The purpose of the loan, according to a statement released by Congressman Bob Price's office, is twofold.

One, to "finance 46 miles of distribution line to serve 360 area consumers," and two, to im-"finance , system provements."

Help also came from many other sources, including Boy Scouts, the VFW Auxilliary ladies at Kings Manor, Jewel Smith, Gebos, Duckwalls, Western Auto and the First Baptist Church Acteens.

The ladies from Kings Manor, along with the Acteens and Auxiliary women, helped dress some of the dolls that were given away. Mrs. Smith, the county welfare director. assisted with the work and the distribution of the gifts.

The Hereford Whitefaces won a "clutch" game here Thursday night, turning back a strong Pampa Harvester team by 64-57, and Coach Ron Mayberry couldn't have been more pleased with his team's performance.

After holding a slight lead most of the way, the Herd saw Pampa rally to tie the score, 53-53, with about five minutes remaining. With Keith Kitchens leading the way, Hereford surged back ahead and captured the victory - the fourth in a row and the ninth in the last 11 starts. The Whitefaces are now 12-5 on the

Mayberry thinks the team should have gained confidence with the triumph, and he hopes the momentum will continue after the Christmas holiday. The Herd enters the Borger Holiday Tourney Dec. 28.

Explaining the "big game" factor of the win, Mayberry said "It's the first time this year we won a close game in the final minutes against a good team." Mayberry said in the wins over Borger and Clovis, the Herd had a good lead in the fourth periods. "This time, the team had to produce, and it did."

The wells will be 30 and 28 inches in diameter, and will pump from 2100 to 3000 gallons per minute, according to Coneway.





> Social Security

Q. I'll be 65 next August and I'm trying to keep up with all the latest information on Medicare. I read that a recent law changed the way I'll enroll in the medical insurance part of Medicare. Is this true?

A. Yes. People who become 65 in July or later and are eligible for Medicare hospital insurance will automatically be enrolled in the medical insurance part of Medicare. However, you'll still have the opportunity to decline enrollment if you decide you didn't want medical insurance

Q. I don't get monthly social security payments but I have kidney disease and I require dialysis every week. My neighbor told me I can now have Medicare protection to help pay the cost of these treatments. Is this true?

A. People under 65 who need hemodialysis treatments or kidney transplants can be covered by Medicare Health Insurance Starting July 1, 1973; if they have worked long enough under social security.

Eligibility begins the 3rd month after the month after the month dialysis begins and lasts through the 12th month after the month dialysis ends or the patient had a kidney transplant.

This protection also will be available to insured workers wives or husbands and dependent children who need such treatments or transplants.

And not only jokes, for as Bob Hope begins his 22nd Christmas trip overseas, he will carry with him the usual bevy of beauties for the delight of homesick soldiers in Korea, Thailand, Japan, Guam and a ship or two on the

Hope at 69 is self-admit-tedly at the mid-point of his unusual career, which has carried him from being an 18year-old hoofer on the vaudeville circuit to being Bing Crosby's stooge to an American institution and the country's most-exported product. Hope these days is as much a Christmas figure as Santa Claus or Dr. Seuss' Grinch or Rudolph the Red-Nosed Rein-

His friends say he could pass for someone 20 years younger.
"Which is what I intend to

do," Hope told a reporter, laughing. "No, make that 25." Bob Hope has spent 30 years, with a lay-off in the mid-50's because of illness, carrying a little bit of home to America's overseas soldiers. He has seen his share of the

action too. During World War II Eisenhower once told him that things had been quiet for a few days.

The next day, during a show, a bombardment began. "This is what you call quiet?" Hope cracked.

Then there was the time that Hope and his troupe landed on a lonely beach in Korea. They looked around for the Marines they were supposed to entertain and couldn't find them.

Finally they located a small group of Marines who turned out to be advance scouts. One of them pointed out to sea. where some landing craft were hoving into sight.

'We haven't landed yet, sir," said the Marine. In 1964 Hope was supposed to stay at a hotel in Saigon while doing a show. Just be-

fore the comedian arrived in his car a bomb went off, miss-ing the comedian by a few

U.S. intelligence later said

Though Hope is a close friend of President Richard Nixon, not even friends can escape the Hope scapel. Back in 1971, one of his favorite jokes went something

"Nixon went down to the Lincoln Memorial one night, and he looked up at Abe and said, 'Abe, you had a war, you had a civil rights problem, what'll I do?' And a deep voice said, 'DON'T GO TO THE THEATER.'"

Many of Hope's jokes are enlivened with a little light

Soldiers in World War II may have heard this one, just

as Vietnam G.I.'s have: "Most things here are exportable. Some are even cur-

Even the newest Hope joke sounds like you've heard it before. It's the Hope style, the one-liners one on top of the other, like a one-man "Laugh-

In," that sets him apart. People laugh at and with Hope partly because his jokes are funny and partly because it's Hope who is telling them.

Not that Hope doesn't keep up with the times. During the 1971 Christmas tour Hope told

a few marijuana jokes: "I saw a guy watching "12 O'Clock High" and he didn't even have a TV set."

"I saw a guy with a lamp-shade on his head — said he was waiting for someone to turn him on." Vietnam has also been the

theme of quite a few other jokes, all aimed at G.I. audi-

At Long Binh, South Viet-nam, Hope once told the sol-

"This place is not fit for man or beast. The girls tell me it's full of both.

World War II soldiers may have heard that one. Hope has said many times

that he's seen too much of war ever to think it a good thing that we should learn to settle our differences around the conference table.

But as long as there is war, or the threat of war, there will be American troops to enter-

It wouldn't seem like Christmas without Hope.

#### Dog-Caused Collision

Motorists kill dogs at an alarming rate. But dogs can be deadly to motorists, too. One year's study of a single thruway resealed that more than 200 accidents had been caused by dogs dashing in front of cars.

What are the legal consequences of such an accident? If a dog causes injury to a motorist may the owner of the dog be held liable in court?

Consider this case: A motorist, suddenly confronted by a dog in the street. swerved to the right, struck the dog, lost control of his car, and

crashed into a fire hydrant. Injured, he claimed damages from-the owner of the-dog under the state's "strict liability" law. And the court held that, since the dog had indeed caused the accident, the owner would have to foot the bill-even with no proof

of his negligence. the books in many states. And even without such a law, a dog owner may be held liable if shown to be negligent.

In another case, a terrier had the habit of assaulting passing sehicles of all kinds. One day he rushed ferociously at a youthful motorcyclist, causing him to lose his balance and crash

Even with no strict liability law in effect, a court ruled that the dog's owner would have to pay damages. The court said he was guilty of negligence for failing to . keep such a troublesome dog under restraint.

On the other hand, there is no olved in the accident-was no really its cause. Thus:

A motorist, after barely touch ing a dog, ran his car into the ditch. But when he sought damages from the dog's owner, the quality of his own driving came under scrutiny. Considering all the circumstances of the counter, the jury concluded that a reasonably careful driver would have had no trouble staying on



Children softly singing, or loud speakers tied to our main street's light poles, Christmas carols are a part of the season. They come to us from behind Nativity scenes set on front lawns, and we sing them in worship. They are a part of the richness of Christmas.

The most loved and universal of all Christmas carols is the inspired "Silent Night, Holy Night," which adds its special aura of blessing to the festival of the Nativity and is sung by Christians of all faiths, creeds, custom and language the world around.

This is the gift of Austrian priest Joseph Mohr, who lived in a small Alpine village. His organist who was also the village schoolmaster, Franz Gruber, set the poem to its

own equally inspired music. On a snowy Christmas Eve, 1818, Father Mohr sat in his study and wrote out the text of the first stanza in German. His words are the first stanza known to every child.

The next morning was Christmas and he showed his peom to his friend Gruber, who took it home to try to compose a melody worthy of what he said was the perfect Christmas hymn. He soon came back waving the sheet music and shouting, "The song sings itself."

The two men stood there on Christmas morning singing the song over and over in their excitement. That evening in the worship service the villagers of that little mountain community of Tyrol heard their priest and the village schoolmaster sing the carol for its first audience.

### State Of Emergency Declared By Smith

will die in traffic crashes over the Christmas and New year holidays has prompted Governor Preston Smith to declare a state of emergency on Texas roadways.

Governor Smith made the emergency declaration in a statement issued form his Capitol offices. The statement was a preface to the Governor's call-up of the Texas National Guard-for the fourth time this year-to help with traffic control during the Christmas period.

"Volunteer Guardsmen will assist Department of Public Safety officers and local law enforcement personnel in the major population areas of our state," the Governor said.

From December 22 through December 25, Guardsmen will work in six of the operations districts of the Texas Department of Public Safety." 106 counties are included in those districts-the counties in which the state's population is heaviest and traffic problems are most likely to occur.



SCHOOL FINANCE PLAN TO NEW BOARD - The State Board of Education passed along to the new 24-member Board a committee report proposing far-reaching alternations in public school finance.

The Board at a special meeting accepted the committee version of a comprehensive foundation school program but delayed formal approval. The largely-new Board takes over January 13.

Board Chairman Ben Howell of El Paso said the report seems to meet requirements of the 1971 federal district court ruling invalidating the present system of financing schools.

Under the committee plan. the new foundation school program would be financed completely from state revenue 

by 1978-79. The local share of program costs would be gradually reduced from 20 per cent in 1973-74 to zero by 1978-79. A variety of other proposals for altering finance formulas are included in the seven major

committee recommendations. Texas State Teachers Association has come up with its own plan to meet thrust of the federal court decision. The TSTA program would cost \$2 billion for the next school year, as compared with \$1.4 billion for the plan before the State Board. The latter represents an increase of \$201 million over the 1972-73 minimum foundation program cost.



### Yule card greetings span the centuries

"A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year to You." This favorite greeting of to-day was the wish on the first known Christmas card, sent in 1843. A Londoner named Henry Cole conceived the idea and had an artist friend, John Callcott Horsley, design the

Scenes are of customs stillpracticed in 1970. In the center of the card is a family gathered at Christmas dinner, the adults raising glasses in a holiday toast. Panels on either side depict the feeding of the hungry and clothing of the .Of the 1,000 lithographed copies of the original card, 12 remain. Two are in the Hallmark historical collection and replicas are offered for this

The lasting popularity of the old wish and old themes suggests that Christmas cards have changed little through the years. Other cards in the collection prove otherwise. Fitting the season, Christ-

mas greetings also have re-flected the moods and events of changing times over the past 127 years, Ed Clat-worthy, a Hallmark director, And, in this year's vast variety of cards can be found reflections of all of the styles of the past.

A change in postal rates oc-curred in England shortly be-fore the first 1,000 cards were mailed. The penny post was introduced in the United Kingdom in 1840, putting postage within the financial reach of many. By 1850, the sending of cards had become an established English custom.

During the 1860s, when the first commercial firms began publishing cards in London, Kate Greenaway became the favorite artist. Her designs,

featuring darling children ex-quisitely dressed in Victorian fashion, were widely imitated.

On 1870 cards are many charming children, some of them little girls in billowing

skirts, bonnets and muffs.
In the 1870s, holiday motifs gave way to greetings illus-trated by landscapes, flowers, birds, animals and fish. The same subjects will go through the mails this year.

Cards sent in this country were imported from England until early in the 1870s, when Louis Prang of Boston set up the first American card firm.

### Christmas wasn't always merry in colonies

BOSTON - Christmas got off to a rocky start after the first settlers from England landed on the New England-

Celebration of the anniversary of the birth of Christ in any way, shape or form was a punishable offense for the first few hundred years after the staid, puritanical Pilgrims stepped ashore at Plymouth.

And it wasn't until 1856 that the Massachusetts legislature got around to declaring the day a legal holiday.

For any of the first settlers to greet another on the street with a cheerful "Merry Christmas" could very well, and often did, result in the arrest of the guilty person.

In May, 1659, the stiff-shirted General Court decreed that "such festivals as were superstitiously kept in other-countries were of great dishonor of Gcd and offense to

Ineretore, court, "it is ordered that whosoever shall be found observing any such day as Christmas or the like, either by forebearing of labor, feasting, or in any other way, shall pay for such offense five shillings as a fine to the country.

The ban on the celebration reflected the varying views of the people in England, greatly divided for centuries on the right and wrong of the matter. When the Puritans gained the upper hand in England they stilled what they described as an annual orgy. In 1644, 14 years after Boston was founded, the British Par-

ordinance calling for the better observance of Christmas. Some shop-keepers continued to do business on the day, thus incurring the wrath of those who were opposed to Christmas and there were

riots as mobs sought to sup- . press celebrations of any kind and the pros and cons continued for generations.

There was a clash over the holiday on the first Christmas day in the history of New England. Gov. William Bradford urged the Pilgrims to remain at work. Some did and others objected so the governor finally decided it would be all right if the celebrations were held indoors and not on the

The Massachusetts penalty remained in effect until 1681. Sixteen years after a commission recommended in 1665 that the colonial Christmas penalty, in conflict with the law of England, should be repealed.

From that time on Christmas began to assert itself more and more.

The real revival of Christmas coincided with the great number of immigrants who began to pour into the American colonies. The immigran.s brought their own customs with them and kept Christmas here as they did in Germany, France, Italy, Sweden and dozens of other foreign nations from which they fled.

Slowly, but relentlessly, the influence of the new Americans brought about a decline of political and religious bit-



### Santa Claus image wrapped in Christmas lore

It was the night before Christmas, 1822, that Santa Claus finally settled on his most popular image. That's when he became a "jolly old elf" with "a round little face and a little round belly, that shook when he laughed like a bowl full of jelly."

Before Dr. Clement C. Moore made him a fat little man in his poem, "The Night Before Christmas," Santa could be fat or thin, tall or short. He had a lot of different names and rode earth-bound horses before he got those high-flying reindeer and, in some places, had gift delivery dates other than Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. He has usually kept his beard, though, — except in Italy where Santa is a lady.

It's not surprising that Santa is completely white-haired. He's about 1,700 years old. He started his career in the fourth century in Turkey, where, because of his kindness and generosity in giving gifts, he became St. Nicholas, the patron saint of children. Although he has had, and even today goes by, a variety of names, he still is frequently called St. Nicholas.

In the Middle Ages, he became more frivolous and from Christmas until New Year's Day was in charge of all holiday festivities. In the spirit of fun, the Scots christened him "Abbot of Unreason" and "Lord of Misrule." The English raised him to a higher station and crowned him "King of the Bean."
Martin Luther, religious leader in Germany in the 1400s, emphasized Christmas as the birthday of Christ and thought of the three wise men who took the Child gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. He named St. Nicholas "Christkindlein," after the Christ Child, and German children believed it was he who brought gifts secretly on

Christmas Eve.

The German people who crossed the ocean to settle in this country about 100 years later changed "Christkindlein" to Kris Kringle, another name Santa is still called today.

It was the Dutch people who, a long time ago, began calling St. Nicholas "Santa Claus."
The Norwegians call their Santa "Julienissen" and the lady Santa in Italy is named "La Befona."

Throughout the years, Santa has worn various kinds of clothes and his usual mode of transportation was a horse. In Scandinavia, where it snows a great deal and sleighs were used all winter, Santa was given his sleigh and reindeer. And, that is where he got off the ground and learned to

The Sandinavians gave
Santa some of the legendary
talents of the Norse god, Thor,
who it was said, rode through
the sky in a chariot. The red
coat was chosen as a reminder of the pagan feast of

Santa delivers his gifts at various times in different countries, although Christmas Eve is the most popular time.

In Holland, gifts are exchanged on Dec. 6, St. Nicholas' birthday. In Mexico, Spain and Italy, presents are given on Jan. 6. Called "The Twelfth Day of Christmas," "Epiphany" and "Day of the Three Kings," it is the day that the wise men presented their gifts to the Christ Child.

The first day of the New Year is gift-giving day in France and Scotland. English children have their visits from Santa on the day after Christmas or Christmas Eve.

### Luminarias brighten New Mexico yule

Christmas in New Mexico is a unique blend of "Season's Greetings" and "Feliz Navi-

In New Mexico, as in other areas of the United States, the holiday season combines divergent cultural customs and traditions into a kaleidoscope of lights, pageantry, good times and solemn moments.

As in other sections of the United States, New Mexicans take great pleasure in decorating their homes with lights - but that's where the similarity ends.

Here, the Christ Child's birth is heralded by thousands of glowing luminarias, softly glowing lights which guide the 'Santo Nino" or Holy Child to the homes of the devout.

This custom was originally started by the early Spanish settlers who used tiny bonfires. The bonfires have been replaced by votive candles inserted in sand-weighted brown paper lunch sacks. The sand holds the luninarias steady and snuffs out the short, squat candles when they burn down. The tops of the sacks are folded down to make a cuff which prevents the sacks from closing.

Luminarias are used to line

rooftops, walls, walkways and driveways. They are usually set in place a day or two before Christmas Eve.

The Hebenstreit mansion in Albuquerque is annually decorated with more than 6,000 luminarias. The candle-lit house is the highlight of a bus tour of luminaria-decorated residential areas of the city.

New Mexico's early Spanish settlers left a legacy which exerts a strong influence on modern-day New Mexico's yületide festivities.

Throughout the state, communities stage classic folkplays such as "Las Posadas," which dramatizes the Holy family's search for lodgings that first Christmas. The search ends when a warmhearted family finally grants Mary and Joseph shelter for the night and a party involving cast and spectators en-

Another traditional drama presented at Christmas is 'Los Pastores," ("The Shepherds") which depicts the classic conflict between good and evil.

Coupled with the Spanish and American Christmas customs are the winter fiestas held in many of the Indian pueblos. The dances at Christ-



### Mistletoe in Yuletide lore

Aside from the myriad myths and historical background, just what is mistletoe? A plant of a thousand varieties because, as a parasite, it takes on the individual qualities of whatever tree it chooses to call home. If it grows on a coniferous tree, for instance, its berries may be pink and its leaves like pine

The mistletoe which grows in abundance from North Carolina on down the eastern coast of the United States is commercially unsaleable, for it has a-rough, gnarled, masculine quality, as opposed to the Central Texas variety. which is a delicate, feminine, bright green plant with pearl-like berries. There is some mistletoe on the West Coast, but not in sufficient quantities to warrant any large scale commercialization.

In spite of its fragile look, Texas mistletoe takes on from the mesquite and Spanish oak trees on which it grows - a hardiness which accounts for its holding up through packaging, shipping and merchandising throughout the country. These days fresh mistletoe is mostly shipped by air.

Autos, airplanes, space-craft and rockets for the boys. Tea and dinner sets, jewel boxes filled with glittering goodies and stylish knapsacks for the girls.

Those are the Christmas toy lineups for sub-teen-agers this year as the Yule season approaches. Ironically, Women's Lib leaders must have forgotten to huddle with the toymakers. Many of the most tempting of their Christmas wares for little girls are designed to make them more feminine:

For two years there has been speculation across the nation that the thrill of the space age is waning. The toymakers don't buy that. They're coming out with a complete line of spacecraft and rockets that will fly off in any direction if there is a va-

The toymakers have surpassed themselves in the rocketry and spacecraft departments. Their space shuttle sets have a startling similarity to the craft that U.S. astronauts will fly late in the

With a hand-held launcher, the 10-year-old junior astronaut can send up a modernis-tic transport and two delta wing re-entry gliders or he can launch via catapult.

As for rockets, the toymakers reached back a few years to build the Nike Zeus, the Apollo Little Joe II and the Honest John. And there are

rocketry starter sets for tinier tots who want to launch their space careers early. For kids approaching or in

their early teens, a rocketry science set, with rockets, parachutes, engines and launcher will keep them busy and out of the house.

The mounting popularity of auto and motorcycle racing is reflected, too, in what Dear Old Dad can slip into Junior's oversized stocking this Christmas Eve.

There are road race sets, dune buggies, individual racing cars, off-road racers, dragsters and "bugs" that can charge down rock-strewn arroyos. All are powered with adjustable engines and amazingly realistic.

For the winter months, a set

of miniature racing mowmobiles complete with banked tracks simulating snow drfts could keep a lot of kids in out of the real snow and cut down

the incidence of head colds.

But let's not forget the little girls. For them there are manicure sets or a combina-tion of lipstick, powder and rouge; or a commetic carry-all with everything to keep the moppet beautiful.

A dainty vanity tray carries lipstick, wave set, comb, brush and mirror. The toymakers surely are going to hear from Women's Lib. The closest they come to a budding career for the sub-teen-ager is a toy first-aid or nurse







### A 'Relevant' Job?

Along with burning the ROTC building, imprisoning the dean, gutting the curriculum and other fun things, some of the student "leaders" of the late 1960s discovered the pursuit of "relevancy."

"Relevancy" is rather difficult to pin down. By usage, it seems to refer to any activity that is perceived as interesting, enobling, creative perhaps even glamorous - and definitely not too hard to learn.

Thus, the student film-maker wants to go out and make a major film - he doesn't have time for "irrelevant" details like the techniques of lighting, camera work, direction, etc. The student executive can't be bothered with problems of finance, marketing, supply, and so forth. He has to get right down to telling business how to be more socially aware. The student brain surgeon . . . well, let's not open up that subject.

Nor is the issue limited exclusively to the campus. Some vocal welfare recipients have disdained jobs open to them as being beneath their dignity. Some hard-working (and well-paid) assembly line workers now demand that their jobs be made more in-And there are the teresting. "disillusioned dropouts," from highly. paid executives to never-paid youths. Some make sandals, some grow organic food, and some counsel with gurus in the high Himalayas. \_\_

They are all seeking "relevancy." But, relevancy to whom or what?

It is the jobs that society needs done that are relevant to society. And these jobs are not necessarily those having the most "meaning" to the individuals who must perform them.

. The economy functions through a series of trade-offs, as simple in principle as supermarket decisions such as whether to dine on hamburger for two nights, or steak one night and beans the next.

So, while individual auto workers might get more satisfaction out of building one entire car at a time instead of just tightening two bolts all day long — cars assembled that way would be so expensive that the men who made them could not afford to own

It is not even a question of competing economic systems. Both capitalist America and socialist Russia need more garbage men than poets. And both societies are maintained by a complex technology that cannot be mastered through inspiration or"good vibes" alone.

OK. If we "need" garbage men, then why do we pay them so much less than, say research chemists? That's another question that causes endless confusion.

It's a matter of supply and demand. There are many people who are physically and mentally capable of collecting trash. Therefore, society offers only as much as it needs to offer to attract a sufficient number of these people to that job. Far fewer people are capable of becoming research chemists. So the "reward" for filling that job must be higher, to insure attracting a sufficient number from this much smaller pool. That's the way it is with all the high-skill, high-intelligence jobs. The number of people who are able to fill these jobs is limited. And there are many jobs where their talent or ability would be of great value to society. Consequently, their "price" tends to be bid up by the competition

Now it's time for a few "howevers." There is nothing wrong with youth questioning the traditional way of doing things. It's natural and healthy. There is nothing wrong with assemblyline workers trying to find ways to make their jobs both more interesting today. Best of the three options is toincrease domestic supplies, which would create jobs, raise incomes, create profit opportunities, lift U.S. tax revenues, and aid national security by reducing reliance on imports. Restraining consumption, the report warns, "could prove expensive and undesirable.

Realistic Environmental

Standards Urged The Council said: "Realistic environmental standards are essential if energy demands are to be met and the environment improved at reasonable costs...Prompt action is needed to eliminate the serious delays that have been caused by environmental issues.'

Examples cited include the delay in the Alaska pipeline, at a cost of atleast2 million barrels of crude oil per day; nuclear reactor plant siting and licensing delays costing the electric utilities at least \$5 billion annually; and air quality which make standards unusuable by industry highsulphur coal, comprising 40 per cent of all coal resources east of the Mississippi River.

Senator-elect James A. McClure (R., Idaho), who headed a House Republican Task Force on Energy and Natural Resources, wrote a recent article entitled "Battle of the Crises: The Energy-Environment conflict." concluded that it is possible to find "solutions which meet the needs of the environment but do not threaten the standard.

### Talk of Texas

KISSING CAPITAL - Texas provokes more Christmas bussing than any other state. It's the world's largest producer of mistletoe.

More than 95 per cent of all of the holiday mistletoe sold commercially in the U.S. is raised in 12 Central Texas counties. Between December 1 and 15, about 400,000 pounds of the highly perishable, parasitic plant is removed from the mesquite, oak, blackjack, chinaberry and other trees in the area. It is then graded, packed in plastic bags and air expressed to stores around the

CHRISTMAS GIFT - Statehood was a late present to Texas 127 years ago.

On December 29, 1845, the U.S. Congress formaily accepted the new Texas Constitution, thus marking the formal entrance of Texas into the family of states.

IT STARTED HERE - Some historians believe that the Christmas tree, as Americans know it, originated in Texas.

When Prince Solms Braunfels and 300 German immigrants arrived in 1846, they were shocked that Americans didn't celebrate the Yule with lighted

A German legend says that not only shepherds and wise men, but trees as well, went to worship the Babe in Bethlehem. The gray and scraggly spruce was the ugliest of the trees, so the heavens took pity on it and dropped stars from the sky to light its branches. The spruce was transformed into such beauty that the Christ Child looked up and smiled.

For hundreds of years, the Germans had accepted the old legend and had decorated the spruce at Christmas. Since the spruce isn't native to Texas, the immigrants put colored paper and lighted candles on the juniper trees that Christmas in 1846. Soon the idea spread, and by the 1860's, the Christmas tree was common throughout the U.S.

CORSICANA'S GOODY - More than 1,000 tons of Christmas cheer were mailed around the world this year from the only bakery in the U.S. devoted exclusively to the production of fruitcake.

Corsicana's Collin Street Bakery, which geared up in October to produce the more than 700,000 cakes ordered by customers in all of the states and 148 foreign countries, has been using the same recipe since 1896. That was the year that August Weidman, a master baker from Wiesbaden, Germany, brought the recipe to Navarro County and joined Tom McElwee in opening a bakery.

Today the bakery requires up to 750 employes during the fall to the turn out as many as 25,000 cakes a day. Customers include Princess Grace of Monaco.

"Uncomfortable as such a delicate question may be, it's about time to ask it. Profits are about as badly misunderstood and universally sought as happiness in marriage:

-"In plain English, profits - the whole system of profit - is a scorekeeping device for society. Profits tell the society what goods and services to produce more of, and the ones to produce less of.

"Whatever the motive of the profit seeker, the social function of profits is to tell society which goods and services are adjudged by people in markets to have a social value worth the resources used to organize their production.

"If markets are competitive, then profits attract more producers, as honey draws flies. Soviet Russia had to reinvent profits as soon as it allowed any consumer choice."



There was always a Christmas eve program at the church and I was expected to perform — sing a song, they called it.

The excitement of performing in public plus the anticipation, during the walk to our home on the outskirts of the little Kansas town, was about all a little boy could endure.

But it wasn't over.

I had to go through an almost unbearable bit of excitement produced by my brother, who always had a fine sense of the dramatic.

Santa Claus always visited us on Christmas Eve. Somehow I was always kept interested, by my sister, in something in the kitchen. While we were there, Santa Claus would whisk through the living room.

When I entered from the kitchen the tree would be lighted. It was done with candles in holders which clamped to the tree. The tree was ornamented with baubles and gaudy string, about the same as today.

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by Santa Claus. His blinding speed would be described to me by my brother.

The tree decorated, the candles lighted, the gifts placed—all in the flick of an eye by a creature that was a mere blur of red and white.

My brother knew because he always tried to capture Santa Claus. He always witnessed the dazzling performance of Santa from the floor in a corner of the room to which he was hurled by the benign but irresistable force of the old elf, who resisted capture.

The story of the Herculean effort to capture Santa was almost enough to make me lose interest in what was under the tree. It was a great story in which there was no hero and no villian. There were adversaries, and I admired both of them —my brother and Santa Claus.


I have always wished Santa had been captured. I wish I could have seen the real, rapid Claus. I knew the one who came around sometimes was an uncle who was fat enough to look the part, in proper wardrobe.

Uncle was not that fast. He couldn't have lighted even one candle in the flick of an eye. I saw him light a pipe — scratching the match on his pants leg and all. Pretty slow.

I haven't asked my brother in recent years if he ever captured Santa Claus. He has grandchildren now and I suppose, if he kept trying, he might have done it.

### Many Yule traditions born in New England

BOSTON — Remove from the Christmas season the notable contributions made by New Englanders — and the list of "firsts" is a long one — and there would be little left of the joy, magic and enchantment of the universal holiday.

Well known is the fact that Louis Prang in Boston introduced the first religious Christmas cards in the United States in 1874. Also known to most everyone is the fact that the lyrics of the song "O Little Town of Bethlehem" were written in 1865 by Philip Brooks, Episcopal bishop of Boston and that window candles first glowed in a home on Beacon Hill.

But perhaps, less well known, is that Massachusetts claims the first department store Santa Claus, forerunner of the thousands of whitebearded old gentlemen who greet millions of children in shopping centers and stores each year across the nation.

each year across the nation.

James Edgar of Brockton
was the first to appear as
Santa Claus in a store. He was
the owner of The Boston Store
which he opened in 18/8 and
operated until he died shortly
before World War I.

Well-suited for his role at that Christmas season in 1878, Edgar had a snow-white beard, a lusty laugh and rotund body. Furterhmore, the store owner loved children.

store owner loved children.
Legend has it that he would
stand on the roof of his store
and scatter pennies to children who gathered in the
street, delighting in seeing
them scoon up the coirs.

them scoop up the coins.

Each Fourth of July he footed the bill for a picnic in

the park for hundreds of children, hiring every available trolley car to transport the youngsters.

At those outings Edgar dressed in various costumes to amuse the children. He once appeared as George Washington, another time as Uncle Sam and once as an Indian chief.

His costume for his first appearance at Christmas time was that of a clown. This made such a hit that he decided on a different approach for Christmas in 1890. He wore a Santa Claus uniform and for hours wandered through his store talking with children and asking them what they wanted for Christmas.

A writer at the time described the scene, saying, "You can't imagine what it was like. There had always been sketches of Santa Claus but when you went to The Boston Store there he was right in front of you.

"It was like a dream come true, you were actually talking to Santa Claus."

The number of children increased every year and they came from places as far distant as Boston to see their friend, Santa Claus, in person. Edgar's "act" caught on and before long there were

Santa Clauses in stores across

the nation — an American tradition that got its start in a small Massachusetts store.

Probably not generally known is that the famous Christmas poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" was written by New Englander Clement Clarke Moore of Newport, R.I.

Moore, records show, told his children he would write a Christmas poem for them. Walking from his home to a butcher shop on Christmas eve in 1822 to buy a goose, Moore trudged through the snow and thought about his promise.

Suddenly the words popped into his head and when he reached home he wrote them down, his work becoming one of the best-loved poems of the Christmas season.

And one wonders how many times this poem will be recited to sleepy youngsters before they go to bed on the night of nights this year.

Lady ghosts in Italy, elves in Scandinavia and wooden shoes filled with hay in Holland all have one thing in common — they are part of the ways that people celebrate Christmas around the world.

If you were able to fly around the world on Christmas Eve, you would see dozens of odd and sometimes amusing Christmas sights, ranging from Scandinavian Santas gobbling porridge as they listen for the footsteps of overanxious children to huge candle-lit processions.

#### Delinquency study probes environment influence

Crowded housing conditions, low family incomes and other similar social factors do have a connection with juvenile delinquency, according to Prof. Gosta Carlsson of Stockholm, who made an investigation among hundreds of boys in the 11-15 age group, but this connection is not at all as strong as has been supposed.

His conclusion was that it is impossible to define any specific condition which would constitute such a high risk that those who grow up in it are "predestined" to fall into criminal behavior.

#### A tree grows in New York

When David Rockefeller, chairman of Chase Manhattan Bank, wanted something really impressive in front of the bank's headquarters, he commissioned Jean Dubuffet to design his largest outdoor sculpture.

The black and white concrete, steel and aluminum work sheathed in glass fiber was created in the artist's studio near Paris and shipped to New York in pieces due to its great size — it is 42 feet high and weighs 25 tons.

wooden shoes on their doorsteps. There's a catch, though. The shoe must be filled with hay for "Sinterklaas" horses. Tome, an elf, is the Christ-

Tome, an elf, is the Christmas gift-giver in most Scandinavian countries. Tome must be appeased with a bowl of porridge left on the door-step. If he likes the porridge and eats it all, he will give many gifts.

many gifts.

Christmas is nearly three weeks long in Latin American countries. In Mexico, festivities, including many processions, begin on Dec. 16 and continue until Christmas Eve. If you were to fly to Mexico on Dec. 24, though, you wouldn't see any gift-giving. The official date for that is Jan. 6, "Little Christmas" or the Feast of the Epiphany.

Epiphany, according to tradition, is the day that the Three Wise Men visited the Christ Child in Bethlehem.

In Italy, gifts are also distributed Jan. 6 by a mysterious but generous lady spirit called Befana.

In England you'll find kissing under the mistletoe, plum
pudding and presents on
Chritmas Eve. The Twelfth
Night of Christmas, though,
finds a return of the celebrating complete with games and

feasting.

The Christmas tree comes from Germany, where it was originally associated with pagen rites, and you'll find it there still. Martin Luther is credited with lighting the tree to symbolize the light of love which Christ brought to the world.

And from Austria comes one of the most beautiful of Christmas carols, "Silent Night, Holy Night." Merry Christmas.
