





Apples As Different Dish

Mrs. Anna Holman, Hereford Rt. | 2, has sent in a recipe for a cottage cheese pie which is unusual and which she says is very good.

Mrs. Holman writes that she makes her own cheese but any kind could likely be used with good results if it were put through a sieve first as cottage cheese has a tendency to get tough when heated unless it is a very fine texture. For a pie with a different flavor try Cottage Cheese Pie.

Cottage Cheese Pie eggs well beaten cup sugar

1 cup sweet milk 1 cup cottage cheese 1 cup sliced apples 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg ½ teaspoon salt

Mix beaten eggs, sugar and milk. Pour into nine inch unbaked crust. Add cheese sprinkled evenly over the top, sprinkle with nutmeg, then place apple slices around in the mixture. Bake at 350 degrees until crust edges are brown and filling is set.

Mrs. Wilson remembers one day when some of the women met at one home to can corn and she helped them run four cookers all day on a range stove using cowchips for fuel. They canned over 100 cans of corn.

The commissioners failed to make an appropriation for an agent for several years and Mrs. Wilson was sponsored for a while so she could carry on the work by Streu Hardware, and The First State Bank when Harry R. Fritz was president.

County Fairs were an annual event from 1927 on for a number of years and Mrs. Wilson put in many long hours serving as superintendent of the Women's Department. There were four booths-one each on clothing, foods, canning and floral - which were open to every woman in the county. Prizes offered required more than a column
