

About 13.8 percent attended college compared to 21.9 percent among Vietnam Era veterans and 20.1 percent for Korean





As election day draws near, it seems that, in the words of Alice in Wonderland, things get "curiouser and curiouser."







harvest of the 1972 crops compared to 1971, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Cotton harvest is a thrid complete now; last year at this time, harvest was less than a fourth completed. Harvest will be underway in the High Plains as soon as weather conditions permit.

Corn harvest throughout the state is virtually completed. Less than five per cent of the crop has yet to be gathered.

Grain sorghum harvest is two-thirds finished. Both dryland and irrigated grain sorghum vields are reported as excellent in the High Plains region. Soybean harvest is a third complete. Harvest of the second cutting of rice is making good progress, while peanut harvest is three-fourths finished.

Wheat planting for the state is more than 85 per cent completed. Irrigated wheat is making good progress.

Moderate to heavy rains are increasing range and pasture prospects. Fair to good grazing is available in most areas on native pastures. Livestock condition for the state is rated good to excellent.

Sales of cattle, calves and sheep increased throughout the state during September, while sales of goats and hogs were down. Cattle and calves marketed through Texas auctions numbered 705,000; this is five per cent above a year

Sheep sales were two per cent above a year ago. Hogs sold totaled 45,000 which is 32 per cent below a year ago.

Egg production in Texas totaled 199,000,000 during September, down six per cent runs over Fort Bend County.

Widow's benefits described

Q. Say a man is collecting \$200 a month from Social Security and dies. Would his widow get \$200 a month if she was only 60 when he died? - C.B.

A. No. The amount the widow would receive would depend on whether or not her husband started receiving his benefits prior to age 65. Assuming that he was 65 or over when he started to receive his monthly check, the widow's benefit at age 60 would be \$143.

Q. I am retired and drawing Social Security benefits. I have been asked to be a guest lecturer at a college a couple of hundred miles from my home. The college will not pay me a salary but will reimburse me for outof-pocket expenses which will exceed the \$1,680 per year allowed by Social Security, Will Social Security count this reimbursement as earnings causing me to lose some of my benefits? F.H.M.

A. The general rule is that payments by an employer want to learn that's half the which are reimbursement specifically for travel expenses of the employe and which are so identified by the employer at the time of payment are not counted as earnings and should not affect your Social Security benefits.

Q. What can you tell us what we can do about planning for a family business? - Mrs. C.Q.

A. Planning for a family business involves many considerations and requires thoughtful analysis of the business factors and family circumstances. Furthermore, as a business grows or the owner approaches retirement, a careful plan should be developed to preserve the value that has built up over the years.

At this time of the year most of us start thinking about our car's cooling system. Although on the market, most are cooled by water. While water is an effective

agent for cooling the engine of these cars, and certainly it is cheap enough, it has several disadvantages as a coolant. Water contributes to rusting and corrosion of the metal parts with which it comes in contact. The freezing temperature of water is relatively high, 32 paratively low temperatures, 212 degrees.

Because water freezes so easily, we add an antifreeze standard. solution to the water. This solution should do three things. It should prevent ice from forming in the cooling system during freezing weather. It should raise the boiling point of the coolant in your engine and it should help reduce rusting and corrosion in the cooling system.

point is high enough to prevent ethylene glycol from boiling away at usual engine operating there are some air cooled cars temperatures, such a solution should last for thousands of miles of driving.

How can you tell which is the best quality of antifreeze? The best way is by reading the label on the container. The label will show the number of quarts of antifreeze coolant needed in your car's cooling system to prevent freezing at different temperatures. 

Industry Is Remarkable, Says Colombian Couple

THE JAIME CUELLARS say Hereford, Texas, is basically the same and yet different in America. Cuellar is staying in Panhandle feedlot operations.

Since Bogota is a city of about three million people the Cuellars say the main difference they have noticed during their stay here is that between large and small cities.

"It's very quiet and peaceful here," says Cuellar, "We enjoy it very much.'

AFTER GRADUATION from high school in Bogota, Cuellar traveled to the United States and attended Texas A & M. where he received his bachelor's degree. He then returned to Colombia, where he was employed by Industria Ganadera Colombiana, one of the largest livestock cor-

porations in South America. With a desire to learn more about the livestock industry,

Cuellar has now returned to A & M and is working on his many ways from their home in master's degree in feedlot Bogota, Colombia, South management. A prerequisite of his course is a five-to-seven Hereford while making a study month internship at a feedyard of his choice. He chose the Texas Panhandle for various

"We just like to go out and have fun. Some of our friends are in a square dance club here, and we're going to go with them sometime and watch. We'd like to learn how."

"A lot of the ladies here have been very helpful to her," he adds, looking at his wife, 'We're both really enjoying our stay here.

Cuellar is serving his 'internship' at Friona feedyards, where he is engaged in learning every phase of the livestock operations from office management to working as a cowboy out in the lot.

"THE MAIN DIF-FERENCE," he says of cattlefeeding in South America and Texas, "is that most our operations are based on grass fatening rather than grain feeding as it is here."

he adds, "To have this opportunity to come over and get p.m. aquainted and it's the best place for me to learn. I'm looking forward to learning everything I can.

Not very many people in South America have this opportunity. In fact, I think I am the first from Colombia to become involved in learning about the feedlot business."

THE CUELLARS ATTEND the Catholic church here. They met in 1968 in Bogota, where they had both lived all their lives. They have been married fifteen months, and met while he was working in Colombia.

"I think so," says Cuellar when asked if they will return to Hereford. "We'll probably be getting back, just to visit around, and see what new developments there are. We'll keep in touch - we've met a lot of nice people here."





Long Time Coming

Have you heard the one about the Texas dachshund that was so long, when someone stepped on his tail, he didn't feel it until the next day?

When it comes to government spending, we Americans are a lot like . that dachshund — it takes so long for the "pain" message to filter through the economy that by the time we know we've been hurt, it's hard to figure out

Well, this time, I'll tell you. On October 17 and 18, our representatives in Congress took two steps that will lead to a tax increase in the 1973-74 period, or a serious resurgence of inflation, or both. Clip this column and paste it on your bulletin board as a reminder, so you'll know, when you suffer the consequences in a year or so, that it was the men in Congress right now who did it to you.

This is the background: Initially, each house of Congress passed a bill granting the President's request for a \$250 billion limit on federal spending for this fiscal year. The House bill permitted the President to cut federal programs as he saw fit, in order to stay within the limit. The Senate, on the other hand, attached so many strings to its version of the bill that any , Presidential budget cutting would have been extremely difficult, if not entirely impossible.

A House-Senate conference committee attempted to compromise the differences, but on October 17 the Seanate rejected the compromise, amid stirring rhetoric about not surrendering legislative power to the

It would be much easier to sympathize with the Senators' sudden concern for principle if they had not, in fact, already abdicated their control over federal expenditures, by their

consistent refusal to maintain a reasonable relationship between income and outgo. The House has been a . ready accomplice, of course, but at least in this case the members of the House were willing to face their own inability to put the brakes on and ask the President to do it for them.

On October 18 — following rejection of the spending ceiling - the next major legislative act of each body was to override the President's veto of a \$25 billion water pollution control bill. The President had warned in his veto message that every dollar above his \$6 billion budget request for the program "would exact a price from the consumer in the form of inflated living costs, or from the taxpayer in the form of a new federal tax bite, or both."

Now when it comes to deficit spending, the President is far from guiltless: One quarter of the present national debt was incurred in his administration. But at least he seems disturbed enough now to try to do something about the federal government's chronic inability to live within its budget, whereas the Senate is still on top of its ivory tower, and the House is only about halfway down to ground

Representative Wilbur Mills' (D. Ark.) chairmanof the House Ways and Means Committee, who led the unsuccessful fight for a spending ceiling had this to say about the issue:

"I believe the American people are aware of what is going on. I know the American people want something done about it. If they cannot expect to get it out of this Congress, my guess is that they are going to elect a Congress on November 7 that they think will work in the direction of containing inflation, of containing federalspending." How about it, Americans?

Occasionally compainies want particular skills but more often prior experience in a particular industry is of little importance. Most manufacturers expect to have to train their employees, and often farmers and housewives make ideal trainees

An existing building is often a strong inducement to a firm to locate within a community but in 14 of 39 cases, the company erected its own structure without aid. Good highway facilities are a "must," and rail and airport facilities are important to some

HOW TO WIN ELECTIONS - Most Texas politicians have not been averse to using a bit of trickery if it helped at the polls. One of the most adept at this kind of vote-getting was the late Sam Hannah of Dallas, for many years a member of the

Hannah had an unvarying routine that called for him to put on his most expensive clothes and make a round of the beer taverns favored by blue collar workers in the metropolitan area. He would walk up to the bar, ask for a brew and inform the bartender in a loud voice that he was a candidate for the Legislature. This announcement would invariably propel

some of the customers toward the bar in anticipation of a free round. When it wasn't offered after a little conversation, somebody would always ask: "If you're running for office, how about buying us all a beer?"

At that point, Hannah would look directly at the questioner and shout: "Absolutely not, sir. I am not here to buy anybody's vote."

Then he would finish his beer quickly and leave. But not until he had handed each of the customers one of his opponent's campaign cards!

THE ODDS INCREASE — When James Odds married Martha Ends in 1841, the San Augustine (Tex.) Red-Lander reported:

"The Odds and Ends being united, and the Ends becoming Odds, one would suppose that two Odds put together would make one even. Instead it is thought that the Odds will be considerably increased.

IT STARTED HERE — "Bulldogging," the rodeo event in which a cowboy leaps from his horse and wrestles a steer to earth, was performed for the first time on a working ranch at Taylor, Williamson

One day Bill Pickett, a Negro cowboy, was loading a herd of steers at Taylor for shipment. One became rebellious and Pickett grabbed it by the horns, sunk his teeth in the steer's upper lip and twisted its neck until he had it sqrawled on the ground. Thus the art of steer wrestling was born, except that modern rodeo performers no longer bite the animal.

Pickett himself went on to become one of the great rodeo stars and performed with Col. Zack Miller's 101 Ranch Wild West Show. He was injured in an accident and died on April 2, 1932. Recently he was named to the National Cowboy Hall of Fame - the only Negro to be so honored.

DOWN MEMORY LANE - The late Jimmie Rodgers, father of western and country music, lived out the last days of his life in Kerrville in the Texas Hill Country.

Rodgers moved to Kerrville after he became a recording star because his doctors advised a change in climate to help him combat tuberculosis. He lived in Kerrville several years, often entertaining other show business greats such as Will Rogers.

Although ill, Rodgers went to New York to do a recording session which another cowboy singer, Gene Autry, and died there on May 26, 1933.

One trouble with the world today is that it's got too many statistics.

I've always had my misgivings, contending that for some people I know to be giving the intelligence tests is about like me trying to measure the Grand Canyon with a foot-ruler.

But that was just the beginning. Now we've got statistics on ererything, telling us for example it cost 4 tenths of one per cent more to live in September than it did in August, that the rise in the crime rate is 3 tenths of one per cent slower today than yeaterday, that a candidate for office gained 3 points over the weekend, that the stock market rose 4 cents on the New York exchange and 2 on the American because Henry Kissinger stayed three

days in Paris instead of two, and so on. For half that I can tell H. E.W. what the trouble is and what the cure is.

In the first instance there are too many unlicensed tricycle riders in this country. And in the second instance the age limit for using the things ought to be raised.

But it's more than just a matter of law and order Part of the blame belongs squarely in the home.

I can't understand the wild permissiveness of 'parents who'll turn a 3-year-old loose'in their living room with a tricycle that doesn't even have brakes...a kid that doesn't even know hisrighthand from his left and couldn't give a turn signal if he had a mind to.

Robinson Mourned

The death of Jackie Robinson, widely mourned by Americans, serves to recall a past that many of us would sooner forget - years only a quartercentury ago in which American society truly qualified for the "white racist". label that has been indiscriminately tossed around in recent years.

In those days, blacks were widely considered undeserving of full social or legal equality. Until Jackie Robinson broke the color barrier in 1947, major league baseball was a lily-white activity. Even after he arrived in Brooklyn as a nervous and bewildered rookie, rival managers and players reviled him with curses and racial slurs.

Yet the "Whites Only" attitude of major league baseball reflected the prevailing social attitude. Even World War II, which ended only two years before Jackie Robinson made his major league debut, was a democratic crusade fought by segregated combat

units. And even when segregation was not explicitly the law of the land in postwar America, it was the prevailing social custom.

Then along came Jackie Robinson, whose athletic ability, intelligence and desire perfectly suited his pioneering role. It is not surprising that he succeeded as major league baseball's first black player, any more than it is surprising that he later succeeded as a businessman. Despite personal success, throughout his life he remained a tireless crusader for social and racial justice.

After Jackie Robinson, an unbroken. string of black stars and superstars entered the big leagues and proceeded. to rewrite the record books with their hitting, fielding and running. Their accomplishments helped bolster -baseball at the gate. More important, however, they also helped ease racial integration in cities where the law was inadequate to deal with ingrained segregationist attitudes. And by projecting varied images - of Robinson's combativeness, Willie Mays's virtuosity, Ernie Banks's eternal optimism and geniality - they helped destroy the stereotypes that made it easy for white America to patronize blacks when it wasn't

ignoring them completely. Obviously, total integration is no more a fait accompli in sports than elsewhere in our society. prejudice is still a long way from being completely eradicated. But there has been undeniable, even remarkable progress in racial relations over the

past 25 years. Part of the reason for this change must be attributed to legislation that provided basic legal protections and extended equality of opportunity. But laws alone cannot sufficiently alter opinions or attitudes, nor forge comfortable voluntary social relationship. That requires extra-legal associations in pursuits where men are judged by ability and accomplishment. Athletics fit the bill precisely and Jackie Robinson and other athletes have played an important part in opening the doors of opportunity not only in sports but thoughout American
