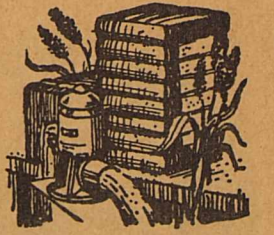

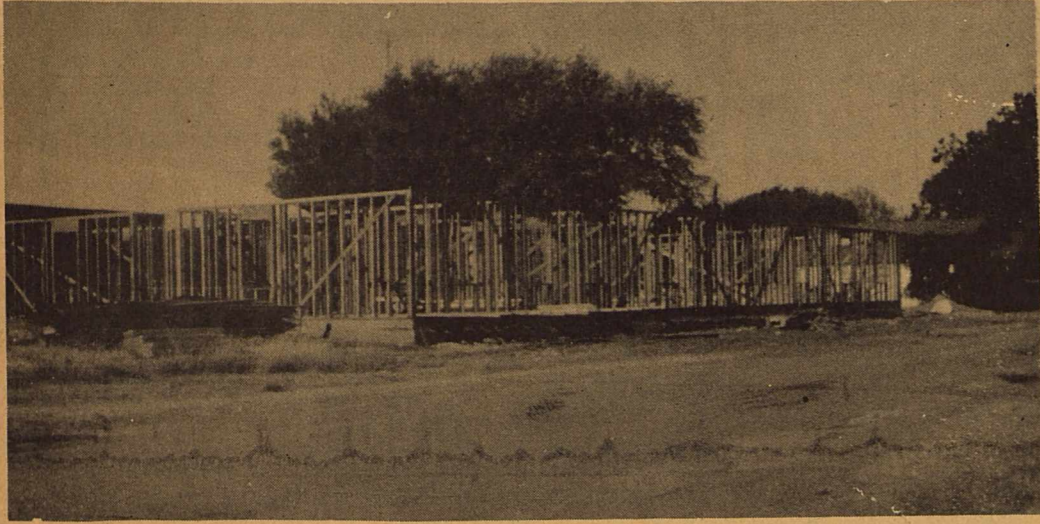

Rule Water Supt. Awarded State Health Dept. Citation

Austin - An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Travis E. Self, Rule water and sewage department superintendent.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in

modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Self's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

Water Used In July Sets Record Breaker For Rule

Rule - The master meter at the Rule Water Plant showed that Rule used more water in July, 1969, than in any period in former months, or in any month in former years. The

total water pumped for that period amounted to 12,254,500 gallons. Last month, June, the amount pumped was 7,192,600.

In July of 1968 the master meter recorded a total of 10,868,100 gallons; in June 1968 the amount was 6,747,200.

Checking back to July of 1959 the records show that 9,287,400 gallons of water were pumped.

Work continues on the job of moving the main water line over near the curb on Highway 283 prior to the laying of a new and wider pavement from the traffic light south to the edge of the city limits of Rule.

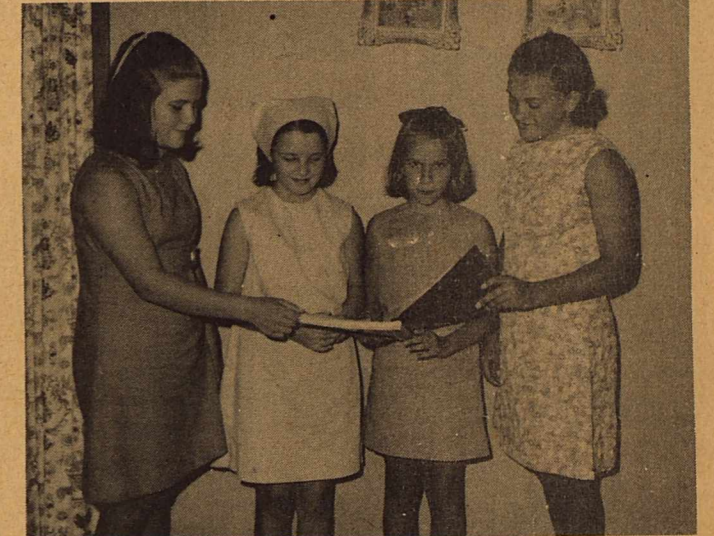

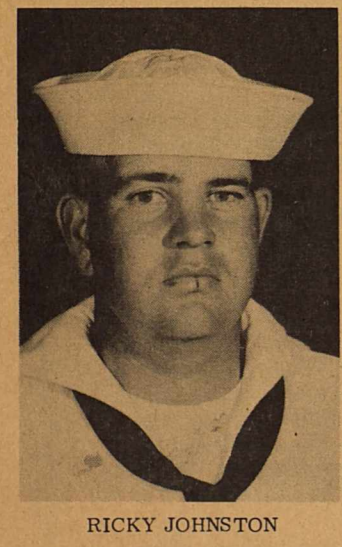

A Smith Funeral Home ambulance brought the Latin-American to the Knox County Hospital where he was dismissed Friday afternoon.

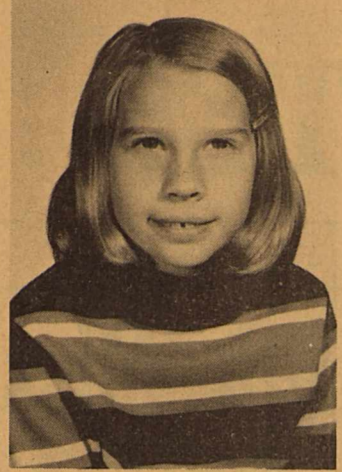

First Baptist Junior Choir Enjoy Outing

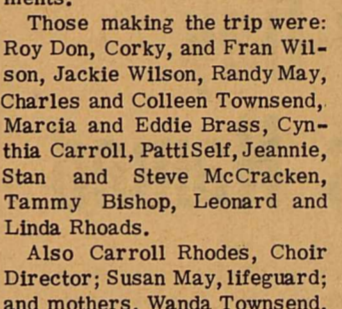



VA To Help High School Dropouts

High school dropouts who enter the service may return to get their diploma under the GI Bill according to Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

The VA will pay veterans up to \$130 a month (if single and they are full-time students - more if they have dependents). Those attending adult evening school will be enrolled at half-time rate.

These payments will not reduce their college or on-the-job training benefits, Coker said. A number of colleges and universities have embarked on new programs for returning veterans who do not possess a diploma but do desire a higher education. However, such veterans must meet certain qualifications established by the institutions and the VA.

Upon discharge, veterans should file at the nearest VA office for certificates of eligibility even though they may not use them immediately. This will save time when they later apply for schooling or on-the-job training.

The VA Manager also reminded veterans who wish to become policemen or firemen that there are benefits under the GI Bill for these approved courses.
