All interested persons should make plans to attend the meeting and share their opinions and recommendations. The study could be important to the future transportation network of the Panhandle. We understand the state will make its recommendations to the Federal folks by Jan. 1, 1975. It is a longrange proposal-with any construction many years past that date.

SOME community leaders feel such an interstate would be an asset to the future growth and prosperity of the area. The big push for the route apparently started in New Mexico, but Amarillo had indicated a strong interest, too. Another route being studied for interstate designation is the extension of I-27 south of Lubbock to join I-20 and I-10. Another route proposal is from Tucumcari, N.M., to Wichita, Kan., which is of interest to folks in the Dalhart and Stratford area.

The meeting will be at the courthouse, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

# Major Items Fill Board Agendas Here

Several major items are on tap for discussion this week as three local governing boards meet in regular session

The Hereford City Commission is scheduled to meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday in City Hall annexation plans; the Deaf Smith General Hospital Board is slated to discuss remodeling proposals during the regular meeting at 7 a.m. Tuesday in the Conference room at the hospital; and the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce directors are expected to hear several special reports during their 6:30 a.m. meeting Thursday in the Chamber office.

THE CITY commission is expected to begin its meeting with a public hearing concerning annexation of portions of surrounding property to the city limits. Should the hearing go well for the commission, then major action is expected in relation to the annexation.

Other items on the city agenda include the letting of bids for heating and air conditioning units; approving an amendment to the recently passed retirement systems; and discussion of a

court tax suit against local property which has a high amount of unpaid taxes.

THE HOSPITAL board agenda is scheduled for regular business other than the remodeling discussion. The proposal

## School Board Candidates Speak Out To Kiwanians

**Brand News Editor** The candidates for the Hereford School Board of Trustees made their first public appearance speeches at noon Thursday as seven of the eight candidates spoke to the Hereford Kiwanis

All seven candidates present gave brief statements to the large crowd at the regular noon luncheon and none were asked questions at the end of the program.

Eight candidates are racing for the two open positions on the School Board in the April 6 election. Absentee balloting in the race begins Monday and will continue until April 2.

There are no incumbents in the race as Dr. A.T. Mims and Hilrey Aven both decided not to seek re-election.

THE CANDIDATES appearing at the

Jim Conkwright, Margaret Formby, Bill Johnson, Charles Schlabs and Glenn Watts. The eighth candidate, Lorenzo Granado, was not present at the meeting.

Kiwanian Ed Coplen, who was head of the program, called alphabetically on each of the candidates and each gave a brief statement or listed the platform on which he or she was running. Following is a brief summary of the statements.

LYNTON ALLRED -

"As a candidate I feel I need to have reasons why I am offering myself as a school board member," Allred said. "I also feel I need to think about the duties and responsibilities of each member of the board.

"The board must serve as a policymaking board to set the policies for the schools to follow. It also must hire the administrators to carry on the business aspects of the school.

"With the duties I feel one thing

needed of a school board member is objectivity — objectivity in decision-making," Allred added.

"Board members need to be open to suggestions from the community and need to be accessible to the people. As a school board member my decisions would be based on the people's wants and desires for the school.

JIM CLARK -

"I have four reasons for running for the school board," Clark said, "my four children.

"I feel the main area where I can be of great help is in the building program. I have questions about whether we are getting our money's worth out of the many buildings we have been adding.

"I am involved in the construction business and I feel I am familiar with this area and could really help here.

"I also feel the athletic program needs to be expanded to include more girls sports. Another area is the vocational programs. I feel much expansion is needed here. Another major area I would like to see changed is to have the school opened up more for community education and community service. We don't have a YMCA here and I feel the school could fill in very well."

JIM CONKWRIGHT -

'I filed for the board because of a feeling of obligation. Obligation to the school system from which I graduated; obligation to repay to a community the time and talent that others gave in the years past to assure me of a good education .

"School programs must be studied. What seems like a simple decision in a board meeting can and will have longlasting effects on a student ... . We need change and progress - but only with proper study and evaluation of the means and programs involved.

The school program must be wellrounded for all levels of students . . . In another vein, it is my belief that the school system should continue to support the community through purchases from local businessmen whenever possible. True some specialty school items are not sold locally; but most things are and every effort should be made to support the person or firm paying taxes to this district, if the price is anywhere within

The board must make decisions and stand by them. And, whenever the decisions of the board are put into policy . those people (administrators and teachers) need to know that the board stands solidly behind them.

'In closing . . . I have no obligation to an interest group or political group within or without the school system or in this community pertaining to the schools. I wish to serve through an interest in the youth and school system in an unencumbered manner and I will study each item and issue on its own merit and will make my decision responsibly."

MARGARET FORMBY -

"Meetings like this are healthy. If all candidates in all elections could come before the voters like this then we would have less problems in our government than we have now.

"I have considered running for the school board many times in the past, but have never made that big step to actually become a candidate until last week.

"I want to be a member of the school board. I am not a women's libber, as such. But I have no apologies about being a woman or a mother. I am an individual who feels I can serve as a board member.

'I have had kids in school for the past 15 years, I have served as a teacher and recently have been a substitute teacher. I feel that my communication with the

"I am a taxpayer and as you know the school is the biggest business in Hereford and it needs effective and objective board members. With my interests and background. I feel I can be an effective and objective school board member."

BILL JOHNSON -

"I have seen the school system operate on the inside and on the outside. The community wants a board member that is objective on every issue.

"I believe in furthering the vocational programs and the women's athletics and I feel I am qualified to serve in the capacity as a board member. Hereford is a growing and progressive town and it must stay that way.

"I want to serve this community one in which I was raised and love."

"I didn't enter this race as a popularity candidate. I feel I have many new ideas and I feel the school board needs some new ideas.

'In the vocational area, I do not have a high school degree, and I feel I know why kids drop out of school. I feel we need a minimum of five credits in vocation for all students to give them some skills.

"I also believe in work and sweat. You can't get anywhere without it. Another area I feel needs changing is the sports program. I feel the sports program has gone too far one way. All efforts seem to be concentrated on winning the game rather than letting all the kids play.

"Every student should be guaranteed to play one-fourth of every game. We talk about the energy problem and then we take all these buses to Lubbock and around. Only five kids get to play when

we get there, whereas many more could have played if we stayed here."

'People later will not remember whether we won or lost but they will remember whether they got to play or

'The most important thing is to see how many kids get to play and participate in the program,

GLENN WATTS -

'I feel I am qualified for the board. I have two children graduated from school here and still have one in school here

"I believe we should treat everyone the same. And also to treat all issues fairly, looking at both sides.

'I am not going to promise you to change everything, but I do promise to be the most involved person on the board and know what is going on."

Bruce L. Miller, a member of the Regional Alcoholism Authority, advised of the newly published "Guide For The Prevention of Alcoholism,'

approved by the United Fund. The guide listed these suggestions: "Never take a straight drink of distilled spirits or a concentrated drink (strong) unless it is-taken with meals. Drink slowly. Never "chain drink". Never drink more than you originally intended to drink. Don't mix drinking and driving. Don't drink alone. Always spend more

time eating than drinking. Always serve soft drinks with the same care you would beer or wine. In other words, correctly iced or chilled. For example, a person wouldn't



# New Uranium Boom Going On In U.S.

prospectors with Geiger counters roamed the wilds of Utah, New Mexico, Arizona and Colorado stalking the hard to find uranium outcrops?

Well, there's a uranium boom going on that makes that era of uranium barons and penny uranium mining stocks look like child's play

THE DIFFERENCE today is that the big mining companies are dominating the play while the individual prospector has disappeared and the smaller mining companies have been absorbed by the major uranium mining companies. Dollars make the difference.

The stakes are huge because most of the surface uranium has already been mined and now shafts will have to go deep into the earth to find suitable

Energy Commission estimates annually by the year 2000 the uranium industry will have to invest \$18-billion in exploration, mines and mills in order to meet the demand for nuclear fuel by the year 2000, just 26 years from now.

THE SHORTAGE of oil and natural gas has accelerated the search for other fuels towavoid a critical power shortage by the end of the 70's. The U.S. now has 43 nuclear reactors producingelectricity. Plans call for 140 nuclear reactors in operation by 1980. In order to meet the dem and for fuel in 1980, 35,000 tons of yellowcake will be required annually to produce atomic fuel for the plants. That's almost triple last year's U.S. production. 160,000 tons of

uranium ore. The Atomic yellowcake will be required

The Atomic Energy Commission has a nonmilitary. stockpile of 38,000 tons of uranium concentrate with which it is making enriched fuel, but this spockpile will be used up by 1978 and the utility companies will then have to get their fuel supplies direct from the uranium producers.

A NEW GROUP of competit ors have jumped into the uranium mining field and they have lots of dollars to spend. They are the major, oil companies. The country's largest producer of uranium is Kerr-McGee Corp, Gulf Oil, Continental Oil, Exxon and Getty

Oil are also involved to various

Uranium fuel now sells for about \$7 a lb., but the price is expected to rise to \$15 or \$20 by the mid-1980's There is even some talk of a \$30 a lb. price by then. Spokesmen say that even with a \$20 or \$30 per lb. price for vellowcake, the cost of nuclear fuel will still be competitive with fossil fuels:

The big unknown is inflation and this is why the uranium producers don't know how to price nuclear fuel for delivery over the next 10 to 15 years. At the moment, uranium mills are operating at 50-50 per cent capacity, but this will change by 1976 or early 1977 as nuclear power plants start lining up long-term supplies of fuel.



#### Editorial **Advertising** And Beef

Anyone questioning the efficacy of advertising might take a long look at some of the problems of the beef industry in recent

We are speaking of advertising in its true sense . . . any action that causes a person to think and, hopefully, to act in a particular way, whether it be a classified ad in the newspaper, a billboard, word of mouth testimonial, or all the other devices man uses.

Unfortunately, the most effective advertising can't be bought. The most effective advertising is the personal recommendation of a product or service by one human to another. Perhaps the next best ad is endorsement in an editorial. And then comes the hidden ad in a news story!

For several years, the beef industry has been making a mild attempt to persuade Americans to "eat-more beef." Ads were bought in daily papers and magazines, billboar is, and of course we all have seen the bumper stickers; usually on pickups.

We suspect that many beefsteaks have been sold because the gastric juices started flowing as persons saw a picture of a juicy steak prepared to perfection or as they were reminded of the nutritional value of this protein-packed food.

But all this advertising was nothing compared to the negative advertising the beef industry received last spring and summer! This negative advertising consisted of selling the public on just one point . . . "beef is too

One phase of this multi-million dollar negative advertising program was the housewife boycott in many cities. But this phase would have been worth comparatively little had it not been for the news media, particularly television, which picked up the daily demonstrations and publicized them twice each evening in prime time!

Even though the price of beef on the hoof has dropped to a point where the supply is drying up due to high priced meat and low priced cattle, the effects of last summer's advertising program are still being felt. The American people were convinced that beef is "too high" and there is buyer resistance,

Advertising is neither moral nor immoral it is amoral! It can sell a bad product just as effectively as a good product, it can sell a

lie just as effectively as a truth. Consider cigarette advertising, for ex-

The American people were sold a lie when they bought the proposition that beef is too high. We do not mean to say that beef is not high. It is high just as is the price of a new car, a cup of coffee, a pound of beans, a motel room, a television set . . . everything

on earth we must have. But the person who says that he "can't afford" to eat steak, then buys a new car, a cup of coffee, a television set, a gallon of gas . . . or even a pound of pinto beans, sim-

ply is rationalizing. The facts are, those who have set the prices on a new car-or television set through the years set them at a figure necessary to return a profit to those producers involved. And we accepted it, if the desire was strong enough and we could rake up the down pay-

But beef, like all agricultural products, was one of those items that has long been underpriced, not because the farmer or cattleman was overly generous, less greedy, but because in our economy he had no other choice. He long raised his cattle, grew his wheat or cotton, and stuck out his hand, asking, "What will you give me?" Humanlike, we all assumed this too-low price was the norm. And when for once in a lifetime beef reached parity with everything else man buys, it just

SEEMED that beef was too high! We'd be the same way about buying a \$5,000 car if we had been paying \$2,500 for a model only to find that the new model had

doubled in price. Dried navy beans have increased 500 per cent in price over the past year, with kidney, pinto, lima and the others not far behind. Navy beans are selling for \$51 a hundred, pinto beans \$42! Even yellow split peas have jumped from \$7.75 to \$29.50 per hundred. But we don't see this screamed on television every night! We don't see the price of a new car mentioned, even in the paid ads!

The cattleman, the feedlot, and the communities supported by them, have a vast new selling job to do . . . if they expect to survive.

### Talk Of Texas

Texas rancher who leased some of his land for oil exploration many years ago also had dabbled with dowsing - the use of a forked stick to find water and oil.

Before drilling began; he went over the acreage with a dowsing rod: At a point where the twitching wand indicated the presence of oil, he drove a stake into the ground.

When the drilling crew came along shortly after, nobody was around to tell them where to set the well. When the men saw the stake, they assumed that it was the marker for the drilling site and began their work. They had drilled more than 1,000 feet by the time a geologist arrived and told them they were drilling in the wrong place.

By then, it was too late to abandon the project. They continued drilling. After another 1,000 feet they hit a gusher.

Later they moved their rig to the site selected by the geologists. Yep, it was a dry hole.

HOW IT BEGAN - The first public meeting of Masons in Texas occurred on December 27, 1835, about a mile north of Brazoria.

Dr. Anson Jones, who was to become the president of the Republic of Texas a few years later, called the meeting. The lodge brothers met under a large oak on the farm of John Austin. The tree, known today as the Masonic Oak, still stands just off-State Highway 36.

The charter for a Masonic lodge

had been issued to Jones by the Grand Lodge of Louisiana several months earlier. He kept the charter with him in his saddlebags through the battle of San Jacinto. After Texas won its independence from Mexico and the new Republic was established, Jones called a meeting of Texas Masons in the Sena chamber on December 20, 1837.

There, with President Sam Houston of the Republic presiding, the Grand Lodge of Texas was formally established. Jones was unanimously elected the first Worshipful Grand Master.

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY -Christmas, 1883, was not a happy one in Brown County because it brought a climax to the fencecutting war.

Cutting of fences by armed bands had started in the summer of 1883. It was part of the conflict between landless cattlemen who wanted to retain the open range and those who had established permanent ranches behind barbed wire fences. Most ranchers owned or leased the fenced lands, but others enclosed public lands and even farms that belonged to others.

To discourage the practice, the fence-cutters began destroying barbed wire all over the county. By late fall, the damage by fencecutters (who also burned pastures sometimes) was estimated at \$1 million. It all climaxed on December 10, 1883, when more than 200 wirecutters met in Brownwood, the county seat, and demanded that the sheriff protect their activities...

On January 4, 1884, the Legislature met in special session and passed a law making fencecutting a felony. In return, ranchers agreed to remove fences from across public roads and from land they didn't own or lease.

It was a victory for the small ranchers and farmers, but it sounded the death knell for the open range.

"WE CAN shut this country down some of the independent truckers are bragging, as though that's something to be proud of.

Maybe they can. Well, so could a lot of other groups. And suppose one of them did? Would the truckers or anyone else — be better off in a "shutdown" country?

The truckers have some legitimate grievances, caused mainly by the same kind of behavior on the part of the Arabs that some of the truckers themselves are now adopting. That in itself is food for thought.

The independent truckers are small businessmen. They generally own their own trucks, which are often heavily mortgaged. They usually charge by the mile for their services and must pay their own expenses.

TIME IS MONEY

WITH LOWER speed limits, they will not be able to cover as many miles in a given time period, which cuts into their pay, or profit. Likewise, higher fuel costs raise their expenses.

To the extent that they are suffering from the energy crisis more than the rest of us, they deserve consideration. But they do not have a right to demand special privileges which leave them untouched while others bear their share of the bur-

The best way to alleviate the problem would probably be an increase in freight rates. The truckers understand that such an increase would aggravate inflation, so they oppose it. Unfortunately, the other alternatives are worse yet.

A higher speed limit for trucks than for cars - which the truckers want - would create a serious traffic hazard. Any traffic engineer will tell you that differentials in vehicle speed cause accidents. Picture trucks weaving in and out of the automobile traffic on an in-

terstate highway and you can see the

danger

So if the truckers get a special speed limit, it will be at risk of life and limb for their fellow highway users. I'm surprised the truckers haven't thought of that themselves, since they usually go out of their way to be courteous toward other motorists.

On the other hand, if the speed limit is raised to 65 for everyone, then the country won't save the gasoline that could be saved by a 50 or 55 limit. And right now, the conservation of any fuel is in the interest of all fuel users.

#### DIESEL IN DEMAND

THE TRUCKERS are having fuel problems, too. Most use diesel fuel, which is in very short supply. They believe that some truck stops have been overcharging for it.

I hope the government will move quickly to prosecute any fuel dealers who have been violating the price control laws, as it has pledged to do.


But every dealer with a higher price on his pump is not necessarily violating the law. Some price increases have been allowed by the Cost of Living Council. Other increases result from the rising cost of imported petroleum, which may be "passed through" under the control

laws. The government is trying to insure that vital industries - including freight transportation have access to as much 'fuel as possible. The difficulty in allocating diesel fuel is that virtually all uses of it are important. This is the fuel of trucks, buses, tractors, construction equipment, trains, mining and oil production equipment, and home heating. None of these users can be cut off entirely.

As of this writing, the majority of the independent truckers have continued to perform their vital work, for which we may all be properly thankful. The union truckers, the Teamsters, have also acted responsibly.

Members of both groups have been shot at because they stayed on the road.

If that keeps up, someone will be killed, and the blockade-minded truckers will have added the strain of murder to the blot of extortion on the shield of a proud industry.

BEEF BREAD Mrs. Bob Josserand Past President, **Hereford Cowbelles** 1 cup coarsely ground cooked roast beef or 1/2 lb. cooked ground beef one-third cup plus 1 tsp. sugar, divided.

1 cup seedless raisins 2 pkg. dry yeast 11/2 cups potato water 3 tb. shortening, melted 1 tb. molasses

1 cup all-bran graham flour cups (wholewheat) 4 cups white flour, approximately, divided

1 tb. salt 1/2 cup chopped walnuts Mix together 1 cup water, onethird cup sugar, beef and raisins and bring to a boil. Soak yeast and 1 tsp. sugar in 1/2 cup warm water. Add potato water, shortening, molasses, all-bran, graham flour and 2 cups white

Mix, cover with dean doth, place in warm, draft-free place. and let rise 10 minutes. Add salt, nuts and enough additional white flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Knead well, cover and allow to rise 10 minutes and knéad again

Cover and let rise to double in bulk. Punch down, cover and let rise 20 minutes more.

Divide and shape into 2 large or 4 small loaves. Place in well greased, lightly floured loaf pans. Use two pans 9x5x3 inches or four small, 41/2x21/2x21/2 inches. Cover and allow to rise 1 10, 11/2 hours. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bake large loaves 45 minutes; smaller loaves should take about 30 minutes.
