### Two-Truck Collision Monday Causes \$650 Damages; No Serious Injuries

No injuries were reported when two trucks collided on the Farm to Market Road, number 1259, Monday morning at 9:45.

J. D. Tyler, Route 4, Hereford, driving a 1948 model GMC truck loaded with feed, was hit in the rear by Bob Ray Clark, pipe setter for the Big T Pump Co., owner of the truck Clark was driving, according to Joe Culp, Highway Patrolman.

Both trucks were traveling west at the time of the accident. Vernon Petty was a passenger

in the J. D. Tyler truck and Henry Jackson of Hereford was a passenger in the Bob Ray Clark vehicle.

Damage to the Big T Pump truck was estimated at \$500 and approximately \$150 to the J. D. Tyler truck.

Charges were filed against both. Bob Ray Clark was charged with following too close and Tyler was charged with having no stop light. Both cases are pending in county court in Deaf Smith County.

# School Taxes Slated To Jump One-Third In 1953

Tax payers in the Hereford Rural High School district can expect approximately one-third increase in school taxes, beginning with and tax payments in October, 1953.

The increase comes as a result of an article passed at the Board of Trustee meeting Tuesday night, effective after Jan. 1, 1953, but will not affect current tax payments. The measure calls for a valuations increase of approximately 50 percent, but the actual tax rate will be lowered to effect the 33 1/3 percent final increase in money paid. This action was taken in order to establish a larger valuations schedule, thus meeting bond company requirements in handling the \$850,000 bond issue which was recently voted to build a new high school plant in Hereford.

The complete order, as it appears in the Board minutes for Dec. 16, 1952, reads:

"It having been represented to the public during the time immediately preceding the school bond election that an increase in

school taxes of approximately one-third would be necessary in order to pay off the bonds and to meet necessary operating expenses with the new High School building; and it appearing to the Board at this time that such one-third increase in taxes will bring in sufficient funds with which to

meet this situation; Motion was made by Schroeter and seconded by Woodford, that the basic assessment value of all taxable property within the school district be increased 50% of its present tax roll value and that the present tax rate of \$1.50 be reduced to an amount that will produce the necessary one-third increase in the total tax levy. After due discussion and consideration the motion was put to a vote and carried unanimously.

The tax assessor was then instructed to carry out the provisions of this order for the tax year beginning January 1, 1953.

### School Trustees Inspect 21 Plants; Cost \$12-\$14 Foot

Trustees of the Hereford Rural High School met Tuesday night and reviewed findings from two tours which carried them into 21 new school buildings in the Texas Panhandle and Eastern New Mexico. No definite action was taken at the meeting regarding construction of Hereford's new \$850,000 high school plant, however, and the board decided to further consider their findings before an architect is employed.

"Building costs we found to average between \$12 and \$14 per square foot on comparatively new high school construction," Robert Veigel, board president, said.

"And this variation was noticeable in the construction of the buildings," Cliff Hicks pointed out.

In addition to trustees on the tours, the group included Cliff Hicks and D. H. Alexander, both of whom are familiar with building methods and both with previous experience on the Hereford School Board. Board members who made the South Plains trip were Robert Veigel, Robert Wag-

oner, A. J. Schroeter, George Graham, superintendent, and Fred Baird, tax assessor, also accompanied the group. This same group, plus Carl McCaslin and Lyle Woodford, trustees, made the trip north and east. Robert Waggoner did not make the north and east swing, but visited schools in Snyder, Waco, Sweetwater and Abilene.

Schools visited and construction in each of the points were also reviewed as follows: FRIONA -- New auditorium and gymnasium, vocational building and band hall. Classrooms were also rebuilt to replace loss in the recent fire. FARWELL -- Classrooms only for a new high school. No gymnasium and auditorium included. MULESHOE -- New high school and auditorium. Old gymnasium was being utilized. LITTLEFIELD -- Complete new high school plant, including gymnasium and auditorium. WHITEFACE -- New elementary school; also new gymnasium to seat 2,400.

Santa Claus will come to be sure. He will be loaded with candy, apples, oranges, nuts -- and toys, too. But even old Santa can't bring back their part-Collie pup, "Blackie" if he decides to "go away" for good. Even if he stays, he'll never be the same either.

In addition they are only two of the scores of little boys and girls who live in the vicinity of Fuller and 25-Mile Avenue, who are afraid to go out into the yard to play these days.

It all started when a dog at the Smithers apartments began acting "crazy" and sometimes foamed at the mouth. Then another dog did the same. Then it happened to "Blackie," their own puppy, only he just started by getting stiff in the back and also acting real peculiar.

Mrs. J. E. Jones is sure

someone is feeding the dogs ground glass in hamburger meat, at least in the first case. The Don Houles, parents of the two little girls, believe that their pup is a victim of strychnine, however.

Little Patricia and Darlene aren't arguing about these things though. They just simply cannot understand why their puppy is doing "this funny way." Sometimes they wake up at night and cry, "because they are afraid."

A lot of grown people in the neighborhood can't understand either. They're the kind of folks who love children. They even like to see little boys and girls romp and frolic and have fun. They're the kind of folks who believe that children -- uninhibited by dread and fear -- are most likely to grow up to be fine, strong men and women. The kind of free Americans who would never even think of feeding ground glass to some little kid's pup... much less at Christmas time.

## Prices Down On Some Items, But Most Things Still Cost Plenty

Dallas, Tex., Dec. 13 — A survey of current price trends completed Saturday indicates that industry and government are the groups most affected by existing price pressures.

The consumer who buys for individual and family use has more opportunity to buy "soft" priced items. But, some foods, most household electrical appliances, and almost everything of durable foods nature still costs him the legal maximum.

These are conclusions drawn from a survey of existing prices in all localities of Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, completed Saturday at instruction of Regional Director B. Frank White of the Office of Price Stabilization. White had requested an objective report on price trends in all major commodity lines, based on conditions existing since Nov. 1.

"The strongest price pressures are in the field of industrial supply, including virtually all metal, machinery, petroleum products, chemical and construction items being used in the military defense program and by non-defense industries," summarized W. Victor Womack, regional price executive of OPS who directed the survey.

The contradictory trends in prices among consumer goods were exemplified by the food stores portion of the survey, which showed that 56.1 percent of all food items listed on the "community pricing" posters in the stores were selling below ceiling prices. On the other hand, it was found that stores, on an average across the region, were pricing 8.1 percent of their food items above legal ceilings posted in the stores. The food stores were found to be selling 35.8 percent of the

items on the posters at maximum ceiling.

R. G. Berele, producer goods chief, reported that most industrial and construction products are in heavy demand and tight supply. Oil field tubular goods are in critical supply, and Berele has received reports of black market activities in some active oil fields in Texas. Delays in deliveries and a backlog of demand keep prices at ceiling for such items as reinforcing bars for concrete, light wire mesh, and structural shapes, hot and cold rolled steel bars, sheets, and some tool and high alloy steels. Lead and zinc prices are well under ceiling with demand soft. Copper is at ceiling, with demand and supply about in balance. Aluminum is at ceiling.

Berele said cement is at ceiling in all four states. In North Texas, demand exceeds supply. Other construction materials at ceiling include top grades of lumber, fabricated steel and aluminum windows and doors.

Clean, late model used cars are bringing prices at or near ceiling, but prices of older cars are soft. New 1952 models bring ceiling prices, with dealers giving good trade-in value for used cars in exchange.

Osher Goldsmith, fuels and chemicals branch chief, reported that chemicals and acids, petrochemicals, and fertilizers are under heavy price pressures. Crude oil, natural gas, gasoline and motor oils are at ceilings. Butane, propane, and the fuel oils are expected to reach their ceilings soon due to seasonal demand increases.

Frank C. Tomlinson, regional foods chief, said that the three top grades of beef — prime, choice and good — are selling at or within 2 percent of their ceilings. Commercial grade beef cuts and veal are from 5 to 10 percent below ceilings.

Pork which has been suspended from control at wholesale but not at retail, brings prices 7 and 8 percent below ceilings in fresh cuts, and 4 and 5 percent below in cured cuts.

Whole milk is at ceiling everywhere in the four states except three local areas, Dallas, Midland, and Little Rock. Most other milk products are at ceilings. Grains and feedstuffs are generally below OPS maximums, except for cottonseed and alfalfa meals, which are at ceiling.

Tomlinson stated that 25 percent of all butter checked in all types of food stores across the region was priced above ceilings. Other major offenders were shortening, with 15.5 percent of its items priced above ceiling, 12.6 percent of canned meats over-priced, 9.9 percent of the salad and cooking

oils above ceilings, and 8.8 percent of the coffee.

On the other hand, 78 percent of all cheese was found to sell below ceilings, 74 percent of all peanut butter was below, 65.6 percent of all syrups, and 79.9 percent of corn-meal and flour mixes. At exact ceilings were 59.9 percent of canned milk items, 51.2 percent of canned soups, 50.2 percent of mayonnaise and salad dressings, and 49.1 percent of breakfast cereals. No controls exist over fresh and processed fruits and vegetables, which were exempted by Congress at its last session.

Mr. Womack explained that the OPS policy is to suspend controls or decontrol items which have reached a "generally stable price level below their authorized ceilings." The agency keeps watch on suspended items, and is prepared to re-control them if they show pressures pushing them back up to former ceilings. Suspension and de-control serve a worthy purpose, he said, in that such actions relieve affected businesses of replotting and filing requirements.

Price regulations have been lifted on men's and women's apparel, floor coverings, footwear, mil-

CONG. WALTER ROGE REPORTS

Removal Of Farmers From Interstate Commerce Classification Important

AGRICULTURAL LEGISLATION: I recently received a communication from the Farmer-Stockman magazine, which is published in Dallas, asking me the following question: "If you could get just one bill enacted relating to agriculture in 1953, what would it be?" The same question was asked other members of Congress and the replies were published in the December issue. I have received several favorable comments from people of the 18th Congressional District who read my statement as published in the Farmer-Stockman. Because of the amount of interest shown in the legislation discussed, I am including in this news letter my reply to the magazine as follows:

"Thank you for your courteous wire of November 6. As you know, one of my primary interests is in agriculture and legislation relating thereto. There are many bills that will be introduced concerning the farmer and stockman designed to promote agriculture and ranching. You may be assured that I will be primarily interested in all of them. A discussion of some of these would require more than 100 words. Therefore, I am going to call your attention to one particular piece of legislation in which I have great interest, and which I think could solve many of the farmer's problems.

"The legislation to which I refer concerns the status of the farmer with relation to whether or not he is engaged in intra-state or interstate commerce. Under present rules and regulations, the farmer is held to be engaged in interstate commerce. This would not seem to make a great deal of difference to many people. However, it can prove very dangerous if such status is permitted to continue. It simply means that the operations of the farmer are subject to regulation under federal statutes. Among these federal statutes is the Fair Labor Standards Act. The farmer at the present time is controlled by all of the

provisions of this act unless he is expressly exempt from certain provisions. It is the provisions of this act that have caused the cotton farmers great difficulty in getting their crops harvested and also brought great hardship on the itinerant agriculture workers' families. The only reason that the farmer is not governed by the maximum hours and minimum wages provision of this act is because he is exempt from these provisions by language in that act. This language could be repealed, either directly or by implication, and in such event, the farmer would be faced with meeting the requirements of this maximum hour and wages provision. I do not need to tell you that such happening would result in bankruptcy to many of the small farmers in Texas and other portions of this nation. This is only one of the examples that could be cited under the present situation.

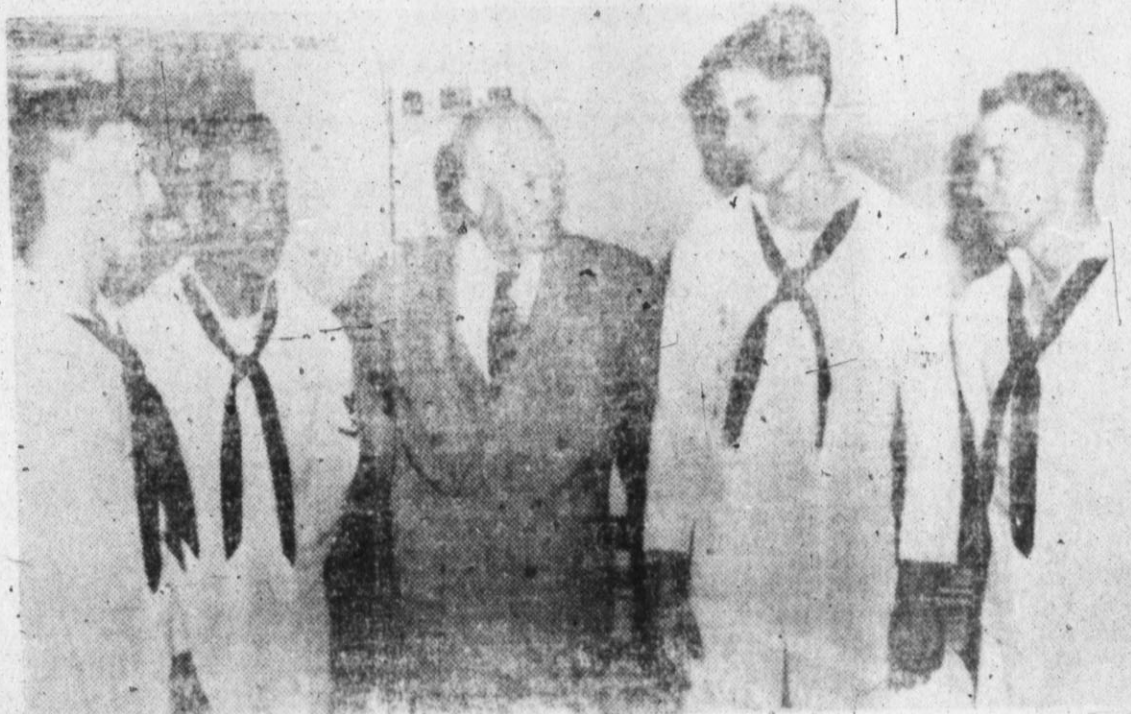
"The real reason that the farmer is declared to be in interstate commerce is because he is engaged in the production of a commodity that possibly could find its way into interstate commerce. This creates an undue and involuntary burden on the farmer. The law should clearly define the acts and conduct necessary to bring a farmer into interstate commerce and under federal laws, rules and regulations concerning his business. Such a law would then enable the farmer to make up his own mind as to whether or not he wanted to engage in interstate activities or intra-state activities. If he chose to conduct his business so that he would be engaged in interstate commerce, he would be governed by federal laws, including the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act. However, on the other hand, if he chose to engage only in intra-state commerce (which certainly he would have the right to do) his business would then be subject to the state statutes related to the operation of such bus-

ness. To say that because a man grows cotton that may finally find its way into a dress manufactured in New York, he automatically becomes subject to federal laws, rules and regulations is to create one tentacle of centralized government to which I am violently opposed. The problem is most serious, and it is my suggestion that the farm organizations and their members devote time and study to an early solution of it."

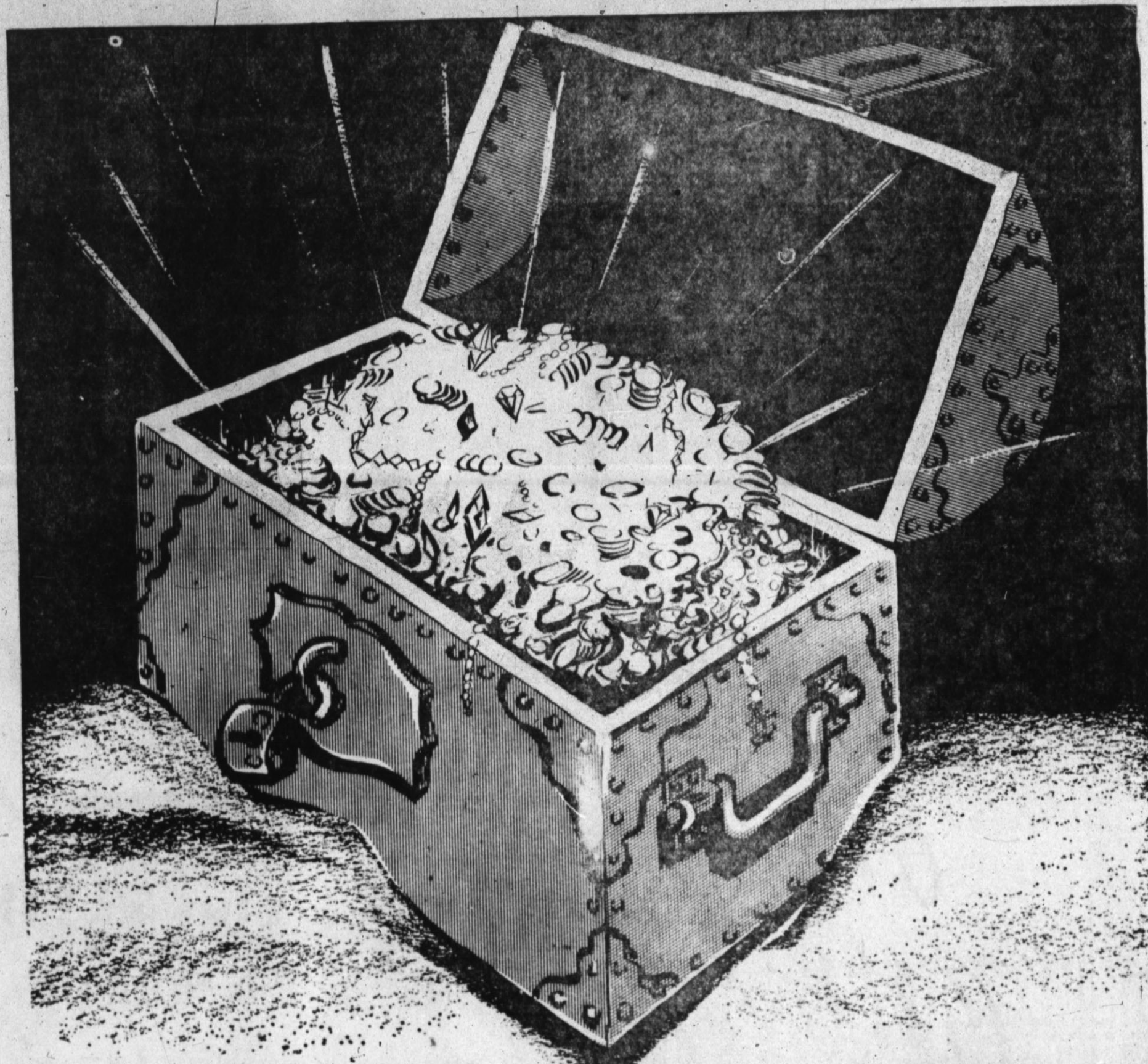

### Howard Gault & Son Listed On Hereford Association Rolls

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 15.—Howard Gault & Son, Hereford, Texas, today was named to membership in the American Hereford Association, the world's largest purebred registry organization, with headquarters in Kansas City, Missouri.

One hundred nineteen Hereford breeders were placed on the Association's official roster during November to boost the total membership to an all-time high of 21,739. Members represent every state in the nation. In addition to the membership roster, the Association maintains active accounts for approximately 80,000 Hereford breeders.

The Hereford Association last year recorded a new world record of 548,418 purebred calves, an increase of 42,357 over the record established during the previous fiscal year. Hereford calves registered last year were two and a half times the total registrations of other major beef breeds combined.

Many farmers have bottom land that could profitably be cleared or bushes removed. Perhaps some pastures that were improved a few years ago need attention. Lime and fertilizer needs should be checked now.

Corn with 30 percent more moisture content is likely to spoil even in winter. Artificial drying, feeding immediately or making ear corn silage are the best ways of making use of wet corn.

It is best to keep production records on each dairy cow in your herd. These records will help you determine how much to feed the cows. And when culling time comes around, you can check for the ones which are least profitable.

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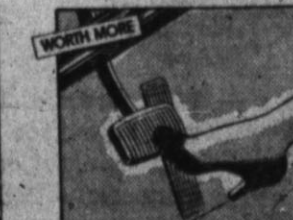
