Random Shots.

Why not let us all bear our part of the revenue. It is urged by the anti prohibition exponents that to abolish the saloon would be to lose the revenue to the state and county. We would ask, who pays this revenue. The answer comes back, "the saloon man". Well, where does the saloon man get it. ans. He gets it from the people who drink the whiskey. Now it does not seem fair to impose on one class for this heavy tax although we acknsled, it is exceeding kind and generous for them to insist on paying it while the rest of us go untaxed to this extent. Don't you think that equalization would suggest an advalorum that should bear alike the expenses of the government. We insist that the generosity of those advocating this question is overtaxed and we want to help you.

What good thing (just one) does the saloon claim to do? I do not have refeance now to the man who runs it but the institutson of the saloon; is it a help to the work of church? Does it carry out the injunction of promoting domestic happiness and tranquility, vouohsafed to us id the preamble to the constitution of the United States?

It is argued that prohibition will cause frade to leave a town and go to other towns where whiakey is sold. We are trying to work up an educational in Hereford. Will a vote to retain the saloon make any impression on the minds of those that miget look in this direction for educational advantages? Would it likely influence those that might make Hereford their home? This question of no saloon is one that school people are pushing hard as a special advantage of their locality and it is a good claim too. You and I would prefer to have among a people to educate our boys and girls whose standard reached highe

than than voing to retain a drink shop in the shadow of of school house or college. Granting the argument, it is not e question of loss or gain as to what class of business shall we vote to retain, the kind that demands the drink or the kind that demands the school? But statistics from prohibition towns confute the argument that trade is driven to other towns by prohibitory measures.

Judge L. Gough of the firm of Witheospoons& Gough, declares publicly that that their firm will not in the event of a prohibitor victory, defend any one charged with the violation of the local option law; on the other hand they will assist in the prosecution whenever called upon. Without some home lawyer to assist glind tiger he would get very lonesome and probably tired of trying to violate the law.

The twenty seventh legislature declares that where C.O.D. liquer packages are delivered in a prohibition town, the sale of said livuor is considered made in that town and the shipper and express companp thus delivering becoming parties to the sale. Th-s breaks up the "jug" business as practiced in so many prohibition towns.

When the vialaton of the local option law answers to the bounty for a charge of vialation the prohibition law to the state for selling intoxicants without a license and to the federal government for selling without a reverue license, he will likely conclude that verily it is a weariness of the flesh to pay three lawyer fees for one violation of the law and will conclude it were better to fortify against these by getting into more congenial surroundings.

If prohibition won't prohibit, why won't it? What does prohibition proposeb It simply means that whiskey will not be sold by our, or your or my consent. We simply say that just for the sake of M. Saloon man's pocket book we will not give our consent for him to degrade

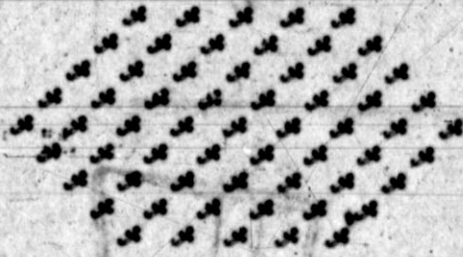
