# **Transportation Discussed**

### **Chamber Of Commerce Seeks Better Freight Service**

A move to get better freight tran-sportation in and out of Hereford was supported early Thursday by directors of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

The directors took the action after hearing a report from the area development committee concerning the problem of transportation service in the area. The report, by Terry Caviness, requested the support of the Chamber in a visit to the local and main offices of Santa Fe Railway Company in an at-tempt to work out better scheduling in the Hereford area.

"We are not getting as good of service as we would like to see," said Caviness. "We thought we could meet with the railroad people and work out something suitable with them."

Directors also discussed the quarterly membership meeting planned for 8 p.m. Tuesday night in the Bull Barn. The 75th Diamond Jubilee committee will be in charge of the program and will present a sytle show featuring old-fashioned dresses and costumes.

BOB JOSSERAND, head of the agriculture committee of the Chamber, said the committee is sponsoring a tour July 13 for several feedlot management students from Texas A&M. Josserand said the students had requested specific places and businesses they would like to visit and that the tour would be similar to the recent cattle-industry tour of the group from Washington County (Brenham).

Josserand also requested and received from directors an endorsement of the agriculture-industry activities planned for August 30 during the Jubilee Celebration.

Josserand said the committee had invited U.S. Sec. of Agriculture Earl Butz to be the keynote speaker at a luncheon during the day, but had yet not received an answer. He also said U.S. Rep. George Mahon and U.S. Rep. Bob Poage would be in attendance during the day and at the luncheon.

THE DIRECTORS also voted to support a plan to locate a diagnostic laboratory veterinarian clinic on the campus of West Texas State University in Canyon. The clinic is to be located somewhere in the Texas Panhandle under the authority of Texas A&M.

When asked if the clinic could be located near Hereford, Josserand said Texas A&M would "probably want to locate near a college or university."

## **Fireworks Draw Heat** From Local DA Office

Day celebration holidays they should know the laws or understand the consequences they may face, warned Crim. Dist. Atty. Andy Shuval this week.

'We have a real problem with this each year," he said. "Also they can not be shot inside the city limits under any conditions."

Citing the Texas laws concerning fireworks, the district attorney said all fireworks stands must be located at least 500 feet outside the city limits.

... "AT ALL stands selling fireworks must be at least a four-inch sign reading 'Fireworks - No Smoking'," Shuval said. "Then there can be no smoking at all within 10 feet of the fireworks stand."

Shuval also stated that all fireworks on display for sale must be protected from the public at all times and that only employees of the stand may enter the building where fireworks are being sold or stored.

Fireworks also are not allowed to be displayed in windows.

"OUR BIGGEST problem, though, is probably persons violating the law about where they can shoot off the fireworks." the attorney said. "Fireworks cannot be shot within the city limits at all. They cannot be shot within 100 feet of a fireworks stand or within 600 feet of a church, school or hospital."

Hereford Fire Marshall Jay Spain issued a warning to local residents who try to pop firecrackers in the ditches along area roads.


'They could be a real fire hazard with all the wheat and barley farmers are trying to harvest," Spain said. "We usually have several fireworks-related fires this time of year and we could use the people's help in watching out for us.'

SPAIN emphasized for special care to be taken in use of fireworks that "shoot out" small balls of fire because of the fire hazard created.

Hereford Police Chief Don Brush said local officers will be observing for fireworks violations within the city limits especially those involving moving vehicles

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



Mayday! Adrenalin flows at the sound of the word.

Mayday is the international voice radio code used by vessels and aircraft in distress to draw attention to an emergency plea for aid, according to water safety officials with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. "Distress" and "emergency" are the key words.

Routine calls for assistance mechanical breakdowns or fuel shortages, for instance - are by law not permitted to contain the mayday expression. A death received.

for these small weeds. FOR LARGER careless weeds and small annual

grasses, a higher rate of atrazine (up to two and a half pounds per acre) plus one gallon per acre of a nonphytotoxic crop oil is needed to

the soil for long periods of time, and only sorghum and corn can be grown the following year. Second, atrazine should not be used on sandy or loamy sand soils because serious crop injury can result. And third, sorghum must be at least six inches tall before over-the-top atrazine treatments can be applied, Supak emphasizes.

For broadleaf weed control in areas where cotton and soybeans are not grown extensively, 2, 4-D or Banvel may be used. The 2, 4-D is available in amine, acid and ester formulations. However, the amine formulation will drift less than the ester or acid.





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
### **Christianity attracts** few in China today

## **Collecting Sales Tax Difficult Job For State**



But there is no way around the fact that our sales taxes do pay for a large part of the public services which are available. In 1972, net State revenues from sales taxes paid into the treasury provided \$818,172,597 - nearly one billion dollars for education, public health, agricultural programs, oil and gas regulation, judicial, and legal and regulatory services.

In addition to that, the revenue-hungry city. governments which levy one cent of every five sales-tax pennies paid received some \$178 million in sales tax shares to provide local services.

While the great majority - atleast 95 per cent - of businessmen who have the responsibility of collecting sales taxes from the consumer have been passing them on to the State of Texas every three months as required, there has

## **Time For The Fireworks**

Coming up soon will be the annual observance of Independence Day — July 4th. Governmental offices, school and almost all businesses will be closed as Hereford residents celebrate the birth of the nation.

Many cities across the state and nation will be celebrating and, no doubt, firecrackers will pop in Hereford. However, they probably won't all pop safely and legally the way officials would like them to.

WITH THE opening of fireworks stands today, Hereford firemen and law officials again are issuing the annual warnings about fireworks and where they will be allowed to be set off. And probably again this year, as every year, someone will have a firecracker go off in his hand; or several grassfires will be reported resulting from misuse of fireworks; and local police officers will be forced to file complaints against people throwing firecrackers from cars or disturbing the peace within the city limits.

IT SEEMS the problem grows a little bigger each year and may some day result in a law against the use of fireworks entirely.

This is not only in Hereford, but has been a problem in many towns. And it's really a shame because fireworks, used and displayed properly, are a real attraction and entertainment.

Not all persons who enjoy watching a good fireworks display are in the teen-age category. I have attended several major fireworks displays in larger cities and the majority of persons attending were adults. Such a display could be a real attraction in Hereford. Although it may be too late to plan such a fireworks demonstration before July 4th this year, plans could be started before next year's Independence Day arrives.

THE HEREFORD Fire Department would be an excellent director of this type of fireworks display and I'm sure one of the civic clubs or other Hereford organizations would serve as sponsor for the event and purchase the fireworks.

Many cities even go a little farther and have a short program of patroitic music and humorous entertainment before starting the fireworks. Companies that manufacture fireworks


prepare special packages for these type of demonstrations and the display is far better than what individual citizens could afford to purchase at regular firework stands.

THE DISPLAY could be staged at some place with plenty of spectator room and parking such as the football stadium where most towns hold the display. A good location in Hereford might be the new portion of Veterans Park on the side of the hill.

The demonstration could then be viewed from all over the city and provide many citizens with relatively cheap entertainment and would probably be just about enough fireworks for people to feel they have celebrated the day.

MOST PEOPLE are sincere in their patriotism of the United States. Because they don't like firecrackers popping up and down the alley; or being thrown from cars; or allow their children to buy the potentially dangerous fireworks doesn't mean they are not patriotic.

An organized, safe fireworks display could be a real benefit to the city and fill in the void inside you when July 4th passes quietly by.

FEW PEOPLE REALIZE THAT THE American success story stemmed from the productivity of its farms. Exports of agricultural products like cotton and tobacco from the southern colonies—and later from the young

republic—were important in earning the currency that was used to buy machinery and all kinds of industrial equipment from Europe. Without them, America could not have become the world's most advanced technical economy in so short a time.

History has a way of moving full circle, and now we are beginning to see a dawning realization that agriculture—once again—holds the key to bringing the American economy back into international prominence.

THE VAST amount of petroleum imports which will be needed to meetthis nation's soaring energy demands will add to the already large deficit inour balance of payments. But there are strong indications that the oil trade deficit can be largely offset if we continue to increase our agricultural exports.

In the last 20 years, output per man hour on American farms has more than tripled. Where one farmer in 1952 produced enough food and fiber to supply the needs of 16 persons, today he is producing enough for 51.

AS WORLD population grows and becomes more affluent, demand for U.S. agricultural products particularly wheat, feed grains, soybeans, and cotton—will continue to increase. Given the proper incentives and price protection they need and deserve, American farmers will produce the crops to meet these demands.

At the same time, they will be making a major contribution to the economic well-being of all Americans.

### Dear editar:

As I understand it, America's reserve supplies of farm products are now down to their lowest in many years, mainly because we've been selling a lot of the stuff abroad, particularly to Russia and China.

I HAVE long wondered, why is it that Russia and China, with so much farm land as they've got, can't produce enough to feed themselves?

I have now found out.

According to an article I read in a copy of Newsweek I bought last week because it had a picture of a horse on the cover — I remember saying to myself, you mean they've got horses involved in the Watergate mess now? — to continue, according to it, China's leaders for example for years have been sending city people such as school teachers, office workers, lawyers, newspaper people and such like out to help work the land. There you are. There's the answer.

IF YOU want to hold crop production down, just turn your farm over to a bunch of city people. Put a banker in charge of maintaining your tractor, a school teacher in charge of planting, an insurance man in charge of plowing some college kids in charge of hoeing, a city councilman in charge of fertilizing, a newspaper man in charge of harvesting, a lawyer in charge of sales, and I guarantee you won't add a thing to the nation's farm surplus.

On the other hand of course if you putfarmers in charge of running cities, what would you come up with? Probably with cities like New York or Chicago that are facing bankruptcy and clamoring for more Federal aid.

Talk Of Texas

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY—Texas, whose annexation treaty with the U.S. guaranteed it the right to maintain its own Army and Navy, actually has put three separate fleets to sea. One still stands ready for "duty."

In 1832, Texas acquired its first navy — a fleet of three ships borrowed from private owners and outfitted to enforce the blockade against Mexico. In 1835, war with Mexico was imminent and four more ships were added. Three of these were lost in battle and a fourth was impounded by creditors. Between 1837 and the spring of 1938, Texas had no naval power of any kind.
