



1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon ginger
2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and beat well. Combine flour, baking powder, salt and spices and stir into the sugar mixture alternately with the milk and vanilla. Stir in nuts and figs. Turn batter into a greased 8-cup mold and cover tightly with mold cover or with aluminum foil. Place mold on a trivet in a deep pan containing 2 inches boiling water, cover and steam for 2 hours. Keep water boiling at all times and replenish water if it boils away. Unmold and serve warm with any
