; OCU-Oklahoma Baptist, 98 and Saturday the Whitefaces and Sandies had 80 chances in a 32 minute affray ... This rule is peddled on mediocrity instead of excellence, if you miss one, you don't get charged for this miss, you mere gets one more try. Incidentally the scorers show all attempts and credit hits ... Of course what the Doc is really

screaming about is the fact that the big wigs have deleted the ball retaining option on free shots. You have to take the tries no wand if you succeed, it gives the ball to the opposition, who blythely trade one point for a chance to make 2 or more ... This elimination of the option is a direct swipe at the ball control coaches, who have been eminently successful in this run and fire era ... 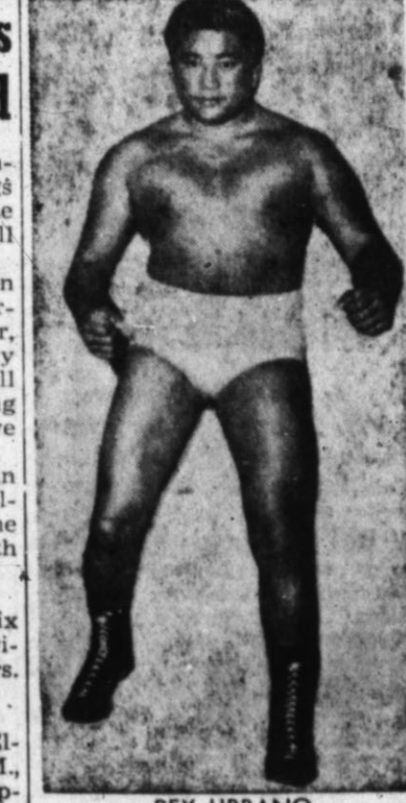
Parks, Cummings Top Grapple Card

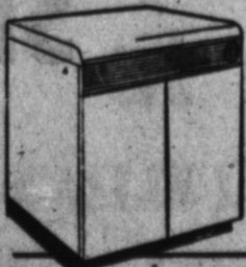

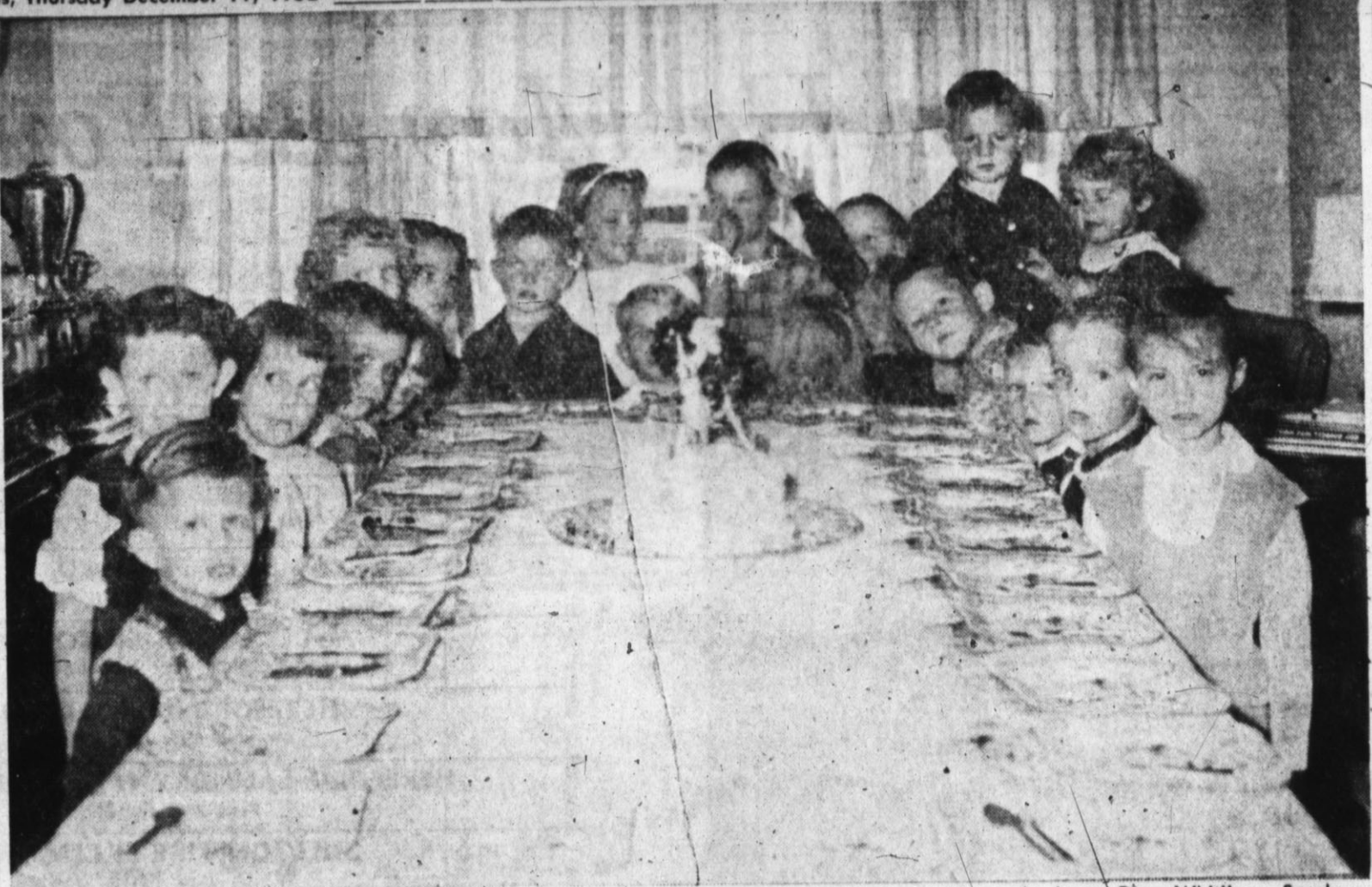

Cattle Prices Remain Down; Sales Heavier

FORT WORTH — Livestock prices were again under heavy pressure at the start of the second week in December as receipts around the major marketing circle were again far heavier than a week ago. The only specie of livestock in smaller numbers was hogs.

Most classes of cattle and calves were fully 50 cents to \$1 below the low close of the previous week, in some cases this put prices \$1.50 or so under those of about ten days ago. Stocker demand continues very small, a few choice calves and yearlings in demand, and some outlets for steers and cows. However, most stocker classes very hard to move and many sell for slaughter.

Lambs ruled \$1 to \$1.50 under the previous week's high time. Hogs opened steady to 25 cents lower, topping at \$17 and \$17.25 Monday. Sows were 75 cents to \$1 off at \$12 to \$15.25.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$20 to \$28.50 while plain and medium butcher cattle sold from \$12 to \$19, with ratty yearlings at \$9 to \$12. Fat cows cashed at \$12 to \$15.25, and canners and cutters sold from \$8 to \$12. Bulls cashed at \$10 to \$18.

Good and choice fat calves sold for \$18 to \$24, a few heavy weights to \$24 to \$25. Plain and medium butcher sorts sold from \$12 to \$17, down. Stocker cows sold for \$11 to \$18.

Good and choice fat lambs cashed at \$8 to \$20, and medium to good kinds sold at \$17 to \$18. Stocker and feeder lambs drew \$11 to \$17. Fat yearlings sold for \$12 to \$17. Aged wethers drew \$10 down. Slaughter ewes cashed at \$5.50 to \$7.50.

Beauty at Home

Q. Just how often should one's hair be washed?

A. You can wash it whenever it becomes soiled, greasy and not up to its usual perfection. Frequent shampoos are not harmful to hair and scalp, as once preached. On the contrary, washing improves the hair.

Q. How does the use of powder accentuate or minimize certain facial features?

A. Use darker-toned powder on features to be minimized, and lighter tones on spots to be highlighted. For instance, if the nose is flat, powder well at the bridge to effect a highlight. Powder the nose last and least, usually. Never look "powdery."

Q. How can I promote healthier fingernails?

A. You can try giving the nails a rest once in a while from the drying effects of lacquer polishes and during this time paint the under tip of the nail white with white ink -- for effect. Buffing the surface of the nails stimulates them, adding strength and beauty.

Q. What lipstick rules should the woman over 30 observe?

A. After 30, lips begin to lose the freshness and definite outlines of youth -- so you have to draw them there with the lip stick. Sometimes mouth corners begin to sag, so you must concentrate on lifting these slightly at the corners. Lipstick on the lower lip shouldn't reach the corners, but color on the upper lip should be carried a little higher as it nears the corner to get the upward turn.

Q. How can I add fluffiness to my hair, which is very oily?

A. Try adding a teaspoon of soda to your liquid soap shampoo.

Q. What is a home remedy for removing tartar from the teeth?

A. With a piece of cotton wound on an orange stick, rub some lemon juice and pumice stone over the teeth.

Q. How should the girl with the oblong type of face make up?

A. Create width in the face, not so much with make-up, as with your hairdress. Fill it out at the sides and bring the fullness down to the chinline. Wear hair straight on top of head, which helps to fore-shorten the face. Apply rouge

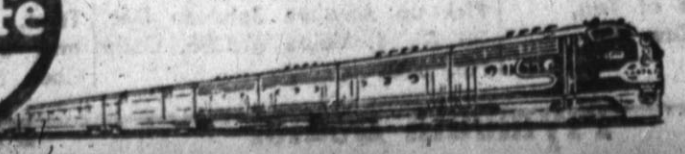

How Can I?

Q. How can I make a cement for pipe joints?
A. A cement for steam and water pipe joints can be made by mixing 10 lbs. of yellow ochre, 4 lbs. ground litharge, 4 lbs. whitening, 1/2 lb. of hemp cut up fine. Mix together with linsed oil to about the consistency of putty.

Q. How can I prevent a rug from slipping?
A. A remedy suggested for a slipping rug is to take three preservatives jar rubbers, sew them together, and attach to the underside corner of the rug. Of course, this must be done to each corner.

Q. How can I pull apart postage stamps that have become stuck together?
A. Lay a thin paper over the stamps and run a hot iron across the paper. This will free them readily and the mucilage on the stamps will not be hurt.

Q. How can I make a good suppidish that can be prepared quickly in an emergency?
A. Slice cold boiled ham thick

enough so that it will not break apart when handled. Spread mustard on each piece and then place on it a tablespoon of baked beans. Roll and fasten with toothpicks; then bake for ten minutes in a hot oven.

Q. How can I make a home-made duster?
A. By soaking old pieces of flannel in paraffin oil overnight; wring out tightly and wash in lukewarm water, and dry. It will gather all dust and give a good polish to furniture and floors.

Q. How can I bleach clothes when laundering them?
A. Add a teaspoon of turpentine to the water when washing white clothes. It aids materially the bleaching process.

Q. How can I lengthen the life of my shoes?
A. Stuffing the shoes with tissue paper after each wearing is a much better treatment for them than shoe trees, as this serves not only to keep the shoes in their proper shape, but soaks up any foot perspiration which may have been left in the shoes.

Q. How can I test the freshness of a ham?
A. Run a knife into it, close to the center knuckle. The ham is good if the knife comes out sweet and odorless, but it is not fit for eating if the knife is smeary and has a strong odor.

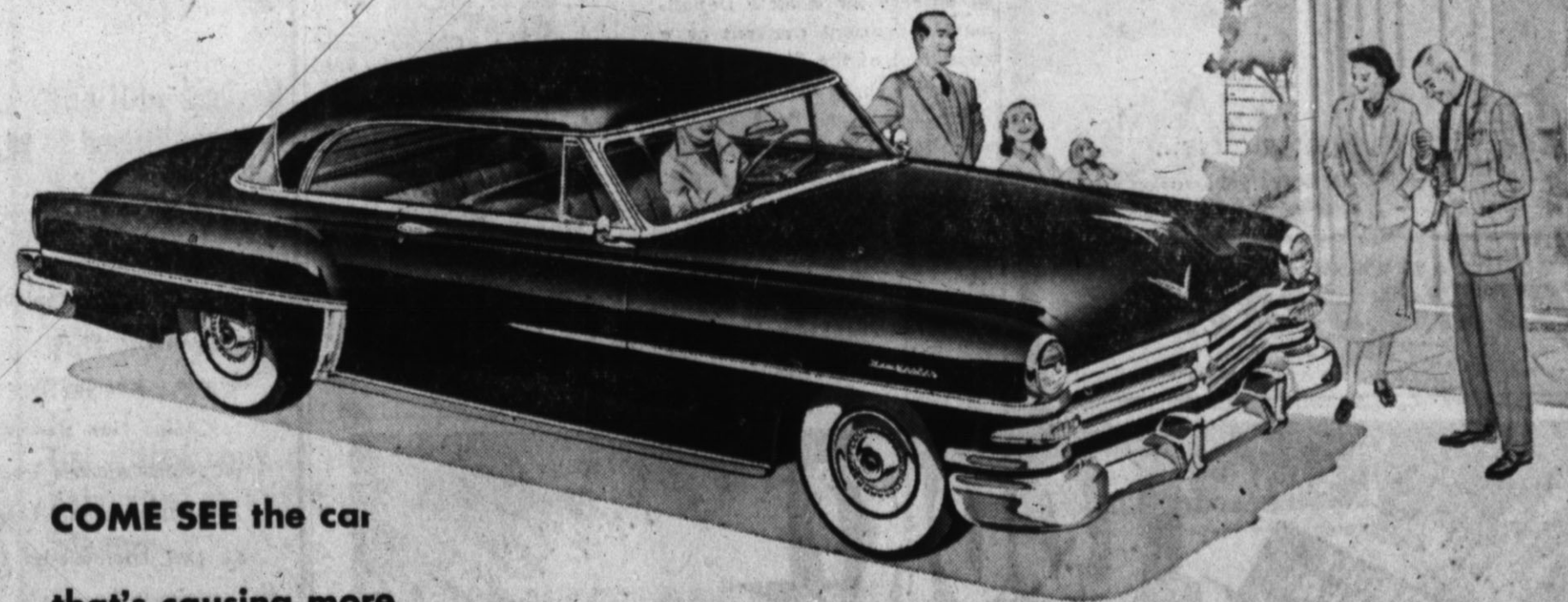

Reservist To Hear Talk "USAR" School Program

Highlighting the activation of the 4163rd ORASU Amarillo Organized Reserve School will be an address on Thursday, Dec. 11, by Colonel Irving D. Roth, Now Chief of the Instruction Branch of the Command & General Staff College in Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas. Colonel Roth will speak on "USAR School Program - Its Inception, Growth and Future".

The meeting - which will be held at the Stephen F. Austin Junior High School in Amarillo - will begin at 8 p.m. Active and Inactive Reserve Personnel over the entire Panhandle area have been invited. The meeting is open to the public. Staff officers and instructors from the school will be on hand after the address by Colonel Roth to explain all phases of the school to the individuals. Colonel Roth was assigned to Fort Leavenworth in July 1948

as a student in the regular course. Following his graduation in July 1949 he came instructor at the command and General Staff College. At the start of World War II Colonel Roth - who was commissioned at United States Military Academy in 1932 - was stationed in the Panama Canal Zone. He was Battalion Commander of the Antiaircraft Artillery Gun Battalion with the First and Third Armies in the European Theater from January 1944 to July 1945. Until his return to the States in May 1946, he served in various antiaircraft artillery command and staff positions in Europe.

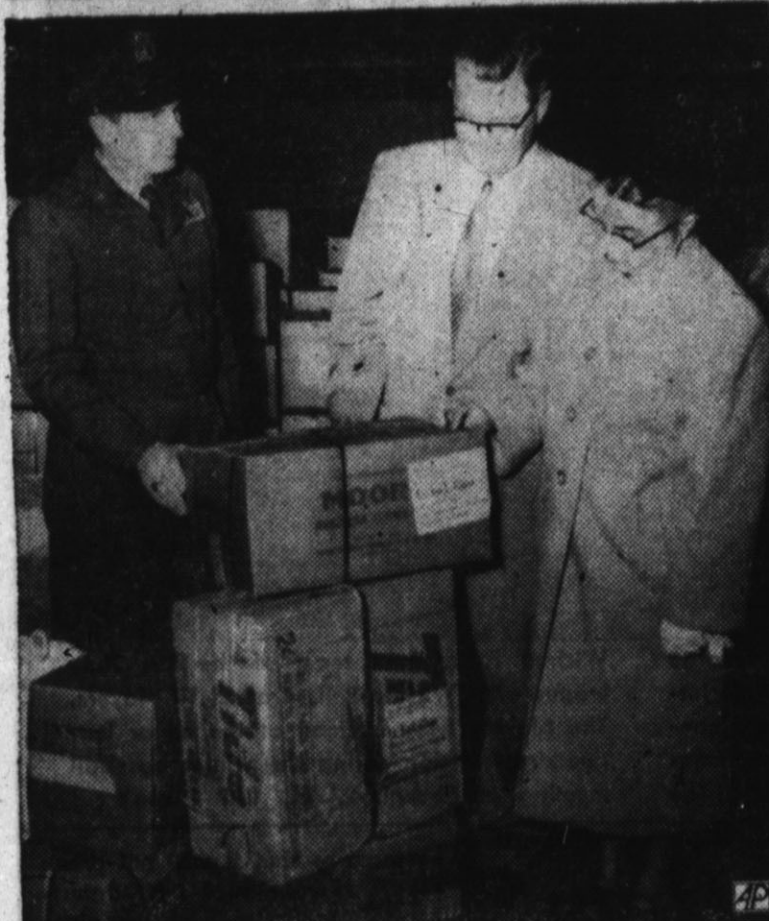
He was assigned to the Antiaircraft and Guided Missiles Branch of the Artillery School, in Fort Bliss, Texas, in December 1946, and served for seven months as Director of the Tactics Department. He has been awarded the Bronze Star, the French Croix de

Guerre with Palm, as well as several campaign and victory medals. Keynoting the affair will be Colonel E. A. Simpson of Amarillo, who will speak on the Defense of America. Colonel Simpson, who helped organize the 142nd Infantry company of the 36th Division, served overseas 14 months during World War I. After the Armistice he joined the National Guard, and for 15 years served as Judge Advocate of the National Guard of Texas. He was awarded the Purple Heart, The Croix de Guerre and the Distinguished Service Cross.

The program will also include Colonel Jones, Commanding Officer of Texas Military District; Colonel John Buswell, Commandant of the 4163rd ORASU OR School; and Lt. Col. Clifford A. Stein, a Branch Director of the School.

Both Active and Inactive Reserve Officers in the Panhandle area have exhibited a great deal of interest in the 4163rd School since its activation. Several courses - which will begin in January - such as Command & General Staff, Artillery, Engineering, Finance and Ordnance are available. Attendance will enable Reserve Officers to maintain their commissions as well as accumulate retirement points.

The 4163rd OR School plans to hold open house at their Armory at 112 N. E. 2nd Street, Amarillo, on Thursday, December 18th, beginning at 8 p.m.

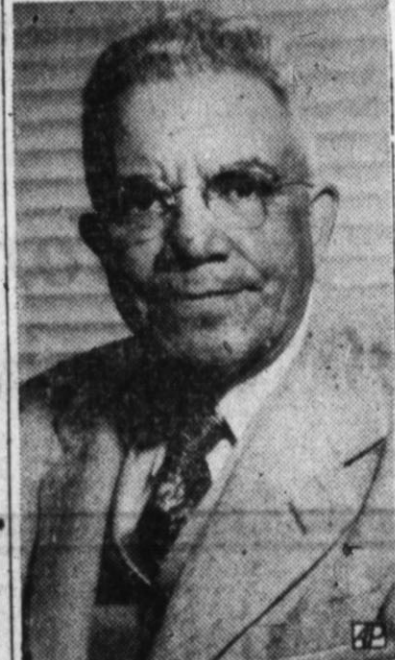
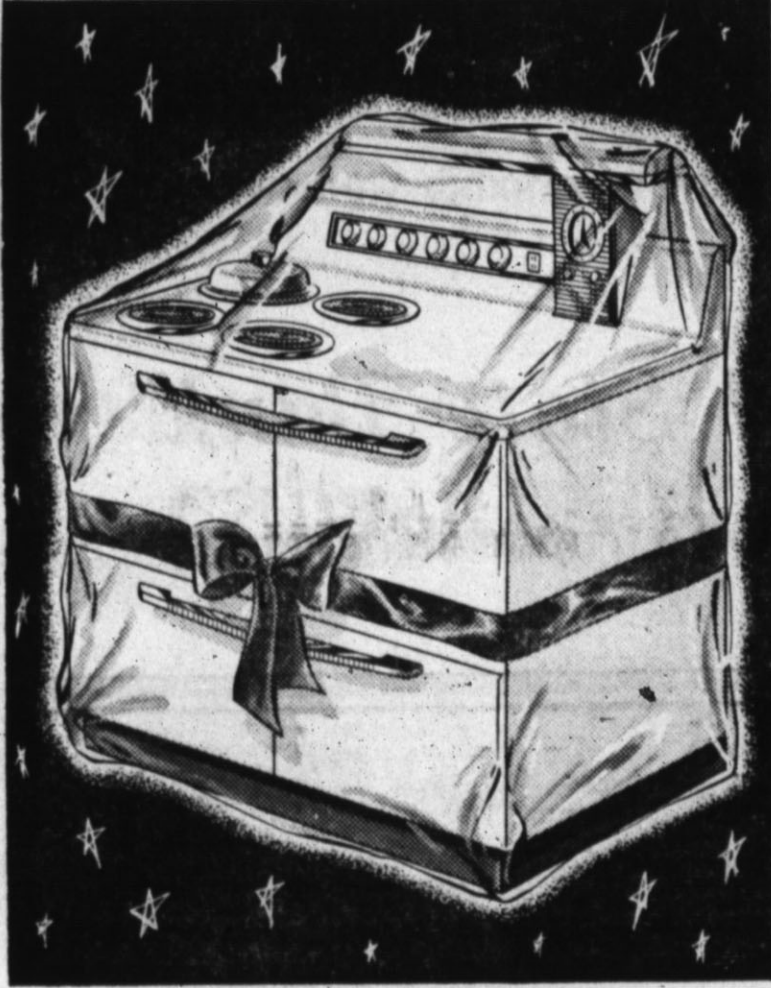

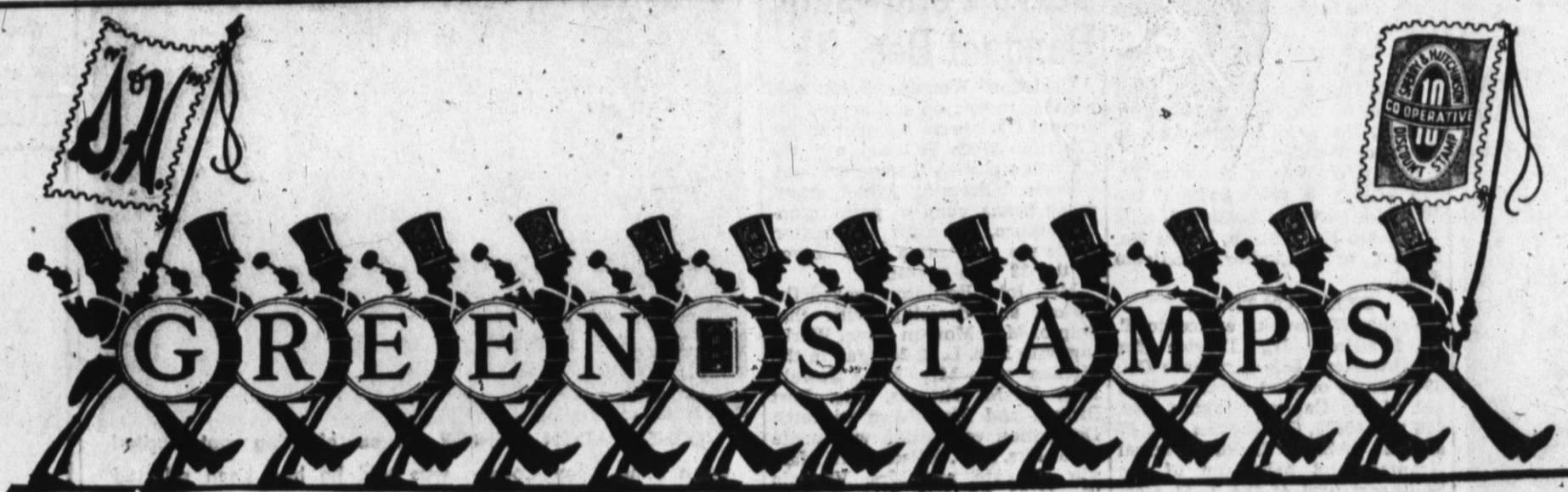

National Capitol Takes On New Look As Inauguration Time Draws Nearer

THE INAUGURATION: The front of the national capitol is

taking on an entirely new look. The inaugural stands have been under construction for some time. This is quite an undertaking, as these stands spread completely across the front steps of the capitol, and the seating facilities extend completely out to the edge of the original capitol building, that is, the original building prior to the addition of the House and Senate wings. They cover a substantial part of the very wide streets and parking area in front of the capitol. Those of you who have visited Washington I am sure can visualize the tremendous extent of the temporary facilities that are built for inaugurations. There appears to be enough lumber being used to construct a sizeable barn for all the farms in a couple of Panhandle counties. All of this work is being done on the east side of the capitol, which is the front of the capitol. When the capitol was originally built, it was contemplated that the major portion of the business district of Washington would lie east of the Capitol and toward the Anacostia River. However, the story goes that most of the land in that section was bought up and quoted for resale at very high prices. The result was that the main business district of Washington was actually built behind the capitol and to the west of it. The better residential district was also built in that direction. From downtown, from the Lincoln Memorial, from the Washington Monument, from the Jefferson Memorial, the Tidal Basin, and practically all of the major government buildings including the White House, the view of the capitol is not the front view but the back view. The inaugural parade will extend through this section of Washington that lies behind the capitol and west of it. Temporary seats have been built along the parade route and are being sold at prices from \$3 to \$15.
