This week the Star received several copies of "Skywriter," from the Meadow boys who are in California working in the defense plants Harvey Bass, Allen Watkins, and Boyce Verner. Skywriter is the official publication of the North American Aviation Inc. It contained some very interesting information.

In one copy was a picture of a long string of B - 25's, the large Twin Engine Bombers which the plant turns out for the Government. From the picture one would draw the idea that they are very enormous pieces of machinery.

Another picture showed a large banner hanging over the entrance to one of the buildings which read, "Remember to Keep 'Em Flying We MUST Get 'Em Built." This Banner was printed in red and blue lettering on a white background, carrying out the national colors.

All of the Meadow boys are working on the assembly line, in the same department, constructing the wings on these towering bomber planes Boyce, Allen and Harvey have them a small apartment together, and get their meals around the corner at a small restaurant. They report that they really enjoy their work.

They were in the middle of the earthquake which occurred in that section recently. They reported that in the middle of the night all of a sudden they heard a queer rumbling sound, and then the bed began to rock, first one corner coming off the floor, then the other, and sometimes the entire bed off the floor at the same time. It lasted about 30 seconds, but seemed like several minutes. One of the boys stated it would be impossible to state the feeling and emotion which went through their minds as this commotion was going on.

These young men, and thousands of others like them who are now working in the factories building and assembling machinery for the National defense program are not only doing a very great work in helping to build up the defense of our country, but are learning a trade which will perhaps furnish them profitable employment for many years hence. We say, more power to them.

### ECONOMY FRUIT CAKE

Combine in pan 2 cups raisins, 2 cups brown sugar, 2 cups water, 1 cup shortening. Let simmer 20 minutes, let cool. Take 3 1-2 cups of flour and sift a little over 1 cup chopped nuts. Sift the rest with 2 teaspoons salt, 2 tsp cinnamon, 2 tsp soda. Stir into cooled mixture, add nuts, use not-too-deep loaf pan for about an hour and fifteen minutes, or until done. Let stand about 24-hours or longer before cutting.
