### Accent on Health

Flouridation of public water supply has been one of the most widely discussed and debated health issues during the past quarter century.

Almost all water supplies are naturally flouridated to some extent, containing a mineral form of flouride. Controlled flouridation brings the amount of flouride in water up to the optimum level, says the Texas State Department of Health.

Lack of sufficient dietary flouride can render the teeth more susceptible to decay. Flouride is a nutrient, working in the body through normal body processes. In addition to strengthening the teeth, there is some evidence that flouride may help to prevent other diseases of the bones and circulatory system. The optimum level of flouride as a nutrient is extremely small. Even if a person received eight to 10 times this optimum level there would be no serious danger, say health authorities.

The water of many communities contains much more flouride than is needed, providing a natural laboratory in studying its effect on the body. Some of the earliest studies of flouridation were conducted in Texas communities with natural flouride of optimum of higher levels.

Since flouride is a natural part of the environment, adding minute quantities to water won't hurt plants, animals, machinery or anything else. Even if some of the flouride is unused, watering lawns, for example, it still is much cheaper to distribute and control the flouride level in water than in any other way. Flouride can be applied directly to the teeth, but it isn't as effective and is more expensive.

A precise answer to the cost depends on how much natural flouride is in the water. The design and size of a community's water system also makes

A difference. However, in most cities controlled flouridation costs between five and 10 cents per person per year. This small cost is more than offset by the savings in dental cavities later on. Children grow up with stronger, healthier and prettier teeth than they would without flouride. The results of a nationwide nutrition survey showed dental problems as one of the most frequent health problems in children. Flouridation of water would get help to those who need it most, lower income groups who cannot afford expensive dental care.

Flouridation is an extremely valuable preventive tool against dental trouble. It benefits everyone in a community by reducing the incidence of tooth decay. In Texas alone, two and one-half million people in nearly 70 cities drink water in which the flouride level is controlled. Another four million people in 586 communities have naturally flouridated water. Texas is 17th in the nation in total population served by flouridation. Total number drinking flouridated water in the United States is 92 million. To add to the emphasis on flouridation, seven states now require water flouridation.

Known to man for nearly 5,000 years, marihuana is one of the most common and least understood of all drugs. Most of the American experience with marihuana has been limited to the widespread, relatively infrequent use of a rather weak form of the drug. Although the principal active ingredient in the plant is thought to be a very complex substance known to scientists as Delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC for short, much remains to be learned about the chemistry of marihuana and related substances.

The Texas Health Department, as one of the prime dispensers of information on drugs of abuse in the state, feels that it is time to cut through the volumes of words and contradictions spoken about this drug, and separate the facts from fiction.

There is a general agreement among medical researchers that at the common levels of usage the typical subjective effects of marihuana are: alteration of time and space perception, sense of euphoria, relaxation, well-being and disinhibition, dulling of attention, fragmentation of thought, impaired immediate memory, an altered sense of identity, exaggerated laughter, and increased suggestibility. Other less common effects are dizziness, a feeling of lightness, nausea, and hunger.

The drug's effects on the emotions and senses vary

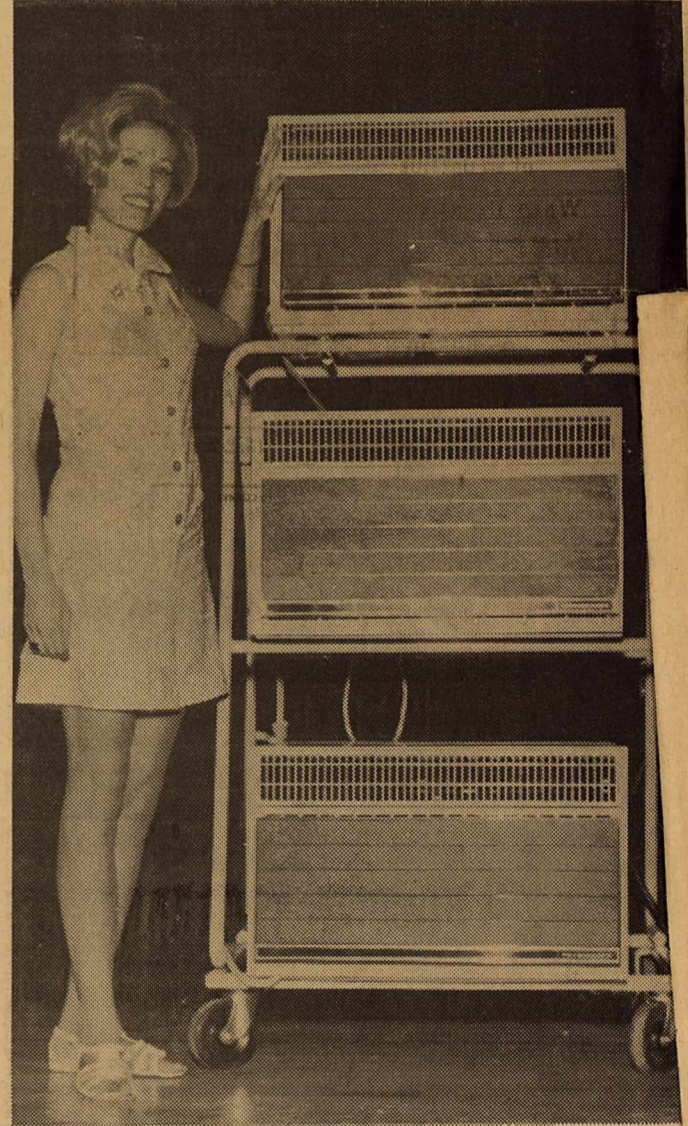

widely, depending on such factors as the user's expectations, the circumstances of use and, of course, the strength and quantity of the drug used. Typically, time is distorted and seems extended - five minutes may seem like an hour. Space may seem enlarged or otherwise distorted - ten feet may seem to be 100 feet. Sounds and colors sometimes seem intensified, and hearing seems keener. Controlled laboratory tests on humans indicate little or no influence on creativity, one way or another. The distortions of the senses apparently account for the user's feelings of being more creative.

Recent studies indicate that marihuana has no effect on the body temperature, respiratory rate, blood pressure, blood sugar, or diameter of the pupil. The drug does produce an increase in the pulse rate and causes a reddening of the eyes at the time of use, and some dehydration.

The drug can produce illusions, or misinterpretations of various sensations. But hallucinations, or the experience of a non-existent sensation, and delusions are rare. Marihuana does not lead to physical dependence. Therefore, it cannot be considered addicting. Chronic users become psychologically dependent upon the effects of the drug. Thus, it is classified as habituating.

The Texas Health Department is constantly updating its information on the drugs of abuse as new data becomes available. Much knowledge on the effects of marihuana has been gained from scientific research in the past year. Thousands more research projects are underway to determine the health implications of marihuana.



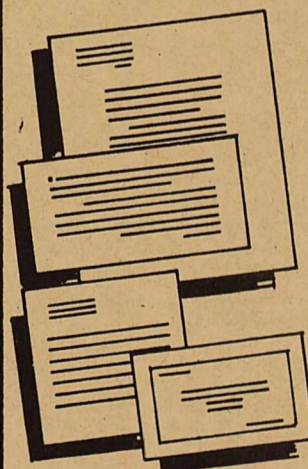

## TDA Seed Lab Now Located At Giddings

Giddings - The new 10,000 square foot Texas Department of Agriculture Seed Laboratory at Giddings is now open for business, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White and Seed Division director Bill Staffel said persons formerly using the TDA Seed Laboratory in Austin, should now send seed samples for purity and/or germination testing to the Giddings facility.

The move from the expensive Capitol area complex in Austin to Giddings will save taxpayers nearly \$3000 monthly in rent and utilities.

A new concept in cooperation between state agencies coincides with the lab construction. The TDA will provide training programs for youths under detention at the Texas Youth Council in the labs, greenhouses and 85 acres that will be used for seed testing, explained White.

TDA seed analyst John Metcalf will head laboratory operations. He will have about 20 employees, most of whom transferred from the old lab at Austin.

# Jackson Drug

As a general rule, when you request any kind of services to be performed for someone else, you may indeed be responsible for payment. But in the case of a medical emergency, the law usually makes an exception and denies liability. As one court explained:

"Persons commonly call for medical aid for the sick solely out of a spirit of kindness, without any expectation of becoming personally responsible."

Would it matter that the sick person was your friend or relative? Not necessarily. Thus:

A man brought his daughter-in-law to the hospital for some tests while her husband was away on a trip. When surgery became necessary, he told the doctor to go ahead. Did this request, plus his kinship to the patient, make him responsible for the surgical fee?

A court said no, because it was not customary for a man to be responsible for his daughter-in-law's medical expenses. To make him liable, said the court, there would have to be a more specific understanding between him and the doctor.

Still, the understanding need not be as specific as a formal legal contract. In another case, a man was driving his girl friend home from a party when he had an accident. The girl was badly injured, and he rushed her to a hospital.

There he begged the doctor to do everything he could to save her life. He said he "felt responsible" because she had suffered the injury in his car.

Later, he tried to avoid liability to the doctor by pointing out that he had not made a specific agreement to pay. But a court held him responsible anyhow. The judge said the comments he did make, under such circumstances, could fairly be interpreted as a promise to foot the bills.
