

# City approves bid for fire station

Hereford City Commissioners voted Monday night to accept a bid of \$357,936 from High Plains Building Co. of Amarillo for the construction of a new fire station.

The proposed fire station will be built on the site of the existing station while a temporary fire station will be located on the corner of Third and Lee.

Commissioners received bids from eight construction companies with High Plains being the lowest bidder by nearly \$10,000.

City Commissioner Bud Eades asked the rest of the commissioners and the members of the Hereford Fire Department who were in at Monday night's meeting if a new fire station was needed. Eades stated that he had received a call from a tax paying citizen who felt that the city should spend the money on trying to repair the existing equipment instead of building a new complex that may not be needed.

Eades also remarked that there were reports that some of the fire station's equipment is old and unsafe for use. According to Fire Marshal Jay Spain the only piece of equipment that the fire department is not getting credit for is the new truck and the reason is that there has not been enough time to get the paper work done. Spain assured the commissioners that everything in the fire department is in fine working order and safe to use.

Fire Chief David Spain reported that the fire station has more trucks than the city has water.

"There is not enough room for

everything we have in this building," Spain said.

The new fire station would have much more floor space along with maintenance areas and room to

wash all the equipment. Currently firefighters have to wash and repair equipment outside the building.

Commissioner Joe Reinauer stated, "We need a new fire station

before we need repairs.

The fire department will begin moving equipment to the temporary location today, and demolition of the existing fire station will begin in ap-

proximately a week to ten days. High Plains Building claims the construction should be completed in 120 days.

In other business the commission: -Passed a resolution relating to the retirement of former city manager Dudley Bayne, who served for 29 years. The resolution was a tribute to the many years of service to Hereford noting his many contributions to the welfare of the city and its citizens.

-Accepted a bid from Goldwaite's of Texas Inc. for a turf maintenance vehicle for the golf course at a price of \$6,350. Goldwaite's of Texas was the lowest of three bidders.

-Appointed Commissioner Tom Legate as an alternate member to the ad-hoc committee to study the proposed nuclear waste depository. Legate will be the alternate to Commissioner Joe Reinauer.

## Hance to run for governor

AUSTIN (AP) — Former Democrat Kent Hance, claiming that Texas Gov. Mark White has failed to provide strong leadership, has formally announced as a candidate for the 1986 Republican nomination for governor.

"It's a pretty well-known fact that I am the one who can beat Mark White and will beat Mark White," Hance said on Monday.

Hance joined former Republican Gov. William P. Clements Jr. and U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler of Hunt in the GOP contest to choose an opponent for White next year. White has not announced but is expected to seek a second term. He defeated Clements in 1982.

"The lack of leadership in the prison system in the last two years is showing," Hance said of problems in the Texas Department of Corrections. It's in complete disarray."

He said the state should consider further appeals of prison reforms that were ordered by U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler.

Judge Justice is not the only federal judge in the United States," Hance said. "We can appeal."

However, the state already has entered a series of out-of-court agreements for making prison improvements.

Hance, a native of Dimmitt, started his announcement tour Monday with stops in Austin, San Antonio, Houston and Dallas. After his visit in Amarillo this morning, he was scheduled to make stops in Lubbock, Midland-Odessa, San Angelo and Abilene.

"The Republicans of Texas are willing to work overtime to defeat Mark White," Hance said this morning. "And they are looking for a strong candidate who can appeal to traditional Republicans as well as rural and small-town conservative voters."

As a candidate for governor, Hance said he believes in bolstering

strong public education in Texas, cutting back on unnecessary bureaucracies and programs, and implementation of a state water plan.

Hance said he had traveled to 60 counties in the last few months meeting with Republican Party leaders and volunteers and picking up support from many traditional Republican sources. In Dallas, the Kent Hance Steering Committee has 500 members. In Houston, 10 of 11 members of the State Republican Executive Committee have endorsed Hance, while 4 of 5 SREC members from San Antonio have done likewise.

In 1984, Hance lost the U.S. Senate Democratic runoff but won 204 coun-

ties. His appeal in the urban Republican areas can be traced to his support of President Reagan in 1981 when Hance carried Reagan's tax bill to victory in Congress. Hance has since switched to the Republican Party.

Hance believes he is the strongest candidate to recapture the conservative coalition of voters that swept President Reagan and Sen. Phil Gramm, an avid Hance supporter, back into office.

Hance graduated from Texas Tech, where he was recently honored as a Distinguished Alumni, and from the University of Texas Law School. He served four years in Austin as a state senator and six years in Congress as the representative from the 19th District.

He resides in Lubbock with his wife, Carol, and their two children—Ron, who attends Texas Tech, and Susan, a student at Monterey High School.

## Subsidies at record level

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farm income is down, but federal cash subsidies paid to farmers in calendar 1985 are climbing to a record level, the Agriculture Department says.

"Preliminary estimates indicated that direct cash government payments through June totaled more than \$5.8 billion, far surpassing the previous record of \$4.1 billion for all of 1983," the department's Economic Research Service said Monday in a new outlook report.

Last year's payments dropped only slightly from 1983 to \$4 billion, according to the preliminary figures. Nearly half of the \$5.8 billion in 1985 cash payments by midyear were feed grain "deficiency" payments, which were earned primarily on 1984 corn and sorghum crops. However, some of the money represented advances to farmers under the 1985 program.

The deficiency payments are due farmers if market prices during a

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## Senate deadlocked on budget bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite warnings that Uncle Sam's checks would soon start to bounce, the Senate was deadlocked over whether to attach a budget-balancing amendment to a bill needed to renew the government's borrowing authority.

"I assume we'll be under even more pressure tomorrow," Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole said Monday after another day of failure to clear the amendment he supports.

The government has reached its legal debt limit of \$1.824 trillion and, without new borrowing, will begin falling about \$20 billion a month behind in its payments.

The cash crunch wasn't noticeable Monday. "The government is going on in an absolutely normal fashion," said Ed Dale, a spokesman for the Office of Management and Budget.

But the Reagan administration insisted that by today or tomorrow it would be out of cash — money that's needed to back government checks.

"All those with government claims — whether Social Security recipients or defense contractors or holders of

government securities with interest payments due — would then be unable to have those claims honored," Deputy Treasury Secretary Richard Darman said Monday in a letter to Dole, R-Kan.

Throughout the day, meanwhile, Dole drifted between the parliamentary tangle of the Senate chamber and closed-door meetings. He planned more of the same today, but there was little prospect for speedy Senate action.

The president, in remarks before a group of GOP supporters at the White House on Monday, again called for the Senate to pass the balanced-budget plan and approve the debt increase.

The Senate wrangling was "putting the federal government in an emergency situation," Reagan said. "The business of our nation must go

forward. We need the debt ceiling increase passed."

The administration has asked for a new debt ceiling of \$2.078 trillion to last through the fiscal year, which started Oct. 1. Congress also could approve a smaller debt increase, to cover a shorter time period.

But the Senate remained trapped in the parliamentary knot tied by proponents and opponents of an amendment offered by Sens. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, Warren Rudman, R-N.H., and Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C.

The Gramm-Rudman-Hollings amendment would force Congress and the president to obey strict limits on annual deficits, and gradually reduce the allowable red ink each year until the budget became balanced in fiscal 1991.

If the lawmakers and the White

House failed to agree on a spending plan to meet those targets, automatic spending cutbacks would take effect.

The House already has approved extending the debt ceiling. However, any amendments would have to return to that Democratic-led chamber and leaders there have been readying a critical welcome.

## New version of farm bill resembles current policy

WASHINGTON (AP) — When Congress began debate on a new national farm policy last winter in the midst of a growing rural credit and income crisis, there was agreement from all sides on one point: current programs weren't working.

But as the House nears final action on its version of a new farm bill, the legislation resembles nothing so much as current policy. It retains the basic structure of farm price and income supports, although it tinkers some with the levels of those supports.

As members have advanced ideas that differed sharply from current law, they have been voted down, with warnings that exotic experiments shouldn't be undertaken with the farm economy in such shaky condition.

The bill does make a bow in the direction of the Reagan administration, which sought lower price support levels as a way of restoring competitiveness in the export market.

But nearly every dollar in lost income from lower prices is replaced by a dollar in new income guarantees, and new exemptions have been created to get around the \$50,000-per-farmer lid on direct subsidy payments.

"The safety net is there ... until there's some resolution of the macroeconomic problems facing farmers, which are beyond the reach of farm programs," said Rep. Edward Madigan, R-Ill., ranking minority member of the House Agriculture Committee.

Madigan said the bill should please farmers, who with record grain yields in some areas and frozen per-bushel income support levels, will see improved cash flows; and the Reagan administration, which gets a step toward renewed international competitiveness and market orientation.

While the White House is not raving about the bill, it no longer is threatening a veto, Madigan said.

Added Rep. Ron Marlenee, R-Mont., "This bill, coupled with some kind of early resolution of the Farm Credit System problems, means the difference between wholesale disaster in agriculture country and a road to a comeback."

The bill is designed to set farm policy through 1991, including price supports for major crops, income protection for farmers, farm credit programs and agricultural research and extension. It also contains authorization for the food stamp program and for overseas food aid.

The Reagan administration originally proposed farm-program spending of about \$30 billion over the next three years. As written, the House version would spend about \$34 billion over that period. With food stamps and other programs in the bill thrown in, the five-year total comes to \$141 billion.

The Senate is expected to take up its version of the farm bill next week, with differences to be worked out in a House-Senate conference.

### Gillett to appeal life sentence

BROWNWOOD, Texas (AP) — Michael Leigh Gillett will appeal the murder conviction and life prison sentence jurors handed him for a botched murder-for-hire scheme that left his step-grandmother dead, his attorney says.

Gillett, whose cool composure during two weeks of testimony cracked when the jury returned its verdict Monday, rubbed his eyes and blankly stared at the defense table as his mother wept.

His reaction was the same when jurors slapped him with the life prison sentence and \$5,000 fine after another one hour and 20 minutes of deliberations.

The life sentence was the maximum sentence that could be returned on the charge of murder. A capital murder charge that could have brought a death sentence was dropped Monday morning.

### Judge delays injunction ruling

AUSTIN (AP) — State District Judge Harley Clark was expected to rule today on a motion by "white oil" operators in the Panhandle Field to block a Railroad Commission order that could shut down some of their wells.

After a 5½-hour injunction hearing Monday, Clark said, "I want one more night to sleep on this."

Lawyers for white oil operators and those seeking to halt the operators' use of refrigeration, or LTX, units disagreed Monday over the effect of Clark's earlier opinion that a commission order was null and void.

That order required retesting of wells with LTX units, which chill vapor to a water-white liquid that is counted as crude oil. Some operators use the liquid to meet the oil-well test of one barrel of crude oil per 100,000 cubic feet of gas.

There are spacing and production advantages to having a well classified as an oil well. For example, an oil well may be drilled on 10 acres, a gas well on 640 acres.

On Sept. 13, Clark said in a letter as to the "substantive merits of the case, I find no error in the decisions and actions of the commission."

### Pilots sue air carrier

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal racketeering lawsuit filed by the Air Line Pilots Association alleges Continental Airlines improperly trained and certified new pilots to take advantage of striking pilots.

The lawsuit filed Monday accuses Houston-based Continental of administering improper, shortened "refresher" and requalification training to pilots who were hired or promoted to replace striking pilots. The replacement pilots, according to the suit, were required by law to receive more comprehensive training.

ALPA alleges that Continental allowed inadequately trained and fraudulently certified reviewing pilots to certify the competency of replacement pilots.

The union also alleges that Continental improperly trained and certified new pilots "to gain an unfair and fraudulent bargaining advantage" against striking pilots.

Continental spokesman Mike Cinelli, when asked about the lawsuit, said, "Pardon my laughter, but it's obvious that ALPA has more lawyers than they have sense."

"This suit will undoubtedly make the most entertaining reading yet of any legal document they filed," Cinelli said.

ALPA struck Continental on Oct. 1, 1983, one week after the airline filed for court protection from its creditors under the federal bankruptcy code, slashed wages up to 50 percent and scaled down its operations.

## INTERNATIONAL

### US asks banks for new loans

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The Reagan administration today asked private and development banks to come up with \$29 billion in additional loans over the next three years to help developing countries improve their living standards.

U.S. Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III unveiled the proposal at a news conference before the opening of the joint International Monetary Fund and World Bank Conference in Seoul.

To get the money, developing countries will have to adopt new policies "to promote growth and balance of payments adjustment and to reduce inflation," he said.

At the end of last year developing countries were in arrears on \$43 billion of their overall debt, which is expected to total \$1 trillion by the end of 1985.

The World Bank provides long-term loans for development projects, while the IMF provides short-term loans to help countries with credit problems and helps them arrange loans with commercial banks by setting conditions for economic reform. They both have the same 149 member governments.

The United States is the major contributor to both international organizations, and U.S. agreement is needed for any major changes in functions or financing.

### Families of hostages await word

LONG BRANCH, N.J. (AP) — Relatives of Americans who had boarded an Italian cruise ship before it was hijacked by Palestinian terrorists anxiously awaited word today on whether their loved ones were safe in Cairo or still aboard the vessel.

Ten passengers, all from New Jersey, were known to be among the 78 Americans who had booked passage on the Achille Lauro. The ship was seized Monday after it left Alexandria, Egypt, and the hijackers threatened to blow it up if Israel did not release 50 prisoners.

The New Jersey residents were on a trip arranged by ABC Tours, said Robert Kantor, whose parents were part of the group.

Kantor said he spoke early today with Carol Hodes, whose parents went on the cruise, and that she said she spoke by telephone with her father at the Cairo Concord Hotel and was told that six Americans remained aboard the ship.

### Ships reported heading for Beirut

PORT SAID, Egypt (AP) — Radio reports said hijackers seeking the release of 50 prisoners from Israel were forcing a commandeered Italian cruise ship to steer for Beirut today, and that they were threatening to kill 413 hostages one-by-one unless their demands were broadcast.

Israel Radio, quoting Israeli radio monitors, said the ship was heading northeast from the Egyptian coast, apparently toward Beirut. It said Egyptian naval vessels and commando units were on standby.

A maritime radio station in San Sebastian, Spain also reported that the captain of the hijacked ship informed a nearby warship it was proceeding to Beirut.

The Spanish station Onda Pesquera, which monitors maritime radio reports, said the captain of the cruise ship asked the warship in a short radio message not to follow it. The station said it was not able to identify the warship.

"The more we study it, the more problems we have with the specifics," said Rep. Thomas S. Foley, the House majority whip and chairman of the Democratic task force reviewing the amendment. He said the Democrats were not going to be forced to act under "the pressure of a contrived emergency."

## Winter storm gusting through nine states

A winter-like storm packing wind gusts of up to 81 mph surged out of the Northwest and left parts of nine states in the grip of a big chill today that pushed the mercury to record lows, closed the entrances to Yellowstone National Park with heavy snow and threatened harvests. Up to 18 inches of snow blanketed parts of Montana, Utah, Minnesota, North and South Dakota, Wyoming, Nevada, Idaho and the mountains of eastern Oregon. Bitter cold wind made it feel like 20 degrees below zero in some areas.

"Temperatures will continue to drop in many areas, setting new records for the next couple of days," the National Weather Service said Monday.

The weather service said 18 inches of snow was on the ground early today near Utah's Elizabeth Mountain and Mirror Lake.

More snow was forecast today for much of the nine-state area blasted by storm.

"It's not unusual to get snow this early in Montana," said Robert Doherty of the weather service. "But it is unusual to have a storm this big this early."

In Great Falls, Mont., a low of 15 degrees early today broke a record

of 18 set in 1966, and Billings' 18 degrees bettered an 18-year-old mark by 10 degrees.

Another record was set in Glacier Park, Mont., where the temperature reached 20 degrees, 11 degrees lower than the 1961 mark.

The unseasonable cold reached as far south as Florida where the temperature dipped to 41 degrees in Tallahassee, breaking by 3 degrees a record set in 1932. North Dakota Agriculture Commissioner Kent Jones said the storm could threaten the wheat and sunflower harvests. Snow can bend or break the plants, and farm machinery will not be able to pick them up, he said. Moisture also lessens crop quality, he said.

In Wyoming, Yellowstone National Park officials closed several entrances Monday because of heavy snowfall.

Survivors include a sister, Norma McRight of Hereford.

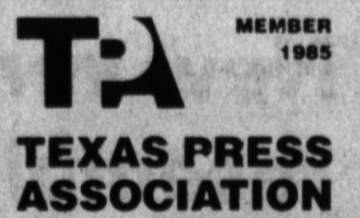
### CLIFFORD C. PICKENS

Charlie Leibrandt, who will start the opener, was 2-0 and had a 1.72 earned run average against Toronto.

Bud Black, who will start Game 2 Wednesday, was 10-15 overall but 2-0 with a 2.28 ERA against the Blue Jays.

Danny Jackson, 1-0 with a 1.99 ERA in three starts, will pitch the fourth game.

Howser will have Bret Saberhagen, 20-6, pitch the third game and will use Mark Gubicza, 14-10, in long relief.

The Blue Jays won 99 games in taking their first-ever AL East championship, but were just 24-26 against left-handers.

Runs may be hard to come by in this series. Toronto led the league in team pitching and the Royals were second, and most of the games between the teams this year were low-scoring. Kansas City won the series 7-5.

A former Hereford High School athlete, who played college football and track, has been named to the Tarleton State University athletic hall of fame.

Other former Tarleton athletes named to the school's athletic hall of fame are: Robert Glover, basketball, 1933-34; Walter Moegelin, football, 1964-67; and Charles Grooms, track and football, 1974-78.

The honorees will be guests at a reception in the physical education at 10 a.m. on Oct. 19, and then at a luncheon at 11:30 a.m. before their induction during the game.

The Oct. 19 has been designated as the "Hall of Fame Game" in honor of the former Tarleton athletes.

The Tarleton State University athletic hall of fame will have 60 members after the Oct. 19 induction ceremonies.

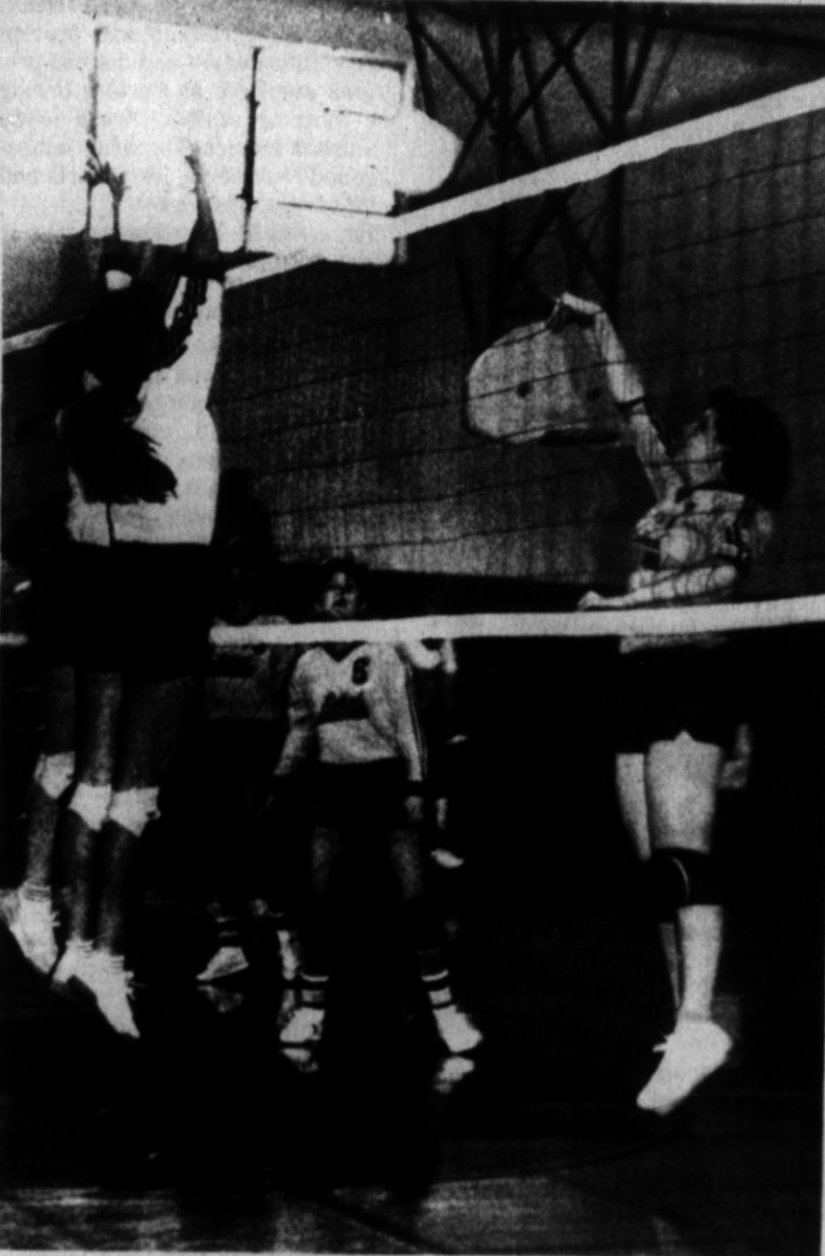

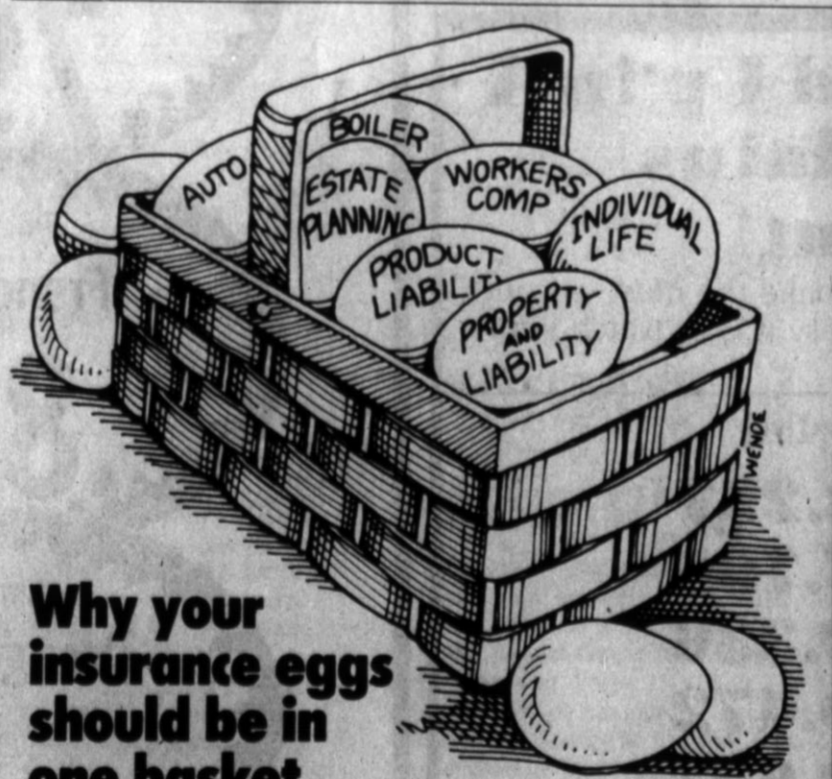

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## Dodgers, Cardinals begin

### N.L. title series Wednesday

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Experience guided Los Angeles Dodgers Manager Tommy Lasorda to his decision to tab left-hander Fernando Valenzuela to start in the opening game of the National League playoffs.

"It's not a tough decision," Lasorda said. "I want to pitch Fernando first. When the playoffs start, forget about all the records and stats. He's been through this before."

Valenzuela, a 17-game winner this season, will be matched against St. Louis Cardinals' left-hander John Tudor, 21-8, in Wednesday night's opener.

Valenzuela, 24, has a 2-1 record and a 1.96 ERA in three Championship Series starts, two in 1981 against the Montreal Expos and the other against the Philadelphia Phillies in 1983.

While Cardinals Manager Whitey Herzog contemplated loading up for Valenzuela, 17-10, by starting a lineup of right-handed hitters, Lasorda predicted the best-of-seven matchup with St. Louis will be "a very, very exciting playoff."

The series figures to match up contrasting styles of winning baseball.

"They have the speed and we have the power," said Dodgers outfielder Mike Marshall, whose 28 homers ranked second behind Pedro Guerrero's club-leading 33.

The Cardinals will be led by the National League's leading hitter, Willie McGee, who batted .353. Their primary weapon will be their team speed.

Led by rookie speedster Vince Coleman, who swiped 110 bases to set a rookie record this year, the Cardinals figure to force the action with aggressive baserunning.

Speed being what it is to the Cardinals, Herzog surprised Monday when he said he was pondering the idea of keeping some of it in reserve in the series opener. He said he there is a possibility that right-handed hitting Tito Landrum could be used in place of Coleman.

Coleman, a switch hitter, has had more success batting from the left side. Landrum batted .280 as a part-timer for the Cards this season and is best remembered for the home run that won the pennant for Baltimore in the fourth game of the 1983 playoffs.

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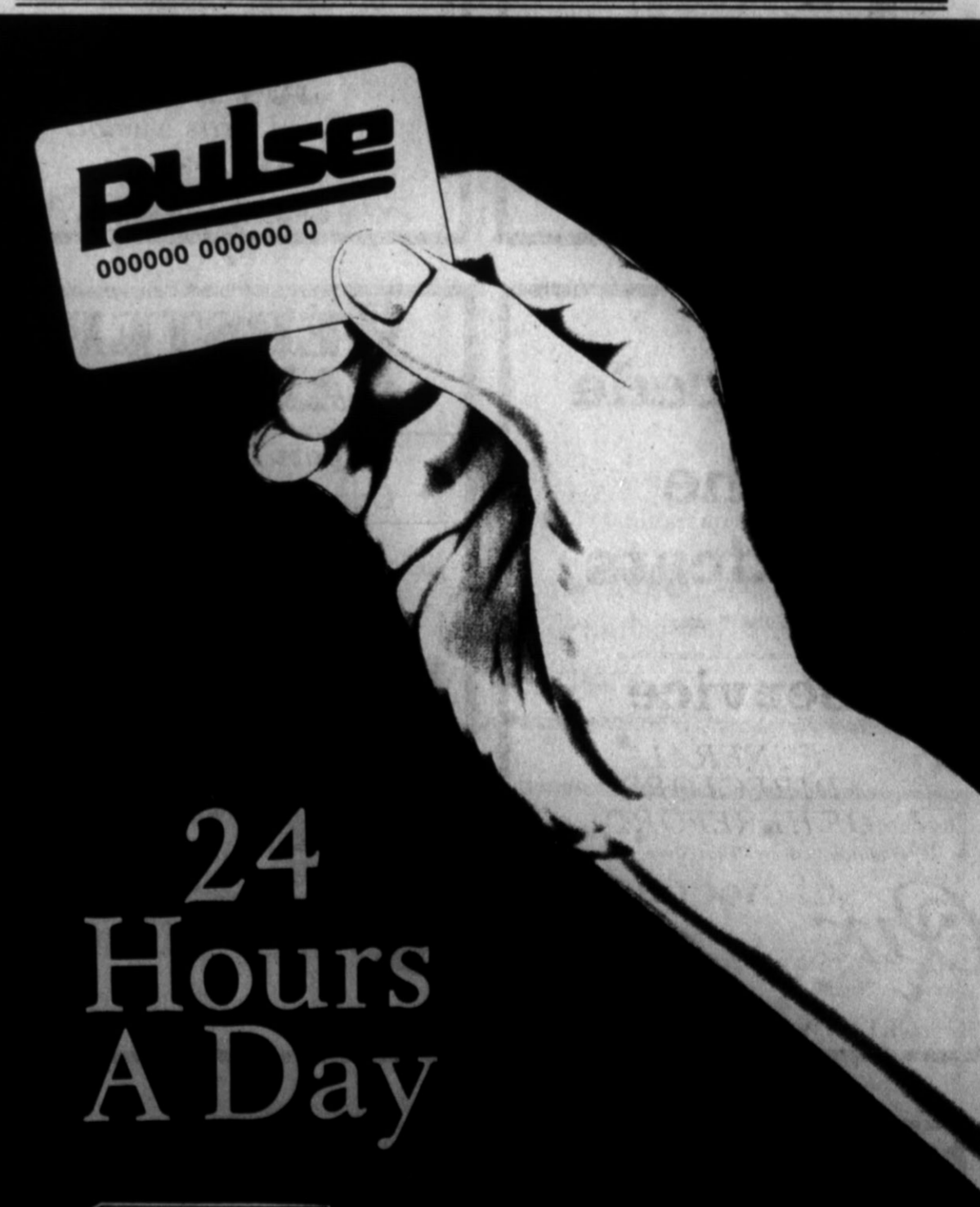
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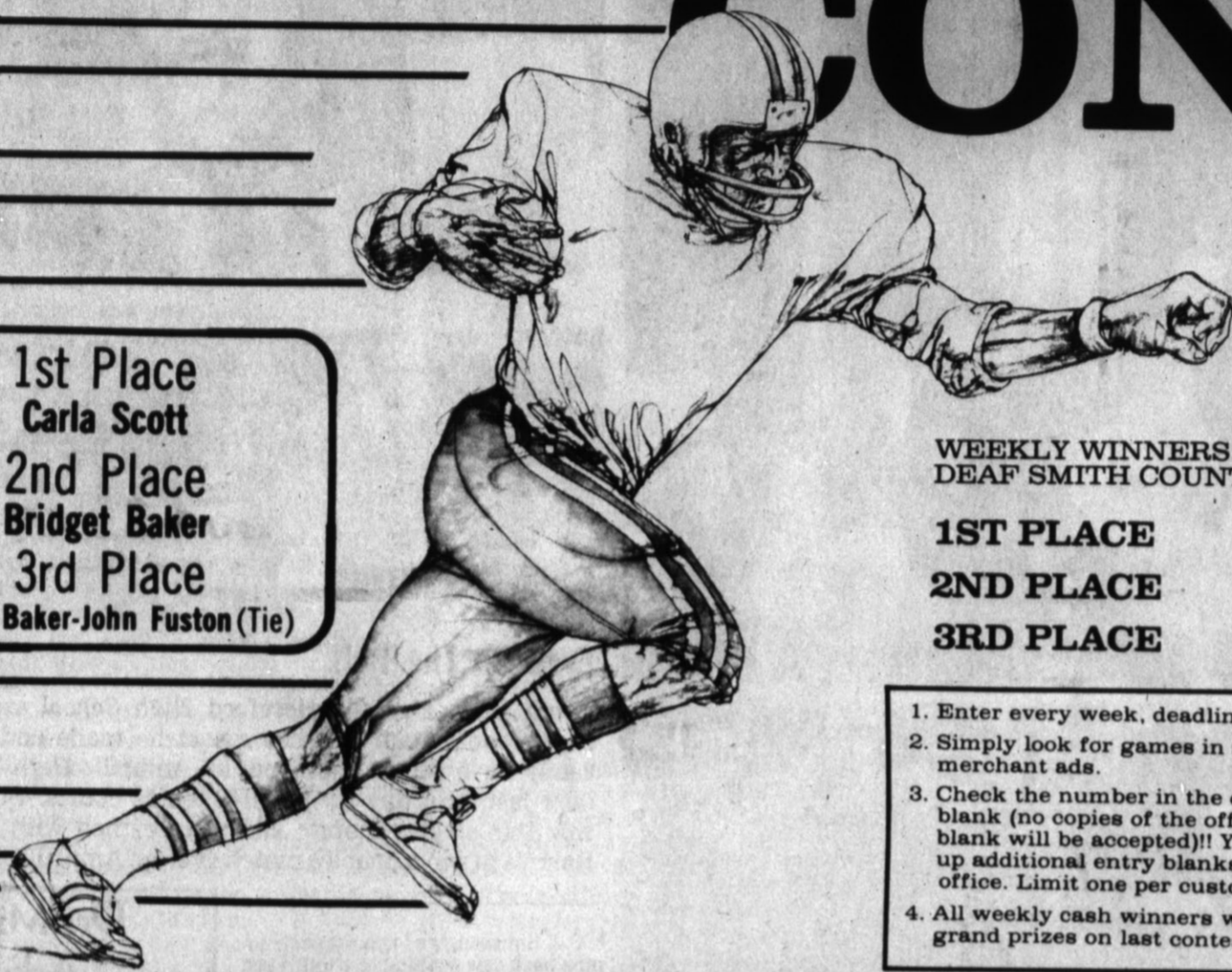

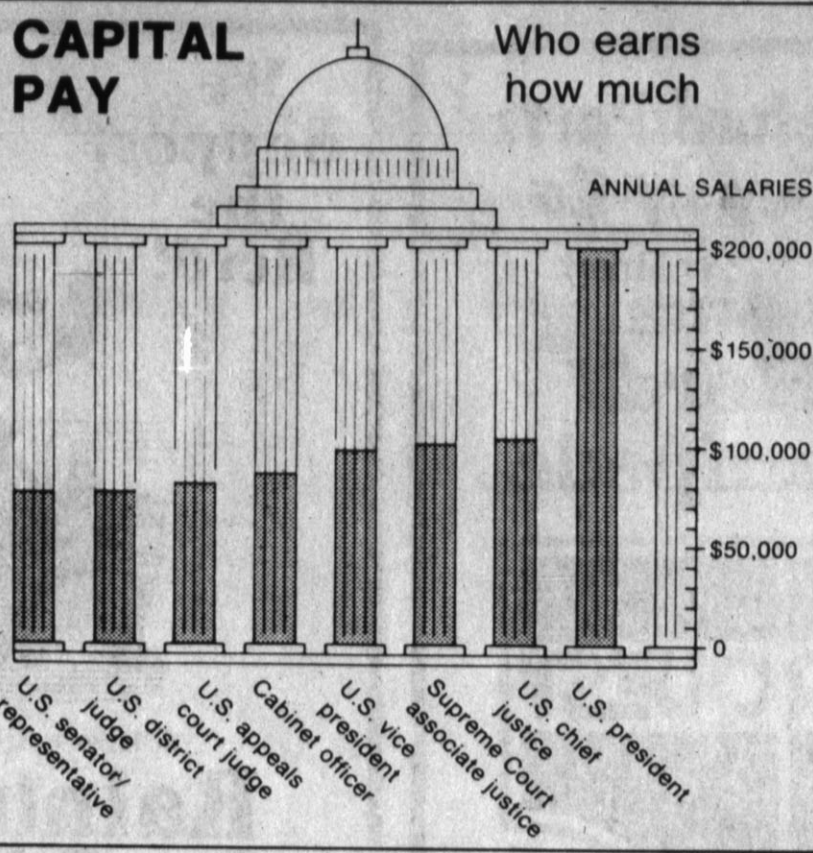

### SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

BETHEL, Conn. (AP) — A device that determines the optimum site for construction of a wind powered generator was awarded first place recently in the 1985 Duracell Scholarship Competition.

The "Wind Speed Analyzer" won the \$10,000 grand prize for Randall Makela, a senior at Cashmere High School in Cashmere, Wash.

Of the 40 other winning entries in the \$30,000 competition, 17 were designed to make life easier, nine were designed to educate, nine were to serve as a warning device, four were to entertain, and one was designed to provide sound and light.

# Traces of molybdenum may reduce some cancer types

A Texas Tech University nutritionist wants to know why the trace element molybdenum reduces the incidence of esophagus and breast cancer.

In two previous experiments, food and nutrition professor Shiang P. Yang and his colleagues in the College of Home Economics found that small amounts of molybdenum in the diet reduce the incidence of the two types of cancers in rats treated with chemical carcinogens.

"We're very excited since we have found this effect," said Dr. Yang. "Now we're studying how molybdenum works in the body to fight cancer of the esophagus and breasts."

Molybdenum, used to manufacture high quality steel, is a trace element in the soil. Humans ingest it in drinking water and through plants. However some areas have little or not molybdenum in the soil. Residents of those areas have diets deficient in molybdenum.

Yang became interested in molybdenum research after a 1979 visit to China where he learned that Dr. Xian-Mao Luo of the Cancer Institute in China had connected a high incidence of esophagus cancer

in the Henan Province of northern China with a low level of molybdenum in the soil.

Some areas of the United States also have soils low in molybdenum, but the incidence of esophageal cancer is much greater in other parts of the world.

Yang said esophageal cancer strikes blacks living in Washington, D.C. at a higher rate than other U.S. groups. However, the reasons for the high incidence rate are unknown.

In the U.S. there are about 20 cases per year for every 100,000 blacks while in Russia, where some areas are very low in molybdenum, the incidence rate is 500 cases per 100,000 population.

The areas of China, Russia and Iran which have high rates of esophagus cancer have been found to differ from places which have lower rates in the amount of molybdenum the inhabitants have in their diets.

The first experiment showed a significant increase in esophageal cancer in rats which did not get a molybdenum supplement after being treated with a cancer-causing agent. The second study revealed similar results for cancer of the mammary glands in female rats.

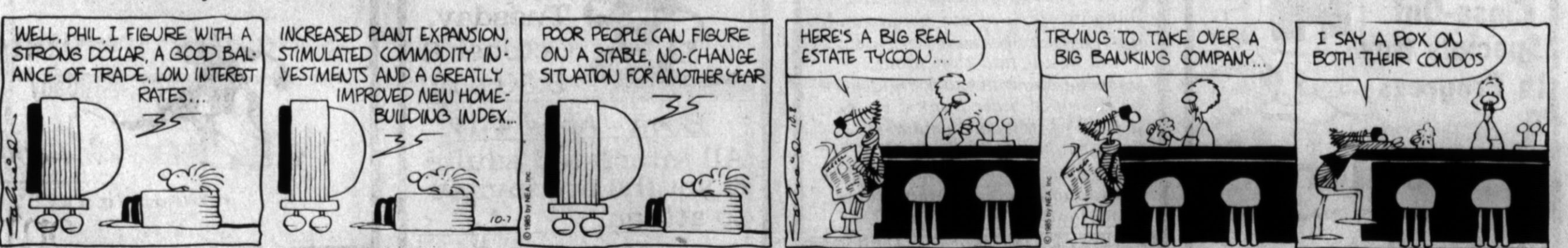

## Guerrillas use young children

**BOGOTA, Colombia (AP)** — Leftist guerrillas are sending children as young as 12 into combat, armed with assault rifles nearly as tall as themselves.

Last week three girls — 12, 13 and 14 years old — were killed when guerrillas of the April 19 movement ambushed an army patrol near the town of Tulua, about 250 miles southwest of the capital of Bogota.

The report came from Tulua Mayor Alvaro Leon in a broadcast interview. He said the children's bodies were so torn by grenade shrapnel and bullets that it would be difficult to identify them.

Twenty guerrillas and four soldiers were killed, the Defense Ministry said. Guerrilla reports on fighting, slipping under the door of the AP's Bogota office, say the army always distorts such figures in its favor.

It is not unusual to find children helping out in guerrilla camps in Central America and South America, but sending youngsters to fight usually indicates desperation.

Fighting between the April 19 Movement, known as M-19, and the army the last two months has been the heaviest in the last 30 years of almost constant guerrilla insurrection in this country of 30 million people.

More than 200 guerrillas and 70 policemen and soldiers have been killed, most of them in the Andes in southwest Colombia, according to military communications and broadcast interviews with small town officials.
